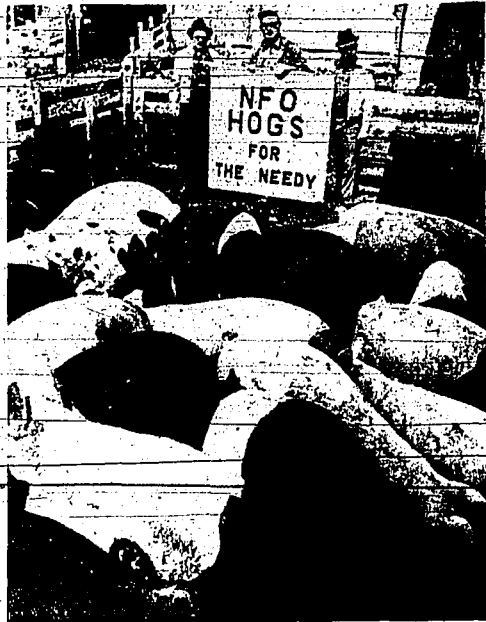

# Mrs. Brooks Pleased With Power Ruling

RUPERT — Minidoka County NFO members continued the holding action on hogs Wednesday by purchasing 94 market hogs during a regular swine sale at the Valley Livestock Commission Co. ...

A total of 124 hogs were sold, but NFO members purchased only those they were ready to take. The 94 hogs purchased by the NFO members brought \$4,000 and averaged 215 pounds for a price of \$12.55 per hundred weight.

The hogs were then taken to individual farms to be held from market channels. This action Wednesday is part of a nationwide action to boost hog prices to 23 cents per pound.

Eilon Hasselstrom, Rupert, said the hog situation nationally was good. Major packers have been signing contracts nearly every day, he said.

NFO members in the area indicate that if the hog product can be withheld a short time longer, "the battle will be won."

There has been no mention of whether the hog product would continue or not or if any other type of action will be taken.

At the sale Wednesday, the hogs were sold by the general public, but NFO members purchased 94 of the hogs.

# Saigon Welcomes New Move

SAIGON (AP) — The government of South Vietnam today welcomes current moves to bring about peace talks between the United States and Communist North Vietnam.

In its first official reaction to Hanoi's offer to meet U.S. representatives, President Nguyen Van Thieu's government said it is consulting with the United States and other allies regarding the contents to be undertaken with North Vietnamese authorities for the purpose of exploring the possibilities for eventual negotiations to end the war.

This was in sharp contrast to a statement by a largely Roman Catholic bloc in the Vietnamese House of Representatives which charged that Hanoi's offer was "only a trick to get the United States to stop the bombing in conditions."

The statement by 21 of the House's 135 members called for resumption of full-scale bombing and expressed opposition to the visit to the United States planned by President Thieu.

The government communique was issued after Thieu held a 7 a.m. conference with U.S. Ambassador Lewis M. Elliot and then met with Bunker and the ambassadors of the five other nations with troops fighting along the South Vietnamese-South Korea, Australia, the Philippines, Thailand and New Zealand.

The foreign ministers said they met to assess Hanoi's reaction to President Johnson's speech Sunday night.

Asked by newsmen if Thieu would attend President Johnson's weekend conference in Honolulu, Bunker replied "I do not know," saying he would confer with American officials from Saigon.

The communique said the Saigon government "welcomes the initiative to bring an early end to the war in justice and freedom."

"In this spirit, I gave my agreement to partial cessation of the bombing of North Vietnam as a first step toward negotiations."

"The governments of the allied countries will be in constant consultations on any points of substance or decisions in conjunction with these overtures."

Opposition to negotiations between Hanoi and the United States appeared to result from fear that the United States wants to change a face which has withdrawn from Vietnam.

Spokesmen for the Catholic bloc in a news conference they would not attend said they were not sure of the results of peace efforts. But they added: "We are determined not to surrender to those who would perpetrate aggression, whether it be a coalition government or neutralism."

The South Vietnamese Senate passed a resolution Wednesday saying the "partial bombing halt should be the first step toward good will by South Vietnam and the Allies."

The senators urged mobilization of all national resources, supporting Thieu's call for general mobilization later this year.

The Senate also reaffirmed its stand against any coalition government with the Communists, and urged the United States to continue fighting on if the United States and other allies do pull out of Vietnam.

