# Bullet In Brain Kills Sen. Kennedy

LOS ANGELES (AP) — It may be days or weeks before the full medical story of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy's assassination is told, but one fact apparently has been established: Death was due to a bullet in the brain.  
The coroner's chief medical examiner said Thursday after a six-hour autopsy: "The cause of death was ascribed by me as gunshot wound of the head, a bullet penetrating the brain."  
Dr. Thomas T. Noguchi told newsmen that pieces of the bullet and the metal core behind the right ear "severely damaged the main portion of the brain and reached about the center of the brain."  
He said the damage was so extensive "it could not help but obliterate all but one fragment of the brain, but one fragment of the brain was partly paralyzed during the 25 hours he clung to life after the shooting Wednesday."  
Noguchi said outline casts of brain tissue and vital organs removed during the autopsy would continue for days or even weeks but he was confident they would not change his decision on the cause of death.  
Quite a few fragments of the bullet were still in the brain, Noguchi said. Surgeons who operated on Kennedy shortly after the shooting reported they had only one bullet in the brain.  
"It is remarkable that the attending physicians were able to remove as many fragments as they did," Noguchi said.  
An indication of the force of the 22-caliber bullet, fired at close range, was seen in X rays taken of the brain. The bullet, which is the "seat of thought" processes, the pathologist said further study would be needed to determine whether the fragments were bits of bone or bullet.

# Green Giant Officials Inspect Buhl Plant Facilities During Idaho Stop

Four top executives of the Green Giant Co., of LeSueur, Minn., arrived in a Lear jet at the Twin Falls Airport Wednesday afternoon to talk with area representatives of Green Giant, and to inspect plant facilities at Buhl.  
The stop was part of a tour of all plants and agricultural operations in the Western United States. The tour of facilities and operations by the executives will conclude with a visit to a Mexico plant.  
Austin Hayden, vice president of production, for the Green Giant Co., reported that "the tour of the Magic Valley facility was gratifying."  
"The Buhl facility," according to Mr. Hayden, "is becoming one of our larger corn plants

in the company. We have been continually expanding since we purchased it from Pileweat in 1949. As soon as our present phase of expansion is complete we will have doubled the facility."  
Commenting on the production at Buhl, Mr. Austin said, "We have recently increased production into institutional lines, and we have plans to move into freezing in the near future. This will become necessary to supply our expanding Western markets."  
"With this year's current expansion, all former facilities at the old Pileweat plant will have been replaced with modern equipment — the most modern available."  
Mr. Hayden said that "improvement in grower relations and the introduction of unique

corn strains for this area actually increase the use of the facility greatly."  
This aspect of the Magic Valley operation has substantially enhanced the value of this territory to Green Giant," said Hayden.  
He added that "harvesting is now completely mechanized and that the use of immature crops and the resultant plow-down of green stover is doing much to build up organic matter in the soil and giving us improved land values."  
He also mentioned that "although the plant physically has doubled in size, the production has doubled, tripled, and will possibly quadruple due to expansion, efficiency, and the use of new varieties."  
The Buhl plant, Mr. Hayden

pointed out, "is now producing all of their own cans as well as cans for the Dayton and Wainburg, Wash., operations, and the facility at Yuba City, Calif."  
"Crop conditions so far this year," reported Hayden, "look excellent. It should be a normal season even though the present cool weather would have a temporary adverse effect."  
Just prior to leaving Twin Falls for Mexico, Mr. Hayden commented that "We consider this to be one of our nicest areas. And that is so, despite the cooperation of local government, and an outstanding environment, make the Magic Valley ideal as a sound economic base for Green Giant."  
The four executives left Twin Falls for Mexico late Thursday.

# Body Of Slain Senator Lies In State; Thousands File Past To Pay Respect

NEW YORK (AP) — Tens of thousands of persons from all walks of life filed past the body of Robert F. Kennedy's body as it lay in state today before the main altar beneath the towering stained-glass windows of Patrick's Cathedral on Fifth Avenue.

Six abreast, in a line stretching about 10 blocks to Grand Central Station, many thousands waited in a 90-degree temperature to pass the casket in the church.

