University Fire Claims Ohio Coed

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—A fire official says appeared "abnormally" killed one coed and injured another at the University of Ohio State University. The blaze broke out in an 11th floor suite of the 24-floor circular tower which houses approximately 1,000 students. There were 20 coeds on the floor. All survived. The dead girl, who died in nearby University Hospital several hours after the fire of smoke inhalation, was identified as Elizabeth Ann Galt, a senior in Twin Falls. She was a freshman majoring in arts and sciences. Nine students suffered minor injuries and were admitted to the hospital. They were treated and released, and two coeds are in critical condition. University Vice President Hildon B. Carson closed the 11th floor and said an intensive investigation was under way to determine what actually started the fire. He said the blaze definitely began in a lounge of one of the six four-bedroom suites on the floor, the central core of which is an elevator shaft.

15th Heart Transplant Performed

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—The heart of a 17-year-old boy heart today in the chest of Louis John Fiero, world's 15th heart transplant patient and the fourth man to receive a donated heart at St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital. A surgical team led by Dr. Denton A. Cooley implanted the heart in 10 minutes Tuesday. The donor was a 17-year-old N.Y. automobile salesman, was listed as "highly satisfactory condition" half an hour after the operation. The donor was Hubert Brundage of Pasadena, Tex., who died at 10:35 p.m. A hospital spokesman said the teen-ager suffered a brain hemorrhage and was transferred to St. Luke's from Southwest Hospital in Pasadena earlier in the evening. Fiero was admitted to the hospital Monday afternoon. At 10:30 a.m. he had suffered numerous heart attacks. He is in stable condition.

Jury Begins Deliberating Brown's Fate

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—A jury of 12 U.S. district court judges is deliberating the fate of H. Rap Brown today after a federal judge charged them not to convict the Black Power leader unless they find the government proved he was aware of an indictment when he took a firearm across state lines. In a 35-minute charge to the jury, U.S. District Judge James Lansing Mitchell directed them to make "no presumption of guilt" by failure of the defense to produce evidence. Brown's chief counsel was the only witness for the defense. Judge Mitchell told the jury which included nine women, that he had no doubt that a conviction the government did not need to prove Brown received judicial notice of the indictment. He said the government needed to prove only that Brown knew he had been indicted. The jury heard final arguments Tuesday night after the defense rested its case with testimony from one witness.

(Continued From Page 1) because of a delay in a suspect's arraignment after his arrest. But later the Senate adopted an amendment by Sen. Hugh Scott, R-Pa., modifying this by providing a confession would not be inadmissible because of an arraignment delay if it were made within six hours of a suspect's arrest. By a 63-21 vote the Senate rejected a non-entirely pertinent provision making identification of a defendant by an eye witness to a crime inadmissible as evidence in federal court. This is aimed at a Supreme Court decision last year barring such identifications if the eye witness first had identified the defendant "at a police lineup" when the suspect did not have a lawyer. Defeated 52 to 32 was a provision that would have barred the Supreme Court and other federal courts from reviewing or reversing a state court ruling admitting a confession in evidence as voluntarily given, if the ruling had been upheld by the state's highest court. On a 51 to 39 vote, the Senate wiped out a provision that would have denied federal courts authority to review or reverse the admission of eyewitness identifications in state trials. It was another provision that would have stricken the federal courts jurisdiction to hear habeas corpus petitions by state prisoners who contend they had been convicted in violation of their constitutional rights.

Wilson Maintains Lease On Office

LONDON (AP)—Harold Wilson and his Labor government kept their lease on political office by Tuesday night, but only by a narrow 35-vote margin in the House of Commons of an unpopular bill to curb wage and price increases which they had passed last week. The bill, a keystone of the government's program to put British trade into the black, passed by a revolt by left-wing laborites. The government's margin on the decisive second reading for the bill was its lowest for a major issue in this parliament. Thirty-four laborites abstained and 10 voted against the bill.

Warning Issued To Dog Owners

BUHL—Twin Falls Deputy Sheriff Curt Prout issued a warning to dog owners allowing their animals to run loose. Any dogs found running through town will be destroyed on the premises and owners held liable for any damage incurred, following the killing of several people by a loose dog which bit both dogs were destroyed on the Southwick farm two miles south of Buhl. Two dogs, believed to be strays, killed four sheep and mauling 16 which had to be destroyed by Mr. Southwick. Ten others were also injured. Damages were estimated at \$1,000. Prout said that both dogs were destroyed on the Southwick property.

