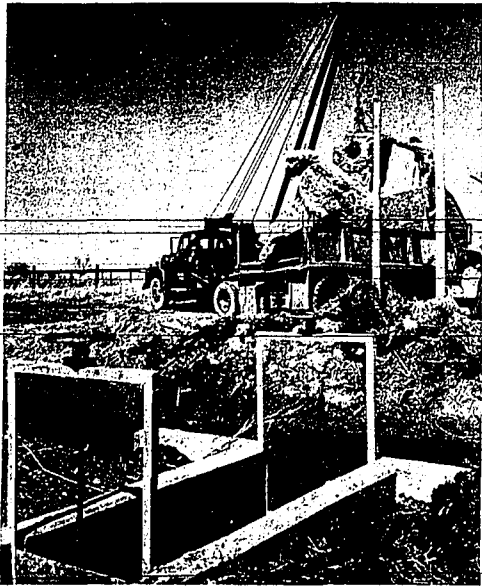

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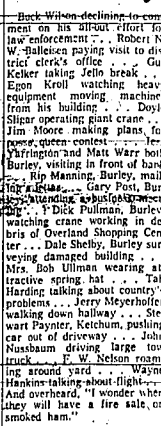

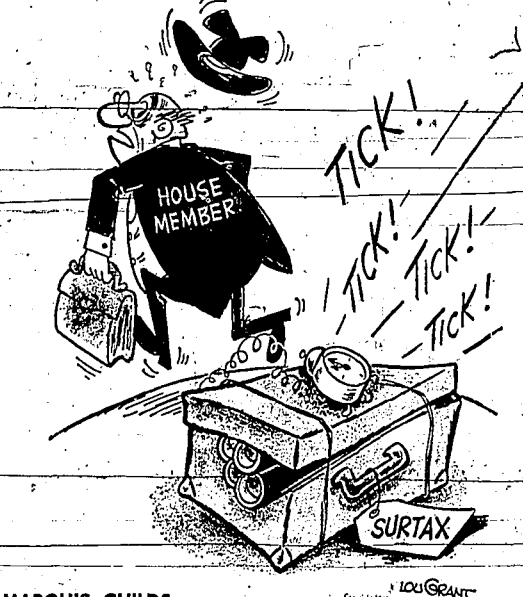

Curiously, Lyndon Johnson's act of self-sacrifice has demoralized the myth which held that "style" and "grace" distinguished "style" and "grace." His renunciation is in sharp contrast with the mystique of the unity pleader, Bobby Kennedy, in waiting until after Gene McCarthy's impressive victory in New Hampshire to make his move.

# Police Guard Negro Leader's Tomb

## Outpourings Of Mourners Attend Rites

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Uniformed police stood watch today at the tomb of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., the slain civil rights leader whose funeral brought outpourings of mourners and tributes rarely matched in the nation's history.

Mourners trickled into South View Cemetery for a look at the crypt even after darkness fell Tuesday. Inscribed on the Georgia marble are the words of an old slave song often quoted by King: "Free at Last, Free at Last, Thank God Almighty, I'm Free at Last."

A police official said the guards were posted as a precaution, and there had been no hint of attempts to molest the grave.

King was killed by a sniper in Memphis, Tenn. He had returned for another march of striking garbage workers after an earlier march erupted into rioting.

His followers called for the nation to look at itself anew as they pledged at the final rites to carry out his crusade against racism, poverty and injustice.

"Let us see to it that we do not dishonor his name by trying to solve our problems through rioting in the streets," urged Dr. Benjamin E. Mays, retired president of Morehouse College, King's alma mater, where outdoor services were held.

"But let us see to it that the conditions that cause riots are promptly removed," said Mays. "Let black and white alike search their hearts; and if there be any prejudice in our hearts against any racial or ethnic group, let us exterminate it."

Mays, who taught King in college, said the American people, including Memphis officials, are in part responsible for the assassination. In a similar vein, the biracial Southern Regional Council, a human rights organization, said in a four-page newspaper ad that while America faces "the choice between the kind of society for which Dr. King lived and died, and the kind of society which denies equal opportunity."

Marching had been a big part of King's life. So in death, there was a final march for Martin Luther King. His wreath-thrusted coffin traveled a route that four miles over Atlanta streets in a faded green farm wagon drawn by two lambs, a symbol of the poor, who's side came he had taken up.

Thousands marched with King, the first since he died.

Ahead of the old wagon, behind it, beside it, in white and unevenly, a number of upwards of 50,000, they marched with the man who was called by most of the black mourners simply "our leader."

At the Morehouse rites following the march from Ebenezer Baptist Church, attendance was estimated at 150,000 by police. Red Cross workers cared for several hundred persons stricken by heat exhaustion in 80-degree weather.

The prominent names at a memorial service in Ebenezer where King was co-pastor with his father, included Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, representing President Johnson. The vice president got up to move to the front pew where King's father sat with his four children and there he offered condolences to her.

