## Refuses To Produce Notes On Case

# Chief Is Fined For Contempt

Police Chief Frank Barnett was ordered to pay a \$100 fine Thursday morning in Twin Falls County Probate Court for contempt, after he refused to produce personal notes during his testimony in a preliminary hearing.

Asked by Mr. Kramer to produce the notes, Chief Barnett refused. ## Troops Launch 5 Drives

SAIGON (AP) — About 10,000 American troops have launched five new drives against the enemy up and down the country to regain the initiative after the 10-day Viet Nam offensive.

The command reported yesterday that 390 dead against 341 wounded. Some operations were launched more than two months ago and the latest five days ago but fear security reasons an announcement was withheld.

These are in addition to the big U.S. and South Vietnamese Operation Quyet Thang—Resolve to Win—that has spread over five provinces close to Saigon. More than 1,000 of the enemy have been killed in this operation.

The purpose of all these operations is the same: to remove the enemy threat to critical areas and to regain the initiative from the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese when they launched their biggest offensive of the war against South Vietnamese cities in January.

The five new offensive thrusts are: —Along the coastal Beng Son flash, 200 miles northeast of Saigon, long threatened by the 23rd North Vietnamese Regiment. This operation was launched Feb. 29 by the U.S. 6th Infantry Division.

—North of the coastal provincial capital of Phan Thiet 100 miles east of Saigon, the Cong overran Phan Thiet in the new year offensive. The 101st Airborne Division began this drive Jan. 20.

—Against An Khe, a big U.S. military base in the central highlands about 220 miles north of Saigon, the 173rd Airborne Brigade kicked off this operation Jan. 11.

—On the edge of the War Zone C near headquarters of the U.S. 1st Infantry and 10th Airborne divisions, 22 miles southwest of Saigon. This operation was opened by the 101st five days ago.

—In the Bien Hoa-Lang Binh military complex headquarters of the U.S. Army in Vietnam 15 miles northeast of Saigon. This operation kicked off two weeks ago, and by the 7th Cavalry Regiment. This plan was.

Sen. Frank Church has reached the conclusion that there is a limit to what the government can do for the farmer and now believes that what the farmer needs is more effective bargaining power to sell what he raises.

The senator, speaking from Idaho Tuesday night to a capacity audience at the annual Jefferson-Jackson Day dinner at the Elks Club in Twin Falls, said the plight of the farmer—the one problem that has not been solved, although substantial advances have been made in all other fields.

this bargaining power. There is no real reason why a farmer should have to come to market when he has raised, and ask how much will you give me for it?"

Rather, the senator said, the farmer should take the initiative and bargain and "then we would be on the way to solving the farm problem."

Along the farm line, Sen. Church said that he was sponsoring new legislation to "plug the holes" in the meat import situation and is also working in the area of sugar beets and dairy products.

He said that the Democratic party had "addressed ourselves to the problems of the aging and the young" and was high in regard to older people.

He declared, adding old people to live in dignity and without fear.

# Hearing On School Budget Due March 28

A 1968-69 operating budget of \$2,893,042 for Twin Falls School District No. 411 will be discussed at 7:30 p.m. March 28 in an open hearing at the school administrative building.

The budget is up just over \$100,000 from the 1967-68 level, down 1.25 mills to 40 mills, an assessed valuation of \$32,457,967. Even with the budget increase, the levy has been able to be reduced because of increased valuation.

The bond interest and redemption levy is down from .925 mills in 1967-68 to 8.0 mills for 1968-69. A school plant facilities levy of 2.0 mill levy, however, marks for the greatest reduction in mills levied.

The 1.25 mill levy, voted on by voters in 1958, expired this year. School board clerk J. T. Anderson said it is possible the levy will be brought to the voters again this May when trustees are elected.

Included in the 1968-69 budget is a 1.0 mill for emergency levy. The one mill emergency levy, not included in last year's budget, was asked to allow for increased enrollment. It is anticipated that enrollment in the high school alone will increase by some 120 students, Mr. Anderson said.

The two mill levy for plant facilities, if voted on and approved, could not be included in this year's budget, however, and would have to wait until the 1969-70 budget.

