Unable to place the child in a complete prone position because of limited room in the automobile, they dropped his back over Janet's arm to clear the air passages.

"The first time she breathed into the child's mouth, Janet said, she did not get a reaction. But the second time, I could feel his chest rise and fall, and I knew I was getting air to him and could adjust my breathing to his," she added.

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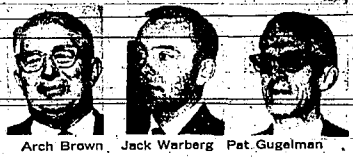

To a lot of people the name Pedro Gonzalez Gonzalez doesn't mean a thing. But show them a picture of the lovable Mexican's face, and they say, "Oh, yeah! I know him. He's great!"

Pedro Gonzalez Gonzalez stopped in Twin Falls Friday on his way to a performance at the Jackpot. His destination was when asked why he came to this area was, "My good friend Rex Allen said I would meet real

Pedro Gonzalez Gonzalez is an unusual actor. Nearly everyone knows his face. It has been seen on a hundred television shows and movies. Television commercials everyday show Pedro's classic face.

And Pedro is candid about it. "I like television best. It means more money. They keep paying you," says Pedro.

"For one national television commercial, (specifically the one for an ice maker in a refrigerator) he gets \$50 every time it shows. And they keep showing it."

Pedro was born in Texas and worked for a while at WOAI Radio in San Antonio for \$345 a week. Rex Allen, now Pedro's good and closest friend, came to town, and Pedro did a small thing in the show.

Rex Allen liked it and told Groucho Marks about Pedro and soon Pedro received a check for \$300 in the mail from Groucho Marks asking him to be on the program "You Bet Your Life."

In Pedro's words, "The first thing I did was to put \$200 in the bank and catch a bus. I even remember the date; it was Jan. 6, 1947."

And from that day on Pedro Gonzalez Gonzalez has been one of the most consistently high paid and sought after actors in Hollywood.

Currently he is under contract to John Wayne. Wayne saw him in a movie and hired him then. He started in "The High and the Mighty" with John Wayne, and at that time his contract stated he would get \$350 a week from Wayne, 52 weeks a year, with a \$150 raise each year, and paid by Wayne whether he works or not.

He has been with Wayne for 14 years.

He is a small man who is very proud of his family and his profession.

He remembers Rex Allen saying, "Pedro, you are so ugly, how can you have such beautiful daughters?" And Pedro goes on to point out that his daughter Yolanda starred on the recent "Hot Shots" special, that her other children are his pride and joy.

"I have two married daughters, and my boy is in the Navy; he is 20 years old and is going to Vietnam next week," says Pedro with considerable pride and concern for his children.

"My wife and I were married when I was 17 and she was 15. She is Leandra, and she is only 4 feet tall. Sometimes I look up at John Wayne all day and down at Leandra all evening and my neck hurts. But my wife, Leandra, she is always 7 feet tall to me."

Mules Take Poor People To Atlanta

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — The Poor People's march train reached Atlanta safely Saturday, escaping a threat of arrest from Gov. Lester Maddox, but coming under immediate fire from the American Humane Society.

"We're in sympathy with what they're trying to do. But we're not in sympathy with using animals in an inhumane way to attract attention," declared Ralph Roberts, executive director of the Atlanta Humane Society, an AHS affiliate.

Roberts said he checked with national AHS officials before complaining about the treatment of the mules.

Twenty-seven mules brought 15 sagging wagons and more than 100 people into Atlanta on the last leg of a fatiguing 580-mile trek across Mississippi, Alabama and Georgia.

Both mules and people looked weary as they left the busy interstate highway.

Maddox had threatened to arrest the mule train highway after it was on the highway after

7 a.m. Saturday—a deadline the governor chose to ignore when the group was still on the highway more than an hour later.

Friday, 67 persons in the caravan—part of the Poor People's campaign—were arrested near Douglasville, Ga., and later released on charges of violating a law banning pedestrians and motorized vehicles from the highway.

The battered condition of many of the mules was one of the reasons it took nearly six hours to cover the 25 miles from Douglasville to Atlanta.

The mule train is headed for Resurrection City in Washington, where several thousand persons already have gathered to demonstrate for more government assistance for the poor.

The caravan is slated to continue on its way Monday or Tuesday.

