No Donor Patient Available

## Sheep Heart Fails To Save Man's Life

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Surgeons failed today in what they described as an attempt to save a dying man by transferring the heart of a sheep into his body.

The operation was performed at St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital, where four human heart transplants took place in recent weeks. Two of those patients survived.

Officials would not identify the man, 47, who died in surgery today. They said his heart failed Wednesday morning and he was referred to the hospital for a possible transplant after being revived with difficulty.

"No donor patient was available," a St. Luke's statement said. "As a last resort the insertion of the heart of a 125-pound sheep was attempted at 11:15 a.m. in an effort to support circulation until a suitable donor might become available.

"The patient's condition was terminal during surgery, could not be reversed and other efforts were abandoned. The patient was pronounced dead at 1:02 a.m."

Spokesmen said a sheep was selected with tissue matching that of the patient. Hospital administrator Newell France de-

scribed it as "a rather bizarre situation."

It was the second known case in which a human being has received the heart of an animal.

Surgeons at the University of Mississippi Medical Center transferred the heart of a chimpanzee to a man on Jan. 24, 1964. It worked for an hour.

The recipient of the chimpanzee heart, described as dying before the surgery, was attempted never was identified.

## French Expel Foreigners Who Took Part In Rioting

PARIS (AP) — French authorities said today 43 foreigners who took part in rioting have been expelled from France in the past 24 hours. All told 73 foreigners have been sent out of France since the crisis began last month.

The new action was decided upon following a Cabinet meeting Wednesday when street demonstrations were banned and seven extremist groups were dissolved.

Eight Spaniards and eight Algerians were among the largest group of expelled. Eighteen Algerians and eight Spaniards were among the largest group run out of the country. No Americans were among them.

# LBJ Congratulates U.N. On Approval Of Weapon Treaty

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — President Johnson, in a surprise visit to the United Nations Assembly Wednesday on approving the treaty to check the spread of nuclear weapons and to de-escalate the nuclear arms race.

"Finally, in keeping with our obligations under the treaty, we shall, as a major nuclear power, promptly and vigorously pursue negotiations on effective measures to halt the nuclear arms race and to reduce existing nuclear arsenals."

Johnson entered the assembly hall shortly after the delegates approved the treaty 95-4 with 21 abstentions. Albania, Cuba, Panama and Zambia voted no.

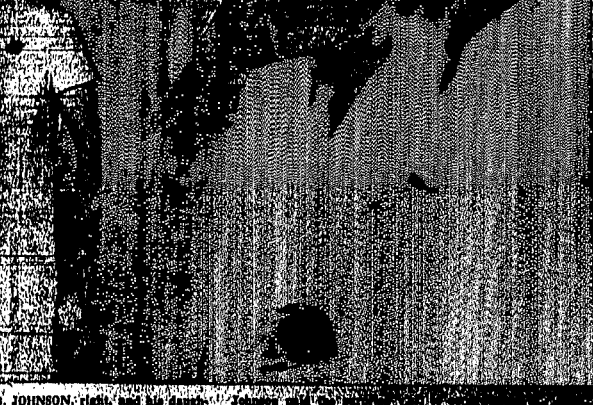

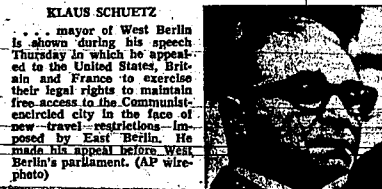

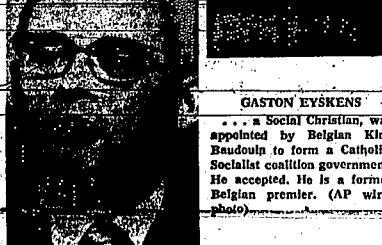

Improvement Reported In Water Inflow

SHOSHONE Magic Reservoir contained 138,000 acre feet of water Tuesday, compared to a full reservoir a year ago on that date. When full, the reservoir contains 191,500 acre feet. The reservoir has been dropping steadily at a rate of four inches a day. It held the same as of June 1. If the drop continues it could have been empty sometime in September but the additional water and weather conditions have changed the picture considerably, officials said.

