President Calls For Panel To Study Violence

WASHINGTON (AP) — A blue-ribbon commission to study the causes of violence in the land was announced today by President Johnson.

Johnson called on Congress to pass laws to bring the insane "prison in guns to a halt."

The chief executive expressed his shock and dismay over the shooting of Kennedy in Los Angeles and told a national television audience Wednesday night that violence, murder and assassination must stop.

"My fellow citizens, we cannot, we just must not, tolerate any more of violent men among us," he said.

"We must not permit men who are filled with hatred, and careless of innocent lives, to dominate our streets and fill our homes with fear."

Declaring that "I hope and pray that we can learn how to stop it," Johnson announced creation of a 10-member commission to immediately examine what he termed "this tragic phenomenon of violence and assassination."

"He enjoined the commission to seek the help of men and women of the highest caliber, to lead the nation in searching for root causes of violence. The panel also will study further steps to prevent assassination and how better to protect public figures."

Commission members include Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, former president of Johns Hopkins University and brother of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower; Roman Catholic Archbishop Lawrence Cooke of New York, and veteran Congress members.

No chairman was named immediately. Johnson said during his 11-minute address, the President spoke with considerable force and intensity. He deplored the assassination of the late Sen. Robert Kennedy, whom he praised as the senator's "brilliant career of public service," his "uncommon energy and dedication."

Johnson "was praying to God that he will spare Robert Kennedy and will restore him to full health and vigor."

The Kennedy family has endured sorrow enough, and we pray that this family may be spared more anguish.

Johnson said there was a connection between hatred and lawlessness and the individual act of violence against Kennedy.

Johnson said it would be wrong to conclude "that our country is sick, that it has lost its sense of balance, its sense of direction and its sense of purpose."

He said "200 million Americans did not strike Robert Kennedy last night any more than they struck John F. Kennedy in 1963 or Martin Luther King in April of this year."

But Johnson said, "Those awful events give us ample warning that we are in the midst of a climate of extremism, of disrespect for law, of contempt for the rights of others, violence may bring down the very best among us."

Recess Is Called In Paris

PARIS (AP) — The Vietnam cease-fire talks were bogged down today in their longest recess so far, but both the United States and North Vietnam have given the impression that they want to keep the talks going indefinitely.

U.S. Ambassador W. Averell Harriman and Ambassador Xuan Thuy of North Vietnam talked for almost two hours Wednesday in their seventh session in four weeks, made no apparent progress toward de-escalating the war, and adjourned until next Wednesday, largely at North Vietnam's suggestion.

Thuy maintained his demand that all attacks on his country stop before other issues are discussed. Harriman continued to call for North Vietnamese de-escalation to justify any further limit on American military operations.

Harriman made a probe to find out whether North Vietnam is in process of softening its position regarding the bombing. Thuy's first reaction was negative; he again asked when the United States would stop all bombing.

The probe was based on a statement made by the North Vietnamese Communist party newspaper, which said last week that the United States must "acknowledge its responsibility for stopping all attacks on North Vietnam, according to U.S. diplomats, Hanoi changed the wording to say the United States must "define" its responsibility.

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Humphrey Will Not Attend Gem Democratic Meet

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey apparently will not attend the Idaho Democratic Assembly June 14-15. He has declared an indefinite halt in his campaign because of the shooting of Sen. Robert Kennedy.

It had been said earlier that Humphrey might attend the Idaho meeting, but after Kennedy was shot, Humphrey canceled plans which included a trip to New York and a western swing scheduled to start June 13.

By WALTER R. MEARS and JOSEPH E. MOHABAT LOS ANGELES (AP) — Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, slain by an assassin's bullet, died early today. His mourning family prepared to take his body home Tuesday. His widow, Ethel, said Kennedy had hoped to lead as president.

And on Saturday, the senator is to be buried in Arlington National Cemetery, at the hillside plot which is the resting place of his brother, the late John F. Kennedy.

Bulletin

House Works On Bill To Ban Mail-Order Pistols

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House today passed a bill to ban mail-order sale of pistols.

"If there is one man who would want this bill passed it is Sen. Kennedy," Rep. William C. Cullin, R-N.J., told the House Wednesday.

Kennedy and his brother, Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., sought during Senate consideration of the bill to include a ban on interstate mail-order sales of rifles and shotguns, but the Senate declined to do it. A majority of the House voted to pass the bill today.

"It is a senseless act" by Frankford, executive vice president of the NRA, by far the strongest group opposing the legislation being debated by Congress.

Building In T.F. Is Up From '67

Building construction in Twin Falls is moving well ahead of the previous year with permits issued in May adding \$34,553 in structural values.