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Favorite Sons Hold Key To Parties' Nominations

WASHINGTON (AP) — With more than two-thirds of the national convention delegates picked in both parties' favorite sons hold the key to both Republican and Democratic presidential nominations.

With the possible exception of Republican Gov. Ronald Reagan in California, nobody expects any of the nominal candidates to hold out past the point where they can see where the political winds are blowing.

But that could come only after the opening of the nominating caucuses, the Republicans in Miami Beach in seven weeks and the Democrats in Chicago three weeks later.

Add in those delegates who have maintained maneuvering positions, remaining uncommitted until they see how the majority becomes a trip through a maze.

The Democratic situation is particularly confused by the shift of more than 300 votes to the uncommitted column while the delegates who had backed

Much the same situation prevails on the Democratic side. The big former Kennedy group is in California where the New York senator won 174 in a primary. Of that number 151 still stand uncommitted or unpledged.

Another large unit in that category is in Indiana where Kennedy won another primary but McCarthy ran third behind favorite son Gov. Roger D. Branigan. McCarthy forces are battling a move to give the whole package of 63 votes to Humphrey.

Humphrey has picked up 23 of Michigan's 98 convention-assigned votes to only 3 on record for McCarthy, with the rest unrecorded.

The precise figures in all cases are from a detailed count as of Thursday night. Polling continued in various areas but without major effect on relative positions. For instance another 14 Humphrey backers showed up in Michigan.

McCarthy's 38 uncommitted are expected to follow Chicago Mayor Richard Daley and he has not spoken.

The Democratic favorite sons are former Gov. George Wallace who is running as a third-party candidate outside his own state but has 15 as a Democrat in Alabama.

Smathers with 57 in Florida; Sen. Edmund Muskie 27 in Maine; Gov. Richard J. Hughes

of New Jersey; Gov. Dan K. Moore in North Carolina; Sen. Stephen M. Young 111 in Ohio; Gov. Robert E. McNair 28 in South Carolina; and Gov. John Connally 10 in Texas.

Humphrey is rated good to pick-up most of the vote when Connally turns Texas loose. Smathers's forces in Florida are administered by people and Humphrey counts on a pick-up there.

The California poll came up with two delegates whose choice boiled-up discussion.

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2,500 Guardsmen End Summer Training

Johnny's Come Marching Home Again

BOISE (Special) — More than 2,500 Idaho and Nevada National Guardsmen are home today after spending two-weeks training at Gowen Field near here. The Guardsmen left Gowen Field early yesterday in truck convoys for home towns scattered throughout both states.

Most of the Guardsmen are members of the 116th Armored Cavalry Regiment, with headquarters at Twin Falls. It is composed of the 1st Squadron headquartered at Caldwell with units at Homedale, Boise, Gooding, Bully, Nampa, Weiser, Payette and Emmett; the 2nd Squadron with headquarters at Pocatello and units at Jerome, Halley, Burley, Twin Falls, Rupert and Eresion; and the 3rd Squadron from Nevada.

Other Guardsmen are members of supporting units including Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, Boise; the 116th Heavy Equipment Maintenance Company, Boise; the 25th Army Band, Caldwell; the 159th Engineer Detachment, Lewiston; and the 838th Engineer Platoon, Moscow.

During the two weeks spent at Gowen Field, the Guardsmen received advanced specialist training in a wide range of subjects. The training was designed to give them practical experience in their jobs. Many were spending their first field training period in their assignments.

Col. Theodore R. Pence, 116th Cavalry Regiment commander, explained that the regiment was reorganized in January and that although the guardsmen had received training on weekend assemblies at hometown armories, this was the first chance for them actually to operate and fire much of the equipment.

During the training period, Guardsmen in the regiment spent seven days in desert training areas 20 miles south of the field, "they bivouacked in the field, mostly in two-man pup tents. Well-equipped mess trucks served hot meals from the standard army menu used worldwide. Rations were drawn daily at Gowen Field including such items as ice, fresh vegetables, milk and ice cream, and trucked south to the training areas.

Write in the field, the Guardsmen were inspected by Maj. Gen. John F. Franklin Jr., deputy commander of the Sixth U.S. Army from Presidio, San Francisco. He spent a day watching rifle squad and scout section training in addition to observing tank and mortar firing.

Last Sunday, the Guardsmen paused momentarily in training to pay tribute to Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, as memorial services were conducted by regimental chaplains.

