

Defiant Youths In East, West Declare War On 'The Establishment'

PARIS (AP) — Rebellious youths in East and West have declared war on The Establishment.

In the East, the Establishment is the Communist party and its bureaucracy. In the West it is the bourgeoisie and its system.

Whether they are ruled by Communists or capitalists, growing numbers of young people see around them a world

they did not make and do not want.

The black flags of anarchism and the red flags of communism flying over the stately old Sorbonne in Paris signal the students' rebellion which has pushed Charles de Gaulle's Fifth Republic into deep crisis.

The bourgeois state must be destroyed, proclaims a big, hand-painted sign on the portico of the university's chapel. Another says: "In Warsaw, Prague, Madrid, Algiers, New York, Tokyo and Rome, students

are fighting in the struggle against capitalism and against the Stalinist bureaucracy.

France is virtually under siege because the student protest has blossomed into nationwide strikes, strikes and protests against the government.

Red China, too, is an extreme example of war against "the high and mighty bureaucracy." This struggle is controlled and directed by the followers of Mao Tse-tung. The target is the entrenched party bureaucracy,

which after the Communist takeover in 1950 became huge and difficult for Mao to handle, a power instrument in the hands of others. Mao feared that the party would surrender its influence to the bureaucracy, the strong and authoritative Establishment.

In the Soviet Union, in Communist Poland and East Germany, it is youthful demonstrators who are the trouble-makers. All the unrest has had its distinct manifestations in resistance to established systems.

As in the West, students and intellectuals join hands in protest. In the East, the protest is against lack of intellectual and cultural freedom. In the West, such freedoms are taken for granted, but the same young forces join hands in protest against conformity, against those they feel made a mess of the world the young will inherit.

In the United States and other countries, the Western Hemisphere, once again the Establishment finds itself the target of youngsters who resist conformity.

There are 600,000 university students in France, more than three times the number in years ago, and the ranks of highbrows are growing all the time. The facilities can no longer keep up with them. About a fifth of these students are reported directly involved in the rebellion.

In Paris, they include anarchists, nihilists, Trotskyists, Catholics, Alais, Guayras — anything but admirers of the French Establishment, in which the rebel students scornfully include the orthodox French Communist party.

They are openly demanding destruction of the state, as it now exists. The atmosphere may appear carnival and gay to the onlooker, but the students say they are deadly serious. Not only must De Gaulle go, they insist, but everything he stands for. And with him must go those methods considered responsible for the system — across the political spectrum: from extreme right to the orthodox Communist left.

Marines Caught In 3 Attacks

SAIGON (AP) — North Vietnamese troops made three ground attacks on U.S. Marines along South Vietnam's northern frontier Sunday and sent big rockets smashing into fuel and ammunition stores at the headquarters of the U.S. 1st Air Cavalry Division.

The U.S. Command said the Marines repulsed the attacks near Khe Sanh and Con Thien, killing 127 North Vietnamese soldiers and capturing 58 weapons. Twelve Marines were reported killed and 49 wounded.

But the enemy's 100-pound rockets did "heavy" damage to the ammunition stores at Camp Evans, the 1st Air Cav headquarters 16 miles northwest of Hue, as well as "light" damage to fuel stores, material and facilities. Eight personnel casualties also were reported.

Heavy damage to the ammunition means that so much of it was blown up that the military at Con Thien will have to replace their mission until their supply was replenished.

U.S. officers say five divisions of the heaviest attack Sunday. North Vietnamese troops opened up on a small Marine unit sweeping a road two miles southwest of the Khe Sanh base in the northwest corner of South Vietnam.

Marine tanks quickly reinforced the ground troops to help beat back the enemy troops. Three Marines were killed and dead on the battlefield. Eight Marines were reported killed and 34 wounded.

George Comstock, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Comstock, Wendell, died at 3:55 a.m. at St. Benedict's Hospital. Officers said he struck the steering wheel of the Volkswagen he was driving, but that death was attributed to extensive head injuries. The car, which was destroyed, was owned by Dwayne Olsen, Wendell's father, and Mrs. George Roberts.

Van Smith and David Roberts, both listed in good condition. All four boys were graduated from Wendell High School Sunday night. They are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Olsen, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Smith and Mrs. and Mrs. George Roberts.

