City, County Reveal Plan To Add Water To Canals On Salmon Tract

For years agricultural and reclamation minds have been pondering the water shortages that have held production on Salmon Tract lands to a minimum, but the Twin Falls city and county government leaders think they may have found the answer within their own resources.

Stressing that many hurdles still must be cleared before the project could become a reality, County Commission Chairman Heber Loughmiller announced Wednesday they are now working out details of a plan to put Twin Falls Canal Co. water, now owned by the city, to use to help irrigate Salmon Tract land.

As outlined in a meeting of the county commissioners, city council, airport commission with City Manager Herb Derrick Tuesday afternoon, the plan calls for putting to use some 2,500 shares of Twin Falls city owned water in the Twin Falls Canal Co.

With completion of the new \$3-million Twin Falls city water system, the city will no longer be receiving its water from the canal system.

All land within the city has water rights, and as the land is annexed, the water is needed to irrigate the pasture where rights were needed to supply water to homes and businesses by taking water from the canals at the filter plant and distributing it over the city system. By late summer the city's entire source will be from spring water in Snake River Canyon north of the city.

As proposed in the Tuesday afternoon meeting, City Manager Derrick and Mayor Kroil said they would be willing to work with the county and with the canal companies to take this 2,500 shares of water from the Twin Falls Canal Co. and use it to irrigate the canal southeast of Kimberly.

Jerome Plant Levy, Elmore Jail Proposal Are Defeated

Voters in two communities in Magic Valley apparently were thinking of their pocketbooks Tuesday when a proposal for a new jail in Elmore-Canyon and a five-mill plant facilities levy in Jerome School District both were defeated.

School trustees were elected in five communities also Tuesday, including Wendell, Filer, Valley as well as Jerome and Glens Ferry.

The five-mill plant facilities levy at Jerome was defeated by a large majority, with 56 persons voting against and 225 for the levy. A breakdown of the voting by trustee zone was not available at the superintendent's office.

In the trustee election, Gordon Howell defeated Jack Hyder, 94 to 57 in Zone 5, while in Zone 4, Gordon Hyder was unopposed, polled 63 votes.

At Glens Ferry, the \$325,000 bond issue for a new Elmore County Jail received 597 yes and 342 no votes in one of the two precincts. Atlanta, still not reported.

A two-thirds majority was needed. Dr. John Shirley, Glens Ferry, county commission member, said this end of the county did not vote for it. Both Glens Ferry precincts defeated the issue as did one of the two precincts at King Hill, Hammett.

"We'll have to bring the proposal up again as a new jail is critically needed and we must find out why the people voted it down," he said. "The commissioner indicated the question would be put before voters in either the Aug. 6 primary or November general election."

The \$325,000 would have been used for an addition to the Elmore County courthouse at Mountain Home and would have provided a sheriff's office as well as jail facilities.

Kenneth Seese received 17 votes for trustee in the Hammett zone of Glens Ferry Joint School District No. 192 Tuesday. He was unopposed as Nathan Miller, incumbent, did not seek re-election.

At Wendell, voters returned both incumbents to the school board in Tuesday's voting. Dr. Richard Hagerman, unopposed in Zone 1, received 24 votes, while in one, Frank Orth was re-elected, defeating Leonard Schaefer, 35 to 14.

Filer School District No. 413 officials said an unusually large number of voters turned out Tuesday to elect Lawrence Knigh trustee Tuesday. He received 30 votes, compared to 18 for Duane Rappert. The incumbent, L.V. Tippet, did not seek re-election.

Roy Coulson was elected without opposition for the sole trustee post to be filled Tuesday in the Valley School district. He received 37 of the 38 votes cast with one write-in vote cast for Ray Kincaid.

Six Races Slated On Local GOP Ticket

With the filing deadline reached Tuesday night for the Aug. 6 primary election, voters in Salmon Falls County are looking for a relatively mild campaign period at the local level.

There will be six contests to be voted on Aug. 6 by voters in Salmon Falls County on the Republican ballot.

