GOP Unit Sets Tax Reduction Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The made-up Republican Coordinating Committee, accusing the Johnson administration of fomenting a kind of "fiscal socialism," has called today for regular annual reductions of income taxes beginning as soon as the Vietnam war ends.

The committee, representing GOP elements, made no outright recommendation on whether a tax increase should be imposed on the affected cities, but it did recommend that it be accompanied by an increase in urban relief.

Military spokesmen said 400 Americans were killed and 24 wounded in the fighting Tuesday. The South Vietnamese lost 11 soldiers killed and 17 wounded, 41 casualties in the 24-hour fighting in this sector totaled 616 — 229 wounded.

Water Outlook Worse In Southern Part Of County

The water outlook for the Salmon and Reservoir areas is getting worse and will continue to do so if present conditions during the past month.

The snowfall in the South Hills has been below normal and the normal spring precipitation has been down. With little or no precipitation, cold weather and cold nights, the expected runoff will be lower than forecast a month ago.

A month ago, the water runoff forecast for the 1968 irrigation season on the Salmon Tract was estimated about 60 to 65 per cent of normal. The snow survey just completed by members of the Twin Falls Soil District, shows the expected runoff may be only 55 to 57 per cent of normal.

Clarence Hedrick, Twin Falls SCS unit work conservationist, says if present conditions continue the forecast a month ago will be high.

The soil moisture is very good at high elevation, but below 5000 feet the soil is very dry. Rains are needed to improve the runoff in the reservoirs.

The snow forecast by the Idaho State University, says that the snow depth in the Magic Mountain and Pole Creek Ranger Station were made by ground travel Nov. John Pascoe, Eagle-Schmitt, Ellis Fuller, Edgar Edger, Taylor, and other courses were flown by Lee Bilz, Eugene, Ellis Fuller and Ken Hepper, pilot.

The snow depth and water content of the courses are:

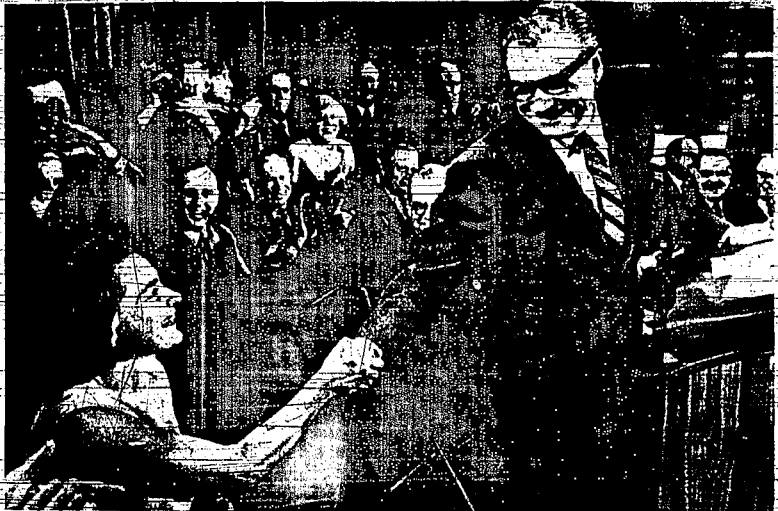
- Magic Mountain, 23.4 inches of snow with 70.3 inches of water compared to the 42.2 inches of snow and 15.2 inches of water a year ago. The 15-year average is 18.4 inches of water.
- At Deadline Ridge the snow depth is 31.1 inches with 38.8 inches of water as compared to 22.1 inches of snow and 29.4 inches of water on May 1, 1967. The 15-year average here is 18.4 inches of water.
- At Cedar Creek there was no snow this past week, but a year ago at this time there was 24 inches of snow with 8 inches of water and the average is 21 inches of water.
- Bear Creek Meadows has 37 inches of snow and 11 inches of water content as compared to 76 inches of snow and 23 inches of water a year ago at this time. The 15-year average is 21 inches of water.
- At Goat Creek the snow depth is 49.0 inches with 17.6 inches of water compared to 69 inches of snow and 23.7 inches of water.
- There was no snow at Red Point and also at Wilson Creek. The snow depth at Red Point was 51 inches with 18 inches of water and at Wilson Creek there was 53 inches of snow and 18.8 inches of water.