Family, friends and associates stood vigil over the body of the fallen senator. Among them were Robert S. McNamara, former secretary of defense and now president of the World Bank; Douglas Dillon, former secretary of the treasury; Burke Marshall and John Doar, his associates in the Justice Department; and Joseph Patrick Kennedy, his 16-year-old son.

At one time an honor guard of four master sergeants in green berets from the John F. Kennedy Combat Center at Fort Bragg, N.C., relieved the family at the casket.

Church officials said that because of the size of the crowd the church would remain open all night if necessary so that all might enter.

A crowd of about 1,000 persons, many of them teen-agers, was waiting in the gray dawn light when the massive doors to the old cathedral swung open at 5:41 a.m. Some had been waiting through the night.

In solemn and somber mood they filed by the dark red wood closed casket in final tribute to the 42-year-old Democratic senator who had aspired to be the second of his family to occupy the White House.

Many in the line were negroes. There were also a number of nuns and two young couples who had attended a

# Sorrow Expressed By Gov. Samuelson

"I am extremely sorry that things like the assassination of Senator Robert Kennedy can happen in a great city like ours," declared Idaho's Governor Don Samuelson at a noon meeting Thursday of the Twin Falls Lions Club.  
Commenting upon the recent political assassinations in the United States, Governor Samuelson said, "I have been trying to weigh the recent assassinations and think the cause started some time ago with our morals deteriorating."  
Samuelson said the American people sat by and let things happen that they should not have. He said we would not have thought of condoning 20 years ago.

He concluded his remarks on the U.S. with this comment: "We are very fortunate to be in this wonderful state with wonderful people who have never let the government get on one side of the state or the other."  
The grand jury was composed of 13 women and 8 men. One juror member was absent due to illness. The foreman said a vote of 14 is required for an indictment.

Samuelson discussed ways in which Idaho could use federal dollars in a more appropriate manner. "If the federal government has, for example, 21-million dollars that they are going to give Idaho to use, I would like to see that money go directly to the Idaho Legislature so they can determine the money for use by the particular needs of the state."  
The main thread Samuelson was attempting to express in his speech was how he could best use the state government for work in an economical and efficient manner. He discussed the Management Services Department that was created in 1964 and his intention to work closer with it.

Samuelson said he needed administration in office that will declare we are going to live by the same rules as regulation and all men should live under these same rules and no minorities should be an exception.  
Samuelson said he would like to see a recent police action in Washington, D.C. during the riots following Dr. Martin Luther King's death. He said he would like to see the police use the same police stand and watch people and then throw fire bombs and destroy the store. Samuelson said he would not expect such treatment and commented, "If I ran down the street and broke a window and stole a television set, then ran down the street, I would expect to be killed just deadlier than a door nail."

# Limited Gun Bill Approved

By ROBERT A. HUNT WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson, speaking in the wake of a new Kennedy assassination, has told Congress that 35 long months after the order murder of President John F. Kennedy "it is time in the name of sanity for a tough gun-control law."  
He served notice Thursday that a measure passed by both Senate and House, and now on his desk doesn't go far enough because it bans the mail-order sale only of pistols. He wants the ban to apply to rifles and shotguns as well.

When it was in the Senate, opponents of the tougher provision — Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., lost in their bid to include rifles and shotguns.  
Two of Dodd's staunchest allies in that body were Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, whose brother was assassinated with a mail-order rifle five years ago, and Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, whose only surviving brother, Robert, was assassinated with a pistol two days ago.

"So, I call upon the Congress in the name of sanity in the name of safety — to give America the gun-control law it needs," Johnson said.  
The House passed the pistol-only provision Thursday and Johnson issued his statement shortly afterward. He did not indicate a measure to ban mail-order rifles and shotguns was in the pipeline.

Two congressmen urged him to veto it; another said he would propose next week a House vote on a measure to ban mail-order rifles and shotguns as well.  
The only House vote this week on the issue concerned the pistol-only provision because that is the way the bill came from the Senate.  
The gun-control proposal has been a matter of controversy on Capitol Hill for several years but is only one of several controversial issues in the legislation sent to Johnson.

