Officers Search Through Night 3 Net Delay On Fishing Trip

A one-day fishing trip down Snake River between Murtaugh and Twin Falls turned into an unexpected all-night adventure for three Tualatin fishermen, and they climbed out of Snake River near the Hansen bridge at about 9:30 a.m. Monday.

A search by Twin Falls and Cassia County officers ended daylight Monday when the three were spotted on their rubber raft from a search plane. They were about three miles east of the bridge at that time and had spent the night in very chilling conditions. The fishermen are the three — Mike Christensen, 23, Gary Rasmussen, 23, and Marc Williams, both 24 — who reported missing at about 11 p.m. Sunday.

Their wives became alarmed about 10:30 p.m. when the men failed to return home. The women drove to the Twin Falls area of the river where the men had left an automobile. The vehicle was still there and the wives contacted the superintendent at the power plant for help. He notified the Twin Falls Sheriff's office and a search began. Mrs. Christensen said the men decided to make the day-long trip Sunday and left Burley at about 9 a.m. They launched their rubber four-man raft from the bridge near Murtaugh and began the trip about 11 a.m., expecting to reach the Twin Falls Park area about 4 p.m.

"There was a lot more portage than we had expected," commented Mike Christensen. "We had to walk over rocks and carry the boat and some of the river going was very rough."

At one point, the men said, their boat dropped over what they thought to be a 20-foot waterfall. All of their fishing gear was lost and the boat had to be pulled out of the water and towed before the trip could continue.

After this incident all three were very wet, fatigued and they knew they would not reach their goal by dark. They beached the boat near the Hansen bridge and tried to sleep, with a small fire for warmth.

"We were very wet and the night in Twin Falls, and by early Monday morning were able to shout to their husbands as they passed below the Hansen bridge," said Mrs. Williams. "Their first greeting," said Mrs. Williams, "was 'Where are you?'" See RAFT TRIP, Pg. 2, Col. 4

Power Line Damage Brings Tight Security

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The latest knocked out telephone service Friday in an area north of Oakland.

Pacific Gas and Electric Co. said power lines were damaged in the same area Wednesday. The company said its security patrol forces were alerted to the area because of the damage. The company said it was sending out repair crews to the area.

Dien Bien Phu Almost Put U.S. Into Vietnam 10 Years Earlier

(Editor's Note: — This is the second of a series of six editorials covering the background of U. S. involvement in Vietnam which originally were published in the Boston Globe. The Times-News has been given permission by The Boston Globe to republish them.)

Sen. Kennedy interpreted Dulles' words to mean that the United States will take the ultimate step. The future President was against it, saying that never in the history of the United States, at least since the Mexican War, have we intervened against a native population, and in support of a power which has maintained colonial control.

"I am frankly of the belief," Sen. Kennedy said, "that no amount of American military assistance in the Indochina can conquer an enemy which is even more determined and more powerful than we are."

Panamanian President Ignores His Impeachment

Panama (AP) — National Assembly members today announced they would wait an hour for a presidential spokesman to announce the results of a vote on the impeachment of President Marco A. Robles today and tomorrow.

The vote moved in two hours after twice-deposed ex-President Arnulfo Arias called for nationwide civil resistance. He understood to mean a general strike in support of the assembly's decision to convict Robles of "unconstitutional" actions.

A make-it-break showdown between the National Guard and the national assembly was the only official arrested in front of the assembly's proceedings.

With 12 minority deputies, a 4,000-man National Guard, and many more in the assembly building Sunday, a voting session of charges brought by his opponents that the influence of the selection of a candidate for the May presidential election, allowed the use of government funds for political propaganda and hired and fired government employees for political reasons.

U.N. Condemns Israeli Attack

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The U.N. Security Council today condemned Israel Sunday night for its attack on Arab guerrillas in Jordan.

The 15-nation council voted as the Arab guerrillas and Israeli forces opened up anew along the Jordan frontier.

