"There is absolutely no doubt in my mind that the Communications Workers will have an overwhelming win, and, in the long run, it will be to the benefit of the nation," he said.

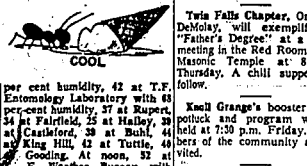

About Those Hitchhikers

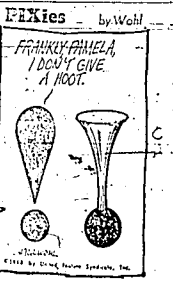

Old Home Burned, Memories Remain

A house was hurled to the ground Tuesday.

Up until about a year ago the little house at 750 Ash St. had been a home.

Mrs. Ella George lived there for many years—just how long, none of her neighbors is able to remember.

A year ago Mrs. George moved into one of the retirement centers, with little chance that she would ever again move back to her own home.

The frame house, at best, was in a terrible state of repair and was an eyesore in an otherwise neat and orderly neighborhood.

The neighbors complained about the mess—and no one could blame them. No matter how neat and tidy their homes were kept, the eyes of passers-by naturally wandered to the little house in the corner lot.

The house and the piles of wooden boxes and other debris in the back yard did not improve with age.

The porch sagged a little, but more all the time. The boxes became broken and stuffing fell out of the junk furniture piled up in the back yard.

It's always said when a house burns—but somehow it's even sadder when it is intentionally touched off into flames.

The Twin Falls Fire Department burned the house Tuesday.

Permission was given the firemen to clear the "eyesore" from the landscape—and many of Mrs. George's former neighbors came to watch and recall the house at 750 Ash St.

Undoubtedly they were glad to see the house go—it contributed little to the neighborhood. But this wasn't what the neighbors talked about.

They talked about the lady who had lived there, how they were afraid tramps would set up residence in the house, and how it was "lucky the house hadn't burned down a long time ago."

There was nothing salvageable in the house. Every remnant of Mrs. George's personality had been removed from the house—except for two cardboard boxes of food.

From the appearance of the groceries, Mrs. George had been an "old-fashioned" lady. There were no packaged mixes, but lots of spices, baking powder, baking soda and other odds and ends which looked as if Mrs. George cooked from scratch.

"A fitting memorial to Mrs. George's 'old-fashioned' general store," said a neighbor, "is the fact that she carried a sun-bleached American flag among the unbleached linens."

The old man picked the flag up, carefully dusted it off and placed it in his back pocket.

The Twin Falls Fire Department regularly burns down buildings on request. They do this as a public service and are able to gain valuable training in the process.

While such evasive eradications are burned, to make room for a natural process in an old city, one can't help but be impressed by the fact that, as Mrs. George's house was burned, more items were taken to the youth center.

McGraw-Hill Won't Publish Biography

NEW YORK (AP) — McGraw-Hill has dropped its plans to publish a critical biography of Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, but has denied it was because of pressure from Washington.

"We didn't publish it because we didn't think it was a very good book. The manuscript was a very disappointing," said Dan Lacy, senior vice president of McGraw-Hill.

"There was no pressure from anyone," he added. "I doubt if anyone in the administration at West Virginia University and even knew about the book."

McGraw-Hill had advertised the book, but Lacy said it wasn't unusual to withdraw a book after advertising it in advance.

The book's coauthor, Robert Sherrill, Washington correspondent for The Nation, contended that the book was dropped because McGraw-Hill had received a phone call from Washington describing him as a "dangerous character."

The other author is Harry Ernest, director of publications at West Virginia University and former Washington correspondent of the Charleston (W.Va.) Gazette.

The book will be published by Richard Grossman, who also published two earlier books by Sherrill, including a critical account of President Johnson's career.

A spokesman for Humphrey said the vice president was aware that Sherrill and Ernest were writing a book about him, but had no further comment.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey is trying in his still-unnounced bid for the Democratic presidential nomination to forge on a national scale the kind of farm-labor coalition he helped create in Minnesota.

To the surprise of no one Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman came out for Humphrey Tuesday. He said he had told President Johnson in advance of his intentions and added that he thinks Johnson is going to remain neutral.

Humphrey, who has made it clear he will run on the administration's record, already has the backing of AFL-CIO President George Meany.

Humphrey and Freeman are a political protégé of the vice president — and Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, a candidate for the presidential nomination, all worked together to build the Democratic-Farmer-Labor Party of Minnesota out of the wreckage of what had been the regular Democratic organization.

Negroes' Attitudes Surveyed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army has prevented publication of results of a 250,000 survey aimed at determining the attitudes of young Negroes toward military service and the National Guard.

National Guard officials, who commissioned the nationwide survey last year after criticism that the Guard had too few Negroes in its ranks, were ready to release its findings more than a week ago.

But Army authorities ordered them not to do so and directed that the report be "stamped" for official use only.

Sources said certain top Army civilian officials apparently felt that releasing the survey as it might seem to point the finger at Negroes, since whites were not questioned in the survey.

Other sources said the survey turned up no appreciable Negro animosity against the Guard, but indicated a lack of awareness of it.

Asked for a copy of the report or a summary of its findings, the Army said: "The Army staff presently is studying a paper prepared by the National Guard Bureau with the assistance of a non-government research organization addressing public attitudes toward military service and the Guard."

"The paper is for official use only and not releasable to the public at this time because it is an internal communication."

The National Guard was strongly criticized on the question of Negro participation in both the President's Advisory Commission on Civil Disorders and Cyrus R. Vance, who reported President Johnson in Detroit during the riot there last summer.

Both urged immediate steps to increase recruitment of Negroes.

There are some indications that the Army is studying the possibility of making public statements aimed at showing why just Negroes and not whites, also, were surveyed.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Henry Ford and David Rockefeller oppose leading a "White March" on Washington.

NEW YORK (AP) — Industrialist Henry Ford and financier David Rockefeller disagree with civil rights leader Whitney Young Jr. that they should lead a "white march" on Washington to prove white America's commitment to racial equality.

Both said Tuesday they believed their efforts to win more jobs for Negroes, among other activities, would be more effective than organizing such a march.

Young, executive director of the National Urban League, suggested the white march earlier. Tuesday at the annual meeting of the American Newspaper Publishers Association.

He said such a march of hundreds of thousands of whites, held by men like Ford, Rockefeller and labor leader George Meany may be the best way for the nation to avoid a "race riot."

Rockefeller said he wondered "whether business cannot contribute more effectively to the solution of racial discrimination and other urban problems through organizations such as the Urban League and the Urban Coalition rather than through participation in public demonstrations."

"It seems to me that the wisest course would be for the business community to accelerate its growing effort to provide training and jobs for minorities and lend even greater support in dealing with education, housing and welfare."

Ford said: "I am interested in his ideas and I have great respect for his judgment but I am not convinced that marching on Washington is the best way for me to make an effective contribution to the lessening of racial tensions."

"I feel I can better serve the cause for which Mr. Young has fought so vigorously by concentrating on the task of finding jobs for the hard-core unemployed. This is the job the President asked me to do and it is in this area that I will be spending my energies."

Meany's office in Washington said he had no comment.

Inflation Battle Is Growing

By JOSEPH R. COYNE

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government is battling inflation with the one weapon it most wanted to avoid—tight money.

But there are increasing signs in Congress that two big guns—a tax hike and cuts in federal spending—may soon be added to the arsenal of weapons against rising prices.

Some government officials are convinced Congress is now in a mood to act on taxes although the details—including the spending cuts on which congressmen have insisted—still must be worked out.

It's doubtful, however, that Uncle Sam will begin collecting higher taxes from individual Americans—even if Congress finally approves before July 1. After this month, Johnson wanted to take effect.

In proposing the 10 per cent income tax surcharge last Aug. 3, Johnson indicated a desire to avoid a recurrence of the tight money policies which marked 1966 and sent interest rates to what then were record highs.

BOISE (AP) — Facts, figures and uses for its water are Idaho's only weapons against other areas which want to import Idaho water, the Idaho Water Resource Board chairman said Tuesday.

He also said he believed Idaho should receive cash payments from any development of the proposed High Mountain Sheep Dam on the Snake River. Other Idaho benefits might include access roads to the dam's reservoir, he said.

An application to build the High Mountain Sheep Dam between Idaho and Oregon is now pending before the Federal Power Commission. The water board intervened in Idaho's behalf.

BIDDING SHOWS CARD LOCATION

In the bridge-orama match between New York and Montreal that preceded this year's Spring Nationals, Sam Gold of Montreal had a chance to distinguish himself.

The cards are? Commentator No. 4 said, "They are well-codged from the bidding. It will make it."

Sam did make the hand. He did play it as the hand seen all the cards. Can you figure out his play with the cards in view?

Sam won the ace of spades and led a low diamond. East was in with ace and made the best return of the spade Jack. Sam rose with the queen. Led his nine of diamonds and let it ride. Then he led the 10 of diamonds to dummy's king and made the key play of cashing dummy's ace of hearts. Next came a club back to the king, followed by a spade play. East cashed three spade tricks but had conceded the last two tricks to dummy's ace and jack of club.