Late that day, the dusty convoys of tanks and towed howitzers returned to the base where permanent barracks, comfortable cots, and hot showers greeted the also-dusty troops. But their work was not over. Awaiting was three days of work — cleaning and servicing their weapons, vehicles and tanks.

The Guardsmen found, for example, that regulations required a 50 cal. machine gun to be cleaned three times on successive days after firing. In addition, tanks, guns, and armored personnel vehicles which are stored year-around at Gowen Field had to be spotless before turn-in.

On Thursday, the Guardsmen

Four Office Days Left To Tax Deadline

Only four days remain until the deadline for the last installment of 1967 real property taxes, according to Ruth K. Jones, Twin Falls County treasurer.

Mrs. Jones said there is \$1,172,883.51 left to collect by Monday. Of this amount the public utilities payments totaling over \$465,000 are presumed to be in the mail, she said.

According to Idaho law, payments offered after the deadline cannot be accepted until July 22, and are subject to a two per cent penalty and eight per cent interest added to the tax bill.

In order to collect the balance due, the treasurer reports her department will need to collect about \$189,000 each day, to meet the deadline set by Idaho law.

The treasurer's office will be open from 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. and payments made by mail must bear a postmark or not later than June 20.

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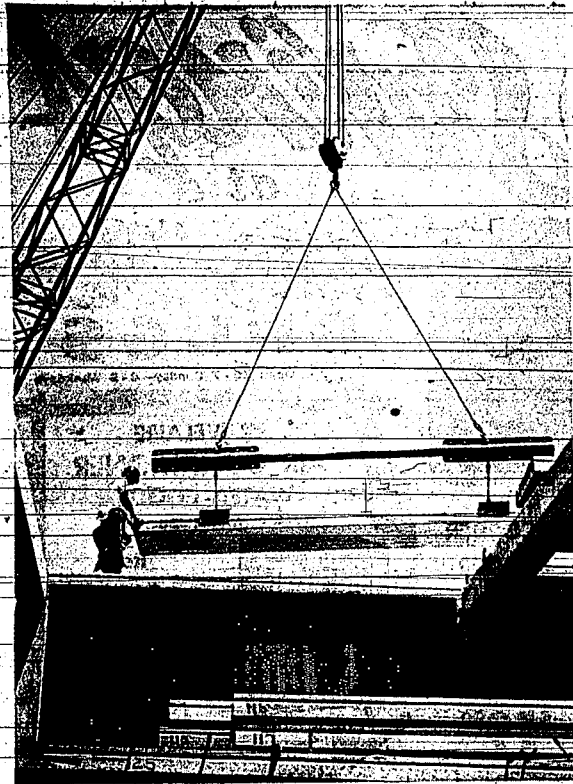

Work On New Building For Clinic Hospital On Schedule

Work on the new Twin Falls Clinic Hospital building is progressing well within schedule, Louis B. Meigs, business manager of the hospital, reported Friday.

The new building is expected to be ready for acceptance by the local hospital staff by Oct. 4. Construction by the Skyline Construction Co., Salt Lake City, began March 20.

It will be entirely of steel and concrete. Work at present consists of placing pre-stressed concrete slabs, designed especially for the building and poured by Ready Pour Concrete Co., at Idaho Falls into place to form flooring in the building. The slabs are being lifted into place by a large crane and will be covered by a thin coat of concrete.

The next step, Mr. Meigs said, will be to fill in the sidewalks and other areas with brick. Plans for the building, drawn by architect Hammit Shaw, Boise, call for open areas on what would otherwise be the first floor of the building. This will provide a large carpet-type area for the staff members to use as parking.

The old John Hayes home, north of the clinic on Seventh Avenue East, has been removed and the property will be converted to parking area in the near future. Mr. Meigs said another home on Seventh Avenue will be moved for parking space when needed.

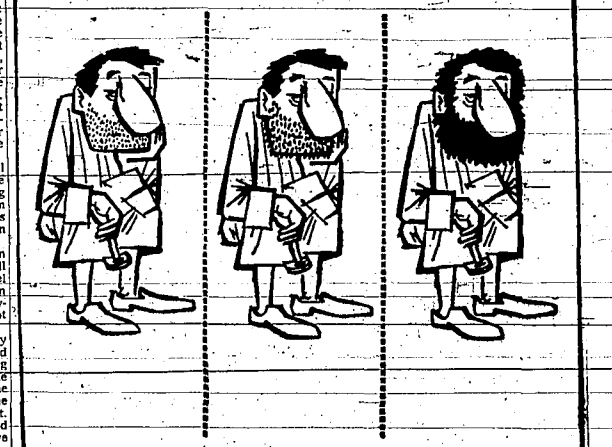

Cowgirls Train For Contests

How to be a rodeo queen in six easy lessons—or would you believe two days of rigorous training? This was the program offered in Twin Falls last weekend for some 32 young cowgirls, many of whom have competed in contests, some who have already won titles and some who have had no previous experience.