Outstanding in the service included Mrs. John F. Kennedy, who like Mrs. King was widowed by an assassin's bullet; Sen. Robert F. Kennedy of New York and Edward M. Kennedy of Massachusetts; Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy of Minnesota; former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York; Gov. George Romney of Michigan; and former Gov. Carl E. Sanders of Georgia.

Gov. Lester Maddox, who disagreed with King's tactics and closed a restaurant rather than integrate it before taking office, did not attend nor did he send a representative. Maddox closed the Capitol early, at 3 p.m. for what he called security reasons as 160 state troopers stood by inside the building.

Night Guardsmen were alerted into the Atlanta area during the funeral; more than 2,000 stood by at Dobbins Air Force Base in Marietta. Authorities described the move as precautionary.

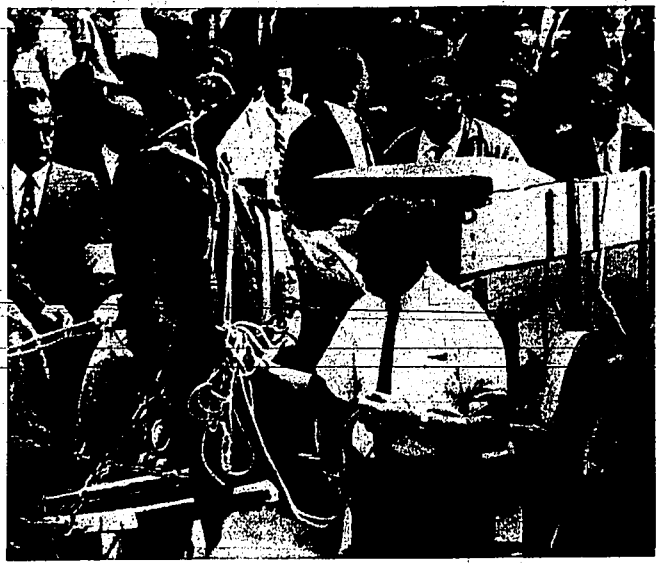
By the time the day-long rites drew to an end on a grassy slope in the cemetery, tanned 80-year-old King's face, because of racial discrimination, the skin was overcast and rain.

"Earth to earth, ashes to ashes and dust to dust," came the familiar ritual as the Rev. Ralph D. Abernathy, King's close associate and now his successor, performed the final symbolic rite of interment. Abernathy succeeds King as president of Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

Mrs. King, 41, dry-eyed through the ritual, wept silently when the coffin was entombed. King's 6-year-old father placed his head on the marble crypt and wept.

Funeral services in Atlanta will be temporary, but the family has not said where final burial will be.

At the church service, King's own recorded voice was heard

by the packed crowd, including Black Power leader Stokely Carmichael who rejected King's philosophy of nonviolence after the 1966 Mississippi march.

A tape recorder filled the hushed sanctuary with the burbled, familiar oratory. "We all think about it and every now and then I think about my own death and I think about my own funeral... I don't want a long funeral..."

The sound of weeping filled the church where King had preached that sermon Feb. 4, 1968.

King's recorded voice said he didn't want mentioned his Nobel Peace Prize and other honors.

"I want you to say that day that I tried to be right... And I want you to say that I tried to live and serve humanity."

"Yes, if you want to, say that I was a drum-major. Say that I was a drum major for justice. Say that I was a drum major for peace; I was a drum major for righteousness."

"And all of the other shabby things will not matter."

## China Trade Possibilities Studied By U.S. Delegation

TAIPEI (AP) — Four U.S. governors and a congressman arrived in Formosa today with U.S. Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman to take stock of trade possibilities with Nationalist China.

The governors were Calvin Rampton of Utah, John W. King of New Hampshire, Robert E. McNair of South Carolina and J. Stuart C. Smith of West Virginia. The congressman was Rep. W. R. Poage, D-Tex.

The group was greeted by U.S. and Chinese officials led by Ambassador Walter P. McCaughy and Economics Minister K. T. Li.

The group met separately with McNCaughy, Li, and P. Y. Hsu, who is governor of the Central Bank and chairman of the Foreign Exchange and Trade Commission.

In an airport statement, Freeman praised Nationalist China's standard of living as among the highest in Asia and credited this to hard work and a stable government.

Freeman said the United States is Formosa's second-best customer.

"We look forward," he told Formosa officials, "to selling you more wheat, as well as feed grains and soybean meal for your growing livestock industry, frozen poultry and a whole range of processed food items."

"In return, you can expect us to take growing quantities of many of your exports, such as veneer and plywood, sugar, tea, specialized food products, communications equipment and other items."

Asked about the possibility that the United States may restrict imports of textiles from Formosa, Freeman said, "I think we will undoubtedly have some discussion about the quota agreements." He insisted there should be "an orderly flow of trade," not something that would "destroy some of our own producers."

After the funeral, they found makeshift accommodations everywhere.

In historic Trinity Methodist Church—one of the few buildings to survive the Civil War—150 weary Negroes stretched out on the same pews Yankee troops bedded upon a century ago.