The council acted at its eighth meeting in four days on complaints filed by Jordan and Israel against each other in violation of the 1967 Arab-Israeli cease-fire. But Arab delegates said they would not accept the resolution further deploring loss of life and property from the attack. It declared that such actions could not be tolerated and that the council would take appropriate action and more effective steps to be taken in the U.N. charter to prevent their repetition.

U.S. Flag Is Taken From Lwo Jima

TOKYO (AP) — The Stars and Stripes no longer flies over Mount Suribachi on the island, battered of Iwo Jima, a spokesman in the U.S. Embassy in Tokyo reported today.

For years, Suribachi was one of the few places in the world where the American flag flew 24 hours a day instead of from dawn to sunset.

A photograph by Associated Press photographer Joe Rosenthal of the flag-raising on Suribachi was used by U.S. Marines at the height of the battle for Iwo Jima in 1945 as one of the most memorable to come out of World War II.

Last week a small group of Marines from Honolulu lowered the flag on Suribachi "quietly and without much ceremony."

A bronze replica of the flag was placed at the site.

The spokesman said he had no other details.

It was one of the bloodiest battles in the Pacific theater. The invading Marines lost 28,000 men, and soldiers and sailors who died there raised the flag to 6,621. The Japanese lost 20,000 men.

Last week a small group of Marines from Honolulu towed the flag on Suribachi to the headquarters of Iwo Jima. A bronze replica of the flag was placed at the site.

The spokesman said he had no idea when the flag was taken down.

Four Copper Giants Reach Agreements

WASHINGTON (AP)—All four of the nation's giant copper producers have now reached tentative wage-hike agreements with unions, officials here are not known when thousands of workers will return to their jobs ending an eight-month strike.

Anacosta Co. and American Smelting & Refining Co. announced Sunday tentative agreements covering more than 15,000 strikers. But they said long-term strikes still must be ironed out at their 23 mines and factories spread over a 16-state area. In addition, a half-million of the new parts had to be made in the next 10 days.

Contributing to the uncertainty of when production will be resumed on a wide scale, settlements also must be reached covering another 10,000 workers at Kennecott and Anaconda plants. A total of 25 unions and a wide variety of skilled jobs are involved in the bargaining. "I don't know when they're going back to work," said an industry spokesman after the new agreements were announced.

The fourth hip producer, Phelps Dodge, reached agreement last week with 6,000 workers and they are the only strikers back on the job at major plants. Several smaller firms settled earlier with a total of about 10,000 employees.

The Phelps Dodge pact provides a 2 percent hourly pay hike over 40 months plus fringe benefit which brings the hourly figure to \$11. The new agreements are in this range.

President Johnson commended the settlement to Washington three weeks ago for "white House" talks aimed at settling the prolonged dispute. He said it was threatening the nation's economy as well as its defense effort.

Wages before the strike averaged \$9.16 for smelting and refining workers and \$2.71 for other and cable-fabricating workers.

The White House declined comment on Sunday's tentative settlement. Negotiations are in continue on the unresolved local issues.

Students At Howard Win Demands

WASHINGTON (AP)—Howard University students rallied yesterday victorious in demands for more black orientation on their predominantly Negro campus.

The protest by some 1,200 chanting, singing students ended late Saturday when leaders accepted a board of trustees compromise and demonstrators left the administration building.

Trustees agreed to let the student government discipline 39 students accused of disrupting May 1 Chapter Day ceremonies and promised not to press charges against the professors.

The trustees also announced student demands for more black orientation of the university would be worked out by a committee of board members, students and faculty members.

The demands include establishment of a Black Awareness Institute, formation of a student judiciary and convening of an all-black college student convention at Howard on student roles.

Student demands for the resignation of university President James M. Nabrit Jr., 67, who has said he would not permit Howard to become a black-oriented university, plans to resist.

Protest leaders said in Negroes they want more Negro history and culture courses at Howard—and programs to develop Negroes as leaders.

"We think this university should prepare us to live in the black community," said Joseph Middlebrooks, president of the engineering and architectural students association.

