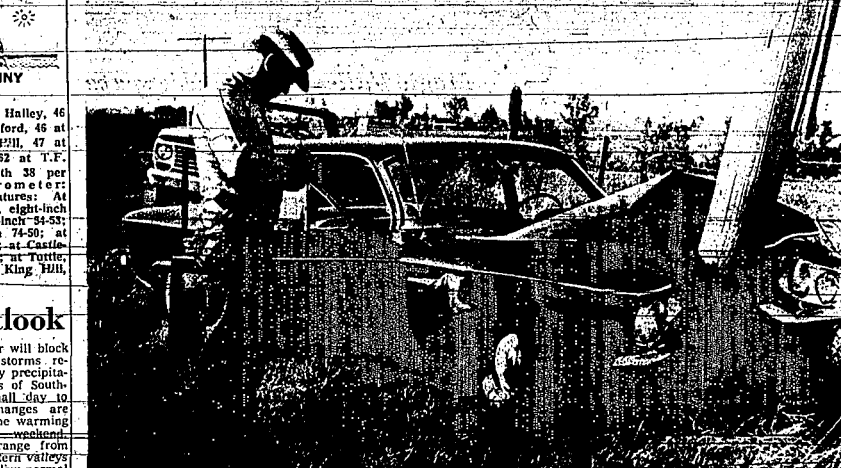

Ghetto Pattern

The rioting, burning and looting in the Watts section of Los Angeles two years ago in August resulted in a fall of about 20 per cent in the value of commercial land and roughly 10 per cent in the value of residential property there.

The estimates are made by Robert A. Steele, partner in a well-known Los Angeles real estate appraisal firm. In a report on "The Impact of Civil Disobedience of Property Values," delivered at a recent conference of the American Institute of Real Estate Appraisers, Steele predicted, however, that substantial rebuilding will take place in Watts within the next three to four years.

Flat Feet

Q-What is the cause of flat feet? Is heredity a factor? Is there any exercise to correct flat feet?

A-Many children are born with flat feet. In such cases, heredity is undoubtedly a factor. Knock-knees can accentuate the condition. In most persons, flat feet are no handicap and cause no problems. Gradually, however, some persons develop a flat foot. This is usually due to the fact that the arch of the foot flattens out as a result of the weight of the body and the strain of walking.

Q-I always thought that poorly fitted shoes were the cause of corns. A foot doctor told me he could remove the corns by an injection of prednisolone into the involved joint.

A-Poorly fitted shoes are the cause of corns and calluses. An injection of prednisolone into the involved joint is not a cure for corns or calluses. It is a temporary measure to relieve the pain and inflammation.

Hailey Bank Sets Open House On Saturday

HAILEY—The First Security Bank of Idaho will hold open house from 1:30 to 6 p.m. Saturday in the newly completed \$33,000 building.

Oscar Cline, bank manager, said the new one-story structure, with full basement, contains 2,300 square feet of floor space. The public banking room has five letter stations, officers' room, a vault and conference room. The bookkeeping area, book vault, lunch room and mechanical rooms are in the basement.

The interior of the building is of redwood paneling on three walls with exposed golden buff face brick on the entry and north wall. The brick building has an entry foyer with enclosing glass vestibule which creates an open visual effect from outside.

Banking machine demonstrations and an unique coin and currency exhibit will be featured throughout the afternoon. Mr. Cline said.

The location of the new banking quarters on the corner of Main and Bullion streets has had a bank on it since the Wall Banking Co., Ltd. was incorporated in June 1903, by Ephraim Daft, Irving E. Rockwell, Leo Cramer, W. H. Wait and Hugh Cramer, pioneer Wood River residents.

The next year the name was changed to Rockwell and Co. Bankers. This firm sold the property to S. Whittier in January 1905, and he sold it to the First National Bank of Hailey. This bank operated until June 1908, when it was sold to the Hailey National Bank.

On Jan. 21, 1939, the Hailey National Bank was purchased

by the First Security Bank of Idaho. Mr. Cline points out the Hailey office of the First Security Bank has an interesting history closely associated with the men and institutions which were the forerunners of the First Security system.