By the thousands they filled the city, pouring in from great distances, many without means for food or lodging; most without funds to find a bed.

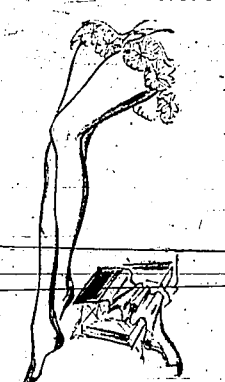
Even if they could have afforded it, a hotel room was almost an impossibility. The hotels and motels were booked solid.

So Atlanta helped. The people plastered their cars with signs marked "courtesy" and gave out sandwiches and ice water. They opened their homes and filled tables with food.

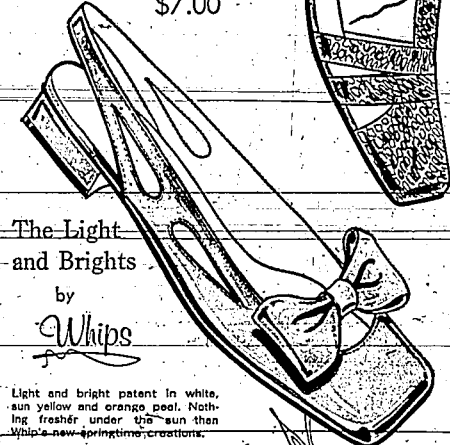

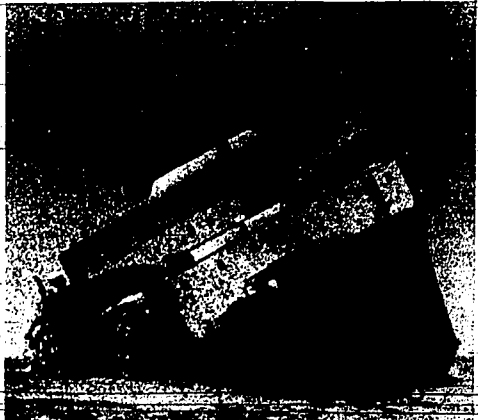

# Debt Fund Collects \$1 Million

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government's special debt fund to help reduce the national debt has collected its first \$1 million from the citizenry after almost seven years of operation.

But it hardly kept pace with the ever-swelling debt—now about \$81 billion larger than when the special fund was set up in June 27, 1961.

Treasury officials said the fund had collected \$15 per acre but members said it was only \$10 per acre.

Obviously, the fund isn't doing as well as hoped. The Treasury for debt retirement.

Gifts have ranged from less than \$1 to many thousands of dollars and include the contributions of one man who sends a check each year equal to his age—71 this year.

Rep. Charles E. Bennett, D. Fla., who sponsored the bill to set up the special fund, contributed the first \$1,000. All other donors remain anonymous at the Treasury insistence.

The fund has regular contributors "in addition" to the one-shot gifts sent in a wave of patriotism or disgust with the increase of the debt itself.

In sending a check for \$71 earlier this year, the man who contributes according to his age wrote: "I follow this custom to remind myself of the great debt I owe my country for the privilege of being a part of it."

**Prison Plan To Confront Legislature**

# 3 Contract Agreements Brighten Troubled Northwest Labor Scene

 With at least three contract agreements Wednesday brightened an otherwise troubled labor scene in the Pacific Northwest, where more than 20,000 workers are idle in labor disputes and another 12,500 are believed on the verge of a strike.

Members of the Seattle-Tacoma Chapter of the American Newspaper Guild ratified new three-year contracts for about 700 employees at the Seattle Times and Seattle Post-Intelligencer Tuesday night.

Union spokesmen said both contracts call for improved fringe benefits and a \$35 wage boost at each newspaper, making the minimum weekly salary for journeymen reporters and advertising display salesmen \$15 in the third year. The old salary was \$12.

At the same time, the Washington Roofing Contractors Association announced it had reached an agreement with negotiators for Seattle, Tacoma, Bellingham and Longview locals of the Roofers & Waterproofers Union.

Victor Ottans, association president, said the agreement—reached after an all-day meeting with federal mediator Barney Toner in Seattle—calls for an increase of \$1.45 an hour in wages and fringe benefits over a three-year period. He said that would boost the package to \$8.53 an hour in the third year for some 400 roofers in the four areas.

The roofers, on strike since last week, were to vote on the proposed agreement as quickly as possible, Ottans said.

Meanwhile, strike votes began Tuesday night for AFL-CIO Communications Workers of America locals representing 12,500 Pacific Northwest Bell Telephone Co. employees in Washington, Oregon and north Idaho.

Ronald Hale, union area director, said results of the balloting would be known by the end of the week.

The vote was called after union negotiators rejected a "final" offer, which Pacific Northwest Bell said would boost employees' pay to 77 percent over the final 18 months of an existing 18-month contract.

The union said the offer fell three per cent short of its demands and negotiators recommended the area join some 200,000 CWA members in a nationwide strike against Bell Telephone Systems across the country unless union demands are met by April 15.

