## Air War Costs U.S. 4 Planes

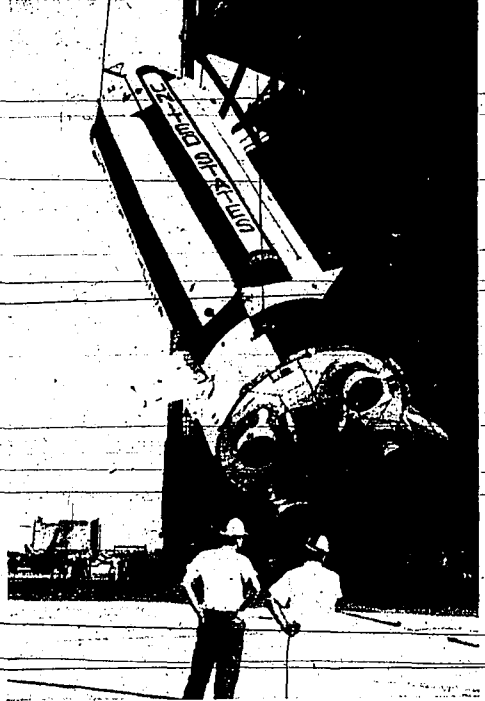

SAIGON (AP) — The air war against North Vietnam cost the United States four more planes Monday, two shot down over the southern panhandle and two lost when they collided in the air, military sources said today. Five of the fliers were rescued and one was lost.

A U.S. spokesman suggested the North Vietnamese may be moving more anti-aircraft guns south to counter the increase in American bombing of the panhandle since President Johnson banned raids farther north.

Two F-105s were shot down near Dong Hoi, about 40 miles north of the demilitarized zone. The U.S. spokesman said anti-aircraft fire around Dong Hoi was extremely heavy and possibly the cause of the collisions.

Since President Johnson halted U.S. bombing north of the 20th Parallel on April 1 in an attempt to open peace discussions with Hanoi, U.S. pilots have more than doubled their usual number of daily raids to the panhandle.

One of the F-105 pilots, Col. David W. Winn, 44, of Minneapolis, Minn., maneuvered his crippled Thunderbolt 100 miles south over the South China Sea, bailed out at 18,000 feet, and was picked up by a "chick green glint" helicopter.

## Vatican To View Issues In Dispute

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Vatican has stepped into the dispute between James Cardinal McIntyre, archbishop of Los Angeles, and the Sisters of the Immaculate Heart, the U.S. Catholic Conference reported today.

A conference spokesman said the Sacred Congregation for Religious and Secular Institutes in Rome has appointed a four-man special committee to examine the issues in dispute.

The committee, headed by Cardinal McIntyre, is expected to report back to the Vatican in June.

The conference spokesman said the sisters were ready to resign from their order in the face of demands from Cardinal McIntyre that they halt their modernization program.

The report said about 515 of the 600 members would resign and form a confederation of religious women leaving parochial schools to teach in public schools.

The nub of the controversy is the sisters' plan to modernize their dress, use their real names, keep their own hours and let some sisters pursue careers outside the convent.

The sisters maintain their modernization program was authorized by the Vatican Council and that they have thus been carrying out the wishes of Pope Paul VI.

Cardinal McIntyre, now 81 and a firm traditionalist, disapproves of the plans.

## Demo Governors Decide Not To Tampers With Events Of History

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — Democratic governors have decided not to tamper with the events of history in this explosive political year, agreeing instead to wait and see what happens before announcing preferences in the race for the White House.

They didn't even reach an accord that would have declared advance support for the man their party eventually nominates to run for president.

Even before their 25-hour political talk Monday, the governors meeting in St. Louis acknowledged they could not possibly agree on a consensus candidate.

It is a major product. A statement rejecting any mass attempt by governors to step into the developing race between Sens. Robert F. Kennedy of Mississippi and Eugene J. McCarthy of Minnesota and Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, the latter still undecided.

Instead, the governors agreed to wait and watch. Even that wasn't unanimous.

Gov. John Bell Williams of Mississippi obtained from the decision of Gov. Lester Maddox of Georgia wasn't present when it was made.