Sponsoring the two-day clinic was the Idaho Rodeo Queen Association, with Karen Bumgartner Jones, Twin Falls, and Carol Quallman, Caldwell, co-chairmen. This was the second annual clinic and covered a two-day period rather than the one-day program the association staged last year in Boise.

Saturday while the rains poured down, the girls worked indoors with experts in personality, appearance, clothing and hair styling.

They were told by Irene Ammons Link, a former Miss Idaho, to "be natural, be yourself, but be your better self."

How to enhance good features and strengthen weaker points by the use of make-up was explained to the 32 girls by Mrs. Letha Harder, beauty consultant of the Idaho Department Store.

Mrs. Helen Henderson, an official of the Miss Twin Falls Pageants for a number of years, discussed personality improvement and offered some fine pointers on what judges look for in the ideal "queen."

Jim Davis, Jerome, hair stylist, demonstrated how the girls can use wiglets to improve their hair styles after they remove the tight fitting western hat, or how a wiglet can be worn under the hat and still give a good hair style when the hat is removed.

A full to give the girl the long hair look that is most suited to western hats, or even the use of a full wig that can be worn in the arena or at dress appearances, were also demonstrated.

Members of the sponsoring committee decided to offer a trophy, donated by Mrs. Gary Obenaus, formerly Diane Kersey, Jerome, for the girl who, in the opinions of judges and clinic committee members, benefited the most from the program.

This was awarded Sunday afternoon at Frontier Field to Marcy Valentine who traveled from Crane, Ore., to attend the clinic. Finishing in a close second, for the honors was Neida Kulhanek, Burley, who wants to be a rodeo queen despite a strong allergy in horses and any type of hair including her own. "Go to some of the big shows such as the Cow Palace events," was the advice of Walter McCallie, "and learn by watching the experts perform."

Mr. McCallie, local horse trainer and riding instructor, advised the girls to watch the experts and use this as a guide to their own competition. Mr. McCallie also recommended to most of the girls that they use a snaffle bit for better side control of their horses when riding a pattern, doing other maneuvers, or just keeping their horse well under control in the arena.

Sunday morning girls began their horsemanship work—something of a sham school on horseback—with a church service conducted by Bud Godby, Gooding.

This was followed by girls working in small groups, with pointers offered on their riding, seat and general horse training, all under the direction of Mr. McCallie. Just a few of the pointers given by the experts included the advice from Miss Vasser that girls in general wear their trousers too short.

"If you tailor your own western suits or have them made to order," she said, "make two pairs of pants, a slightly shorter pair for dress appearances and a longer pair for riding. The extra pair for dress also will assure the contestant a better appearance as the trousers seat will not be shiny from riding."

At any rate, she said, the trousers should always cover most of the boot.

Miss Willhite warned girls to stop and think during their interviews. "If you didn't hear all of the question or don't understand it, don't be afraid to ask it be repeated," she said.

"Then stop for a moment and think about a sensible answer. Sometimes the judges receive a good answer that has no relationship to the question asked, or the girls are in such a hurry to answer they begin talking without saying anything intelligent."

Comments solicited from the girls at the close of Sunday's activities were without exception, favorable. All agreed they had gained

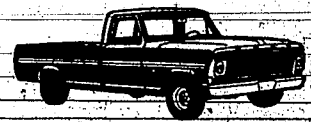


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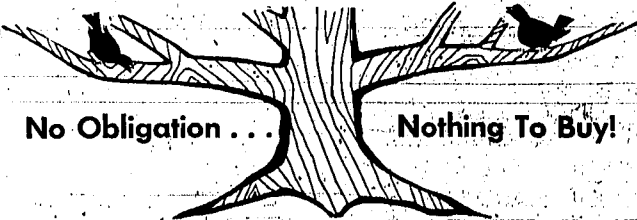
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Messman Grabs Win In Magic Valley Trapshoot

The new rule aimed at preventing amateurs from selling their winnings to friends. For instance, a lot of amateurs make pocket money by winning a tournament, then finding a friend who needs something. Say you win a set of golf clubs. You don't need them. But a friend is interested in buying a set. He tells you what he wants and you sell that particular set at payoff time. The retail value is \$150. You sell it to your friend for \$100 and both come out with a profit. The common practice is taking all winnings in golf balls and selling them. Of course, it is illegal under-golf rules and those doing this should be ineligible to compete in any tournament.

