Hunter Rescued After Fall In Canyon

HANSEN — It took rescue workers and a helicopter about four hours to reach a Twin Falls man and get him to safety Saturday after he plunged about 200 feet over the wall of the Snake River canyon near here.



THERE'S A HELICOPTER IN this picture, but it isn't any easier to spot than was Jessie Grijalva, 21, when sheriff's officers directed a search for him Saturday. The helicopter was able to land at the canyon bottom where rescue workers placed Mr. Grijalva aboard. He fell about 250 feet into the canyon about 12:30 p.m. Saturday. It took Times-News Staff Writer Ruth Koonce Miller nearly an hour—and a pair of shoes later—to find the search area and capture this picture. Mr. Grijalva, not visible in this picture, was awaiting rescue about 150 feet from the canyon bottom. He was listed in "guarded" condition later in the day.

Modern Cowboy Is Not So Weak, Big Rodeo Winner Larry Mahan Proves

SEATTLE (AP)—Cowboys can be dumped, stomped, gored and busted—but they can't be stopped this side of a hearse.

Take Larry Mahan. Last July at St. Paul, Ore., a bruiser's neck tied on his foot and broke an instep bone. Larry took a few days off—to go deep sea fishing—and returned to the rodeo trail to win the World All-Around Cowboy championship and \$51,896, an all-time record.

I remember Johnny Tubbs of Mesquite refusing to take him because he had a broken neck. Wasn't he riding the saddle broncs every weekend?

And there's always Freckle Brown, now 47. The unbelievable Mr. Brown won the bull riding championship and broke his neck in 1952. Last year he was the world's fifth best man on a bull and at the National Finals Rodeo he stayed the night on Toronado, the first cowboy to clock a ride on this famous bull in seven years.

I guess they healed them selves."

Mahan picked up the nickname "Goldfinger" when he won 1948-50 and the championship in 1956. After his July mishap last year Larry looked like a poor choice to repeat, but he didn't worry about the foot "because it always land on my kester, anyway."

He won the bull riding title, placed third on saddle broncs and fourth on the barebacks. But the 50 grand was only part of Larry's income, which he augmented through endorsements and other interests. One is manufacturing a livestock trailer at Phoenix, where he and his wife, Darlene, plan to move with their two small children.

Expenses gobble about 50 percent of the gross and Internal Revenue must have its bite, but Larry says "I don't mind the income tax as long as I can keep on doing what I like for good money."

Arjanians make the big money possible for present day contestants. This weekend Larry expects to step aboard H head of explosive livestock at Prince George, B.C., and Seattle and next week things get hectic.

Flying his own Piper Comanche, Mahan will be in Bald, Tex. Thursday in San Diego, Friday afternoon; San Diego again Saturday night; Buckeye, Ariz. Sunday; Mesquite, Tex., Monday and then into Tulsa Tuesday for a five-day rodeo.

Excepting Freckles Brown, Larry thinks the peak years for a rodeo cowboy are from his late teens to early 20s. Mahan is 24 now and feels "I must take every advantage of the years. Right now I enjoy every minute and when I finally have to quit I hope it's because I'm tired of travel, not rodeo."

Like any athlete, the 58, 155-pound Mahan is limped on conditioning. Once when he thought he was in a slump he slipped away to a riding school in Canada and topped off 49 broncs in seven days.

After a tough day at the rodeo

the Oregon cowboy likes to follow dinner with a few pushups in his hotel room to loosen up the muscles, then a bath and off to bed—how many pushups, Larry?

"Oh, about 50."

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Johnson Has Warning For Top Officials

WASHINGTON (AP)—The White House informed top officials in the executive branch this week that President Johnson expects them to stay clear of precaution politics this year.

Sources said today Johnson aides made a series of phone calls to Cabinet departments to level officials' references to should not publicly take sides in the roll for the Democratic presidential nomination.

In some departments, meetings were called to impress officials with the President's thinking on the subject.

The White House would only refer inquiring newsmen to Johnson's March 31 speech withdrawing from the 1968 race. Attention was called specifically to this passage: "I have concluded that I should not permit the presidency to become involved in the partisan divisions that are developing in this political year."

Some department heads interpreted Johnson's reference to the presidency to mean only he would not become involved. They now have been informed he included all policy makers within the executive branch.

Before this clarifying word came from the White House, Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey got public endorsement from three Cabinet members: Secretary of Agriculture Orville W. Freeman, Secretary of Labor W. Willard White and the Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare.

Sen. Robert F. Kennedy was endorsed Thursday by Under-Secretary of Agriculture John A. Schmitzler.

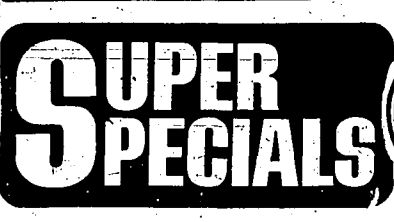

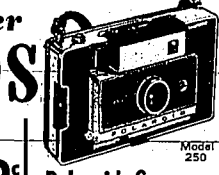

RECEIVES GRANT
MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — The University of Idaho Saturday has received a \$1,700 federal grant to help provide special training to state water and waste-water treatment plant operators.

The university, which along with the Idaho Department of Health will also pay \$11,700, the funds will pay for a special three-day short course to begin next February.

Officials said the course was being offered because of increasing demand for skilled water and waste-water treatment plant operators.

U.S., Soviets Join Forces Over Treasuries

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — The United States and the Soviet Union have joined forces to try to win over opposition to their treaty aimed at banning the spread of nuclear weapons.

The two powers made their appeals as the General Assembly's main political body opened debate Friday on the treaty worked out by the 17-nation disarmament committee in Geneva.

The treaty has brought objections from India, Brazil, Italy, Japan, West Germany and Communist China and France, both nuclear powers, have spurned the pact.

Debate was launched by U.S. Ambassador Arthur Goldberg and Soviet First Deputy Foreign Minister Vadim V. Kuznetsov.

Goldberg said the treaty will require more than any treaty our time to push back the fearful shadow of nuclear destruction.

He said the treaty is the step the world should take next — the endorsement of the treaty by the General Assembly.

Kuznetsov told the committee the treaty was essential "to the whole of mankind" and that the Soviet delegation calls upon the delegations of all member states "to approve it."

Among countries that became parties to the treaty, those with nuclear weapons will be bound not to transfer them to others and those without will be bound not to acquire or manufacture them.

Goldberg pledged that the United States would "readily share our knowledge and experience, acquired at great cost, concerning all aspects of the peaceful uses of nuclear energy with parties to the treaty."

He especially mentioned, explaining the aid endorsement of the treaty "will improve the atmosphere for peaceful settlement of other conflicts."

He declared that it was urgent because the opportunity might "never recur."

Kuznetsov said that when the Security Council acted to back up the treaty, the Soviet Union would state specifically that any country that committed or threatened aggression with nuclear weapons "must be aware that its actions are to be countered effectively by measures to which the United Nations charter to suppress the aggression or remove the threat of aggression."

Kuznetsov refrained from the usual Soviet attacks on West Germany and Communist China. He did not mention U.S. military action in Vietnam.

In a statement read for him at the start of the meeting, Secretary of State Dean Rusk expressed hope that all outstanding issues will soon be resolved, so that the treaty could be put into effect as soon as possible.

The next meeting will be Tuesday morning.

The book, "The Story of Alcatraz," was 92½ days late. Marvel borrowed it in 1943 when he was 12 years old.

Speaking in French to an international group of scientists, the pontiff aimed his appeal to the "entire human race."

The Pope's speech came a day after the latest underground nuclear test conducted in Nevada. Vatican sources insist that the tone of the speech was directly influenced by the Nevada test.

The Pope declared scientists bear responsibility for making weapons capable of destroying mankind.

He said endorsement of the treaty "will improve the atmosphere for peaceful settlement of other conflicts."

Demonstrations and Loyalty Day parades across the nation Saturday climaxed a two-day, nationwide protest against the Vietnam war and racism.

The Loyalty Day marches, annual events in many places, were sponsored by veterans' groups.

In New York City, thousands of protesters marched to a Central Park "stop the war" rally to hear speakers including Mrs. Martin Luther King Jr. and Mayor John V. Lindsay. Sponsors of the antiwar rally said they expected 100,000 to attend.

The annual Loyalty Day parade, which sponsors said drew 8,000 marchers and which newsmen said drew 5,000, broke up about an hour before the Central Park rally began and ended about 10 blocks south of the park. The parade was a memorial to the late Francis Cardinal Spellman.

There was no major confrontation between the protesters and the paraders. Police prevented one possible clash when they stopped a radical peace group of about 400 from staging an "anti-imperialist" march up Fifth Avenue along a route that might have crossed the Loyalty Day parade. In addition, fifty flags were taken from the parade by a small group of youngsters carrying American flags and another group carrying Viet Cong flags.

Nearly 100 had been arrested by 3:30 p.m.

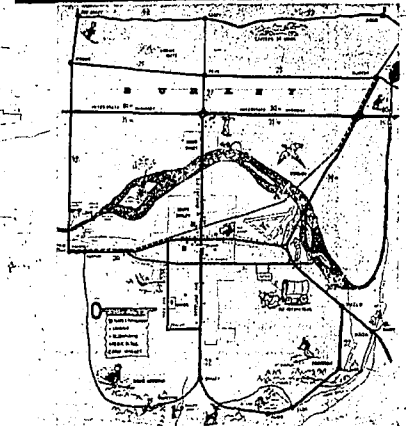

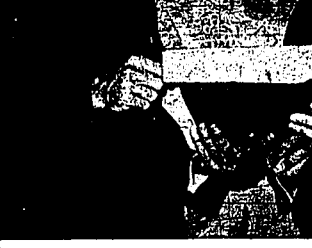

NATO Is Given Three-Stage Plan

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP)—Belgium has given the North Atlantic Treaty Organization a three-stage plan to reduce the level of armed forces in Europe, NATO sources said Friday. There was no immediate comment from the United States or other major powers on the plan, and diplomats emphasized it would require much discussion. The plan calls in its first phase for a freeze on the number of men and the quantity of armaments within an area of Europe. The area's size would depend on whether the Soviet Union itself is included or the plan applies only to Eastern European countries.