Latest filings brought contests in one county commission district, the sheriff's office, the office of county coroner, for prosecuting attorney and both legislative districts for state representatives.

Most popular office on the ballot appears to be the third county commission district now held by Heber Loughmiller, commissioner chairman, and Loughmiller, the last to file for the office, will be opposed for the Republican nomination by a write-in candidate, unopposed for the Democratic nomination in that district is Von Nebeker Hansen.

In the Legislative District 23, the two state representative nominations on the Republican ticket are sought by four local men. Incumbent legislators Ray Lincoln and J. D. Chlubra are opposed by Robert Day, Amalgamated Sugar Co. official and former Idaho State Chamber of Commerce president, and Joseph Stimpel, local public relations man.

In Legislative District 24, incumbent Republicans William Roberts, Bull and William Lanling, Twin Falls, will be opposed by Gene Hull, local banking executive. No Democratic candidates filed for either state representative post.

Seeking the county coroner post now held by Dr. Thad Scholer are Clayton Edwards, Republican, and Ed Edwards, Democrat.

Kennedy And Nixon Make Effective Vote Showings

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two victories by Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, an impressive showing by Richard M. Nixon and the defeat of Sen. Frank J. Lausche, D-Ohio, highlighted five primaries across the nation.

Kennedy defeated Sen. Eugene McCarthy in Indiana's Democratic presidential primary and his national convention delegate slate beat Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey in the District of Columbia.

Republican candidate Nixon won the Republican senatorial nomination by a landslide in Ohio. Lausche was defeated by Cincinnati City Councilman John J. Gilligan, a former congressman who had labor support and the Ohio Democratic organization endorsement.

In Tuesday's primary voting: —Kennedy got about 42 per cent of the Indiana vote to about 31 per cent for favorite-son candidate Gov. Roger D. Branigan and about 27 per cent for McCarthy.

But it appeared possible Kennedy might have to share with Branigan some of Indiana's 63 Democratic National Convention delegates. Nixon garnered 56 per cent of the vote.

All 21 candidates on Kennedy's delegate slate in the District of Columbia were far outdistanced by Nixon.

By unit rule Kennedy won all 23 of Washington's convention votes.

Also in the D.C. voting, a GOP candidate, Sen. James Buckley of New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller supporters easily defeated a slate weighted toward California Gov. Ronald Reagan, a favorite-son candidate.

Gilligan's Ohio GOP Senate opponent apparently will be Gen. William B. Saxton, who issued a victory statement after outdistancing two opponents.

In Alabama, third-party presidential candidate George Wallace apparently won the right to run on his state's Democratic ticket. He appeared to have picked the least of 34 Alabama delegates to the Democratic convention.

Florida Rep. Edward Gurney won the Republican senatorial nomination by a landslide but the Democratic race between former Gov. LeRoy Collins and Army Gen. Earl Faltich appeared headed for a runoff.

Kennedy was making no claims for the future after his Indiana victory, including his prospects in the Nebraska primary next Tuesday.

Vice President Humphrey says he's the front runner in which Sen. Kennedy runner, Kennedy said, "I'm opposed by other candidates nearly two out of three where I am because the only way I can do well is to take my campaign to the people."

He said the combination of results in the District of Columbia and Indiana "indicate a broad base of support for my candidacy."

But McCarthy and Branigan forces — and promoters of the Humphrey campaign — noted Kennedy was a minority winner. McCarthy said he would have gotten many of Branigan's votes in a two-man contest.

"No one deserves any prizes in this contest," McCarthy said. "We will carry the fight to Nebraska and the Democratic confrontation that was denied us here in Indiana will be given us in Nebraska."

Sen. Walter F. Mondale and Fred R. Harris, co-chairmen of United Democrats for Humphrey said, "It is the only primary in which Sen. Kennedy was opposed by other candidates nearly two out of three where I am because the only way I can do well is to take my campaign to the people."