Kennedy Views Policy With Farmers

PENDELTON, Ore. (AP)—Sen. Robert F. Kennedy told Eastern Oregon ranchers today that this country's present farm policy makes no sense. "It makes no sense for either the farm or the city, if you do not have farmers," Kennedy said. Kennedy said in remarks prepared for a breakfast meeting with Eastern Oregon ranchers, Kennedy, who had some lecture-warm reception in Western Oregon last weekend, got a rousing welcome as he took up campaigning in Eastern Oregon Tuesday night. An estimated 1,500 persons cheered him on arrival at the Pendleton airport that would have a crowd of 2,500 applauded him at an evening rally in a downtown meeting hall. His first supporters were greeted with the reception, saying both turnout exceeded last week's for Richard Nixon, Republican presidential nominee, by at least 1,000 at each place. Kennedy faces Sen. Eugene McCarthy and President Lyndon Johnson in a June 24 primary in Oregon. Supporters of Vice President Hubert Humphrey have been urging a vote for President Johnson at a symposium of support for Humphrey, who is on the ballot only as a vice presidential candidate.

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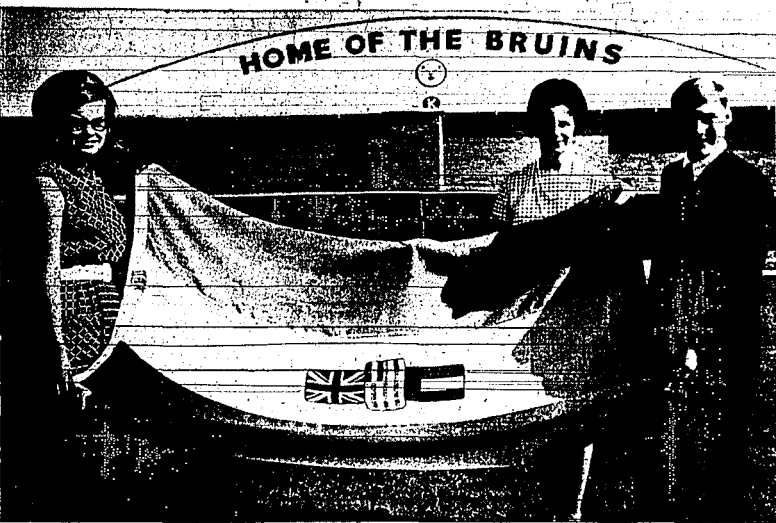

Quiet, Clean Electric Cars Developed

DETROIT (AP)—With the internal-combustion engine under attack as an ear-warring pollution-spewer, engineers said today they have developed quiet, pollution-free electric cars that meet most commuter and suburban needs.

But problems remain and the vehicle's capabilities are limited.

Three experimental efforts by Ford Motor Co., General Electric Co., and Electric Fuel Propulsion Co.—were described in research reports prepared for the current Society of Automotive Engineers meeting in Detroit.

Robert A. Aronson of Electric Fuel Propulsion, a Ferndale, Mich., firm, said its Mars II experimental electric car "will power the driving requirements of many residents of urban and suburban areas in terms of speed and range."

Top speed of the Mars II, he said, is 65 miles per hour, compared to 55 mph for GE's Delta and 40 mph for the Comuta developed by British researchers.

The typical medium-size U.S. built automobile can go more than 200 miles on a tank of gasoline before needing refueling, and this far outdistances the range of the electricies.

GE says its model can go 105, and Ford says the Comuta's range is 40 miles before batteries are exhausted of power and need recharging.

One problem is that the recharging process takes 8 to 10 hours on electric current of 110-120 volts, which is the normal house voltage.

It can be cut some—to 45 minutes to 2 1/2 hours—by special high-voltage rechargers designed by the researchers, but not generally available at service stations, garages, or homes.

The batteries of the electricies, while costly—\$300 to more than \$600 depending on size—might last for up to 50,000 miles, Aronson said.