Bermuda Declares Emergency

HAMILTON, Bermuda (AP)—Bermuda's government declared a state of emergency today after an outbreak of burning and looting by predominantly Negro gangs in the second straight night of violence in the island's capital. The executive council sent 300 armed troops of the Bermuda Regiment into Hamilton's poorer section to reinforce nearly 250 riot police.

Police said the rioters had dispersed by 3 a.m. after an 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. curfew was ordered until peace returns. All fires were reported under control.

Meanwhile, the predominantly white governing United Bermuda party—UBP—denounced what it called inflammatory statements in the last few days and the predominantly Negro Progressive Labor party—PLP—accused the UBP and Hamilton police of racism.

The two parties will contest an election in mid-May under new election rules in the British colony giving the PLP greater influence. The PLP wants to restrict immigration of the English, who the party claims keep Negroes out of better jobs. It also wants independence for the island.

Five persons were injured, one seriously, and 15 were arrested, police said. One of the injured was John Patton, deputy leader of the UBP, who suffered a broken arm apparently when he tried to intervene.

U.S. tourists fled to their hotels and downtown bars and restaurants closed as the rioters, many moving around in cars for hit-and-run raids, set cars and buildings afire.

An estimated 300 youths gathered near a furniture store which had been set ablaze for the third time within 48 hours. The offices of the government's Transport Control Board were extensively damaged. The estimate of damage for two nights climbed to a quarter of a million dollars.

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Board Expected To Oppose Diversion Study

By **BUD JORGENSEN** (AP) — The Idaho Water Resource Board is expected in the coming week to take a firm stand against any study now of water diversion to southwest states.

The agency is expected to urge completion of water studies throughout the West before the question of diversion is considered.

These studies, an agency spokesman says, are likely to show that the southwest states are not now making the best use of the water they already have.

The board is expected to spell out its position at a meeting in Caldwell Wednesday.

Dr. Robert R. Lee, director of the board's staff, has drafted a proposed policy statement saying there should be no study until sources and needs have been identified.

"What they (the board) will probably say," Lee said, "is we're sympathetic to the needs of the Southwest, but these have yet to be identified."

The board has under contract organizations preparing studies on Idaho's status of water and potential needs.

A state water inventory by the University of Idaho is expected to be completed by the end of September. Related studies on resources and needs are under way and are scheduled to be finished by the end of September 1969. Lee said the 10 other contiguous western states have similar studies in progress and they all should be completed by 1972.

Lee said he anticipates these studies will show southwestern states are not short of water now and are wasting water.

Businessmen, politicians, industrialists and farmers from the Southwest are grow-oriented, Lee said, adding he believes much of the clamor from that area for more water stems from a desire to create a potential for far-off growth.

Lee said there is a good argument for the contention that the large metropolitan areas of the Southwest, such as Los Angeles, should not grow beyond a certain population level and the growth should be dispersed throughout other areas of the West.

Lee stresses that the Water Resource Board is not necessarily opposed to any particular water diversion plan, but wants to wait until the needs are identified.

Lee, at a meeting earlier this month of the Federation of Rocky Mountain States, opposed a resolution to involve the federation in studies of water diversion.

The federation action followed presentation by a Denver engineer, Lewis G. Smith, of a proposal to divert water from Canada's far north through existing river systems to all Rocky Mountain and coastal states, while the federation did not endorse this plan, it said such diversion plans should be studied.

Another section of the policy statement the Water Resource Board will consider Wednesday endorses the Western States' Water-Council as the organization to study water needs.

Lee says he believes the seven-state federation should not be involved in water matters and the Western States Water Council, with representation from all 11 western states, is the organization that should be studying all water supply proposals.

The proposed policy statement also says other means of obtaining fresh water, such as desalinization, should be given consideration.

Lee said the channels of rivers in some areas would not hold the volumes they propose.

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

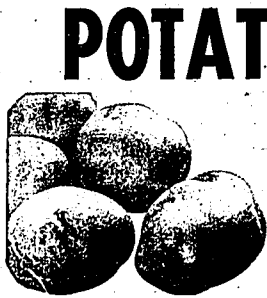

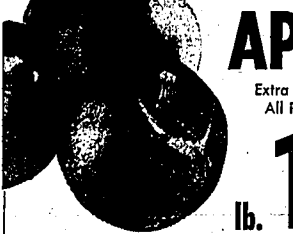

Employees Of Market Catch Four Robbers

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (AP) — A 25-year-old supermarket manager became enraged when five bandits took \$1,113 while his mother was on duty as a clerk.

Four of the men surrendered and lay face down, hands behind their heads on the busy roadside of Interstate 95, under a tree held by McClary and police officers.

A fourth man, whom police said was wounded by McClary's M1 Carbine during the chase, was found an hour later crouching in a nearby palm-tree thicket.

Big boy Frank Warren, 19, who drove his own 1968 Mustang as the chase car, while McClary sniped at the car tires, used one of the bandit's pistols to help stand guard. Warren's left forearm was slashed by windshield glass that shattered when he hit a bullet during the chase.

"They were firing at us with four guns. We saw pistols kicked out of every window," McClary said.

Police said McClary was deeply scarred about wounds from Jerome Holland, 17, who was wanted by Miami police for robbery and jailbreak.

"I was just aiming for their tires," McClary told police. "But why did he risk his life to catch the bandits?"

Negro Leader Urges Self-Help Project

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Negro businessman who opposes the "People's Campaign" urged Saturday a "self-help" economic development program for Negroes, and asked for public and private loans to help finance the project.

Dr. Thomas W. Mathew, who is a string of small business owners in New York and Watts, employing about 600 people, suggested \$100 million in federal loans at 2 per cent interest. The program, he said, in view of the alternative insurance losses from fires, loss of business, increased cost of deterioration of cities and the cost of sustaining police and armed forces.

Mathew, 43-year-old head of the National Economic Growth and Reconstruction Organization—"NEGRO"—opposes such a demand for the "People's Campaign" as a guaranteed annual income on grounds that they increase Negro dependency, and don't attack the psychological problems that are the legacy of slavery.

He opposes increased welfare programs for the same reason. "Dreams and the view from the mountaintop are nourished by the federal government," he said, "and legislation quoting phrases spoken by the Negro leader who originated the Poor People's Campaign."

But in the view of the black and ghetto millions of children need and employ and train "the so-called hard-core unemployed."

Negotiators Inch Toward Tax Increase

WASHINGTON (AP) — House negotiators are inching their way toward agreement on a bill that would raise income taxes by \$10 billion and reduce authorized long-range government spending by about \$20 billion.

If the proposal passes through the House, it would begin the bit with increased holding about midyear. The first instalment of spending cuts probably about \$5 billion, would come during the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Agreement is not certain, but there has been an informal meeting of minds, both in Congress and the Johnson administration, on the rough figures. There is great discussion on the details.

Finally, there is no assurance yet that the House would pass such a measure—and without fair assurance it may never be brought up.

But the increasingly urgent situation calls for both U.S. and foreign fiscal authorities for this country to get its domestic and international accounts in order given the economy-tax package its best chance in months.

Council Told Israel Will Hold Parade

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Israel made clear in the U.N. Security Council Saturday it will hold a military parade through Jerusalem on its 20th anniversary Thursday despite a complaint from Jordan and objections from Secretary-General U. Thant.

Israel spoke out as Pakistan and India privately sought support for an intended resolution that would have the Isolation Council call on Israel not to hold the parade.

Israel Ambassador Yoel Teohach told the council, "Israel forces are free to move, to act and to parade as they see fit within the area held under the cease-fire for the 1967 Arab-Israeli war, which includes the occupied Jordanian sector of Jerusalem."

Jordanian Ambassador Muhammad Ali Effendi, whose complaint had brought the council together, said the parade would pass through the Jordanian sector of Jerusalem. He charged that it was "part of the Israeli plan to bring the complete annexation of Jerusalem in Jerusalem. They are holding out the military parade."

Students Responsible For Columbia Sit-In Denounced

NEW YORK (AP) — The stemming out of Harlem riots in Board of Trustees of Columbia University Saturday denounced the "small minority" of students who brought academic work at the prestigious institution to a halt and arrested the student leader, Graydon Kirk, in his refusal to grant them amnesty.

Dr. Kirk then summoned the university's 800 faculty members with professional status to an unprecedented Sunday meeting to discuss the situation created by the student sit-in. There are 3,111 teachers at the 27,500-student institution.

Rebel students, numbering between 200 and 400, were still holding out with Negro students and Negro outsiders barricaded in the Hamilton Hall. They should "call on Israel not to hold the military parade."

The student demonstrators, holding a total of five campus buildings, rejected a faculty-proposed peace formula to end the disturbances. They were holding out for amnesty.

They have succeeded in getting the university to suspend the constitution of a gym in Morningside Park, building that the school's building would deprive Harlem children of play space.

Friday's much-protessed hydrogen bomb explosion, the most powerful ever detonated in the United States, did not cause any major damage, AEC said Friday.

Erupting with a force of more than a million tons of TNT, the explosion set shock waves rolling through the ground for hundreds of miles.

The blast carved out a cavern as deep as Hoover Dam, but did not contaminate air or water, cause any earthquakes or cause any major damage, AEC said Friday.

Senior officers were conducting lectures on communications, mob psychology and other phases of riot control, Johnson said.

State and local police officers were also attending the classes.

Some 1,000 army guardsmen from southwest Idaho were at Gowen Field this weekend for the two-week summer camp.

The men were using the full range of available equipment, Johnson, the liaison officer of the first squadron, said.

Beyond this, I would, of course, be the first to say that service as vice president is an excellent preparation for the presidency."

