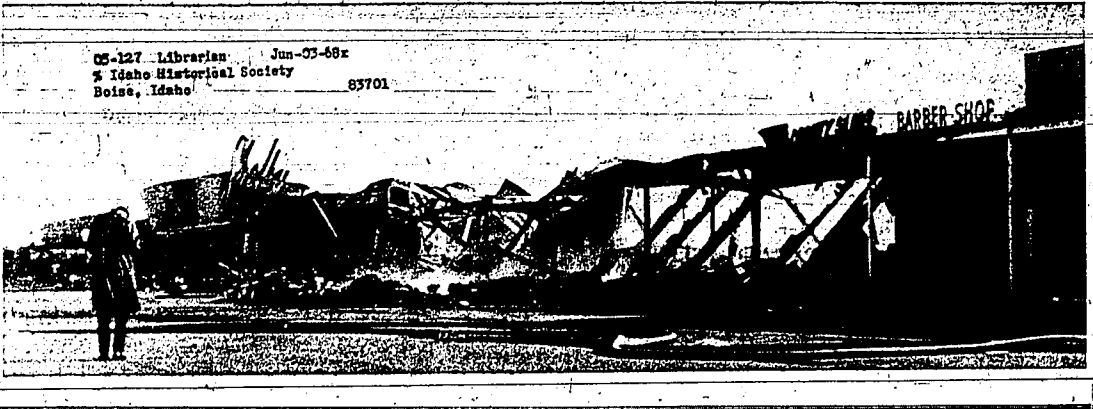

Famous Figures Attend King Funeral While Throngs Wait Outside

By DON MCKEE ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — An audience of America's famous said today Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in formal thousands services today while thousands thronged outside. Senators, governors, civil rights leaders, religious figures and others—all led by Vice President Humphrey, representing the White House—came to Ebenezer Baptist Church. And as the invitation-only audience of 1,300 persons listened to the quiet, dignified services inside, a crowd estimated by police at 50,000 stood outside for hours around. Occasionally they had cheered

when such notables as Mrs. John F. Kennedy and New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller arrived, being escorted through the pressing crowd by police. Even as the service continued, State Adjutant General George J. Heintz announced that National Guardsmen from throughout Georgia were being airlifted to the Atlanta area. "We intend to be ready" for trouble, he said, adding that none was expected. But inside the church the mood was one of solemnity and peace, with only an occasional hint of the world's troubles outside—as one minister prayed

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Mansfield Sees No Fast Solution

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Democratic Leader Hubert H. Humphrey said today that the Mansfield forecasts no early Capitol Hill cure for problems reflected by the violence that has wracked the nation in recent days.

Mansfield said in an interview he'll push a post-Easter city bill, pass legislation aimed at meeting major social problems. But he conceded it will be difficult to reach the roots of ferment that exploded into violence after the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

"He listed for early action a so-called 'safe streets' bill, a juvenile delinquency measure and legislation to give the Equal Employment Opportunities Commission power to enforce its orders."

House will act this week on a Senate-passed civil rights bill, which includes an open-housing provision.

But beyond that he said he thinks it will be wise to have members of Congress test reaction back home in a week's Easter recess beginning Thursday before acting on any new proposals that may be aimed at the core of discontent in city slums.

Mansfield urged his colleagues Monday not to act impetuously in the aftermath of King's murder. He said greater responsibility for individual citizens, rather than new legislation, is "initially necessary to regain our self-respect."

Mansfield said President Johnson, in discussions with congressional leaders, had not outlined any legislative proposals he most wanted to see enacted.

Mansfield was noncommittal about when the Senate will act on a supplementary money bill. The state and local police conference committee deleted \$100 million for summer poverty program.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., said in a statement he will propose final approval of the bill unless the funds are restored. The "safe streets" bill would provide for federal grants to improve state and local police forces, curb handgun sales, authorize wiretapping by law enforcement officers under court orders and remove Supreme Court restrictions on police questioning of "criminal suspects."

A Senate Labor subcommittee has approved legislation authorizing a \$20 million outlay, over the next four years to revive a program of prevention and rehabilitation among juvenile delinquents.

The administration has been unable to pry out of the Labor Committee a measure to give the Equal Employment Opportunities Commission power to enforce its orders against job discrimination.

Business leaders have contended this would put the federal government in a position to tell them who to hire.