# Lent is for Converts and Christians.

The story of our society may be told on not what Christians did in church, but what they accomplished in prison. For the penitentiary, reform school and county jail are in gasping need of all that Christians can provide.

Here are the lonely, the addicted to drugs and alcohol and sexual perversion. In prison you find those who have fallen a long way. The trail is strewn with smashed jobs, broken marriages, lying and thieving, beating and hurting. And they are just the men and women that were the special intense concern of God's son.

If Lent reminds us of anything, it is that Jesus was also in prison. Behind bars. Unfairly treated. He shared the fate of seven convicts who never has been sentenced. His followers, in honoring him, should be as frequent in their visits to the cell block as they are to the cathedral. Jesus said, "I was in prison and you came to me."

Think of it. There are 250,000 people in prison, needing guidance, jobs, counseling and friendship. In New Jersey alone, half of the men in prison are under 21. Who will help them return?

Lent is a time to be haunted by the demands of the gospel as high as we are helped by its power.

# Both House and Senate Now Have Official Ethics Code

WASHINGTON (AP) — Both the House and Senate now have official codes of ethics aimed at curbing conflict of interest by requiring Congress members to make public some information on their outside financial dealings.

The House adopted its code Wednesday by a vote of 389 to 109. The lone dissenter, Rep. Peter H. R. Frelinghuysen, R-N.Y., said the code's financial disclosure provision "proves nothing and is of no value to the voter in judging whether his congressman is honest."

The Senate adopted its code March 22 on a 67 to 1 vote. The lone dissenter, Sen. George D. Aiken, R-Vt., called it a fraud on the public, too weak to mean anything.

The two codes differ substantially in their public-disclosure requirements.

Both codes stemmed from the clamor last year following the capture of Senator Thomas J. Donohue by a conflict of interest. Rep. Adam Clayton Powell, D-N.Y., from the seat to which he had been elected.

Major provisions of both codes deal with financial disclosure and with use of funds received from voluntary dinners. These are the main differences.

Financial disclosure — The House requires public disclosure of the names of companies doing business with the government from which the member had an interest in excess of \$3,000 or income over \$1,000.

House members also would have to publicly name professional group, such as law firms, from which they received more than \$1,000 a year and the sources of any other outside income in excess of \$5,000.

A second report by House members would list the amounts of the outside income received. It would also be opened only in an ethics committee probe.

The Senate report would list the amounts with the controller general of all financial interests and income. It would be kept confidential and could be viewed only by the Senate ethics committee.

Senators would have to file for public scrutiny an accounting of all contributions and fees in excess of \$300.

Both House and Senate reports would be enacted.

Testimonial dinners — House members would consider as campaign contributions all proceeds from testimonial dinners unless otherwise specified in advance by the sponsors. There would have to be kept separate from personal funds and could not be used for other than campaign purposes.

Senators could use money received from fund-raising events for office expenses as well as for campaign costs. They also could use private contributions to meet personal office expenses, including travel.

# Pornography Law Effective On April 15

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new federal law to take effect April 15 that will aid in removing delivery of pornographic materials to persons who do not solicit them, Sen. J. Edward R. Jordan, R-Iowa, said Wednesday.

Jordan said the new law provides the recipient of such mail can complain to his local postmaster or to the postmaster general, who can then order the material not to be delivered or make no further mailings.

If the mailings continue, the postmaster can refer the matter to court and jailed if convicted.

"This bill," said Jordan, "will allow any parent to write his own mailbox and will provide the American householder with an effective, enforceable law against irritation of moral decency."

# Idaho Student Grants Set Up

DENVER (AP) — Financially needy Idaho college students will receive a total of \$501,250 in Department of Health, Education and Welfare grants next year.

The grants, ranging from \$200 to \$1,000, will be matched by other forms of assistance from the colleges.

At Boise, Colville, 23 students will receive \$27,500. College of Southern Idaho, 75 students, \$27,500. College of Idaho, 202 students, \$194,000. Idaho State University, 233 students, \$116,500. Magic Valley Christian College, 15 students, \$5,000. Northwest Nazarene College, 302 students, 145,900; and the University of Idaho, 240 students, \$175,000.

# Dr. King Ignores Order

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and other civil rights leaders say they will ignore an injunction prohibiting another mass march here next Monday if the injunction is allowed to stand.