Sam could also have ducked the jack of spades and made his contract. We will leave it to you to work that play out.

We will also leave it to you to figure out if Sam would have been able to make the hand if West had not stuck in his futile two-club call.

Q—The bidding has been: West North East South 1♠ Pass 1♠ Pass 2♠ 2NT 2NT. What do you do?

A—Redouble. You have the balance of power with your 10 high card points.

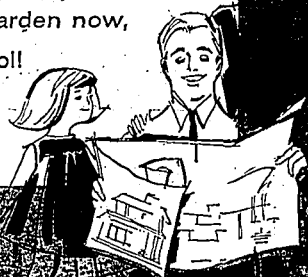
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Household Aid Can Renew Furniture's Complexion

Only antique furniture is granted the privilege of looking its age . . . and it has to be a hundred years old or better to qualify. So if any of your furniture, particularly that of recent vintage, is getting to look antiquity . . . it's time to restore its youth.

Tables, most vulnerable to wear and tear, seem to age the fastest. Usually finished, as is most wood furniture, with varnish lacquer, or sometimes shellac and rubbed to a high polish, they're prone to scratches, alcohol stains, heat marks and bloom (a gray discoloration), or the affliction may be nothing more serious than a build-up of old furniture wax that has turned dark and spotty.

Upholstered chairs come second in terms of aging. Here you have a different set of problems. Tops, where chairs are grasped to be pulled away from the table, discolor. Legs and rungs get scuffed, particularly when there are youngsters in the house who like to either swing their feet as they sit so that heels hit the rungs or wrap their feet round the legs.

Now while professional restoring is costly, the do-it-your-

self variety calls for little more than an expenditure of your time. It's time you won't be grudge when the job is done and you see the results and count your savings.

The most tedious and time-consuming part of the operation is removing the old finish. While most amateurs associate this step with special hardware store-bought products, the professional restorers who work on fine old pieces prefer the common household cleaner, sal soda concentrated, which you find in the laundry supply section of your local grocery store.

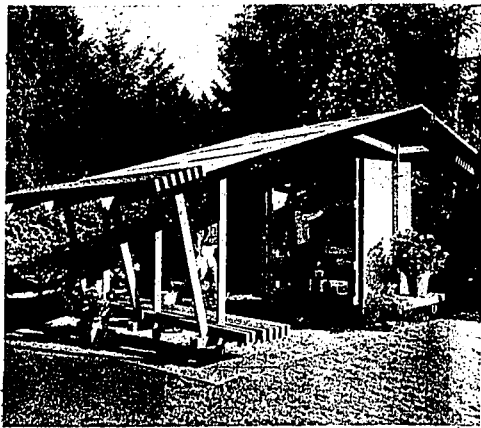
This offers some distinct advantages to the do-it-yourselfer. Since it's odorless you don't have to work outdoors or in large airy, probably chilly quarters as a precaution against toxic fumes. It's far less hard on your hands and costs a fraction of what the special products do.

The strength of the solution you'll need . . . you simply pour sal into hot water. It is determined by the malady. For a simple case of wax build-up three tablespoons of the sal to the quart of water sponged over the surface, rinsed with fresh water and wiped dry is the prescribed cure. For varnish, lacquer or shellac, use a cup of the sal to the quart of water and apply the solution to a small area at a time with medium steel-wool. Rinse, wipe dry.

Run over the surface with fine sandpaper. Wrap the sandpaper around a block of hard, dry cellulose sponge for chairs. The sponge has just enough give to let sandpaper dig into the rounded and fluted areas. Work on chairs on a newspaper-covered table to eliminate back-bending. Since you'll be in a comfortable position, you'll do a better job.

As for the best type of finish to use, consult your hardware dealer from whom you buy it. Just be sure the wood is completely dry before you apply it.

To get the smoothest possible finish with a spray paint the home handyman should avoid holding the spray can too close to the work surface. Hold it at least eight inches away and keep it moving steadily. It should be remembered that two light coats will always cover better than one heavy one. In addition, there will be much less likelihood of dripping or running because too much was applied.

Perseverance Pays Off On Pests

Science is helping gardeners more each year in their battle against the bugs, beetles and botanical bandits.

Mites are a perennial problem. They threaten shrubs, trees and a wide variety of vegetables and flowers. Mites are tiny, blackish or reddish, almost invisible pests that damage plants by sucking juices from leaves and tender shoots. Jot, dry weather encourages mites.

Malathion is effective. We prefer a combination spray material that includes various chemicals to control insects, mites and a broad range of destructive pests. Spectracide, which includes Dioxin, is useful for control of many pests.

Large bugs, bagworms, juniper scale and euonymus scale are particularly troublesome in summer. They feed on leaves and cause discoloration and unsightly damage. DDT or malathion knock out scales and bugs. Juniper and euonymus scales. Sewin insecticide is good against bagworms.

Trips are tiny dark brown insects that damage many plants, including roses. Buds remain closed or are distorted. Use a mixture of DDT and malathion.

Small pinhead holes in vegetables are often caused by flea beetles. If abundant, they can damage most of the leaf surface on plants, retarding growth and reducing yields. Spray or dust with malathion, methoxychlor or Sewin insecticide, a broad-range combination pesticide.


Periodic application may be necessary to keep insects under control.

Borers can be sure death to valuable trees unless controlled. Various borers attack dogwoods, hickories, birches, oaks and many other trees.

A spray of DDT can be painted on tree trunks. More simply, you can spray with the insecticides labeled for borer control, depending on the problems you have.

Indoor Garden

A must for summer decorating is an Indoor potted plant garden. Use cool-loving, clay-pot green plants of different heights and shapes to form a simple grouping in living, dining or family room.



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First Aid Outlined For Green Thumbers

With warm weather comes the opportunity to recover the old and start an inactive winter. For many it means the excitement of planning a new garden; the urge to get out and dig in the soil to plant the selections found in the many flower and seed catalogs.

The growing season also brings with it the common outdoor hazards of poison ivy, windburn, sunburn, insect bites, blisters and cuts. In addition, skinned knuckles, puncture wounds and other gardening misfortunes. In many cases just the simple use of garden gloves and other protective clothing will be of great benefit in safeguarding against these perils, and make it a lot easier to enjoy your green thumb activities.

Garden gloves offer excellent protection for hands and wrists against many garden hazards, but for those misfortunes that cannot be prevented, it is always best to be prepared and know what to do when they occur. Following are accepted procedures for handling the most common gardening hazards.

CUTS AND SCRAPES. If you suffer from skinned knuckles, scraped knees or minor cuts, wash the wound thoroughly with soap and water, then cover it with an adhesive bandage. A good antiseptic also helps, any serious cut or abrasion should be treated by a doctor.

SUNBURN. The most common spring and summertime discomfort is sunburn. For most people the risk of sunburn can be easily avoided. With the use of modern protective lotions, coupled with limited exposure, severe sunburn can be prevented. When sunburns are overlooked, and painful sunburn results; wash gently with soap and water, and apply a mild ointment.

SUNSTROKE AND HEAT EXHAUSTION. There is a marked difference between these conditions. Heat exhaustion is the milder of the two, but a physician should be called in either case. Both are brought on by excessive exposure to heat and sun, plus overexertion. Common sense, and working in moderation, will let you condition your body for longer work periods.

POISON IVY. Most gardeners can identify poison ivy plants and thus avoid physical contact. But this is not always enough to avoid affliction. The sap can be carried by other people, clothing, household pets, even the smoke or vapor of a brush fire.

However, when working around poison ivy, garden gloves and long-sleeved clothing are a necessity for proper protection.

If you suspect that you have touched poison ivy, wash immediately with strong laundry soap. Wash and rinse the exposed skin repeatedly five or six times. Using this precaution you may be able to wash away the plant's oily sap before it penetrates the skin. If not, call your doctor to suggest a remedy.

INSECT BITES. Common symptoms of insect bites are swelling and itching. This can be minimized with the use of cold compresses for the swelling and calamine lotion for the itching. The use of a good insect

repellent spray, used in the area in which you plan to work, will help to minimize the number of insects.

FERTILIZERS, HERBICIDES, ETC. Materials such as these should only be handled with the protection of gloves. Some liquid materials are especially harmful and one should always wear liquid-proof gloves when handling them. The new ambidextrous gloves are excellent for this purpose. By disposing of the gloves, there's no chance of carrying the hazard into the home.

PUNCTURE WOUNDS. Tetanus can be a serious complication resulting from a puncture or laceration from rusty nails, dirty tools, bits of broken glass, etc. For such wounds, see your doctor without delay.

Observance of the above procedures, along with the use of proper clothing and a garden gloves, should make your spring gardening projects more enjoyable.

Put Garage In Shape With Ingenuity

Probably every city in the nation is sprinkled liberally with residential garages which were, when the nation began its transition from horse-and-buggy transportation to the automobile. And many of them are gabled frame structures which are bowed in the ridge and bulged at the sides with fatigue.

It's not difficult or expensive to pull these old-timers back in shape using a little ingenuity. One man solved the problem simply with a hand-operated winch and a few sheets of one-half-inch plywood sheathing.

