## What Is 'Time'? It Can Be Misery Or Salvation

**Time** is a word that means many things. It is the passing quickly for 355 men and women who are in the Idaho State Penitentiary on a day, however, the gray stone walls and the food tastes terrible and the prisoners think more about life on the outside.

The prison complex on Warm Springs Avenue has been in constant use since 1890. Its massive wall and sprawling buildings are the result of many plumb lines in view of the many plumb lines in the surrounding neighborhood.

When the wind is right, citizens can hear the inmates yell and the sounds of their daily routine is marked from breakfast to lights out.

This old prison has been con-

tinuous for years. But it won't be long before a large change from the situation that existed just eight months ago.

The new inmates who are being received at the Idaho State Penitentiary are being housed in the new building which was started in 1964. It will be the vocational of baking and send home to relatives.

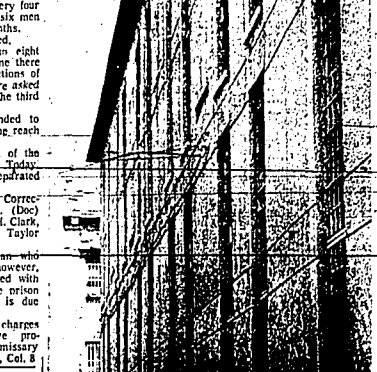

The first head-on race between Democratic presidential candidates Robert F. Kennedy and Eugene J. McCarthy comes in Indiana's May 7 primary—and they're already clashing over its significance.  
"Indiana is the key primary," Kennedy told crowds in Fort Wayne and Columbus, Ind., Wednesday.  
The New York senator said Indiana "may very well decide who's going to be the Democratic nominee—and very likely the next president of the United States."

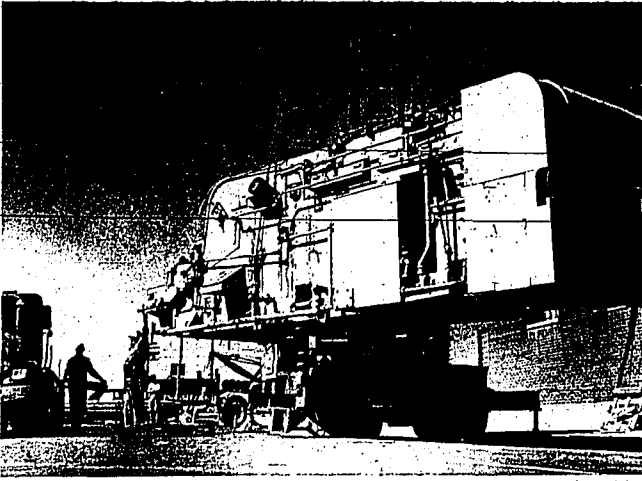
But McCarthy, campaigning in Nebraska where the two senators also meet in a May 14 primary, didn't agree.  
The Minnesota senator told newsmen Indiana may be more critical for Kennedy because it's his first. But he said the true test is the showing in all the primaries.  
McCarthy claimed in Lincoln, Neb., later that his New Hampshire—and Wisconsin—primary victories "pledged" President Johnson's decision to de-escalate the Vietnam war.  
The senator drew long applause when he said the people have passed judgment on the

war and Johnson has responded by declaring "this war must be brought to a close."  
But Kennedy in Indiana repeated none of his earlier criticism of Johnson and did not attack "the administration's war policy as he has in the past."  
On the Republican side, backers encouraged by New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's recent statements, have launched a Rockefeller-for-a-President Committee to promote a convention draft.  
Rockefeller told a news conference Wednesday: "I have said I was available if the party

wanted me. . . . I have not pulled out. I just never got into active candidacy."  
While McCarthy was campaigning in Nebraska, he was winning in local primaries 115 of the 960 Connecticut state delegates who will select and instruct the state's 44 national convention delegates.  
McCarthy drew about 45 percent of the vote Wednesday in what was the closest thing to a caucus since the state's last presidential primary.  
He was the only candidate to have delegates pledged to him in all 30 local primaries.

