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Peace Talks Bring Sharper War Action

SAIGON (AP) — The U.S.-North Vietnamese talks in Paris have brought sharper action in the Vietnam war. Like two masters, the two sides grope for holds that will lead to a spectacular throw.

The U.S. Command has predicted a further escalation in fighting and latest allied intelligence seems to bear this out.

U.S. sources have said privately that neither side is likely to score a decisive victory in the near future.

Thus neither can bargain in Paris from a position of absolute strength that would force concessions.

Many in Saigon recall former Ambassador Henry Cabot

Lodge's recommendation to President Johnson when there were hints that peace talks might start in 1966. Lodge recommended increasing the pressure on the enemy to the maximum should Hanoi or the Viet Cong show real signs of wanting peace. Even the most minor concession, Lodge urged, should not be agreed to unless a counter concession was won.

Therefore—bigger battles; higher casualties—probably the largest of the war on both sides—and claims of decisive victories are forecast. Indications are that each side also will place increasing importance on victory claims, not so much to strengthen the hands of its bargainers in Paris but to convince

the world that its side is winning.

The idea, it is believed here, would be to generate pressure from allies and friends on both sides to make concessions that would bring a settlement on the best possible terms.

The U.S. Command is highly conscious of sentiment in the United States and has become increasingly sensitive in its public relations.

When a U.S. Special Forces camp at Kham Duc was threatened with being overrun recently, a hasty evacuation of the camp was ordered. A U.S. general called this an American victory.

But Kham Duc sat astride a major infiltration route that

North Vietnamese engineers are turning into a two-lane road. Evacuating the camp left the enemy with a free hand in the area.

On the other hand, Hanoi has boasted of huge victories against the allies in the Saigon area during fighting earlier this month. In fact the enemy forces were mostly turned back at the city's slum belt, along its outer limits.

The most likely battle zones of the future probably are around Saigon, below the demilitarized zone and the central highlands. Rocket and infantry attacks around Saigon prove that the enemy command is capable of piercing the U.S. shield around the capital.

Red Colonel Defects And Reveals Plan

SAIGON (AP) — The second highest ranking Viet Cong ever to defect told a news conference today the enemy would keep up its attacks on South Vietnam's cities to improve North Vietnam's negotiating hand at the Paris talks.

Col. Phan Mau, 38, defected Monday after his regiment got orders to fight in the second offensive this year against Saigon.

He said the current Communist strategy "consists of a very long schedule composed of many offensives... all aimed at supporting the talks being held in Paris."

"The presence of North Vietnamese troops in the South is clear to everyone," he said. But the denial of that at the Paris talks "has disadvantages."

"It creates disbelief among the rank and file of the Viet Cong among the population of the North. They ask themselves if other things the party says are true or not."

Mau said the Viet Cong would continue to shell the cities of South Vietnam "to show their presence and to show the world that they are still strong."

Before the Tet offensive against Saigon and 35 other populated centers in February, Mau said, most rank and file Viet Cong troops believed the people would rise up to support them.

"After the offensive we didn't believe that any more," he said. "We didn't have the support of the population, and the allied forces were stronger."

Mau said he decided to defect because he felt his ambitions were not being fulfilled, he had disagreements with his superiors and he found the Communist dogma deceptive.

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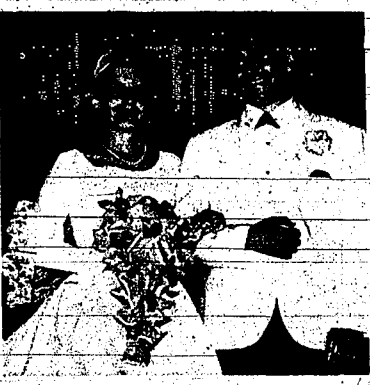

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—Bobby Unser, hottest American race driver this year, stomped out the turbine revolution Thursday in the 500-mile race. He won his first Indy 500 with a record speed of 152.882 m.p.h.

The Albuquerque, N.M., member of a famous racing family pulled ahead to stay with 22 1/2 miles to go as a leading turbine faltered for a second straight year.

Joe Leonard of San Jose, Calif., climbed out of the ailing turbine with his head hanging, just as Parnelli Jones had done a year ago when the original turbine quit with 7 1/2 miles to go.

Two other Lotus turbines entered by Andy Granatelli also failed to finish. Graham-Hill of London, 1966 winner, crashed after losing a wheel. He was not hurt. Another turbine driven by Art Pollard of Medford, Ore., stopped minutes after Leonard's quit.

Granatelli said he didn't know what happened but "They just quit."

McLain Can Beat Foes, But Not Fans

ANAHEIM (AP)—Denny McLain is winning his war against American League hitters but taking a drubbing in his vendetta with the baseball fans of Detroit.

The Tigers' ace right-hander pitched the first nine innings Wednesday night that his wife and infant daughter recently averted possible serious injury after someone in the crowd placed a bomb in the family car.

The incident occurred 10 days ago, only a few days after McLain publicly accused Detroit fans of bombing the team to such an extent last season that it cost the Tigers the American League pennant. They finished one game behind champion Boston.

McLain says his wife and daughter were driving from Detroit stadium to their suburban home when they pulled off a highway to get gas.

"The attendant looked under the hood and discovered there was a smoke bomb wired to the ignition," McLain said here Wednesday night after he pitched a four-hitter and struck out 13 in a 3-0 victory over the California Angels.

"If the bomb had gone off when my wife was driving at high speed, she and the baby both could have been killed," he said.