First, he released the collar beams that tie opposite rafters together and used the hand-

winch to pull the walls together until they were straight. Then he replaced the collar beams.

Faced with an old and curling composition shingle roof, the remodeler decided it would be too much work and expense to remove the shingles. He simply applied the four by eight-foot plywood panels over the shingles.

The plywood sheathing prevents the walls from bowing out and the roof from sagging again. It provides a fire surface for the new roof of cedar shingles, and acts as a strong structural diaphragm to resist the effects of high winds or earthquakes.

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Fence Adds Protection And Privacy

Protection and privacy, two basic reasons for building a fence, now are often joined by a third consideration—beauty.

Traditional types of fencing such as steel chain links continue to serve their purpose of enclosing and protecting a property, but they add another dimension when they're planned as a backdrop for roses or other bushes and vines.

Lumber, one of the earliest fence materials, goes contemporary in attractive designs—louvered, wood "bricks," parquet, baskets, baskets and lattice-work patterns.

Man-made materials such as fiber-glass-plastic create unusual patterns in combination with wood framing. Panels of fiber-glass-plastic—provides—plastic—without cutting off light, thus serving many special needs.

Hardboard panels, used as fences, can match or contrast with the siding of the home, and can be painted for decorative outdoor living room effects.

Steps Given For Installing Tile Floor

Installing a resilient tile floor in the home is simply a matter of following the instructions on the box. But, like sewing a dress or making a boat, there are parts of the job that require special care.

First, choose the tile carefully — type, color and design. The family will be living with it a long time.

Vinyl asbestos tile wears well, comes in a wide variety of patterns and colors and is easy to maintain, says the Better Floors Council.

Before the floor is installed, the subsurface should be carefully checked for any unevenness. It must be free from wax, paint, oils, grime or varnishes. Floor covering dealers will be able to advise on the best underlayment for the area.

As many resilient tile designs are now available in 12-by-12-inch squares, it's easy to figure how many will be needed. The number is the same as the square footage of the room. In a 10-by-12-foot room, 120 12-by-12-inch tiles (10 per cent of the total) will be needed, for cutouts and future replacement in case of damage.

If nine-by-nine inch tiles are used, about 200 will be needed for a 10-by-20-foot room.

After the subsurface is smooth and clean, mark the center point of the room with a taut chalk line. Begin by marking the centers of the two end walls of the room, snap the string to transfer the chalk to the floor and repeat on the two side walls. Where the chalk lines meet is the center of the room.

These two chalk lines must be at an exact right angle. You can check this way: Starting from the center point where the lines meet, measure exactly four feet toward a side wall and make a mark. Do the same toward the opposite wall.

Starting from the center once more, measure three feet toward an end wall. Make a third mark. Using a long ruler or tape, lay it between the first and third marks. The distance should be exactly five feet. So should the other side.

Using the chalk lines as a guide, lay two unmeasured rows of tile perpendicular to each other, marking off one quarter of the room. Adjust the rest row so that the tile is about six inches from the wall for 12-inch tile, and four and one-half inches for nine-inch tile. This insures an even border around the room.

Remove the rows of test tile and spread the recommended adhesive over that quarter of the room, being careful not to cover the chalk line. Spread adhesive evenly and not too thick-

ly. Be sure to follow manufacturer's instructions.

Adhesive must be dry to the touch before laying tile. Starting at the center, carefully place each tile—don't slide—butting, each to the adjoining one. Continue for each quarter of the room.

When finished, check the floor carefully and remove any adhesive from the face of the tile. Use a putty knife or water and a steel wool pad. Wait a week before washing the new floor.

Siding Checks

When does a home need new siding? Here's how to check.

Examine siding for presence of moisture. This can lead to termites, rotting wood. Fungus and mildew are two signs.

Blistering, chalking and peeling of paint show need for re-painting or replacement. Cracks, splits or breaks are indications that it's time for replacement of siding.

Choice Of Sandpaper Depends On Job At Hand

No amount of paint and varnish remover will leave a wood surface ready for repainting. And no matter how smooth the finish of new wood as it comes, from the lumber yard, it still is not ready for paint or varnish.

Sanding is the necessary step you must take before finishing. Whether you hand sand or use a power sander, pick the right type of sandpaper for the job at hand. Abrasive papers are available in a wide variety, both in kinds of abrasives and in the coarseness of the grit.

New synthetics are rapidly replacing flint papers. In addition to type, there are several other choices to consider. Abrasive paper is sold as wet or dry. Wet types are used with water for quicker cutting and have a flexible, waterproof backing so that you can dip them in water for fine finishing and polishing. Oil is sometimes used for wood surfaces.

You also have a choice of closed - coat and open - coat papers. Abrasive grains packed closely together make a close-coat paper which cuts faster but clogs more quickly, especially on soft materials. Open-coat papers will not clog so quickly

and are best for machine sanding.

Flint and garnet papers are the most familiar and the cheapest per sheet. But aluminum oxide, a brownish synthetic, lasts longer, thus warranting its higher price. Since it can be used on so many different surfaces, it is best to have around. This all-purpose abrasive is available in sheets, belts and disks.

Another synthetic often used is silicon carbide, harder than aluminum oxide and ideal for floor Sanders. It also is used for such hard surfaces as glass and ceramics.

Very fine grit is used for sanding between coats of varnish or paint and for final sanding before applying a clear finish.

Fine grit paper is used for final sanding of wood before applying a Stinner or sealer. Use it for removing light rust from metal.

Medium grit paper is for heavier rust, for the first sanding of raw wood and for sanding off any scratches. Use the medium grit for removing a small amount of wood for a better fit. If much wood must be removed or deep scratches sanded, use coarse grit paper.

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CARE FOR YOUR power mower pays dividends in cutting costs. Power lawn mower blades should be sharpened or replaced once a year. A wrench is the only tool required for removing most blades.

Experts Give Tips On Care Of Power Mowers

Proof of the popularity of gardening today is the fact that there are over 20 million power lawn mowers in use, according to recent industry estimates.

Lined up hub-to-hub, that many machines could mow a swath 7,000 miles wide.

Today's mowers are ruggedly built machines that can last six or seven years with proper maintenance. However, their life can be cut in half if they do not get proper care.

Power garden equipment experts for Mobil Oil suggest that owners check their mowers each spring to insure long life and maximum efficiency. Here are their pointers.

Remove rotary mower blades

and have them sharpened and balanced. Actually, a new blade costs only a little more. Reels should only be sharpened by a specialist.

Caked, dry grass should be removed from the underside of rotary mowers particularly if the unit's exhaust is under the blade housing. The hot exhaust can ignite the dry grass and start a potentially dangerous fire.

When doing this, or any other work on a power mower, the spark plug wire should be removed to prevent accidental starting.

Oil and gas should be drained if this wasn't done when the mower was put away for the

winter. The crankcase should then be refilled with a special power mower oil. Automotive engine oils should not be used; they are formulated to lubricate engines operating at varying speeds. Power mower engines operate at relatively constant speeds and, therefore, require special oils. Outboard motor oils should be used only with two-

cycle engines.

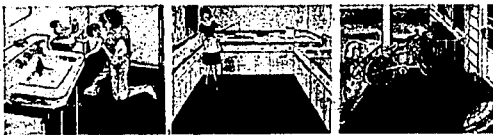
The mower should be washed down with detergent and a scrub brush and rinsed with a hose. All oil plugs and gas caps should be tightened before doing this. A few drips of mower oil should be applied to wheel bearings and any oil cups.

Mower spark plugs rarely need cleaning. If you do remove the

plug and have a unit that requires a copper washer under it, do not reuse the old washer. It will not make a proper seal. A new plug and washer is the best bet.

With these simple steps out of the way, practically any power mower can be used throughout the entire season with little or no attention.

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Protect Your Roof From Driving Spring Rains

In many sections of the country many more weeks of "winter" weather are still ahead. And heavy spring rains will surely follow. Let this be a reminder for homeowners to give their homes a thorough maintenance inspection.

Somewhat the roof generally gets neglected when it should be checked first before the severities of weather take hold. The roof is subjected to severe exposure by rain, wind, sun, and not until a storm causes one or more serious leaks is the homeowner aware of his neglect.

Responsible roofers will check a roof free of charge and give estimates for any needed repairs or replacements. Preventive maintenance can avert rain damage to walls, ceilings, floors and furnishings.

Gutters must be cleaned and checked for rusted areas and putter hangers checked to see that the gutters are properly fastened. Television antennas are major offenders on roofs, and the area around guy-wire anchors should be inspected for possible leaks.

Damaged or missing shingles must be replaced. It takes a careful inspection to determine if portions of many shingles have broken off and blown away or if shingles have cupped or split. Wind and stress may have loosened the roofing nails so heads no longer are in contact with the shingles, and this must be corrected.

Anything that projects through a roof is a danger source for

leaks. Flashing around chimneys, pipes and vents and sky-lights should be inspected.

Should re-roofing be necessary, the homeowner should consider several important factors in selecting a quality roofer: resistance to fire, wind and rain; color; uniform quality; insulation value; economy and low maintenance.

