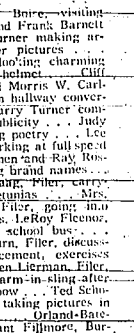

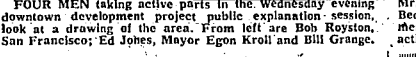

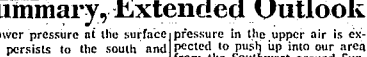

# Area Road Construction Projects Outlined

SHIP RELEASED — [Ship Regostrov was released by Twin Falls Times-News, May 23-24, 1968]  
 RIO DE JANEIRO (AP) — [The Brazilian navy Wednesday after being held for 18 days.]

Among major construction projects in District 2, Idaho Department of Highways, under the 1968 construction program are some west of the interstate 80-N from Sublett to the Utah-Idaho state line.

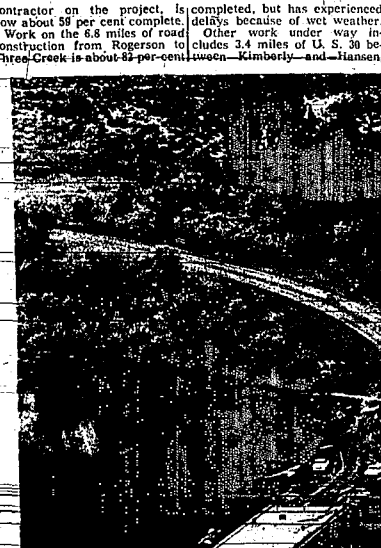
Blaine Sessions, district engineer, said four contracts have been awarded on this section representing a total of \$3,034,627.77 in highway investments.

Contractors include Peter-Klein and Sons, Idaho Falls; Goodwin Construction Co., Blackfoot; LeGrand Johnson Co., Logan, Utah; and Neilsen and Miller Construction Co., Twin Falls.

Most recently under construction is another 18.25 miles of construction including aggregate base, plant mix pavement, signing and delineation of interstate between Sublett and Juniper. This work, amounting to \$2,432,925.00, is under joint contract to Grant Construction Co. and Inland Asphalt Co., Hayden Lake.

In the Twin Falls area, Mr. Sessions said, work is continuing on State Highway 50, from Red Cap Corner to the Hansen Bridge. The project, which began last fall, is now 42 per cent complete.

Mr. Sessions said construction also is progressing well on the Ken Curtis Memorial bridge on the Clear-Lakes Road, near Snake River, Neilsen and Miller Construction Co., Twin Falls.

contractor on the project, is completed, but has experienced delays because of wet weather. Other work under way in District 2 includes widening and new pavement will be completed late this fall. Road mix pavement and seal coat will be added on 7.8 miles of State Highway 50 from Five Points North toward Hansen. This recently was awarded to Kimberly Construction Co.

Two new road areas are under contract to Gary D. Jones, Burley. They are located east and west of the Junction of U. S. 93 with Interstate 80-N in Jerome county.

Work under way in the western part of the district includes U. S. 20-26 east of Gooding. This section is 86 per cent complete and soon will be open to traffic.

Constructing a plant mix pavement and seal coat on 9.2 miles of Highway 20 on Banbury Hill and 4.2 miles south of Bliss has been awarded Carl E. Nelson Co., Logan, Utah.

Other District projects include construction of roadway, surfacing and curb and gutter on 26 miles of U. S. 93 and 69 miles of State Highway 78, both on streets within the city of Ketchum. This work is about 33 per cent completed. Mr. Sessions said. Construction of a 40-by-100-foot concrete block maintenance building at Hailey for state equipment is about 20 per cent complete, with Ulman Construction Co., Twin Falls doing the work.

Two other projects have been advertised for bid. They include plant mix seal coat on Interstate 80-N from West Jerome Interchange to Greenwood. This work will cover 29.5 miles of four-lane divided highway. Also, construction of roadway, drainage structures, base and bituminous surface mix on 5.3 miles of 400 West to State Highway 24 in Mindoka County, is under contract.

Now in the final stages of design and soon to be offered for bid are construction projects from Eiler in Cedar Crossing highway from the junction of U. S. 93 to Picabo-Paul streets, and another surfacing project on Interstate 80-N in Cassia and Oneida counties.

Mr. Sessions said highway improvements are designed to improve conditions for the highway user and to make travel more safe. He said highway users are asked to keep in mind as they travel and to drive accordingly in construction areas.

## Storm Sweeps North Utah

A storm swept into Northern Utah Wednesday night and persisted early today, slowing highway travel, causing minor flooding and knocking out power in scattered areas.

There was heavy rain in the Salt Lake City-Ogden area and snow in the mountains.

The communities of Kanab and Oakley, at the foot of the Uinta Mountains east of Salt Lake City, lost electric power and some telephone service in the storm which left six inches of snow.

A tree limb snapped off and fell across power lines.

The Highway Patrol said U.S. 30 and 40 were slushy east of Salt Lake City.

Said one dispatcher: "I'm afraid we've got some bumper fenders today."