East Germany Collecting Visa Fees

BERLIN (AP) - Communist East Germany began collecting \$1.25 visa fees today from West Germans traveling overland to Berlin. The United States, Britain and France denounced the travel restrictions. West Germans previously insisted on being issued West Berlin visas with their identity cards, but under the new regulations announced Tuesday they must pay a visa fee and will have to obtain passports by June 15. Unlike the visa procedure in many countries, the process at the border is handled by the West German Embassy in East Berlin. The East Germans also have imposed new taxes on goods shipped between West Germany and West Berlin.

Demands Of Inmates OK'd By Official

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) - The director of the U.S. Bureau of Prisons personally has agreed to demands by four armed inmates in the U.S. Penitentiary as the price for the safety of 21 hostages. At the concessions were made, Director Myrl Alexander told a four inmate conference Wednesday the four inmates would be freed "for any crimes for which they can be indicted." Alexander and warden Olin G. Blackwell agreed to transfer personally the prisoners-Ralph M. Lepiscoc-and-Fredrick Freeman Lester Jr.-to other penal institutions without loss of family visiting privileges. In response to another demand Alexander promised to have Justice Department officials review the severity of the 30-year sentence of Robert W. Gorman. Prison officials also agreed to permit the inmates' grievance committee to be permitted in the Atlanta Penitentiary to allow the press to make periodic inspection tours of the federal prison and to review the prison's food and dining-room facilities. "The objective was to bring out these hostages alive. We brought them out alive," Alexander said. Alexander and other prison officials refused to promise that the inmates holding the hostages would not be prosecuted after they gave themselves up.

# Jetliner Crash Claims Six At Calcutta

CALCUTTA, India (AP) — A Pan American World Airways Boeing 707 jetliner, flying through a monsoon rain, under-shot the runway at Calcutta's Dum Dum Airport today, caught fire and burned, killing six of the 63 persons aboard.

Fifty-six persons were reported injured, including several in serious condition. A spokesman for Pan American said five passengers among them a child and three women and a stewardess were killed. The survivors were 48 passengers and nine crew members.

Among the passengers was the Anglican bishop of Hong Kong, the Rev. Gilbert Baker, who was flying to London. The airline said he was not hurt.

There was no information on the nationality of any other passengers.

Twenty-five injured persons were reported in satisfactory condition in one nursing home, and more injured persons were taken to other medical establishments.

# 6,054 Acres Of Brush Sprayed In Camas County

FAIRFIELD — A test sarge brush spraying program is being carried out in Camas County, according to Russell Patc, manager of the local ASCS, and Dave Cronkovich of the Soil Conservation Service.

The contract calls for the spraying of 6,054 acres. Helicopters from Boise are being used to spray the 2-4-D Ester with a diesel base.

The project is sponsored by the Soil Conservation District with a 50 per cent cost share.

The actual spraying is being done for \$1 per acre.

The area being sprayed starts from Monument Gulch in the southwest corner of the county and goes east to the Jim Kneash property; then north on Willow Creek and west again to the Sheep Basin area. Nearly every drainage will be included in the project.

Most of my cases gout, like diabetes, is an inborn error of metabolism with heredity an important factor. Women rarely get it before the onset of the menopause...

What are the symptoms of gout? Gout is the same as gouty arthritis. When the uric acid level in the blood is high, sharp uric acid crystals precipitate in the joints, especially in the "great toe" and in the skin...

Is there any kind of fruit juice that doesn't contain uric acid? Does gout affect the heart or the blood pressure?

Fruit juices contain a variety of acids but not uric acid. Although the chief complication of gout is kidney damage, recent years have shown an increased incidence of high blood pressure, hardening of the arteries and coronary heart disease is higher in persons with gout than in the general population.

