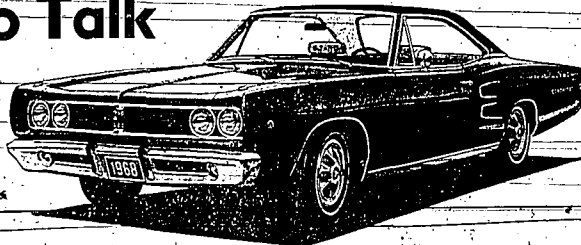

The Car Thefts

If the automobile industry raked up even a 10 per cent increase in profits in one year, company executives would blow their tops.

An unknown number of youths eventually graduate into the class of hardened adult criminals who account for the other 50 per cent of car thefts...

The National Automobile Theft Bureau has just reported that 631,700 cars were stolen in 1967. That's better than one every minute of every hour of every day.

Cleveland, Ohio, which experienced a 58-per-cent jump in auto-thefts last year, is launching a campaign to educate its car-owning citizens.

Although the recovery rate of stolen cars has been more than 80 per cent, there is little comfort in that statistic. Many cars are found seriously damaged; others are stripped of components and accessories...

There is little the police can do about preventing car thefts, only have ingenious methods of transporting and disguising cars, switching serial and motor numbers and counterfeiting ownership papers.

Actual dollar cost of automobile theft is placed at \$100 million annually, which is ultimately borne by everyone riding in direct losses, higher insurance premiums or increased taxes to pay for police, court and prison expenses.

Idaho's Life Insurance Totaled \$3 Billion In '67

BOISE — Families in Idaho bought more life insurance during 1967 than in any previous year, collected a larger amount of benefit payment from life companies, \$711 million, and ended the year with \$3 billion in life insurance protection, according to a report by the Idaho Life Insurance Association.

Idaho's total life insurance in 1967 totaled \$3 billion, an increase of about 10 per cent over 1966. Life insurance protection during 1967 totaled \$711 million, an increase of about 10 per cent over 1966.

Despite the growth of life insurance throughout the state, statistics indicate a need for more protection. A year ago, the average Idaho family had about \$13,300 of life insurance, which was equivalent to about 63 per cent of their annual income. While the need for protection can vary considerably even among families with similar incomes, many experts in financial planning advise as a rule of thumb that families generally need enough life insurance to cover four to five years of family income.

The Institute estimates that life insurance companies paid about \$13 million during 1967 to beneficiaries of Idaho policyholders who died. This was about \$1 million or eight per cent higher than total death payments in the state during 1966.

Idaho continues to rank as an important state for investment of policyholders' funds. Life insurance companies this year provided a substantial amount of mortgage financing for new homes, farms, apartment buildings, office buildings, stores and other business and industrial facilities.

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Wife Says Letter Is "Phony"

NEW YORK (AP)—Wearing his wife's initials "to go to the grain," Fireman Michael O'Bannon posted next to a ping-pong table somewhere in North Korea with seven fellow captured crewmen of the U.S.S. Pueblo.

The picture and a letter from the Navy man arrived recently at the O'Bannon home in the Vermont, Ore., one of a number of such letters coming to crewmen's families from high officials in the United States.

Mrs. O'Bannon thinks the letter is phony. "And many other relatives of the American who were captured two months ago say that the letters they have received simply do not ring true."

Mrs. O'Bannon said the grin on her husband's face was the one she always wore when he wanted him to do something he didn't want to do. She said she is pretty sure that the man in the picture and that he's wearing his "to go to hell grin."

She said the letter was written in an unnatural style. It refers to "my dearest," which she says he never would have written, and to his parents as "my family" instead of the usual "Mom and Pop."

The letters to relatives, to President Johnson, and to senators are seen by the State Department as part of a propaganda effort by the North Korean Communists. Many of the letters call on the United States to apologize to North Korea for the activities of the electronic surveillance ship.

Mrs. Gerald Neale of Washington, Iowa, said the letter from her son, Clifford, said he was "forced to copy it from a blackboard."

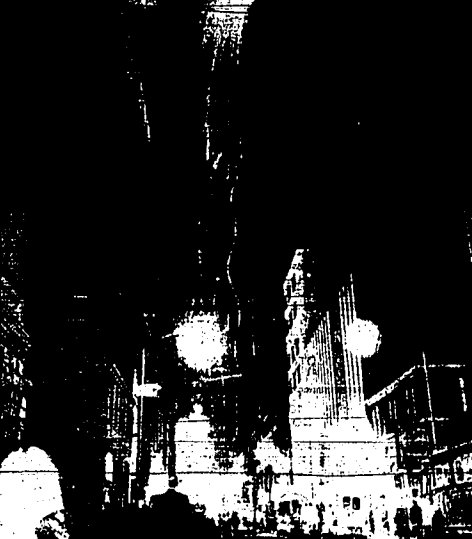

RFK Ups Hopes For Reagan

WASHINGTON (AP)—Ronald Reagan's political advisers are hoping that Robert F. Kennedy gets off to a fast start in the race for the Democratic presidential nomination because, as one of them put it: "With Bobby in the picture, we may have a chance."

Two top men in the quiet campaign to win the Republican nomination for the California governor said in separate interviews that if Kennedy looks like a winner when the Republican convention opens Aug. 5, it could put GOP delegates in the market for a new face as an alternative to the current front-runner, former Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

If Kennedy becomes the Democratic nominee, said California adviser, "It will be harder for Republicans to campaign against the Johnson administration. After all, Bobby will have gotten the nomination by campaigning against the Johnson administration himself."

Since the Democratic convention opens three weeks after the Republican convention, the Reagan men are hoping for a strong early showing by Kennedy.

In the interim, the Reagan forces are trying to convince Republican favorite Sen. Strom Thurmond to stay off to a Nixon banquo.

"If the favorite son holds, it's impossible for a guy to get that nomination on the first ballot," a Reagan adviser said.

He echoed the California governor, who told a Sacramento conference Monday: "There are now favorable delegations representing more than 700 votes... I'm still inclined to think it will be an open convention."

One of those delegations will represent California's 86 votes, pledged to Reagan.

Reagan has repeatedly denied he is an active candidate for the presidency. However, he won't remove his name from the presidential primary ballots in three states where it would take a decision of any kind of possibly becoming a candidate. Thus Reagan's name will be on the ballot in Wisconsin, Nebraska and Oregon, though he has no plans to campaign in any of them.

Discussing Nixon, Reagan advisers tend to condemn the former vice president with faint praise.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Robert F. Kennedy's entry into the Democratic nomination contest appears to have boosted President Johnson's strength in southern and border states.

Sen. A. S. (Mike) Monroney, seeking re-election in Oklahoma, said in an interview, "The New Yorker's venture into the presidential contest had wiped out what anti-Johnson sentiment existed in his state."

Monroney noted the Oklahoma legislature's unanimous passage, with Republicans participating, of a resolution endorsing Johnson's Vietnam policies, which Kennedy has attacked.

Similarly, a high-ranking Democrat who has been feeling the voter pulse in Virginia said Kennedy's candidacy has made highly probable the choice of a pro-Johnson delegation in the July state convention.

They paid Donny Anderson \$600,000 to carry the ball for Green Bay. And they had Joe Namath \$100,000 to throw it for the Jets in Shea Stadium. Americans have been willing to bid big to buy big money for those who can inspire, thrill and entertain.