City Clerk Constance Leiser reports 18 permits issued in the past month of which five were construction other than dwellings and represented a total of \$339,880, included was the new warehouse structure of Idaho Frozen Foods representing more than \$300,000.

There were ten repairs and improvements, \$6,263; three additions and alterations, \$8,500, and no new dwellings.

Construction for May boosted the total structural value of new buildings for 1968 in Twin Falls to \$1,006,299, compared to \$618,040 at the same time last year. A year ago in May 22 permits were issued, totaling \$233,900.

European Gun Laws Are Tough

LONDON (AP) — Any European who wants to carry a gun has a tough time getting past governmental bureaucracy and police regulations.

In every major country in Europe, you need either a police license or registration with the local authorities to buy firearms.

Britain's gun law dates back to 1920 and is considered in keeping the circulation of pistols down and making the armed robber a rarity. Policemen carry guns only under exceptional circumstances.

To get a "firearms certificate" in Britain, the prospective owner must tell the chief of police why he needs one and answer numerous questions with police followup.

France's arms regulations are harsher on private citizens—but the police are armed. On certain categories of French citizen, such as policemen and bank guards, can possess a pistol. Hunters can buy rifles and shotguns with a permit.

In the Soviet Union and Spain, only police are allowed to possess pistols. Hunters are given licenses for rifles and shotguns, but control is very strict.

British editorial writers said today that the shooting of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy was the almost inevitable consequence of Washington's refusal to control domestic firearms. It was a threat they stress getting past the assassination of President John F. Kennedy five years ago and again after the killing of Martin Luther King.

Potato Bill Is Approved In Capital

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Agriculture Committee approved Wednesday a bill under which commercial potato growers would assess themselves to finance a potato research and promotion program.

Under the bill, growers would pay one cent per hundredweight of potatoes into a fund to improve the competitive position of fresh potatoes and to expand potato markets.

The program would go into effect only if approved by a two-thirds vote in a referendum among the 16,990 farmers who grow five or more acres of potatoes each year.

Tropical Storm Continues Path Of Destruction

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Tropical storm Abby, blamed for seven deaths in Florida, buried a 16-mile-an-hour wind at Jacksonville beach today, toppling trees and power lines and flooding streets.

Described by weather men as a poorly organized storm, Abby spun north in the Atlantic near latitude 29.3 north, longitude 81.0, a short distance north of Daytona Beach.

Abby's arrival in Jacksonville prompted Duval County officials to close schools.

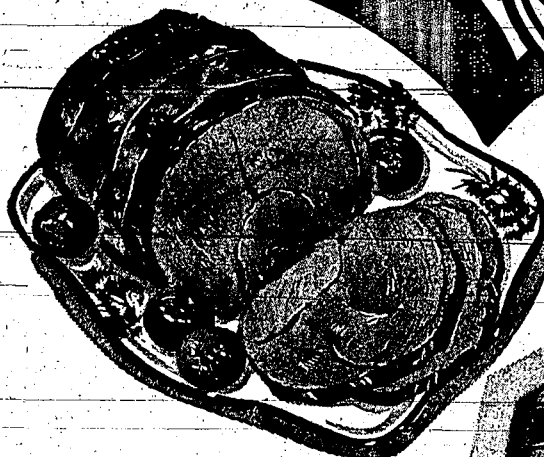

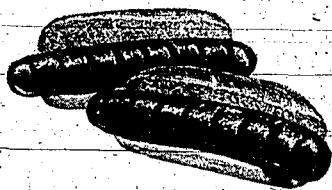

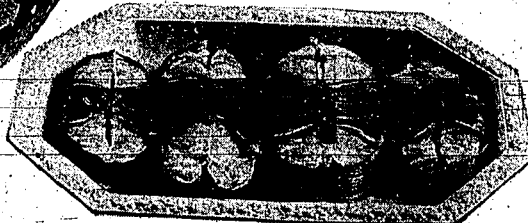

Rupert Signs Contract For Street Work

RUPERT — The Rupert City Council voted to accept a contract concerning a highway safety program during its regular meeting Tuesday night in Rupert.

The action was in response to a letter from Idaho Gov. Don Samuelson requesting the city agree to cooperate with the state in implementing a highway safety program in accordance with uniform standards which must be approved by the Secretary of Transport before Dec. 31, 1958.

The 1958 Safety Act established the safety standards which must be met by all states to avoid possible withholding of federal-aid highway construction and safety funds.

The council also named Governor Newman as voting delegate to the Association of Idaho Cities Convention in Pocatello June 20-22.