Although national labor leaders support the measure, many individual unions oppose it on the ground it would open their membership rolls to persons they regard as unqualified.

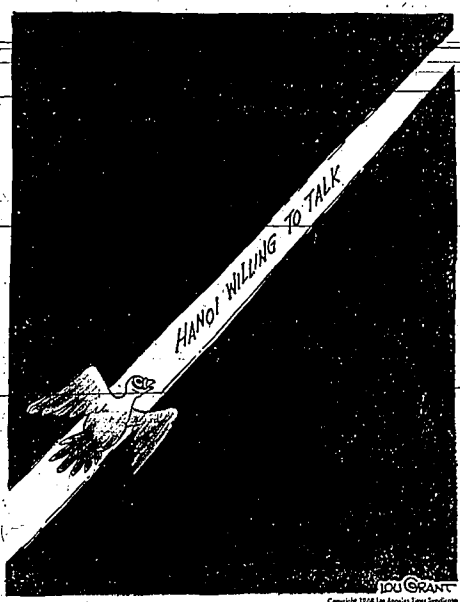

Israelis Threaten Jordan

TEL AVIV (AP) — Israeli military sources threatened Jordan today with more air and ground raids if Arab commandos continue their sabotage raids in Israel and areas the Israelis seized in the 1967 war.

The Israeli army said it exercised the right of hot pursuit Monday for the first time after Jordan caught a band of Arab commandos in the Negev Desert and chased them 20 miles into Jordan. Military sources said it was likely the Israelis would use the same tactics again if the occasion arose.

In Monday's action, helicopter-borne Israeli troops invaded Jordan to attack a commando headquarters in the West Bank. The troops withdrew after inflicting a number of casualties and blowing up a house.

The Israeli army said it attempted an invasion with armored vehicles and helicopter troops "covered by a band of Arab commandos in the Negev Desert and chased them 20 miles into Jordan."

Polish Chief Asks To Be Relieved

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Premier Jozef Cyrankiewicz asked today that he be relieved of his duties as president of Poland because of "deteriorating health."

He has had chronic eye trouble and is reportedly unable to read. His resignation was expected to be accepted at a meeting late today.

The power struggle that has been going on in Poland since the death of Wladyslaw Gombol and a powerful group of World War II Communist underground fighters called the "Kruszki" faction of ultranationalists led by Maj. Gen. Mieczyslaw Moczar, the minister of interior and head of the secret police.

The Polish government at present has been shaken by the death of at least 10 persons from government or party posts following student "demonstrations" against the government and rioting last month.

Crash Survivor Praises Pilot

LONDON (AP) — One engine caught fire and fell off and the left wing was in flames. But, soothing music was still coming through the loudspeakers and "we must owe our lives to him," said one of the 121 survivors.

Five of the persons aboard were killed and 22 injured in the crash landing Monday at London Airport. Survivors included officials of British Overseas Airways Corp.—BOAC—said the skill and courage of the pilot, New Zealand-born Captain Charles Taylor, "prevented a much more serious accident."

Two minutes after the Boeing 707 jetliner took off from London for Sydney, Australia, it looked and saw the side was all in flames.

"I remember thinking, 'We've got a choice. Either he lands the plane or the wing will fall off and we will have had it.'"

"Some of the passengers saw the pilot's face in the engine broke off and plunge into a water-filled garage pit southwest of London, narrowly missing nearby buildings."

"The fire was growing all the time, but the pilot brought the plane to a stop in three minutes later," Dellich said.

U.S. And North Vietnam Work At Cross Purposes

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER

AP Special Correspondent

WASHINGTON (AP) — On the basis of their public positions—the United States and North Vietnam are working at cross purposes in their different approaches to Vietnam peace talks.

North Vietnam wants preliminary discussions when President Johnson will end the rest of the bombing of its territory.

Before ending the rest of the bombing, however, Johnson wants to know whether North Vietnam will level off its supply of men and heavy weapons into South Vietnam.

Without such assurance on this point, administration officials said, Johnson would consider it "militarily dangerous to stop the limited bombing of the North" still permitted under his March 31 order.

Thus the prospects for successful peace talks are regarded as dim.

In Washington as essentially discouraging at the moment despite the speed of diplomatic developments between Washington and Hanoi during the last 10 days.

But public positions can be changed in private bargaining, and some officials believe an accommodation on the bombing issue may be possible.