Nixon, campaigning in Nebraska, said he thinks McCarthy remains a strong Democratic contender because of his massive voter support — but will not win his party's nomination.

"He'll have the enthusiasm but he will not have the money or the organization," Nixon said. "Hubert Humphrey will have the organization; Bobby's got the money."

Nixon also predicted Kennedy would be the Democratic winner in Nebraska, next week and Humphrey will be second on write-in votes.

2,002 Enemy Soldiers Die In Three Days Of Saigon Fighting

SALGON (AP) — The U.S. Command announced today that 2,002 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese soldiers have been killed in the past three days of heavy fighting in and around Saigon.

But despite his heavy losses, the enemy battled on for the fourth day in streets on the capital's western side.

The government put a 24-hour curfew on the western half of Saigon to aid its forces.

In comparison with the 2,002 enemy killed, the U.S. Command said allied casualties in the first three days of the new wave of attacks on Saigon totaled 211 killed and 821 wounded, 30 Americans killed and 323 wounded, 81 South Vietnamese killed and 698 wounded.

U.S. delegation in Paris Tuesday said the enemy had ordered the round-the-clock curfew in the western sector to prevent Viet Cong infiltration.

One enemy 100-pound rocket hit the heart of Saigon, killing a child and wounding another while it landed at Tan Son Nhut air base, on the northwest edge of the city.

A U.S. spokesman said three American servicemen were ordered to the base and damaged in the rocket attack. He said five South Vietnamese also were wounded.

Military sources believe the Viet Cong intends to keep up their urban and street fighting in Saigon in an attempt to influence the U.S.-North Vietnamese preliminary peace talks expected to open Friday in Paris.

Diplomatic Team To Leave Thursday

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former deputy secretary of defense, Gen. Andrew Good-pasteur, under assignment as deputy U.S. military commander in Vietnam, Philip C. Mabib, Asian expert in the State Department, William Jordan, aide to presidential adviser Walt W. Rostow, and Daniel I. Davidson, special assistant to Harrison.

Sergeant Shriver, just sworn in as American ambassador to Paris, is hurrying to his new post, a few days ahead of scheduled departure.

Up to last Sunday according to reports from Saigon, an estimated 100,000 Communist troops have entered South Vietnam since late January — more than 5,000 of them in the first five days of this month. Meanwhile, there have been no U.S. reinforcements, officials said.

Poor People's Campaign Bogs Down

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — The Southern leg of the Poor People's Campaign bogged down here today as leaders held prolonged discussions on the route the march should take through Alabama's capital city.

Original plans called for a downtown march in memory of Dr. Martin Luther King, and officials here feared this might coincide with movement of the body of Gov. Luther Wallace to the Capitol.

However, Mrs. Wallace's body was taken to the Capitol without incident.

About 160 marchers later started toward Dexter Avenue Baptist Church, where King began his civil rights campaigns in the 1950s, is about a block from the Capitol.

The demonstration was to be the last in Montgomery before the marchers board buses for Birmingham, the third Alabama stop on the tour aimed at gaining poverty legislation through Congress.

De Gaulle Views Student Rioting

PARIS (AP) — President Charles de Gaulle discussed student rioting today with his cabinet after police had broken up a demonstration in the morning hours to block a student march on the Sorbonne.

The new fighting grew out of a five-hour demonstration by 10,000 to 20,000 persons.

Concerned about France's image with hundreds of corrections in the U.S., the preliminary peace talks between the United States and North Vietnam, De Gaulle was reported to have said he needed to increase educational facilities.

One Houston Transplant Patient Is Dead

HOUSTON (AP) — One of the three men who underwent heart transplants with live donors died Sunday.

A St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital announcement said James D. Cobb, Alexandria, La., died Sunday morning after unexpected complications developed.

"The transplanted heart was not rejected and functioned well until about 10 hours after the operation occurred," the announcement said.

The cause of death was not known but the hospital said Cobb, who received the heart of a 15-year-old boy Sunday, was believed to have died because of liver and kidney failure.

Meanwhile, the other two patients remained in satisfactory condition.