Several hours before the storm hit, five funnel clouds were sighted over the Cedar Mountains some 20 miles northwest of Dagway Proving Ground in western Utah.

The Weather Bureau said one of the funnel clouds touched the ground, thus earning the classification of tornado.

## Thalidomide To Be Central Issue Of Trial In Germany

By OTTO DOELLING AACHEN, Germany (AP) — Bettina is 7 years old and is learning to write with her feet. She is born without arms.

At another desk at a special school in Hamburg, her classmate Martina draws a picture of trees and people who have healthy limbs. She carefully guides the pencil with one of her own deformed hands. When the recess bell rings, Martina's stunted legs prevent her from running to join the other children at play.

There are about 5,500 Bettinas and Martinas in 20 countries, from Austria to the Philippines, more than 2,000 live in West Germany.

Why they were born with malformed limbs will be the central issue of a criminal trial opening before the Aachen State Court Monday.

The prosecution contends the malformations were not accidents of nature but the result of human negligence.

Nine officials and scientists of Chemie Grunenthal, a West German pharmaceutical company, are charged with negligent manslaughter and inflicting bodily injuries in what some medical authorities have termed the "thalidomide catastrophe."

Hermann Wirtz, 71, president and chief stockholder of the family owned company, underwent surgery this month and is not expected to be tried with the other eight. The prosecutor's office said Wirtz probably would be tried separately when he recovered.

In 1957, the company developed and sold thalidomide, a soothing and sleep-inducing drug. The drug was withdrawn from the market after Dr. Wilking Lanz, a pediatrician, reported a possible link between it

and a wave of infants born with malformed limbs. The drug also was blamed for the deaths of some malformed infants soon after their births.

The mothers reportedly had taken thalidomide in the early stages of pregnancy.

Soon after the Lanz report, the first of what eventually added up to about 300 criminal complaints was filed by one of the parents of these children at the office of the Aachen chief prosecutor, Heinrich Gierlich.

Five years of investigation led to a 972-page indictment taken from 60,000 pages of evidence.

The trial is expected to last at least two years. It promises to be involved, Gierlich said in announcing the indictment last year. "In nature and also this case is without precedent. It is of immense consequence for all concerned."

The defendants face maximum sentences of five years imprisonment, and a decision against them would open the way for parents' civil damage suits, which are possibly totaling \$25 million.

The 300 complainants include a number from abroad. The drug is known to have been manufactured in England, Sweden, Israel, Brazil and Japan and was marketed in a number of other countries at the peak of its popularity. Grunenthal produced up to one million pills a day in West Germany.

A few malformed infants also were born in the United States, where a federal drug administrator, Dr. Frances Kelsey, blocked sale of the drug. The mothers there reportedly were wives of U.S. servicemen who had been stationed in West Germany and women who had received the drug from abroad.

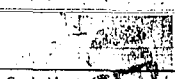

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# Reagan May Turn Candidate

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — The national head of a citizens committee for Ronald Reagan predicts the California governor will become an active candidate for the GOP presidential nomination he does well in Tuesday's Oregon primary.

Henry Bubb of Topeka, Kan., chairman of the citizens group, told newsmen he thinks that a showing topping the 22 per cent of the vote Reagan got in the Nebraska primary will propel the governor into a position as an active but not despite the California governor's insistence that he is not a serious candidate for top place on the ticket.

Reagan is unchallenged in the June 4 California primary for that state's 86 convention nominating votes. This will rival the home state support of Sen. Nelson A. Rockefeller, who is expected to have most of New York's 92 votes in his corner.

Reagan is on the Oregon ballot. A write-in campaign for Rockefeller has been launched here, Robert Ridgley, an attorney heading the write-in effort, estimated the five-day blitz for Rockefeller will cost \$100,000.

Ridgley said receiving 10 per cent of the Republican vote would help establish Rockefeller as a solid contender for the nomination. Few involved politicians shared this view.

Bubb was not optimistic that the combined Reagan-Rockefeller vote would challenge the majority that former Vice President Richard M. Nixon seems likely to record.

Nixon who shares the ballot with Reagan, has been taking part in a campaign to dig in the average of about 70 per cent of the vote that he has maintained in four previous primaries. He is expected to lead the write-in campaign in search of Oregon's 18 convention votes.

Nixon's supporters appear confident.

**Humphrey Favored By Idaho Demos**

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Democratic leaders are virtually unanimous in agreeing the state's selection to the National Convention will be unopposed — but agreement ends there.

Based on conditions as now, Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey appears the choice of a majority of the delegates to be chosen June 14-15 at the state convention in Idaho Falls.

One source gives him 10 of the 25 votes; another rates him with 15. But these sources differ considerably on how the remaining nine will be divided. One says Sen. Robert Kennedy of New York will get eight and Sen. Eugene McCarthy of Minnesota will have one.

The second source divides his remaining ten votes equally between McCarthy and Kennedy.

Humphrey backers are predicting he will get up to two-thirds of the Idaho delegate vote, and one says the goal is 22 of the 25 votes.