Idaho Road Mishaps Claim Nine Lives

Idaho's traffic death toll for the year was 94 today after it emerged that nine more persons were killed in traffic accidents on the state's roads.

Four Mountain Home teenagers were killed and a man critically injured about 10:30 p.m. when a car driven by Sheldon D. Chatham, 17, was struck by one driven by Kenneth C. Copeland, 24, King Hill, Idaho.

Chatham was killed, along with three of his four passengers. Dead were David Wallace, 16, Gale Becker, 16, and Charles Thomas, 16. The fifth occupant of the car, Gregory Hardy, 16, was hospitalized with injuries.

Norman McArthur, about 21, of Castleford, was one of Copeland's passengers and was hospitalized in critical condition in Mountain Home. Copeland, 24, was in fair condition and Robert Crain, 24, of French, was in good condition.

Elmore County Sheriff Earl Winter said Chatham's car was struck in the side by Copeland's auto when Chatham's auto attempted to cross Idaho 67 artery highway, also with Idaho 67 west of Mountain Home.

A Clarkston, Wash., boy, 15-year-old Monte Lewis, died about 10:30 a.m. when his motorcycle left a 34-mile road south of Lewiston, Idaho, traveled 17 1/2 feet and struck a truck wall, state police said.

Two petty larceny suspects, Idaho man and his grandson were killed earlier when his car crashed through a guard rail and down a 16-foot embankment near Ashukha, Idaho. The victims were Chester C. Nealey and 11-month-old William Todd Piper of Caldwell. Nealey and Deborah Piper of Caldwell, were hospitalized.

Six-month-old Shane Godfrey of Burley was killed in a two-car crash 18 miles east of Burley on Interstate 15W.

State police said his mother, Mrs. Deloy Godfrey, was driving the car and 18-year-old Riley of Burley was driving the other.

The death toll on this date last year was 75.

Surprise Expressed At Carcasses Near Burley

BURLEY — Many people expressed surprise Monday that conditions such as described in Sunday's Times-News regarding dead animals and debris dumped along the Snake River west of Burley actually existed.

Burley city officials also reported they had been made aware of the situation when the dogcatcher was told that a pile of dogs was seen eating on the carcasses.

Health officials in Twin Falls said last week the unauthorized dumping of old cars and animals, mostly from persons, on and around several miles of the Snake River had been investigated and they felt that the debris had been properly buried.

However, residents in Burley Monday have asked why the carcasses were buried some 200 feet from the river when the law states such dumping cannot be done within one-quarter of a mile of a public thoroughfare, which officials consider the Snake River is.

A dead calf, photographed at the water's edge last week, still was at the site Sunday.

James Ingalls, Twin Falls, district health department sanitarian officer, told the Times-News Friday his department would make further examinations of the site to make certain all animals are removed and that the river are no longer used for dumping refuse.

France Nears Paralysis With Mounting Strikes

PARIS (AP) — Strikes snow-balled rapidly across France in a wave of social protest today and the nation approached total paralysis, Paris' big central market, while truck drivers remained at their jobs.

Most miners were out, the 600,000 members of the Northern Basins joined the strike of their comrades in Lorraine.

The 10,000 men of the Alsace potash mines and the 7,000 men of the mines in the Blanzy Basin at Marignane, near Mars-

Electricity workers in Paris continued to provide power all day, though they have occupied the 1,200-ton of a French oil refinery at Le Havre and 2,000 of a Shell refinery near Marseille put down their tools.

Reports of other stoppages poured in from outside Paris. The 2,500 of the French plant of the international tractor of St. Die, nearly 10,000 in the Sud-Alvion plant at the port of Rochefort, and an unlimited strike of the same firm's factories in the Bligny Basin at Marignane, near Mars-

Paris on chartered buses. Only the big Paris inter-urban airport was almost deserted as airlines switched their flights to Brussels, Belgium, and other cities.

France's Channel ferries to Britain remained in port.

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Harriman Sends Aide To Brief British On Paris Peace Talks

PARIS (AP) — Ambassador W. Averell Harriman sent a high-level aide today to brief the British on the status of preliminary Vietnam peace talks here, in advance of British Foreign Secretary Michael Stewart's forthcoming trip to the Socialist union.