Gov. Ronald Reagan of California, after an address at the University of Colorado: "I'm hardly overwhelmed with surprise. This makes no change in the presidential race. I would, of course, be the first to say that service as vice president is an excellent preparation for the presidency."

Former Gov. George Wallace of Alabama, campaigning in Texas as a third-party candidate: "I don't think it will affect my candidacy in Texas or anywhere else."

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill that would regulate surface mining and set land reclamation standards goes before the Senate Interior Committee this week.

The committee will seek public view Tuesday and Wednesday on the proposal. The Utah Mining Association has sent a letter to chairman Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., the sponsor, opposing the measure.

Paul Hittle, secretary of the Utah mining group, said the Jackson bill would let the interior secretary "make recommendations to Congress last week."

Clark Rules Out Assassin Conspiracy

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Attorney Gen. Ramsey Clark ruled Saturday there is no significant evidence that the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King "goes beyond the single actor" who fired the fatal shot.

Clark made the statement during a news conference here in reply to a question concerning the reports of a possible conspiracy of southern businessmen who might have been involved in the King slaying.

"We could make a long, long list—as long as the imagination of man runneth—of people who could possibly be involved in this," Clark said, "but there's no significant evidence that it goes beyond the single actor."

The attorney general did not mention the name sought in connection with the slaying, James Earl Ray, by name and did not elaborate on the investigation except to say that he still feels confident an arrest will be made soon.

"I was hopeful an arrest would be obtained before now," he said. "The individual being sought is in a very difficult situation and it will be difficult for him to avoid arrest."

Clark was in Atlanta to speak at an Emory University Law Day luncheon.

Asked if he thought the slaying of King would result in effective gun legislation, Clark said it is "incredible that it has taken this long to obtain such legislation. However, he said he would not "describe a direct causal relationship" between the slaying and the legislation.

"I hope to see action on this legislation in the Senate next week," he said.

Clark was asked if he would press for the nomination of Ray by the Southern Christian Leadership conference on Washington in connection with his People's Campaign not be held.

He replied, "This depends on what you mean by a march. It is a question of timing. There will be tension in our cities for some time. It is important that self-discipline be displayed in order to avoid the risk of violence. And violence will impede the progress of this country."

Cryder Clears 15 Feet In Pole Vault

Borah Claims SIC Title; Maughan And Gunther Become Double Winners

Twin Falls' Scott Cryder posted just exactly half the total pushed the all-time Idaho pole vault back to 15 feet off the Borah Lions vault with the Southern Idaho Conference track and field championship in another display of power Friday afternoon.

Maughan, making his first appearance in any kind of SIC competition, made his presence felt by taking second with 3 1/2

points, just exactly half the total pushed by the rampaging Lions. Cryder, the first Idaho prepster to clear 14 feet might have become the all-time best-of-100 legs boy included—in reaching 15 feet. He narrowly missed on his attempt at 15.4. Cryder's effort was the only one allowed to stand for a conference record although Del Ray Maughan of Borah, Smith of Caldwell and

Gunther of Meridian all bettered existing marks. They couldn't be allowed due to excessive wind.

Maughan won both hurdle events in the fine times of 14.1 in the highs and 19.1 in the lows. In the preliminaries he ripped 84 points and enough power to beat Don Miller in the 100-yard dash in 9.6—two-tenths under the existing record—and Gunther, just 221 in the broadjump—an inch over the current standard. Needless to say, the win was at their back.

The wind also was at the back of Cryder in the pole vault but the rule book states that the event does not come under established events. Cryder, who established three conference records in as many years and placed third as a freshman, lost all competition at 12 feet, 6 inches. He cleared 14.8 on his second try and 14.4 and 14.8 before missing the first time at 15 feet. From there he went to 15.4 and nearly made it on his first.

Maughan and Meridian's Gunther were the only boys able to come up with double-victory, and two defending individual champions were unseated.

Maughan was superb in the hurdles and probably would have given the records a strong scare on a still day. He was particularly impressive in the high hurdle preliminaries when he clocked the 13.9. In the finals, Twin Falls senior Von Wells pushed Maughan, winding up with 14.2. Maughan's competition in the lows was Capital's Hepp, who is a 13.3 clocking.

Gunther took the broadjump at 22.1 and the high jump at 5-0. He also took third in the pole vault by spearing Meridian's second-place finish with 15 points.

Smith's Stan Smith lost his laurels in the shout to Pocatello sophomore Ken Monroe. Smith came out of the preliminaries led by Pocatello lead. He was 51-11 1/2 while Jay Ulrich of Twin Falls was 51-11 and Monroe was 51-10.

Monroe uncorked his winning 52.5. In the finals while Smith and Ulrich did not improve, the Pocatello champion, Dean Kent Gierich of Highland who led his hometown crowd to Caldwell's second-place finish with 15 points in the time of 2:07.

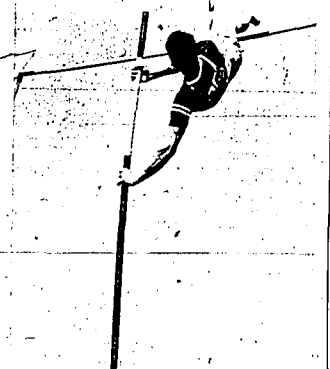

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Ellis ops Heavyweight Champi

Boxer Awarded Split Decision Over Quarry

OKLAND (AP) — Jimmy Ellis of Louisville, Ky., boxing with cautious skill, scored a split 15-round decision over California's Jerry Quarry Saturday night and won the World Boxing Association heavyweight championship.

Ellis, 37, displayed superior boxing ability in this climactic final of an elimination series which began last August to replace the dethroned Cassius Clay, or Muhammad Ali.

A round of thunderous boos in the Oakland Coliseum Arena from the estimated 14,000 fans echoed when announcer Jimmy Lennon shouted the split decision.

Referee Elmer Costa scored it 7-6 for Ellis, Judge Fred Apostolli had it 10-5 for the Louisville fighter while Judge Rudy Ortega had it even at 8-8. The Associated Press scored it 8-6 for Ellis.

There were no knockdowns and there were times when the fighting was far less than explosive. But the tension always remained because of Quarry's renowned punching power and Ellis' quick hands and good firing power himself.

It was only the second defeat for the 27-year-old Quarry from Bellflower, a suburb of Los Angeles, in 32 fights. Veteran Eddie Machen beat him in July, 1962.

Ellis, using his four-inch reach advantage to good purpose, got away quickly to win the early rounds while Quarry, from the 11th on tried desperately to catch his opponent's point here.

"I fought my fight," Ellis said. "He hit me a couple of good shots but it didn't get me out of commission. I hurt him a couple of times with right uppercuts. He's a good fighter."

Angelo Dundee, Ellis' manager, said his fighter would be an active champion. "Line 'em up," Dundee said of the other heavyweight contenders. "We'll fight them all."

There was no serious damage to either fighter. The 28-year-old Ellis, a former sparring partner of Clay, had his left eye cut in the first round and retaliated by opening a slight cut near Quarry's right eye in the second round.

The corner men patched up both wounds and neither cut was reopened. Probably the hardest punch came in the seventh. Quarry, who had been trying to lure Ellis into a corner where he could get him at close quarters, dropped his hands in disgust.

Ellis refused to accept the bait. A moment later Ellis accepted with violence. He connected with a right hand that landed to the jaw that obviously shook up Irish Jerry.

Quarry's best round was the 13th when he caught Ellis with a hard left hook and followed with a vicious dig to the body that had Ellis hanging on and clinching during most of the remaining moments of the round.

Quarry, noted for failure to follow up an advantage, did it again and backed off after several wild swings and Ellis recovered his pole.

Dundee apparently gave Ellis instructions to stay out of danger in the final two rounds. In the 15th, Quarry tried to get over a sneak left hook as they touched hands, but missed and from then on Quarry wiggled stalked Ellis who danced and kept out of trouble.

This was Ellis' 11th straight victory as a heavyweight. In 31 fights, he has won 28 and lost 5. The five defeats came when he fought as a middleweight.

Quarry, who also had a 10-fight winning streak entering the fight, has won 28 times and fought four draws and knocked out 15 opponents.

The fight was televised nationally by ABC-TV as well as around the world via satellite, but was blacked out in the Oakland-San Francisco area.

The fight, which meant \$125,000 to each boxer, was recorded as his first loss in all states except four. Joe Frazer of Philadelphia, who declined to enter the elimination series, is recognized as the champion by the New York, Illinois, Maine and Massachusetts state boxing commissions.

Quarry reached the final fight after defeating ex-champion Floyd Patterson by a 12-round decision last Oct. 29 and a 12th-round knockout over Thad Spencer Feb. 3.

Ellis, who lost to Lotus Martin in nine rounds last August and won in 12 over Oscar Bonavena last December.

It doesn't make any difference what you talk about in sports, it all goes back to speed.

This was proved again Friday when T. W. L. Falls' Scott Crayder whipped over 15 feet — and almost made 15-4 — during a vault pole event of the South American and Conference meet.

It has long been said that Hovey Crayder, an 11-foot sprinter, would be a 15-foot vaulter the minute he could develop 10.5 seconds and get into the world class at 10 feet. With the wind at his back, Friday, the Brunson, S.C., hurdler perfect the way to 15 feet — missing that height on the first leap. He made 14, 14.4 and 14.8 without any trouble.

Referring to the wind, Don Crayder, Scott's father, noted during the competition, "I just told Scott we found out what's been wrong with his vaulting." Asked if speed helps, Crayder held his thumb and index finger a little way apart and smiled "a little."

But true to this motif of all mixed up athletic events, there is another ramification. Crayder is breaking in another in a line of new poles. With the new fiber glass, a vaulter must advance to stiffer products as his ability to bend the more flexible more and more. For instance, if Crayder now used the standard glass pole he started with four years ago, he would never get over the bar. That pole also would be shattered on every attempt.