Patients were J. M. Stuckwisch, 62, Alpine, Tex., and Everett Cline, Thomas, 47, Phoenix, Ariz.

The latest heart recipient, J. M. Stuckwisch, 62, of Alpine, Tex., was either "dead or dying" when the heart of a 30-year-old man was weakly attached to his chest Tuesday, a hospital official said.

The heart of Clarence A. Nichols, Houston, who was transplanted in Stuckwisch's chest in 30 minutes, Everett Cline Thomas, 47, of Phoenix, Ariz., stood up for the first time since he received a new heart.

The question of when the donor died medically and legally died arose as Dr. Denton A. Coohey prepared to lead the surgical team in the Stuckwisch operation.

Harris County Medical Examiner Joseph Jachimczyk said Nichols was pronounced dead at 11:58 a.m. by Dr. Pedro Caram of St. Luke's Hospital.

Caram said an electroencephalograph showed absence of any brain waves. A respirator was used to keep the donor's heart viable before it was placed in Stuckwisch's chest.

The implant to Stuckwisch began six minutes later.

Cobb called about noon and asked permission to proceed with the operation. Dr. Jachimczyk said.

"I couldn't give legal approval," he said. "I would not sign either his or her press charges," the medical examiner said.

"I suppose I gave him my tacit approval," he said.

He would not give his legal approval because an autopsy had not been performed, Jachimczyk said.

Only Nine Of 25 Trapped Miners Have Not Been Contacted Since Flooding

HOMINY FALLS, W. Va. (AP) — Only nine of the 25 miners trapped in a flood of water in a coal mine in southwestern West Virginia on Sunday were unaccounted for, rescue officials said today.

The number of those who have not been contacted since noon Monday was revised from ten to nine.

Officials also said two brothers, Oscar and Otis Dillon, were lowered through an air vent. Wives of two of the miners each talked to their husbands this morning by radio-telephone.

Estimates that the men were trapped in the mine for 10 hours before afternoon today varied in mid-afternoon and the best prediction was that they might not be rescued until midnight.

Officials said one of the men, Otis Dillon, was an officer today. A doctor rushed from a nearby town to check on the men.

Here it would join with surplus or waste water from Rock Creek, be stored in a holding reservoir and then pumped into existing Salmon River Canal Co. laterals and canals.

Mr. Loughmiller said this could then be carried to the lower portion of the Salmon Tract to provide supplemental water to the lower area and other existing supplies would be used to augment the upper portion of the tract.

"In this way," he said, "we could probably provide sufficient water for some 8,000 acres of highly productive farm land."

"We still have a long way to go," Mr. Loughmiller added. "It must all be cleared by legal experts in the field of reclamation and of course must have the full blessing of the Twin Falls Canal Co. In fact, we don't even know if we can do it legally at this point."

Planned Parenthood Chief Says RFK Projects Wrong Image For Presidency

NEW YORK (AP) — An expert on natural resources and population trends declared today a man with 10 children has the wrong image to be president of the United States.

And that, said William Vogt, a former director of the Planned Parenthood Federation, is why Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., if the Democrats nominate him to succeed Lyndon Johnson, would set back the attempt to achieve a rational population policy for years.

Vogt, author of "Road to Survival" and other works on conservation of resources and world population control, asked today the United States population trends declared to who sets such a bad example.

"One of our most cherished tenets is that it's up to the parents to decide how many children they should have — this is the heritage of free people," the spokesman said. And at any rate, the spokesman added, voluntary birth control is working well in the United States despite such families as the Bobby Kennedy's. In 1967 the birth rate dropped to a record low of 17.9 per 1,000 population, compared with 24.4 in 1959.

Vogt, who headed the federation from 1957 to 1961, said its members seem to think it's all right for the rich to have so many kids because the rich can give their children so many advantages. He disagrees.

For one thing, Vogt said, rich

Idaho Congress, Court Candidates File

BOISE (AP)—Candidates for Idaho's congressional and state court elections have filed petitions with the office of Secretary of State Pete T. Conners, but only one congressional nomination will be contested.