The official U.S. spokesman at the talks, in which the American and North Vietnamese stands apparently remain far apart, was asked whether the United States was requesting the British government to serve as go-between for the Americans and Russians on the peace issue. He replied that since Washington and Moscow have agreed to the affirmative position taken by the United States delegation in the talks was the correct one, rather than getting involved in the propaganda exercise which has characterized the Hanoi approach.

Stewart's Moscow sojourn

Jordan said there have been no private contacts between the American and North Vietnamese delegation members since the Saturday session.

When the talks reopen Wednesday, the big snag, as before, is likely to be North Vietnam's insistence that the United States, without asking any concessions in return, end all bombings and acts of war against the North.

Harriman and the No. 2 U.S. envoy, Cyrus R. Vance, called on the South Vietnamese ambassador here for a 40-minute review of the talks so far. Harriman told newsmen as he left the South Vietnamese consulate that he and Bill Diehl, U.S. ambassador to Hanoi, had agreed to the affirmative position taken by the United States delegation in the talks was the correct one, rather than getting involved in the propaganda exercise which has characterized the Hanoi approach.

When he arrived at the South Vietnamese consulate, Harriman told newsmen he wanted to

get some information from the South Vietnamese delegation and to keep them fully informed. He wants to get their feeling of view and judgment.

Knowledgeable American and French diplomats believe a compromise will be found to end the U.S. bombing of North Vietnam, reduce North Vietnamese infiltration into the South and move to full-scale peace negotiations.

But the possibility that the differences between the Americans and the North Vietnamese will persist and that the talks will eventually collapse cannot be ruled out.

The expectation of a compromise agreement rests on the belief that the final purpose of both sides is to make peace.

That remains to be proved. One main purpose of the United States and North Vietnam in the talks to date has been to find out what the other's real expectations is. A second obviously is to make propaganda, and presumably a third is to put bargaining positions on the table.

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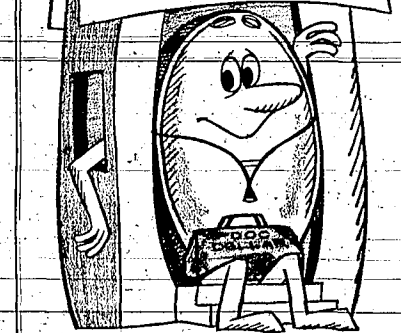
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Rights Leaders Watch Idaho Unit

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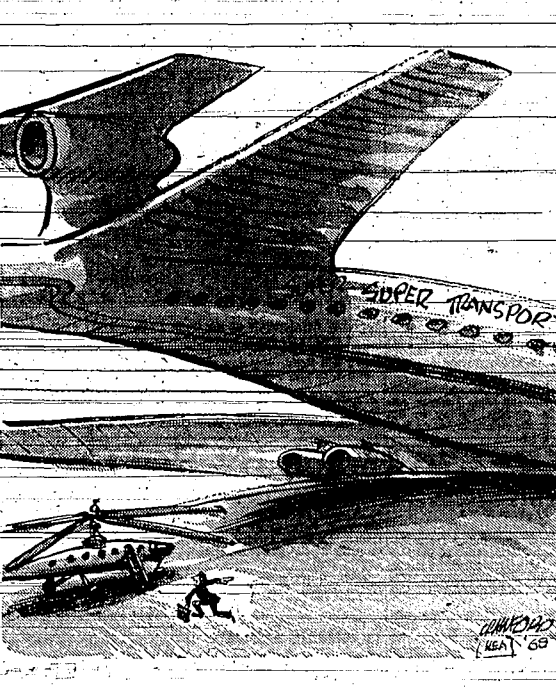
Only A Moment