With the growing trend to easy-care living, heavyweight fire rated asphalt roofing designed to last as long as 25 years, is an ideal choice. It also offers the family the assurance of fire safety and protection from flying fire brands and embers which constitute a threat during a fire. It bears the United States Laboratories' Class "C" label for fire resistance as recommended for new construction and remodeling by the International Association of Fire Chiefs and the National Fire Protection Association. Homeowners in some areas will find fire rated asphalt roofing enables the house to qualify for lower fire insurance premiums.

The color of the roof is a very important consideration in the total color styling of a home. Homeowners can select from a wide variety of colors and blends.

The color selected may have an important bearing on the home's year-round comfort because white or lighter-colored ceramic roof granules reflect solar heat in the summer, helping to reduce air-cooling costs.

Guides To Battle Weeds Are Listed

Give a weed an inch and it will literally take a yard. One crabgrass plant can produce as many as 200,000 seeds a season.

One dandelion produces a mere 200 seeds, but look at the lawns almost solid with yellow blossoms and you see what that pest can do.

One plantain plant produces over 20,000 seeds a season. Even if only half a sprout and reced next year, you could have 200 million seeds threatening your lawn and garden by the third year.

Luckily, applied science and power give us tools to conquer weeds. One of the greatest developments in weed control was the development of 2,4-D. It is a highly effective herbicide developed to control broadleaf weeds.

From this chemical, scientists developed various ones such as 2, 4,5-TP and others. These are selective materials. They don't harm valuable grasses, but they do kill broad-leaved weeds, Chickweed, plantain, dandelion, knotweed, poison ivy, dog fennel, cur dock and many others yield to these materials.

Spray is easiest and fastest. A small tank-type sprayer is best. Spray when air is calm to avoid drift damage to roses and other broad-leaved flowers and shrubs.

Mix a tank every time you mow. As you walk along, simply squirt every weed on your right-hand side. A few months later most weeds will be gone. You get best results when weeds are young or growing fast, spring, early summer and fall.

Crabgrass is hated by more gardeners than you can count. But again the scientists found help. Seed lies dormant over winter and germinates in warm spring weather, about when purple lilac blooms.

Dicthal is one of the newest and best chemicals to stop crabgrass cold. It is now contained in most crabgrass control material. This newer material actually prevents crabgrass seed from germinating, so no crabgrass rises to ruin your lawn.

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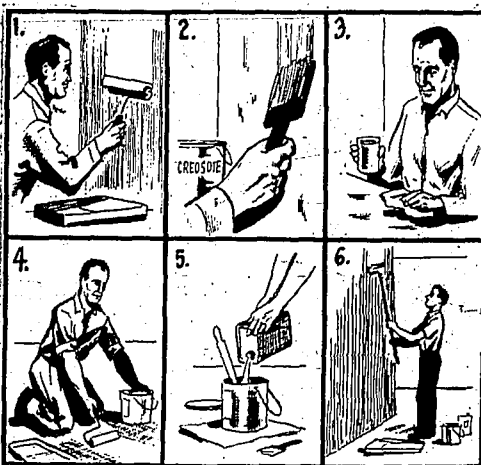
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FOR THE BEST possible results when painting: (1) prevent drips and splatters by controlled handling of paint; (2) avoid unattractive bleeding with thorough preparation of surfaces; (3) eliminate glossiness of paint caused by excess oil by wiping with turpentine; (4) keep paint glossy by applying a good undercoat and a finish coat that isn't too thin; (5) combat moisture blistering by using a paint that "breathes"; (6) there's a right brush technique and a right paint for every painting job.

Avoid These Painting Blunders

NEW YORK (NAPS)—An attractive, long-lasting paint job is the result of more than a stroke of good luck. There are ten major blunders that can hitch up an otherwise good piece of work, and almost every do-it-yourself painter manages to commit at least one of them at some time or other.

But by knowing what they are, and how to avoid them, you'll find it easier to give painting problems the brush-off.

1. **Dripping and Spattering** may not ruin a good paint job, but it does leave you with a mess to clean up later. Protect your furnishings with tarpaulins or tarpaulins "drop cloths". To prevent drips, don't dip your brush or roller too deeply. Consult experts at the National Company. Avoid the slap-dash method of painting by not rolling the roller too fast and by not flipping your brush at the end of each stroke.

2. **Bleeding** makes for unattractive results and can bleed you financially, too. If you have to do the job over. This staining of the paint—over knots or sappy places in wood by resins and gums drawn to the surface by heat—can be prevented by removing all the paint in the area, then sealing in the gums with a coat of pure shellac, special knot sealer or varnish. Apply primer then continue with the normal painting procedure. Bleeding may also result if you try to paint over wood that has been treated with creosote. Since creosote can't be removed, the surface must be given multiple coats of paint to prevent bleeding.

3. **Stitchiness** is caused by excess oil or the wrong type of oil in the paint. Sticky paint can soon be hardened by wiping it with turpentine. But if this method fails, you're stuck—the only thing left to do is to remove the defective paint and start over.

4. **Early Chalking**—or loss of gloss—in small areas is another painting blunder that shouldn't be glossed over. It's caused by the absorption of oil from the top coat of paint by the wood beneath. It is apt to occur sooner if the wood or masonry surface has been given an

insufficient paint coating. The problem can be remedied by applying an additional coat of paint. When doing this, don't thin the paint—often a cause of chalking in the first place.

5. **Blistering** frequently results when there's moisture in a wood surface you're painting. When drawn to the outer surface, it breaks the paint bond, stretching and swelling the film. Using a latex paint which is blister-resistant is one good way not to be a painter who's wist. One such paint which shows a Dutch Boy on the label, has a "breathable" action which allows moisture to pass through the paint film, enabling you to eliminate that long wait for an exterior surface to dry after a rain.

6. **Peeling** may occur without blistering, but often results from the same causes. A greasy or oily surface, a previously painted surface that's in poor condition, or a weight has loosened

the prime coat are also major causes of peeling.

7. **Mildew** occurs under damp conditions, whether indoors or out, and develops on your new paint job in the form of a rusty or sooty deposit. The resistance of ready-mixed paints to mildew can be improved by adding a fungicide, available at paint or hardware stores in a special form for mixing with paint. Look for a paint that is labeled "resistant to stains from both mildew and fungus". To avoid those unattractive specks—don't "speculate" about the paint you purchase.

8. **Laps and Brush Marks** won't make you bristly if you use the correct painting techniques. To avoid laps, it's wise to paint an entire wall or ceiling before stepping, unless you use a latex paint like Naplex, which makes it possible to stop and start when you please without laps showing up later. On a por-

ous surface "brush in" paint with short-strokes then smooth it out with longer ones. On a flat surface, use light, long strokes, gradually lifting the brush at the end of each stroke. In both cases, use a relatively dry brush to smooth out the paint and eliminate brush marks where the strokes join.

9. **Cracking** paint results when the film is broken through to the wood. Moisture then enters behind the film, loosening it and causing the paint to scale and flake. The reason is that the paint moisture—when it ages—becomes so brittle and inelastic that it can't expand to contract with the surface to which it is applied.

10. **Alligatoring**—those splits and cracks in the top coat only, which are named for their resemblance to an alligator's hide—may look good on your new shoes or handbag, but not on a new paint job. Alligatoring is caused when the top coat is harder and less yielding than the coat beneath. It can happen if the top coat is applied before the first coat is thoroughly dry, or if you apply a lower coat that doesn't dry hard because of fatty oil or too much oil.

Beauty Patios With Clay Pots

An attractive terrace or patio table can be made with three large clay flower pots and a circular piece of wood. Invert the three pots and space them evenly in a tripod arrangement. Then simply place a circular piece of wood over the pots to serve as a table surface. Use reinforced or a precast concrete slab.

Assemble a handy cigarette receptacle from two clay pots. Invert the first pot, then stack the second right side up. Place a three-inch bolt, backed by rubber washers, through the drainage holes to anchor the pots. Then fill the top pot with sand. Add a bright coat of paint, or some of the new decals.

Give each cookout guest his own hibachi by using eight 10-inch red clay flower pots. Plug the drainage hole, put charcoal in the bottom of the pot, the grill goes on top.

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Improvements Pay In More Than Cash

Outdoors, homes are getting a facelift with everything from new roofing and siding to new patio furniture and plantings. Indoor rooms are being redecorated to the magic of paneling, painting, wallpapering, flooring. Kitchens go modern; family rooms grow big and cozy and bathrooms expand and multiply. Repair and remodeling, expansion and modernization are in the air—it's home improvement time!

"It's all this in aid of? Some proponents of home improvement hold that it's worthwhile to remodel because it's a good investment. Improving a home will increase property value and pay off with a better resale price, they say. True enough—but there's more to home improvement than property value, contends Edgar V. Hall, director of the National Home Improvement Council.

"We're used to spending substantial sums on cars, clothes, food, vacations, entertainment. We don't expect to recoup our expenses on these items," says Director Hall. "Why, then, should we expect to do so in the case of home improvement and remodeling?"

Remodeling pays its own dividends, he points out. For one thing, it enables families to enjoy a better overall standard of living. Children stay at home when they have more space to play in. Tensions between parents and children are less, when a second or third bathroom relieves the usual morning congestion or when there is a basement family room for play or entertaining.