The previous rule allowed the highest bidder you could win a set of woods or irons. Under the new \$100 rule there's no way. But it still doesn't preclude the undercover resale of golf balls, steel singles, irons, etc. and those working the mid black market certainly aren't cramped in the least.

The effect of the USGA rule has been to cause heretofore legal amateurs, individuals, and groups, to come up with shady ideas to circumvent the new rule or propose to flagrantly flout it. Such thinking, naturally, puts the entire concept of the game under tremendous pressure.

Say a Magic Valley Association sponsors a tournament and rewords the payoff plan to circumvent the rule. They do so under the impression that the rule is bad, but nonetheless it is a rule. Of course, other associations and many individuals, amateur and professional, will immediately know of the flouting. They either can become accomplices after the fact by failing to report it to the USGA or they can become flunk by rating.

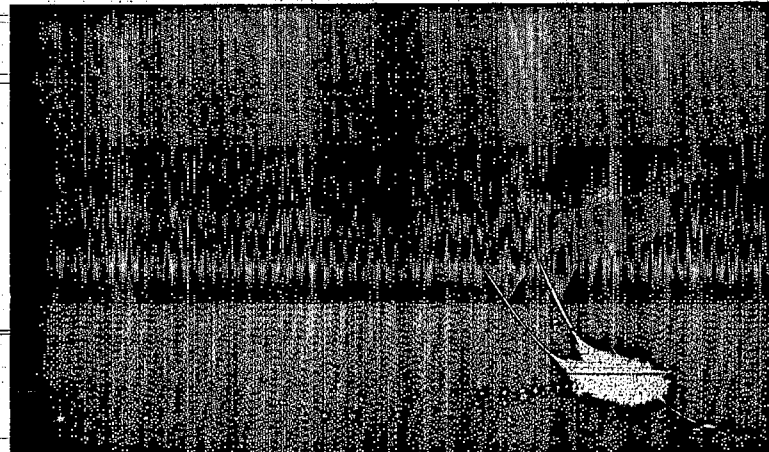
Flight Into Darkness Occurs Nightly At Airport



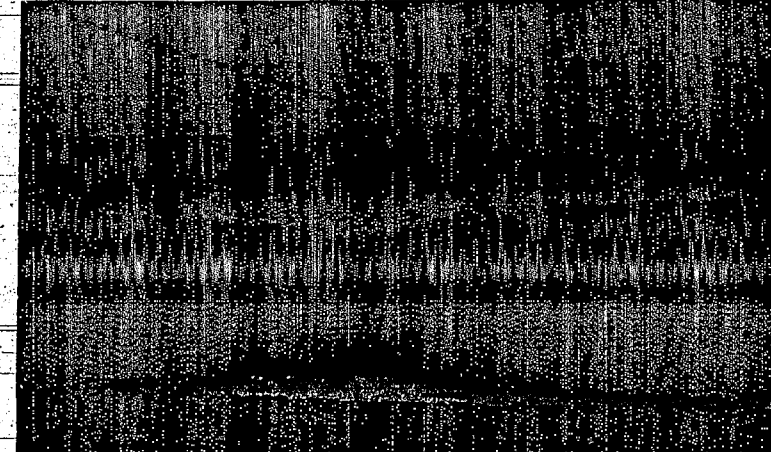

Ernie was at one time deputy sheriff for Twin Falls County in 1940-1951, and that is the only period in his life when he wasn't actually cutting hair on a full-time basis.

He now says that most of his trade in Filer is from farmers who come in somewhat regularly to get their hair cut.

"There simply isn't any town talk to speak of . . . or at least there isn't much."

