## 1,000 Red Troops Hit U.S. Artillery Base

SAIGON (AP) — About 1,000 North Vietnamese troops attacked a U.S. artillery base in the central highlands today and overran one gun position in the heaviest fighting there in four months.

The North Vietnamese, armed with flame throwers and rocket-propelled grenades, were driven back by the 500 U.S. soldiers after four hours of battle, the U.S. Command said.

A spokesman said 18 North Vietnamese troops and 19 Americans were killed and 51 American wounded. All forces passed through rice paddies and hedgerows pursuing a battered

Viet Cong force that broke off a sharp battle shortly before dawn. The Viet Cong death toll was put at 251.

The command said 10 U.S. soldiers were killed and 71 wounded in the fighting. South Vietnamese casualties were described as light.

The attack in the central highlands was launched under the cover of darkness by two or three North Vietnamese battalions against an artillery support base of the U.S. 4th Infantry Division 18 miles west of Kontum City.

Headquarters said the North Vietnamese troops, including only 20 miles from their Cambodian border sanctuary, stormed the 500 American defenders and

drove through a portion of the perimeter.

Four hours later, headquarters said, U.S. infantrymen had pushed the enemy troops back and restored the defense line.

The North Vietnamese began withdrawing toward Cambodia as dawn broke and American reinforcements poured in. Air cavalrymen made a helicopter assault into the battle zone in an attempt to block the enemy's withdrawal.

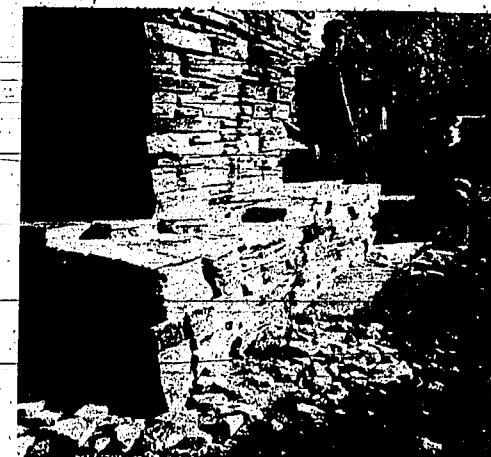
Tactical fighter-bombers and 150mm howitzers pounded the North Vietnamese.

It was the heaviest fighting in the central highlands since last November's 21-day battle for Dak To, 25 miles north of Kon-

tum. Kontum City was hard hit by enemy troops during the Viet Cong lunar offensive Jan. 31. U.S. 4th Division infantrymen went into the city to clear it out.

According to intelligence reports, the North Vietnamese regiments—about 12,000 troops—threaten the Kontum City-Dak To area.

The heavy fighting near Dak To was touched off before dawn Monday when the Viet Cong attacked two South Vietnamese outposts 28 miles northwest of the capital and infiltrated the marketplace of a district town called Trang Bang, and a nearby hamlet. One outpost protecting the district town was overrun. The second held.

### Monument Damage Not Vandalism

Broken pieces of mortar around the base of the Vietnam War Memorial monument in Twin Falls City park had a number of persons shaking their heads Thursday over reports of vandalism of the lowest type. However, things aren't always what they appear on the surface.

A check with Dale Ford, chairman of the committee in charge of the memorial, revealed it was not vandalism after all.

Expensive rocks for the exact shape and size needed to maintain the contour of the monument, had worked loose. Members of the committee broke away the mortar and took the rocks so they would not be removed by someone else or blown from the sidewalk.

"As soon as weather permits, we will replace them," Mr. Ford said, "and will then seal the entire monument against weather so there will be no further deterioration."

"He said the committee did not have time to seal the monument material as planned last fall.

### Monetary System Conference Asked

BRUSSELS (AP) — With three days until the Stockholm conference that seeks final accord on "paper gold" as international currency, France called today for a conference to create a monetary system ruled by real gold.

France, however, was completely isolated. Dutch Finance Minister Pieter Willemien said after French Finance Minister Michel Debré argued his point at a dinner here Monday night.

Debré told his colleagues from the Common Market countries that special drawing rights on the International Monetary Fund were not a solution to the world monetary crisis. The drawing rights are called "paper gold."