Converting an attic into a bedroom or study can mean less time spent in front of television and better grades in school. It can mean a place for Dad to catch up on office work—or, it can provide guestroom space for overnight—or longer—visits from friends and relatives.

For Mom, of course, a more spacious, better equipped kitchen or dining room means a new lease on life. She will have more time to spend in commu-

nally activities, or in pursuing the hobby she once dropped to raise a family.

Improvements like these make a house more livable, and they are easy to finance, too.

"The monthly payments for the kind of improvements that excite the admiration of the neighborhood are substantially less than the payments on a new house," Mr. Hall says.

There are other factors to consider, too. Inasmuch as mortgage money may be in short supply, it is difficult to buy a new home, even for those who can afford the payments. This also means that there are fewer buyers for used homes, making it harder to resell a home.

The alternative, then, may be to improve the present home. Unlike mortgage funds for new homes, financing for remodeling is not hard to come by. Most lending institutions are happy to finance remodeling projects.

With the availability of financing, there is also an increasing number of contractors who are highly qualified to do expert work at fair prices. Contractors and new home builders are entering the remodeling field in large numbers.

"Never before has there been such a vast amount of materials available for remodeling," says the Home Improvement Council director.

3. Teen-agers want their own bathroom and are getting them in increasing numbers, as parents get tired of the rush-hour competition.

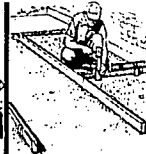

Six-Step, Easy-To-Build Patio

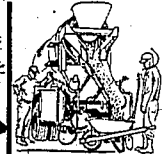
The outdoor living season is at hand. Here are six easy steps to help make your summer more enjoyable with a new concrete patio. If you're experienced, you can handle the job yourself. Otherwise refer and call your concrete contractor.



Step 1. PREPARE THE BASE — Select your patio area carefully to be sure it's exactly where you want it. Stake out the area to help you visualize its appearance. Remove the turf and at least four inches of top soil. Compact base soil with a tamper or heavy roller. Place a smooth, level one-inch layer of sand to provide firm, even support for your patio.



Step 2. SET THE FORMS — Your concrete patio can be laid-out in almost any shape: square, circle, diamond, or free form. For a 4-inch thick slab, use 2x4 boards on edge, nailed to 1x2-inch stakes driven firmly into the ground. The top edge of the forms will be the surface grade of your patio. Be sure that water will drain properly.



Step 3. ORDER CONCRETE — After the base is prepared and forms set, call your local ready-mixed concrete dealer. Tell him the size patio you are building and that you want to use concrete with a percent air-entrainment. He will deliver enough concrete to do the job. Be sure to have enough help ready to place the concrete when it arrives. Wait until you are ready to place the concrete before calling the ready-mix company.



Step 4. PLACE THE CONCRETE — Place the concrete as near as possible in its final position. Don't spread it from one central pile. Spread the concrete thoroughly to help consolidate it. After the concrete is placed, strike it off with a 2x1 board on the forms as shown here. This insures a flat, level patio surface. Keep enough concrete ahead of the 2x1 to fill in all low spots.



Step 5. FINISH THE SURFACE — After the surface water evaporates and the concrete starts to stiffen, "float" the patio surface with a light metal or wood float. This produces a textured, slip-resistant finish. If a very smooth surface is desired, finish with a steel trowel. But remember that the smoother the surface the more slippery it will be when wet.



Step 6. CURE THE CONCRETE — Cure the concrete properly to produce a strong durable surface. For best results keep it wet for at least six days after placing or cover it with a plastic film as shown here. Wet burlap or straw are equally good for curing. Your concrete patio should provide many seasons of enjoyment.

Early Spring Spraying Pays Double Summer Dividends

When the days become noticeably longer, and the sun starts blanketing the earth with renewed warmth, Nature's alarm clock goes off. Buds on plants awaken and begin to swell, and insects start emerging from their various over-wintering stages.

This is the time for you to make preparations to see that these newly active insects do not spoil your long-awaited Spring garden. Early spraying is in order.

The garden experts at the Geigy Chemical Corp. say that early spraying will pay double dividends. In addition to getting these "early-risers" and preventing them from ruining the lush green of the spring garden, early spraying will keep these pests from being the originators of an insect population explosion that will demand a lot of spraying in summer and fall when you have many other activities planned.

So, at the same time you are dusting off the golf clubs, or thinking about summer sports, it is a good idea to check the sprayer and make sure it is in operating condition. Also be sure to have a supply of fresh insect control chemicals on hand, especially one like Spectracide lawn and garden insect control which will curb just about all the major pests that attack the garden with just a single spraying.

One of the most damaging occurrences in sprayers is the corrosion of metal parts. This usually results from permitting certain spray solutions to remain in the tank for extended periods — such as over Winter.

Thoroughly wash out the sprayer with water and a laundry detergent, and examine all parts for signs of corrosion. If some is found, clean with a wire brush. Small crystals formed by corrosion will clog the nozzle. After the sprayer has been thoroughly washed, fill the tank with clean water and test the spray pattern to make certain the nozzle is not clogged. A clogged nozzle is not uncommon; it can happen quite often

during the season by particles of dust, sand or soil getting mixed up with the spray. To clear the nozzle, remove it from the sprayer and clean with a length of thin wire. If this fails to unclog it, flush and reverse-flush with clear water until the particles have been dissolved.

Examine the label on all old spray insecticides. If the label has been obliterated, throw the chemical out. Check the label to see whether storage will reduce its effectiveness. If in doubt, throw out.

It is best to start the garden spraying season with a fresh supply of a versatile insecticide that can be used on all plants. Then it is not necessary to mix separate chemicals for all different plants. For instance, the insect control Spectracide can be used on fruits and vegetables as well as garden plants, shrubs, trees and the lawn.

The spray program should be started as early as possible and continue through the season. Spraying all garden plants regularly every ten days to two weeks, will keep insect populations to a minimum and allow you to enjoy a lush, green, healthy garden through summer and to the fall.

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Quiet Things Down With Acoustical Tile

Modern living is louder than ever, and with high-fidelity equipment, radios, tape recorders, television sets and recreation rooms that are designed for indoor playing by the youngsters.

A way to deaden some of that noise in areas you wish to keep quiet is by installing acoustical tile. Much tile also can be used to cover a damaged ceiling, or can be used for a ceiling in an unfinished basement or attic.

Acoustical ceilings work by absorbing sound waves.

Tiles are available in a variety of materials and colors, and prices vary accordingly. The easiest to install is a tile made of pressed wood fibers.

Tiles can be installed by nailing, stapling or using an adhesive.

Do not try the adhesive if the

ceiling is badly cracked, if paint is peeling or if ceiling is very uneven. Do not apply adhesive over wallpaper; remove first. If the ceiling is painted, apply one or two tiles with adhesive and allow to stand for 48 hours. If they do not pull away you can proceed. If the adhesive soaks through the paint, the old paint will have to be removed.

Tiling a ceiling is like tiling a floor. Find the center and snap a chalk line across the middle and another at right angles to it. Install tiles from these center lines out so that less than full-sized tiles will be at the edges of the room.

Do not spread the adhesive on the ceiling. Apply four walnut-sized dabs of adhesive, one at each corner of the tile about one inch in from the sides. Slide the tile slightly back and forth to assure an even bond. Check frequently with a level. To level, apply more or less adhesive.

For nailing or stapling, furring strips must be provided. If furring strips are applied to a plastered ceiling, nail through the plaster into the joists. Over a finished or unfinished ceiling, apply furring strips at right angles to joists.

Use one by three-inch furring strips and nail on 12-inch cen-

ters. Start at the center of the room and work toward the wall. Allow at least four inches but no more than 10 inches between the last furring strip and the wall. Then put up one last furring strip flush to the wall. Level with thin wedges between furring and joists.

Acoustical tiles can then be nailed or stapled to the furring strips. You will find that stapling is faster.

When you cut tile, use a good cross-cut saw or a sharp fiber-board knife. Cut with the edge of the tile up.

Apply a moulting to the face of the room for a finished appearance.

Anyone Can Have Great Lawn

You can grow a great lawn almost anywhere. Even with poor soil and weeds you can overcome problems and have a beautiful carpet of grass to make your home more attractive.

Clay or sandy soils cause problems. Both can be greatly improved by adding organic matter, such as peat moss or humus. A rotary tiller is excellent to churn peat or humus into the soil.

If you have a sparse lawn with more weeds than grass it may be best to start all over. Fall is the ideal time; nature's natural time to start lawns. Tillers can be rented but they are a good basic investment from \$10 up for a variety of garden jobs. First, use 2-0-0 or 2-4-5-T to kill all weeds.

Then spread 1 to 1½ cubic yards of peat per 1,000 square feet, more if soil is exceptionally sandy or high clay content. Till or turn over to about six-eight inches deep.

Since grass roots should go deep, it pays to till fertilizer into the soil. Use a 20-10-10, 18-5-5 or other high nitrogen analysis fertilizer.

