## 25 Men Still Trapped In Flooded Mine

HOMINY FALLS, W. Va. (AP) — A receding water level today encouraged crews trying to rescue 25 men trapped in three groups inside a flooded coal mine in southeastern West Virginia.

The water depth had dropped one foot, enabling crews to move pumps ahead another 30 feet to a point 880 feet inside the mountain side entrance of the Gauley coal and coke Co. No. 9 mine.

Thousands of gallons of water cascaded into the Gauley mine about noon Monday when the crew cutting coal broke through to a nearby abandoned mine which was flooded.

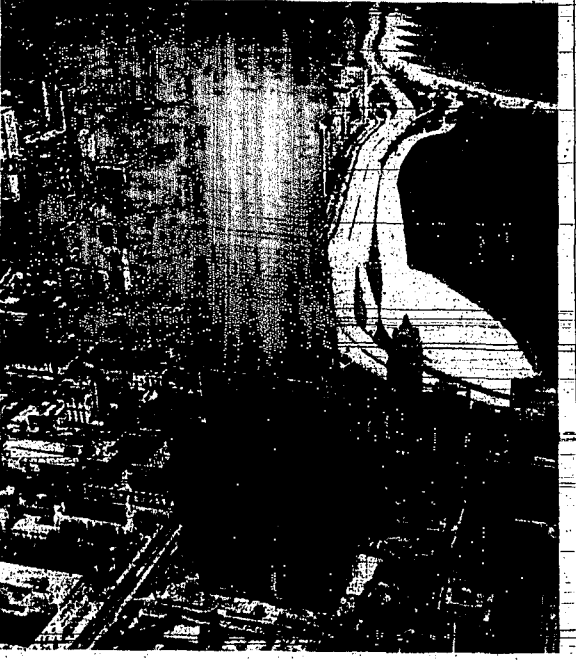

## Gov. Lurleen Wallace, 41, Dies After Two-Year Cancer Battle

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — Gov. Lurleen Wallace, 41, whose compassion for the afflicted symbolized her brief career as a public official, died in her sleep today after a two-year battle against cancer.

Her husband, George, whom she succeeded as governor 18 months ago, and her four children were at her bedside in the white-columned executive mansion when the end came at 12:34 a.m.

Immediately on her death, Lt. Gov. Albert Brewer, 38-year-old Decatur, Ala., attorney, became governor under Alabama's law of succession.

James B. (Pat) Burns has indicated that he will seek again the office he has held for 18 years. He has had 20 years experience in law enforcement. Burns said, "I deplore the trend to socialized government. Your vote in this election will be more important than ever before."

Burns will be opposed by Irving Altman who is currently Jerome County Justice of the Peace. Altman was born in September, 1924, and is married to the former Jeanne Bartholomew of Jerome. He spent three years in the Navy, two

and one-half of which were in the job of county commissioner from the south Pacific.

Mr. Altman is a graduate of Santa Monica Police Academy and was a member of the Los Angeles police department. He was Jerome County Commissioner before he became justice of the Peace. He stated that his policy would be a full time sheriff department.

Dale Burkhalter, Republican, has filed again for the office of assessor, which he has held for the past two years. He is a lifetime resident of Jerome and a property owner for 22 years. Before coming to Jerome, he was associated with the farming industry.

He stated that his office is halfway through the reappraisal in Jerome County and it has received very fine acceptance by county residents.

Filing for the first time was Leroy Bentzinger, Republican, for state representative. Bentzinger has been owner of Jerome Implement Co. since 1953. He has three children, ages 8 to 18.

Bentzinger said he plans to work for the business men, the farmer and for the rights of the people.

Dr. Lauren M. Ncher, coroner, has filed for reelection. John Van Orman, Republican, has indicated his intention of seeking reelection for a fourth year.

Thirty-five exhibits were entered in the fair, many of them the result of team work.

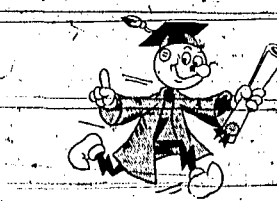
Age of entrants ranged from fourth grade to seniors.

