Yugoslav Unrest Stirs Country

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP)—Yugoslavia's Communist government banned public demonstrations, meetings and parades in Belgrade today following two days of fierce fighting between rebellious students and police—the first spontaneous flare-up in the country in the years of Red rule since World War II.

Students retained control of the Belgrade University administration building, seized Monday, and about 30,000 attended orderly meetings at colleges scattered throughout the capital.

The ban by President Tito's government on public assembly, issued for the "protection of public order," appeared to have a double aim—to head off any new rioting while keeping the revolt from spreading to workers as it did in Belgrade.

An Interior Ministry statement said property damage from violence Sunday and Monday exceeded \$120,000 and that 300 arrests had been made. It also said that 100 demonstrators had placed explosives in a downtown travel agency.

The official injury count was 38, but an eye witness said to be substantially higher.

The university itself was ordered closed for seven days and policemen ringed its grounds. They made no effort to enter the student-held building, but checked the identification of those who went on campus.

The telephone lines to the building were cut, students said. About 2,000 had gathered earlier to hear a nonstop round of speeches from a balcony draped with a huge picture of Tito and such slogans as "Down with Red Bourgeoisie" and "The Press is Lying."

Informants said Communist party student leaders appeared to have regained control over the student rank and file by joining with their demands and joining protests against what they called police brutality.

They are expected to press for a halt to public demonstrations and a change in the government. Student demands presented to government leaders were:

- Abolition of all social privileges which still exist in Yugoslavia.
- Abolition of unemployment.
- Removal of poor quality workers.
- Time work and jobs for all university graduates.
- Democratization of the Communist party, and the news press.

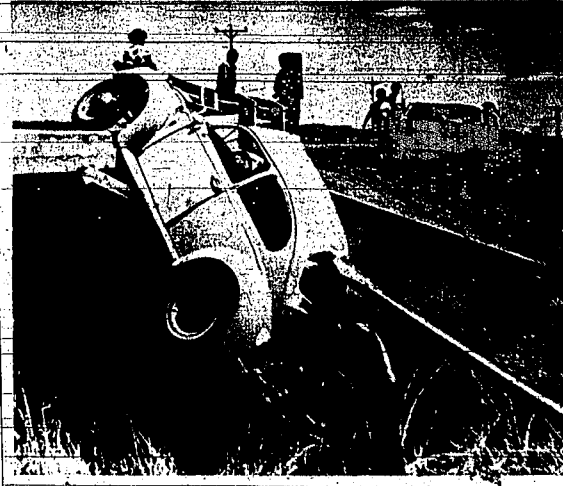

Cape Kennedy Moonport Threatened By Hurricane

PUNTA GORDA, Fla. (AP)—Behind her five persons were missing and a child was dead, a hurricane Abby moved onto this west coast Florida fishing village today and aimed her demolishing winds and torrential rains across the state toward the nation's moonport on Cape Kennedy.

Forecasters Arnold Stagg at the National Hurricane Center in Miami said the storm would weaken as it moved north-northwest across the state.

At the moonport, heavy rain was reported. The Air Force and National Aeronautics and Space Administration spokesmen said the moonport is extremely vulnerable to gusty winds.

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Israeli Jets Hit Arab Positions In Attack On Jordan

TEL AVIV (AP)—Israeli warplanes swept across the River Jordan to hammer Arab artillery positions today on the eve of the first anniversary of the Arab-Israeli war.

Artillery, mortars and tanks kept up a barrage of rapid fire from the Jordanian frontiers. Columns of black smoke rose from several Arab villages.

The Israeli army announced three Israeli civilians had been killed by shelling of number of border farm settlements. First wounded said at least eight were reported.

The fighting began before dawn. The Israeli army accused the Arab troops of lobbing a number of mortar shells at the settlements along the river immediately south of the Sea of Galilee.

Later in the morning the Israeli charge Jordanians fired machine-guns at laborers in the field.

The Jordanians were reported shelling four settlements along the river during the afternoon.

The reaction was the third major Israeli raid on Jordan this year. Fighter-bombers from Tel Aviv swept along the Jordan Valley March 21, covering an Israeli invasion force of thousands that wiped out Arab command bases. They returned eight days later to attack Jordanian artillery emplacements.

Associated Press correspondent Tom Pritch telephoning from a rooftop in Beit-Sme'an, the largest town in the Beisan Valley, said witnesses there saw planes scream across the border.

Israeli helicopters whirred well behind the battle lines and the ejection of mortar shells and artillery sounded in the air.