Although he had acknowledged the definite help of the wind, Crayder said "I think the (bend of the) pole has helped more than the wind." He was bending the new one well and since it is a stiffer model when the pole uncoils from that bend it unleashes much more twisting action.

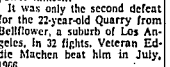
But it also brings up the old question about the chicken and the egg. Crayder have bent the new pole as well without the extra speed provided by the wind at his back?

The wind, of course, remains academic. The record is Crayder's, the track rule book says that the pole vault is a non-wind-aided event, probably under the theory that during the time the wind causes enough adjustments in style and technique to offset any advantage it would provide in speed down the run way. For it is a matter of record that at least three 13-foot potential vaulters in Fiji, who had couldn't come closer than a foot of that mark and they all blamed it on the wind.

And that brings up the point that if the wind didn't give Scott the speed to be a great pole vaulter, he certainly gave him that acrobatic reflex ability that made him a very good one. Crayder's body control is fantastic, enabling him to get into that type of condition that he has run into yet. Out of dirt runways to rain-swept track fields he is always at least approximately his best.

The 15-foot vault also very probably did another thing for Crayder. Although Idaho State, Oregon, Oregon State, Washington State, etc., have been correlated with the pole vault for a long time — would you believe three years? — no one has come within the same promise of long green in specified amounts. That probably is because 14 foot high pole vaulters aren't really that rare in this day and age. But 15 feet is another story.

There is also value in the 15-foot leap in the fabley business of vaulting for Crayder's mind. Vaulters think in terms of three inches, because that's the usual margin of error. So 14 feet is a big mental barrier, the next is 14.3, then 14.6, etc. Once attained, these heights come much easier mentally the rest of the career.

Fashions Change-Not Diamonds

Fashions in weddings, in gowns and in customs change, but most brides still choose a diamond for their engagement ring.

The engaged couple usually chooses the ring together and young people today often are frank about discussing cost.

It's always a good idea to get the advice of an expert before choosing a diamond but here are some things to look for.

Size alone does not determine the value of a diamond. Color, cut and clarity also are factors. Diamonds come in carat weights. There are 100 points to a carat, but while it would logically seem a 50-pound diamond would be a half carat stone, the weight may vary by as much as six points and still be referred to as half a carat. It is important therefore, to check weight by the exact number.

The best "color" for a diamond is for it to be colorless.

Clarity refers to the relative fineness of the stone from such things as carbon spots.

Cut—the shaping and arrangement of the facets—is what gives the diamond its sparkle.

A solitaire — a single large stone — is more valuable than several small stones of the same weight.



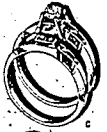

This envelope is then placed in a larger one for addressing and mailing. If the guests are to be invited to a reception, a small card detailing time and place are enclosed, with RSVP. If there is to be a reception only for family, it's proper to enclose an At Home card, on the same style paper, with the couple's new address on it. The proper wording of the invitation if both parents are alive and together, is as follows: Mr. and Mrs. Richardson Roberts request the honor of your presence at the marriage of their daughter

Sara Anne to Mr. Mills Standish Elliot on Saturday, the eighth of June at twelve o'clock. Church of the Transgressor Middletown, Oklahoma. If only one parent is living, he or she alone extends the invitation. In the same form. If the bride's parents are divorced, the invitation is issued in the name of the mother, whether she has remarried or not. If the bride's parents are separated but not divorced, the invitation would be extended as follows:

Mrs. Richardson Roberts and Richardson Roberts. Guests accepting or declining the invitation should also use the third-person formal, in similar style: Mr. and Mrs. Jonathan Briggs accept with pleasure the kind invitation of Mr. and Mrs. Richardson Roberts at the marriage of their daughter Sara Anne to Mr. Mills Standish Elliot

Send Out Thank You Notes Quickly

When it comes to thank-you notes, there's a very simple rule of etiquette. It doesn't matter so much how you phrase your note; it's the speed with which you send it off, that shows your good manners, as well as your gratitude. 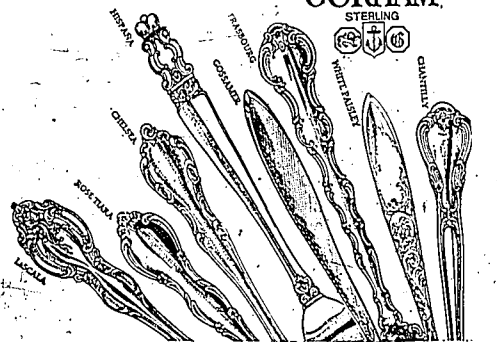

Plot Future Costs To Meet Budget

The household budget—blissful or hant for the newbride?—whichever way you regard it, it's a must; otherwise there's financial chaos.

The time for anticipatory h—sing is well before the wedding, so there's time to adjust to the fact that he always takes cabs when it rains, and that she wants to have her hair done weekly.

Prepare for these revelations by sitting down together with a big sheet of paper. Noting the income is a simple matter. The future expenses are the greater difficulty.

Start with rent as a fixed expense. Food is a bit difficult, but take a figure representing what each of you currently spends as single people, and cut it back about 30 per cent.

Don't forget, as one young couple did, to allow for lunches, unless you pack them at home, and sometimes rising young executives don't go for the picnic lunch.

Operational activities fall into several categories: cost of running and maintaining a car; gas, electricity and phone bills; insurance on household goods and health policies (unless carried by the employer), and cleaning and repair bills.

Except for the insurance figure, these will be difficult to anticipate until housekeeping actually begins.

The clothing estimate should be a modest one because presumably the two have stocked their wardrobe in advance of the wedding.

If income is limited, keep contributions to a minimum the first year, one dollar each to given charities.

The biggest gaping hole in the budget is for recreation and miscellaneous spending. Try not to push too many items under this category. Cigarettes and the daily paper are miscellaneous, but items for the party and things like anniversary presents should be saved for from dollars saved in other categories.

Last, but certainly not least, contribute to the piggy bank weekly, no matter how little. This rainy day fund will find many uses, no matter how carefully you plan.

Wise Bride Learns Labels At Start

On becoming a bride: learn your labels. And know what they mean. No one ruins clothes faster than a bride who doesn't follow the washing and ironing instructions on garment tags. It's true that tags may seem confusing. Durable-press fabrics, for example, are identified by a variety of labels — including "Never-Press," "Super-Crease," and "Primatized."

Whatever name your durable press fabric carries, chances are the fabric will benefit from a touch-up with an iron after laundering.

This year the majority of men's shirts will be durable-press. With proper washing care, these shirts should require ironing only around seams where slight puckering may occur.

Remove the shirt just after the washing machine's rinse cycle and before the spin cycle. The shirt can then be tumble-dried, but it must be removed immediately after the drying process. It's important to remember that the durable-press process bakes out wrinkles by using high temperatures. Conversely, if shirts are not removed immediately after being dried, wrinkles will be baked in.

For the body of the shirt, a cool iron and a lightning-fast pressing will do the job.

When ironing try using spray sizing instead of dampening the shirt. Magic spray sizing will restore original "body" which tends to wash out in the laundry. A little sizing sprayed on shirt collars will go a long way toward perk-ing up the collars without making them uncomfortably stiff and scratchy.

Sizing also contains a special lubricant that makes iron glide smoothly. This too will reduce ironing time.

These techniques, combined with durable-press fabrics, should enable new homemakers to approach ironing days with a lighter step — and work load.

Receptions? Rentals Rush To Rescue

Until they've streamlined home wedding receptions down to the point where such things as presentable, disposable dinnerware and glassware are in the logistics of carrying off the festivities are bound to be hectic.

The Impassario in charge of planning, purchasing, storing, cleaning and coordinating is usually the bride's mother. In fact, it's Mom who's responsible for the vast clean-up while the honeymoon is under way, and who turns to renting what is needed, according to A to Z Rental, Inc., a large national system of general rental outlets.

"What is needed? Rental centers throughout the country report that requirements may range from a few special pieces not found in the average buffet — demitasse spoons, large chafing dishes — to virtually a "heat-and-serve" operation complete with china, tables, linens on up to a bar and a dance floor.

In the last few years, the services of A to Z Rental Centers have mushroomed to the point where there is almost no limit to rental possibilities. A complete sound system with mike and speaker, for instance, rents for about 7.50 a day, a graceful pair of candelabra, \$3 to \$4. The bar, by the way, rents at about \$6 a day, and the dance floor costs \$6 for each 3-by-6-foot section.

Basic essentials are, of course, less expensive. Silver plate flatware runs seven cents a piece. The most expensive chinaware piece might be a tea set at 50 cents a day.

The advantages of renting are both practical and psychological. Practical in that it is a fast and inexpensive way of buying party service items of types and quantities that won't be used often enough to justify the purchase because it saves a lot of work and stress.

And if features are less-than-perfect, try posing with your face at a slight angle to the camera, with head up and chin lifted.

Expressive Eyes
Eyes laden with false lashes and over-stated styling are not suitable for a bridal portrait. Instead, begin by emphasizing natural sparkle. Many professional models achieve this look (and refresh tired eyes) with Visine decongestant eye drops before applying make-up. The drops are said to work visibly while you watch and restore whiteness in less than a minute. Be especially careful in applying eye make-up if you wear glasses. The lenses of your glasses enlarge the eye area, so you need the barest minimum

of definition. In most cases, the frames of your glasses will provide enough emphasis.

Feminine Hands
For relaxed, graceful hands, try a trick that the models use. Before the picture is snapped, lift both hands high into the air to ease tension and minimize prominent veins. Then return hands to position and clasp them lightly, slightly angled for a slender look. Repeat this procedure often.