Mr. Anderson said that the levy is used much as bond issue money is. In the past 10 years, it has been used for site purchases, building alterations and improvements, the high school stadium and snack bar, a vocational arts annex, library facilities, sidewalks and special education facilities have all been paid for from the fund.

Comparisons of budgeted expenditures between 1967-68 and the 1968-69 budgets show that most categories of expenditures are down, except those from the general fund. In 1967-68 \$2,178,965.85 was expended from that fund and the 1968-69 budget shows \$2,314,750 to be spent from general fund money.

The bond interest and redemption fund is up \$500 from last year's total of \$247,350.

Adult education has been cut to \$100 from \$1,000 in 1967-68, and driver education expenditures have been cut from \$50,000 to \$15,000. All other fund expenditures, except the Federal Forest Fund, which remains at \$500, have been reduced in the new budget.

## Mansfield Will Urge Senate To Cut Foreign Aid Request

By JACK BELL, WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield says he'll urge the Senate to cut President Johnson's \$2.9 billion foreign-aid request "to bare bones."

Bow Mansfield, a critic of Vietnam war escalation, said in an interview he would oppose any effort to suspend the program for the duration of the Asian conflict.

"The trend in foreign aid is in the right direction—downward," he said. "I believe that it should be cut to bare bones this year. But I do not think it can be cut off entirely. That would only be to abort it."

President Johnson's 1968-69 foreign-aid program includes \$420 million in military aid. Last year Congress topped \$1 billion of the President's request, only only \$2.2 billion, lowest in the program's six-year history.

Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, another Vietnam policy critic, has proposed suspension of all aid to help meet mounting war costs. There are clear indications of strong opposition to the aid authorization in both houses, but administration leaders feel they can salvage a reduced appropriation.

Mansfield said economic aid obviously must be continued in Vietnam, South Korea and friendly Southeast Asian countries. But he said even this must be reduced as a part of a general economy program.

In addition, he listed space, non-Vietnam defense spending and public works as other areas where savings might be made in the Congress' "budget war."

He is demanding spending reductions before they vote for increased taxes.

As a part of such a program he said that two-thirds of the U.S. troops who make up the equivalent of six divisions in Europe should be brought home.

Mansfield said he had asked a high administration official—declined to name—for a report on why the return of 25,000 European-based troops, announced last December, had been delayed.

He said troops were supposed to be coming home in January but the action was delayed. The Pentagon said it expects the movement home to start in April—unless—suspended.

Mansfield contended this delay contributed to the U.S. balance-of-payments problem which he said might have been eased had the troops been started home when originally scheduled.

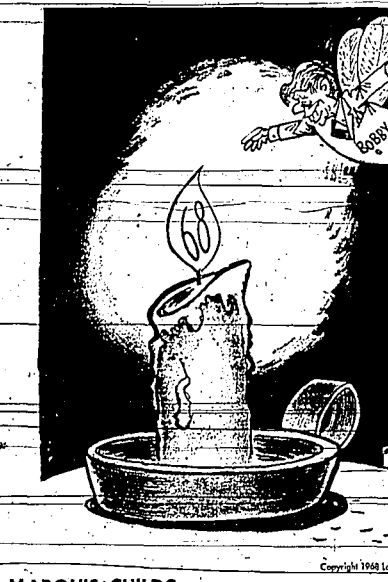

# Army Statement Is Expected On Deaths Of 5,000 Sheep In Utah



CARCASSES OF FIVE SHEEP lie dead in a snowbank near Skull Valley southwest of Salt Lake City. Scientists are probing the mysterious deaths of 5,000 sheep in Utah. Army chemists and biologists are expected to review a recent decision to refuse visas to Mormon missionaries.

**SKULL VALLEY, Utah (AP)**—A statement on the mysterious deaths of 5,000 sheep in Skull Valley southwest of Salt Lake City was to be made by the Army today. The Army's chemical and biological warfare division said Wednesday it was processing information for the statement.

The sheep began dying one week ago today on the rangeland near the Dugway Proving Grounds where the Army conducts chemical and biological warfare tests.

An Army spokesman said Tuesday the installation "definitely is not responsible" for the deaths.

All sheep deaths occurred on the Hatch Ranch, operated by the Anschutz Corp. of Denver. It is separated from Dugway by land and healthy sheep flocks.

