Relief Aid Granted To Idaho

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson granted today \$667,500 in additional disaster relief funds for Idaho to aid in restoring public facilities ravaged by forest fires last year.

The President previously made available an initial allocation of \$250,000 for the state.

State officials have estimated the cost of fighting fires in north Idaho last summer at nearly \$3 million. The President designated Idaho a "major disaster" area at that time, entitling the state to federal help.

After the initial \$250,000 allocation, Gov. John V. Evans asked for more help in paying Idaho's fire fighting bills.

Samuelson's office had no immediate comment on today's allocation. Sen. Len B. Jordan, R-Idaho, and Frank Church, D-Idaho, said they were pleased with the President's action.

Senator Dodd Proposes Gun Control Bills

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., proposed two gun control bills today, one to prohibit interstate mail order sales of rifles and shotguns, the other to require registration of all firearms.

Without such legislation, he said, "our land will be the scene of more assassinations and attempted assassinations."

Dodd said: "The gun lobby, led by the National Rifle Association, will not doubt make another determined effort to deprive the public of the kind of firearms legislation it has requested, indeed demanded."

A crime control bill sent to the White House by Congress last week would ban interstate mail order sales of handguns and their over-the-counter sale to nonresidents of a state.

President Johnson called this measure a "major step" in curbing Congress to extend the ban on mail order sales to shotguns and rifles, as proposed in the bill.

However, Johnson did not go so far as to propose compulsory registration of firearms.

During Senate debate on the crime control bill, Sen. Edward W. Brooke, R-Mass., introduced a registration amendment, but he did not call it up for a vote.

He said he realized it stood no chance of adoption.

James Earl Ray Indicates He Will Fight U. S. Extradition

LONDON (AP) — James Earl Ray made a two-minute appearance in Bow Street Court today and indicated he would fight the U.S. government's attempt to seek extradition for the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Ray had been under heavy guard since his arrest Saturday. Ray's dark hair was flecked with gray at the temples, and his face was tanned.

A government prosecutor asked that Ray be held in custody, and the judge granted Ray's application request that the court appoint a lawyer for him. Then he was taken away by a large force of plainclothesmen and uniformed police.

Ray had been in Canada, Portugal and Britain before the two-month hunt ended with his arrest in London airport.

'Frisking' Power Upheld By Court

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court upheld today the power of police to stop suspicious people on the street and "frisk" them for weapons.

The decision, given by Chief Justice Earl Warren, said a policeman is entitled for the protection of himself and others "to conduct a carefully limited search of a suspect's clothing to find weapons which might be used to assault him."

BOSTON (AP) — Still so young to have come so far, many have grieved so much, Edward M. Kennedy stands alone—the last of the Kennedy brothers.

Six years in which triumph and tragedy have followed one another in a terribly swift succession have thrust him at 36 into leadership of a fabled political family.

T.F. Core Area Is Given Planning OK

Things looked bright Monday for the Twin Falls downtown improvement project as Sen. Church, D., Idaho, announced from Washington, D.C. that approval has been given for the final plans of the project.

The approval of plans was given by the Department of Housing and Urban Development and represents completion of the first phase of the project. It opens the way for ultimate upgrading of the central core area of Twin Falls, Sen. Church said. The core area concerned is "U" shaped and bounded on the north by Second Avenue North and East; on the east by Third Street South and East; on the south by Second Avenue West and South and on the west by Second Street West and North.

In approving the final plans, officials of HUD said "99 business and three industrial projects will be offered assistance in finding decent, safe quarters when relocated from the project area."

The news was greeted in Twin Falls with happiness, but it was pointed out construction in the downtown area is still in the future.

First and foremost, the total downtown improvement project has to have Twin Falls city council approval and only after a public hearing or a series of public hearings.

No hearing dates have been set.

Relocation from the downtown area when construction begins is expected to cost \$147,855 and this amount will be provided by HUD, Sen. Church said.

The development area, about 16 acres and known as the Four Parks project, exists from the efforts of two groups, the Twin Falls Urban Renewal Agency and Twin Falls Group of Downtown businessmen.

All work on the plans was done by Twin Falls residents.

Sen. Church said, "approval of the final plan is the culmination of a lot of hard work and demonstrates how well federal and local agencies in cooperation with the local business community can work together in solving urban problems."

Barrier Downed By Court

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court today knocked down a year-old barrier that stood in the way for taxpayers suits challenging federal aid to parochial schools.

The barrier was imposed by the court in 1967 when it found that individual taxpayers lack the standing to sue the government over big programs because their tax payments are too small to show sufficient personal involvement.