Operations Of Coca-Cola Are Moved

Equipment of the Coca-Cola Bottling Co., 163 Third Ave. S., is being moved to new and better quarters this week in the old Self Manufacturing building, which has been purchased by the firm's owners, Mr. and Mrs. Egon Kroll.  
New quarters will give the company about three times the floor space of the former building, Mr. Kroll said. He said property across Third Avenue South from the Self building has also been purchased and will be used for future expansion of warehouse and processing facilities.  
From the Twin Falls plant, the firm serves eight Magic Valley counties with a fleet of trucks delivering the soft drink supplies to businesses of the valley.  
Mr. Kroll said Thursday most of the equipment has been transferred to the new building with the exception of one major item that will be moved later this week.  
By Tuesday, he said, the firm hopes to be manufacturing soft drinks from the new location.  
Most of Wednesday was spent in moving one piece of equipment. This was a 50,000-pound bottle washer. The plant washer was pulled and pushed through the doors by heavy equipment from Northwest Crane Rigging and Transport Co., owned by Doyle Gilmer.  
A large crane lifted the 25-ton piece of equipment, which Mr. Kroll said weighed about \$1 a pound, onto a flat-bed truck, then unloaded it in a similar manner and pushed and pulled into the new quarters.  
Mr. Kroll has been managing the firm since 1952 when he purchased half interest and took over complete ownership in 1956. The firm operates with franchises from the Coca-Cola Co., Quench and Crush lines and also distributes Canada Dry products in the local area.  
Mr. Kroll said his company employs 21 full-time persons in the manufacture and distribution operations.

SHOSHONE — Magic Reservoir contains 162,000 acre-feet of water, compared to 69,000 acre feet a year ago now. Opinions vary as to the filling of Magic, however.  
Some are certain that it will fill and others aren't so sure about 30,000 more acre feet of water is needed to fill the reservoir and the inflow has been about 1,000 acre feet per day even with the cool weather.  
Leon Grivee, manager of the Big Wood Canal Co., states it is possible the inflow may increase with warmer weather, however the snow cover left is all below average. No decision has been reached as to when Magic water will be turned on. Since it might not fill and storage would be charged from the first turn on water will be turned on any sooner than possible.

The Draft Quotas

Draft quotas throughout the country are rising, and so are questions about the draft. The issue is the state selective service system in Idaho, Maj. Gen George B. Bennett, says: "Young men have a right to know the answers to their questions."

The Selective Service Act has been in continuous force since 1948. Married men got a reprieve in 1963 when President John Kennedy ordered deferments, but the order was canceled in 1965 by President Lyndon Johnson because of the demands of the conflict in Vietnam.

This is not a comment on the pros or cons of the Selective Service System. It is an essay on the draft system, and some answers to questions most often asked by the young man of draft age.

For instance, young men will ask: If a person registers his card to national headquarters will he be considered delinquent? The answer is no, for not having the card in his possession?

The answer is, the infraction of the law is not having the card in the registrant's possession. Whether the individual will be processed as a delinquent depends on the circumstances and is a decision to be made by the local draft board.

Can a person be deferred from the service for a traffic violation on his record? This question has nothing to do with deferment. The issue is whether the individual will be accepted for service is controlled by the Department of Defense.

Once a person turns in his draft card, then he gets a change of heart, what must he do in order to enlist in an armed service? Possession of a draft card is not a requirement for enlistment. However, if the individual does not possess a draft card he is in violation of the law.

Can the registrant get an attorney to represent him before a hearing with the local draft board? No. How can a registrant find out how he is classified? Lists are placed in public places at each local board office.

Can the registrant ask questions when in doubt about the draft? Yes. These questions and answers are just a sample. Others can be posed at the local draft board.

The Selective Service System is flexible in that it deals with individuals. If deferments are given, it is often for a good reason and in no way—in this day and age—can a draft board be influenced by improper means.

Selection of draftees follows in this manner: Delinquents 19 years of age and older, in the order of dates of birth—with oldest first; volunteers under 26 in the order that the individual volunteered; non-volunteers 19 to 26 who do not have a wife, with oldest first; non-volunteers over 26 with youngest first, and finally, non-volunteers 18 1/2 to 19 years old, with the oldest called first.

Each young man must register when he is 18 years old. Matters of deferment should be presented to the local board for individual consideration.

And a few other legislators, including Rep. Henry Reuss, also of Wisconsin, and Rep. Dominick Daniels of New Jersey, have introduced legislation to reduce this hand-out to the wealthy.

After all, they represent a lobby—the Lobby of the Anonymous—and they have the power to reduce the depletion allowance through the ballot box.

The U.S. Command said 219 Americans were killed last week and 3,100 were wounded. Of the wounded, 1,344 required hospitalization. A week earlier, the American totals were 330 killed and 3,586 wounded.