Mayor Wendell Johnson was authorized Tuesday night to sign a contract with the Idaho State Department of Highways concerning the reconstruction of these Rupert city streets contained within the Local Improvement District No. 11, bordered by Tenth street, D street, Scott Avenue and A street.

The contract declares that the highway department will pay the cost of the reconstruction on that portion of State Highway 24 contained within the area. The reconstruction will involve excavation, base, paving, curb and gutter installation and a storm sewer outlet installation in the area.

The state's share of the cost will be an estimated \$33,753.00, depending on the cost of the contractor. A storm sewer trunk line will be installed on A street for an estimated \$28,078.00, of which the state will pay \$5,515.00, or 22.6 per cent.

The contract signed Tuesday allows a year for completion of the project. Also during Tuesday's meeting, the council discussed the proposed remodeling of the city's civic building. Two plans have been submitted, one calling for remodeling the present building and the other for constructing a new building to meet the Civil Defense standards.

Another meeting is called for Thursday evening to further discuss the matter.

Four Killed In Massive Land Slide

REVELSTOKE, B. C. (CP) — At least four persons were killed and a young girl injured Friday evening when a massive landslide hit their car on the trans-Canada highway 240 miles north-east of Vancouver.

A highway department spokesman said "there could be more" vehicles under the slide, which roared down a rift in steep mountains and still was coming down 1 1/2 hours after it broke loose.

Mud and rocks covered the highway to a depth of more than 15 feet, about 20 miles west of Revelstoke. A pilot who flew over the scene at 7 p.m. pdt said the running slide then was about 600 feet long.

The bodies of a man, woman and two girls, believed members of one family, were found in the car. Another girl escaped with minor injuries and was reported in "fairly good shape."

A hospital official quoted the ambulance driver who brought in "two of the dead" and the injured girl as saying that if any other persons were trapped, there is no hope they are alive.

Nippon Clipon Bridge To Aid New Zealanders

AUCKLAND, New Zealand (AP)—On May 30, 1968, a grand bridge was opened across Waitemata harbor, the sheltered deep-water port around which this largest New Zealand city has grown. For the half-million Aucklanders it was a dream come true.

The bridge was 3,248 feet long, 142 feet above high water, could carry two lanes of traffic each way, and was going to be big enough to last the city for 25 years.

But in three years, in 1962, there was talk of the need of a second bridge—or a subway, or something, because the volume of traffic already was that predicted for 1974.

Today a Japanese firm is shipping two extra traffic lanes to each side of the bridge to double its capacity.

The Japanese company is Ishikawajima-Harima heavy industries of Tokyo, civil engineers, shipbuilders, manufacturers of engines, machinery, and power equipment.

In February, 1966, the Auckland Bridge Authority called for bids and plans for two extra lanes on each side for two extra bridge. Two Japanese firms, one each from Germany, Britain and Austria sent bids. The contract with IHI for the equivalent of \$10.4 million was signed Nov. 4, 1966, and work is to be finished next April.

Before the bids were called, Auckland had plans drawn up for bridge extension that provided for 1,150 girders to be riveted together. IHI came up with the idea of using just 28 girders, weighing close to 400 tons, and welding them together. This was being done.

First the Japanese company brought out 22-ton brackets, and fixed them to the bridge piers to carry the roadway girders. New Zealand workers quickly pointed out the side of a bridge abutment, "Nippon Clipon."

In October 1967, two giant floating cranes, built in Japan especially for the job, arrived after a 40-day tow from Tokyo. Each is 180 feet high with a lifting capacity of 250 tons.

Then came the first of the giant box girders, prefabricated in Japan, and the cranes, working together, began to lift them into position. The girders arrived from Japan, three at a time, on the deck of a former 13,000-ton oil tanker and are slipping on another former tanker in the harbor until needed.

The clipon idea is expected to cut the equivalent of \$3 million off the original estimate of the cost of the job; the work will be completed sooner than by conventional methods; the widening is being done without interrupting the flow of traffic across the bridge.

On an average day, 35,000 vehicles now use the bridge, nearly three times the volume in the opening year.

Already, the general manager of the bridge authority, Owen H. Brampton, has predicted that the widened bridge will be too small for Auckland traffic by 1979.