Palls of smoke rose from the Jordanian mountains in the Golan Heights and the town of Tel-El-Arbain, which the Israelis have hit frequently in the past as an alleged base for subversive activities.

The outbreak began as a typical shelling along the river which became the cease-fire line between the nations after Israel seized the west bank from Jordan in the Arab-Israeli war last June 5-10.

Israeli shelling hit the settlements of Neve Or, Yardena, Gesher and Beit-Yosher in the Beisan Valley and Ashdot Yaacov in the Jordan. It had been targets of previous attacks.

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Shelling Of Saigon Keeps City Tense

SAIGON (AP)—Viet Cong gunners shelled Saigon for the second night in a row tonight, while the U.S. military reported the capital's southern sector in two attacks.

A U.S. spokesman said 10 82mm mortar rounds landed near the city but the station was not damaged. A few minutes later about 10 more rounds hit the city.

The mortar attack followed by less than 24 hours a barrage of 40 rockets in the heaviest enemy shelling so far of the embattled capital district. The Viet Cong, meanwhile, sent fresh troops to the city.

New fighting broke out only after a half north of President Nguyen Van Thieu's Independence Palace, in the heart of Saigon, while a river in the city was still battling other enemy troops for the fifth day in the western part of the capital and in the northeastern suburb.

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France Reels In Face Of Long Strike

PARIS (AP)—France is reeling in the face of a long strike that has paralyzed the country since mid-May.

The withdrawal represents a big part of France's \$1 billion aid to the United States.

French reserves had dropped to \$1.5 billion from \$4.5 billion on May 31, the Finance Ministry said.

Striking leaders went to their strike members seeking to get the trains and Paris buses and subways moving again.

The Banque de France resumed operations after being closed two weeks. Hundreds of small and medium-sized factories reopened.

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North Vietnamese Deliver Hard-Line Talk In Paris

PARIS (AP)—In a hard-line interview, apparently linked to the Paris peace talks, North Vietnam's top military leader said here for the first time that the country is losing the war in Vietnam.

The interview with Gen. Vo Nguyen Giap, Hanoi's defense minister, was published in the French Communist party newspaper L'Humanite.

2 Candidates May Visit Demo Meet

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho (AP) — Two of the three top Democratic presidential aspirants may attend the Idaho Democratic Assembly June 14-15, one official says.

Edward W. Pike, chairman of the Bonneville Democratic Central Committee, said Monday chances are good that Sen. Mike McCarthy and Vice President Hubert Humphrey will appear.

Pike said Sen. Robert Kennedy might be represented by his brother, Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass.

Some party officials have predicted that more than two-thirds of Idaho's 25 votes at the Democratic National Convention will go to Humphrey.

The presidential race is the only one likely to draw any debate at the State Democratic meeting. Party officers, headed by Chairman E. T. Waters, are expected to be re-elected if they want the jobs.

Unopposed for Democratic nomination are Sen. E. T. Waters, State Rep. Darrel V. Manning of Pocatello for 2nd District Congress, and former Rep. Compton W. Clark for 1st District Congress.

Grid Hero's Death Ruled 'Justifiable'

STOCKTON, Calif. (AP) — A white liquor store clerk's fatal shooting of Negro football star Ted Watkins and his brother, Black Power advocate in Canada, was termed by a district attorney Monday as "self-defense and therefore justifiable."

Watkins, 27-year-old all-star Canadian Football League end with the Hamilton, Ont., Tiger-Cats, was killed during the attempted robbery of a liquor store in a Stockton minority area Sunday, police said.

Police said his young brother, Clifford, 24, was wounded in the encounter with two white liquor store clerks.

"I have concluded the shooting of Theodore Watkins by Fred Larsen was in self-defense and in prevention of a robbery and therefore justifiable," Dist. Atty. Lawrence Driven of San Joaquin County said in a statement.

The police account said Ted Watkins grappled with Larsen, 25, after hitting him with the head with a bottle of liquor. They fell through a pane of plate glass, which nearly severed Ted Watkins' forearm.

Larsen, said the account, was searching for his gun when Clifford ran outside and tried to get it away from him, whereupon Larsen fired and killed Ted Watkins.

Another clerk fired and wounded Clifford.

Administration Has Plan For New Trade Laws

WASHINGTON (AP) — Top Johnson administration officials are carrying to Capitol Hill the President's drive for freer trade while congressional sentiment is strong for using import quotas to protect U.S. industry.

The administration drive, launched today, amounts to the first major review of U.S. trade policy since the 1962 Trade Expansion Act, which greatly reduced tariffs.