Debré said that instead, the official price of gold should be raised and a new monetary system set up with gold supreme. A conference should be convoked, he declared, "to make all currencies juridically equal."

President Charles de Gaulle, whose government has "retained international gold, hoarded gold and warned against the U.S. dollar as a reserve currency to the simple gold system."

Replying to Debré Monday night, Minister Emilio Colombo and West German Economics Minister Karl Schiller said the two officials had met here to discuss a system of drawing rights that would function well.

### T.F. Flying Service Will Get Contract

WASHINGTON, D. C. (Special) — The Bureau of Land Management will award a contract Tuesday for nearly \$2 million to Reeder Flying Service of Twin Falls for aerial spraying of Idaho and some 200 other government lands, according to Sen. Frank Church, Idaho and Con. George Hansen, Idaho.

### Mansfield To Oppose Troop Increases

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana, said today he opposes any increase in U.S. troop levels in Vietnam.

Mansfield told the Senate he wants "to make my position and my feelings known before reaching here after a decision has been reached."

"It is my firm belief that any increase above the announced congressional level should be put into effect," he said in a speech.

Mansfield has been a vocal Senate critic of the Vietnam war who has called on the Johnson administration to seek congressional approval of any proposed increase beyond the \$13,000 ceiling now authorized.

Mansfield told note of reports that the administration is considering requests by U.S. commanders for up to 200,000 troops.

Mansfield said his opposition to more troops "does not mean it is necessary to surrender or get out of Vietnam. It does mean we have to consolidate and consolidate the already great commitment which we have there."

### ISU Expects Full House At Kennedy Talk

POCATELLO (AP) — Idaho State University officials are preparing for a capacity crowd tonight when Sen. Robert Kennedy, D-N.Y., speaks only a few days after his announcement that he is a candidate for President.

Kennedy's speech was set for 8 p.m. after his introduction by ISU President William E. Davis.

Two former Idaho State Democratic chairmen said Monday they thought an Idaho campaign organization would be formed soon for Kennedy.

One of them — the man who headed the 1960 Idaho Campaign for Kennedy's late brother — said in Mountain Home Monday that Kennedy would "get a sizeable number of the Idaho delegates to the Democratic National Convention."

The prediction was made by John Glasby, who said Kennedy's entrance into the presidential race was a "serious threat" to President Johnson's effort to be re-elected.

Former Democratic Chairman Lloyd Walker said he knew of no Kennedy group being formed yet, but predicted one soon.

## Pilot Walks Away After Emergency Landing

RUPERT — "Any landing you can walk away from is a good one" and a Boise commercial pilot proved the truth of this saying Monday evening.

Dean Wright, 39, did walk away unharmed after making an emergency landing, with a single engine, Boeing Executive 2 airplane, owned by Boise Aviation Inc., in a field 12 miles north of Rupert, near the Nordland County line.

The 400-foot lights on the plane glowed at the Burley airport, said the plane did not appear extensively damaged.

PFA employee Donald Stone, who arrived at the airport, said that by being in radio contact with the pilot and using the equipment in the Burley FAA office, they were able to pinpoint the location of the landing.

They notified Minidoka County sheriff's officers who arrived at the site east of the Nordland community, within a few minutes after the crash landing. They took the pilot to the Burley airport where a fellow employee of the Boise Aviation Inc., who was on duty, picked him up and flew him to Boise.

Officials of the Boise Fire Department were expected here Tuesday to determine what to do with the plane.

## SEATO Treaty Cited As Legal Basis For U.S. Vietnam Involvement

(Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of six editorials outlining the background of U.S. involvement in Vietnam, which were published originally in The Boston Globe. The Times-News has been given permission by The Boston Globe to republish the series.)

It was President Eisenhower who first sent American military personnel to Vietnam, but as advisers to the South Vietnamese government. He increased them from 527 to 85,000 in 1960. President Johnson changed the "advisers" into combat troops and now has some 500,000 there. Why "advisers"? The answer

is that troops were prohibited by the Geneva Accords of 1954. That was 13 years ago, really, yet it is still a legal barrier to U.S. troops from going Communist. Two of the three reasons given by President Johnson to keep all that he says is our commitment date back to that year. They were the SEATO treaty and the Geneva Accords. The latter, however to South Vietnamese Premier Ngo Dinh Diem.