No further negotiations were called with Pacific Northwest.

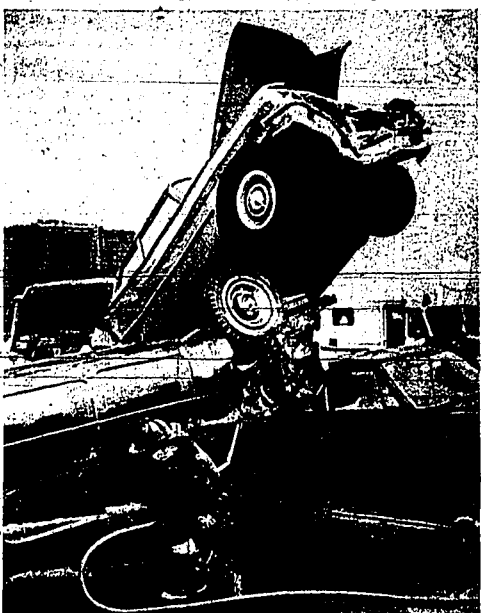
Negotiations are scheduled to resume Thursday in Spokane, however, between eastern Washington contractors and the laborers' union.

About 2,000 laborers struck April 1, killing some \$78 million worth of construction projects in Eastern Washington and north Idaho when an estimated 7,500 members of other trades unions refused to cross picket lines.

The laborers want wage and fringe benefits increases totaling \$1.25 an hour over a three-year period. The contractors' latest offer was \$1.11.

There was no sign of an immediate settlement of a strike against more than 40 Seattle "contracting plants" by members of seven unions in the Seattle Metal Trades Council.

Negotiations in the dispute, involving 10,000 metal tradesmen, were recessed indefinitely Monday.

## Detroit Mayor Makes Plea To Striking Newspapers

**DETROIT (AP)** — For nearly five months the two million residents of the Detroit area have had to depend on radio and television and a scant supply of newspapers from outside the city for their news.

Detroit Mayor Jerome P. Cavanagh, feels these sources are not sufficiently fill the void created by the 147-day shutdown of the city's two major daily papers.

A spot check showed other residents agree.

The mayor felt the lack of papers caused such a flurry of rumors about impending racial strife that he went on television earlier this year to announce a special telephone center to help quell rumors and to urge Detroiters to stop buying rumors.

After the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., caused a brief outbreak in the heavily Negro 12th Street area and prompted a mobilization of the National Guard, Cavanagh made a special appeal to the publishers and unions involved in the strike-to-resume publication to ease racial tensions.

The publishers responded by saying they were ready to supply "ground rules" Cavanagh requested leading to a possible resumption of publication, but the Council-of-Newspaper-Unionists refused to go along.

They urged, instead, around-the-clock bargaining sessions.

The afternoon Detroit News was shut down by a Teamsters Union strike last Nov. 16 and the morning Free Press closed the next day, saying it negotiated some contracts jointly with the News. The Teamsters have since settled with the two papers, but four other unions are now on strike.

A labor mediator, Prof. Nathan P. Feinsinger, was brought in March 23 to help move the sides toward settlement. Cavanagh says that since then there has been some progress in bargaining on noneconomic matters.

Radio and television stations have expanded their news coverage since the strike began.

The distribution of newspapers from Toledo, Chicago and New York and three adjacent cities has increased. These are usually gobbled up quickly, and there haven't been enough of them to match the combined 2.2 million daily circulation of the News and the Free Press.

A resident of suburban Birmingham, Ann Squires, said she tries "to catch every radio and television news show available when I'm home."

"Most of my life," Miss Squires added, "I've enjoyed that morning paper, and when

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# Shortcomings Of College ROTC Program Are Viewed

**FORN POLICY** (NEA)  
 The scene is much the same at colleges from Boston to Berkeley this week. Thousands of uniformed men are parading through an open field to perform the ancient military rite of a parade.

"Right shoulder... HARMIS... Left Shoulder... HARMIS... A... HACE."  
 Predictably all the troops are as happy at their work. Some are yawning contemptuously. Still others are fully asleep on their feet.

## Thieu Sends Mobilization Bill To House

By HARRY KRAMER  
**SAIGON (AP)** — President Nguyen Van Thieu announced he had sent to the House of Representatives a mobilization bill calling for general mobilization and suggested that it be passed quickly.

"While preparing for peace we must increase our fighting potential more than ever," Thieu told a joint session of South-Vietnam's House and Senate. "The Communists will only accept peace talks when they are aware of our strength and when they know they cannot win."

Thieu did not give details of the bill, informed sources said. It would send the draft age downward to 18 and upward to 40 or more, and would recall most reservists and veterans.

General mobilization presumably would also involve drastic economic measures.

General mobilization would be in addition to the 35,000-man increase already planned for this year. It could bring a total of more than one million men under arms for the government.

Thieu had said March 31 that his government would order general mobilization this fall if the Viet Cong continued its attacks. There was no immediate explanation of his introduction of the mobilization bill.