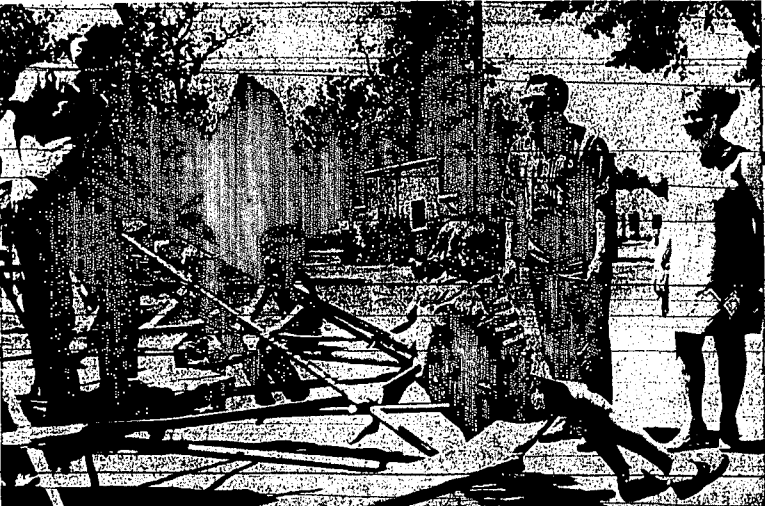
The new program for handicapped youngsters will include softball, swimming, arts and crafts and bowling. The youngsters who are also will be given free passes to the Shrine Circus.

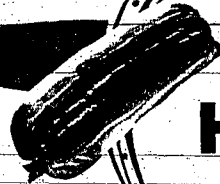

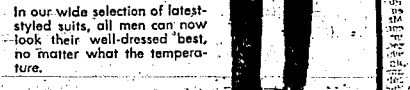

Red Ink Entries Indicate College Athletics Facing Rugged Financial Future

NEW YORK (AP) — "It's like having 280 kids in college at the same time," one school director of a large Midwest university groaned. "It's a financial back-breaker."

College athletics are in a money bind. They have become a high-pressure, multimillion-dollar business on most campuses. Costs have multiplied in the last decade. Football once the breadwinner, no longer pays the freight.

Business managers with a money-bag, such as at Alabama and Notre Dame, are tightening their belts and putting in new orders for red ink.

Notre Dame's athletic budget has risen from \$200,000 in 1952 to \$2,000,000 in 1968-69 but it manages to operate in the black. Michigan State has scored its sports outlay mushroom from \$147,000 in 1947 to \$1,854,000 in 1967, an increase of 1200 per cent.

In the Big Ten, long the symbol of big time college football, six of the ten members are reported to be in the red. In the Big Eight, Kansas' budget has risen from \$350,000 to \$1.4 million in four years.

The sprawling universities of the Pacific coast are similarly affected. In the hohobos of the South and Southwest, where bowl games are spawned, many of the colleges are dependent on booster clubs to keep their heads above water.

At major universities, athletic budgets run from \$1,500,000 to as high as \$3,200,000, the figure for Ohio State's 18-sport program.

Most of the sky-rocketing cost is purely economic, like the housewife's grocery list. The flashy gear to outfit one player runs around \$150, quadruple what it was a few years ago. Jet travel costs, more, hotel and food prices have escalated.

The heavy burden, however,

Robinson Fights Injury And Illness To Regain Status As Feared Slugger

BALTIMORE (AP) — Beset by injuries and illness, Frank Robinson has struggled for almost a year to regain his status as one of the most feared hitters in baseball.

Sideline currently with a sore arm, there is no evidence that the comeback is complete.

Since last June 27, the Baltimore Oriole's outfielder has had an extraordinary streak of bad luck. He has been sidelined with a concussion, double vision, an attack of mumps and now the sore arm.

About the only personal statistic which hasn't suffered in the interim is his salary. After a three-year contract with the Senators signed for \$115,000, representing a \$15,000 raise over 1967.

"It's reached the point where I've stopped being disappointed, and just realize I have to live with it," Robinson said.

In 1966, his first season with Baltimore, Robinson led the team to its first American League pennant by winning the Triple Crown with a .316 average, 49 homers and 122 runs batted in.

Last season, he was hitting .337 with 31 homers and 59 RBIs when misfortune struck for the first time. He suffered a concussion in a baseline collision, missed 28 games because of double vision and played the rest of the season with affected vision.

Still he finished second in the league with a .311 average, third with 34 RBI and fourth with 30 homers.

"I went to spring training this year confident that my season were all right," Robinson said. "And I still think there's nothing wrong with them."

But after playing only eight games of the new season, Robinson was hospitalized after the April 20th game with the mumps.

After three pinch hitting appearances, he returned to the starting line-up May 12 and immediately injured his arm trying to throw out a runner at the plate.

"It was a case of throwing too hard, too soon," Robinson said. "I have to work my arm into shape slowly every year anyway, and this was just like spring training all over again for me."

Although a detriment on defense, Robinson played in nine more games before being sidelined again on doctor's orders for heat treatments and arm-strengthening exercises.