MR. SPECTATOR My, My How Times Change

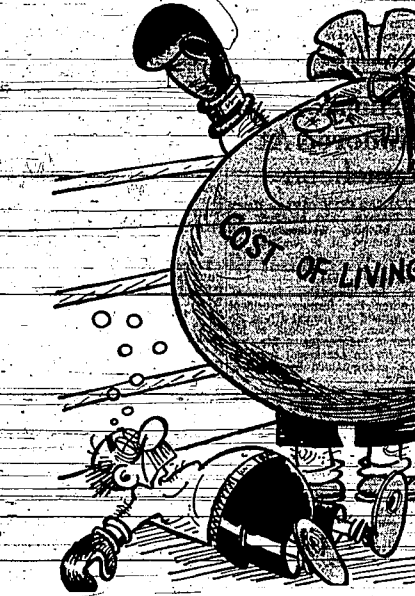

WASHINGTON—I do not know whether a Washington politician named Albert Lorraine is guilty of homicide in shooting a looter during the recent civil rights exercise. But I worry about him. In America even a cop, presumably innocent until proved guilty, but the nation's capital has become Hell City. Lorraine had better get his affairs in order. From the evidence submitted to a coroner's jury, there is no question that the height of the rioting—the looter—was emerging from a store that wasn't his. It also showed that he refused to stop when challenged by Lorraine. Yet the jury took only 15 minutes to reach a verdict of homicide. Not accidental or justifiable homicide, but murder.

declared martial law and citizens presumably sent forth at their own risk. There is, of course, the question of whether Lorraine was trigger-happy. Perhaps he was. Was he a cop, I suspect I would be a touch nervous under similar circumstances, if only because hoodlums are always beating up cops in Hell City. Surely it is safe to suggest that the circumstances were extending when mobs of Negroes were tearing through the streets, looting and burning and leaving thousands of children homeless. Under these circumstances, it is curious that none of the civil liberties Negroes who launched a frenzy of beating when ever a Negro is nabbed for

knifing a citizen in plain view of several witnesses has come to Lorraine's defense. Yet Lorraine was under oath to prevent crime, and until proven guilty he was only doing his job. But no, I suppose there is nothing strange about all this. It is just the order carried out by the new double standard imposed by politicians and their tame police administrators to keep order in minority blocs. Only several hours before, Stokely Carmichael appeared before a mob of Negroes and urged them to go back and "get a gun," a performance coincidental with the start of the rioting. Yet, at this writing, Carmichael is still in the streets, free to indulge in such adventures as fanning a revolt of Columbia University students.

JOHN BECKLER It's Inefficient

WASHINGTON (AP) — It would be hard to design a more inefficient system than that by which the United States nominates its presidential candidates. It is hard to believe that it could be better suited to the national temper in this election year. At a time of national uncertainty, the system is a recipe for racial, urban and economic problems, the system is forcing the political situation fluid. It permits Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York to become a candidate for the Republican nomination and score at least a psychological important victory in Missouri. It permits Eugene J. McCarthy, D-Minn., to turn a quixotic one-man crusade into a full-fledged campaign, and Sen. Robert F. 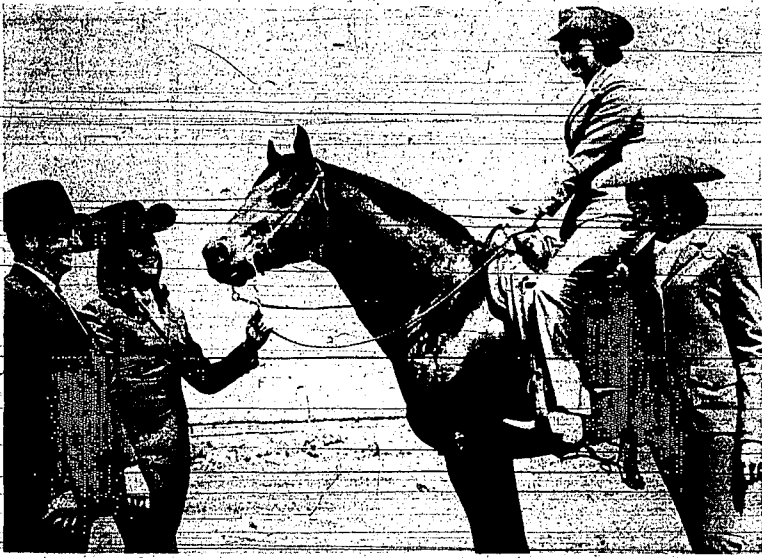

# Tax Hike Bill Basks In Relative Warmth Of Panel Endorsement

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's income tax hike bill, cold-shouldered since last summer by the House Ways and Means Committee, is basking in the relative warmth of the panel's qualified endorsement. But the congressional fight has escalated over the size of a proposed spending cut tied to the tax boost.