Thieu also said cessation of the U.S. bombing of North Vietnam in efforts to bring about peace talks would be a calculated risk in the search for peace. He said North Vietnam would be able to infiltrate more men and supplies into the South and "with less hindrance, they will try another offensive under the pretext that the talks have bogged down."

The president said a complete cessation of U.S. bombing of North Vietnam was unacceptable to his government unless the Communists withdraw their troops from South Vietnam and reduce their aggressive acts.

"Hut, to, hut, hut."  
 "Left, Left, Dammit, you nincompoops, turn LEFT!"  
 It is, of course, ROTC (Reserve Officer Training Corps) at its finest, best, or worse. And this week nearly 25,000 "nincompoops" (a engineer's mathematics, lawyers are turning "left" at drills on 250 participating campuses.

The spectacle is fun, but hardly new. ROTC is almost as old as the nation. Faced with a continuing and often critical need for new officers, the U.S. Army has since 1820 used colleges as recruiting factories.

As well as that they have, without the program, the nation's military structure would have collapsed on several occasions. During World War II, for example, more than 100,000 ROTCers plugged up serious shortages in the armed forces.

Indeed, the benefits of the program have been enormous. Over 25 per cent of all military officers are presently on duty are ROTC graduates, and this spring the colleges will commission 19,000 more, badly needed lieutenants and ensigns.

But if the benefits of ROTC have been considerable, so, too, have the headaches. Loud-singing hippies (with flowers in squirt-gun barrels) are showing up at ROTC drills. Peace demonstrators are blocking some military science thresholds. Anti-ROTC petitions abound... and so do critical student editorials. Some violence has been fanned, several noses in Alabama recently staged a classroom boycott to protest against U.S. combat leadership in the "stupid compulsory ROTC thing."

A Yale University newspaper recently called for an end to ROTC's "academic credit for military training, citing ROTC's lack of academic rigor."

Hampden Institute in Virginia is still reeling from the effects of black vigilante Stokely Carmichael's "little white muskies" down of campus ROTC offices. Says Kevin Tigh, a sometimes student, all the criticism at Berkeley, "ROTC is propaganda and it has no place in a college curriculum. I feel the Army should hire its little muskies to clean up the mess."

Adds Bertram Garstok, a psychology instructor at Michigan State University: "ROTC is an island of indoctrination in a sea of academic freedom. It is a continuation of the military tradition of indoctrination."

To be sure, military classes have always been the object of some scorn. Campus objectors have long fought against ROTCians as "subservient, untrained, short haired, and untreated ROTC cadets."

Today, however, the argument is getting across. "I don't think we're teaching yesterday's propaganda. Students today aren't that glibly about things."

It's not only the military instruction that's out of date, students say, it's military equipment also. A colonel at Hampton Institute, just a few miles from

Army ROTC headquarters at Ft. Monroe confesses that his class can't or won't teach us about military history. "It's all I can do to keep my eyes open in my class," he says. "I can't do it from a wooden mock-up of an airplane. It's just a piece of wood."

Another colonel at Ohio State University says he has 200 rifles in his arms room, and they are pushing for the military's decision to train an enrollment of 4,500 ROTC students. He says, "The 'Vietnam equalizers' cannot be found on any campus in America, except on a short-loan basis. 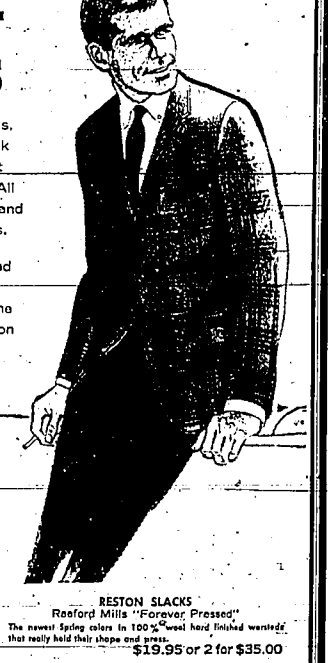

## Water Level Of Lake To Be Lowered

**PRIEST RIVER, Idaho (AP)**—Benjamin F. Pennington, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, said today that the water level of North Idaho's Lake Pend Oreille will be lowered about four feet, according to a preliminary release of the Corps of Engineers. Pennington said the lake will be lowered to an elevation of 2,066 feet above sea level. The lake gradually will be lowered to 2,056 feet. Purpose of the operation is to assist in filling of a new lake, Lake Umatilla, behind Johnson Day Lock and Dam on the lower Columbia near Astoria, Ore.

Pennington said the filling of Lake Umatilla will begin April 15, and the water from Lake Pend Oreille will pass through 11 dams before it reaches the new lake.

After the operation, Pend Oreille will be held near 2,056 until spring snowmelt begins. At that time it gradually will be filled to 2,062.5, and will be held at that level during the summer recreation season, Pennington said.