# Wallace Attacks Lawsuit

By DON MCKEE

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP) — George C. Wallace has charged that a new federal lawsuit against Alabama agencies is in effect an attempt to hinder his "third party" campaign for president.

"That's using the Justice Department for politics," Wallace told a cheering crowd at a Chattanooga rally Wednesday night.

Wallace, former governor of Alabama, said U.S. City, Gen. Ramsey Clark should resign because politics is behind the suit filed Wednesday, which charges eight Alabama state agencies with racial discrimination in hiring.

Wallace said Clark had allowed himself to be "traded" by militants and revolutionaries, referring to a confrontation between the attorney general and a spokesman for the Poor People's Campaign.

"Then," Wallace yelled, "he jumps on the good people of this country. He ought to resign tomorrow."

Wallace was closely guarded by Secret Service agents, state and local officers and personal bodyguards. A tight security lid was clamped on Municipal Auditorium for the rally attended by nearly 5,000. Helmeted policemen were on duty and three fire trucks with crews were posted around the building.

Wallace walked on stage as country musicians accompanied him strummed out "Dixie." His supporters screamed, stood in chairs, waved tamppan hats. Wallace saluted, stepping from behind his bullet-proof portable lectern as Secret Service men moved quickly to his side.

Police Commissioner James E. Turner said earlier that a threat on Wallace's life was taken to the police headquarters and resulted in the questioning and detention of two Negro youths. They were not charged or identified.

BOISE (AP) — Only 25,000 of Idaho's 500,000 registered vehicles have been inspected under the state law which went into effect this year, Harold Davis, supervisor of the inspection program, said Wednesday.

"At this rate, we can expect nothing but delays, confusion and some owners facing possible loss of use of vehicles at the end of the year," he said.

The law requires each registered vehicle be inspected by Dec. 31.

## Samuelson Speaks At 4-H Congress

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP) — Gov. Don Samuelson advised 4-H Club members today of the importance of family, and respect for law and order.

Samuelson, in remarks prepared for the annual 4-H Club congress in Moscow, told how he and his family built a home in the Governor's hometown, Sandpoint.

"We would not trade that home for the most luxurious palace in the world," he said. "It is ours and we literally built it together. That is where we will return after my job as governor is over."

Samuelson, reviewing 4-H guideposts of living, said the guidepost on becoming responsible citizens is the most important to him.

"Too many persons in this country accept the privilege and pleasure of living in this great republic without shouldering the responsibilities which are necessary to our way of life," he said.

"There is no place in our society for violence and disrespect for law and order. Those who follow such a course should be dealt with sternly."

## Idaho Demos Prepare For State Meeting

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Idaho Democrats, preparing for their state assembly Friday and Saturday in Idaho Falls, may find more interest in national presidential aspirants than in state-level politics.

Sen. Eugene McCarthy is scheduled to speak Friday morning. The Minnesota Democrat was in a visit to the states in Idaho and Montana this weekend.

U.S. Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, scheduled to deliver the keynote address Friday, and State Democratic Chairman E. T. Waters arrived in Idaho Falls Wednesday.

Appointment of assembly committee and reports by committee are scheduled Friday.

Nominations for candidates for congressional races are set for Saturday.

Many party officers also are to be elected Saturday. The incumbents, all seeking re-election, are unopposed.

## AEC Views Request To Route Bus

FORT HALL, Idaho (AP) — The Atomic Energy Commission is considering a request to route a commuter bus through the Fort Hall Indian Reservation.

The request was made Wednesday at a meeting on the reservation.

T. J. Herrick, Washington, D.C., director of the AEC's division of labor relations attended the meeting. Accompanying him were W. L. Clinks, manager of the Idaho operations of the AEC, and J. C. Carter, personnel representative from the Idaho Falls AEC office.

A bus for AEC employees at the National Reactor Testing Site runs between Pocatello and Birefoot. Clinks' cousin, member Keesley Edmo asked that the bus be rerouted through the Fort Hall Township, which is between the two communities.