Horses and other livestock weren't affected, and U.S. Department of Agriculture veterinarians do not believe the sheep died of a contagious disease.

Dr. Kent VanKampen, a USDA pathologist at Utah State University, said whatever was killing the sheep struck at the nervous system.

VanKampen said the symptoms were not those caused by poisons known to him.

Sen. Wallace F. Bennett, R-Utah, said he wrote to Secy. of Army Stanley Resor and Agriculture Secy. Orville Freeman, asking for a federal investigation.

"If the deaths are attributable to chemical warfare tests, action should be taken immediately to compensate the sheepmen for their losses," Bennett said.

He added that if the losses were from noxious plants "I would appreciate knowing what action the Department of Agriculture might take to clean the edge of this disaster."

## Review Of Visa Denials Is Requested

**BUENOS AIRES (AP)**—Argentina's president has been asked to review a recent decision to refuse visas to Mormon missionaries.

Visa applications for permanent residence by 200 Mormon missionaries had been denied by Hector Obligado, the director of migration.

The Federation of Evangelical Churches in Argentina appealed Wednesday to President Juan Carlos Onganía to request the "recent discriminatory measures."

The federation said visa refusals "is against the Argentine Constitution, the best Argentine liberal and progressive traditions and even against the recent decisions by the Vatican Council."

It added, "There is no official word to rectify the moral and institutional damage" done by the official's decision.

In refusing the visa permits, Obligado on March 3 said: "The North American pastors only came here to influence other people."

He added, "It is for Argentines, not foreigners, to deal with matters pertaining to the national spirit."

When asked why missionaries at the LDS Church had been excluded from Argentina before, Obligado said: "This was due to the terrible indifference of previous governments to matters as important as religion, teaching and other activities which can change the spiritual condition."

Last week, the Buenos Aires newspaper La Prensa, said the ruling was a matter of "alarm and surprise, not only because of the intolerance, but also because of the sectarian attitude involved."

## Kidnaped Bishop Makes Appearance

**GUATEMALA (AP)**—The Most Rev. Mario Casariego, archbishop of Guatemala who was kidnaped last Saturday, appeared Wednesday. Church bells in the capital rang out on the news.

"The motive for the abduction remained a mystery."

Church authorities said Sunday that the ailing archbishop, 58, had been abducted soon after returning to this isolationist Central American country from a trip to Mexico City. They appealed to the kidnapers by radio and television to respect the prelate's special medical diet.

Dozens of wealthy Guatemalans have been held for ransom in recent years by Communist guerrillas. Terrorists of both left and right have killed at least 1,000 persons since July 1956.

# Community Patrol Corps Armed With Walkie-Talkies in Central Harlem

By BOB MONROE

NEW YORK (AP) — Members of a new Community Patrol Corps, young men armed with walkie-talkies instead of weapons, have taken to the teeming streets of Central Harlem in an experiment aimed at keeping the city cool.

Within hours after the first patrol fanned out Wednesday they had broken up a fight between two teen-age girls, prevented a possible stabbing and urged youngsters to accept around midnight.

Strolling the broad sidewalks in pairs, they took notes and reported on such hazardous or unsanitary conditions as unsecured vacant buildings, uncollected trash, pot-holes and defective trash barrels.

Earlier, before the corpsmen left between 15 and 20 years of age, left the headquarters they lined up in their distinctive brown jackets and were addressed by Mayor John V. Lindsay.

This experiment is the most important of his kind in the country," he told them. "It will be your job to make sure the community of Harlem has faith in cops. Very often the community has reason not to have faith."

Lindsay said their biggest problem is the young cats, the

teen-agers. There's where you have the toughest job. I can tell you more than you know."

He said if the week-long experiment is successful it will be continued.

As the patrols departed they were observed by Charles J. Kenyatta, a black nationalist.

He told newsmen the patrol department is not capable of performing its duties.

But the general public reaction was favorable. Most residents interviewed said they were pleased with the patrol

and they greeted the corpsmen with curiosity and friendliness.

The patrol was organized by the "New Institute of Justice" and the Mayor's Criminal Justice Coordinating Council. The corpsmen, who have no powers of arrest, are paid \$20 a week.