# Sirhan's Case Gets Started

By JACK SCHREIBMAN LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Los Angeles County Grand Jury met today to hear 23 witnesses and consider a first-degree murder indictment against a young Jordanian in the assassination of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.  
Sirhan Bishara Sirhan, 24, was not present as the 23 grand jurors met on the fifth floor of the Hall of Justice. He is jailed under constant surveillance in a maximum security cell.  
Sirhan's attorney, E. McKee, a retired garage man from near Long Beach, said before the hearing began: "The jury has made up of persons from all walks of life, creeds and colors and I feel that after we have heard all the evidence and do the fairest, a change of venue is warranted."  
The jury also was asked to return indictments for assault with intent to commit murder in the wounding of five others in the burning of gunfire that killed

Kennedy early last Wednesday after he proclaimed his triumph in the California Democratic presidential primary election.  
The grand jury was composed of 13 women and 8 men. One juror member was absent due to illness. The foreman said a vote of 14 is required for an indictment.  
Headling the presentation to jurors was Dist. Atty. Evelle J. Younger, who requested the indictment.  
Younger said Sirhan would be arraigned in person within 48 hours in Superior Court, make a plea at that time or shortly after, with trial expected to begin within 60 days from that time. Should the defendant seek a change of venue, Younger said he would not oppose it.  
The public defender's office is providing Sirhan legal advice. The prosecutor originally was led under \$250,000 bond, but

that was revoked by Superior Court Judge Hanger. Hanger said that after Kennedy's death, California law permits to bond "a murderer."  
Younger said the murder indictment "is a long first step toward taking the handcuffs off of our law-abiding citizens and placing them on the criminals."

## U.S. Envoys Leave Paris For Funeral

PARIS (AP) — Ambassadors W. Averell Harriman and Cyrus R. Vance, leaders of the U.S. negotiating team in the Vietnam peace talks, were flying to New York today to attend the funeral of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.

The talks are in recess until Wednesday, and aides said Harriman would "be back in Paris before Kennedy's funeral." He previously planned a trip home this weekend, primarily for personal reasons, and may stay in the United States for several days.

The seventh session of the peace talks was held last Wednesday.

U.S. officials expect a very slow pace to persist, perhaps for weeks, while the Vietnam war continues and perhaps increases in violence. Maneuvering on details—such as whether North Vietnam will admit it has troops fighting in the South, is expected but no early resolution of major issues is foreseen unless there are unexpected developments.

## Seattle Siren To Alert Soldiers

SEATTLE (AP) — Soldiers in the central highlands of Vietnam will soon be awaking to the sound of a Seattle siren.

Capt. Richard D. James recently wrote to the Seattle Police Department to find out where he could buy a new or used siren. He said he needed it to alert his battery to critical situations.

"We have been using a vehicle horn," he wrote, "but it is not loud enough to penetrate the bunkers to awaken the men." The police contacted the owner of an ambulance service, who immediately donated a \$300 siren.

## Bill Inked On Candidate Protection

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legislation authorizing Secret Service protection for all major presidential candidates sped through Congress Thursday in the wake of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy's assassination.

It was sent to President Johnson, who promptly signed it. Johnson already had ordered the protection in anticipation of the bill's passage.

Secret Service agents have been assigned to Richard M. Nixon, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York, and former Minnesota Gov. Harold E. Stassen, Republicans; Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, Democrat, and former Gov. George C. Wallace of Alabama, Independent.

Hubert H. Humphrey, a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, already had Secret Service guards as vice president.

The bill authorizes \$400,000 to finance the extra protection during June. The total cost through the November election was put at \$2 million.

Additional financing beyond June 30 will be sought in the regular annual appropriation bill for the Secret Service.