Federal officials say the restraining order will be enforced by federal troops if necessary.

A hearing was scheduled for Monday before U.S. District Judge Bailey Brown, who issued the injunction Wednesday after city officials said they feared a recurrence of the rioting following a march led by King a week ago.

King told a cheering audience of some 2,000 persons Wednesday that he was "going to march again; we've got to march again in order to put the issue where it's supposed to be."

King originally had planned to stage the mass march in support of the anti-segregation workers on Friday, but agreed to postpone it after others said in Memphis Wednesday they would bring more than 6,000 persons here Monday for a "march on Memphis."

King also said a "defence" Wednesday night was less than one-fourth of the 9,500 persons who had gathered for the same purpose two weeks ago, said that violence had no place in the upcoming march.

"It's no longer a question of nonviolence or violence in this world," he said. "It's nonviolence or nonexistence." King called for economic boycotts to take the place of "bricks and bottles" . . . (And) Motlow Cocktail.

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The House of Representatives today passed a bill to give the inventor of the heart transplant patent a \$250,000 award.

# Reasons Told For Holding Quaker Film

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Treasury Department admitted Wednesday it was holding copies of a film depicting a trip by Quakers to North Vietnam.

But treasury officials said the film merely is being held in custody pending issuance of a license.

Last week the Coyote, the College of Idaho students' newspaper, said copies of the film intended for delivery in the United States are being held by customs agents.

The film depicts the voyage of the 50-foot yacht, Phoenix to Hanoiport last winter to deliver medical supplies.

Lawrence Scott, executive director of a Quaker Action Group, the group which sponsored the voyage, said eight copies of the film already are circulating in the United States, but three copies were being held by customs agents for review by the Defense Department's Foreign Assets Control Division, which Scott charged, has decreed it must approve any film originating in Viet Nam before it can be imported and shown.

Scott said the control division, which enforces the Trading with the Enemy Act, has tied up three bank accounts so the movie can't be used to buy supplies for the North Vietnamese for Viet Cong.

Treasury officials said Wednesday the film's sponsors had applied for a license to re-export it into Canada. They say the film entered the country illegally.

**PROBLEMS TOLD** — WALLACE, Idaho (AP) — Although aided by Tuesday's passage of a \$40,000 special levy, the Wallace School District still is in serious economic difficulty and must close at least one school and release three teachers next year.

Passage of the levy leaves the district with "reasonably good" school programs, all the basics, Dist. Supt. Otto Isler said Wednesday. The economic slump still will force the reduction in faculty and closure of a 69-student school.

**PROGRESS REPORTED** — BOISE (AP) — A member of the Idaho Constitution Revision Commission says the commission hopes to have a rough draft of a proposed new constitution completed by next week.

Carl Burke, a Boise attorney, said Wednesday the aim of the group is to propose a new basic code that will "take the shackles off state government and give it power to take care of the needs of the people."

The commission has been working for more than two years drafting a proposed document to replace the original 1888 constitution.

**STUDY PROCEDURES** — BOISE (AP) — A Los Angeles consulting firm will be working throughout Idaho the next few weeks on a study of the state's driver licensing procedures.

Dave Dehlin, executive secretary of the state Traffic Safety Commission, said Wednesday sheriffs, county commissioners and legislators meet Wednesday at Boise that updating of Idaho's driver licensing laws is needed. He said this is necessary to make Idaho's law conform to federal regulations passed last year.

The consulting firm, Management Technology Inc., was hired at a cost of \$20,350 with the fee being underwritten by the National Highway Safety Commission.

# Port Strike Is Over In India

CALCUTTA, India (AP) — A port strike here had brought the unloading of food for 500,000 villagers in the Midnapore district of West Bengal State ended today.

Authorities agreed to most of the demands of the 42,000 workers, including giving permanent status to casual workers. The strike began last Friday.

The newspaper the States reported Wednesday that the Midnapore villagers were starving because of the strike.

# Simplot Aide Is Speaker At Burley

BURLEY — "Agriculture is the backbone of Idaho and especially of Magic Valley," Pat Harwood, director of public relations for R. Simplot Co., told Burley Chamber of Commerce members Monday at Burley, Calif.