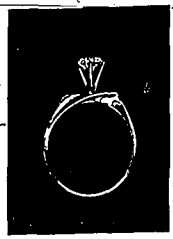

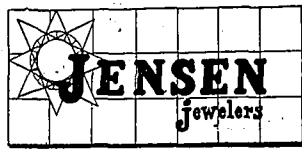

Bride Can Make Own Dress Cheaper

When a bride-to-be decides to make her own wedding gown, her reason is usually that she can't find the kind of dress at the price she's willing to pay. If she sews her own, she can make a gown for as little as \$30 or as much as \$150, in the top bracket, she might create a gown of silk and worsted, with a lace bolero, and a curved train. Her headpiece could be a matching head bow of lace and silk, attached to yards of filmy illusion tulle.

The original cost of the fabric, the amount of lace used, and the length of the train are factors in increasing or decreasing the price of the gown.

Of the preferred fabrics, girls favor silk linen, silk broadcloth, rayon and silk mixtures in a twill weave, and acetate and rayon combinations to look like satin, faille, or a silky ribbed material.

Laces vary from delicate silks to heavy cotton and wool. Lace is easiest to handle when completely underlined or lined. A lively finish for the neckline, sleeve or hem of the gown would be a scalloped edged lace.

Generally speaking, brides-to-be who sew their own gowns choose simple lines, and don't get into the intricate task of lace, rhinestone or seed pearl inserts, which are best left to the professional seamstress.

If a fairly large crowd is to be invited you will no doubt need to hire extra chairs and dishes, order a cake, canapes and borrow a punch bowl, unless you own a large one. If a caterer is doing the job these chores will be his, but if you have hired a couple to assist

you, the small details are up to you. You will need to arrange for music, flowers and the vases to put them in. If you must work out the menu, and if the food is to be prepared in your kitchen, that too requires an early start. You must estimate how much food you will need for every guest. The simplest wedding will require considerable help in the kitchen. The bride's mother can't be expected to prepare food and drink with all the other responsibilities she will undertake. Unless the house is large and there is a great deal of help available at low cost, it may be easier on the budget to hold the reception out of the home or order everything from a caterer, who will bring his own assistants and clean-up squad.

What sort of rules of etiquette are in effect for the second wedding?

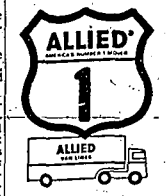
Good taste presumes that the second ceremony be simpler, whether the pair be divorced or widowed.

Either a civil ceremony or a simple home wedding is correct. Some couples are married in the chapel of a church, but it's best to make sure of its availability. If one party has been divorced, some denominations will not permit re-marriages within the sanctuary in that case.

If either couple has children old enough to attend the wedding, it's best to ask them their feelings. If the divorce proceedings were acrimonious or if the children are bitter about the re-

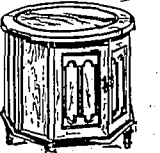
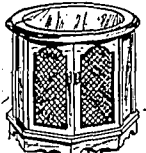
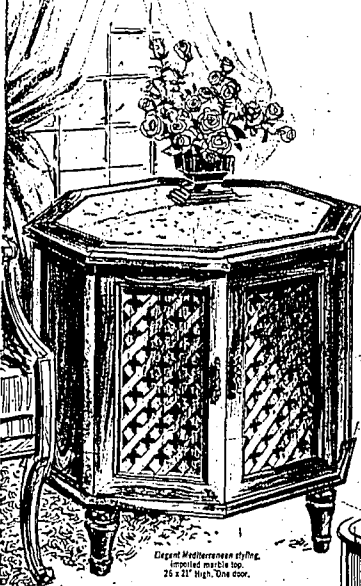

Clothing Safety Features Noted By County Agent

SHOSHONE—Safety features of children's clothing deserve attention, Mary Lou Ruby, home economics agent of Blaine-Camden-Lincoln Counties, reminded parents this week. They are particularly necessary in spring when boys and girls play out-of-doors.

A child's clothing should show against the background, the agent said. If outer garments are made in colors that attract attention, such as red and yellow, the youngster will be more readily seen by motorists. His clothing will serve as protection. Leave belts and bows at home when children go out to play. They are an annoyance to the child just learning to dress. Belts that do not remain tied are a nuisance and a safety hazard. Little girls like to play fir-awings where belts may become tangled and cause accidents. Collars on children's play clothes may cause them to stumble and fall. See that collars are securely fastened. Better yet, have none at all.

Now that paper clothes are coming on the market, mothers will be wise to see that they are fireproof. Remember that washing-of-paper-clothing removes the fireproof finish. Paper clothes are intended to be worn only until soiled and then discarded.

For other helpful suggestions on buying or making children's clothes, read the PNW Bulletin, "Buying Children's Clothing." These bulletins are available free at your Consumer Education Center, the Extension Service Office, reports Miss Ruby.

Long Weekend Follows Middle Fork Fly-In

 It was just over a week ago when I received an invitation to spend the weekend on the famous Salmon River. The invitation included a flight into the back country a hundred times or more; and a two night stay at the Flying B Ranch, a rustic retreat which looks more like a slice of the Old West than a picture of Ole Paint riding into the sunset.

Needless to say I snapped at the invitation like a stretched roling after his favorite food. And from that point on, I was hooked.

Not being the back country type, I really didn't know quite what to expect . . . but I was determined to go. I don't hunt or fish — but I do take pictures, and I felt that the trip would be a natural for both black and white and color slides. So it was set. I was to leave Friday afternoon, by air, from Twin Falls.

Friday afternoon the clouds over Twin Falls were few, and the sky seemed friendly. I waited at the airport for a Nevada pilot who was to fly me into the ranch. And in the distance, toward Nevada, I could see a speck of shiny metal catching the sunlight. And it gradually grew larger. The pilot landed his Cessna 180 at the Twin Falls

and taxied to where I was waiting. We'll go in the other direction, the runway rapidly. And as something in my mind seemed to rise to meet us, I was ushered into the kitchen. The other way, I was to learn, and we leveled off just before the stove with legs piled along side because a steeper flight path sun filtering through the gray was the first thing I remember seeing. The second thing was that all that food.

MAGIC VALLEY PORTRAIT . . . Proper Credit Provides Real Service, Manager of Shoshone Bank Believes

SHOSHONE — Ferry C. Hadlock, Shoshone Manager of First Security Bank, lives an extremely active life with various interests. He chose banking for his profession because he finds it interesting though other jobs have tempted him financially.

"A great service can be given through proper credit," Mr. Hadlock states, "and the importance of proper credit is vital to national economy, and to the individual progress."

One of the most interesting phases of the banking business, the manager states, is "the creation of money through loans. Every time we loan a dollar it increases 10 times. We are permitted to loan 70 per cent of our deposits, according to federal law."

Thus he explains some of the interesting phases of his work and states it seems quite inevitable that he should wind up in a sheep area, for his father owned and loved a band of sheep boys and his own child, he was the oldest of seven children and had numerous responsibilities, among them cooking, which he still enjoys.

Though he was skeptical about moving to a small town when asked to take over the Shoshone bank, Mr. Hadlock said he has learned to enjoy this type of living, whereas a great deal of stress is found and where his children, he feels, have even greater opportunity through leadership and participation.

One of the "fringes" benefits he has found in Shoshone is learning about the sheep business.

"I feel it is a romantic work in itself. There is a lot to be learned in the sheep business, and explaining the process of preparing the lamb for fat or feeder sale. There were 150,000 head of sheep in Lincoln County a number of years ago. Today there are only 15,000."

Mr. Hadlock said he has given his younger life in an agricultural area, he "loves the farmers and appreciates the work they do for the pay they receive, and is concerned over the future of the small farms."

Mr. Hadlock became manager of Shoshone First Security Bank in 1951, coming from Blackfoot where he was assistant manager. He began working for the bank in Blackfoot in 1946 as head bookkeeper and then became senior teller and time-wait manager.

During his stay at Shoshone, deposits at the bank have increased 50 per cent. There are seven persons working in the bank besides the manager and he said they are all exceptional.

THE SEARCH FOR THE GIRL WITH THE BLUE EYES
By Jess Stearn

This latest study by reporter Jess Stearn, author of the best-selling "Edgar-Cayce: The Sleeping Prophet," will be ridiculed by skeptics and critics of a "useful" subject.

With the psychic, it will be heralded as tangible evidence for reformation by his disciples. Yet despite one's opinions on the subject, despite the author's laudatory view of life without the consolation of reformation, his nostalgia for a pat solution to the riddles of man and the universe, here is a book that will not be set aside.

It all began when Jess Stearn received orders from his editor to go to Canada to investigate a case of regression under hypnosis which promised to be as interesting as Bridley Murphy's case. However, Jess Stearn's trance a friend who had boasted

"Promise them anything—but give them Walt Disney." This is included among the familiar adages, but in this day and age it seems to make more sense. Anyway this is the theory of teachers in the HYBURN School Primary building.

The building, which is one of three in the Hyburn School district developed a center library for youngsters in grades 1-3 this past year.

To promote a more livable and money atmosphere for reading among the 275 students, the school painted the room formerly used for storage, built bookshelves, laid an orange carpet and put up curtains.

But the biggest asset to the room environment is a large oil painted mural of Walt Disney characters, which was painted by Mrs. Nelda Montgomery and covers the entire north wall.

Mrs. Montgomery, first grade teacher, completed the mural after donating 78 "enjoyable" hours to the project. She took the time to paint the mural, buy new books, but did free hand work with original selected colors.

Included in the 24-foot long woodland scene are Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs, Bambi, Pinocchio, Dumbo, Lullabell, Thumper and Pinocchio.

The color contrast and blending of shades are considered an outstanding success because the youngsters' eyes light up every time they come into the room. The striking colors draw immediate attention to the painting although the sharpness is not so dominating to the extent that it "comes out and hits you."

To the contrary, the trained and natural ability of Mrs. Montgomery brings the viewer to the painting and makes it almost difficult to leave it. She exercised ability in setting so delightful that the viewer finds something different each time it is viewed.

Each time the teachers had asked for a central library in this building, but were unable to get one because of lack of funds until the recent passing of Title 11 by legislature. The library currently has about 500 books—some purchased with 11 funds and others purchased by the school district.