Four administration officials will appear for continuation of a policy begun by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. Despite Congress' general attitude, Johnson contends such restrictions as import quotas are "self-defeating" because they only prompt other countries to impose similar restrictions on American goods.

Story Tells How Scorpion Search Is Responsible For Tale Of German Sub

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — A sleek craft with what appeared to be sail-like configuration on top and double red-like objects toward the front which he said appeared to him like 20mm gun mounts.

NEW YORK (AP) — A campaign by U.S. clergymen to grant Vietnam war dissenters church sanctuary from federal law is off to a sputtering start.

Idaho GOP Strength Plan Proposed

BOISE (AP) — Strengthening grass roots support in the Republican Party by eliminating legislative district delegates to state assemblies, was suggested Monday by Dryden Hiller, deputy secretary of state and former clerk of the Idaho house.

Hiller said state assemblies should be made up of county representatives only. He is an Ada County delegate to the GOP state assembly.

Hiller also proposed eliminating incumbent legislators as automatic delegates to the assemblies. They would attend only if chosen by their county assemblies.

Under Hiller's proposal, each county would have three automatic state assembly delegates to the state assembly, committee and committee members — plus one for each 100,000 votes cast in that county for the party's congressional candidate at the previous general election.

Idaho's political parties are a long way from agreeing on Hiller's plan, adding that legislative districts set up in the 1968 reapportionment "aren't working out."

Hiller said his proposal would come closer to achieving equitable representation in nominating assemblies of both parties. It is an example of the current system, he said, Shoshone County has six votes in the assembly and Ada County 13. Shoshone county with ten times the representation gets only six times the representation.

Under Hiller's proposal, Shoshone County's representation would be seven and Ada County's 3. Hiller said Democrats would be similarly helped.

publican voting power of Shoshone's gets only six times the representation.

Hiller said he intends to ask the resolution committee at the GOP state convention this month to adopt his idea and request the next Idaho Legislature to enact it.

North Gem Lake Search Continues

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP) — Search rescuers failed Monday to locate the body of a Spokane woman presumed drowned in a May 25 boat accident on Lake Coeur d'Alene.

Kootenai County sheriff's deputies used search boats with powerful magnets Monday trying to locate Darlene Walter, 34, or the boat she is feared to have gone down with following its crash into a rock cliff.

"The search is to continue today."

The boat was owned by Kenneth Hartley, 45, of Spokane. Searchers recovered from the lake several hours after the mishap.

John Bender, sheriff, said no trace of the boat has been found above or under the water. He said it was hoped the magnets would hook onto the boat's engine or hull.

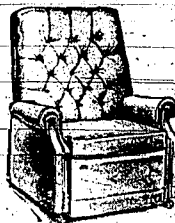

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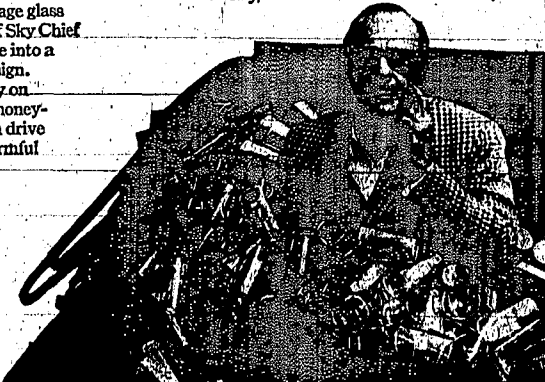

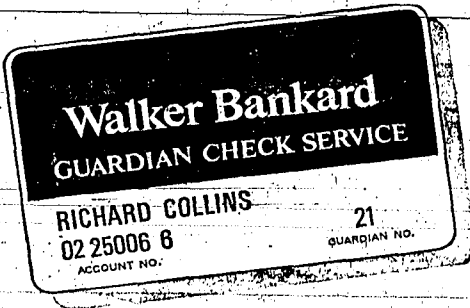

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department has charged that the Interstate Commerce Commission was "seriously deficient" in gauging the effect of the Northern Lines railroad merger would have on competition.

As part of its suit to block the merger, the department filed a brief with the U.S. District Court Monday citing differences between two ICC reports on the proposal to allow creation of the 260,000-mile system. The first report was linked to an ICC decision in 1968 turning down the merger.

In its first report, the Justice Department said the ICC "set forth careful and correct findings to measure the competitive effects of the merger."

The second report relied on a series of conclusory generalizations to reach the opposite result.

The merger would weld together the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroads, all huskies of the railroad industry, as well as two smaller western lines, the Spokane, Portland & Seattle and the Pacific West Coast Railway.

