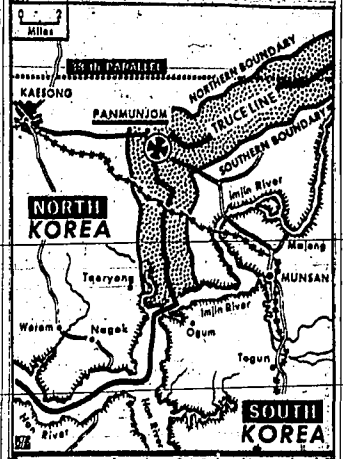


2 Americans Killed Koreans Ambush U.N. Truck

SEOUL (AP) — Two Americans and two South Koreans were killed Sunday night by North Koreans who ambushed a U.N. Command truck half a mile south of the Panmunjom armistice meeting site.



THE CROSS locates the area where North Koreans ambushed a truck and killed four United Nations Command soldiers, including two Americans Sunday night.

The spokesman said a truck from the U.S. 2nd Infantry Division was making a routine run from an advance camp to Panmunjom when it was attacked. He said personnel aboard a second American military vehicle carried about 200 rounds of automatic weapon fire and two explosions erupted in the area.

Two other American soldiers were wounded. The U.N. Command called the ambush "a flagrant violation of the armistice and filed a protest note.

The ambush raised American suspicions to four soldiers who were wounded Sunday night. The spokesman said the North Korean half of the demilitarized zone. The two South Koreans killed were attached to the U.S. Division.

Rear Adm. John V. Smith, the U.N. Command member of the Military Armistice Commission, demanded a joint investigation of the attack.

Johnson Heads For Honolulu Meetings

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — President Johnson ended a relaxed Easter weekend at his ranch and headed today for Honolulu for talks with South Korea's president and with U.S. military chiefs in the Pacific area.

A last-minute addition to the party was Cyrus R. Vance, former deputy secretary of defense on whom Johnson frequently calls for special assignments.

It was Vance whom Johnson dispatched to South Korea following the Jan. 23 seizure by North Korea of the U.S. intelligence-gathering ship Pueblo. President Chung Hee Park and other officials in Seoul protested that they were excluded from the party.

Courts Process Thousands Of Arrests Made In Rioting

KANSAS CITY — About 180 in all in lieu of bonds of \$50,000 to \$100,000 awaiting hearings on felony charges arising from riots, courts also have 122 misdemeanor cases, such as curfew violations, on docket. About 20 persons pleaded guilty to curfew violations and were fined \$15 to \$25. Other cases have been continued.

Hundreds have been fined, mostly for curfew violations. Many have received suspended sentences. Others remain free in bail pending trial on charges ranging from looting and arson to first-degree murder.

In Baltimore, about 5,800 persons were arrested in 6,466 cases tried, 2,193 convictions resulted, mostly for curfew violations. Fines ranged from \$5 to \$250. Probation cases totaled 389. Many cases involving looting and arson await grand jury action.

Washington reported 5,500 arrests, including 4,400 curfew violations. Persons charged with curfew violations in that city they can avoid trial by posting \$25 bond. The remaining cases deal with looting, arson, and other more serious charges.

Chicago arrest figures exceed 2,500, with an estimated 500 persons remaining in jail.

Bonds for 201 persons arrested in looting and arson cases were reduced Sunday in a special Easter session of circuit court. A total of 283 cases were heard.

Previously more than 2,000 were released on bond, plus some juveniles who were turned over to their parents. Most of the Chicago arrests were for disorderly conduct, curfew violations, burglary and looting.

Cases in other cities include: CINCINNATI — Total of 260 persons arrested, including 84 juveniles. Charges include curfew violations and possession of fire bombs. Three persons have been charged with first-degree murder, one for manslaughter, two for assault with a deadly weapon, and one for inciting to riot.

NEW YORK CITY — About 400 arrests, with disorders minor compared with those in other cities. All cases are being processed in courts of the city's five boroughs.

Titanium Helmet Is Tested

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army is considering a helmet of lighter but tougher metals, the soldier's shade, shield, foot-stool and pillow.

Researchers believe titanium, a lightweight but expensive alloy used in some advanced aircraft, can provide the protection a helmet with better head protection than the helmets now made of manganese steel.

Scientists say titanium helmets have stood up well in ballistics tests at Edgewood Arsenal, Md. Scientists there also are looking at several other materials which might be used to fashion combat helmets.

It is part of a broad Army effort to provide durable but light cumbersome gear for the fighting man — to lighten his burden, make him more mobile and more effective.

Humphrey Counts On Collecting Political Debts In His Bid

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey is counting on collecting political debts piled up in distress party fund-raising activities in his expected bid for the Democratic presidential nomination.