The room is too small for classes to seat the 30 students. So, teachers requested a carpet installed so students can stay on the floor during daily story hour sessions under the direction of Mrs. Glen Maughan, school librarian, and Mrs. LaMar Davis, assistant librarian.

The library was developed in January and Mrs. Montgomery spent painting the mural on this time on Saturday and Sunday. Next year she will put a plastic coating on the mural so it can be washed and remain permanently.

Mrs. Montgomery had painted many pictures but said this was the first mural. She divides with Dr. Oliver Parsons at Rexburg. Teachers who developed the library facility delighted Mrs. Montgomery to do the honors of painting the animated characters. Considerable money was paid for by the school district and from the expressions on the youngsters' faces when seen in the painting, they figures—it was well worth it.

From Filer, Idaho, Mrs. J.M.N., "I have a number of rare coins and wish to know their value at present.

"The list of coins are as follows: 1—Large Cent, 1831; 1—Half Cent, 1866; 1—Nickel, 1859; 1—25 cent piece, 1847; 1—1/2 Dime, 1855; U.S.A., 1—1/4 Dime, Foreign, 1844. Have had these coins in my possession since 1935 as a gift from my mother who is deceased. Shall appreciate this kind service and information."

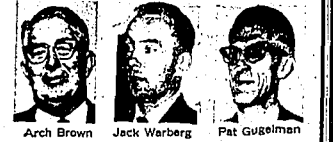
Answer: Your coin is an Italian 20 Lire piece struck from 1927 until 1934, under Victor Emmanuel, the then King of Italy. The monetary value of the coin is less than 10 cents in the United States, but it is a fairly scarce coin—one of the few from foreign countries, and is presently selling at about 20 cents to collectors. If in uncirculated condition, it is worth more. It is worth considerably less than that.

From Mrs. G.F., Filer, Idaho: "I have a coin which has the same color as our United States penny. On one side is a crown, over an 'O' with a 'W' in it. On the other side what looks like a rooster, and next to it is a '2'. Ore, underneath the word '2 Ore.' What can you tell me about it?"

Answer: This is a standard coinage of Norway. A 2-Ore piece was struck in 1927, and continuing to the present. It is made from bronze, and worth approximately two-tenths of a cent, exchange. Collector value, brand new, is about ten cents. It is not a scarce coin. Incidentally, you mention the United States "penny." There is no such thing—the coin is a cent piece and has always been.

James Buchanan died at 77 . . . and two patents for the typewriter were granted.

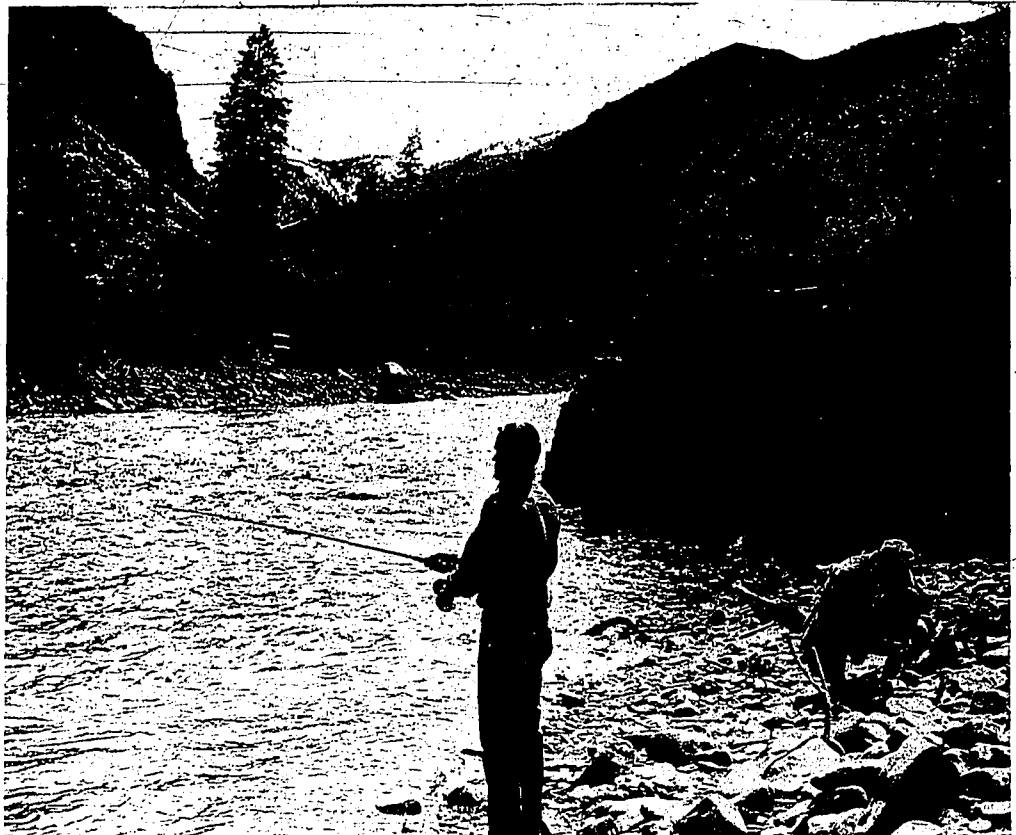

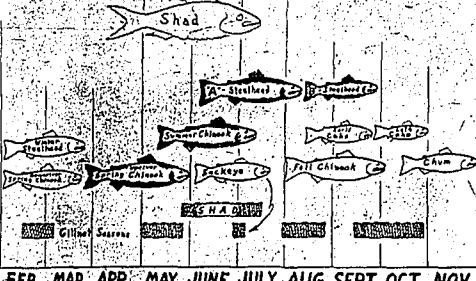
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COLUMBIA R. - FISH RUNS

Idaho's Story Told At Portland In Special Meet On Salmon Production

Members of the Idaho Fish and Game Commission and staff made a personal plea at a special hearing in Portland, April 18, requesting more consideration for Idaho-produced salmon and steelhead in the Columbia River fishery. Following the hearing, action was taken to delay Indians fishing above Bonneville Dam, sports fishing was prohibited in the Columbia River by both Oregon and Washington, and a decision on any commercial season was postponed in order to protect the upriver run of spring chinook. The Idaho contingent pointed out that while Idaho streams contribute an estimated 34 per cent of the upriver spring chinook run, Idaho fishermen shared less than 10 per cent of the total harvest in 1967.

yon amounting to \$24 million and a \$7 million steelhead hatchery at Dworshak Dam on the Snake River of the Clearwater. Details on other Idaho projects included reintroduction of runs by egg incubation channels in the Clearwater and Lemhi rivers; \$3 1/2 million in Federal grants for constructing fish screens and ladders at migration barriers; and \$125,000 in Federal aid monies spent on the average each year for salmon and steelhead research projects to provide more answers to problems in fish production, ecology, and migration. Research on the Columbia River fish and Game Department. Idaho's scientist staff is working part of full time on salmon and steelhead problems and management.

The overlap in the timing of the various runs of the Pacific age-old struggle between sports, commercial, and migratory fishermen of the Columbia River is a complex and difficult problem. As yet, no one has developed a formula for distribution of the harvest. Consider the fact that Idaho fish may spend one-half of their life span in Idaho waters as adults, eggs, and juveniles—they cross three state lines during their seaward migration, and reach maturity in the international waters of the Pacific Ocean traveling as far as Alaska.

Do the salmon belong to the commercial fishermen of the United States, Canada, Japan, and Russia on the high seas? ... sport fishermen on the lower Columbia? ... commercial gill net fishermen on the Columbia River whose industry dates from the mid 1800s? ... Indian fishermen whose prior use may go back several thousand years? ... or sport fishermen in the headwater streams? The answer to the question "whose fish?" may never be reached to the satisfaction of all parties concerned.

While this struggle between user groups wages on, salmon and steelhead entering the Columbia River today destined for 600 miles of spawning runs destined for the hook of the net—and that is the gauntlet of a rapidly changing and increasingly hostile environment. Losses of adult salmon and steelhead between the six dams enroute to Idaho probably equal or exceed the total numbers of these fish taken in the commercial gill net fisheries. The Idaho Fish and Game contingent at the Portland hearing emphasized that while differences may exist between the various states and agencies, our ultimate and universal goal should be the preservation of the Columbia River fishery resources and the rivers themselves.

Marine Corps Training Simply Never Ends

Marine Corps training is rough and it never ends. From the first day in receiving barracks at either San Diego or Parris Island, S. C., to the day of discharge, the Marine's life is filled with training. He stands inspections and no matter what he did the night before he is expected to be bright-eyed and bushy-browed at 5 a.m. A hangover is no excuse to get out of a 20 mile hike.

When the day's work is done, there is guard duty and the sergeants sit and brood the breeze with the privates. In advanced combat training, the Marine learns more of his trade and he learns to coordinate with other combat troops. He learns more of a combat reading a map, more about going on patrol, more about more time spent in the field and at the end there is a five day mock war.

It was on such a day, near Christmas of 1958, that our unit was sent to a new station. It ended with a soldier who had to pack and take along all of our equipment. This included a sea bag of nearly 75 pounds and whatever else the Marine had managed to collect.

At Tent Camp Two shortly after bootcamp we were told to pack up and take along all of our equipment. This included a sea bag of nearly 75 pounds and whatever else the Marine had managed to collect. This precluded many sick bay visits on a tough training day. It was just too much trouble to pack that sea bag and carry it to sick bay.

The war started on a Monday. It was usual for Marines in rank to be on guard duty in front of the road in front of the mess hall at 5 a.m. There were four platoons in the company, and the platoons were labeled first, second, third and fourth.

With us we took a Navy command (a medic) and a small truck filled with food, extra blank ammunition and flares. We walked for nearly seven miles into the mountains, then built a safe encampment on the crest of a large hill. Foxholes were ripped out of the rocky ground and trip flares were set.

Through this training the Marine Corps has managed to build a strange and vital fighting organization. The training is still rated as the toughest in the world — as far as training of masses of men goes — and the results pay off.

