## 2 County Highway Districts Get Bridges For Cost Of One

Two highway districts in Twin Falls County have new canal bridges almost for the price of one, and at a saving to taxpayers of both districts.

Directors of the Twin Falls Highway District decided to replace an old single lane steel bridge across the low line canal just southeast of Twin Falls and found it would cost \$225 to remove the old structure.

Instead, they gave to the Murtaugh Highway District for

purchase, moved and installed for a total of \$4,000. It was moved intact, on a flatbed truck, from the Twin Falls Highway District just southeast of Twin Falls at a saving to taxpayers of both districts.

## U.S. Defends 5 Military Attaches

MOSCOW (AP) — The U.S. Embassy says five military attaches who got in trouble with Soviet authorities were engaged in activities they are perfecting by normal and accepted on the part of military attaches of the world over, including those of the Soviet Union in America.

The five Americans and a Canadian military attaché were accused of carrying the open files, papers, maps, tools and other items into the country and were arrested in two incidents last week at a Leningrad shipyard and military base in White Russia.

The U.S. Embassy said the incidents were "staged" and the immunity of the five Americans had been violated. The Canadian Embassy also rejected the Soviet charges.

There was no indication the Soviet government would expel the six men.

## Vietnam Demands U.S. Agree To Site

TOKYO (AP) — North Vietnam demanded today that the United States "agree without delay" to a Phnom Penh "peace talks and also stop all attacks on North Vietnamese territory."

The demand, in the official Communist party newspaper Nhan Dan, repeated the charge that the United States is interfering in its talk of peace efforts.

## Strike Affects Phone Company

A telephone strike hit Magic Valley Thursday, affecting those to those people placing calls little or no difference was noticed.

The strike is part of a nationwide walkout by the AFL-CIO Communications Workers of America in which 300,000 employees in 100 states are out.

In Idaho, nearly 1,800 Mountain States Telephone Co. employees were involved, and in Magic Valley an estimated 100.

Supervisory personnel have been on standby notice for a month and were prepared Thursday afternoon to take the line left by operators and repairmen.

The strike involves the Communications Workers of America against the Western Electric Co. Western Electric furnishes telephones and some repair service to Mountain States.

About 10 employees of Western Electric work in Twin Falls, but this figure varies from time to time as they are hired regular Mountain States personnel.

The nationwide strike is for higher wages.

The contract between the Communications workers and Mountain States is still good, and this is where the complex situation comes in.

Although Western Electric employees are directly involved, operators and repairmen of Mountain States are expected to honor the strike and stay away from work.

There are about 90 operators in Twin Falls, and 30 supervisory personnel who can back them up.

## American B52s Stage War's Heaviest 24-Hour Aerial Blow

American B52s hit South Vietnam's Shau Hill with more than 100 tons of bombs Wednesday and today in the war's heaviest aerial blows for a 24-hour period.

At least 90 of the eight-engine Stratofortresses streaked over the valley from bases in Thailand and Guam to bomb North Vietnam's strategic Hanoi-Ankang area and troop concentrations.

The 25-mile-long valley has become the No. 1 target for the B52 saturation bombing. Senior U.S. officers believe the North Vietnamese are delaying the Communist's major attack on Hue, 25 miles from the north.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — The release of Eric Starvo Galt has been charged with conspiracy and murder in the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

The FBI said in a fugitive warrant issued Wednesday night in Birmingham, Ala., that Galt, 35, conspired with "whom he alleged to be his brother" to violate King's civil rights.

Tennessee carried the death penalty, although the star chair has not been used in the state since 1920.

# Atomic Food Unit To Be Shown

Buhl — A week-long demonstration of a portable cesium irradiator created by Isotopes, Inc. of Westwood, N. J., will be held at the Snake River Trout Farm next week.

The unit, which preserves food by radiation, is being brought to Magic Valley under the sponsorship of the Idaho Nuclear Energy Commission in cooperation with the Atomic Energy Commission.

Ray Rostron, manager of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, is acting as coordinator for the events planned.

Anyone interested in viewing the unit in operation, is encouraged to go to the Snake River Trout Farm near Buhl. The unit will arrive on Monday and be in operation through Saturday.