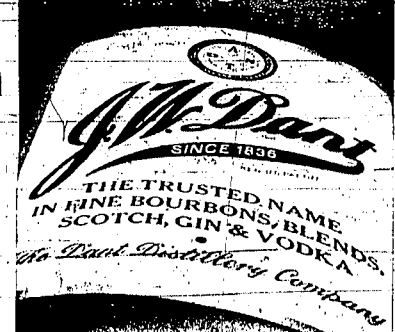

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate moved only last month to boost taxes while slashing federal spending \$6 billion, now has taken a first step toward giving itself a new office building critics contend will cost the taxpayers \$100 million.

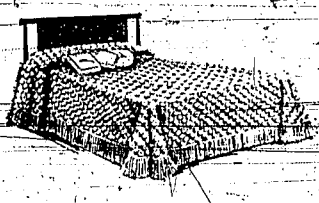

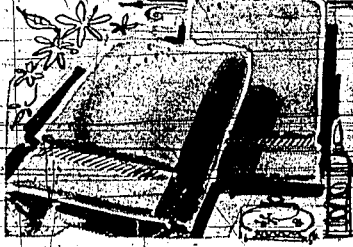

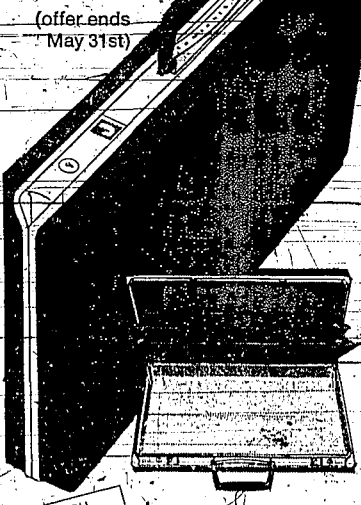

At that time Pavel also said he was trying to reorganize from the force "people who violated the law."

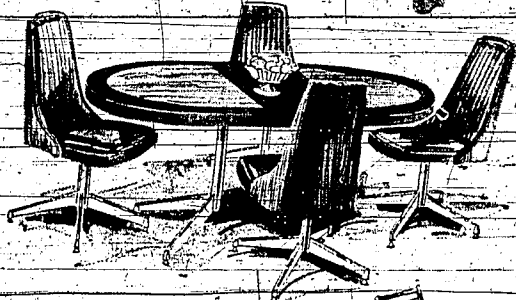

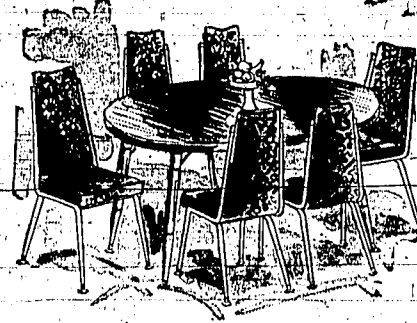

Gov. George Hansen told the Harrison School PTA Monday that state and local government provides more than 80 per cent of the total amount spent on elementary and secondary education in Idaho's public schools.

"This concept is erroneous and strikes at the heart of our national concept of a public school. It is not the federal government but state and local governments which provide over 90 per cent of the total amount spent on elementary and secondary education in Idaho's public schools. Of that amount, less than one dollar out of each ten comes from the federal government."