## Four Girls Claim To Have Seen Vision

**SEVILLA, Spain (AP)**—Four girls living at Palmar de Troya, a village 17 miles south of Sevilla, claim they saw a vision of the Virgin Mary twice, March 31 and April 1.

Father Jose Maria Suarez Moreno, the local priest, said today the girls had reported the vision to him.

"I have my reservations about the reported vision," he said. "I paid it not much attention. Let's wait and see. Anyway, all four girls are normal but they could have had a collective hallucination."

The girls are Maria Josefa Guzman Hidalgo, 13, Ana Aguilera Saborido, 13, Ana Maria Garcia Gonzalez, 12, and Maria Garcia Cabrera, 12. They come of farming families.

Ana Maria said they had gone out to a nearby field to pick flowers for the altar of the local church.

"When I lifted my head I saw a flash coming from a nearby tree and at its center appeared a face," she said.

"At first I thought it was the face of a man. But when I looked at it carefully I saw it was the face of the Virgin. It was a pinky, smiling face with big black eyes. I called in my friends and they saw the face too."

## Soviets Believe Soil Shelter On Moon Plausible

**MOSCOW (AP)**—Soviet scientists have determined that men could protect themselves from radiation on the moon by building a shelter with 12 feet of the official news agency Tass reported Tuesday.

The scientists reached this conclusion on the basis of data provided by unmanned Soviet moon shots. Protection against radiation is one of the most serious problems faced if space ships are sent to the moon for prolonged stays.

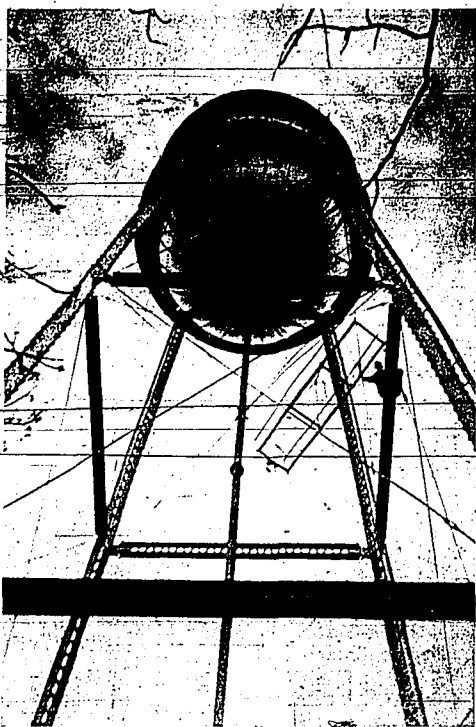
The Soviet Union on Sunday launched a new unmanned moon shot, Luna 14, and it is expected to reach the area late Wednesday.

## Agreement On Garbage Strike Near

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## North Vietnamese Met U.S. Air War With Good Defense

**MIAMI, Fla. (AP)**—The people of the country, he reported, met the escalation of the American North Vietnam air war against them with much of the credit with comparable escalation of their own air defenses, which an American writer reported as "a good defense" to have "carried them through the air war in remarkably good shape."

Bill Baggs, editor of the Miami News, said Hanoi is needed in what must be "one of the most sophisticated and effective defense systems in the world."

# Racial Violence Takes 31

By The Associated Press  
Racial violence following the assassination last Thursday night of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. thus far has taken 31 lives, resulted in the injury of more than 2,500 persons and caused damage estimated at more than \$30 million.

Some 14,000 persons have been arrested in connection with riots, looting and exchange of gunfire with police. More than 2,000 fires, nearly all attributed to arson, have been reported.

# Parents Urged To Instruct Children In Health Habits

BOSTON (NEA) — Parents to do just routinely take advantage of the public action which were commonplace when my medical practice began.

In this series, I would like to convince parents everywhere that it is equally important to establish in their children certain health habits which over the years may substantially reduce the risk of heart attacks and strokes.

My list is this ancient maxim: "This education forms the common mold: Just as the twig is bent, the tree's inclined."

I strongly share the conviction of the American Heart Association that the 20th anniversary as a national voluntary health agency, and which is an important part of our life and work, that the individual's risk is vastly improved if good heart and health habits have begun early in life and remain.

Many forces will in later years shape a child's susceptibility to heart attacks and strokes — among them physical inactivity, an overrich diet, cigarette smoking, excessive body weight, high blood pressure, genetic inheritance, the male sex, and increasing age.

But the first three of these factors cannot be controlled. But the others are subject to modification by the individual. The extent to which a person does the things that should be done will be conditioned in large measure by the habits which he or she develops in childhood. Parents play an extremely influential role in the development of these behavior patterns.

Both by precept and example, parents can establish for themselves and their children a routine of regular physical activity consistent with their own or their children's conditions of health.

They should maintain normal weight, and make certain the children do the same. They should abstain from smoking, thus setting a good example, and they should insure their children avoid the hazards of cigarette smoking.

Mothers can help their children form good dietary habits by serving unadorned fats (mostly vegetable oils) in place of saturated (mostly animal) fats and fewer foods rich in cholesterol.