"Instead, what-if's doing," he said, "is preparing us to fit into the white man's world—and not in leadership roles."

Administration officials said the university will be back to normal operation Wednesday following two days of reading periods. They said sit-in buildings would be open today and some classes would resume immediately.

NEW YORK (AP) — Deposed Congressman Adam Clayton Powell predicts "civil war" among young people over the nation's race situation.

Powell, back from an 18-month self-imposed exile in Blimie, the Bahamas, raved at an emphatic "no!" when asked at a news conference Sunday if he envisioned a race-war this summer.

But Powell added, he believed that both white and black youth would join in battling the "white power" structure.

The 59-year-old Powell, who returned Friday night to a tumultuous session in Harlem, said he came home to purge his district of "Uncle Toms."

Meanwhile the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., said at a news-conference in Harlem Sunday that he is still committed to nonviolence and I think the vast majority of Negroes think that way."

The Nobel Peace Prize winner said he was reluctant to predict this summer's "accusations" preceding them is like inviting fire.

Powell also delivered a short sermon at the Abyssinian Baptist Church, where he has been pastor for many years.

Powell, a Democrat, was ousted from Congress on charges of misusing public funds, and charged with contempt in defying New York courts over payment of a \$100,000 fine against him when he returned to New York to head a national parole pending appeal of his conviction. He promised a judge he would obey all future court orders.

Powell, when asked whom he supports for the presidency, replied, "only A.C.P.," meaning himself.

King spoke at the New Canaan Baptist Church of Christ in Harlem, where he attended ceremonies marking the inauguration of the Rev. Walter T. Walker as pastor. Walker formerly served with King in the Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

New Attack On Cancer Is Reported

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — A new line of attack against cancer-starting, the tumor-suppressing, and the tumor-supplying is reported by a research scientist.

Dr. Melvin Greenblatt of the Chicago Medical School said studies with hamsters indicate tumors make a chemical which signals surrounding parts of the body to grow new blood vessels, to feed them.

"If we can identify the substance, it may be possible to produce antibodies against it," he told an American Cancer Society symposium for newspaper writers Sunday. "This would interrupt the chemical signal, stop the growth of new blood vessels and thus starve the tumor."

"Antibodies are substances that the body produces to fight disease-causing material.

Growth of new blood vessels is a process known as angiogenesis, by cuts or blisters. Wounded areas are supplied with new blood vessels, which bleed, seep or oozed.

Dr. Greenblatt found that tumors call forth a similar response in the body's blood vessels. After having a membrane on the cheek poked, he covered it with porous filter paper, then placed cancerous tissue on the paper.

A chemical made by the cancer filter through the paper and started growth of new blood vessels in the normal membrane below the paper. If the paper had not been there, the vessels would have extended into the cancerous tissue.

Dr. Greenblatt said studies are under way to see if a similar chemical is involved in human cancer.

Dam Breaks In Massachusetts

LEE, Mass. (AP) — An earth quake struck a highway across a highway. At the Glenhurst dam, flooding ran away Sunday. The dam, a truck was smashed through a brick wall.

James C. Hart, company president, said the flood waters were rushing through the building, creating out walls. Heavy rains and rapidly melting snow have poured thousands of tons of water into New England waterways, but the only serious flooding was at Lee.

Rescuers searched for the body of a woman believed trapped when water from man-made Lake Lee poured through a 40-foot hole in the dam.

Police said the water pushed into East Lee Brook normally dried up. The water overflowed its banks and swept away everything in its path.

The lake was swollen by two days of torrential rain. Last week that caused minor flooding on rivers and streams in most of New England.

A witness said a wave of water 10 feet high and 150 yards wide struck the house, flooded the dam and swept uprooted large trees in its path.

The flood swept several cars off a two-mile section of U.S. Route 26 but police said no bodies were found inside. The Lee exit of the Massachusetts Turnpike was closed for several hours. Initial estimates placed damages at about \$10 million.