South Vietnamese headquarters reported 407 government troops killed last week, 1,479 wounded and 14 missing in action. The week before the Vietnamese reported 333 men killed, 1,140 wounded and 41 missing.

The South Vietnamese command said 4,012 enemy were killed in action last week, and 559 were captured.

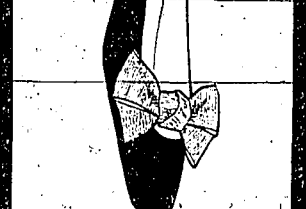

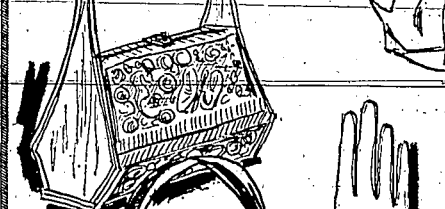

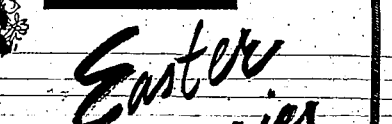

College and university students throughout the nation will be marking the Choice '68 ballots when they elect officers for their own student bodies.

Of elections have been set for April 22. The 13 choices given for president include three Democrats, seven Republicans and three independents. At least ten of the candidates are no longer in the running.

One of the independents on the ballot is the late Dr. Martin Luther King and one of the Democrats is President Lyndon B. Johnson, who has said he will not run for reelection.

Other Democrats on the ballot are Robert F. Kennedy and Eugene F. McCarthy. Other independent party candidates are Fred Hatfield and George C. Wallace.

Republicans on the ballot are Mark O. Hatfield, John V. Lindzey, Richard M. Nixon, Charles H. Percy, Ronald Reagan, Nelson Rockefeller and Harold Stassen. Students are also offered in place to write in another candidate.

No vice presidential race is offered on the ballot, but three opinion questions are asked.

# Legal Obstacles Being Cleared For Transplants Of Hearts

By ROBERT GOLDENSTEIN, AP Science Writer

CHICAGO (AP) — Lawmakers in a half-dozen states have acted to clear away the legal obstacles that could block transplants of hearts and other organs.

—What determines the time of a donor's death—the cessation of heart or brain action?

—Who will determine among the many persons who need a new healthy heart which ones will receive the relatively few organs available?

The legislators have not gone into these questions and the laws passed or under consideration apply to the transplantation of all of internal organs.

Organ transplant bills were introduced in Virginia, Maryland and Oklahoma.

The Virginia General Assembly passed a sweeping law that would restrict heart transplants to a "relatively small number" of minutely controlled organs of the recently deceased persons performed at only available for surgical transplants.

The law, which becomes effective at the end of June, provides:

—"I am proud that Kansas has become the first state to provide for an internal organ as a transplant."

—There is insufficient time to contact the next of kin in order to ensure the health of the organ to be transplanted and no known objection is foreseen from the next of kin.

—The organ removed from the dead person will not interfere with the medical examiner's investigation or autopsy.

The dead persons under the law would include those killed by accident, suicide or homicide, those who died suddenly when in apparent good health, or when in prison, or when the body is to be cremated.

The Kansas Legislature adopted a bill providing that any competent person may donate body organs to another person. Upon death, the person's spouse, adult child or parent, clergyman, lawyers and California Institute of Technology, Lee Durrigge. The committee may recommend statutes to the legislature.

—"There probably will be legal complaints in the future if a person dies or is seriously injured in a transplant, and we are not prepared legally at present for such complaints," Younger said.

"Also, let's say two people are in need of a transplant when an organ becomes available," Younger added. "How are we to decide who should get the organ? And who should make the decision? Should the state become involved or just the medical profession?"

The Maryland Legislature passed a bill which would give the proposed donor of tissues and organs the exclusive right to revoke the decision. Present law gives the next of kin 72 hours after the proposed donor's death to revoke—too late for transplants in most cases.

—The South-Carolina Senate and the Oklahoma House passed bills designed to remove any implied warranty that blood used in transplants of organs need in transplants are, without defect.

The legislation would protect surgeons from legal responsibility in the event of failure of transplanted organs or hepatitis after a blood transfusion. Surgeons still would be liable for damage suits for negligence or faulty procedures.