The last to file was 30-year-old Joel Anderson of Pocatello, a Republican businessman who will vie with four others for the Republican nomination for Second District U.S. Representative.

Anderson filed his nominating petitions minutes before Conners' office closed Tuesday, as did Supreme Court candidate Steve Bistline of Sandpoint.

Any other petitions postmarked before the Tuesday midnight deadline would also be accepted, Conners said.

Others waiting until the last day to file were Sen. Frank Church of Idaho, who will seek a third six-year term, and Rep. James A. McClure, R-Idaho, who will also seek re-election from the First District.

Sen. Don Loveland of Burley and Gov. James of Idaho Falls are among those who filed as a Second District Republican congressional candidate.

Six candidates have filed for the two Supreme Court seats which will be vacated this year and five have filed for the Second District Republican congressional nomination. Justices, however, are elected on a non-partisan basis.

If a Supreme Court candidate receives a majority of votes cast in the Aug. 6 primary election, he is elected. If no candidate has a majority, the two highest ones run again in the Nov. 5 general election.

Four candidates are after the seat occupied by Justice C. J. Taylor and two are seeking the seat held by Justice E. B. Smith.

Bistline and District Judges Boyd R. Thomas of Idaho Falls, Sherman J. Hollowed of Rupert and Charles R. Donaldson of Boise are seeking Taylor's post. District Judge Merlin S. Young and Atty. Gen. Allan G. Shoard are running for Smith's seat.

Idaho will elect one U.S. Senator and two representatives, plus the two justices of the Supreme Court.

Judge Hagan Views Idaho Election Laws

BOISE (AP)—Fourth District Judge Alfred C. Hagan is considering a request that he declare Idaho's election laws unconstitutional.

The request was made by attorney for former Alabama Gov. George Wallace and the American Independent Party in Idaho, which wants Wallace's name on Idaho's ballot this year as a third-party candidate for president.

However, Idaho law provides neither for a write-in ballot nor for independent presidential candidates.

Boise Attorney Theron Roberts, calling Wallace's party, said state election laws are "clearly and patently unconstitutional" because they deprive a substantial group of electors in Idaho of the opportunity to place their candidate's name on the ballot.

Dan Slavin, representing the party, contended that the alternative of write-in candidates was available to Wallace, nobody was deprived of any rights.

The Wallace attorney argued that in previous court cases a who restrictive state election laws had been upheld in court, there were alternative methods for candidates to get on ballots.

Idaho's Legislature in 1968 repealed the law providing for formation of political parties. Roberts asked that the repeal be declared unconstitutional, and that the court outline a means whereby Wallace's name may be placed on Idaho ballots.

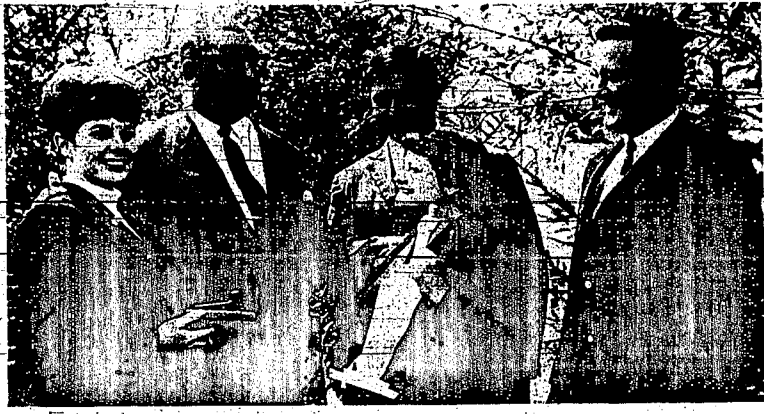

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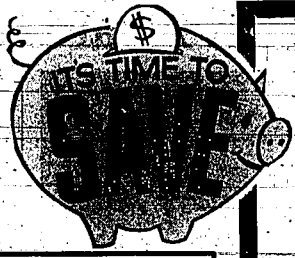

Weather Station Complex To Be Built Near Burley

A telemetry system designed to measure pressure, temperature and radiation will be installed on Mount Harrison south of Burley sometime this summer.