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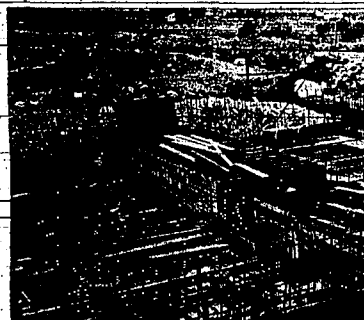

years. Coho, however, were first taken in Idaho reservoirs in the spring of 1967. An angler now finds himself in a position to take both of these salmon species along with rainbow trout, from the same body of water. 'Lucky Peak, Arrowrock, and Anderson Ranch reservoirs, for example, each contain all three species. There are other Idaho waters which contain two, and sometimes all three, of these popular sport fish.

Generally, fish in these waters are not as big as those encountered the drastic, man-made changes that threaten anadromous fish in the Columbia River system. Numerous successes have been made introducing and bolstering coho salmon runs in coastal streams with artificial rearing facilities. Now there are surpluses of coho salmon eggs which Idaho can use as little cost. The purpose of planting coho in Idaho waters has been to supplement the normal stocking program for reservoirs in an attempt to improve fishing in these rather unproductive waters. Water Project Nears Long Awaited Completion Date

Within the very near future Twin Falls city officials say Blue Lakes spring water will be flowing through the city's water distribution system. This is the completion of a \$3-million water improvement program for Twin Falls and giving the city a supply of pure spring water to replace present contaminated Snake River water that supplies city users. Work on the project began with completion of studies in 1965. The first phase involved improving pipelines to improve pressure throughout the city. Contracts were let in 1967 for work on the current phase of the system that has involved a \$1.5 million water treatment plant. A giant pipeline has climbed from the canyon floor north of the city to a booster station on Falls Avenue. One pumping station is completed in the canyon and the second is now ready for operation near the new \$-million gallon reservoir. Different lines are going into the tank construction at this time and it has already been filled with water. Within the next few days, officials hope to fill the new tank with Blue Lakes water, reports City Manager Herb Derrick.

Construction of the unique system involving the pumping operation and the reservoir built by means of a concrete super-structure and gunite spray has attracted attention from several surrounding states. It's completion will bring attention to assuring the city adequate supplies of good water for many years to come, eliminate the need for water treatment and highly chlorinated water that has made Twin Falls famous over a wide area. It will also mean the closing of the 50-year-old Twin Falls filter plant. At the same time, the new construction will mean the building of the filter plant facility could raise only \$350,000.

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Role Of Consumer Price Index In Our Society Is Explained By Specialist

NEW YORK — (NEA) — The did the men who fought over tariffs in 1887-88 realize they had fathered a collection of statistical data that would be used to sell a brand of milk or help a woman decide to quit her job. The studies of prices and living conditions in the United States in the late 19th century eventually grew in 1913 into the Consumer Price Index. Most persons still wrongly call it the cost-of-living index, which it is not, but got that label when used in World War I in a wage agreement "adjusting wages to the higher cost of living resulting from the war." It officially became the CPI after World War II and measures the changes in prices and goods bought for family living.

Since 1913 the CPI has been a bulwark in collective bargaining, in establishing rent and food controls in World War II. It relies heavily upon reports by Bureau of Labor Statistics comparison shoppers. These individuals shop from Orem, Utah, to Logansport, Ind., to Los Angeles and New York.

The prices they report for a 400-item "market basket" help indicate what urban wage earners pay for bread, milk, a blouse, rent, a house or a used car, each month and what the changing prices of these will mean to everyone next month.

next year, next decade. It cost more than \$3 million in fiscal 1967 to collect wholesale and retail prices, interpret them and try to explain why the Consumer Price Index exists and what it means to the man-in-the-street.

The milk promotion, for example, helps shed light on the CPI. Food shopped up at least 28 per cent of the drain on a wage earner's weekly take-home pay.

A daily in Queens, N.Y., printed a CPI extract on its milk containers of the costs of food products. The shrewd promotion highlighted the fact that milk was a small per cent of a family's food costs.

What does the lower cost of milk mean to a Frenchwoman who likes her wine? In the case of Michele, a Parisian hairdresser who married her American soldier during World War II and has lived here since the late '40s, the existence of such a price measure may help her decide whether she can quit her job and live on her husband's pay.

Her husband, she explains, drives a truck for a bottling firm. They have a car, a mortgage on a two-family house. Their \$60 was just dratted.

Possibly Michele can't quit yet. If Michele noted a recent newspaper report she might get a glimmer of why she should continue to work.

