

Guardsmen Start Summer Training

A total of 105 enlisted men and seven officers, under the command of Capt. Burrell Bybee and members of Troop 1, 116th Regiment, Nevada National Guard, bivouacked Friday night at the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds.

The unit consisting of one squadron from Idaho and two from Nevada was on the way to Gowen Field, Boise, for annual field training exercises.

Here some 2,500 men and officers from Idaho and Nevada National Guard units will train for seven days. The military units arrived at Gowen Field on Sunday and will remain there through the week. Trucks, tanks and heavy guns moved into the desert area 20 miles south of Boise for special field maneuvers.

Col. Theodore R. Pence, Twin Falls, regimental commander, said this year, training will emphasize individual specialties.

The reorganization of the regiment in the summer training requires us to conduct this training in individual skills," he said.

As a result, he said, many guardsmen will be experiencing their first field training in their new assignments. Former bulldozer operators are learning new skills as artillerymen and truck drivers are learning to operate tanks, Col. Pence explained.

Basic new training in these new skills has been under way since January and will field training south of Boise will provide practical experience, the officer added.

Battle Looms For Empire State Votes

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — The three contenders for the Democratic presidential nomination are laying the groundwork for blitzes in New York State.

Of this state's 190 delegates to the party's national convention, 123 will be picked in the June 18 primary. The Democratic State Committee will choose 65 after the primary, and the two other spots go to the state's national committeeman and national committeewoman.

Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy recently said he would wage an all-out effort for support among the 3.7 million registered democrats in New York State.

Sen. Robert F. Kennedy adopted state.

Mr. Kennedy subsequently announced that he would campaign extensively in New York after Tuesday's primary in California.

Supporters of Hubert H. Humphrey say the vice president will join the race, beginning with an address to Democrats in Rochester Thursday.

Under New York's primary system, three delegates and three alternates are chosen at the polls in each of the 41 congressional districts.

McCarthy backers collected about 150,000 petition signatures to field state in all but four of the districts. Humphrey-pledged candidates are running in 25 districts. Kennedy has 32 states pledged to him.

WILLARD, Utah (AP) — Searchers have recovered a third body from Willard Bay following boating accident May 20 which claimed four lives.

Box Elder County sheriff's officers reported finding the body of Mrs. Ronald Adair of Tropic, Utah early Sunday morning. Her husband, Airman 1c Ronald Adair, is still missing and presumed dead.

Saturday the body of Sgt. James Plerson of North Bend, Ore., was recovered. His wife's body was found 12 days ago.

The search for Adair continues.

Both men were stalled at Hill Air Force Base. The couples had gone on a fishing trip when the accident happened.

ONLY GIRLS?

Q. Are some women capable of having only girls?
A. All women are capable of having boys or girls. The sex of the child is determined by the father — not the mother. Death Toll Of Weekend Hits 602

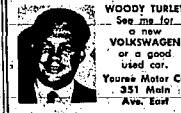
The Memorial Day weekend traffic death toll fell short of early estimates made by the National Safety Council, but the loss of life was high.

The toll as the four-day weekend ended was 602. A total of 488 traffic fatalities were counted during a recent nonholiday weekend of the same length.

The safety council estimated the highway toll during the 102-hour holiday weekend would range between 625 and 725. Last year, a record 668 persons were killed on the nation's roads during the Memorial Day observance.

The recent nonholiday count of 488 highway deaths was made by The Associated Press for comparison against this year's Memorial Day toll.

In other outdoor accidents over the holiday period, boating mishaps claimed 37 lives and 116 persons drowned.



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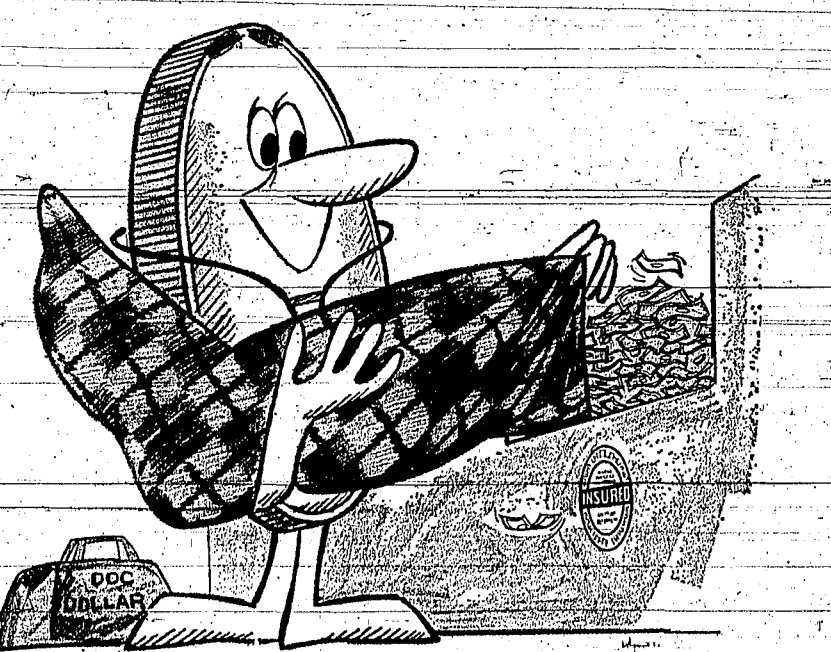
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Dear Abby