Education In Private Schools

For a hundred years the Protestant Church and public education in the United States were inseparable. The Lord's Prayer and the Golden Rule were taught in most every classroom every day. Traditional Christian religious holidays were observed in classrooms, school assemblies and extracurricular school programs. Since the Supreme Court banned prescribed prayers from public schools, there has been a national revival of interest in private schools. Protestant schools are presently being organized at the rate of 25 a year. Americans, hard taxed to support public schools, are willing to pay extra to provide for their children education in a Christian environment. Several factors contribute to this phenomenon. Enforced desegregation of public schools has encouraged the formation of private segregated schools in some states. Overcrowded public schools have motivated those who can afford it to seek the more pure and unadulterated state of the smaller school. Grotesque misbehavior, individual and organized, which now characterizes many public schools has alienated both students and faculty. Private church-related schools hereofore could not compete in the open market against the higher teachers' salaries available in tax-subsidized schools. Now many teachers, some fearing for their personal safety, flee the "blackboard jungle" for the happier environment of a "selective" school. If there is less pay, there are more "fringe benefits" on a Christian campus. The largest organization of these Christian day-school educators is the California Assn. of Christian Schools. These are not "parochial" schools. They are supported in whole or in part by a church, but each is open to anybody who is academically qualified and willing to live and work by the rules. Based on achievement tests, students of the CACS schools are academically a year ahead of the national average. Years ago it was argued that students maturing in a "sheltered environment" would, like hollow plans, be unprepared for the rigors of the real world. Now more and more Americans are realizing that it is fact

Wayne Brandstadt, M.D. Baseball Elbow

Little League's elbow, an injury that has been recognized for many years, is still with us. The onset is gradual. The condition develops only in the throwing arm and is caused chiefly in pitchers, especially those who are 13 or 14 years old. A separation of a fragment of bone at the end of the elbow or a chip fracture is the underlying trouble. The best treatment is prevention. This requires making sure that the players report promptly any pain or soreness that develops in an elbow, discouraging attempts to throw curve balls by boys in this age group, restricting pitching practice to a minimum and shortening the playing season. Any boy who develops a sore elbow should be watched for the rest of the season. Our daughter, 2 1/2, gets frequent them. How can we prevent them? Will she outgrow them? If your daughter rubs her eyes, which may be likely, she may spread staphylococci from one eye to the other or from her nose to her eyes. Not applicable help to bring a styo to a head, then you should have your doctor lance it and drain it. Yellow oxide of mercury ointment placed on the lids will help to dry the crusts and infection. Washing her hands and face with a soap that contains hexachlorophene will also help. Although the condition is common in children they can occur at any age. Your daughter will not outgrow them but you can help her to control them in time. Q—My daughter, 2 1/2, has a congenital heart defect called coronary artery anomaly. She appears to be healthy and is very active. How serious is this condition? A—The severity of congenital heart defects varies widely. If a child with an abnormal coronary artery survives her first year of life the chances are she will live a very old and comfortable life. Compensation has taken place through other arteries, taking over the function of the abnormal artery. I assume that the defect was discovered as an incidental finding when she was being examined for some other condition.

THEIR PROTEST JUST WASN'T CHILDISH ENOUGH. Some University students want a voice in picking the new university president. Students should be represented on the search committee. But the group that staged the sit-in at Johnson Hall to demonstrate their interest in higher education went about it all wrong. The new president can't possibly be in the "later" before the summer of 1968. That means that this year's seniors and juniors won't be around to sit on a log with the new man and absorb wisdom. Even the freshmen and sophomores will have only one or two years of association with him. How about the students whose educations will be even more sharply influenced by the new man's policies? They are the ones to worry about. In the last 42 years, the university president has stayed an average of seven years. That's not a very long time to influence the last change in a graduating class in 1978. The first senior who will have spent his freshman year with the new man will be a member of the class of 1973. From the representation on the search committee calls for the appointment, right now, of a high school junior, high school sophomore, a ninth grader and a high school senior. These are the ones who have the most at stake. — Eugene Regester-Guard.

RECLINING CUSTOMERS The action of a few University of Oregon students in making a bunk house of the U. of O. Administration building is a poor argument for giving students a greater voice in university administration, specifically the selection of a new president for the Eugene school. Students should be consulted on administrative decisions — as they work hard in their days. But they have no valid claim to a decisive voice in university administration. The public colleges and universities of the state are the property of the people of Oregon, devoted to the education of youth. Their responsible officials, including members of the Oregon State Board of Higher Education, are the agents of the people, operating under provisions of state law. Students outnumber faculty and staff in the university community. But their status is temporary and in other ways much different from that of teachers and administrators. The latter have responsibility for decisions governing academic and physical program extending over many generations of students. Students are in effect, the customers. And this is one form of merchandising in which the customer is not always right. This week's article by Eugene Regester-Guard in the Eugene campus inadvertently chose a way of demonstrating this point to the general public — thereby hurting their cause. The "specimen of student squatters" in law administrative or academic affairs. — The Oregonian.