## Radical Students Plan Campaign

BY GAYLORD SHAW

Leaders of the radical student group that disrupted college campuses across the country during the past year now are talking of spreading their gospel of revolution to America's working classes.

The objective, said one national officer of Students for a Democratic Society, is "an alliance between students and workers like in France."

Carl Davidson, SDS national secretary, said as the first step an unemployed number of SDS members are taking summer jobs in big-city factories and are moving into blue-collar neighborhoods.

"We will learn how the workers think and how they live," Davidson said. "Then we can organize."

SDS, which claims 35,000 members on more than 200 campuses, has made similar attempts at community organizing in the past—generally without success.

In 1965, it launched Economic Research and Action Projects (ERAP) in slum areas of 10 cities, but two years later dissolved the ERAP structure.

"Our rhetoric sometimes gets ahead of our programs," Davidson said.

The renewed talk of expanding off-campus follows two developments:

1. A year of unprecedented unrest on U.S. campuses, beginning with demonstrations against the Vietnam war and the military draft and ending with a paralyzing student strike at Columbia University.

# Humphrey Strategists Look For Way To Get Young Voters

By HARRY KELLY

WASHINGTON (AP) — Strategists for Hubert H. Humphrey are looking beyond Eugene J. McCarthy's challenge to how the vice president can convince voters—especially young ones—that he is not just part of the status quo.

"The pressure is off as far as the convention is concerned," said a Humphrey adviser, but he acknowledged concern over how Humphrey is regarded, especially by young voters.

But McCarthy, resuming his campaign against Humphrey Wednesday for the Democratic presidential nomination, said Wednesday he doubts the accuracy of tabulations indicating a heavy Humphrey lead in delegates to the party's August convention.

On the Republican side, New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller toured the Watts area in Los Angeles Wednesday—eluding his heavy guard to wade into a throng of high school youngsters at one point—and commented on commitments like that in Vietnam.

"We cannot act as the world's policeman," Rockefeller said. "Before we commit even small forces, all the far-reaching implications of this act must be faced—as they were not faced in Vietnam. We must not find ourselves with a commitment looking for a justification."

Rockefeller also said he would accept immediately the debate, saying through a spokesman. Vice President spokesman it "would only serve Richard M. Nixon if one of the Democrats by promoting television networks offers time. Visible tendencies among Republican; regarded the GOP licks."