Gov. Richard J. Hughes of New Jersey raised the question of an advance endorsement of the 1968 Democratic ticket, but said he would neither seek nor accept.

## Burley Project Announced

BURLEY — Construction of a \$3 million ultra modern shopping center on the east side of Burley is scheduled to begin in September, officials of the Damm Development Corp., Nampa, announced Tuesday morning at a news conference held in the Ponderosa Inn.

John W. Nelson, official of the Nampa firm which also develops the Lakos Shopping Center in Twin Falls, said "The Mall" Shopping Center will cover seven acres on a 30-acre site bounded by East Main Street, Highland Avenue and 16th Street. The area, which will include more than 300,000 square feet, will be air conditioned and carpeted throughout and all under one roof.

There will be space in the new shopping center for from 25 to 30 businesses, Mr. Nelson said. Officials from two major chains also present at the press conference announced their firm will establish stores in The Mall.

Floyd Weeds, manager of the Penney Store, said his firm has signed a lease for 70,000 square feet of space to include a department store, auto center, and a variety of other stores with an exit from the department store to the air conditioned parking area.

## Few Clues Slow FBI In Hunt For Man

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Dead-end clues to a man who vanished without a trace apparently confronted FBI agents today in their investigation of the sniper slaying of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Yale was multiplied in the hunt for Eric Starvo Galt, a mysterious quiet-talking man whose last known address was a Birmingham rooming house where an Eric Galt lived for six weeks last fall.

Galt's abandoned white Mustang was introduced last Thursday by the FBI in Atlanta. It fit the description of a car seen leaving the scene after King was killed April 4 by sniper firing from a rooming house in Memphis, Tenn.

Memphis witnesses described the suspected assassin, who registered at John Willard, a rooming house opposite King's motel, as about six feet tall, shag-haired and "a clean, neat man."

No trace of Willard has apparently been found.

## Novelist Edna Ferber Dies At 82

NEW YORK (AP) — Novelist Edna Ferber died today at the Pulitzer Prize in 1924, died Tuesday in New York. She was 82.

## Johnson Bears Down On U.S. Military Problems

HONOLULU (AP) — President Johnson, pressing Hanoi for an early and serious response to Vietnam peace efforts, also bearing down on military problems in conference at the U.S. Pacific command today.

Johnson's schedule today centered on a visit to the hilltop headquarters of Adm. U.S. Grant Sharp, Pacific command-in-chief who will retire in July. The President said he wanted to talk about the military situation in Vietnam with Sharp and his designated successor, Adm. John S. McCain.

The President left North Vietnam a new peace prof Monday, soon after arriving in Honolulu.

As friends and critics vied for attention with shouts, chants and placards, the President's clear message was more numerous—Johnson reviewed peace efforts in an address from the steps of Iolani Palace, seat of the Hawaiian government. The efforts focus at this stage on finding a mutually acceptable preliminary meeting site.

Declaring "precious time is being lost," Johnson said: "For us, this is not a propaganda exercise. We have sent serious and considered messages to Hanoi and we want the earliest possible contact."

"What is needed today is an equally serious reply, reacting to our proposals for negotiations or offering additional suggestions of neutral capabilities where both of us have representatives and communication channels."

Several hours after Johnson spoke the official North Vietnamese Communist newspaper announced that Hanoi would send 124 negotiators to Hanoi. The negotiators showed "lack of good will" in turning down two sites Hanoi has proposed, Warsaw and Phoenix Park, Cambodia.

A Nhan Dan article broadcast from Hanoi flung back in the President's face his offer in the past to send 124 negotiators anywhere at any time for talks.

"This statement is big-sounding and allows no misunderstanding," the article said.

"Yet, after making many such statements the Johnson Administration now changes tune."

While here, Johnson said he would like to see the terms of the twin paths to peace with the military command and the Communist newspaper on Wednesday, with President Khan Dan said the United States showed "lack of good will" in turning down two sites Hanoi has proposed, Warsaw and Phoenix Park, Cambodia.

Park was flying in from Seoul tonight.

Johnson is expected to remain in Hawaii until Thursday. He is scheduled to leave for the city at the seaside estate of the widow of the late millionaire industrialist Henry J. Kaiser.