"State and local governments should insist on retaining major controls and prerogatives in the operation of educational systems," Hansen said. "The progress of this country has been great under this system. We should not allow the federal government to take over the job of educating our children. 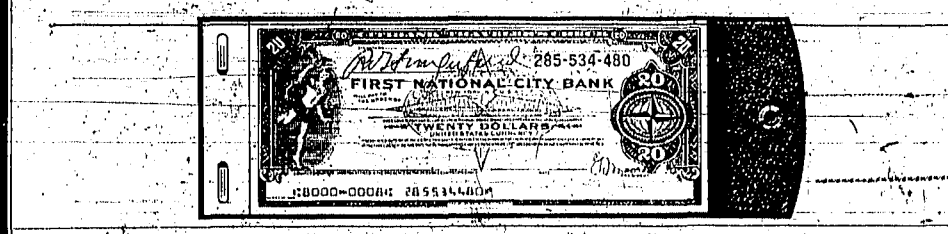

By JOHN CUNIFF and B. H. BARNES. NEW YORK (AP) - Spurred by renewed consumer demand, the crest of an inflationary boom, free of big strikes and for the moment, increased confidence in higher taxes, America's corporations are reporting profits.

Hundreds of companies are reporting profits considerably higher than last year's. The nation's very largest firms reported an average increase of 10 percent in 1967 over 1966.

The records are being achieved despite higher costs for raw materials and labor, and despite some of the highest borrowing costs of this century.

The question now being asked by corporate finance officers and stockholders is: "Can we keep it up?" In some cases the answer seems to be no.

General Motors reported a 10 percent jump in January-February profits to \$456.7 million. Chrysler's net income rose 280 percent to \$69.3 million.

Profit increases by Bethlehem Steel, which reported a 100 percent increase in profit, and Inland Steel, which reported a 100 percent increase in profit.

General Business Week magazine commented: "In fact, what the figures indicate is that over the year ago could be close to a 30 percent meaning roughly a 30 percent annual rate after taxes."

One troubling aspect of the profits surge is that it is partially a product of the government's demands for goods and may be difficult to sustain.

Salmon, Steelhead Being Transplanted

BOISE (AP) — The entire salmon and steelhead department of the Snake River basin is being replanted, with a major portion being re-leased into the Salmon River system. The transfer of the migratory fish runs is one of the problems that had to be solved in connection with the construction of the Idaho Power Company's three-dam power complex on the Snake, which is to be officially dedicated here Saturday for a return of 5,000 fish. The transfer of the fish runs was the last option left to save the salmon and steelhead and young salmon traveling down the Snake River.

The adult salmon in the spring and steelhead run are trapped in the three dams—Brownlee, Oxbow and Hells Canyon—and they first had to develop a method of transporting the fish over the dams. Nets were built over the dams, and the young salmon and steelhead were placed in the nets. The fish were then raised in ponds until they reach migratory age—about 18 months for steelhead and two years for salmon.

The eggs of the fall chinook salmon are stripped from the females at the Oxbow Hatchery and spawned there. But, as soon as these can be transported, they are taken to the Niagara Springs Hatchery near Twin Falls. When the young steelhead reach migratory age, they are released from ponds in the Pishimi River north of Mackay.

Gebhardt said about 88 per cent of the young salmon raised from eggs survive to be released, which compares to about a 25 per cent survival rate for those spawned in nature.

Transplant Failure Is Explained

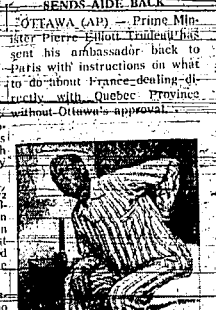
PARIS (AP) — French heart transplant patient Clovis Rohlain died because his vigorous heart flooded his lungs with blood, his doctor said Tuesday night.

Rohlain, 66, lived for 3 1/2 hours with the heart of a 25-year-old metal-worker killed in an auto crash. The operation Saturday night was the first heart transplant in Europe and the second reported in the world.

After an autopsy, Dr. Ghislain Cabrol, 43, the surgeon who headed the transplant team, gave this explanation of Rohlain's death Tuesday morning.

Before the autopsy, Dr. Maurice Nicodier, the chief surgeon at La Pitte Hospital, where the operation was performed, said Rohlain had died because of an insufficiency of blood to the brain.

The measure was passed by a vote of 15-4 on the council, revoking a law that applied to 93 percent of the city's housing stock.

"All that's left is our last chunk if we had the predicted vote of 15-4," Groppi said.

The council was expected to go no further than making provisions of a newly enacted federal law, which bans discrimination in housing.