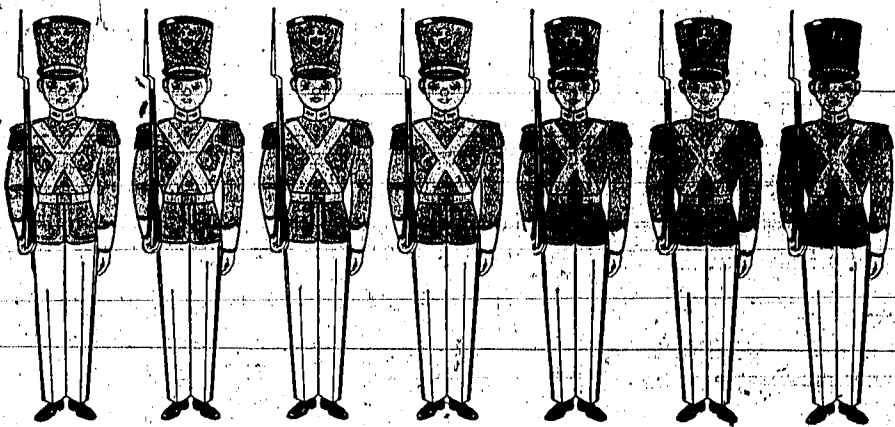

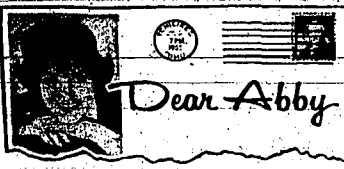

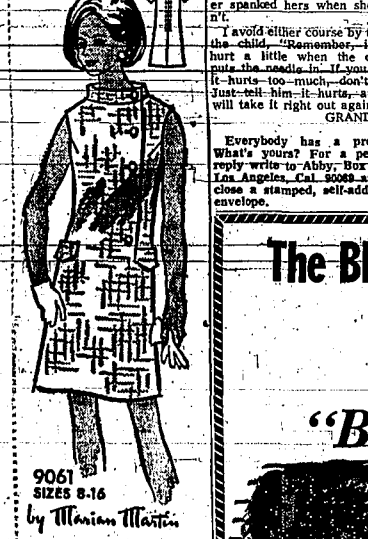

### Donations Promised For Rupert Agent

RUPERT — Mindoko County Commission Chairman Burt VanEvery Wednesday said that \$750 from private donations for a subsidy to the salaries of the Mindoko County agents should be in by July 1.

Mr. VanEvery said the funds are not pledged, but he is certain they will be in by that date. He said he is not certain who will be donating the funds.

The money will be transferred to the University of Idaho Extension Service and dispersed from there to the local agents. Mr. VanEvery explained, and would then not be written into the salaries provided by the county.

Last month, the commission promised, in a letter to the extension service in Boise, that the county would raise the additional money requested by the service for the agents' salaries. The commission had refused the

action earlier this year.

The letter stated that the additional \$500 per agent per year, requested by the service, would be raised by private donations. However, Mr. VanEvery explained, the donations expected by the first of the month will only take care of July through December. Money for next year's salaries would either be included in the county's budget or some other arrangements would be made.

Mindoko county agents are Vance Smith, Lamont Smith and home demonstration agent Renee Alder. The county has provided \$1,000 toward the salaries of each, with the balance coming from the extension service. In total, the county has been paying \$21,300 of the service's budget of \$43,316 in the county.

### Lincoln Board Settles County Agent Problem

SHOSHONE—The matter of the increase in salary for the 1968 Extension Service Budget within the county has been settled, at least for the time being.

County commissioners corrected the May County Commission meeting minutes to read: "That Lincoln County will continue to pay the increased University Extension Service Budget of 1968, which amounts to a total cost to Lincoln County, in addition to office expenses, travel and office help, of \$1,350.00 participation in the County Agent's salary for 1968, and \$750.00 toward the home extension agent's salary."

The board recognizes the controversy between the County and the University Extension Service Administration over the necessity and manner of increasing the Extension Service Budget, but also recognizes, both the value of the Extension Service program in Lincoln County and the full support of the local persons by the County Commissioners."

After the May meeting, members of the Lincoln County Taxpayers' Association met with commissioners, again requesting that the increase in wages be allowed or be placed upon the November election ballot for the people of the county to vote upon.

This matter was taken up with the county prosecutor, Howard E. Adams, who has informed the Board of Commissioners that the Idaho statute does not provide for presenting such a question at election time.

The final action to allow the amount, as stated in the corrected minutes, was then taken by the board and prepared for publication by clerk, Mrs. Luella L. Kinsey.

The report of Justice of the Peace C. W. Gwin for the past month was accepted in amount of \$799 collected in fines and fees.

The resignation of Mrs. Kenneth Kleas as election judge for Shoshone precinct number one was accepted and Mrs. Burton Thorne was named in her place.

Mrs. Kinsey explained that the Richfield Grange had sent a letter signed by members and by Glen Ross to the Commissioners meeting stating appreciation for the work of the county extension agent and requesting the increase in budget for that department be allowed.

Fred Kohl, district extension agent, also met with the commissioners to answer questions concerning their final decision in the matter.

### Death Penalty Ruling From Court Awaited

WASHINGTON (AP) — As the Supreme Court pushes toward adjournment, probably on Monday, a 28-year-old Negro waits on death row at Alabama's Kilby Penitentiary.

Edward Boykin Jr. is scheduled for execution June 28. The crime for which he was sentenced to die is armed robbery. Boykin was tried in September 1966 for the robbery of five Mobile, Ala., stores. He pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to death five times, once for each of the robberies.