## Blast Set

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — The biggest nuclear blast ever to be set off in the United States is scheduled for Wednesday morning under the Nevada Desert, the Atomic Energy Commission announced today.

The AEC said the explosion is expected to be felt up to 250 miles away at 5 a.m. PST.

The test is described as a low megaton yield, which means it has the strength of one megaton (one million tons) of TNT or more.

The AEC said no other test underground or above ground has had this much impact in the United States.

## Union Chief Says Phone Workers Strike Inevitable

WASHINGTON (AP) — Only a miracle can avert a nationwide strike of some 200,000 telephone workers next Thursday, says President Joseph A. Beirne of the AFL-CIO Communications Workers of America.

After a seven-hour meeting with the union's executive board Monday, Beirne said: "The strike is inevitable at this point and that position must be held hard and unflinchingly for the substantial general (wage) increase that our members both need and deserve."

Some 8,000 members of another union, the AFL-CIO International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, are already on strike against the New Jersey Bell Telephone Co. and 14,000 members of Bell's union are respecting the picket lines and refusing to work.

The New Jersey telephone company said supervisory personnel stayed on the job and there was no interruption of service to its 2.2 million customers when the strike began Monday.

Beirne predicted that a strike by his members would also have little immediate impact on most customers, except for long distance calls in Texas and California, and for long distance calls in Nebraska and Kansas.

## Downtown T.F. Improvement Dream Nears Reality

Federal financing for a massive downtown Twin Falls improvement project may not be final yet, but indications Tuesday after a meeting of downtown merchants were that things are rosy indeed.

Eliten of the city's leading businessmen met Tuesday afternoon to discuss the improvement project. The meeting was held at the Rogerson Hotel and was presided over by Fred Dodds, a downtown shop-

ping mall, featuring plenty of trees, were presented by Ed Peterson of the Jones-Fehlbach Associates, architects, and an economic projection of the undertaking was presented by Jerry Kaiser of Larry Smith and Associates, Inc., architects.

Mr. Kaiser's firm helped make Twin Falls' comprehensive plan and he presided over the improvement project for downtown improvement will work.

William Grange, of Cable Vision, said the city council is "receptive to the idea of downtown im-

provement," and added that he believes the government will approve and announce approval of the \$31 million in funds to start the project rolling.

The city's Urban Renewal Agency made application for the funds recently and is now in the process of applying for \$500,000 to see the project through.

The Local Area Development LID is anticipated for the downtown area to raise \$300,000.

The three blocks of funds will be used to transform downtown Twin Falls, a six-block core area, into a huge shopping mall

with plenty of parking and easy access to stores.

It is anticipated there will be a small amount of traffic allowed on Main Avenue, and one-way traffic on Second Avenues North and East and South and West. Second Street, between Second Main Avenue and Second Avenue will be closed to traffic.

Modern restaurants and stores are planned in individual stores and the rear of the stores will be nearly as attractive as the front.

Utility cables and water systems will be underground and the trees will be of varied species.

Where the Perrine Hotel is on a high rise building is planned. Members present at the meeting asked and it would be "14 stories with a beacon roof on top. Rear section, however, the building will be five stories. There are also two townhomes planned for Main Avenue.

Mr. Kaiser said his firm has been working on an economic projection of the project and anticipates that the total price-

of the project is \$31 million. The project is expected to be completed by the end of 1970.



In far too many cases a youthful offender is sent to prison, and later released to pursue a course of crime. Prison quite often molds the young man into what he becomes. If these young men can be salvaged—then rehabilitation has done its job and society has benefited.

The benefits can be felt in the pocketbook. For each man that fails to return to prison, the taxpayer is saved an estimated \$50,000. That is including court costs the county must pay, and custodial costs the state must pay...

The Stimulant

A favorite political theme long has been that the drift of farm families to urban localities is a weakness that should be corrected by the greatest of government exertions. Many economists do not agree.

They hold that the technological revolution in agriculture, which makes it possible for fewer people to produce more food and fiber, is a prime stimulant of the economy.

# Cancer, Virus Tie Studied

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — There may be a positive link between infectious mononucleosis, widely known as the kissing disease, and a malignant tumor which is quite common in Africa but rare in the United States.