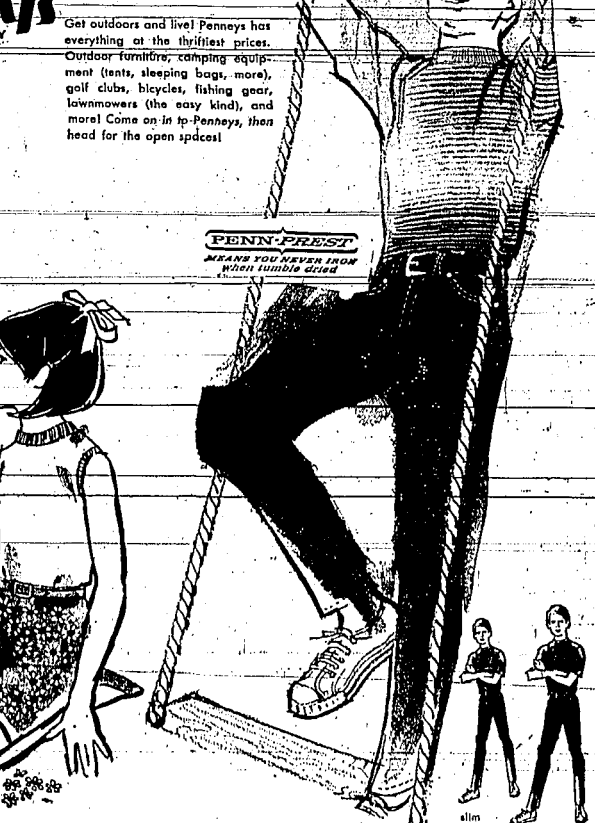

Goddard's Resigning Untimely

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dr. James L. Goddard, federal-contraband director of food, drug and drug control, is resigning at a time insiders consider critical for a series of innovative new programs he has launched.

One such program is unprecedented tests on humans to see whether generic drugs—those identified by chemical names—perform the same as their more expensive brand-name counterparts.

Sources say the program could lead to requiring manufacturers of generic drugs to prove through such tests that their products match the performance of approved drugs.

Goddard, who in 1964 was named to the Food and Drug Administration from a little-known agency to a much-publicized one, is leaving to join EDP Technology Inc., a drug services and drug distribution firm in Atlanta.

The 45-year-old physician, a career Public Health Service officer, is known to have become exhausted by the demands of the job. And he is said to have liked Atlanta, where he served as head of the health services Communicable Disease Center before becoming FDA commissioner in January 1966.

Although Goddard drew frequent criticism for his candid statements on such controversial subjects as marijuana and LSD, sources close to him say such pressure didn't force him out.

Other new and far-reaching policies begun under Goddard's direction include:

- A review of more than 3,000 widely used drugs to see whether they do what they are supposed to.
- Goddard predicted it might lead to removal of drugs from the market, some of them family favorites.
- A plan to get industry to regulate itself, subject to checks by FDA inspectors, to ensure the quality of food and drugs for consumers.

Poor People's Confrontation With Congress Is Orderly

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Poor People Campaign's long-awaited confrontation with Congress turned out to be quiet, orderly and a lot milder than many on both sides had predicted.

Two tightly disciplined delegations, one in the morning and later one in the afternoon, walked the two miles from their shantytown camp to Capitol Hill, where a few testified about their problems while most sat quietly listening.

Leaders made clear these were only the first of what will probably be daily trips to important governmental offices.

"The city is where we will be sleeping at night, but it is not where we will be living," Rev. Jesse Jackson told a crowd that gathered near the "Resurrection City, U.S.A." city hall. "We are not here to threaten the nation, we are here to educate it," he said. "Washington will know we are here."

About 100 morning marchers made their way to Capitol Hill to take seats in the congressional committee rooms and call on individual congressmen. A few invited earlier by

committees, testified about the conditions they must face back home.

The afternoon march was planned after a scheduled trip to the nearby grave of President John F. Kennedy failed to get started.

About 300 of these campaigners, some in straw hats and blue jeans or khaki pants or African robes or simple house-dresses, made their way slowly and silently to the edge of Capitol Park.

"They were met there by dozens of police, who explained in brief confrontations with march leader Jackson that demonstrations were prohibited on the Capitol grounds.

Police broke them up into 15 or 20-man groups to proceed from there. Each group moved in almost complete silence as some went to the House gallery, and others stood or sat briefly in the hallways outside.