"But the bomb wasn't wired properly. It was supposed to go off when she turned on the ignition."

"If anything had happened, I'd have spent the rest of my life finding out who was responsible," he said.

McLain, 31, leads the American League in victories, has gone the route in eight of his first 11 starts and has reduced his earned run average to a microscopic 1.92.

Ironically, his lone defeat came the first time he pitched at home after publicly blasting Detroit fans for heckling the players. Baltimore pounded him en route to a 10-3 victory.

"I've been booed before, but never like that," he said, "and I guess it made me press too hard."

Classifying Of Streams Aids Fishing

BOISE—The Idaho Fish and Game Department is currently conducting a fish production study on several Idaho streams. Fish populations are measured in natural areas and then are also measured in adjacent areas that have been altered by some activity such as rechanneling, dredging mining, or road construction.

Dick Litzsauer, fishery biologist, has sampled fish populations in streams across the state. The study has shown that streams that have not been changed by man produce 10 times as many game fish as altered streams. Alteration of a stream results in a 93 percent reduction in fish production.

Litzsauer explained that the population samples are taken using electro-fishing gear. Two electrically charged nets are placed in the water and any fish swimming between them are momentarily stunned. After the fish are measured and weighed, they are returned to the water unharmed.

Thus far the survey has covered 507 miles on 26 streams. Of this, 44 percent or 224 stream miles have been altered.

Litzsauer pointed out that channel alteration normally eliminates shade, deep holes, and undercut banks. These areas are used by fish to rest, feed and hide.

The importance of stream fisheries was revealed in the department's 1966 inventory of all state waters which showed that although streams comprise only 22 percent of the available fishing waters in Idaho, they support an estimated 56 percent of the fishing pressure. Therefore, protection of streams from further channel alteration is necessary to maintain Idaho's excellent fishing.

Forward Pass Pronounced In Top Shape For Triple Crown

NEW YORK (AP)—Forward Pass is as ready as he'll ever be to make his bid to become racing's first Triple Crown winner in 20 years; trainer Henry Forrest said Thursday.

Forrest watched the Calumet farm colt gallop at Belmont Park and said he "will just have to be out there" to be beaten Saturday in the 100th running of the 20-year-old Belmont Stakes.

The last horse to win the Triple Crown—Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont—was Calumet's Citation in 1948.

A field of nine 3-year-olds is expected to go to the post for the Belmont at approximately 5:30 p.m. EDT. CBS will televise the race nationally from 5 p.m. to 5:45 p.m.

If all nine start, the gross purse will be \$161,450, with \$117,700 to the winner.

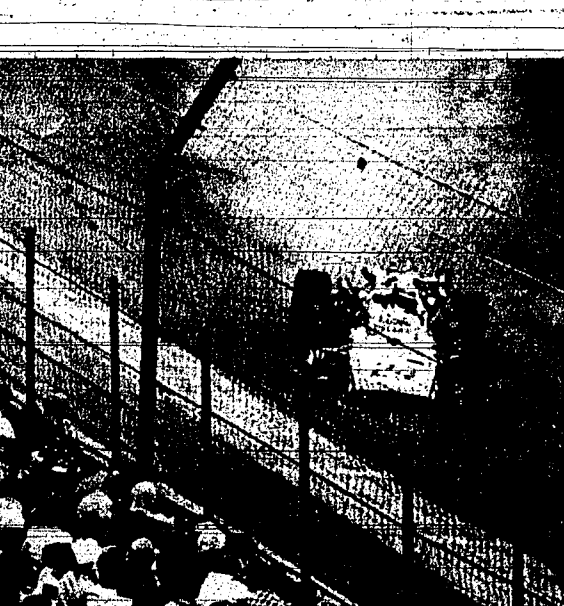

Washington scored three more runs off reliever Jim Bouton.

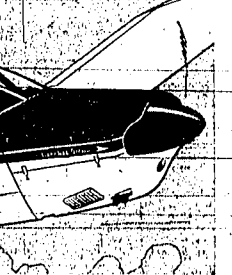
Mantle's performance in the opener was his first 5-for-5 day since 1956. He homered with a runner aboard in the first and with the bases empty in the fifth.

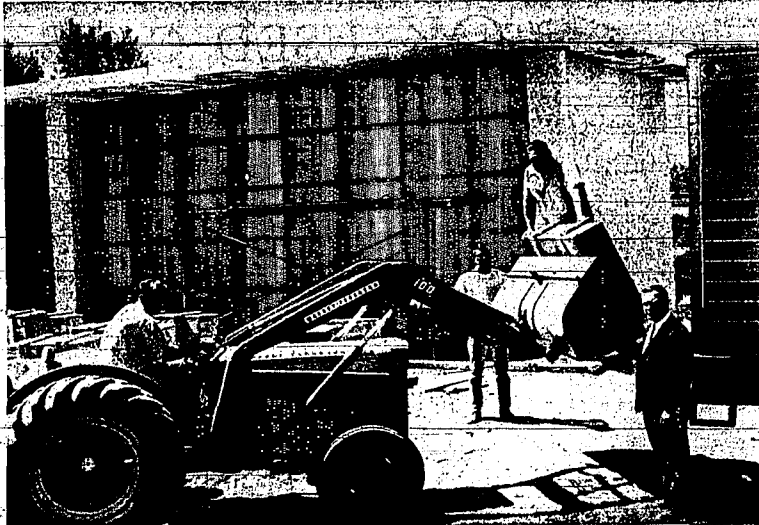