His petition to the Supreme Court, filed by Mobile lawyer E. Graham Gibbons, said no one was killed or severely injured in the series of holdups. In one of the robberies, a grocery chain store's built-in ratchet fell off the ceiling and struck a girl in the leg.

In Alabama, the trial jury can impose any penalty for armed robbery from 10 years in prison to death.

Boykin's appeal contends, as so many appeals do, that the death penalty is unconstitutional, that it violates the Eighth Amendment's prohibition of "cruel and unusual punishment."

On June 3 the Supreme Court ruled the death penalty may not be imposed or recommended by a jury from which all opponents of capital punishment have been automatically excluded.

Some observers believe this points the way toward the eventual outlawing of the death penalty. For now, though, capital punishment is very much alive in 41 states.

Gibbons has filed with the Alabama Supreme Court a request for a stay of execution. If that appeal should be denied the next move would be to appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

If there is no action on the case by the U.S. Supreme Court before it adjourns for the summer, a Supreme Court justice could issue the stay of execution needed to bring the court's return to the bench Oct. 7.

### Court Sets Hearing On Wallace Case

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court has scheduled a June 18 hearing on an appeal aimed at placing the name of George Wallace on the November ballot.

District Court Judge Alfred Hagan of Boise has held that third-party candidates should be able to get on the ballot, but Hagan said he would not set up special procedures to get Wallace on the ballot this fall.

Hagan's ruling came after deadlines for political parties in Idaho to hold preliminary meetings in time for this year's election.

Theron Roberts, a Boise attorney handling the case for Wallace, contends the district court should get up special procedures to allow Wallace to get on the November ballot.

### Base Planned

NEW YORK (AP) — A \$37.5-million maintenance base to be constructed at John F. Kennedy International Airport in the 1970s has been announced by Natch E. Hagley, president of Pan American World Airways. The base will be an overhaul center for jumbo passenger jets now being developed, Hagley said.

# Kennedy Memorial Vote Set By Delegates

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Some members of California's Democratic National Convention delegation favor a first ballot memorial vote for the assassinated Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.

That's one finding of an Associated Press poll which also uncovered little open support among the delegates for either of the two surviving presidential candidates, Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota and Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy.

The survey reached 113 persons, about two-thirds of the 172

members. The rest were unavailable.

A course is expected to be decided on Saturday when the delegation gathers in Los Angeles, where Kennedy was fatally shot last week after capturing the California primary and its prize of the second largest bloc of convention votes.

Several members said they will propose a unanimous first ballot vote for the late senator. Forty-one persons said they either support the idea or are sympathetic to it.

Virtually all the others contacted said they didn't know what direction might be taken on the initial ballot.

State Sen. Alan Short said he will "offer the idea" that the chairman of the delegation, Assembly Speaker Jesse M. Unruh, be a favorite son presidential nominee to bind the group together and maximize its influence.

Earlier in the week, Unruh

told newsmen he wants to keep emphasizing their intention to the delegation united and spurn Humphrey at all costs.

Thirteen said they favor or are leaning toward McCarthy, while 11 favored Humphrey at the top of the list. Two said they favored Kennedy.

# National Rifle Group Questions Legality Of Move

 WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Rifle Association has questioned the legality of a Post Office Department move to curb the traffic in mail order guns.  
 But if past practice holds and the early reaction of those who deal with weapons is any indication, it appears likely that it will be business as usual for the gun mail order houses until—arguably—less than a year after Congress controls.  
 Postmaster General W. Marvin Watson announced new postal rules Wednesday under which packages containing guns will not be accepted for mailing unless clearly labeled "Firearms."  
 Further, he said, delivery of firearms will be held up until the chief law enforcement officer of the community to which the package is addressed is notified.  
 Watson also announced sawed-off shotguns and short-barreled rifles will be banned from the mails under "concealed weapons" regulations unless addressed to authorized law enforcement or military personnel.  
 "I don't think this will solve the problem," said Harold G. Denzwaiz, a prominent New Mexico sporting goods executive. "I think people who commit crimes steal guns."  
 A postal department spokesman said Watson's ban, announced in a National Press Club speech and intended to go into effect immediately, will apply to guns "26 inches in length or which have the characteristics of a concealed weapon."  
 Pistols were not included because they have been banned from the mails for years, the spokesman said.  
 Harold W. Glassen, president of the NRA, told a news conference later that he questioned whether Watson had the authority to hold up mail delivery of guns, particularly to states that have no laws restricting the purchase of firearms. Most states don't.  
 "That can be tested in the courts. Let's see," said the department spokesman.  
 Watson also urged private express companies to follow the department's lead.  
 Such firms are free to deliver pistols now. But they would be restricted from selling handguns across state lines under a stricter measure Wednesday.