The radiation process of food preservation with the irradiator is accomplished by ionization and sterilization. Pasteurization in this way retards the growth of bacteria and microorganisms, which delays spoilage. The sterilization by radiation kills bacteria and other microorganisms. The preservation of food indefinitely without refrigeration. The sterilization process is used principally for meats.

The stop at Buhl is the only one that will be made in Idaho. The unit is coming here from Oregon where demonstrations have been held.

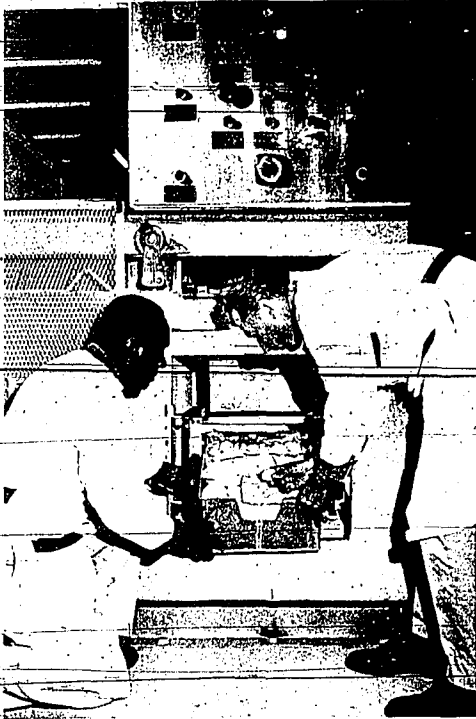

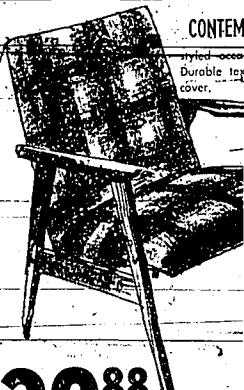

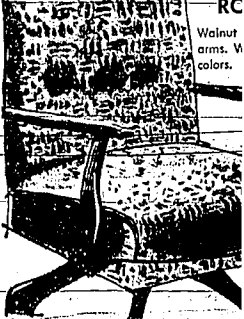

The new issue will be combined with the old issue so that the total annual mill levy for the 20-year period bonds and the outstanding bonds will be about 9.5 mills or an average three mill increase over the present levy for bond retirement.

For property assessed at \$3,000, having a market value of about \$15,000, the additional three-mill

levy would cost about \$9 more annually than is now being paid. Two-thirds majority is needed to approve the proposed bond issue.

In the last bond election in October, 1967, there were 53.24 per cent for and 46.66 per cent against out of 4,395 total votes cast. The three pollster places in Burley and one at Malheur cast a majority vote in favor of the bond issue while the other two places cast a majority of no votes.

Twelve-year-olds must be 21 years of age or older, must have actually resided in Idaho for six months and be a bona fide resident of the school district for more than 30 days and must be a taxpayer or wife or husband of a taxpayer.

Voting will be held at Alhion Elementary School, Almo Elementary School, Burley High School, Burley Junior High School, Southwauk Elementary School, Declo High School, Raft River High School, and the school district of Oakley High School gymnasium and Bean Growers Warehouse, Milner.

6 Children Perish In Georgia Fire

RABUN GAP, Ga. (AP) — Six children in this small North Georgia community perished when fire destroyed their two-story house Wednesday night, despite frantic efforts of their mother to rescue them.

Mrs. Billy Darnell, the mother, and a 16-year-old son, Hubert, escaped.

Mrs. Darnell awakened the children who were sleeping upstairs, and then went to call volunteer firemen at nearby Clayton.

She was making the call, the flames spread from an area around the chimney to a nearby staircase, blocking it as a fire for children, a relative reported.

The 16-year-old boy escaped by leaping down the staircase. The dead children were identified as Sue, 18; Lester, 15; Gladys, 13; Rose Ann, 11; Dale, 10; and Kay, 8.

A sister-in-law of Mrs. Darnell, Mrs. Keith Darnell of Atlanta, said the father was away at his job at the time of the fire.

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# Universe Is Said Doomed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Navy researchers report they've obtained evidence the universe is a closed system, and therefore inexorably doomed to fiery destruction some 10 billion years from now.

They said the new findings— gleaned from the flight of an Aerobee rocket—support the view a closed system whose expansion will gradually slow to a stop, with catastrophic results.