Reuther Blasted By Official Of Textile Workers

WASHINGTON (AP) — A fellow union president says Walter Reuther hurt the labor movement in a critical election year by splitting his Union Auto Workers from the AFL-CIO.

"This serves only to strengthen in the hands of the enemies of labor," said William Pollock, president of the 200,000-member AFL-CIO Textile Workers Union of America.

Pollock's union backs Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey for the Democratic presidential nomination. The Auto Workers have declined to endorse any candidate although Reuther reportedly leans toward Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.

He said contestants will pick up their numbers at the rodeo office at Filer Saturday prior to the rodeo. The office will be open at 8:30 p.m.

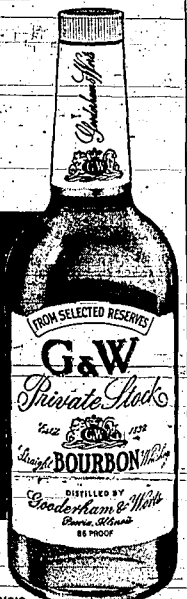
Other events include the queen's breakfast and queen horsemanship competition Sunday morning. Selection of a new queen will be during the Sunday afternoon rodeo program.

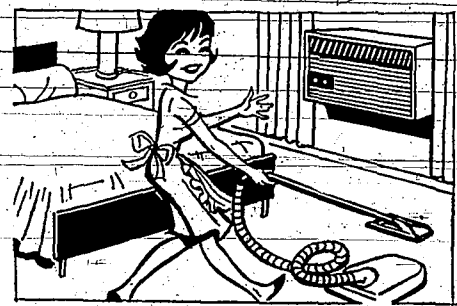

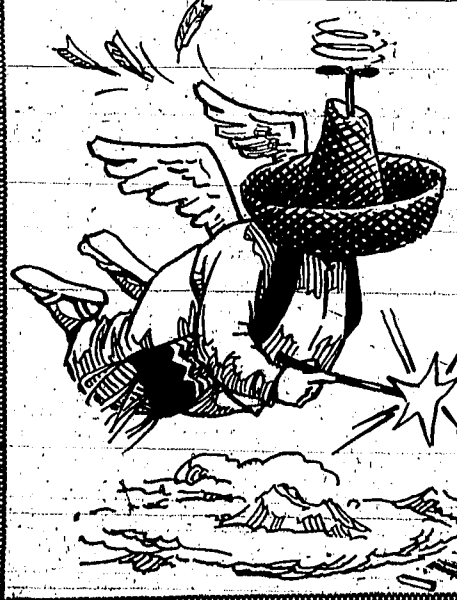

Andy Warhol, Film Artist, Is Wounded

NEW YORK (AP) — Police say Valeria Solanis, a young actress who appeared in several of Andy Warhol's underground film epics, told them she shot the trend-setting pop artist because "I am a tower child. He had too much control over my life."
Warhol, 41, whose films, sculpture and paintings inspired new currents in pop culture, remained in critical condition at Columbus Hospital today with doctors saying he had a 50-50 chance for survival.
The artist, who first outraged critics with his paintings of Campbell Soup cans and out-sized reproductions of Brillo boxes that sold for \$1,300 each, was shot Monday afternoon in the movie studio he called a "factory."

Mario Amaya, a writer and art dealer from London, who was visiting Warhol was also hit in the barrage of five bullets but he suffered only a graze wound in the back and was released after treatment.

Miss Solanis, 28, surrendered four hours after the shooting by announcing to a traffic policeman in the Times Square area, "Police are looking for me."

She was wearing a trenchcoat with a loaded pistol stashed in each side pocket. After questioning she was booked on charges of felonious assault and possession of a deadly weapon.

The slight, 5-foot-3 Brown-haired actress had a role in Warhol's film, "I, a Man," a parody of a Swedish film about a nymphomaniac, chatted freely with newsmen during her booking.

About the shooting she said, "I've got a lot of very involved reasons." She described herself as "a writer" but gave no address saying, "I live nowhere."

The shooting took place about 4:30 p.m. in Warhol's sixth floor office on Union Square with five other persons, including Amaya, present.

VP Speaks Of Social Revolution

NEW LONDON, Conn. (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey pledged Tuesday that if elected president he would give individual Americans the chance to carry "peaceful social revolution" to those who seek it abroad, and to spur the United States away "from ever wider military and armaments programs toward peaceful development."

Humphrey had a busy day of traveling as his rivals for the Democratic presidential nomination—Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy and Robert F. Kennedy—waited for the results of their California primary contest.

The vice president's speech was prepared for the U.S. Coast Guard Academy commencement here.