Making its first formal decision on the 10-billion income tax increase request, the committee voted for the hike Monday provided federal spending is cut at least \$4 billion.

The House Appropriations Committee had previously recommended this figure and Johnson said he would accept it, trying to hammer out a compromise tax-spending bill.

Rep. John W. Byrnes of Wisconsin, ranking Republican on the Ways and Means Committee, called the panel's action "a surprising fiscal year starting July 1" and a capitulation. He suggested that the House vote for a \$4 billion minimum spending cut, with the possibility of a larger cut if the Senate passes a similar measure.

Sen. John J. Williams of Delaware, the chief Senate Republican confereer, said he would hold out for \$6 billion and expects the Senate to back him. He suggested that the House vote for a \$4 billion cut, with the possibility of a larger cut if the Senate passes a similar measure.

There has been speculation Johnson might veto a bill that required cuts as deep as \$6 billion.

# Pulitzer Prizes Awarded

**NEW YORK (AP)**—The 1968 Pulitzer Prize for fiction has been awarded to William Styron's controversial novel, "The Confessions of Nat Turner," which was based on an 1831 Negro slave revolt.

John S. Knight and staff members of two of his newspapers were honored with two separate Pulitzer Prizes for journalistic excellence—a triple triumph unique in the 52-year history of the awards.

Knight, editor and director of the Knight Newspapers, won one for distinguished editorial writing. Eugene Gray Payne, of Knight's "Shelby News-Gazette," was named the outstanding editorial cartoonist of 1967.

The staff of Knight's Detroit Free Press, which has been shut down since last November in a labor dispute, was cited for local reporting of the 1967 Detroit riot and their causes.

The prize for International Reporting was awarded to Alfred Friendly of Washington Post for his coverage of the Middle East war in 1967.

J. Anthony Lukas of the New York Times was the prizewinner for local investigative reporting for his account of the life and murder of Linda Frazier, who was slain with her hope of a better life in a tenement boiler room in New York.

In the arts and letters, Will Inge and his wife Arline won the general nonfiction prize with "Russell and Revolution." It is the 10th and concluding volume of the "Story of Civilization" series.

The history award went to Bernard Bailyn for his "The Ideological Origins of the American Revolution." He has written extensively on American history.

The poetry prize went to Anthony Hecht for "The Hard Hours," his fourth work. His first volume of poems was published in 1954.

John Adams received the music prize for his orchestral suite, "Echoes of Time and the River," performed for the first time May 18 at the University of Symphony Orchestra.

The Arkansas Democrat, chairman of a Senate investigation subcommittee, said he'll reveal what the panel uncovered about discussions by persons he said plan to move in during the planned nonviolent demonstration and engage in rioting and looting.

His comments in the Senate came as Congress was considering a bill aimed at limiting use of federal property by demonstrators for camps.

The Rev. Ralph David Abernethy, head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, is organizing caravans of poor people heading for Washington.

**NEW JERSEY**  
**Students Go To Capitol**

**TRENTON, N.J. (AP)**—New Jersey students who marched 2,000 strong to the State Capitol Monday to urge more funds for public higher education.

Gov. Richard J. Hughes and Chancellor of Higher Education Ralph A. Dungan addressed them. They booed Dungan and interrupted the governor during his speech.

The student demonstrators, including coeds in long black dresses and young men in black jackets or wearing red armbands, marched about two miles from a city park to the Statehouse behind flower-laden coffins in a protest.

Hughes said "I did not come here to be a fellow mourner for higher education." He said he believed that higher education "can come alive," and told the students he had submitted a request to the legislature for a referendum on a \$42 million bond issue for college construction.

Petunias and geraniums are among the right combinations. Grouped with them may be such favorite go-together plants as coleus, fibrous rooted begonias, small chrysanthemums and dwarf marigolds.