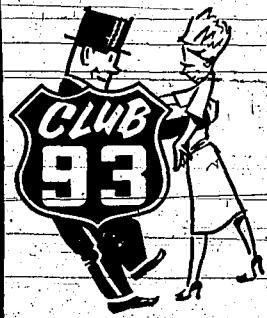

Summer Classes Are Planned At Rupert

RUPERT — Between 50 and 60 children of migrant laborers in the Mindoko County School District are expected to enroll in the Migrant Labor Program. It is to be sponsored for the first time this summer in the school system under the provisions of Public Law 69-10, Title I.

Don Lowder, assistant superintendent for the district, said the money for the program will be supplied by the federal government and is anticipated to be in the amount of nearly \$31,000 for the educational aspect of the program.

The eligible Spanish-American students will meet in a moveable building presently under construction by the Cascade Components in Pocatello for a sum of \$13,600. The building is designed for four small classrooms, with moveable partitions to enable them to be converted

to accommodate anywhere from one to the four rooms.

Two teachers and four teachers aides will instruct the students, who must be between the ages of 5 and 10 years, in the basics of English, arithmetic and social behavior. The classrooms will be located near the Pershing elementary school in Rupert. Classes begin June 10 and run for six weeks.

In the fall the building will be used as a recreation and testing center for all the migrant students who move into the school district. At the center, the students will be tested to determine whether or not they can achieve if placed in a regular classroom. If the tests indicate that the student could not succeed sufficiently in the normal class, he will be retained in the special migrant labor class to study the subjects of English, math, and social behavior, as in the summer program.

In the fall program, all school-aged migrant students are eligible for the special courses. No charge will be made for the special class.

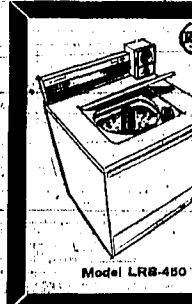

Grants Available For Some Students

If you are a college student or high school graduate ready for college, you may be eligible for federal Educational Opportunity Grants of \$200 to \$300 a year. The program is limited to undergraduates.

If you were in the top half of your college class the preceding year and if you have demonstrated the need for additional funds, you may be awarded an additional \$200 a year.

Any student in extreme financial need who has been accepted for admission at a public college, or who is already enrolled full time and in good standing, is eligible to apply for an Educational Opportunity Grant.

The young man or woman must be financially unable to remain in school without the grant. He must show evidence of academic or creative promise.

The grant may be no more than half the financial aid supported by the college from its own resources. The balance could include a National Defense Student Loan or a college scholarship or employment. It cannot include student earnings under the College Work-Study program.

For more information, see or write the financial aid officer at the college of your choice. Application for a grant should be sent to the college, not the Office of Education.

Here are other special grant programs:

Upward Bound
Several hundred colleges operate summer Upward Bound courses for more than 25,000

high school students with mediocre school records who have talents "worth developing at college."

Upward Bound is primarily a talent hunt. Secondly, it is a field. It stresses motivation. Students receive a stipend which ranges up to \$10 a week.

They are chosen for this program by teachers, school principals, and counselors, and juvenile authorities. More information is available from Upward Bound, Office of Economic Opportunity, Washington, D.C. 20506.

Social Security Educational Benefits

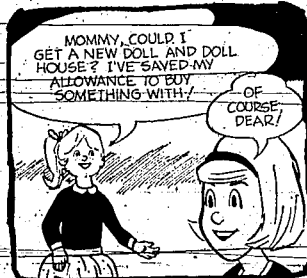

Low Water In Lemhi River Being Watched

By LARRY HOVEY Times-News Sports Editor

SALMON—Idaho's short water year already is causing problems for the Idaho Fish and Game Department, the Lemhi River staging a replay of its anadromous fish threat two years ago.

Due to the sub-normal snow pack, the river cannot provide enough flow to fill the needs of steelhead and chinook salmon and the needs of irrigation.

The major problem isn't now, notes biologist Don Corley, and the headaches might "go on" within 10 days—about the target date for arrival of the first salmon.