Richard C. Henry, the Naval Research Laboratory, who reported the findings Wednesday, said a team of five-man research team, said the rocket-based evidence indicates strongly that the universe is doomed.

He said such a system would "fall inward until all the galaxies are crushed together in a fiery ball of matter and radiation."

Henry, 28, a research fellow supported by the National Science Foundation, reported to a special symposium marking the 25th anniversary of the National Bureau of Space Research. He amplified in an interview.

The Aerobee rocket, in a 100-mile-high flight above the White Sands, N.M., missile range last September, detected and measured certain cosmic rays coming from galaxies beyond the Milky Way.

Observations indicated there may be 100 times as much matter dispersed in the vast reaches of space between galaxies as in all the mass of all the galaxies combined.

Henry explained that a closed universe is "vastly greater than that of an open or ever-expanding universe."

These observations of the Aerobee, he said, "indicate that there's enough matter in the universe to produce the complete curvature required for a closed universe."

### 363 U.S. Men Die In War In Last Week

Saigon (AP) — The number of American killed in the Vietnam war climbed to 363 last week, the highest number in 12 weeks, the U.S. Command reported today.

An increase also was reported in the number of South Vietnamese casualties dropped from the previous week.

An increase of 5,000 also was reported in the number of U.S. military personnel in South Vietnam, which totaled 522,000 as of midnight last Saturday.

There was no official explanation for the increase in the number of American battle deaths in a week when fighting generally was described in communications as light and scattered, U.S. officers said, however, there were ten of thousands of men in the field in widespread operations.

The week before 279 Americans were killed.

American-wounded last week totaled 2,894, compared with 2,150 the previous week. Of the week's last week, 1,332 were hospitalized.

South Vietnamese headquarters reported 291 of their own soldiers were killed last week, considerably less than the 407 reported the previous week.

The headquarters said there were 855 South Vietnamese wounded last week, compared with 1,479 a week earlier, and 33 missing last week against 14 the previous week.

Both the U.S. and South Vietnamese commands reported that the total number of enemy killed by allied forces last week was 1,071. The report, however, did not say how many were killed.

The casualty report raised to 21,417 the number of U.S. military personnel killed in action in Vietnam since the start of the war, and last Saturday and the total number of wounded reported to 133,752. Of the 133,752 wounded, the U.S. Command said 70,042 required hospitalization.

Dist. Judge Fred Taylor reportedly sentenced Robinson to the federal prison at Springfield, Mo., which contains a psychiatric center.

Taylor recommended Robinson receive "all the psychiatric and medical help deemed necessary."

Robinson's attorney had said the man had a long history of mental problems.

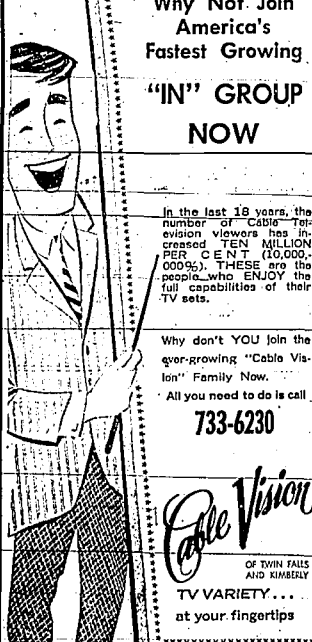
# Koreans Got Classified Documents

The music of Mozart is always a test of musicianship, a test which was passed very well indeed by the gentlemen of the quartet. In fact, all of their work showed great sensitivity for ensemble which of course is one of the first requisites in a fine chamber group. Each of the players in the group is a musician of distinction; together they form a string ensemble which is far above the ordinary.

As an encore, they played the lively "Presto" by Boccherini. It was a fitting climax to an evening which proved to be a delightful musical experience.

# Mayor Has Clarified Police Order

CHICAGO (AP) — Mayor Richard J. Daley has clarified his order that police shoot arsonists and looters on sight, but reiterated such force as is necessary be used to prevent such crimes.

Daley read a statement to the city council Wednesday which tempered the language of his order Monday in connection with arsonists and looters. He said the statement was designed to remove the impression that the mayor had called for indiscriminate shootings.