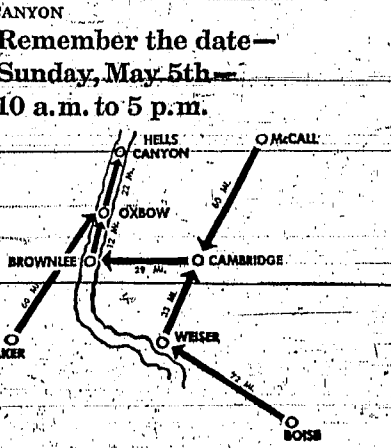

The initial impact of clearing 15 feet in the pole vault has become known.

Twin Falls' Scott Crider accomplished the feat Friday at the Southern Idaho tracks in a performance which didn't take long for the rest of the country to get talking about it.

Crider's performance was a surprise to many who were watching him at the Twin Falls airport and would the young man be that school's guest over the weekend, taking in a Saturday afternoon meet at PGWV?

But the one that pleased Coach Klemkopf more than any other was one from a fiber glass pole manufacturer's representative, who Coach Klemkopf said "must be a pole vaulting nut."

The man represented Thermoflex out of Salinas, Kans., so Coach Klemkopf felt he should tell him right off that Scott accomplished the feat on a Sky pole.

Hardly aghast at that, the man went into details of vaulting that were very encouraging.

Coach Klemkopf quoted the man as saying the following noteworthy items:

1.—Barbed-wire is nearly overrated and is not essential to becoming a national competitor. It's nice but ranks behind several things that Crider evidently does well.

2.—He praised the fact that Crider was holding 33 feet, 9 inches of pole when he cleared 15 feet. "Then you get a vaulter," Klemkopf quoted the man as saying. "There are too many going 14 feet who are holding 14 feet of pole. They are limited simply because they will sooner or later run out of pole."

"The vault also will bring Scott some national recognition, it appears. When this name appears in at least one of the track-and-field papers, it is safe to assume that he will have several more letters coming from college coaches around the country."

Meanwhile, back at the Twin Falls, Crider Tuesday sailed over 14 feet with lots to spare and then went to work on vaulting 15 feet that he has so far been unable to prove to the youngster said. "Because of the wind Friday, a lot of people think it was a fluke and the 15-foot vault is certainly overrated. I don't think that I can do it. I don't think it is necessary for me to hit 15 feet again, but I at least can try to do it."

"This is the kind of training that could psych you," said the man who is in line of the great American athletes.

"You say to yourself it isn't going to bother you but when you feel the need to say that, then I suppose you're already are a little bit of a champion."

He acknowledged a new feeling of confidence, not surprising since most of this spring he has been a matter of measuring progress by inches and fractions.

The 15-foot vault, of course, helps in this area but the big thing is the vaulting pole.

"I said Friday that the wind was probably helping me, but the new pole was the big thing," Crider pointed out. "The reason is that at last I'm able to bend the bigger pole. Last Thursday (in practice), I couldn't do it so I used the 14-foot pole. It was the more flexible one. In fact, I was going to send the big one back. I took one practice vault with the smaller one, Saturday. I hit 15 feet with the big one. It shot me up about four feet over the bar, and I decided then I was going to use it all day."

Crider said the wind suddenly was able to bend it so much. Maybe it was because of the wind and maybe because I was in competition. I don't extra. Today (Tuesday) without any wind I can bend it without any trouble and that is what has given me confidence."

The basic thing for anyone to remember here, however, is that Crider is the state's first 15-foot pole vaulter. The record stands on the SIC books. The rule book says wind doesn't affect vaulting and when the same record book says you can't use the wind, it is too much nit for record-keeping—in practice.

There is an elderly gentleman (in his 80s) living in a small single room in a local hotel. This man has married children and grandchildren in town who hardly look at him.

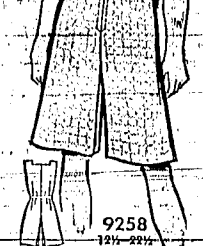
He can't dress himself, or bathe very well, and his eyesight is failing, so the male help-hire-a-maid-to-look-after care of him than his own family.
