State Parks In Idaho Are Given Attention At Twin Falls Meeting

Board members of the Idaho Department of Parks started a series of meetings in Twin Falls Thursday with discussions during the morning session centered around three new parks in South Idaho.

Late in the morning meeting, board members accepted title to 3,000 acres of land near Pocatello which will be developed into Rock State Park. The title was delivered by officials of the Bureau of Land Management.

A motion was passed during the meeting to consider East

Idaho engineering firms for park planning work to be done on projects in Southern Idaho. If a firm cannot be obtained, the board will work with engineering firms that have done state work in the past.

It was learned that four firms proposed at Glenn Ferry were in Boise and one in Coeur d'Alene have done state work in the past.

The Three Island State Park project, which is being developed in the engineering work there, the board said also probably will be given a chance to develop land on the south side of the gorge first as an "economy measure." Engineering work calls for \$20,000 worth of work at Idaho Falls and \$25,000 worth of work at Three Island, but one official said these estimates "are estimated guesses."

A Malad River Gorge progress report was given at the meeting. The board is considering putting a state park at the gorge scenic spot between Wendell and Bliss.

After the report was given, the board passed a motion allowing negotiations for the purchase of private property in the area.

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Laos Meet Brings No Agreement On Talk Site

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department said following a new U.S.-North Vietnamese truce today that there is no agreement yet on a site for preliminary peace talks.

The renewed exchange took place in Vientiane, Laos, where U.S. Ambassador William H. Sullivan met for 30 minutes with the ranking diplomat at the North Vietnamese embassy there, Nguyen Chan.

Sullivan reported from Ambassador, the White House and State Department during the morning.

Robert J. McCluskey, State Department press officer, de-

clined to discuss the subject saying that no agreement has yet been reached on a site. However, the Johnson administration judgment of the Vietnam meeting, it was learned, was that it had failed once more to end the impasse over a site for preliminary peace talks.

Officials also indicated that the latest Hanoi move was in no precise sense a reply to the last previous U.S. message to Hanoi on Monday.

Indications in official quarters here were that North Vietnam was still pressing the United States to accept Warsaw as a site to move by Poland yes-

terday an effort by North Vietnam to organize a major press campaign against the United States.

That was their assessment of Poland's reported appeal to six embassies in Warsaw to exert influence in bringing preliminary peace talks on ending the Vietnam war to the Communist nation's capital.

Domestic sparring continues here as the U.S. State Department reported prepared to carry on prolonged, hard-nosed negotiations with North Vietnam over the site.

And U.S. officials forecast that the longer the present domestic sparring continues, the more Johnson will hold his

resolve not to give way on this first issue of what they maintain will turn out to be a long and painful peace-making process.

U.S. officials say there seem to be several reasons for this. One is that North Vietnam believes that by manipulating public opinion pressures against the Johnson administration it can force the U.S. to agree to a place as neutral as Hanoi and painful to Washington.

Another reason, U.S. officials believe, is that if the site is unfavorable to the U.S. interest and disliked even by South Vietnam the issue may be viewed as a concession between the Washington and Saigon governments.

Paratroopers Are Close To Severing Red Power

SAIGON (AP) — South Vietnamese paratroopers have moved close to a Shau Valley to cut off North Vietnamese supply lines for a possible blow at Hue or other northern cities, military spokesmen said today.

The U.S. 1st Cavalry Division, in a direct war, has been ordered to expect a high level of enemy attack, possibly an offensive in late April or early May in the Hue area.

In Saigon, the National Police Directorate told the people the enemy was planning another big attack on the capital.

The South Vietnamese move to positions east of a Shau Valley could be the start of a major strike to drive southward North Vietnamese stronghold stretching 25 miles along the border of Laos in the far north.

Allied forces have not ventured into the valley in force in the two years since North Vietnamese troops overran the Special Forces camp at Shau and turned the valley into their biggest supply base in South Vietnam.

After round-the-clock pounding of the valley by U.S. B-52 bombers, nearly 2,000 South Vietnamese paratroopers launched Operation Lm Son last Friday, but it was not an Allied force that the request for the ruling was not proper procedure.

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Schools Are Searched In Bomb Scare

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Union Chief Says Chances Good For Breaking Strike Deadlock

WASHINGTON (AP) — The union leader directing the eight-day nationwide telephone strike says chances look good for breaking the deadlock in wage talks.

More than 200,000 members of President Joseph A. Beirne's A.F.-C. Communications Workers union are involved in the walkout in about 40 states, but there has been little effect on most telephone service across the country.

"At this point, I can report definitely that things are looking up," Beirne said Wednesday of continuing informal talks with Bell Telephone System officials.

Beirne said negotiators on both sides now favor abandoning the 18-month wage reopening provision—which set off the first nationwide telephone strike in 21 years—and writing a new three-year agreement.

Talks have centered on a brand new contractual agreement, to give parties an opportunity to break out of the impasse who had reached prior to

the start of the strike," Beirne said in a statement.