Lime is needed to build a good lawn in most areas. Ordinarily about 50 pounds per 100 square feet is desirable.

When you have tilled and graded, you're ready to seed. Your cheapest investment is good, quality seed. It will produce the high quality lawn you want for years to come.

Kentucky bluegrass, Merion bluegrass, fine fescue or Highland henrietta grass. Follow seed package directions to get adequate coverage.

Use salt hay or similar mulch to cover the newly seeded area. Water periodically to get seed sprouted well. Hold off mowing until grass is up and doing well.

From then on, follow a sound, regular fertilizing and mowing program to build a strongly rooted lawn that will last for years.

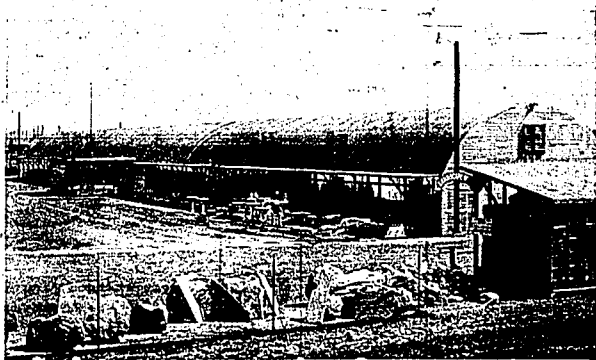

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Electric Drills Now Refined And Versatile

The electric drill has long been the first power tool for the home handyman, after he has all of his basic hand tools, and the common electric drill has undergone a transformation in recent years.

The simple 1/2-inch electric drill is the only kind you may not too long ago. For anything larger, say 3/4 or 1 1/2-inch work, you needed an expensive industrial model. And for versatility, there just wasn't any. But now the gap between the simple and the heavy-duty drill has been filled with a variety of models that offer more power, and at a reasonable price.

Innovations include variable speeds, reverse gears, insulated handles, battery operated drills.

The variable speed has made the drill tremendously versatile. Simplest models have a switch that allows you to operate the drill at either a high or low speed.

More sophisticated is the speed control that allows you to run the drill from a speed that barely turns the chuck to the unit's maximum speed. Simply increasing pressure on the trigger switch increases the speed. When you are working with hard materials or large drill bits, you need power rather than speed, and cutting down the speed gives you the extra power. Going through a piece of soft material, on the other hand, just requires speed.

With variable speeds, the use of a screwdriver bit in a drill becomes truly practical. And power driving is a convenience like no other.

The low speeds help in starting a hole, too. Instead of using a rafter punch you can start with the drill bit itself. At a low speed, it will not slip off the

New Hope Seen For Stately Elm

There is new hope in the fight to save our nation's elm trees.

First step is to recognize Dutch elm disease. Premature wilting and leaf fall on one or more branches is an early symptom. Leaves curl and turn yellow. Wilted branches show brown streaks under the bark. As the tree dies, the destructive elm bark beetles move on to find a home under the bark of another tree.

Help is at hand, according to Dr. Philip Rusden of the Barrett Tree Research Laboratories. New chemical tools used in conjunction with basic sanitation practices, fertilizing and spraying have spurred new efforts by home owners and municipal officials to save elms.

When symptoms of the disease appear, act fast. Remove wilted limbs well below the point of infection. In some cases, complete removal and burning of the tree is necessary to avoid contamination of healthy elms nearby.

Two new tools are helpful. *Dibrin*, a systemic chemical injected in tree trunks in spring kills bark beetles before they infect a tree. *Vapam*, another chemical, can create a soil barrier against transmission of the disease through interlocking roots.

Feed with fertilizer applications in holes made by crossbars in circles around the trees, about 100 per tree, to invigorate them. Spray to control beetles and other insects. Pruning and burning infected branches and limbs is vital. When you remove limbs, and can't burn, remove the bark from trunk and branches larger than an inch thick. Do this or spray dead limbs with two per cent DDT in fuel oil or kerosene.

The insulated drill is ideal in a damp basement.

Battery-operated drills allow you to work away from a power supply. This sort of drill works on a rechargeable battery cell.

Determine if you really need a cordless drill before investing in one. It may not be worth the extra expense to you.

The simple pistol grip has given way to a variety of handle styles. Some drills have extra handles so you can get a better grip on the tool. Shop around for the drill that has the features you want, and be sure it handles comfortably.

Usage Of Pot Plants Increasing

We're becoming a nation of pot plant hobbyists. Nearly seven out of 10 households have living plants growing either indoors or on porches, patios and terraces, according to a recent study.

During summer you'll find a number of professionally grown clay-potted asters that can brighten your indoor and outdoor plantings. Colors range

through whites, blues and reds. They like to be kept on the moist side, but should not be "drowned." Porous clay containers with good drainage are best for their health.

If you're selecting professionally grown combination pots, or growing your own for winter color indoors, try ageratum, alyssum, tuberous-rooted begonias, shrimp plants. Other excellent plants include coleus, dahlias, forget-me-nots, fuchsia, geraniums, impatiens, lantanas, lobelias, pansies, petunias and verbenas.

To enjoy flowering bulbs in the middle of winter, start bulbs this fall. Plan ahead.



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Pruning Aids Tree Growth; Tips Listed

Ideally, beautiful trees spread shade, bear fruit, bring greenery to home scenery. But if they're to keep on doing all these things, they must be pruned.

More and more homeowners are tackling the important job of pruning on a do-it-yourself basis. For their guidance, here are some tips.

Early spring is the best time to prune, giving cutting wounds on the tree a chance to heal during late spring growth.

Exceptions are "bleeders" — notably, maples and birches. They exude much sap when cut during the dormant period, and should be cut during the fall growth of summer.

When pruning, make the cuts at a joint and make them clean and even. If a stump or lip is left behind, a callus won't be able to form over the wound and it will remain open to infection.

When cutting large limbs, avoid tearing the bark. Try undercutting about a third or a quarter of the way through the bottom of the limb before starting to cut from the top. It's also helpful to lessen the weight of the branch by pruning several limbs before making the final cut.

Secure large limbs with a rope before cutting.

For safety's sake, be sure no one is under the tree during pruning, or in position to be struck by a falling limb. Pruning requires climbing high, use a safety rope.

When any limb larger than a twenty-five cent piece is cut, the wound should be dressed to speed healing. Asphalt mixtures are popular for this work, because they are easy to apply and weather well, but pine tar is also effective, as well as Bordeaux mixture, or copper sulphate.

To apply mixture, try tying a brush to a pole and working from the ground. Balancing on a limb with a brush in one hand and a can in the other can be dangerous.

With their high speed and light weight, chain saws can ease the work of tree pruning. In fact, pruning is one of the major uses homeowners find for chain saws, according to a recent survey which also showed that one American household in 20 now owns a chain saw among its tools.

The survey, which was conducted by Omack Industries, manufacturer of cutting chain for use in forestry work, reported that of thousands of saw owners interviewed, 21.2 percent said they had been asked at least once to lend the tool to a friend or neighbor at a statistic, which led Guy Sabin, vice-president of Omack, to remark:

"Homeowners who have a chain saw soon find their neighbors aren't coming around to borrow the lawn-mower any more. Let's see the spot of having the saw!"

Soil Deceiving

That garden soil brought in from your yard can be deceiving — and harmful to plants. If it's been exposed to summer herbicide treatments.

When re-planting plants that have been outdoors, it's safer to use a professionally prepared, sterilized potting soil and porous clay pots, the combination that promotes proper drainage and healthier plants.

Move Benches

It isn't necessary to anchor benches permanently to a patio, but it is advisable to change their position by a couple of inches every so often.

Window Shades Can Be No-Cost Repair Item

Window shades can be annoying as well as a means for achieving privacy. Sometimes they wind up without reason, offering no privacy at all. Other times they refuse to roll up at all.

Any part of a window shade is easily repaired or replaced. While complete shade replacement is not terribly expensive, sometimes a simple repair can be made with no expense. Should you replace a shade, salvage the parts from the old roller. They can be useful for later repairs.

Understanding how a shade is constructed makes it easier for you to repair.

The shade is fastened to a wooden roller with staples, tacks or tape.

Inside the roller is a coil spring with a dowel inside. At one end of the roller is a stationary pin. At the other is a flat, rotating pin. Metal end caps protect the parts.

Tiny pawls fit into slots at the end with the rotating pin. The force of rotation releases the pawls which in turn causes the spring to raise the shade. When you stop the shade's movement the pawls drop into place and lock the roller in that position.

Now — when a shade doesn't roll up, what do you do? Increase the spring tension by pulling the shade down a few turns. Then remove the roller from the brackets and roll up the shade tightly. Put it back and try again. If the tension

is now too great, remove the roller and unwind the shade a couple of turns.

Check the pawls to see if they are stuck. They drop in place by gravity. If lubrication seems in order, use graphite, not oil. Oil becomes gummy, picks up dirt.

The spring may be broken if these measures fail. Get a new roller.

A shade that snaps up with no reason has a spring that is too tight. Roll the shade to the top, remove roller from brackets.