Heading the corps is Herbert Miller, a 26-year-old street worker. He told the mayor at the inspection ceremony, "Harlem's job is to keep cool not only in the summer, but for all four seasons."

# Letters From Captive Pueblo Crew Urge Apology

 WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. officials say letters from captive Pueblo crewmen to their families at home appear to be a new North Korean bid to wrest an apology from President Johnson.  
 Some relatives of crewmen, telling Wednesday of receiving such letters, expressed suspicions they were written under North Korean supervision.  
 Catherine O'Bannon, wife of Michael O'Bannon, 21, a fireman on the intelligence vessel when it was captured Jan. 23 off North Korea's coast, said such requests closely paralleled those in a letter she received, signed by all 82 surviving Pueblo crewmen when they were released last month.  
 That letter, addressed to President Johnson, urged him to "frankly admit" the alleged violation and apologize.  
 The administration has declined to disclose what action might be taken in response to that appeal.  
 Top administration officials, including Secretary of State Dean Rusk and former Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara, have maintained that the Pueblo violated the Communist nation's territorial waters.  
 Mrs. Warren Hayes of Columbus, Ohio, said the letter apparently written by her son, Radio 27, Lee Hayes, described the Pueblo as an espionage ship spying in North Korean waters.

Some of the letters bore Paris and Marseille postmarks, which U.S. officials said indicated they may have been sent to France through North Korean or other diplomatic channels.  
 Mrs. Hayes said she was sure her son wrote the letter she received—but was equally certain it was written under supervision.  
 She noted it contained few misspelled words. "He never wrote that neatly and he never spelled a lot of little words," Mrs. Hayes said.  
 She added she intends to write the government as the letter suggested, seeking a U.S. apology.  
 "We just can't forget our son's over there—it's been buried too long. We must do something now," she said.  
 "Mr. and Mrs. William W. Woelk of Alta Vista, Kan., said the letter and a picture from their son, Florence Applegate, had been buried for so long that it was being "treated all right" and "not to worry"—a recurrent theme in most of the other letters.  
 U.S. officials said they had not received any other such letters.  
 Several relatives of crewmen reported turning the letters over to the government and officials were reported studying them.  
 They noted it was obvious the letters could not have been sent by the captive crewmen if the North Korean government hadn't wanted them sent.

With today's giant trucks and power shovels, gold can be recovered profitably in open pits where the yield is as low as \$2 a ton.

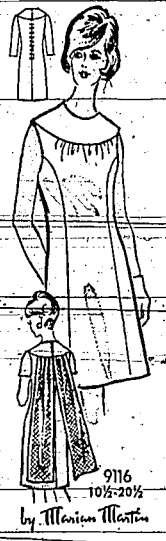

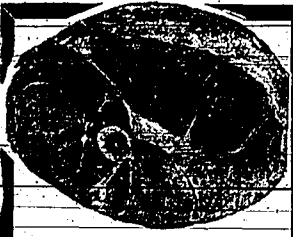

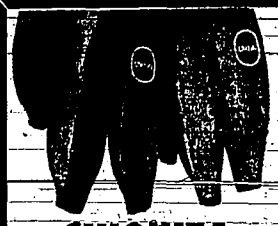

## WONDER BIDS. GOOD AND BAD

"Wonder Bids" is a derivative name given to various weak bids so popular among experts. We have nothing against them. In fact we use them sometimes but we don't go out of our way to do so.

In one table in a recent team match East chose to open with

played a diamond. South won in dummy, ruffed a spade with the last trump in his hand, discarded dummy's last spade on the king of clubs, entered dummy with a diamond, picked up East's last trump and made his slam.

We won't say that South was in the best contract in history but it was a reasonable slam and he made it.

At the other table East decided that his hand was good enough to open one spade—it was, with 11 high card points and a good spade suit.

South was ready with a wonder bid. He bid three clubs—a weak jump overall. This weak jump overall shut West out of the bidding and it also had the effect of keeping North quiet. A vulnerable weak jump overall may not be too weak but it isn't likely to be one with support for some other suit and North held only one club.

Six clubs made also when the queen of clubs dropped so the effect of the two wonder bids was to get South to a slam at one table and hold him to a part score at the other.