Today's ruling sweeps aside that decision. This means seven New Yorkers who contended federal aid to pupils in church-run schools violates the Constitution will have a chance to try to block the program in court.

Similarly, the ruling may clear the way for suits against other government programs.

The carefully worded 8-1 decision delivered by Chief Justice Earl Warren, said there was "no absolute bar" in the Constitution against federal taxpayers challenging allegedly unconstitutional federal taxing and spending programs.

The federal government spends an estimated \$4.1 billion a year under the 1965 Elementary and Secondary Education Act to provide special education services for children attending nonpublic schools in 1967 areas.

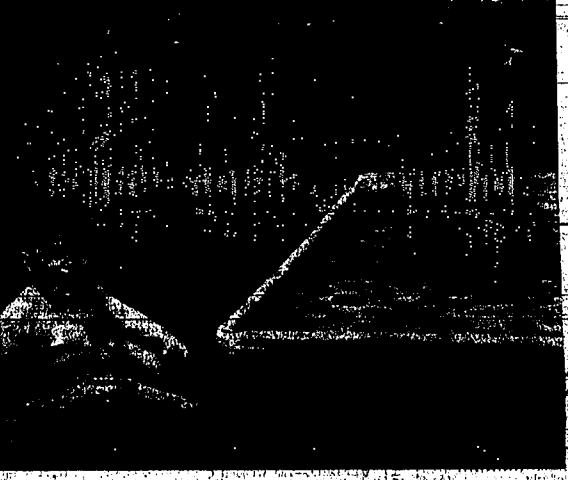
The seven taxpayers claim this favors religious groups and Amendment's ban on establishment of religion by government.

The Justice Department, meanwhile, urged the high court not to disturb the 1923 ruling. Solicitor General Erwin N. Griswold called it "a modern exemplar of FCC regulation of the broadcast industry."

Civilian Casualty Toll Mounts With Heavy Attacks On Saigon

SAIGON (AP) — The civilian casualty toll from 22 days of Viet Cong rocket and mortar attacks on Saigon soared past the 500 mark today with another shelling on the densely populated central districts of the capital.

Gen. William C. Westmoreland, outgoing commander of U.S. troops in Vietnam, told a farewell news conference: "It is virtually impossible to stop this indiscriminate firing of rockets."

Westmoreland leaves Tuesday for Washington to become Army chief of staff.

At least 15 of the 100-pound Russian-made rockets tore into the city early today in the Viet Cong's terror campaign, setting several houses afire, and Vietnamese civilians were killed and 33 wounded.

The start of the Viet Cong's May 5 "peace talks" offensive against Saigon, 109 civilians have been killed and 413 wounded from enemy shellings alone, based on an unofficial tabulation of reports of the South Vietnamese military headquarters and the U.S. mission.

South Vietnamese military headquarters announced that over-141, 453 civilians have been killed and 3,660 wounded in the last 37 days from both enemy rocket and mortar attacks and street fighting in the capital.

South Vietnamese losses were put at 216 killed, 1,933 wounded and 40 missing for the same period. A breakdown on U.S. and other allied casualties was not immediately available.

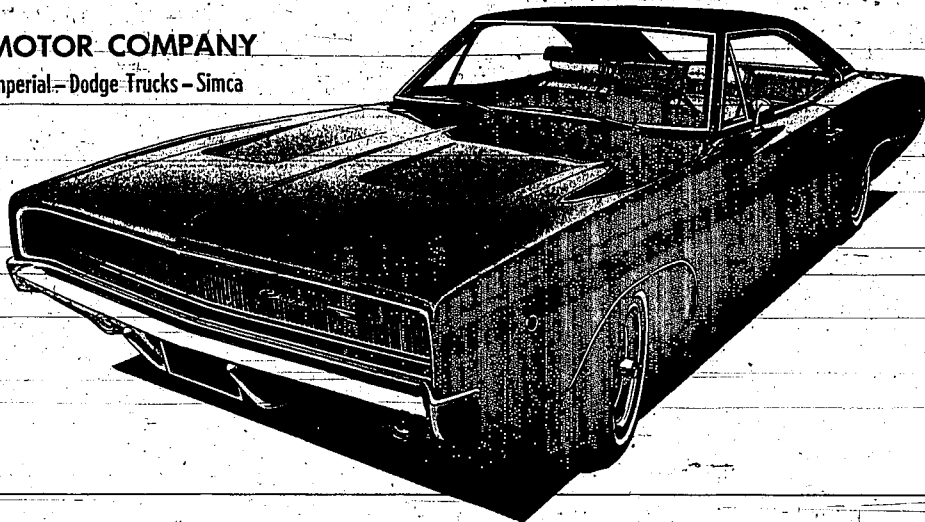

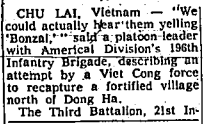

Brown, 32, a former fullback with the Cleveland Browns who led the National Football League in rushing, was booked on suspicion of assault with intent to commit murder.