The company gunnery sergeant came out shortly after the first platoon. In this manner he could not see the men in the first platoon because of the early morning darkness and the fog from the ocean.

After this was done, we waited for nightfall. While waiting we ate cold G rations, a conglomerate of concentrated food and topped off with 20 year old cigarets and thick applesauce. We, of course, expected no attack but this security is basic when a base of operations is established.

A Marine will not leave a wounded buddy behind. He will risk his neck many times, and he will carry another man's pack when the going gets too much for a weak. He will curfew, but he will obey. And a Marine will not let his rifle get dirty, or lose it in the field if it can be helped.

Half an hour's more sleep was a wonderful thing then. After roll call, the gunnery sergeant would read the orders of the day, then dismiss the company to let the men shave and wash up for chow. After the ground-powder, or M and M, was cleaned and the company would be on the road by 7 a.m.

The word was passed around. "Third squad to the CP." A squad consists of 12 men and the CP is short for command post, where the company commander meets with his executive officer and his squad leader and platoon sergeant.

During Korea, many Marines walked out of the Chosin Reservoir although their feet were frozen but stumps of ice. They carried their dead with them. And to get this kind of training, the ground-powder, or M and M, is cleaned and the company would be on the road by 7 a.m.

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For several years, the Idaho Fish and Game Department and Idaho fishermen have been deeply accused at a hearing in Portland of doing nothing for the salmon and steelhead and just "sitting upriver and crying for more fish." Idaho challenged such accusations with a 30-minute presentation at the recent hearing in Portland. The illustrated text outlined continuing all efforts by the Idaho Fish and Game Department for protecting and enhancing salmon and steelhead resources.

Particular attention was directed to the year 1965 when the commercial industry harvested 1,161,000 pounds of spring chinook and Idaho closed the State to all salmon fishing to save the resource. Unforeseen losses of adult fish in two dams occurred in 1965 and of the 84,000 spring chinook which escaped past the dams, only 12,174 passed over Ice Harbor Dam on the Snake River.

The Idaho statement also pointed out that the spawning grounds in Idaho have been closed to fishing since 1962 in addition to the complete salmon closure in 1965. Fishing for summer chinook—the largest run of fish in the Columbia but now an endangered species—has been closed now for 4 years in Idaho. The Idaho Fish and Game Department also has actively opposed dam building in Hells Canyon, the Salmon River, and on the Clearwater. While some of these efforts unfortunately have failed, the Department was instrumental in leading migration programs for the Snake River runs in Hells Can-

Kennecott Smokestack In Utah Smokes Again After Vacation

The smokestack at the big Kennecott Copper Corp. smelter at Garfield, Utah, is smoking again after standing idle nearly nine months. So is the smokestack at the little New Mexican town of Hurley.

The smoke marks the end of the longest strike in copper industry history.

More than 90 per cent of the nation's copper production and 35 per cent of its lead and zinc output were cut off during the stoppage. It cost an estimated 1.3 million tons in refined copper per production.

More than 60,000 workers in 23 states were idled.

The United Steelworkers of America and 25 other unions called the strike last July 15 to back up new contract demands. The issues were not resolved until late last month.

Many of the miners lived on union benefits, food stamps and credit during the idle months, but a lot of them think the effort was worth it.

"You've got to show them," said Frank S. Copper, 27, a Salt Lake City copper worker with three children, "I don't think it was worth eight months."

"You've got to suffer to get something," concluded a New Mexico striker. "You don't get anything for nothing."

What they got, using the Phelps-Dodge Corp. agreement as a guide, was an estimated \$1.13 increased wages and benefits over 40 months for miners, smelting and refining workers. A 54-cent hourly pay hike over the same period is included.

Wages before the strike averaged \$3.23 an hour for copper miners, \$3.16 for smelting and refining workers, and \$2.71 for wire and cable fabricating workers.

The biggest stumbling block to settlement had been union demands for company-wide bargaining and simultaneous effect expiration dates.

"There was some significant progress in that direction," a union spokesman said, "but we didn't get everything we wanted."

The new settlements at Phelps-Dodge, American Smelting & Refining, Kennecott Copper, and Anaconda all run out in 1971 but the big copper producing states of Arizona, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico and Utah were hard hit.

Montana estimates losses in the state totaled more than \$72 million.

Included in the total are the \$205.52 million in state income taxes it didn't collect from the 7,200 strike-idled workers, each of whom lost an estimated total of \$4,361 in wages, and the \$835,092 it didn't get in mineral production taxes.

Many of the strikers who left Montana's Silver Bow County to seek work elsewhere are starting to trickle back.

The state estimates the strike cost it \$323,293 in welfare funds. Utah officials said they didn't have the remotest idea what the strike had cost their state, but the Salt Lake Tribune, which kept a running estimate of the effect on the state's economy, estimates it at more than \$36 million.

The Tribune also estimated that a worker on a 5-day week at an average wage of \$3.16 a hour lost more than \$5,000 in wages.

Arizona Gov. Jack Williams estimated his state's loss at \$171 million.

Despite the loss, most miners appeared to feel the long strike was worthwhile. Some, who admitted the walkout might cost them more than they would gain from it, said they went on strike to help future workers.

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The Amazing Man Who "Photographs" Thoughts

Experts can't explain how—but they admit Ted Serios somehow can "think" pictures onto film By PAUL WAHL

ON THIS page are examples of some of the weirdest snapshots you've ever seen.

Ted Serios, who made them, claims that they're photographs of his thoughts! You don't believe it? Well, neither did Ted—at first—but he has been "thinking" pictures into cameras for years now, and nobody—scientists, doctors, camera experts—has yet to explain it.

There's a word for what Ted Serios does: *thoughtography*. It was coined more than 50 years ago by a Japanese psychical researcher, Dr. Tomokichi Fukurai, as a name for the apparent ability of some mediums to project and imprint mental images on photographic plates.

Ted Serios is in his late 40s. He has had little formal education, dropping out of grammar school at 16. A former seaman, his last steady job was as an elevator operator.

With George Johannes, a fellow hotel employee who dabbled in hypnotism and found Ted a good subject, Serios engaged in a number of experiments in clairvoyance in 1955. At Johannes' suggestion, Serios tried to photograph his thoughts. Using a sealed camera, he shot away at a blank wall. When the processed film came back with a few pictures on it, Ted was sure that a joke was being played on him.

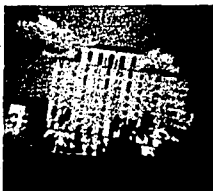
Assured by Johannes that this was not the case, he repeated the experiment and continued to get inexplicable photographs. In these early attempts at thoughtography, conventional cameras were used. Later, he switched to the Polaroid Land camera for quick results.

While an assistant holds the camera, Serios—standing or sitting close—stares fixedly at the lens. Concentrating intensely, he appears to be under great strain: his face is flushed and his heart pounds wildly. He seems to be "trying to force the picture out. When he feels ready to imprint an image on the film, he yells "Now!" and the camera operator trips the shutter.

Sometimes, Ted will make the exposure himself. The print pulled

from the camera seconds later isn't the close-up portrait of Ted Serios that you might expect to see, but a picture of something else—that shouldn't be there—at all—like a building or an automobile.

Often he is as surprised as anybody by what he photographs. Once he tried to "think" a submarine

photo and who showed up but Queen Elizabeth II, crown and all. It has been reported that Ted produced a picture of Russia's Vostok space ship in flight—before any pictures of it had been published.

Although he has made hundreds of thoughtographs since 1955, Serios can't do it every time. Indeed, his all-time "batting average" is low—he misses more than he hits. Serios has used his failures as an argument to answer those who say it must be a trick. He says, "If it isn't for real, why can't I do it all the time? If it was a trick, I could make money on it in night clubs or tv."

Serios' demonstrations are conducted under well-controlled conditions designed to eliminate virtually any possibility of fraud or collusion. He is under constant close surveillance by various experts throughout the session, sometimes monitored by movie cameras. Often, he submits to personal search.

In spring, 1964, Serios met Dr. Jule Eisenbud, a prominent Denver psychiatrist and associate clinical professor of psychiatry at the University of Colorado Medical School. Dr. Eisenbud has been actively interested in parapsychology—psychical research—for more than 25 years and was greatly impressed by a demonstration Ted gave. Later that year, at the psychiatrist's invitation Serios moved to Denver to join him in a series of experiments.

In more than three years of investigation, Dr. Eisenbud conducted many tests of the Serios phenomenon under a variety of conditions, with every possible safeguard against any possibility of deception, and all were closely observed.

As a result of these experiments, Ted Serios finally has received—at least in some measure—the scientific attention he so long sought. He also became the subject of a fascinating book, "The World of Ted Serios," written by Dr. Eisenbud.

Does Ted Serios really photograph his thoughts? "As one scientist who worked with him five years ago says: "If what Serios does is a trick, all I can say is that it's a good one!" ♦

Somehow you people in the States have found that we Meads live on the same hill as the Beatles—John and Ringo to be exact—and this hill is about 20 rain-swept miles from swinging London, where the "mini-age" was born.

The letters already are beginning to come in. Now some of the letters just want a leaf from John Lennon's tree—and I can tell you now that it's stripped bare to about nine feet, which is as high as a teen-age girl in a nylon parka can reach, standing on her girl-friend's shoulders.

But the letters that began to worry me came from other middle-aged characters like me, and they asked: "What will happen to us? Is it possible to succeed in the mini-age after you're 50?" Or even, some asked, after you're 80?

Before I could answer those, the really worried ones asked: "Is it possible to survive?"

On my way to Piccadilly the other day I stumbled into Carnaby Street, where the mini-manufacturers buy their gear or clothes. I was wearing my gear, a navy-blue blazer, shirt, tie, and gray slacks. Two quite virile-looking fellows in purple and gold caftans with strings of temple bells around their necks and flowers in their shoulder-length hair caught sight of me and said, "Look at the old boy! "Which ones?" I say, I've always known that one day I'd become a rallying point for youth.