Many brilliant minds conspired with a kindly spirit of new knowledge to bring the miracle of the world to the fore. Thought to their learning, their industry and their genius ours, we need undergo the embarrassment of sitting in the library with a book on the shelves that is just a few pages too short. — St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

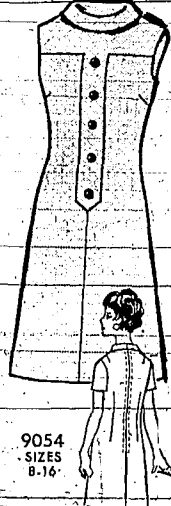

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Favorite Recipe Is Winner

All good cooks have a collection of cookbooks and a recipe file they keep adding new food ideas to. A Filer woman will be sharing one of her favorite recipes with women all over the nation when it appears in the June issue of Family Circle magazine.

Mrs. Douglas' (Birdene) George, household of four, has resided in Idaho for about one year, moving here from Washington. She likes to cook and enjoys trying new ideas.

Her recipe for "Baked Bologna Jubilee" was selected from among 3,400 reviewed and tested by the national magazine in its search to find new and interesting ways to prepare foods. Mrs. George noted she had submitted 11 recipes, all favorites of hers and all easy to prepare—and nutritious.

According to Ann Serenne, food expert and judge for the magazine's "Contest for Clever Cooks," the first determining factor in awarding prizes was originality. Recipes selected for testing also were examined for sound shortcuts that do not sacrifice quality and ingenious use of less-costly ingredients. Great care was taken in all testing. Nothing but standard measuring cups and spoons were used. Cooking times and times were followed precisely. When considered necessary, minor adjustments were made. For example, since the flavor intensity of certain ingredients, particularly spices and herbs, can vary drastically from one household or locality to another, how much salt or pepper is needed, or desirable often depends on personal preference. Judgments about savings in time or money had to be relative. What seems quick or inexpensive to Mrs. Brown who is cooking for herself and her husband, might seem exactly the opposite to Mrs. Murphy who is feeding a large family on a limited budget.

Ultimately dishes were judged on the basis of flavor, texture and eye appeal.

Here is Mrs. George's prize-winning recipe:

BAKED BOLOGNA JUBILEE
Makes 8 servings

- 1 piece bologna, weighing about 3 pounds
- Whole cloves
- 4 cups mixed, sliced or cut-up pared fresh fruits
- 1 cup firmly-packed brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine

Peel covering. If any, from bologna; cut bologna in half lengthwise. Score rounded side of each half in diamond pattern—stud meat with whole cloves. Place halves cut sides down in a greased baking dish 13 by 9 by 2 inches. Arrange fruits around meat.

Blend brown sugar, cinnamon and orange and lemon juices in a small bowl; drizzle over meat and fruits. Dot fruits with butter or margarine; cover pan.

Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees, 20 minutes; uncover. Spoon juices in dish over meat. Bake 10 minutes longer, or until lightly glazed.

Douglas received an Emmy for his appearance in "Do Not Sit Gentle into That Good Night" on the CBS Playhouse and Miss Stapleton was named for "Among the Paths to Eden," an ABC special.

George Schaefer's production of "Elizabeth the Queen" on the Hall of Fame on NBC was honored as the outstanding dramatic program.

It was a night of double and multiple awards to performers, producers and programs by the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences in New York and Los Angeles. The awards program was telecast by NBC.

"Rowan and Martin's Laugh-In," mid-week replacement on NBC, was named the outstanding variety series and its presentation as a special fact in selected spots, the outstanding variety program. Its writing team won the Emmy in the variety category for writing.

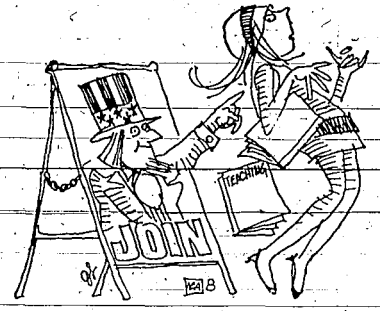

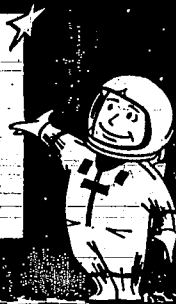