# Educational Robin Hood Won't Take Money From Federal Government

**Detroit (NEA)** — "I nearly didn't finish high school," admitted Mrs. M. J. Bentley, 41, a mother of three, as she sat in the school cafeteria. "I had my bachelor's degree at 17, my master's at 19 and my doctorate at 21. You could say that I'm a hustler."

To call Mrs. Bentley a hustler would be an understatement. Her friends think of her as a black Bilko, a sawed-off Sir Lancelot, in a baggy suit, the educational Robin Hood of Detroit's inner city. Mrs. Bentley, who runs the Career Development Center here, put in 24 years as a baggage porter at the Statler-Hilton Hotel before taking leave last year to devote full time to the center. Her fees that his independent, local organization can best describe. Her goal is to train the unemployable and to find employment for the so-called unemployable.

In order to achieve these goals, Mrs. Bentley will take just about anything from anybody. The one thing she won't take is money from the government — and government.

"We'll take money from unions or private individuals or almost any other source," she says, "but we stay away from those government dollars. We want to involve people with their souls, with their physical strength, with helping themselves. We involve people with doing something to give their community into the American way of life. We call it Sweat Equity. When government money comes in, Sweat-Equity goes out. That's when a program becomes a give-away."

Mrs. Bentley started the Career Development Center about three years ago with a bankroll of \$150. Her idea was simple. He wants to help those who are now underprivileged find better jobs and he wants to find jobs for the unemployed.

Part of the center's training program is being conducted by Mind, Inc. Mind offers a series of courses covering the basics of reading, spelling, word meaning and math. After finishing these elementary courses, students move on to more specialized training which includes a typing course. In addition, courses are offered in Teletype operation with classes in business machine operations, word-

ing, electricity and kitchen and dining room work soon to start.

The building itself is a former school converted into a workshop and now being converted back into a school.

The library, which consists of a handful of books at present, lists such titles as "Fanny Hill" and "Valley of the Dolls." The people who run this unique school don't care what they read. Mrs. Bentley said as they read.

Many of the center's 203 students are young people. Some are high school dropouts, others graduated, but found that their diplomas didn't mean much when matched with their skills.

Three of the four teachers, calling monitors at the center, are college dropouts. One finished business school.

Mrs. Irma Craft, a former high school teacher who now works at the center, said that many of the high school graduates now taking CDC courses should have been graduated from high school.

"We tested some of these people and found that they're third- and fourth-grade levels as far as arithmetic is concerned and fifth-grade levels as far as English and word meanings are concerned. They're absolutely lost. That's why we have this second — chance operation. The way things are in the schools today the guidance counselors are often nothing but disciplinarians. The teachers aren't given encouragement to do the kind of teaching they can do and the students suffer the consequences."

Mrs. Craft doesn't promise to find every student a job. "What we do promise," she says, "is to make everyone employable. Our No. 1 demand is for office workers and so far we've had good success in placing people."

Local banks, department stores and power companies and industrial giants like GM, Ford and Sears have tapped the center for skilled workers.

Bush and Mrs. Craft take considerable pride in the fact that they have placed in jobs none

money and what he calls "the honest little people of the community" together at the center. And he gets things done.

"You've got to care leadership," he says, "and you can't tell people who their leaders are. The reason why we've been successful is that we're just like the people we're working with. We live here, just like they do. The Negro people look to us for leadership, not the ones appointed by the white community."

As an example, Mrs. Bentley points to Whitney Young of the Urban League.

"Let's face it," he says, "if you want to socialize, Whitney Young is your man. He's a fine gentleman, really, and his daughter goes to Bryn Mawr."

Many of the people who work with and/or are helped by the center have been in jail.

"These people have been through the ropes, they've made mistakes," says Mrs. Bentley, "most of these cases society has looked down on these people. We don't do that. I've got some kids with past records working on our building on the other side of town, the Community

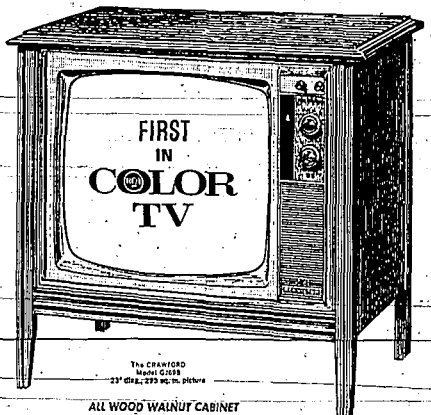
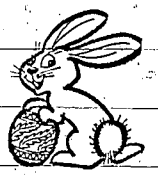