The Geneva Accords, the Geneva Conference, it began discussing Indochina on May 8, 1954. It was attended by the United States, Great Britain and the Soviet Union (the latter, chairman). France, the U.S., Communist China, Cambodia, Laos and Vietnam and the Vietnam regime.

Agreements were signed July 20 and 21 providing for a ceasefire and withdrawal of troops — they forbade any military alliance and any new troops, weapons or bases. And they partitioned Vietnam along the 17th parallel but said (Articles 6 and 7):

"The military demarcation line is provisional and should not in any way be considered as constituting a political or territorial boundary. The Geneva Accords might well argue, if it were not by now academic, that these words have a significant meaning on the Administration's charge of "aggression" across the demarcation line.

The Geneva Accords provided for country-wide elections to be held in July, 1956, leading

to the reunification of North and South Vietnam. They have never been held.

Signing for the Vietnam was Brig. Gen. Tran Quang Buu, the Oxford-educated former leader of the French-sponsored Boy Scouts. But the United States and South Vietnam did not sign. The U.S. issued a unilateral declaration that it would "refrain from the threat or use of force to disturb" the armistice, and "would view any renewal of the aggression in violation of the aforesaid agreement as a serious threat to international peace and security."

It added that the U.S. "shall continue to seek to achieve unity through free elections, supervised by the U.N. to insure that

they are conducted fairly." President Eisenhower called the accord "the best of a bad bargain."

Peace now came to Vietnam, but all too briefly. Aid only 49 days later, on Sept. 8, 1954, the Southeast Asia Organization was formed, on Secretary of State Dulles' initiative, by a collective defense pact signed by the United States, Britain, France, Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines, Pakistan and Thailand.

Hailed by Dulles as an "Asian-American Mutual Defense Pact," it was the legal basis for our armed intervention. So it is worth examining carefully. Article IV of the SEATO Treaty dealt with a threat "other than by armed

attack" or "by any act or situation which might endanger the peace of the area."

This would cover Communist subversion or internal revolution, although when the Senate debated the treaty Sen. Walter F. George, then chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, said the reference "does not mean that the U.S. has undertaken to suppress bona fide local revolutions."

It added, "The parties shall consult immediately in order to determine the measures which should be taken for the common defense." The only limitation here was to consult.

Later, Section I came to be relied on, because of Hanoi's

action in infiltrating troops. This section dealt with "aggression by means of arms and combat forces." It said only that "each Party" will in that event act to meet the common danger in accordance with its constitutional processes, which include Congress' power to declare war.

Next again there was no commitment to use combat forces. In South Vietnam, according to many critics, who also say that our forces were not sent in accordance with our constitutional processes, which include Congress' power to declare war.

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## Youth Writes Essay On Murder Plan

HIGH POINT, N.C. (AP) — Police said Monday a 16-year-old High Point high school youth wrote an essay detailing how he planned to commit murder and then shot another 16-year-old with whom he had quarreled.

Charged with the murder of David Lee Walker was Gerald Locklear, a Lumberton, Ind., Officer. Locklear said witnesses told him that Locklear approached Walker as he left the school cafeteria and "let's talk a few minutes later, witnesses said."

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Opposition To A Tax Increase Softening

WASHINGTON (AP)—The administration's balance willingness to trim the budget submitted last January is softening some of the opposition to a tax increase.

But it also is giving Republicans some support for their oft-repeated claim that the President is not leveling with Congress on fiscal matters. The administration's point to the January budget message which President Johnson said outlined a "light and stringent economic program."

Subsequently, administration spokesmen said the budget, in testimony before the House Ways and Means Committee, Secretary of the Treasury Henry H. Fowler said "the President's fiscal program represents a tough policy."

House Appropriations Committee in effect cut the budget, rock-bottom figures. "We were told in almost so many words," a Republican committee member said, "that there was no other place to cut safely; that the figures presented were the only ones to be considered."

But it will have to call for cuts of far more than \$3 billion if it were to avoid economic chaos," he said. "It may cost as many of our seats in Congress," he added, "as it would cost to increase taxes whether we want to or not."