As the group entered, Rep. Albert W. Watson, R-S.C., was finishing an hour-long speech about the Vietnam War. Communist involvement in the Poor People's Campaign. However, he said he was not accusing the leaders of any Communist party involvement.

"We're not Communist-motivated, we're hunger-motivated," Jackson said later.

Capitol police rushed to close the doors of Congress to the public once the marchers were inside. "Security is very tight," said one officer as he refused a newsman admission. "We don't know when trouble might come."

As confrontations got underway, "Resurrection City" continued to grow. Southern Christian Leadership Conference officials estimated 2,500 residents were in the site, with 400 more waiting in northern Virginia for shuttles to be built and another 500 or so on the road from Western states.

The Rev. Ralph David Abernathy, SCLC president, left an all-day meeting of the finance committee long enough to visit the shantytown and announce that the campaign's Memorial Day march had been rescheduled for June 19.

This was done, spokesmen said, to give Bayard Rustin, organizer of the 1963 March on Washington, time to organize this one, too.

Reagan Proposes "Creative Society" As Alternative To Great Society

California Gov. Ronald Reagan proposed a "Creative Society" alternative to the Great Society and New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller has ordered a five-day attack on the nation's economic ills.

"The Creative Society is based on the premise that government cannot possibly match the creativity and energy of private industry," Reagan said.

"The Great Society has grown greater every day—greater in spending, in debt, in bureaucracy."

(Reagan, the California Republican favorite son candidate, spoke at a \$100-a-plate GOP fund-raising dinner in Chicago, he repeated an article that he is not going to announce as a GOP presidential candidate.

Announced GOP candidate Rockefeller's five-point program includes a proposed bill in "the budget in public spending" and a temporary income tax increase at least as large as the administration's 10 per cent tax surcharge proposal.

He charged the Johnson administration with "service failures in leadership," for not seeking a tax increase in 1965, to accompany the Vietnam war effort and war on poverty, to stem growing inflation.

Rockefeller also proposed reassignment of financial commitments around the world, avoidance of further domestic

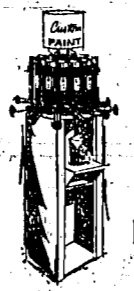

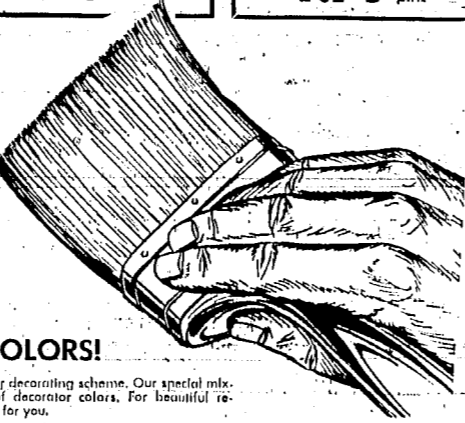

After the bear left, Hahn said he climbed down and walked three miles to the nearest road. Hahn was picked up by a motorist and taken to a hospital in Cardston. Hahn is listed in good condition with lacerations on the ankle.

Hahn said at the hospital "I don't want anything done to the bear and cub. It was my fault, I was intruding into her territory."

Hahn said he had a tree picked out to climb in case the bear charged but he did not cover the 50 yards faster than he anticipated.

He had hiked into the park from the town of Sunay, and camped on the creek named To-The-Sun Highway in the St. Mary Valley.

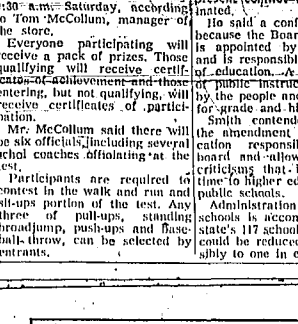

Amendment Urged For State Office

BOISE (AP) — Passage of a constitutional amendment to prohibit classroom use of four-letter words would not limit academic freedom, Smith said.

A recent controversy at Idaho State University concerned the use of such words in the student newspaper.

The ISU Communication Board adopted a policy requiring the paper's editors to screen material before publication. Editor Frank Hissong then resigned, criticizing the board's action.

"To the extent that censorship was to stop him (Hissong) from using those filthy four-letter words," Smith said.