That was the report today by Dr. Julius S. Horowitz of Roswell Park Memorial Institute in Buffalo, N.Y.

If the link, a virus, is established definitely, it will be the first time that a virus has been indicted as a cause of cancer-type disease in humans.

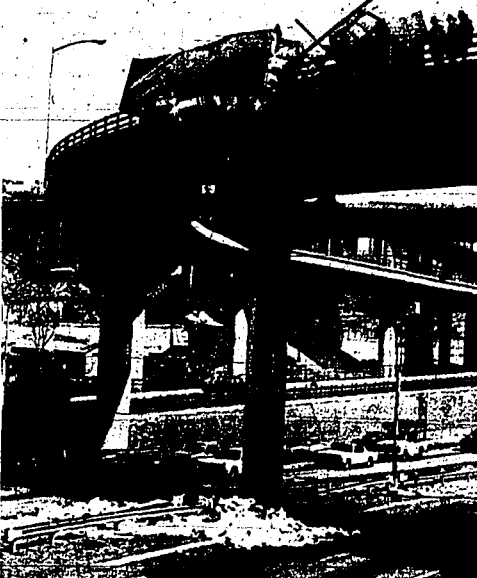
The virus has already been shown by other researchers to be associated with infectious mononucleosis, usually not a severe disease that causes fever, chills, general bad feeling, fatigue and sometimes headache and chest pain.

Researchers have shown that the virus reacts with protective antibodies from humans who have already had the kissing disease, the Roswell Park report said. The reaction is similar to that of an infecting virus would produce in a vaccinated person, indirect evidence that the virus causes infectious mononucleosis.

The New York researcher, associated with Dr. James G. Drake Jr., and Dr. Virginia C. Gunkel, gave their report to the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology, meeting here.

They found that the same virus associated with infectious mononucleosis is the one often seen under the electron microscope in tissue samples of Burkitt's lymphoma, the malignant tumor frequently seen in Africa.

The Roswell Park studies indicate that in a test tube the virus can affect certain cells in a variety of ways.

# 'Columbus Day Caper' May Make Four National Holidays 3-Day Weekends

WASHINGTON (AP) — Around the House Judiciary Committee they call it the "Columbus Day caper" and if its success, four national holidays will provide three-day weekends each year.

A bill calling for the observance of Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Veterans Day and Columbus Day on Mondays has been approved by the committee. But don't pack that weekend bag yet.

A favorite of the business community, which thinks it would make for more efficient work and production schedules and less absenteeism, and strongly backed by the travel agencies and airlines—the bill has introduced much enthusiasm among the general public.

And it has aroused surprise by strong opposition from patriotic societies and veterans organizations with an interest in a specific holiday, and church groups with an interest in Sunday church attendance.

They have expressed fears that regular three-day holidays would lure people into unproductive and fruitless endeavors on those occasions.

Such opposition pretty well killed the original Monday holiday bill before the committee last year. When the first session of Congress ended, only Memorial Day remained in a bill that would have also moved Washington's Birthday, Independence Day, Veterans Day and Thanksgiving to Monday.

It was then that Rep. Robert McClary, R-Ill., chief sponsor of the bill, discovered Christopher Columbus.

For years Americans of Italian descent have cherished the idea of a national holiday commemorating Columbus' 400th anniversary. McClary, D-N.J., a senior Judiciary Committee member, has introduced bills establishing such a holiday. Many states observe Oct. 12 as Columbus Day but the bills for a national holiday never got anywhere. They served mostly to stir counter-campaigns by Americans of Scandinavian ancestry.

Rather than try to legislate history and reluctant to impose two new holidays on the nation, Chairman Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., kept the Columbus Day bill bottled up.

# Brooke Will Introduce Legislation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legislation will be introduced in the Senate this week aimed at the start on enactment of White House riot commission's recommendations that would cost an estimated \$30 billion over a decade.

Sen. Edward W. Brooke, R-Mass., committee member, plans to introduce bills Wednesday to make a limited, low-cost study of federal riot commissions, including a congressional study of a plan for a guaranteed annual income.

He also will propose federal incentives to eliminate racial imbalance in schools and the effect of federal housing restrictions that "decline to abolish such imbalance.