# Trudeau Favored For Canadian Post

By MAX HARBELSON — OTTAWA (AP) — Justice Minister Pierre Trudeau was a big favorite today to become Canada's next prime minister as the Liberal party assembled for a three-day convention in a hotel here.

With the vote still two days away, Trudeau declared his preference for the first ballot, and other contenders were reported putting out feelers for a stop-Trudeau drive.

The withdrawal from the race Wednesday of Finance Minister Mitchell Sharp and his support of Trudeau failed to halt feverish behind-the-scenes maneuvering.

Fifteen of 19 announced candidates for the post of party leader, and with it the prime minister, were still in the race, including seven cabinet members.

Informal polls indicated Trudeau would lead on the first ballot by a substantial margin, but Foreign Minister Paul Martin, Transport Minister Paul Hellyer and Trade Minister Robert Stanfield also registered significant strength.

The latest Gallup poll showed Trudeau far in front in popularity support in urban centers. Thirty-two per cent of the 14 persons quizzed named Trudeau their first choice with 14 per cent for Martin, 10 per cent for Hellyer, and 4 per cent for Hellyer.

This may be a factor in the convention voting since the Liberal Party has a national election probably within a few months. Sharp, third fifth in most polls, expressed belief that majority of his followers would switch to Trudeau but this was disputed by all the other leading contenders.

Winters all claimed they would get most of Sharp's delegates. Sharp's switch did, however, bring to Trudeau's financial minister's elaborate campaign organization and it gave Trudeau a total of seven cabinet ministers in his camp. Hellyer has four and Martin three.

Today's convention program was devoted mostly to workshop meetings at which the eight leading candidates were given an opportunity to discuss domestic and foreign affairs and to answer questions from delegates.

The evening program was dedicated to Pearson, who is retiring at the age of 70 after five years as head of the government. He was to deliver his farewell speech to the 2,100 delegates, but was not expected to indicate which candidate he favors.

The convention will open Saturday afternoon at its final session.

# Total Of U.S. Wounded High In Week

SAIGON (AP) — The number of Americans killed in the Vietnam war dropped slightly last week but the total of U.S. wounded soared to the highest for a seven-day period during the conflict.

At the same time, U.S. troop strength increased by 5,000 to 162,000, the highest number ever listed for American forces in South Vietnam.

The U.S. Command said 330 Americans were killed in actions last week as compared with 349 a week earlier. The number of wounded was 3,856, spokesmen said, as compared with 1,993 wounded in the week ending March 21. Of that 3,856 total, 1,329 were hospitalized but 2,527 did not require hospitalization, the command said.

Unofficial records showed the previous high for American deaths was 2,766 in the week ending last March 9. South Vietnamese military headquarters issued weekly summaries last week of 393 killed, 1,169 wounded and 41 enemy were killed last week by 3,428. The total of U.S. TIMES-NEWS WANT ADS

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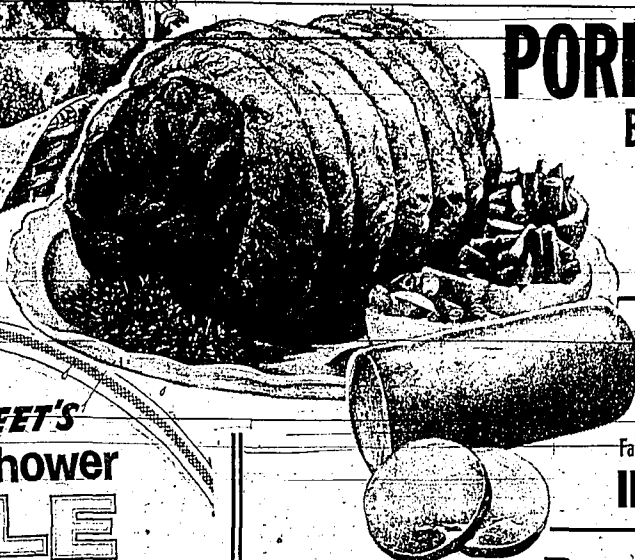

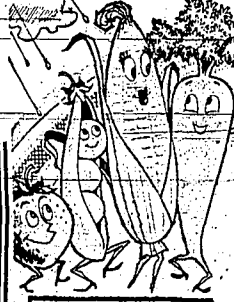

# Czech Regime Probes Death Of Official

PRAGUE (AP)—Czechoslovakia's new regime is investigating the death 20 years ago of Minister Jan Masaryk, and two more top Cabinet members have resigned as the liberalization was continued.