Finally, the family can make doctor checkups a regular routine. This is especially urgent insofar as adults are concerned, since the physician will have an opportunity to treat any high blood pressure, diabetes or other disorders his examinations may disclose.

If the habits suggested above are lastingly imprinted, there is an excellent possibility that 10, 15 or even 20 additional years of life could be the bounty for each child.

Some parents violate all of these basic principles and still don't realize the harm they are doing. Actually, they are increasing rather than reducing their children's probability of living longer.

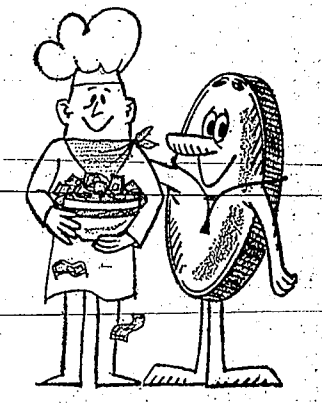
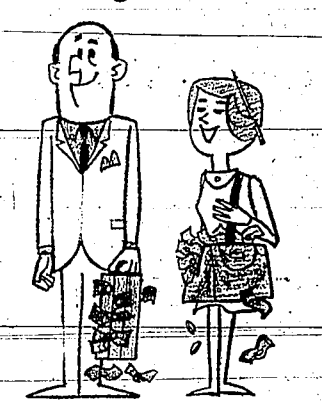

## Medical Specialists Pass Along Some Advice On Avoiding Liver Disease

BY NOEL GROVE BETHESDA, Md. — (NEA) As if Asian flu, a tax increase and the Vietnam war weren't enough to fret about, Americans may be straddling a peak season in outbreaks of hepatitis.

But they admit that if trends over the past decades hold true, this winter will probably turn up more reported cases of the energy-draining, yellowing disease than have occurred in any of the 100 years.

Hepatitis, a disease of the liver, remains one of the most frequently unresolved problems in the field of infectious diseases.

Parents would also be advised to prevent their children from playing near sewage outlets.

The last high point of hepatitis in the United States was in the winter of 1960-61, when 64,267 cases were reported. In keeping with trends observed in earlier years, the number of cases decreased steadily in the winters of 1962-63, 1963-64 and 1965-66. The 1966-67 the number of cases began the upward again.

Each week throughout the year, the number of new cases throughout the United States is reported to the National Communicable Diseases Center in Atlanta, Ga. So far this winter, the number of cases is running about 100 cases a week, according to Dr. Ronald Johnson of the hepatitis unit at the center, indicating the seven-year peak is holding true to form.

## Rate Hike Seen

WASHINGTON (AP) — Chairman John E. Horne of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board forecasts Tuesday the possibility of even higher interest rates for home mortgages.

The nation is likely to face "rather stringent" credit conditions, Horne said, until the balance of payments and budget problems can be resolved.

"Interest rates which are already high may go even higher," a workable in a talk to the annual legislative-management conference of the National League of Insured Savings Associations.

Interest rates on home mortgages during February approached their record levels of 1966. The average rate on conventional loans for new houses reached 6.49 per cent.

## ICC Refuses To Block Rate Increases

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Interstate Commerce Commission refused Tuesday to block increases in truck freight rates scheduled to go into effect April 15 in 11 western states, including Utah and Idaho.

The increases range from 1 per cent on shipments weighing 10,000 pounds and over to 3 per cent on less than truck load shipments under 10,000 pounds.

ICC rate was 5.2, while commissioners John W. Bush and Dale W. Hardin voting to suspend the rates. But the majority voted to let them go into effect while at the same time investigating them.

The action was similar to one taken March 29 when the commission voted to allow higher rates to go into effect in 23 states, but decided to investigate them.

The "latest" increase affects truckers which are members of the Pacific Inland Tariff Bureau in Utah, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, Montana, Wyoming, California, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico and Colorado. Shipments going into Western Canada also would be affected.

## Date Stretched

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Internal Revenue Service said Tuesday it will stretch the April 15 income tax filing deadline for taxpayers affected by outbreaks of racial violence.

The service said it will accept returns delayed because of the disturbances without assessing the usual penalty 5 per cent per month of any taxes due up to a 25 per cent maximum.

The service said it cannot waive, however, the interest prescribed by law on any taxes due — one-half of one per cent monthly.

The service said some taxpayers may have lost records or been prevented from obtaining help in preparing tax returns because of curfews and violence.

These returns, it said, should be filed as quickly as possible, accompanied by a letter stating the circumstances and reasons for the delay.

The letter must establish clearly that the delay was caused by the disturbances and was outside the taxpayer's control, IRS said.

# Union Leaders Say There Is No Alternative To Striking

**MINNECIPUS ISLAND, Maine (NEA)** — On a clear, cold morning recently, one of those days when the song insists you can survive, Dwight Hanna, the only teacher at the tiny of education sought a concept school on this little lump of land that off Maine's rock-bound coast, saw his career come to an end.