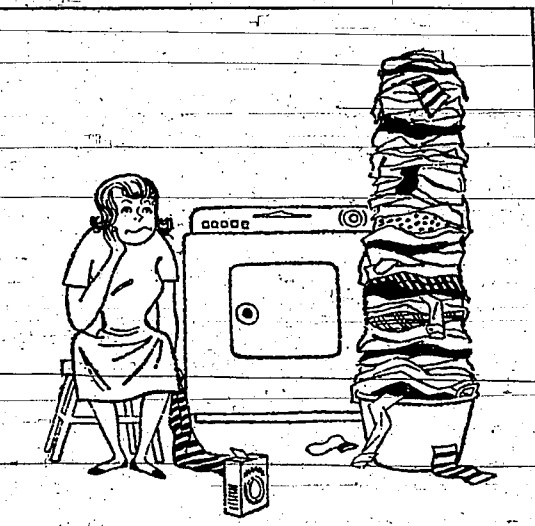
He was taken to the West Hollywood sheriff's substation and was later released on \$12,500 bond. His attorney, Jules Covey, said he would make no statement until later today.

Deputies Myron Cole and John Texeira said they were called to Brown's West Hollywood apartment at about 9 p.m. after neighbors complained of a fight.

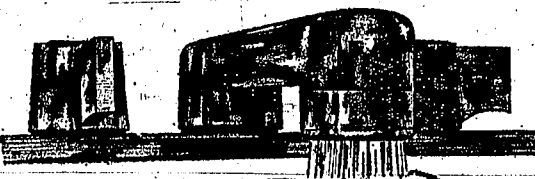

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HHH To Inherit Support

 Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey stands to inherit such a large share of the national convention delegates left unattached by the death of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy that his nomination for the presidency seems assured. "The New York Times" said today.

This, the Washington story said, was the major conclusion of a survey to the effect that the Kennedy assassination on the Democratic party's choice of a nominee conducted by correspondents of the Times over the weekend.

The story also said in part: "The state-by-state inquiry indicated that more than 400 delegates who had been pledged or were leaning toward the New York senator or available in his cause are now expected to support Humphrey at the Chicago convention, which starts Aug. 26."

Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy of Minnesota, the only remaining contender in the field, has the allegiance of only about 75 delegates who had previously been pledged in the Kennedy camp.

The addition of more than 400 delegates to his existing contingent in New York would give Humphrey more than 1,600 delegates, by a generally conservative count. The majority needed to win is 1,200.

Comparable estimates of McCarthy's delegate strength, not including any results from New York, were less than 650.

This left about 600 delegates listed as undecided.

On the Republican side, New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller praised Kennedy today in the first public speech by a presidential candidate since the senator's death last Thursday.

Rockefeller, under Secret Service guard, said in prepared remarks at an Alpheny College commencement in Mendon, Mass., that Kennedy was "someone special to young people who seek new leadership."

Idaho's Road Death Toll For '68 Rises

CALDWELL, Idaho (AP) — Idaho's traffic death toll for 1968 has risen to 117.

The latest victim was Jeanne Bates, 24, of Boise, who died Saturday about seven hours after crashing into a power pole about three miles south of Caldwell.

There were 87 fatalities on Idaho highways by that same date last year.

Turn-In-Your-Guns Move Starts

NEW YORK (AP) — A turn-in-your-guns movement has started in the nation in the wake of the assassination of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.

And there have been calls from public officials, groups and individuals — for stronger gun-control legislation at federal, state and city levels.

"I don't feel like killing anything any more," said Alan E. Schoening, as he turned in two hunting guns to the police in Lancaster, Pa. "Even if people have been shot now," he said, "I want to give up these guns so you can destroy them. I hope this gesture will encourage others to do the same."

A chain of discount stores in Columbus, Ohio, said it would stop selling guns and turned its stock of small arms, hand guns, ammunition and related items to the police department.

John E. Fitcher of Denver urged gun owners to take "all firearms in your possession to the steps of the state capitol next Sunday (Father's Day) to be destroyed and disposed of."