"Right now we have a few adult steelhead in the Lemhi and we are interested in saving them since they are part of the plantings we made in 1965. A

rain yesterday (Wednesday) kept the flow up in good shape. There are no passage problems today (Thursday)," he said. "If we are lucky enough to keep getting some rain right along, we could get by without any problems with the salmon."

"But we're keeping a close eye on the situation and we're ready with everything we can think of to get maximum benefit out of the salmon spawners that get this far," he promised.

The department's remedy is two-fold. Two years ago Corley's crews laid several hundred feet of plastic to seal the wing in irrigation diversion dams. The dams basically are rock made and very porous. The plastic sealer kept the irrigation flow up to snuff but "saved" enough water for three and four-foot legs that were stripped from the

ground unsatisfied. "If the dam flow up, the problem could increase by next weekend when the first spring Chinook Salmon are due. The Idaho Fish and Game Department has worked out the logistics to insure against spawning failure."

Corley emphasized these precautionary measures may not be needed. However, he added, two of the largest wing dams already have been sealed.

Currently, his biggest interest is in the steelhead run. "We have taken 30 adults at the Lemhi weir that were marked and definitely are returnees from our 1965 plant. We have some of the nation's top drivers. \$3.01 seconds, of 169.779 m.p.h. in time trials for last year's 500 mile race. This year's trials will start Saturday."

Corley concluded.

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Negro football candidates at the University of California are boycotting a meeting, demanding the right to say who should play which position and when.

Coach Ray Wilsey silently read their demands, presented by one athlete and one student non-athlete, declined them, and handed back the paper.

"I do not believe these prerogatives of a coach are negotiable," he said. "I cannot ignore my responsibilities."

He refused to give details of the demands.

He also refused to name any of the athletes.

"I will not initiate any name calling," he said today. "I don't want to appear to the public to be exposing them to ridicule."

He said in a statement: "I will be denied to have no understanding young men because of their ancestry."

New Bail Bond Schedule Noted

JEROME—According to Justice of the Peace Irving Altman, the Idaho Magistrates Association has constituted a new bail bond schedule.

By state law, any person convicted of a misdemeanor in justice court may be fined up to \$300 and, or six months in the county jail. As of May 1, bonds will be drawn while intoxicated, \$300; reckless driving, \$200; driving with suspended license, \$200; basic rule violation, \$40; and speeding, \$1 per mile for the first 20 miles in excess of the limit, then \$2 per mile on speed exceeding 40 miles per hour.

Detroit Newspaper Strike Has Lasted 6 Months

DETROIT (AP)—The Detroit newspaper strike has lasted six months as of Thursday with neither unions nor publishers showing signs of changing their positions.

The American Newspaper Publishers Association lists a 230-day shutdown of the Terre-Haute (Ind.) Star and Tribune in 1964-65 as the longest ever, but these newspapers combined have less than a 10th the circulation of either the News or

The 13 unions still without contracts—nine are not on strike—have at least an unofficial understanding that none will go back until all do.

The strike that started in 1967, when the Teamsters Union struck the News in support of new contract demands.

Two days later the Free Press shut down voluntarily. The newspapers operate under an agreement that allows against one a strike against another.

Twice Teamsters at the News voted down settlements, negotiated by their representatives. Final agreement didn't come until March 15.

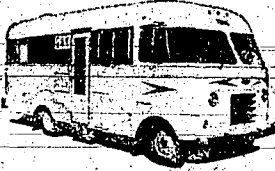
The strike then was 121 days old, the contracts of the 13 other unions with which the newspapers deal had expired and four of them had proclaimed themselves officially on strike and started picketing.

The publishers settled with the Teamsters on a three-year contract, effective at the resumption of publication, and carrying pay increases of \$11.