"It is my opinion that the (state) board will not tolerate four-letter words." He added he expected the state board to extend the restriction to classroom instructors.

If a constitutional amendment is passed this fall removing the superintendent of public instruction from the list of elected state officers, Smith said, a state conflict would be eliminated.

He said a conflict now exists because the Board of Education is appointed by the governor and is responsible for all levels of education, including public instruction. It is elected by the people and is responsible for grade and high schools.

Smith contended passage of the amendment would fix education responsibility on the board and allow it to correct what he felt was a bad situation.

Administration of Idaho's schools is accomplished by the board. If such a conflict could be reduced, he said, possibly to one in each county.

Air Reserve Briefing Is Conducted

Briefing on Air Reserve personnel records at the nation's largest computerized records center was provided 22 officers and airmen of the 9430th Air Reserve Squadron, Twin Falls, during a field trip last weekend.

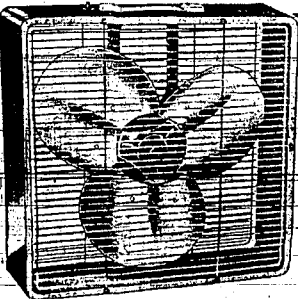

Need For Nurses Reflected In Aid

By RAY CROMLEY
NEA Publications

Our society's need for nurses is apparent in the educational stimulus provided by federal funds in this field.

Federal loans up to \$1,000 a year are available for students enrolled full-time in accredited schools of nursing in public or nonprofit colleges, universities, junior colleges and hospitals. Loans are repayable to the school over a 10-year period which begins a year after study is completed.

Students must need the money to continue their studies and be qualified by academic standing.

As much as 50 per cent of the loan plus interest may be canceled for five years of full-time service as a professional nurse in a public or nonprofit organization.

Nursing schools may not award National Defense Student Loans to students who are eligible for Nursing Student Loans.

In addition under the "Nurse Training" program, monthly stipends, allowance for dependents and a travel allowance to private graduate nurses for nursing specialists and teachers in hospitals, public health agencies and schools of nursing.

Traineeships may be used for long-term academic study in universities, or for short-term programs provided by universities, health agencies, or other nonprofit sponsors. A traineeship for long-term study may not be awarded to any nurse for more than two years.

Traineeships must be enrolled as a full-time student in a participating school, be a U.S. citizen or intend to reside permanently in the U.S., be pursuing a course of study leading to a baccalaureate or associate degree in nursing, a diploma in nursing or a graduate degree in nursing, be in need of assistance and be able to maintain academic good standing.

Traineeships and student loan funds are administered by nursing schools. No loans or traineeships are made directly to students by the federal government.

Students desiring loans or traineeships must apply directly to participating nursing schools. Students already enrolled in a participating school should consult the official in charge of student financial aid.

There are also Nursing Student Opportunity Grants of up to \$300 a year awarded to undergraduates on the basis of need. After the first year, an additional \$200 a year is available for those who rank in the upper half of their nursing class. For information write Division of Nursing, Public Health Service, Arlington, Va. 22201.

Other areas of concern in our country are reflected in the fellowships in air pollution, community health, injury control, nursing services, water supply and pollution prevention efforts by the Public Health Service. The aim is to raise the level of competence and increase the number of men and women qualified to undertake research in these fields.

Fellowships are also awarded to increase the number of skilled and research workers in the health information specialties.

Predoctoral, postdoctoral, special research career and international postdoctoral fellowships are awarded.

Mormon Lake Coho Thrive, Return Of Perch Dims Outlook

FAIRFIELD — Coho salmon have taken to Mormon Reservoir like gangbusters, combining with a solid population of big rainbow trout to make a great sports fishery. But also perch and muskellunge are being caught in the more highly regarded game fish are in a predictable manner.

Robert Bell, district fish biologist for the Idaho Fish and Game Department, conducted a gill net census on Mormon Reservoir Tuesday and hauled in a bunch of fat, healthy fish. Even the perch were in about as good condition as you could find.

Most rewarding was the growth of the Coho salmon fingerlings planted a year ago. The Coho were largely in the 11 to 13-inch range but a couple were recovered that ran up to 16 inches and the average of a pound. Just about a year back they were two and three inches and 170 to the pound.