"The union, before launching the strike of telephone installers, operators, linemen, repairmen, clerks and other workers, rejected a company offer of a 7.5 per cent wage increase over 18 months. The company said at the time the union was demanding 10.2 per cent.

Telephone installers, who set the wage pattern in the industry, averaged \$3.27 per hour before the strike and other telephone workers averaged \$2.75.

"Chances look good, but there are many knotty problems to resolve," Beirne said of talks with company officials.

Talks originally were confined to wage matters, including pay differentials for various jobs and geographical areas. Discussing a completely new contract adds such matters as pensions, health and life insurance and working conditions to the agenda.

Thousands of Bell workers whose contracts have not expired in those two states and others are refusing to cross picket lines of the union's 23,000-member telephone installers, who work in most states. Another 140,000 Bell workers in 12 states where their contracts have expired are also on strike.

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Nevada Assured Of Blast Safety

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission, under pressure from a billion-dollar Hughes to postpone a nuclear test, assured Nevada today that there is little danger from the blast.

But a day before the countdown started, the Hughes organization renewed its request for a 30-day delay and a group from St. Louis, Mo., expressed concern over the safety of Hoover Dam. The test is scheduled for 6 a.m. Friday.

The underground test, equal to slightly more than a million tons of TNT, will be the biggest explosion ever set off in the United States and the explosion by the AEC to be felt in buildings 250 miles away — maybe more.

Residents of Salt Lake City, San Francisco and Albuquerque reported feeling a nuclear blast about 20 per cent less powerful in 1956.

The AEC told Las Vegas government officials and businessmen it has spent \$11 million on studying effects of ground tests. It said it believed the danger of water contamination, radiation in the air and earth should be small enough to warrant the test.

James E. Reeves, manager of the AEC Nevada operations office, said, "We are fully cognizant of the potential hazards involved... The scope of our testing is limited by our knowledge and understanding of what we can do safely."

He said the test is necessary for the national defense.

John A. Deane, a scientist who studies ground motion, said an earthquake April 8 near San Diego caused more than 100 nuclear tests than any other nuclear test so far.

Other scientists said underground tests have never been contaminated more than 150 feet away by a nuclear explosion, and that radiation has been released into the atmosphere only twice in underground tests, accidentally and in small amounts.

Gov. Paul Lammie said he had been assured by the AEC the proposed test received intense scrutiny and that an additional review confirmed the original findings.

But he added: "Despite the expressed by many Americans, should not be unheeded."

Robert Maheu, Hughes' chief executive officer for Nevada, issued a statement Wednesday formally asking the AEC to delay the test so independent studies can be made.

At a news conference Hughes' scientific adviser, John Meier, spokesman for an organization called Committee on Environmental Information, said the committee was worried about the test's effect on atmosphere and Davis dams.

Dr. Barry Commoner of Washington University, St. Louis, who heads the committee, said "In our view the AEC doesn't know enough about Hoover Dam to go ahead with this test."

He said the committee fears damage to buildings and release of radiation.

The AEC, he said, also has failed to provide its information for scrutiny of scientists, who might be able to offer suggestions.

Flashing Beacon Planned At Alfresco Road And Highway 27 Intersection

HEYBURN—A flashing signal beacon at the intersection of Highway 27 and Alfresco Road, long sought by safety-conscious citizens and officials in the community, will be installed by the State Highway Department, Sen. Don Loveland reported Wednesday.

Sen. Loveland, who worked with Sen. Mary Brooks on the project, was advised of the plan this week by Ellis Mathes, state highway engineer. The decision followed a public hearing Monday afternoon at the Heyburn school library attended by representatives of organizations and civic leaders.

Opinion was expressed that although this beacon will not solve the safety problem existing at the intersection, which has been the scene of several bad accidents in recent years, and is not what was first requested by them, still local residents approve any action which may lessen the existing dangers.

Burley Mayor Joe Peters reported a traffic activator, first sought by local residents, would cost approximately \$35,000.

The flashing signal beacon, which will be installed, will cost \$2,500 with the state and city of Burley to share the cost.

State Patrolman Charles Peugh said he supported the decision of the Highway Department not to install a red light on Highway 27 or reduce the 50 miles per hour speed limit, because it would be a "hardcore element."

U.S., Enemy Casualties Are Down

SAIGON (AP) — Fewer U.S. and enemy casualties were recorded in the Vietnam war last week, while the number of South Vietnamese troops killed increased.

The casualty pattern reflected the sporadic fighting across the country with no sustained ground action but a number of sharp clashes at various points. In its weekly summary, the U.S. Command said 297 Americans were killed in action last week, compared with 362 a week earlier. There were 1,459 Americans wounded last week, down more than 1,000 from the previous week.

Of the wounded last week, 736 required hospitalization. South Vietnamese headquarters said 380 government troops were killed last week, a sharp rise from 293 a week earlier. The number of wounded last week was 990, a small drop from 885 the previous week. Thirty government troops were reported missing or captured.

Ronald Reagan of California, 11 per cent; Eugene McCarthy, D-Minn., 6 per cent. Some 37 per cent voted for the bombing escalation.