Clear As Mud



On the weekend there were authoritative reports, Johnson was planning to cut requests for new appropriations for the fiscal year starting July 1 by as much as \$3 billion. These reductions would be from the original request made in January.

In a Minnesota speech Monday the President confirmed he was working with Congress to compromise on the budget. And he called on Americans to join in a program of national sacrifice to meet the need for funds even more cuts than had been planned originally in domestic spending.

One such measure submitted in January is undergoing a review by executive agencies. The President said he knows on such matters said in the budget had already in a review.

The two powerful House committee chairmen who have been conferring on economy moves, Wilbur D. Mills of Ways and Means and George J. Mahon of Appropriations, indicated to newsmen they think the \$3-billion White House figure is too high. Neither would publicly cite a counter-figure.

The significance of what has happened in the past few days seems to be that a particular depth of budget cut has been decided on, but that the long-standing dialogue between the House and Capitol Hill on a tax increase has been resumed.

Q — A urologist says I have a nonspecific bacterial infection in my bladder. Antibiotics have not helped. Is there anything that will clear it up? Would the fact that my uterus protrudes on my bladder cause infection? A — A different bacteria require different antibiotics and, in some cases, tests must be made to determine whether the organisms causing the infection have become resistant to the treatment used. Pressure from the uterus pelvis may irritate the bladder and cause frequent urination but will not cause infection.

Q — My doctor found pus in my urine. What is the cause? A — The cause is an infection in the kidneys, bladder or both. Your antibiotics usually clear up such infections. Q — My bladder has fallen. My doctor says I should have it repaired but it doesn't bother me. It has been like that for 20 years. Are there any exercises that would help? If the bladder is put back in place, will it stay put? A — A repair operation for a bladder that protrudes into the birth canal is usually advisable to prevent a bladder infection. I know of no exercise that will hold your bladder in place. Your cystocele is a result of one or more deliveries and since I assume you are past the childbearing years, there should be no danger of a recurrence after the operation.

Q — My doctor says I have scar tissue in my urethra and must have more cystoscopic examinations. Won't this instrumentation cause more scarring? If not, won't many more treatments will be necessary. If instrumentation is properly performed by a qualified urologist, it will not cause scarring. Many treatments are usually necessary. If not, depends on the progress made toward correction of the underlying cause.

Q — Can an ulcer of the bladder be cured? Does it turn cancerous? A — Chronic ulcers of the bladder are notoriously hard to cure. Local treatment through a cystoscope is usually required. Chronic irritation of the bladder may be a precipitating cause of cancer.

Q — I am a woman, 72, and have a constant urge to urinate. When I do, I have a burning pain in my bladder. Can I have a cystitis? A — First, have your doctor determine the cause. A treatment program might include drugs and diet that will change the acidity or alkalinity of your urine. Urinary antiseptics and antibiotics may be needed.

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Awesome Power

The new standards would lower permissible levels to 2.2 grams and 23 grams, respectively. Officials of HEW have learned one lesson since they became involved in the automobile industry. They now give the industry some lead time to meet without undue cost and inconvenience. But there still exists the uneasy feeling, and not only among leaders of the automotive industry, that one man at the head of a government department is not the proper seat of responsibility for decisions which directly or indirectly affect hundreds of thousands of jobs and tens-of-billions of invested capital. Even in the Great Society, it is possible for a bureaucrat to be wrong

Business Not Enough

That the business climate of Free Europe has undergone dramatic changes in the past decade is an understatement. But what is occurring now and will continue in the near future may be of more consequence to the individual European businessmen. In the hope of becoming more competitive in growing world markets, many European businesses are merging. The increasing frequency of merger suggests some businessmen have become enamored of bigness for the sake of bigness. If so many of them are headed for a surprise, bigness alone can work against success as well as for it. Small companies which combine into one, may manage to equip for the infinitely more complex operations of a giant corporate complex may find themselves adrift in a sea

of confusion. Europe has a past history of factors. If competition is to be a factor in the new Europe of tomorrow, as it must be if the economy is to be built on a vibrant foundation, controls must be erected to prevent excessive mergers from stifling the competitive spirit. Larger companies in an economically unified Europe could contribute significantly to the growth of the continent by pooling research efforts and sharing in other areas of duplication. It should be with these ends in mind that Europe's businessmen pursue their goals of merger in the wake of the Common Market and largescale tariff-cutting. As one British economist summed up the situation: "It may take many years of hard work to secure those benefits that are all-too-easily assumed to flow from size alone."