Hanna took himself out of

schools closed and their teachers on the picket line. Gov. DeWey Bartlett of Oklahoma, huddled with legislative leaders in an attempt to push through a \$77-million program in hopes of ending a statewide teachers' strike. 1,500 members of the State Teachers' Federation of the Republic of the world, what he called "the deplorable conditions of our school."

For seeking less noble goals—more money in most cases—the other strikers lost nothing but their jobs.

But teachers aren't the only ones to rebel against the public recently.

"Time was," says a New York lawyer, "when industrial unions were the only ones that would dare to strike. The civil service workers felt that a strike would be a violation of their obligation to the people of their city."

Those days are gone forever. The spirit of militancy "has touched everyone."

It has touched transportation workers, who have killed city-owned buses and New York's subway; welfare workers who have decided that they have to look out for their own welfare; nurses and doctors, who have prescribed remedies for their own ills; sanitation work-

you hit 'em where it hurts. And strikes hit citizens where it hurts the most. Denied their services and safety, many people are willing to sweeten the pot a little in order to get the wheels of progress rolling again.

"I deplore strikes by members of the teaching profession and other professionals," says Dr. John Fischer, president of Columbia University's Teachers' College, "but I also deplore the conditions that lead these people to think that there's no alternative to striking."

But union leaders say they

see no alternative.

"Strikes by workers that jeopardize the public welfare are impermissible and must be deterred," says a veteran labor mediator Theodore Kheel, one of the leading experts on the subject.

"The right to strike, no matter how important to labor, must be subordinated to the superior public interest."

Most people agree; but unionists warn that the public interest will be hard pressed to prove its superiority.

## Rockefeller Gathers Aides To Formulate Positions

NEW YORK (AP) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller announced Tuesday that he is assembling a staff of advisers and researchers to help him formulate positions on the "great national and international issues before us."

He named four men and said he is preparing to state his policies on foreign and domestic problems confronting the United States.

In a statement issued by his office, the governor said "other expert advisers in specific fields" will be brought into the staff.

The four named were Dr. Henry Kissinger of Harvard University, Dr. Richard Nathan of the Brookings Institute, Oscar Reubhausen, a New York City lawyer, and John Emmett Hughes, widely known writer.

Rockefeller announced March 2 that he would not be a candidate for the Republican nomination for president. He said, however:

"I have said that I stood ready to answer to any true and reasonable call from the Republican party to serve it and the nation. I still so stand. I would be grateful if any candidate were I to say otherwise."

Up to now, the governor has refrained from speaking out on domestic and foreign problems because to do so, he said, might create the impression that he was a presidential candidate. In his statement Tuesday, he said:

"Our nation is enduring—as I said a fortnight ago—a time of crisis and confusion probably without parallel in our history. The tragic events of recent days make this obvious truth more plain than ever. This truth imposes on every American—and especially everyone in public life—a special responsibility to know his responsibility and to speak his mind."

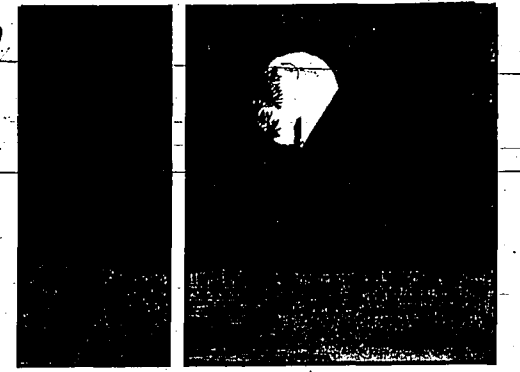
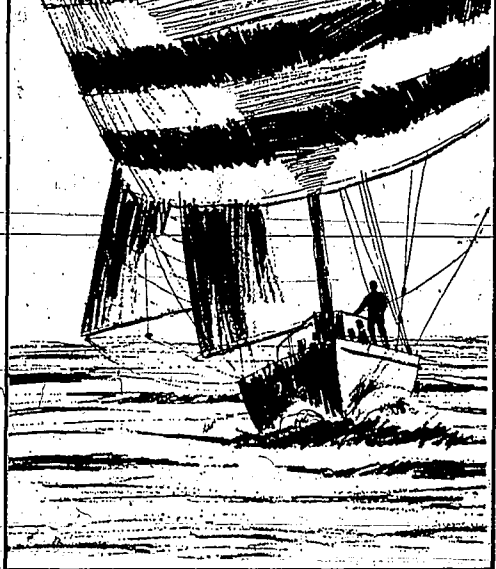
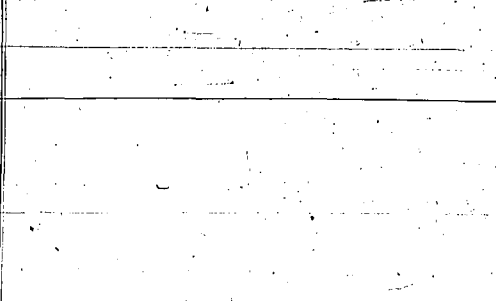