# Poor People Try To Get Protests Back On Target

WASHINGTON (AP) — In their first demonstration in more than a week, Poor People's Campaign leaders attempted to be trying Wednesday to get their sometimes wandering protests back on target.

About 350 persons, buoyed by pep talks, marched on the Department of Agriculture to begin a round-the-clock vigil protesting hunger in America.

Discipline wasn't perfect. Park police said they arrested two youths who broke away from the march and tried to haul down an American flag near the Washington Monument. But there were many indica-

tions of the sharper focus the Rev. Ralph David Abernathy, campaign leader, said he would try to work into demonstrations. Speeches were few, and stuck closely to the point at issue.

As Abernathy complained that the response Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman has made have been "gratifyingly inadequate to meet the hunger crisis," the Interior Department issued a permit for the June 19 mass rally here in support of the campaign.

Sterling Tucker, named director of the march and rally just four days ago, told reporters a realistic goal for participants would be something under 100,000.

Although a list of speakers has not yet been decided, he said, Mrs. Martin Luther King

Jr., widow of the slain civil rights leader who conceived the Poor People's Campaign, will probably be among them.

A group of about 100 women, all residents of Washington, D.C., had Capitol police worried for a bit when they left the march around the Agriculture Department to stage their own from wandering off on their own, as tourists may do.

Police had to separate them into three groups to comply with a law forbidding mass demonstrations on the Capitol grounds, and they prevented individuals

## Player Finds Touch With Putter, Joins Casper As Top U.S. Open Contender

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — South Africa's Gary Player threw down the gauntlet to favorite Bill Casper while the stock of Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer dipped Wednesday on the eve of the 68th U.S. Open golf championship.

"I think I can win it," said Player, the calculating little internationalist from Johannesburg, South Africa, who feeds on bananas, raisins and sub-70 rounds.

"I've rebounded that putting touch that deserted me in the Masters."

"It's a Gary's kind of course — a mine, too," acknowledged Casper, after he and Player had teamed for a nine-hole final

tune-up over the relatively short but exacting Oak Hill Country Club course.

"This is not a course that can be overpowered. You have to think and outsmart it. Ben Hogan would do great here. So should Player."

The 36-year-old Casper, winner of four tournaments and nearly \$125,000 so far this year, has been made a firm 6-1 favorite in the four-day tournament, starting at 7:30 a.m. EDT Thursday.

The 150-man field—132 of the world's top pros and 12 amateurs—will play eight and nine-minute intervals.

Wednesday's final practice was interrupted shortly after noon by a flash downpour. But the forecast for Thursday and the weekend is for fair weather and seasonal temperatures.

Player, 35, who has won every major professional crown and captured the Open in 1965 at St. Louis, moved into the No. 2 favorite's spot on the strength of two brilliant sub-par rounds in practice.

Most high mountain summits still are closed by snow, including Dollarhide, Vanity Summit to Seafoam and the road to Goose Lake. However, Profile Summit from Yellow Pine to Big Creek and roads to Boulder and Loon Lakes are open.

—Green River—throughout Magic Valley region curtailed fishing. Streams have been high and slightly muddy. Dollarhide and Vanity Summits are still closed. South Hills roads are open—except into Lake-Cleveland.