North Vietnam's position was made official in its reply Monday to a U.S. message of April 3 notifying Hanoi that Johnson was prepared to establish contact with representatives of North Vietnam.

Johnson plans to send Ambassador-at-Large W. Averell Harriman to handle the first phase of preliminary discussions on how to get full-scale peace talks started.

The date and place for these discussions have not been agreed upon. The United States had suggested Geneva; North Vietnam proposed Phnom Penh, Cambodia, where the United States does not have an embassy.

Rangoon, Burma, is considered a possible compromise but neither of the other cities has been finally ruled out.

The U.S. reply to the message from Hanoi, which the White House announced Monday, is expected to be sent in the immediate future. Present indications are that the reply will deal primarily with a date and place for Harriman and North Vietnamese representative to meet. Further talks with the issue to be discussed.

The North Vietnamese message was not made public.

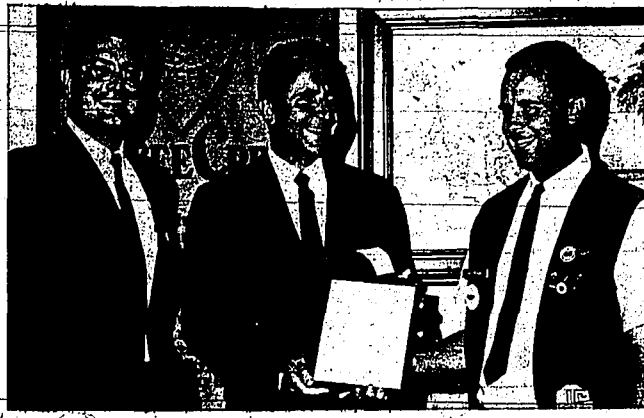

Air Power Helped Break Siege At Base

SAIGON (AP) — Senior U.S. officers say the tremendous amount of American air power thrown against the North Vietnamese around Khe Sanh helped break the 75-day siege of the Marine combat base and prevented the enemy from launching a mass attack.

The 31 days between the start of the siege on Jan. 21 and March 31, U.S. warplanes dropped 35,410 tons of explosives around the base in the northwest corner of South Vietnam. That was about one-sixth the total amount dropped in the entire Korean War.

U.S. fighter-bomber pilots flew a total of 21,921 sorties in support of Khe Sanh during those 71 days, an average of 308 a day. A sortie is one flight by one plane.

Perhaps even more significant were the 425 missions flown by the Air Force's giant B52 saturation bombers, each of which can carry up to 25 tons of bombs. Usually 3 to 12 of the big bombers fly a mission, and the B52s dropped a total of 59,542 tons of bombs, or more than half the total tonnage that rained down.

"We really just leveled that area," said one general. "Never in the history of warfare was there ever such a concentrated bombing campaign during such a period."

Idaho AEC Unit To Get \$100 Million

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Atomic Energy Commission's 1969 budget calls for spending nearly \$100 million in Idaho, Sen. Len B. Jordan, R-Idaho, said Monday.

The AEC's authorization bill was passed Monday by the Senate. It already had been passed by the House.

Among projects authorized were a \$2 million cathead solids storage facilities addition, a \$10.2 million hot fuel examination facilities and a \$2 million modification to the EBR-2 facility at eastern Idaho's National Reactor Testing Station.

Jordan said the AEC's budget for fiscal 1969 would call for \$99,541,000 for Idaho operations, versus the expected 1968 fiscal year expenditures of \$61,616,000.

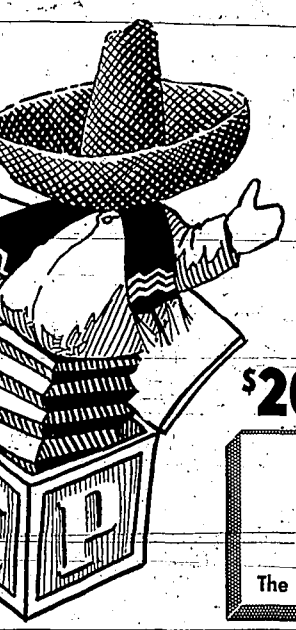

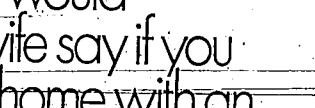

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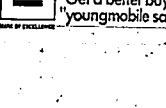