He said the gesture would be a sign of our intention to kill no more, and as a fitting remembrance to a fallen martyr — Robert F. Kennedy.

who called himself "an avid owner and user of guns," and urging a 90-day jail sentence for possession of any firearm. "I don't want a means ending the sport of hunting," he wrote, "but our first obligation must be to mankind and the perpetuation of society."

Mayor Joseph Alioto of San Francisco proclaimed the seven days beginning July 4 "America's Week," and asked all citizens to turn in their guns — with no questions asked. Last Friday, Alioto had urged a city gun control law "with teeth in it."

Not all the action came from adults.

A group of junior high and

high school students in University City, Mo., formed an organization called Students for a Clean Committee to work to eliminate guns.

"The adults don't do anything," said Sharon Lieberman, a member of the group. "They mourn and say they'll do something and then they seem to forget."

Circuit Judge Max Raskin of Milwaukee urged passage of a law under which firearms would have to be drawn out of a local arsenal, somewhat like books out of a library. Raskin said the law would sign out the weapon, state his purpose for needing it and sign it back in after a specified time.

Cambodia Releases 2 U.S. Soldiers

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP) — Prince Norodom Sihanouk today released two American soldiers as a gesture of homage to the late Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.

The two soldiers, Jerry A. Wester and Ronald L. Lehmann, were held by the Cambodian police. Company, were aboard a Philippine tug that strayed into Cambodian waters in the Mekong Delta.

They were turned over to the Australian Embassy, which has represented the United States in Cambodia since Sihanouk broke relations with Washington.

In a message of sympathy to Sen. Kennedy's widow, Cambodia's ruling prince said: "The Cambodian people and I want to express our admiration and our respect to the Kennedy family for their sacrifices for the cause of peace, justice and liberty for the oppressed must not be vain for the honor of the American people and the future of humanity."

Sihanouk's announcement made no mention of releasing the tug or its eight-man Philippine crew. Phnom Penh newspapers had reported they would be treated leniently and would be released.

The U.S. government had protested the detention of the men and said the tug intruded hastily into Cambodian waters due to a navigational error.

The Cambodian government rejected the protest, saying the boat passed a "clearly visible Cambodian order" on the river bank and ignored signals ordering it to turn back. Earlier the Cambodian government had offered to release the two men in exchange for two bulldozers. Washington made no reply to that offer.

Students At Belgrade Will Go To Classes

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — The Paris-based reformed student movement at Belgrade University agreed Sunday night to return to classes after President Tito promised them educational, political and economic reforms.

Representatives of the Communist party youth and student organizations joined with leaders of the student action committee in adopting a proposal to return to classes. They have given sufficient guarantees that the students' demands would be carried out.

In an effort to end the week-long students' strike, the 76-year-old president said students occupying the university had brought up questions that had bothered him.

"This time... I will wholeheartedly endeavor for solutions, and students must help me in this," he said. "If I am not able to settle these issues, then I should not remain in my post."

Tito acknowledged that the government and the ruling Communist party were responsible for much of the unrest among the 6,000 striking students.

He said the party will be purged and that efforts would be made to bring greater unity among party leaders. Those not attending those responsible for police attacks on the students last week would be punished.

Tito admonished the students, however, to go back to their studies while the government and party worked out a solution.

Savings Bonds Report Issued By Chairman

According to Patrick J. Hamilton, county chairman for the savings bonds program, savings bonds and savings notes are paying higher rates of interest.

The interest rate on freedom shares was increased from 4.74 per cent to 5 per cent on issues dated June 1 and thereafter.

Mr. Hamilton reports that a 10 per cent increase in the rate is available for single, over-the-counter purchase in combination with an E bond of the same or larger denomination. The restriction that freedom shares may be purchased only by individuals enrolled in a regular purchase plan has been dropped.

The decision rested heavily on the view that parochial schools serve a secular educational function as well as a religious educational function.

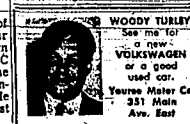

Oswald: "If West is alert, he will see that his queen of clubs isn't going to be worth anything if left in his hand. True, if East started with jack-eight-deuce of clubs, South could rise with dummy's ace of clubs and finesse successfully against the jack, but then South would have no way to get back to dummy for the last two clubs."

Jim: "If West does play the queen and South rises with dummy's ace, South will lose his contract. His correct play is to let the queen hold and let East's king make the next club trick, whereupon South will make one no-trump, but not the over-trick."

South has a normal opening no-trump, and in a duplicate game the chances are that even South's partner would open one no-trump and play the hand right there against a spade opening.