It is widely assumed he will announce his candidacy this week. Humphrey's associates believe his extensive traveling on the Democratic ticket circuit will help do for him what it has done for Richard M. Nixon among the Republicans — put him in the front rank of candidates.

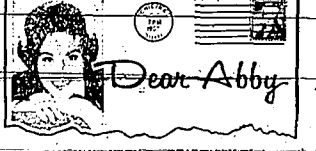

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Mill-men at U.S. Steel's Homestead Works want more parking space, \$500-million Local 1408 at McKeesport. Steelworkers at McKeesport want incentive pay for all workers at their plant.

Half-Inch Of Rain Started Flood-Of-Events That May Alter Race Relations

By GAYLORD SHAW

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — On a cold, gray morning in January, half an inch of rain could send trickles of water along the gutters. But that half an inch of rain started a flood of events that may have altered the course of "relations" in the United States.

Because of the rain Jan. 30, Memphis Sanitation Department supervisors sent home with two hours pay for the day, 21 or 22 men whose job it was to clean the gutters.

The gutter cleaners, all Negroes, complained their white supervisors always received a full day's pay, even when it rained.

Their complaints swelled into a strike of 1,300 sanitation workers and garbage collectors, 98 per cent of them Negroes. They racially tinged labor dispute brought clashes with police, hundreds of arrests and a sit-in at the city council chamber.

And it brought Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. to Memphis.

King led garbage collectors on a march through the business district on March 25. He was planning another march when, on a still spring evening April 4, the night of King's death, the civil rights movement's leading apostle of nonviolence was shot and killed by a sniper.

The night of King's death, orders started breaking out in cities across the nation. The riots were and lasted for a week, leaving more than a score of persons dead, scarring Washington, Chicago, Baltimore, Kansas City and other urban centers, and heightening racial tensions in communities from coast to coast.

Within a week, Congress had passed and President Johnson signed a civil-rights bill containing a broad open housing provision.

The turmoil following King's death all but obscured the sanitation workers' strike, which ended its 10th week today. The dispute has not yet cleared, and some officials appeared concerned about the plans of the Rev. Ralph Abernathy, who succeeded King as head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, to address a mass meeting here tonight.

Aldes said Abernathy would launch a new campaign "for better jobs and human dignity" and would stay in Memphis "for the duration."

Two days after King's slaying, the White House dispatched Undersecretary of Labor James Reynolds, a veteran of steel, railroad and other major labor negotiations, to Memphis in an attempt to "settle" the garbage collectors' strike.

The American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees is seeking a 45-cent increase in hourly wages that ranged from \$1.65 to \$2.10. The last reported offer was no more.

Reynolds called negotiators, including Mayor Henry Loch, into session Easter Sunday but they didn't seem hopeful of an early settlement.

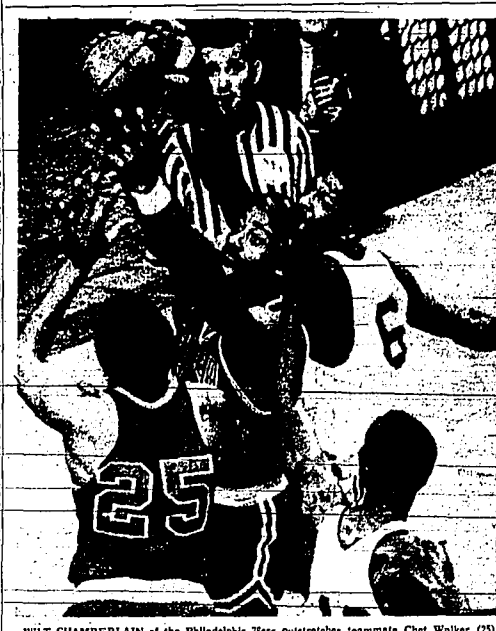

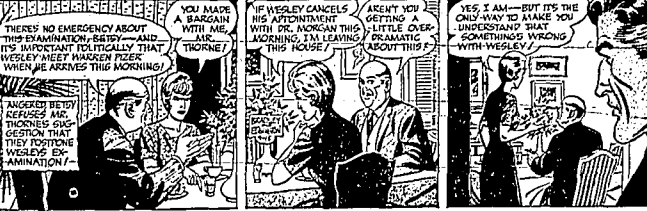

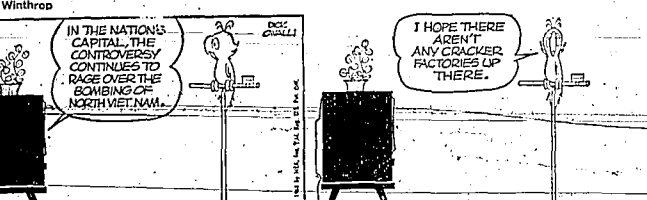