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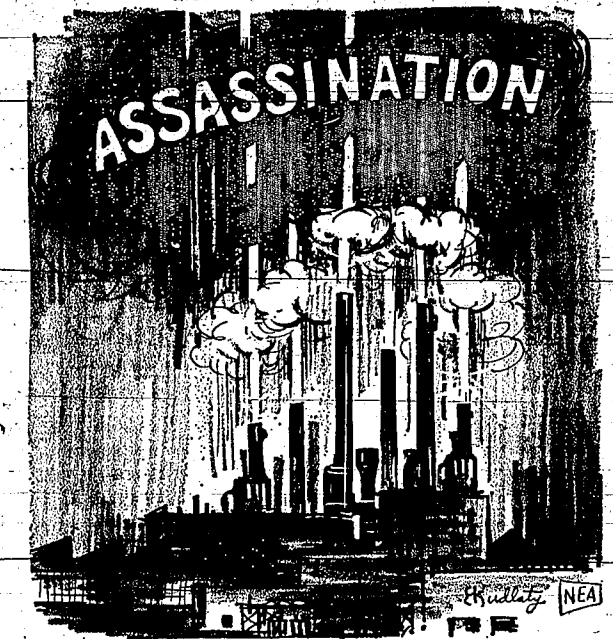

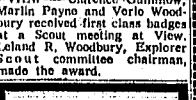

### Speculation Emerges Over Successor Of Sen. Kennedy

ALBANY, N. Y. (AP) — The names of former Sen. Kenneth B. Keating and U.S. Rep. Ogden R. Reid—figured prominently Thursday in speculation over whom Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller will appoint to fill Robert F. Kennedy's Senate seat. The Republican governor and other political notables declined to discuss the impending appointment publicly. Rockefeller's press secretary, Leslie Slovic, told The Associated Press that the governor had "given no thought" to a successor for Kennedy. The governor is required by state law to fill the vacant seat by appointment, although the law does not specify when he must act. By custom, governors of this and other states have waited at least until after the funeral of deceased senators before acting. Keating's name came immediately to the fore, on the theory this Rockefeller might wish to reinstate the former senator.

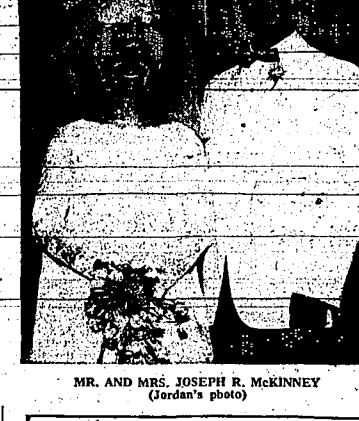

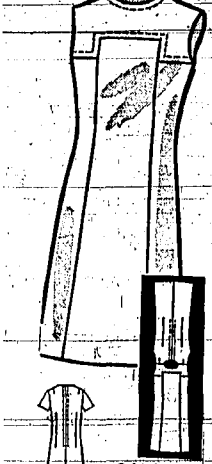

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# Spray Apple Trees For Codling Moth

Home fruit growers now is the time to spray apple trees for codling moths, the cause of the worms that damage the apples, says Donald Youst, Twin Falls County agent.

Mr. Youst said Dale Latta, state inspector has found several orchards with codling moths. Mr. Youst added that there are several chemical programs that commercial orchards use, but for the home grower use three tablespoons of 25 per cent DDT plus one teaspoon of 91 per cent malathion or two teaspoons of 57 per cent diazinon per gallon of water.

Repeat this process at three week intervals or after heavy rains, until mid-August. For worm-free apples this fall.

## T.F. Scientist Is Honored With Degree

Dr. Walter H. Pierce, Twin Falls, retired director of the Agronomy Research Center, was awarded an honorary doctor of science degree Sunday at University of Idaho commencement exercises.

Pierce, who received both his bachelor's and master's degrees from the university, was cited for his research which added considerably to the growth of the state's agricultural industry.

As a plant pathologist in the University's Experiment Station in Moscow and Twin Falls, he did basic research which resulted in the University of Idaho dry bean varieties. This ultimately became the basis of a \$20- to \$30-million-dollar Idaho industry which continues today.

Leaving the University in 1937, he joined the University of Idaho as a geneticist and plant pathologist. Here during a 30-year career, he was primarily responsible for the development of over 50 new varieties of strains of peas and some 15 new varieties of strains of beans. Many of these have been of special significance in the emergence of canning and freezing food processing industries.

# Management Is Key To Top Irrigated Pastures

There are several farmers and ranches throughout Twin Falls County and other areas in Magic Valley who are not getting full benefits from pastures.