He likened Congress' withholding of funds for the Asian Development Bank and the Agency for International Development to holding back "a necessary and available medicine from a patient whose health depends on it."

"I propose to offer a new system of national service for our young people—a system that offers overseas outlets far beyond the present numerical openings in the Peace Corps and in voluntary agencies."

Humphrey also proposed to explore new tax and other incentives for universities, corporations and labor unions, and to become involved in health, education, agriculture and manpower projects in new nations.

Veterinarian Operates On Grandson

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—An animal surgeon cut a hole in his grandson's windpipe to allow breathing after a piece of chicken caught in his throat during a Sunday meal.

"I just couldn't give up," when a "life was slipping from my hands," said Dr. Roy Nipko, a Salt Lake City veterinarian.

Tucker J. Nipko, 2, was reported in serious condition today in an intensive care ward.

While Dr. Nipko performed the tracheotomy with a steak knife while the boy lay on the driveway leading to his home. He had a minor surgery performed by his father, Jack A. Nipko, Clearfield, but "I could see that it was not going to make it in time."

Dr. Nipko, 53, said the emergency operation took only a second.

"Veterinarians are trained for emergencies in our areas just like doctors are for theirs," he said.

The youngster's parents and another grandchild were at the hospital when the boy "went down immediately" when the food lodged in his windpipe. He said the boy turned blue by the time the family car was reached.

"I took him out of the car, right in the five-way, few seconds. He started to breathe. We knew then the air passage was unblocked."

Dr. Nipko said the boy was kept in the hospital for dinner while the boy's grandmother gave artificial respiration. They returned home this during the afternoon.

"It's a harrowing experience," he said. "We performed (tracheotomy) on animals many times. That's a human."

Congress Assured Of Plans For Military Strength

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Johnson administration is assuring Congress that plans call for U.S. troop strength to be held steady in Vietnam and lowered in West Europe.

Both questions have been major foreign-policy issues on Capitol Hill.

A recent White House meeting of congressional leaders was told there are no plans for increasing the number of troops in Vietnam beyond the current authorization of 550,000 men.

Secretary of Defense Clark M. Clifford told the group he is determined to fulfill his pledge to the South Vietnamese forces (take back once again more of the responsibility for fighting the war).

Other public and private discussions, Clifford has talked of the eventual withdrawal of large numbers of U.S. military men stationed in Western Europe.

Statewide Stream Map Is Released

BOISE — A statewide stream classification and map will help groups Idaho water into four classes or rating categories was released today by the Idaho Fish and Game Department.

The point is that dam construction and water storage already has flooded 594 stream miles, and that an additional 19 per cent of the Idaho stream acreage is scheduled for reservoir development for power, flood control and irrigation in the next three decades.

Added to the loss of stream fisheries by reservoir development are miles of streams de-watered for irrigation, degraded by pollution and siltation and chewed apart by bulldozers and displaced by roadbeds, said a U.S. Fish and Game Department fisheries management supervisor.

The five rating factors used to classify state streams were aesthetics, availability, use, productivity and size. Each factor was scored with ratings of A, B, C, or D. For example, three "A" ratings with no "D" rating ranked a stream in Class 1, rather than lower down the scale.

West cashed his three aces and made his king of spades later on. He could have beaten three spades had he cashed his ace of clubs, but that would be too much to expect of even a great player.

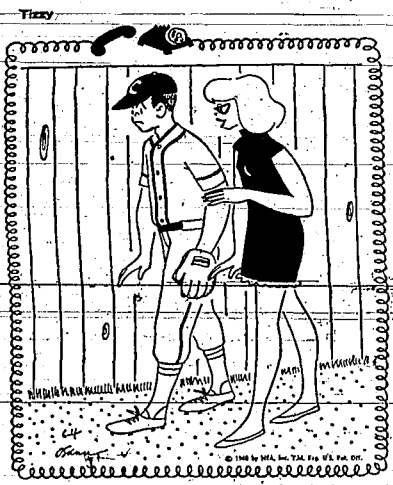

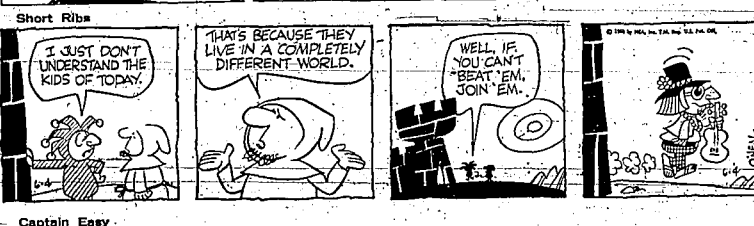