In the past, Idaho Democrats frequently have named the state in sending their delegates to the National Convention. That means a majority vote of the delegation would decide who got the entire vote.

There is considerable sentiment this year to skip that procedure, leaving each delegate free to vote as he wishes on the first roll call.

None of the three announced candidates appears to be the enthusiastic choice of many influential Idaho Democrats.

A number have said — but not for quotation — they would like to see someone other than the present aspirants get the nomination.

But, they acknowledge they see no prospects in sight.

# Humphrey Brings Countryside To Him

WASHINGTON (AP) — It was the first in last-ago campaigning — and first class all the way.

Instead of going into the countryside, Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey brought the countryside to him, a new chapter in his quest for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Using two planes, Humphrey visited 152 Delaware delegates.

Democratic officials wives and so on from Wilmington to a reception in Washington's Mayflower Hotel.

He wined and dined them in an atmosphere of candlelight and music, had singer Nancy Sinatra and basketball star Elvin Hayes around to sign autographs — and made one of his shortest speeches of record, 14 minutes.

This was not a case of just wooing delegates to the Democratic National Convention.

Humphrey won 16 of the Delaware Democrats' 22 delegates votes at the party's recent state convention.

It was more a case of keeping those wooed and won from flirting with Humphrey rivals — particularly Sen. Robert F. Kennedy. And maybe winning some more.

Humphrey called it a "thank you" party. "You've had your convention. You've made your decision, and we don't have to argue about that," he told his transfused guests.

The delegate affair is "part of the tone of the campaign," explained a Humphrey aide. "It shows strength. It shows adequate financing. If we did this for every state in the union, it would still be cheaper than what Bobby spent in the Indiana primary."

Sen. Walter F. Mondale, D-Minn., said Under the Democrat for Humphrey, of which he is co-chairman, paid for the affair — and confided that since the Humphrey campaign let its costing money even when on the ground "we might as well use it."

Aides called the Delaware affair a pilot project that probably will be repeated with other state delegations, flying them here or, in some cases, bringing them to an outing with the vice president at his Minnesota home.

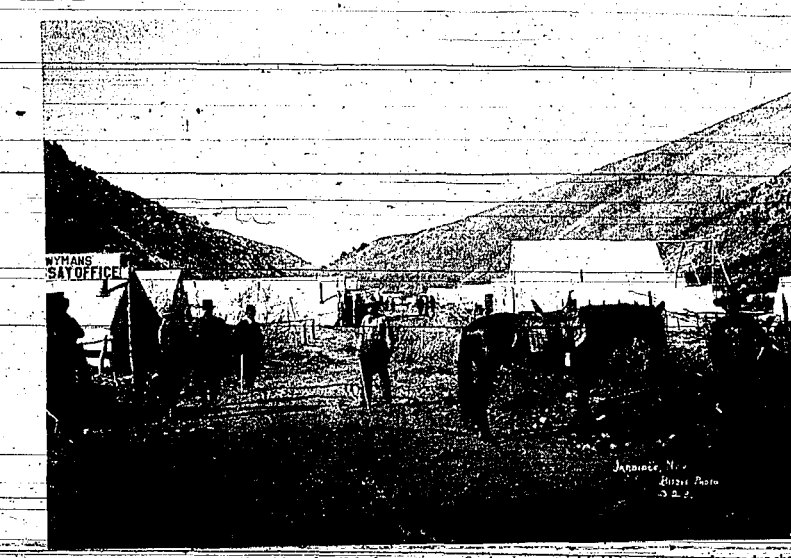

"The utility's new wheeling agreement commits it to deliver more power to federal customers in southern Idaho by 1968 than the capacity of a proposed government line to the area," Carlsson stated.

The utility official scolded his remarks were "based on fact, not emotion." He also noted that "so-called cheap power is necessary and of major concern in the attraction of industry."

Discussing Idaho Power's new wheeling agreement, under which it will transmit supplementary electricity in southern Idaho, Carlsson told his audience, "Contrary to some reports you have heard, all preferences customers are assured of sufficient power resources for their normal load growth as determined by the public agency's own projections."

"Any load other than normal load growth would and should be considered on a separate and specific basis," he stated.

Referring to critics of the wheeling agreement who he said "in effect wanted Idaho Power to agree to wheel an unknown amount of power to an unknown customer at an unknown time," the official said, "This is not the official's responsibility but an impossible demand."

Facilities to generate, transmit and distribute power here are "based on fact, not emotion," he said. "Facilities must be planned many years in advance, he noted.

"We serve over 151,000 customers, and we simply cannot ignore our responsibility to our customers by agreeing to an unlimited commitment to public agencies for which we, other than by contract, have no direct responsibility."

Carlsson reviewed the wheeling agreement's cancellation clause, saying it gives a preference customer "as much and a high degree of protection than he had before the contract was signed."

"The clause gives Idaho Power 30 days to study any request for service and make for additional power to supply a preference customer requesting a block of energy in excess of the contract limitations."

A question period was held and Mr. Carlsson's talk was followed by a luncheon.