"Certainly an officer should do everything in his power to make an arrest—to prevent a crime by utilizing the minimum force necessary," Daley told the council. "But I cannot believe that any citizen would hold that policemen should permit an arsonist to carry out his dangerous, murderous mission when minimum force is necessary to prevent or deter him."

Emerging from the council meeting, Daley was asked if he was misunderstanding the "shoot on sight" order Monday. "Yes I was," Daley replied. "The law changed the position in the wake of heated controversy which followed this remark on Monday." "No," Daley replied, "it said very distinctly that all I want is for people to obey the laws."

Daley's statement to the council Wednesday was in connection with a resolution he introduced designating May 2 as Law Day, a resolution which the council adopted unanimously.

Daley evidently was replying to criticism during the April 17 disturbances that police did little to stop looters and arsonists. The mayor touched off a wave of controversy—in the city and the nation—Monday when he rebuked Police Supt. James B. Connelley for not issuing "shoot on sight" orders during the disturbances. He told a press conference at the time that policemen should "shoot to kill" arsonists and shoot to "maim or cripple" looters.

On aside to the mayor called Daley's statement Wednesday "a clarification" of his earlier order.

# Annual Meet For Sawtooth Area Is Held

The annual Rangers Conference for the Sawtooth National Forest is under way at the local Forest Service office, according to P. Max Rees, forest supervisor.

The conference, which began Thursday, will continue through Friday. Mr. Rees, who is in charge of the seminar, said that the conference is featuring an exchange of ideas aimed at providing increased services to people at a minimum cost through improved management of the resources.

Mr. Rees pointed out to the group that resources must be managed to get the maximum human benefit from the wildlands through improved multiple use as a management goal. He also stressed that land managers must coordinate the various resources and services on public land to produce the greatest good for the largest number of people possible.

The forest supervisor stated that these annual conferences have contributed significantly in the past to the improvement of management of national forest areas.

# Northwest Timber Industry Gets Boost From Restrictions Put On Log Exports

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pacific Northwest timber industry got a boost Wednesday when restrictions were placed on the export of raw logs to Japan from federal lands in Western Oregon and Western Washington.

Industry sources estimate these contracts could meet Japanese demand for unprocessed logs for the next six months to two years.

The announcement Wednesday in Portland received the immediate approval of timber industry representatives and politicians in the western parts of the two states.

The timber industry contract, which limit log exports to 300 million board feet annually, had bid up prices beyond the reach of many domestic sawmills, causing shutdowns and unemployment.

Representatives from the western parts of Oregon and Washington discussed the log export problem at Tokyo in February. No agreement was reached, although Japan indicated it would step up its importing of semi-processed lumber products.

A spokesman for the public docks said he doubted that Japan would import semi-processed lumber now that restrictions have been placed on raw logs.

Freeman said that forest areas included in the restriction would be continuously reviewed to determine their appropriateness. "We will act as swiftly as possible" if it is determined other areas of the West are affected, he said.

The restriction order now covers all Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management lands in the western parts of Washington and Oregon, and logs over 100 feet long.

Representatives of public ports, longshoremen and stevedore companies said the restriction order would severely impair trade relations with Japan. The order will also mean a considerable loss in revenue and wages at Washington and Oregon ports, they said.

The United States and Japan have discussed the log export problem several months ago that have resulted in a temporary moratorium on exports.

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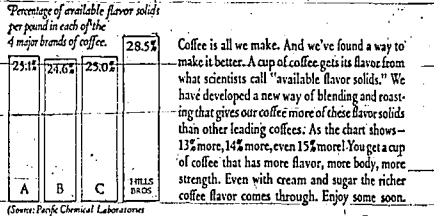