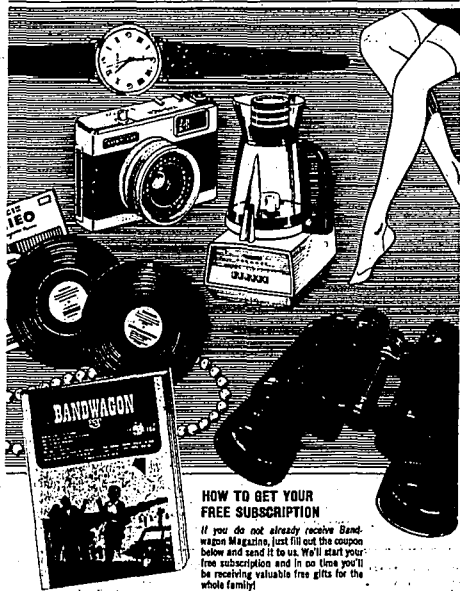

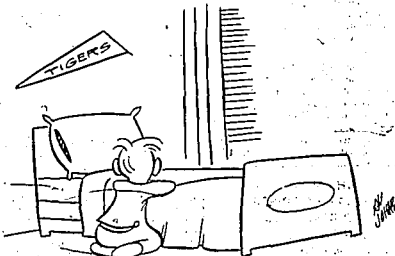

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

The Smothers Brothers: Nice Guys or Dissenters?

"THERE goes the sketch," said Tommy Smothers, slapping the script down on the table.

He was referring to a directive from CBS Program Practices, known not so affectionately by the Smothers brothers as the "Big Daddy Memo." Program Practices, which holds the final say over what goes out over CBS airways, had just censored a number of "key" lines from one of the show's skits.

Both Tommy and Dick, stars of the highly successful "Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour," knew that the lines would be cut as "too controversial," "too suggestive," or "too irreverent." But they kept them in anyway in their continuing battle with "Big Daddy."

Normally the boys just wince when the ax falls, but when they feel they have been unjustly censored, they do fight back—as witnessed by the performance of folk singer Pete Seeger on their Feb. 29 show.

Seeger had made a special appearance on their season-opening show last September and had planned to sing the highly controversial ballad, "Waist Deep in the Big Muddy." The "Big Daddy Memo" immediately deleted it. But the Smothers boys objected violently and took up Seeger's cause—with the result that he did sing the song six months later on national tv.

Sadly, Dick notes, these victories are few and far between, but they keep trying. Aren't they afraid that the constant clashes with Program Practices might jeopardize their show and their jobs? "No," says Tommy, "performances should reflect the times they live in. We're trying to make people aware of what's going on today. My God I'm just not as afraid as most people are."

That's not always true, though, for the Smothers brothers. They grew up in the Philippines (their father, an Army major, died in a Japanese prison camp during World War II) and moved to Red-

do Beach, Calif. During school years, when money was scarce, the boys took on odd jobs to supplement the family income. A natural flare for comedy led them to San Francisco's "Purple Onion," a coffee house which has been the launching pad for many of today's comedians.

After the coffee-house apprenticeship came tv guest shots and personal appearances across the country. "We made good money," says Tommy. "But more important, we had little interference. That's why last year was so difficult for us."

"Little interference" meant they could turn out their special brand of comedy ("not just those picky Bob Hope type jokes," says Tommy) without fear of censorship, humor which Dick calls "unique," but which critics call "irreverent." But it did endear the brothers to the younger generation and culminated in their first tv show—which lasted exactly one season.

Why did they fall after such an auspicious start? "The show was terrible. We just listened to a lot of people who didn't understand our comedy," says Tommy. "We're what's happening; our producers unfortunately just didn't realize it."

They were given a second chance by CBS in an attempt to break the

Sunday-night "Bonanza" blockade—a variety hour filled with topical humor and guest stars. CBS executives now admit, "They're a little more topical than we anticipated."

But for all their anti-Establishment humor, the Smothers brothers affect a strange phenomenon. Although thousands of letters may pour into CBS attacking a skit on the show, the letters always blame the network, never, as most letters say, "those nice Smothers boys."

Maybe that's their secret—the "nice" nephew image, one which they are extremely careful to protect. Both brothers have cherublike faces, meticulous manners, engaging personae. Dick (married, three children) appears calm, confident, self-assured—exactly what he is.

Tommy on the other hand puts on the guise of the hapless man-child adrift in the big, bad world, trying to come to grips with reality but never quite making it. Away from the show, although you'd never think it, he is the swinger. Recently divorced, he drives the flashy cars, dates the flashy blondes. Of the brothers, he is the warrior, the intellectual, the political activist.

True to their image, the boys open their show each week with what has become their trademark—the comedy dialogue which develops into an argument. They've replaced their famous "Mom always liked you best" routine in favor of topical comedy, but Tommy still loses out.

These dialogues often draw the knife of the "Big Daddy Memo," but the brothers keep plugging for what they consider "what's happening, groovy, psychedelic comedy."

One thing is certain. No matter how much anti-Establishment humor they turn out, no matter to what lengths they dissent, they will jealously protect the all-important image that the average viewer calls, "those nice Smothers boys."

May Is Salad Month

■ May is national salad month. It is a reminder to include vitamin-mineral rich salads such as these in your daily meal planning.

Pineapple Seabreeze Salad

- 1 can (1 lb. 14 oz.) pineapple chunks
 - Spicy Tomato Dressing (see recipe)
 - 2 cups shredded crisp salad greens
 - Crisp romaine leaves
 - 2 cups cooked deviled shrimp
 - 2 cups grapefruit segments
 - 1 cucumber, pared and sliced
1. Drain pineapple, reserving $\frac{1}{2}$ cup syrup; prepare and chill Spicy Tomato Dressing. Thoroughly chill all salad ingredients.
 2. To assemble salad, line bottom of chilled salad bowl with shredded greens and put romaine around edge. Arrange pineapple, shrimp, grapefruit, and cucumber in the bowl. Serve with the chilled salad dressing. *6 servings*

Spicy Tomato Dressing

- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup reserved pineapple syrup
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup light corn syrup
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup wine vinegar
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon seasoned salt
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon pepper
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon dry mustard
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon celery seed
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup catsup
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup salad or cooking oil

Pour pineapple syrup, corn syrup, and vinegar into a salad dressing bottle. Add a mixture of next four ingredients, cover, and shake well. Add the catsup and oil; shake vigorously to blend. Chill at least 1 hour. Shake well before using.

About $\frac{1}{2}$ cups dressing

Confetti Potato Salad for a Crowd

- 5 lbs. potatoes, pared, cubed, cooked, and drained
 - $\frac{1}{2}$ cup French dressing
 - $\frac{1}{2}$ cup lemon juice
 - 1 tablespoon garlic salt
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon Accent
 - $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon black pepper
 - 2 teaspoon dry mustard
 - 9 hard-cooked eggs, chilled and diced
 - 1 cucumber, pared, seeded, and chopped
 - 1 bunch green onions, chopped

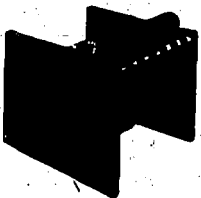

Are Today's NOISES Harming or Helping Us?

By JOHN E. GIBSON

IN OUR society, more progress seems to bring more and more noise.

Because of the increase in noise, scientists have been studying its effect on us in everyday work. They wanted to know how much truth there was in the remark—"It's so noisy I can't hear myself think." What they learned may surprise you.

What is the most annoying noise?

Researchers at Britain's National Physical Laboratory recorded a collection of the "worst" sounds they could think of, such as the roar of a racing motorcycle engine (without muffler), the rat-tat-tat of a jackhammer, the roar of jet aircraft taking off, the cries of animals in the jungle. The entire collection was then played back to a representative group of volunteers, and their reactions were carefully noted. When the tests were completed, the scientists announced that the most annoying noise known to man is a sound you don't need to go any farther than your kitchen to hear: the scraping of a saucepan with a knife!

If you are doing mental work, should you seek out the quietest spot you can find?

That will depend to a great extent on your own particular temperament. Many persons find extreme quiet more distracting than noise. Dr. David Harold Fink, a psychiatrist, concludes from his studies that most persons' mental processes function best when quiet is relieved by soft music.

Why is it that many persons find quiet more disturbing than noise?

Some persons can be-

come so thoroughly conditioned to working in noisy surroundings that they can't work anywhere else. A sculptor had his studio workshop in a building facing one of the city's noisiest intersections. While he was away

on a business trip, his wife had their quarters soundproofed for a surprise. But when the sculptor returned, he found that he couldn't work. It was too quiet. After several frustrating days, he had all the soundproofing

removed immediately.

Is there any proof that noise can help some individuals work better?

Yes. In recent studies conducted at the University of Oklahoma, students were given

personality tests and divided into two groups: those who were well adjusted and those who were judged to be maladjusted. The maladjusted group worked significantly better with loud noise than the group with the more balanced personalities.

Why persons with an abundance of personality complexes should work better amid noise is the next question to be answered. Some scientists speculate that perhaps noise distracts them from their own unresolved emotional conflicts, or it may equalize internal and external pressures.

But don't high-strung persons have the greatest difficulty working under noisy conditions?

As a general rule, this is not true. Investigators have found that neurotics can work in veritable bedlam without having their efficiency impaired—but this applies mostly to neurotics. Calmer persons can be disturbed by unusual amounts of noise.

Psychologists at Western College for Women tested 174 students on an anxiety scale. They were then given various types of exacting clerical work under two sets of conditions: very noisy and extremely quiet. Findings: the most anxious students performed significantly better under noisy conditions, while the least anxious students did best under quiet conditions.

Just how much does noise affect ability to do mental work?

That depends on the kind of noise. Studies conducted by the Medical Research Council show that high-pitched noise caused mental workers to make more errors; low-pitched noise "mowed down" decision-making ability. ♦