The Army Corps of Engineers has announced an invitation for bids. The work on top of Mount Harrison includes construction of an insulated metal building about 30 feet by 78 feet. It will have a concrete foundation and will include a raised-floor system about 900 square feet in area. There will be air conditioning, electric heating, plumbing and a 2,000-gallon water storage tank.

A gravel road and parking lot will be built in the area and the entire complex will be surrounded by metal fencing.

Primarily the station will be used to measure weather conditions and radiation from outer space.

The project will be awarded to a small business firm, as provided by federal regulations, and requests for bidding documents must reach Corps headquarters at 1519 Alaskan Way South, Seattle, Wash., by May 16.

California Gas Explosion Wrecks House

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP)—A gas explosion heard eight miles away flattened an empty house early today, heavily damaged two others and shattered windows for 10 blocks.

Witnesses said nine persons were scratched and bruised and released after treatment at San Jose Hospital.

A Pacific Gas & Electric Co. spokesman said a search turned up no gas leaks and workmen were mystified as to the cause of the blast.

The utility firm spokesman said the house had been vacated Tuesday because it was being fumigated for termites. But he said the fumigation gas being used was not explosive.

Rockefeller Asks Plans To Aid Cities

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller called today for the development of "creative programs to rebuild our cities" so that slum areas become "decent and productive places to live and work."

The Republican presidential candidate said in a speech prepared for a University of Minnesota audience. "Such programs mean jobs and handouts. They mean paychecks—not welfare checks."

"We must have the courage to take corrective action," the New York governor said. "If our hearts don't tell us that this is so, then the violence exploding in our cities certainly tells us."

He said that Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. "died not for the cause of one color but of one idea: The idea of human dignity. It is this all-embracing—all unifying—idea that we must learn to live."

Rockefeller said the nation cannot live "half in prosperity—half in poverty; half in comfort, half in squalor; half in hope and half in despair any more than we could have endured as a nation half alive and half free."

U.S. Geological Survey To Salvage Skeletal Remains

PUELMAN, Wash. (AP)—The U. S. Geological Survey, with its sophisticated equipment, has been called in to help speed up salvaging the remains of what is reputed to be the Western Hemisphere's earliest known human.

Anthropologist Roald Fryzell, Washington State University professor credited with discovering the 11,000 to 13,000-year-old skeletal remains, said the team must race against a December deadline to remove all remains possible.

The digging site in southeastern Washington is at the Marmes Rockshelter, scheduled to be covered by water when the Lower Monumental Dam reservoir is filled in December.

"Because of the important nature of the data at Marmes Rockshelter, WSU needs the best assistance available," Fryzell said. "With the reservoir to be flooded in December, removal of all possible information will be critical in terms of time," he said.

He said the survey will contribute analyses of samples for radiocarbon age dating as well as well as the correlation of volcanic ash layers.

Reuther Behind In Union Dues

WASHINGTON (AP)—Walter Reuther's United Auto Workers union, currently renewing threats to quit the 14-million-member AFL-CIO, faces the possibility of being kicked out next week for nonpayment of dues.

The Auto Workers, issuing new attacks on AFL-CIO President George Meany's leadership from its convention in Atlantic City, will be three months and about \$250,000 behind in dues May 15 and face automatic expulsion, informed sources said.

The AFL-CIO Executive Council, meeting next week, may take up the matter and some sources predict a majority of its members may be angered enough to oust Reuther's union if it doesn't pay up.

Sources say AFL-CIO leaders of Labor with the Reuther-led Congress of Industrial Organizations.

They are also now moving apart on presidential politics and the impending Poor People's Campaign in the nation's capital.

Meany, 73, is throwing the AFL-CIO's support behind Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey.