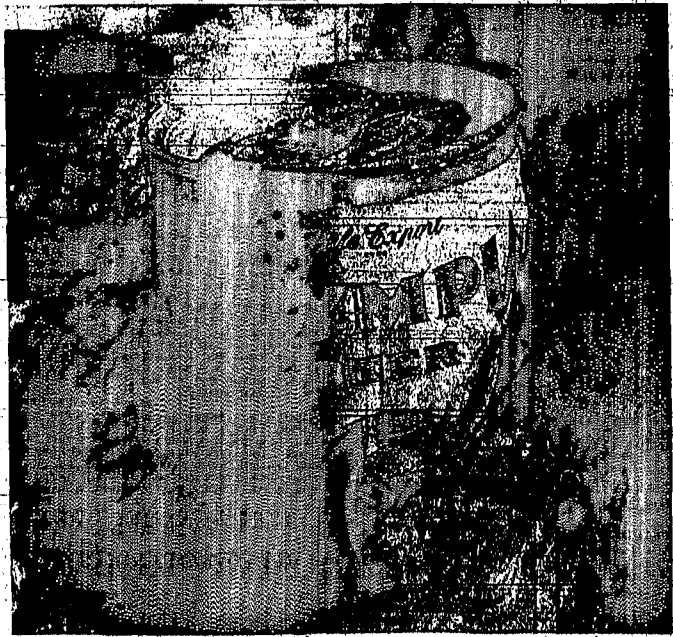

**Nixon Won't Debate With Rockefeller**

NEW YORK (AP) — Richard M. Nixon has rejected a challenge from New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller to meet in a nationally televised debate. Nixon, generally considered the frontrunner for the Republican presidential nomination, said Wednesday such a debate "would only serve the Democrats by promoting divisive tendencies among Republicans."

The former vice president made the comment through a spokesman after flying back from an unannounced vacation in the Bahamas. He was under rigid security guard.

Rockefeller had issued the challenge earlier in the day during a campaign appearance in Los Angeles. He said he would accept immediately if one of the networks offered time for a debate with Nixon.

Nixon aides said the former vice president's disinclination to debate was not related to his televised confrontation with the late President John F. Kennedy in 1960.

Their debate is widely regarded as one of the chief reasons Nixon lost that election. Nixon, who has made no public appearance since the assassination of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, spent three days at an isolated fishing camp in the Bahamas, resting and working.

His next scheduled appearance is Friday when he will give the commencement address at his daughter Tricia's graduation from Finch College here.

**Idaho GOP Delegation Likely Will Favor Nixon**

By JAMES RAGSDALE  
 COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP) — Idaho's delegation to the National Republican Convention likely will favor former Vice President Richard M. Nixon according to a ranking Gem State Republican.

The question of who will capture the votes of Idaho's delegates—who likely will be uncommitted officially to any candidate—was the talk of this late-side town Thursday as Republicans arrived for Friday's start of the State Republican Assembly.

Ranking Republicans were to hold hearings Thursday afternoon into Idaho problem areas, which eventually will become planks in the state GOP platform.

State Rep. Harold Snow of Moscow, chairman of the important Platform Committee, said he believed Nixon would capture most of Idaho's delegates to the national convention. "It looks as if the Nixon forces

are going to be predominant," Snow said.

The Gem State delegates favored the then Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater for president four years ago.

Snow noted that Nixon's strength is showing up much stronger in pre-convention days than for either Gov. Nelson Rockefeller of New York or Ronald Reagan of California.

"Nixon seems to have more strength than either of the other two candidates," Snow said, adding that he does not anticipate a move during the assembly to "tie the national delegates down."

But he cautioned that during an assembly "things can change."

Snow also said his Platform Committee also would consider Thursday whether to extend planned platform categories to include a plank on law enforcement.

Referring to current discussions on law, enforcement and

gun control, Snow said, "It is of great import to all of us, especially in light of recent events."

The Platform Committee currently divided into five subcommittees — did not include a stand on either law enforcement