Hanging Baskets

Nothing freshens up porches like hanging baskets of trailing plants suspended from beams or rafters. Plunge the flowering or foliage plant, clay pot and all, into a wire basket lined with damp peat moss.

The clay containers will keep plant roots cooler during hot summer days, while needed moisture is absorbed through porous pot walls.

ets, unroll halfway by hand and replace.

A shade that falls or wobbles is easily corrected. Sometimes the stationary pin is bent. Straighten with pliers or replace with a nail of about the same size.

Loose brackets should be re-mounted with screws instead of nails.

If you are moving a short shade to a larger window, re-set the brackets closer together. Or extend the pin by pulling it out slightly or replacing with a long nail of the same thickness.

Moving a wide shade to a slightly narrower window is again accomplished by working on the fixed pin in the roller. Take off the fabric and cut the end of the roller where the fixed pin is. Replace the pin and end cap. Use tacks, staples or tape to refasten shade to roller.

The shade itself should be trimmed by stretching it out on a flat surface, measuring, marking with a straight edge and cutting with scissors.

If the shade rolls up crooked, remove and unroll. Unfasten shade from roller. Drop the edge of the shade a trifle lower on the side toward which the shade runs. Refasten.

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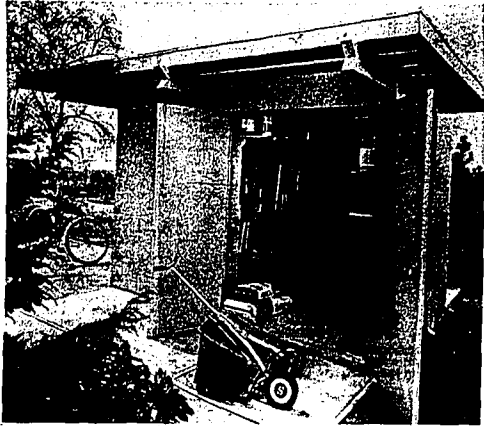

It is a simple, sturdy plan that should offer no problems to the weekend carpenter who wants practical outdoor storage.

Build Screens at Key Spots In Yards To Attain Privacy

Many ingredients go into the design of a successful outdoor living area — but most important is the provision for privacy. Few people can truly enjoy a patio or deck when every moment outdoors is shared with the neighbors.

The solution is obvious: screening. But where to build it? What pattern to use? What height should it be?

These questions can be answered by taking a coffee break on the patio, sketch pad in hand. Also take along a chair light enough to move around easily. If you have one, a small camera may come in handy, too. During this session, you'll determine how and where to block sight lines, from neighboring properties and close-by streets or driveways. You needn't be an artist or draftsman.

Just figure height and width of the area needed to block a view to your patio, by drawing lines that relate to distant tree branches, windows, utility poles and the like.

Make several such sketches, for each, note your position and whether you were seated or moving around on the patio and standing. Before sketching, draw a line through the center of the paper to establish eye level.

Once general dimensions are determined, the next decision will be location of the screens. Putting them near the patio's edge has many advantages. Not only are they likely to make the best sight barrier, but screens become a windbreak, too.

There'll be no wall-like effect

Drop-Leaf Handy

Like outdoor cookery? Why not build a drop-leaf service counter on the fence next to the barbecue unit?

Build counter of one by four's and hinge it in fence's main rail. Put screw eyes in outer edge of the counter and attach brass chains to upper fence rail. To raise counter for use, pull up and snap chains into screw eyes.

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Outdoor Storage Unit Ends Garage Clutter

Garages are for cars—at least that's what the architects design them for. Mostly, though, they house a jumbled collection of bicycles, garden tools, patio furniture, old paint cans and trash containers.

There's no need for this condition when you can easily build this modern outdoor storage unit developed by the American Plywood Association to give the garage back to the car and at the same time provide organized storage for the many items ordinarily misplaced in that abused structure.

Something like an outdoor basement in that there is plenty of room to store those things that ordinarily encroach on living space, the eight by 12-foot building has five separate storage areas, each for a specific group of items.


Two large areas with sturdy

plywood shelves at their sides are intended for outdoor living equipment such as barbecues and patio furniture, and sports equipment such as bicycles and croquet sets. The adjustable shelves are ideal for storage of paint and similar material.

These two areas and a third intended for garden tools and supplies are fitted with large plywood doors that can be locked to protect the contents.


The two remaining storage areas are left open. They are intended for lawn and refuse storage.

Do-it-yourself plans make it easy for the amateur handyman to build this free-standing unit in a minimum of time with exterior-type plywood. The plans for the outdoor storage unit may be obtained for 10 cents from the American Plywood Association, 1119 A St., Tacoma, Wash.




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Beautification Starts With Cleaning Up

From a homemaker's individual efforts to improve his home grounds to complete urban renewal, home and community beautification projects are on the increase, for both practical and aesthetic reasons.

Nearly all such projects start in the same way, with one essential step: Cleaning up litter. And there's good cause for this. Litter prevention is a prerequisite to property beautification, according to Keep America Beautiful, Inc.

"Just as a woman would not put cosmetics on a dirty face, so must littered property be cleaned up and kept clean, before it can be beautified," says Allen H. Seed Jr., executive vice president of the national litter-fighting organization.

Loss in property values is a big factor, too. "Property owners who permit yards and surrounding neighborhoods to be cluttered with litter are depreciating their investment," Mr. Seed explains. "There seems to be mutual agreement that litter-free property will appreciate much faster."

While it is difficult to place an accurate price tag on this loss, real estate men and builders agree that it is considerable. Anti-litter and beautification projects in many sections of the country are actively supported by real estate and builders groups.

How such improvements affect property is strikingly demonstrated by this example: Property values increased 25 percent after a clean-up and beautification project along a four-mile boulevard in Los Angeles.

A few years ago, the street was left littered and unsightly after a street railway was removed. Property was selling for as low as \$25 per front foot.

Property owners, in cooperation with the city government, cleaned up the area and planted flowering trees along a center island that replaced the tracks. Sparked by the beautification, a fine business and professional district developed along the street. Property values soon rose to \$200 per front foot.

One of the most encouraging things about litter prevention is that "neatness breeds neatness."

"When a piece of property has been cleaned up, it tends to remain litter free, and it sets a good example that is likely to be followed by the neighbors," says Mr. Seed. "One good example can mushroom into a community trend."

Kitchen Remodeling Starts With Planning

Even though a wide array of space-age kitchen appliances are used by today's homemaker, the average housewife still spends up to 60 per cent of her waking hours in the kitchen.

Lack of a functional design often accounts for much of the needless time the homemaker spends in her kitchen, according to Sears, Roebuck and Co. kitchen planning consultants.

When remodeling one of the first rooms in a home to be given a facelift is the kitchen, the planners report. Yet, they said, while homeowners provide for a new look to their kitchens they often overlook providing for an efficient design.

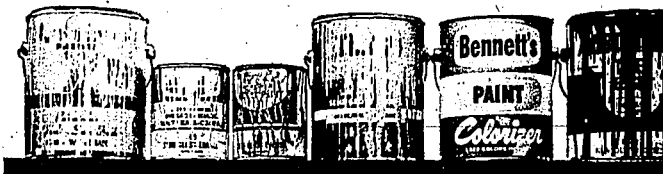
While kitchen needs may vary by family, a general rule for kitchen arrangement applies to most all families.

Modern kitchen arrangement, the planners said, should be based on a work triangle. Each point of the triangle should represent one of three major work centers — the refrigerator center, the cleaning center, and the cooking center.

The walking distance of the triangle—from the sink to range to refrigerator and back to the sink—should not total more than 22 feet or less than 15 feet. If the appliances are too far apart, the homemaker will waste time and add steps in cooking and clean-up work. If it is too close, the homemaker

will be cramped. Generally, a design that provides for the most efficient placement of equipment and also incorporates adequate cabinet space and countertop work area allows: Four to seven feet between the sink and refrigerator; four to six feet between the sink and range; and four to nine feet between the range and refrigerator. After a workable plan is developed, the homemaker should consider the decor desired. A wide range of kitchen cabinets, dining lounges, and kitchen remodeling products is available at Sears, Roebuck and Co.

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Tree Kills Turf? Put In Plantings

A big, old shade tree is a delight in any yard. But often lawn doesn't grow well near the trunk, where large roots make soil sparse.

A good solution calls for removing lawn in a three- to six-foot radius around the trunk, replacing grass with hardy evergreen ground cover.

Around that, lay a border of crushed white rock or gravel contained by pressure-treated two by fours or four by fours, sunken so their top edge is at lawn level.

Bench Beneficial

Near the back door, build a garden bench of two by fours. You'll find it also makes a handy-sewing counter, workbench and drop-things-off spot for the patio.

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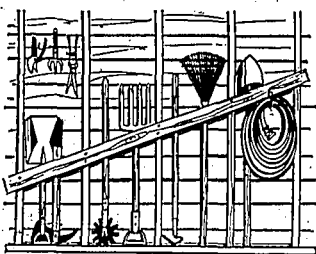


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OUT OF THE WAY and handy, too. Garden tools can be racked in neat order in an unfinished garage or tool shed by nailing a board across four or more studs. If nailed at an angle the board will hold tools of varying length.