The 60-year-old Reuther, re-elected Tuesday to a 12th term.

Meany previously ignored most of Reuther's actions. But there are new elements in the deepening split between the two men who founded the AFL-CIO 12 years ago by merging Meany's American Federation

as UAW president, is officially keeping the Auto Workers neutral in the fight for the Democratic presidential nomination. But he is reportedly leaning toward Sen. Robert F. Kennedy of New York.

Reuther has endorsed the Poor Peoples' Campaign, while Meany, while taking no official position, is reportedly cool to the idea of thousands of marchers besieging government buildings in Washington.

In his latest slap at Meany's leadership, Reuther charged at the Auto Workers convention that the AFL-CIO is "ruled by the dead hand of the past."

Replied Meany: "The American trade union movement today is in the best condition in its entire history."



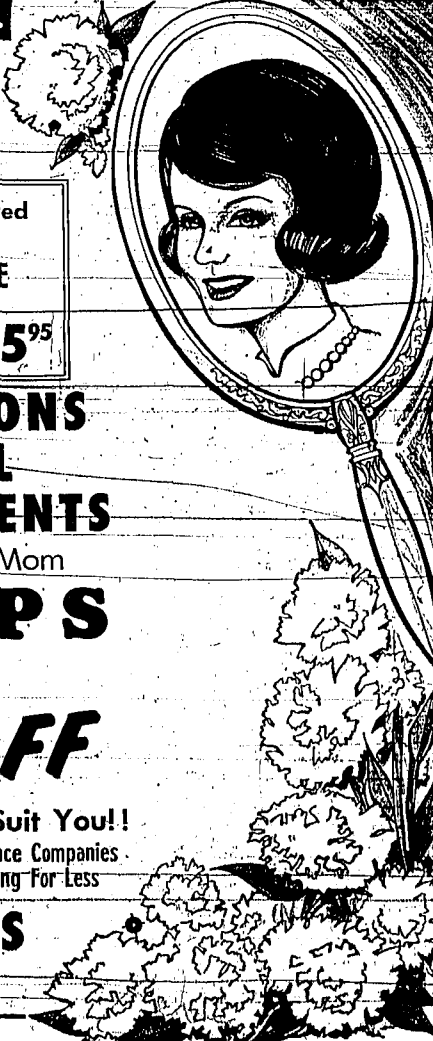

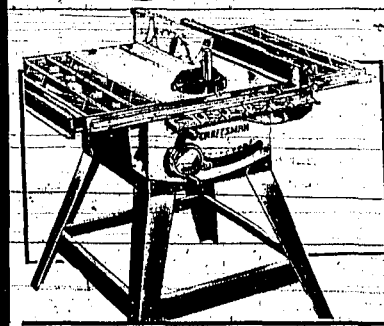

He spent money liberally to transport himself, his retinue, his relatives and his big name friends to all corners of the state. He overwhelmed his opponents with television time.

Against this McCarthy's largely volunteer organization, which had worked so well in previous primaries, couldn't muster crowds or stir up interest to rival that of the Kennedy road show. Branigin didn't even

SPADE SHOWS HEART-VOID

The bidding of today's hand is interesting in that each player had a decision to make at almost every turn to bid. East might well have responded with one spade. He only held four high-card points, but six-card spade suits don't pass on a bush.

South might well have bowed and tried to set one heart, but

part score, but South decided that he had underbid his hand materially and that he wanted to play at game. South's decision was unfortunate but we can't criticize him for making it. He had made only one mid bid with his tremendous hand.

West opened his ace of hearts to have a look around the table. He suspected that there might be a singleton heart somewhere, and if his partner held it, West was going to give him a ruff.

When North showed up with a heart singleton and East played the discouraging deuce, West shifted to his ace of spades.

East wanted his partner to lead another heart. East could overruff dummy, but how could East make sure of that heart shift?

East worked it out! He dropped his king of spades under his partner's ace. West was surprised but he wanted to be surprised to lead a heart and set the contract.