Other Brooke proposals will include:

- A change in distribution of federal education funds to redirect \$1.2 billion exclusively toward low-income school districts.
- A congressional study of the welfare system to "hopefully prepare the Congress for a thorough and impartial reconstruction of our presently inadequate public assistance programs."
- Extension of antidiscrimination provisions in employment to all federal, state and local government agencies.
- Relaxation in qualifications for Small Business Administration loans in slum areas.

Brooke did not estimate the cost of his proposals but aides said it would run to thousands, rather than millions of dollars. They said he avoided introducing more costly measures because of congressional resistance to new spending programs.

Instead, Brooke hopes for several small victories to put Congress on record in favor of eventual massive urban reconstruction, the aides said.

# Space Linkup To Provide Big Step

WASHINGTON (AP)—West-ern space experts believe the technique was proved in the Gemini program. The paths of the Russian satellites with technical knowledge to link up move forward with two pro-grams to send men to the moon and to build a manned space station for military purposes.

The next step, expected soon, is to launch a satellite which should be used for launching manned ships—a feat ac-complished by America's Gemini astronauts as early as March 1966.

The Soviets have said their first man-to-the-moon plan involves flight last April was to have been the first Soviet space link-up. But the plan was upset when the spacecraft developed control and parachute problems that killed the cosmonaut pilot, Vladimir M. Komarov.

While the Soyuz ship was being redesigned, the Soviets re-visited the unmanned Cosmos 166 and 185 flights last October to gain their initial docking experi-ence. They duplicated the exer-cise Monday with Cosmos 212 and 213.

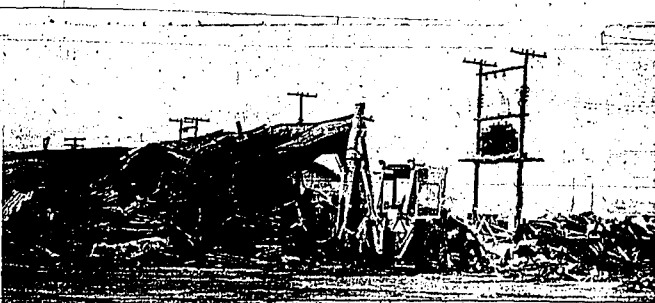
The repeat may have been necessary because of problems which cropped up on the Octo-ber test. American specialists said the Russian radar on the main satellite (185) lacked the long-range precision of that on the Gemini craft.

They noted that Cosmos 185 originally intended for the dock- ing, was too far off course, nec-essitating the launching of 183. The latter achieved an orbit just 15 miles behind its space part-ner.

The Russians said Monday the flight involved "refinement of new systems," which could in-clude improved radar.

Gemini pilots, who achieved a more than a dozen dockings in four flights, often started out several hundred miles behind their Agena target satellites and in different orbits, using sophis-ticated radar systems to pursue their prey.

## IRS Is Still Relying On Its Tipsters

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite its complex tax computer, the Internal Revenue Service still relies on tipsters to catch some of America's tax cheats.

But the number of rewards for supplying usable information is on the wane.

Now, last Monday's income tax deadline is past. IRS officials expect a flood of mail claiming that one person or another cheated on his tax return.

Officials said they receive about 100,000 tips each year from persons looking for rewards, seeking revenge, disgruntled with their employer, or simply patriotic.

The number who actually collect a reward is relatively small — 624 for the last complete fiscal year — and is expected to get smaller. Two years before, 792 persons got rewards.

Officials said the computer system now in complete operation can uncover omissions and omissions on tax returns before the filer can see them.

IRS doesn't broadcast the fact it sometimes uses information supplied by tipsters to catch tax cheats but officials said it's a small part of the law enforcement program.

Total tax collections last year total \$248 billion, IRS officials said, and only \$11 million stemmed from information supplied by informants.

During the fiscal year which ended last June 30, the service received 409 claims for rewards from tipsters, rejected 3,395 of them and allowed the balance of 324.

The reward can go as high as 10 percent of the amount collected by IRS but it usually averages between 4 and 6 percent. And rewards are paid out only after IRS determines the information helped materialize to recover additional tax.