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Interest In Building Governor's Home Increases As Boise, State Officials Dicker

BOISE (AP) — The state and the City of Boise can get together on a land trade and the state builds a governor's residence. It will be the first the state has built in its history.

The City of Boise recently indicated it is willing to enter into a land swap that would provide land for a residence for the state and land for a golf course for the city.

The present governor's residence, which was built in 1914 as a private home, was purchased with a 1947 appropriation of \$25,000 and that was the first provision the state had ever made for a place and its chief executive to live.

U.S. District Judge Fred H. Taylor of Boise was in the legislature at that time and was on the committee that selected the present residence.

He was interested at that time in creating a governor's home.

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money may be used for furnishings for the governor's residence, or diverted to other projects at the discretion of the Permanent Fund Building Council.

The language in the appropriation specifies that any expenditures relating to a governor's residence must be with "consent and approval by the governor."

An aide to Gov. Don Samuelson said "This governor is not going to ask the legislature for money to build a residence."

The present residence, according to material compiled by the Finance Historical Society, was built in 1914 by W.E. Pierce as a private residence.

Pierce was in real estate and finance. He was president in 1914, a partner with John M. Haines, governor during 1913-14. Pierce was mayor of Boise during 1916-17.

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Soviet Effort In War Is Reviewed

WASHINGTON (AP)—A new U.S. Army study suggests that the 1945 victory over the Soviets and a chance to reach the Rhine River—and thus control of most of Germany—was lost in the last months of World War II.

Had the Soviets succeeded in reaching the Rhine before the Allies crossed that river, they would have been in position to have attacked France and the low countries, and to have controlled virtually all of Germany instead of settling for a division of control with the Allies.

This, in turn, might have altered the shape and fate of postwar Europe.

These conclusions are implicit in the Army's account of the late stages of the Soviet-German war.

That account, titled "Stalingrad to Berlin," was researched and written by Army historian Earl F. Ziemke. He drew on captured German documents and on Soviet military writings, according to the Army's account.

The offensive began Jan. 12, 1945, and within two weeks Soviet units were closing up on the Oder River.

But on Feb. 17, 1945, Ziemke wrote, the Soviet staff "misjudged" the situation and ordered Marshal George K. Zhukov and other field leaders to clean up the flanks of the advancing Soviet Army.

This, in the view of U.S. Army historians, wasted almost six weeks.

"By the end of the third week in February the great Soviet offensive had come to a dead halt," the study said. "Caution was in the air."

The Army study noted that the Soviet high command's decision coincided with two small German counterattacks—one aimed at Stargard east of Berlin and the other on the East River in Hungary.

It is suggested the counterattacks accomplished nothing for the Germans militarily, but apparently demonstrated to the Soviet staff officers.

"The abortive Stargard operation brought the Germans a substantial, unexpected, and unearned dividend," the study says. "They have profoundly affected Germany's future," the study said.

In the fit of caution that took hold in mid-February, the study said, the Soviet high command "dismantled its operation for an advance into Berlin."

By the study's account, the Soviet high command staff in the late fall of 1944 planned a winter offensive that was to have advanced the war in about 20 days.

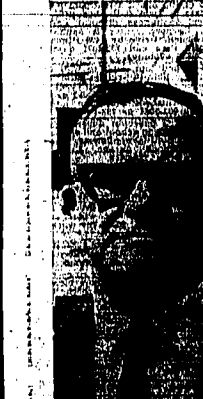

The ceremony was held at the Moscow State University.

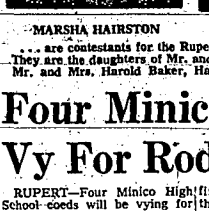

Popularity voting, which counts 25 per cent of the total points, will be held in conjunction with the rodeo June 24. Those who purchase tickets to the event are entitled to one vote. Holly Hougburg will emcee.

The remaining 75 per cent of the total points awarded to each contestant will be determined by a girls' representative personally, and her ability to show her horse. She will be required to show the horse at a 600-foot, trot, gallop, figure eight, stop and start, and a 100-foot answer any questions pertaining to a rodeo and will be given up to three minutes of free lance.

The queen and her two attendants will be crowned July 4 during the annual rodeo. She will ride in the parade, and will preside. Relinquishing over this year's rodeo will be Mrs. Wilfred, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Willert.