Pick Plants For Long Effect; Fence Helps Slow Growers

When designing a garden from scratch on a bare lot, or re-landscaping the yard of an older home, it's sometimes hard to wait long enough for the young plants to attain their full growth. The temptation is to substitute fast-growers and large showy specimens in order to achieve an immediate effect. Yet, according to Landscape Architect Daryl B. May, that can spell ruin for the garden and loss of the home-owner's investment in time and money, for the final effect is likely to be a far cry from the original intent.

There are, however, ways to create a good appearance right from the start. A bit of the budget can be spent on a few near-mature plants to help balance the use of so many young specimens. Adding a few interesting materials in containers around patios and entrance areas does

a lot, too, toward creating a more settled appearance in the young garden.

"Perhaps most important of all," said May, "is to include a backdrop for planting beds, something that fills in—space while plants are growing and sets them off when they reach maturity. A fence is an excellent choice for this purpose. It lends stability right away and makes the most of even the smallest shrub.

"The fence doesn't need to be fancy to do the job," May pointed out. "Just a plain board fence is frequently the best choice since it won't dominate the scene. A light touch is needed, however, and use of half-inch fence boards gives it to either a tall or low structure."

Re-sawn western red cedar, Douglas fir or ponderosa pine produces the best textural com-

plement to plant materials while requiring less maintenance than smooth-surfaced wood, May suggested.

For finish, the penetrating transparent stains are preferred to shades that won't conflict with leaf and petal tones—moss green, sand-gold, natural wood tones and the silver of weathered wood. Reddish

browns are often no good since they tend to turn purplish.

Use of the fence permits a few other aids for the young garden, May said. For example, interesting things can be espaliered against the fence to add form and eye-appeal. Trees, like apple, pear and quince make excellent espaliers, and, of course, vines, climbing roses and some

junipers can be trained into handsome shapes against a fence.

"To make young beds look their best, match with bark material. Some rock also helps produce an established appearance, while bulbs and bedding plants are a reliable source of immediate color and body."



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Ways Are Outlined On How To Avoid Burning When Using More Fertilizer

Many home gardeners have found that using more fertilizer is not by itself the answer to more vigorous growth and better blooms.

In fact, heavy fertilization can on occasion — hinder growth and sometimes hurt plants from so-called burning. Damage can come from excessive salts in certain types of fertilizer formulations.

You can avoid this hazard by using garden fertilizers which have a low salt index. Most of these fertilizers contain potassium nitrate (KNO₃) as a major source of both nitrogen and potash.

Potassium nitrate, which is all plant food, does not leave salt residues in the soil, for it is itself usable by the plant. The potash is present without non-essential chlorine, and nitrogen is in the nitrate form, immediately available to plants. This means plants get the benefit of nitrogen even though heavy rains may come almost immediately after

application. So, when you're selecting a garden fertilizer, look for one that contains potassium nitrate. Many of the fertilizers formulated especially for potted plants in the home and for use in the garden contain this prime ingredient.

These formulations resulted from tests conducted throughout the United States at leading state land-grant colleges and universities, and by professional growers in nurseries and greenhouses. Results showed low salt fertilizer containing potassium nitrate to have many advantages including virtual elimination of the burning problem.

Also, research on the use of potassium nitrate as a separate fertilizer material applied as a supplemental diet showed increased yield and flowering.

Both standard and prilled forms are available for use in a fertilizer grade, and in a straighter solution, spray, or straight in direct application.

Plants get a fast, strong, healthy start and develop stronger root systems earlier. When it's time to transplant, there is less set-back. And these plants develop far richer blooms, colors and foliage.

In addition to lower salt content and providing nitrogen in the favored nitrate form, potassium nitrate contains no non-essential ingredients. Its 44 per cent potash and 13 per cent nitrogen are completely soluble and immediately available for fast balanced uptake. It is also essentially free of chlorine, sulphur and sodium.

So, as a home gardener, you're right in applying more fertilizer, but be sure the fertilizer is formulated especially for gardens and house plants. To help you judge the relative performance of fertilizers, those containing potassium nitrate assure you that you will have a minimum of salt problems, a maximum of safety even with heavy applications, and a quick response.

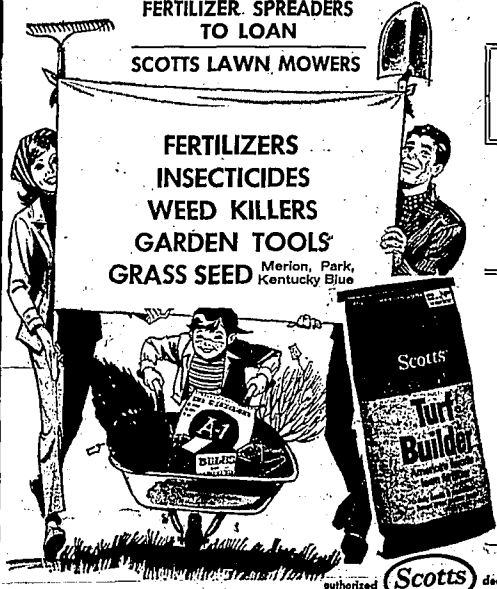

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Cool It This Summer With An Attic Fan

No need to lose your cool over the heat of summer. While whole-house air-conditioning is the ultimate in cooling, it is possible to make your home comfortable without it. Cool air is forced out just a matter of feet; it into your house to replace the warm air.

An attic fan, not exactly cheap, is still less expensive than air-conditioning. It pulls the warm air out of the house during the evening, causing cooler air to rush in through open windows from the outside.

New Lighting Improves Kitchen Look

It's a pretty safe bet that kitchen lighting needs updating—and this one change can make a dramatic improvement in the efficiency and beauty of the kitchen area.

Where is light needed? In a kitchen, it's needed on counter tops, at the range, at the sink, in the cupboard's—plus general overall lighting.

A surface-mounted fixture, equipped with a totally enclosed glass or globe of diffusing material, is the simplest method of ceiling lighting. Make sure the unit has a diameter of at least 12 inches, so the 100 watts of light needed in it will not make the fixture overly bright to the eye.

At the other extreme is the wall-to-wall luminous ceiling plan, with a group of 40-watt fluorescent tubes mounted on the ceiling and a suspended corrugated vinyl plastic "ceiling" about 18 inches below them.

Sometimes it's as effective—and considerably less expensive—to install a luminous ceiling in just one section of the room, in lieu of a surface-mounted fixture.

To light countertops, mount a single row of fluorescent tubes under the wall cabinets, either concealed behind the "lip" of the cabinet or equipped with shielding trim.

At the sink, a double row of fluorescents is needed, because the light has to travel a greater distance to reach the work area. An alternative plan is to surface-mount two 75-watt reflector floodlamps at ceiling level or recess them in the ceiling itself. This avoids the shadows created by a single downlight.

The range area needs a fluorescent tube mounted in a bracket on the wall or on soffit or ceiling.

If the kitchen includes a plan-

The attic fan, is generally located in the attic floor over the ceiling in the middle of the house. Installing the fan at one end of the attic itself, in a garage, is possible only if the attic is tightly sealed. Otherwise, you will simply be changing the attic air.

The fan can be mounted vertically inside the attic by building it into a suction box which serves as an air tunnel. The only side open in the attic will be the fan side.

Rule of thumb for size of an attic fan is that you should pull the air in a house over every minute, every 1½ minutes at least. Fan capacity is rated in cubic feet per minute—multiply length times width times the height of the ceiling to get the cubic feet in your house.

A good attic fan may run about \$150 plus the cost of installation. Cheaper, though not so efficient is a large window fan. There are types and sizes to fit every window.

One end of a window fan can work wonders in cooling a house. Again the best place is upstairs. Locate it at the window on the sunny side of the house and close the other windows along that side. Open the windows on the shady side and downstairs where the air is cooler. Remember that the fan must pull air out of the house so that it can be replaced by cooler air.

Run the fan at night, keep windows closed and shades drawn on the sunny side during the day to retain the cool air.

Even without a fan you can keep your house cool by providing the proper outlets for warm air and inlets for cool. Your entire house is like a chimney and the warm air rises in it. Provide openings where they will do the most good.

Open up all windows at night, close and shade the ones on the sunny side during the day. Keep interior doors open as well as outside doors during the night so that air can flow through the house. Open basements windows—air is coolest at the lowest point.

If your house is on a slash, try to install ground-level vents to admit air. Screen them and cover them so they can be closed in winter.

If your house has a crawl space, it has a supply of cool air. Fibor registers that can be opened in summer, closed in winter will tap this supply.

At the top of the house there should be vents to rid it of the warm air that piles up under the ceiling. Most attic vents are designed to allow air to rise up and get hot and stagnant. I urge window-sire vents in large, the cost of installation.

Remodel Picket Fence This Year

If you aren't fond of your picket fence but its condition is too healthy for replacement, just remodel it.

Remove the pickets and cut them to fit between top and bottom fence rails. Add a one-half inch nailing strip to both rails, inset from the edge about one inch.

Then nail on the cutdown pickets, which are now just one-fourth inch boards. For additional pattern, alternate them with a one by one.

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