This is the thought of Clarence Hedrick, Twin Falls unit conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, and also of Dick Stafford, and Lyle Jones, supervisors of the Snake River Soil Conservation District.

The key to getting best results from pastures is management, Mr. Hedrick said. There are 700,000 acres of cropland pasture in Idaho, of which 500,000 are irrigated, and capable of producing three to six tons of alfalfa hay per acre.

In irrigated pastures, Mr. Hedrick said, management is a key tool.

In any irrigated pasture program, especially in Twin Falls County, there is the establishment and selection of high quality seed. For best results in this area, Mr. Hedrick said, the combination of Latah Orchardgrass and alfalfa is the highest producing type of pasture there is in this area.

Farmers who want this type of pasture should seed six pounds of latah orchardgrass and two pounds of alfalfa per acre. Another figure that is high yielding is a 1:10 alfalfa-clover

This is good if a plentiful supply of water is available throughout the growing season.

The mixture of alfalfa and Latah Orchardgrass also recovers quickly.

In any pasture program, don't overgraze. In the spring allow at least eight inches of top growth to develop before turning livestock on the pasture.

Never graze the topgrowth closer than three to four inches from the ground since it reduces the yield, weakens the plants and increases erosion and allows weed invasion.

Also avoid undergrazing. Mature forage is unpalatable and of low nutritive value. Tall growing plants may drive out such desirable low growing plants as Ladino clover because of excess shade.

Irrigate pastures every seven to eight days throughout the growing season. Also the pastures should be fertilized with nitrogen for the grasses and phosphate for the legumes. Split application is best, says Mr. Hedrick.

For spring apply about 80 pounds of available nitrogen per acre and in July or August when the yield starts to drop off, another application will bring the yield back up. Phosphate also should be applied at that time again.

A schedule of grazing should be set up and followed closely. A continuous grazing program is poor management. In a short period of continuous grazing will result in poor production.

Rotation grazing is best. Under rotation grazing, the pasture is divided into three or more units. As soon as the forage is about eight inches tall, depending on the type of grasses used, the livestock are turned into the first unit. They graze the unit for six to nine days, depending again on grasses and legumes and then they are turned into the second unit. The remaining units are grazed in turn and then the cycle is repeated starting with the first unit again.

A complete grazing cycle of the entire series of grazing units should last about 21 days with a Ladino-grass mixture. About 30 to 35 days are required with alfalfa since a larger proportion of the stems are consumed and a certain amount of regrowth is essential for the replenishing of root reserve so that the vigor, productivity and density of the stand are maintained.

There are some farmers and ranchers in the area who have excellent pastures while their neighbors do not.

Dick Stafford, Twin Falls, chairman of the Snake River Soil District, has one of the outstanding pasture programs in the county. He has some pasture in Latah Orchardgrass and alfalfa mixture. "Broma" and Orchardgrass.

several pastures in this area that are irrigated but are very poor. There are several reasons for this. One of the main reasons is that most of them are old bluegrass pastures, established years ago. Also poor management caused some of these poor pastures.

He said if these old pastures were plowed up and reseeded with some of those new species of grasses and with proper management, they will be in top producing condition.

The Snake River Soil District supervisors are urging local farmers and ranchers to improve their irrigated pastures by using a need for high yielding pastures.

Also irrigated pasture program fits well into the crop rotation program. Mr. Hedrick says by rotating pasture cropland with the cash crop rotation plan, the soil is improved for other crops.

Also, he says one of two hay crops can be taken from a pasture before it is grazed.

"Dollarwise," Mr. Hedrick says, a high yielding irrigated pasture will compare with the best cash crop in Magic Valley. But the key is management.

A tour of the Aberdeen Plant Materials Center, to view new grass species for irrigated pastures, is scheduled this summer

for the supervisors of the three soil districts in Twin Falls County. The three districts are the Snake River Soil District, Twin Falls Soil District and the Balanced Rock Soil District.

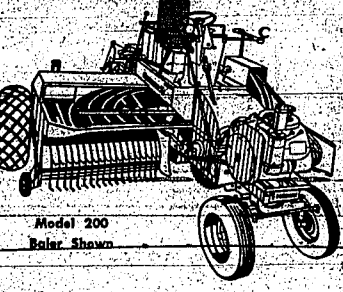

## Coho Salvaged From Salmon Tract Canal

A systematic salvaging of Coho salmon has been started by the Idaho Fish and Game Department in cooperation with the Salmon Falls Reservoir Canal Company.