Soviet Gains

Because the U. S. government does not understand the significance of religion in Moslem nations, Moscow is winning important psychological victories in Pakistan, the Middle East, Indonesia and in some parts of Africa. Though the Russians persecute religions at home, a Moscow-approved Soviet Moslem president at the critical closing session of a conference just held here in Dacca attended by Moslem representatives from 18 countries. Under the leadership of this Soviet grand mufti, these Moslems called for united efforts by Moslem states throughout the world for "the liberation of Mecca, Palestine and Cyprus" and appealed to Moslems to unite against the "imperialists who have divided the Moslems of the world in their attempt to rule over them."

Soviet Gains

This Moslem approach is important in Pakistan, Indonesia and a dozen other Asian, Middle East, and African states which consider the Moslem religion as the correct cornerstone of government. Pakistan considers itself a government of the Moslems. The country was split from India on the basis of religion. A Moslem political party is the largest political group in Indonesia. The Moslem religion is a strong force helping to tie a number of lands to Egypt's Nasser. U. S. foreign policymakers, however, have been slow to recognize the deep effects Moslem emotional bonds have on the national policies of a sizable number of Moslem nations in the Middle East, Asia and Africa. There also exists among many Moslem people a strong sense of persecution.

ing this Moslem cohesion and sowing these feelings of persecution among the Moslems of the Moslem people. These Moslem "Moslems" picture the Russian as a "Goliath" force behind Moslem "persecution" in the past and today. It is not yet clear how successful the Russians can be. But a sense of persecution is a strong handle which clever Russian psychologists can use. What is needed is a positive effort by the United States to understand the Moslem's strong emotions and to do more to show our respect for their past and present achievements. 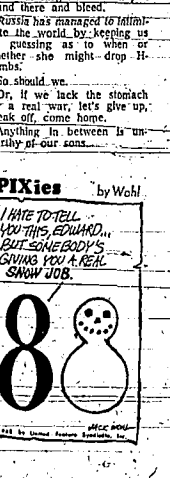
He's All Alone

The turnout for "peace candidate" Eugene McCarthy in New Hampshire has staggered President Johnson. He should have seen coming that a weak previous Gallup poll had reported 49 per cent of Americans now believe we have blundered and should never have become involved in Vietnam. Russia has managed to intimidate the world by keeping us all guessing as to when or if we might drop H-bombs. So should we. Or, if we lack the stomach for this war, let's give up, break off, come home. Anything in between is unworthy of our sons.

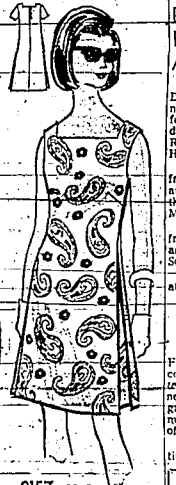

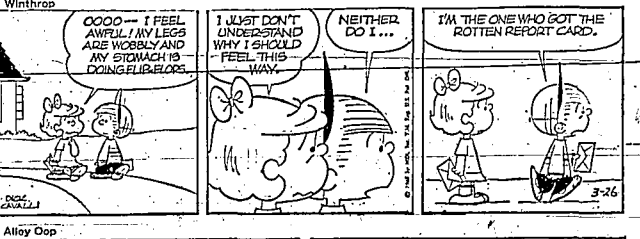

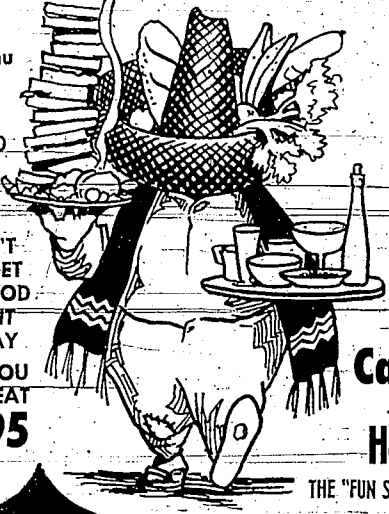