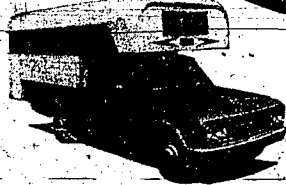

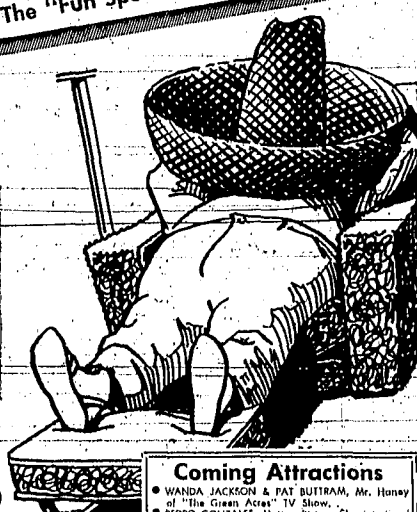

All in all, despite the weather and the storm, the annual event was very successful.

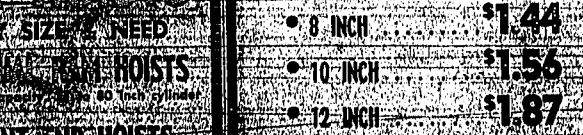

However, Idaho growers who have had potatoes for the spring and summer markets have not always been compensated for the extra storage. It has not been unusual for potatoes to bring less in the latter part of the season than at the beginning. If growers are rewarded for holding for the late market this year, it could provide incentive for further efforts to extend the marketing season.

The recent price increases may also influence the acreage planted this spring. Banks had early in March a summary of planting intentions indicated the 1968 acreage would be five per cent less than last year. Actual plantings frequently exceed the estimates. A 1968 crop of the size indicated by current planting prospects and a favorable growing season could result in price problems for Idaho producers again next fall.

The summary said Idaho cattle feeders had 10 per cent more cattle on feed April 1 than at the same time a year ago. They placed 31 per cent more cattle on feed during the January-March period. Marketing days are expected to total over April the first quarter were an average of four per cent from 1967. Prices in May or June are expected to be higher.

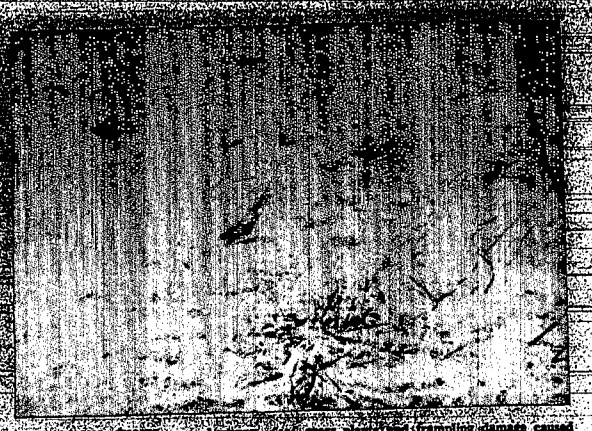

How Tough Is Newly Seeded Grass? Soil Conservationist Offers Tips

BUHL - Your grass is just about as tough as the grass seeded in the above photo. This was a good stand of young Whitman wheatgrass, seeded in the fall on a range but grazed the area for seven days during the last of July. It was estimated that this grass is 95 per cent of the stand already destroyed by pulling out and trampling the grass. The cattle had only utilized the seeded grass, which was the most palatable plant in the area.

According to Lewis Perce, soil conservationist, Buhl, anyone that has prepared and seeded an area knows that it is an expensive operation and that it is uneconomical to have to do it over several times. The operator has to pull out and trample the grass, the loss of forage during the extended establishment period. So it is important that the operator does everything possible to get an established stand the first try.

Also, it is usually safe to assume that when an operator seeds a pasture or range, he plans to maintain it as such for a long while. With this in mind, it is doubtful that he could afford to establish or maintain much less than a full stand of forage.

A large per cent of the grass seedings made start out as excellent stands in order to obtain these stands a good seed has been used. The far the ground was prepared into a good firm seedbed, the seed was drilled at the proper time and depth and mother nature has done her part.

This far the operator has it made, the hard part is completed. Why does he lose the seedling? He realizes that the young plants are easily killed that they can't compete with faster growing more aggressive plants.

He also knows of other things that can develop during seeding and full plant establishment. Probably no one knows of all the things that will prevent a seeding failure. However, if an operator does understand as much as is known about grass