The body of Masaryk, son of Czechoslovakia's founding president, was found in the window of the foreign ministry less than three weeks after the Communist took over the nation in 1948.

The Stalinist regime said that Masaryk committed suicide by jumping from the window of his apartment. But many in Czechoslovakia and abroad believe he was murdered so he could not become a leader of anti-Communist resistance.

Acting Atty. Gen. Frantisek Zabransky announced the new investigation after philosopher Ivan Svitak wrote Zabransky asking him to establish whether Masaryk "was the first victim on the road to totalitarian dictatorship."

"There is a well founded assumption that Jan Masaryk was murdered," Svitak said and that the new liberal leadership which has replaced the Stalinist regime of Antonin Novotny must clear up the case so that thousands of citizens may have faith that the talk about rehabilitation of Stalinist victims is not a trap.

Suspicion about the Masaryk case was intensified this week by learning from the window of Supreme Court Judge Josef Brestansky was found hanging from a tree in a wood south of Prague. Police said he committed suicide, but his family and most Prague newspapers refused to accept the verdict.

Carl Murphy of Niagara, another sophomore, was runner-up to Maravich with a 38.2 average.

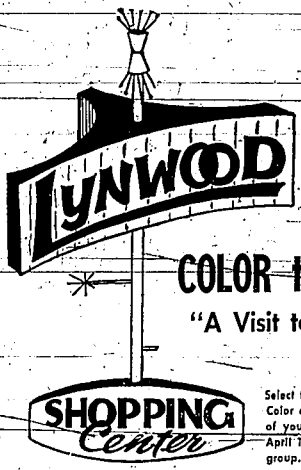

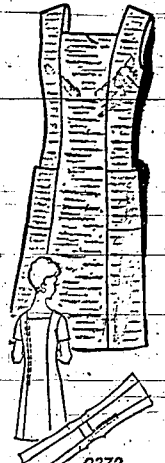

# Number Of Women Who Do Not Vote Is Very, Very High

**NEW YORK**—Former Presidential adviser Theodore Sorensen asserted today that with a larger proportion of young women in the electorate and a sharper fear of an "expanded" war, women voters "are a chief source of support" for Robert Kennedy in the opinion polls.

"He is, in fact, one of those rare candidates whose strength among women when he tested against any opponent, proves to be substantially greater than among male voters," he said.

Writing in the current issue of Redbook, just released, Sorensen said that the number of American women who do not vote is "appalling," he said that statistics on mothers with small children who go to the polls are "especially low."

"One conclusion unfortunately is clear and undisputed: American women do not turn out to vote the way American men do," the biographer of John Kennedy said. "The price paid for this failure—paid by the women themselves, their husbands and children and the nation as a whole—must be made clear," he said.

search by the John Kraft opinion-survey organization, a 1967 poll showed that "the notion of a solid and consistent nationwide female vote is a myth."

"Not only do women fail to show any particular preference for female candidates; there appears to be some evidence that they often oppose women for public office," Sorensen said.

He added that "on matters of race, women tend to be slightly more liberal than men in both the North and the South—possibly because of greater church influence or less job competition."

Sorensen revealed that despite John Kennedy's popularity among women in 1960, "he did not receive a majority" of their votes.

"Surveys indicate that too many of the women who were for Kennedy in 1960 simply did not vote on election day," Sorensen wrote in Redbook. He added that women in general were more influenced than men to heed anti-Catholic bias they heard in church. The number of older women who listed themselves with opinion-poll questionnaires as faithful Democrats but who nevertheless voted for Nixon is judged to have been, at least in part, a sign of lingering religious prejudice."

He asserted that women voters today are attracted to peace candidates.

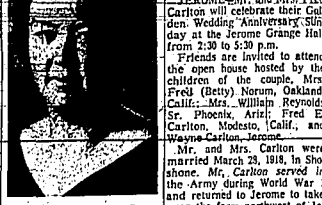

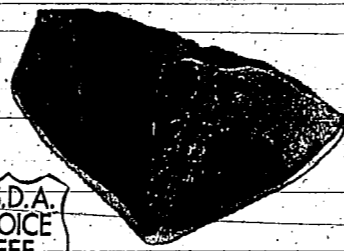