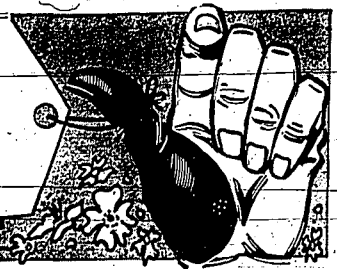

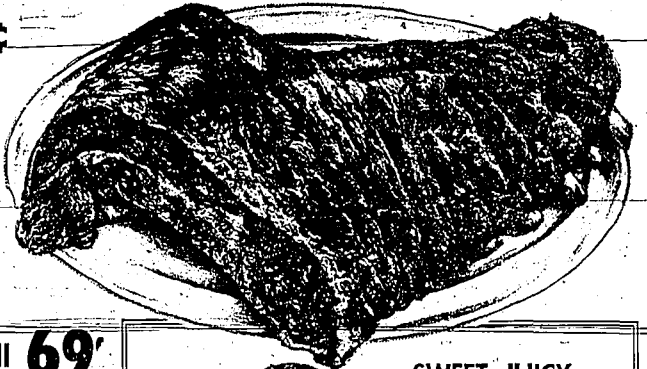

## Protest Halts Meet At El Paso

EL PASO, Tex. (AP) — A woman won one of 18 first places Wednesday night in the University of Texas-El Paso quadrangular track and field meet interrupted twice by Negro demonstrators. The meet was completed under guard of about 50 policemen.

The demonstration follows action last week in which seven Negro track and field athletes, since joined by two others, boycotted a meet at Provo, Utah. For not competing in the Provo meet against Brigham Young University and Utah State, UTPE said the nine athletes had dissociated themselves from the team and the school to reinstate the nine athletes.

Roger McKowan, sports writer for the El Paso Times, said the demonstration was in efforts to get the school to reinstate the nine athletes.

There were no arrests after Wednesday night's incident. The 400 event was scratched but the 120 high hurdles was completed. New Mexico State and Western New Mexico also competed.

# Correction Plan Blamed For Riot

RALEIGH, N. C. (AP) — Prisoners. One of eight critically injured prisoners died late Wednesday night in a hospital. Five officers were hurt, none seriously, in the confrontation Wednesday's Central Prison riot in which six prisoners were killed.

But State Correction Commissioner Lee Bounds claims no credit from his relatively new policy of collecting the worst offenders at the maximum security unit in Raleigh.

The advantage of the grouping, Bounds said, outweighs the risk.

He said that his system inmates—that the "tuff" convicts, racketeers, assassins, sexual offenders and other prisoners who have been terrifying their fellow inmates—are removed from the general population and housed in the state, allowing more rehabilitation in those units.

Bounds' department has been criticized early Wednesday when guards fired shotguns into a crowd of more than 400 rioting

# Mothers May Be Protected From Measles

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — A scientist says mothers of child bearing age may be able to get protection within a year against the birth defects of German measles. The next epidemic of the disease is due about 1970.

That was a report on a new live virus vaccine against German measles given today by Dr. Maurice C. Hillman at the Merck Institute for Therapeutic Research at West Point, Pa.

Hillman said large-scale tests are already under way in the United States and that by the end of the year up to 20,000 children in five different areas would receive this experimental vaccine. Tests of other vaccines will cover another 20,000 children.

The virologist said the vaccine successfully passed pilot tests with mothers and children in two suburban Philadelphia communities.

Hillman couldn't say how many people would have to be given the vaccine before the Federal Food and Drug Administration ruled on its safety and effectiveness.

In the case of ordinary measles-vaccine, 10,000 were tested, and in mumps only 2,000.

At least three other vaccines using different strains of the virus are undergoing tests in the United States and abroad. The manufacturers also hope to get them on the market within the year.

German measles is a relatively mild disease that strikes mostly children and young adults. Until recently, there seemed to be no need to prevent it but now doctors have proven that it causes serious congenital defects in children whose mothers were infected in the first trimester of pregnancy.

World wide epidemics of the disease normally occur every six years. During the last epidemic in 1964-65, 29,000 deaths within the womb were reported and 20,000 birth defects.

Hillman, in reporting his findings at the annual meeting of the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology, said the pilot study involved 527 children and their mothers in Havertown and Broomall, Pa.

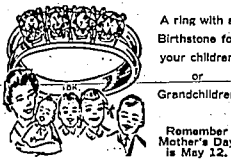

# Women Note Importance Of Clinic

HAILLEY — Women of the Wood River Valley are putting off their spring housecleaning, laying aside their seed catalogs and postponing purchases of bedding plants. Even their bridge clubs are being neglected.

And what, you ask, could revolutionize the march of the seasons like this? The answer is a fund-raising project in support of the Wood River Mental Health Clinic.

The unique idea behind this project is that of the "vanishing tea," and the idea has caught on with a fervor hoped for by those who recognize the importance and need of such clinics.