So far this has been the best growth rate found in the state, such proven protein providers as Richfield Canal falling last year. But the Mormon Reservoir Coho are still eating plankton, rather a disappointment as it was hoped they would become cannibals and fatten up by eating other fish—preferably perch and other trash fish. Bell said a gill net census will be conducted in Salmon Falls Reservoir, south of Twin Falls within the 10 days to two weeks and held out hope that larger Cohos will be found since Coho in those trash-fish riddled waters are known to have converted to a fish diet.

The Coho came to Idaho as an experiment a year ago in the hope that a rapid growth rate would provide trophy fishing in accessible waters. The department is "combating" with the fact the spring have dumped about 2,000,000 fingerlings in the state's reservoirs.

But the presence of perch dims the overall outlook for the fishery will hold up in good shape for another season or two before beginning to deteriorate. After that, the decline will be rapid.

Economically, the department can afford treatment projects only in low water years. This appears to be a short season and the department may be able to go with it this year or wait for the next dry one, which may be a long time in coming.

From the fisherman standpoint, the eradication projects have proved very beneficial. Some 10 years ago the department wasn't counting but three or four people a weekend perch fishing on Mormon. Since the eradication and rebuilding of a trout fishery, its popularity has soared and it is a top producer providing year-round angling. A test of its productivity was established last opening day when the fisherman standing in line to go to any stream or impoundment in the state. The morning count found 67 boats on Mormon, which never had been so busy.

Although the project winds of necessity have to kill the trout and Coho populations at some time, it is a great moment. On important moments like these two, fisheries can be recreated as quickly as they are lost. Its effectiveness is being backed up by low hatchery trucks and dumping in a fresh supply.

The projects don't eliminate the perch-prefering public either as Magic Valley has several impoundments that will never be treated and always carry a big perch population.

The storm of controversy that raged nine years ago about the eradication at Magic, Mormon and their tributaries has proved senseless. After a year's lay-off, the opening weekend at Magic provided more trout in the creel than that big perch-stuffed plowd impoundment had provided the entire season before. Perch eradication has been proved the fishermen's friend in such captive waters.

CORRECT BIDS REACH SLAM

In the Jacoby method, the immediate jump to three of a minor suit after an opening no-trump is merely a game invitation in no-trump. North has two

not enough to warrant taking the bidding to the slam no-trump. When South hears the three diamond call he becomes interested in getting to a slam. He only has one point for his opening no-trump but they look golden for slam purposes. He has three aces and the king of diamonds and his jack of clubs is supported by the 10. South starts slam proceedings by bidding three hearts.

This doesn't excite North at all. He had suggested a slam when he bid two clubs and three diamonds. He does not want to go past three no-trump under his own steam.

South continues with four clubs and once more North is left. This time with a four diamond call.

South gives one more slam invitation by bidding four spades. This costs nothing because North can still go to the slam on four no-trump, but by this time North is ready to act on his own and North jumps to the diamond slam.

There is no trouble in the play. South draws trumps, loses the club finesse and eventually makes North's third spade on his long club.

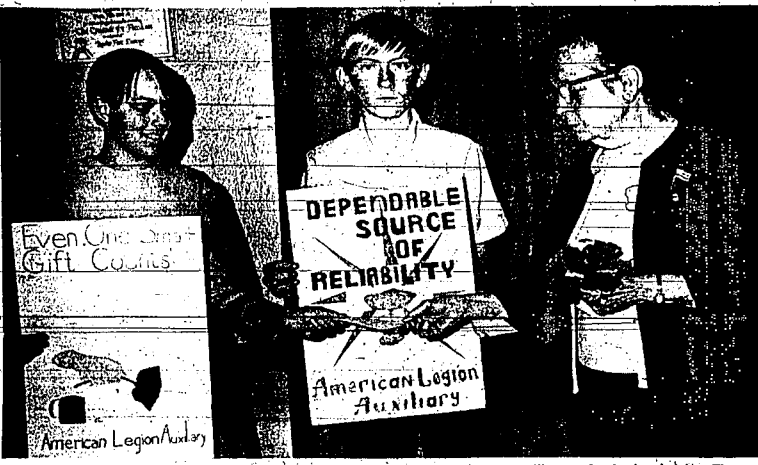