The Salmon tract, hard pressed for sufficient irrigation water this year, has adopted a policy of running water through the canal system for six- to eight-day periods and then closing down the system until irrigation again is required by crops. The schedule will fluctuate according to weather, as the rains of Wednesday and Thursday will provide relief in water use and reservoir drawdown.

The Coho, part of the initial planting experiment a year ago by the department, like the moving water and have left the reservoir to live in the canal—and die in the small laterals. Last year the department salvaged only at the end of the season, returning about 600 fish to the reservoir.

With the alternating water schedule, this will have to be stepped-up to about eight- or nine times this year.

Biologist Robert Bell, Jerome, headed up the first salvage Thursday after the regional office had received several calls concerning the situation. "We found the fish largely in four or five concentration points and took out about 400," he reports. "The calls we received reported that at least several limits had been taken by anglers and there also were rumors that some people were taking them illegally."

Bell noted some disappointment in the fish. "We weighed about four to a pound. The biggest one was about 15 inches long and couldn't have weighed more than half a pound. Some of this lack of size could be attributable to the fish being in the canal where there isn't much food."

"We took some stomach samples and they were all empty except for one fish which had caught a beetle," he continued. "We are going to conduct some gill net catching there in a week or so and we hope the fish were as good as in the reservoir are faring better. These fish we salvaged today were in pretty good shape but they weren't fat like the ones we took in the gill nets at Mormon Reservoir."

But urged the cooperation of the public in refraining from fishing the canal until the department has completed salvaging after each close-down. "We will try to be there the day after the flow is shut off each time," he said. "All the fish will be returned to the Salmon Reservoir. After we have salvaged we won't mind fishing pressure. Due to the cool conditions of the past few days the fish have managed to survive in good shape. Later this summer, the sun should warm these pools behind the tolerance of the Coho and they will probably die. Of course, we are losing fish in the small laterals that run into the fields but we can't help that."

Bell said the regularity of the salvaging would depend on the fish. "We might have a large exodus of fish each time or we might find that the short water runs aren't drawing enough fish out of the reservoir to make the salvage feasible. It takes at least four man-days," he pointed out.

In the meantime, Bell reported that due to the reports of illegal fish taking, the department's enforcement branch will maintain a tighter than usual check on the canal.

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# High Water Eases Salmon Outlook For Lemhi River

SALMON — Water conditions that have been caught by high water and the fish have anglers in the Salmon River. Don Corley, a regional fish biologist for the Idaho Fish and Game Department, believes the pressure is off at least for this month.

The main Salmon below the mouth of the East Fork is unfishable now due to the run and muddy conditions. Above that the river is turbid but fishable. On-up, it is high but in better fishing condition," he reported.

Two-weeks ago, the low water year and demands of irrigation had reduced fish passage water to a threatened trickle—similar to the big headache that barely was circumvented two years ago. Although the first Chinook Salmon weren't far away at that time, Corley's optimism has paid off.

"We're getting some rain and the high water runoff is coming down the Lemhi now," he said Thursday night. He added he expected the water situation to remain up throughout the month with the runoff starting to subside around the middle of the month.

"We have two spurges of Salmon coming into the Lemhi in early June and early August. If there is going to be a problem it will come in late July," he explained. "It appears that the fish arrive here about the same time. From our checks at the Lemhi we've seen them immediately go up the Lemhi and lay around in the deep pools up there—until it is time to spawn. Some of them have to move only a few yards to the spawning beds from where they've been holed up. The others appear to come into the lower Lemhi and wait in the low pools until they ripen. Then they come up into the headwaters."

Corley said the department knows of about 30 to 35 Salmon Reservoirs.

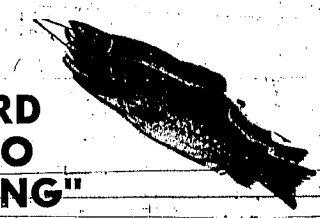