For example, in the New

York-New Jersey area, the CPI reached a high of 120.9 per cent in January — or a 20.9 per cent increase over the base year 1959 used as 100. Economists say it will continue to go up here and nationally.

What does this mean to her? Michele and her husband's pay checks are fatter now than ever before but she complains she has less. Sound familiar? In a sense there is more but less, an almost Pennsylvania Dutch comment on current pay checks.

The Consumer Price Index helps explain partially why this is so. For example, economists for the regional Bureau of Labor Statistics using the CPI reported that from April 1956 to April 1968 a factory worker's pay check in the New York area increased one-third. But the purchasing power or value of the dollar was up only 4 per cent. Why? Because prices increased 28 per cent during those years.

Bringing this down to take-home pay for Michele's husband, in 1959 the average pay check in the New York area was \$71, based on \$2 an hour. Last month at \$3 an hour, take-home pay was over \$100. Yet more dollars won't buy more than they did in 1956 — again based on prices of goods and services then.

For the weekly wage earner this price squeeze meant that in January, 1967, if Michele's husband earned, after taxes and

other deductions, \$93.70, the dollar value was the same as the \$86.92 he earned in 1957-59.

All is not absolutely bleak for Michele, her husband or wage earners generally. The CPI shows this. Our standard of living continues to rise. Luxuries — cars, color television, weekly visits to the hairdresser, country club membership — are now priced as necessities.

And these necessities make up the prices we pay for what we want to have. However, the gap between take-home pay and spiraling prices is closing rapidly. Anyone faced with such statistics can put this news to work. The first step may be to make shifts in the family budget, BLS regional economist Allan Gould explains.

Gould points out that the Consumer Price Index is more valuable to workers like Michele and

her husband because of the price squeeze.

Its purpose is to measure the effect of price changes on the working man and it helps measure what happens to the money he spends. As a day-to-day tool for Michele, for example, it is not that simple for her to use. But she can, Gould explains, note the monthly index report of whether food prices are up or down and shop around her area supermarkets for bargains.

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A PHYSICIAN TELLS:

How to Rate Your Doctor's

With professional evaluation still a long way off, here's a set of guidelines

MOST OF THE 25 million or so patients who will be hospitalized in the U.S. in any given year have their health and welfare protected in ways largely invisible to them.

They simply take it for granted that these safeguards exist. And exist they do; hospitals are under rigid supervision, both by the medical profession itself and the hospital commissions.

But what of the millions of other persons who are treated in that last outpost of total medical autonomy—the doctor's private office? Here the individual practitioner sets his own standards; no one looks over his shoulder or evaluates his performance. This is the crux of a growing medical controversy—what are your safeguards here?

Predictably, the quality of medicine tends to vary enormously from one office to another. And the average patient has no way of judging what kind of medical care he is getting except by using the unreliable guideposts of his own instincts and knowledge, the doctor's reputation, and the effect on his health.

Soon, however, things may be different. The Federal government, under Medicare and Medicaid, is paying the office-care and out-of-hospital bills for millions of people. Even private insurers are offering programs that will cover office care. All of them are beginning to express interest in what they are getting for their money.

Forward-looking medical men have come to an irrevocable conclusion on evaluation of office care: we'd better do it ourselves before they do it for us. But there are still problems.

For one thing, many doctors say it is an impossible task. Medicine is an art, not an exact science. Many unmeasurables and imponderables go into a doctor's diagnosis and program of treatment that do not lend themselves to precise scientific measurements and, in particular, to comparison with other patients' and other doctors.



There is some truth to this objection. It is certainly unrealistic to conclude that rules regulating hospital practice would also apply to office practice.

It's a pretty simple matter, for example, to review an appendectomy done at a hospital and decide whether good judgment was exercised in deciding to take the appendix out. Appendicitis displays relatively standard symptoms and physical findings. The tissue is examined by the pathologist and adjudged diseased or not, and the postoperative course is usually uncomplicated, lasting a week or less. A hospital record which differs from this theoretical standard case

is immediately apparent upon professional examination.

The average office case, on the other hand, is usually very different. It is far more likely to be psychosomatic ("nerves")—in whole or in part—with a bewildering variety of symptoms and sometimes physical findings which defy easy sorting out or evaluation. Furthermore, many of them are "incurable" in the strict sense of the word. The anxieties and tensions which bring many people to the office may go on for long periods of time despite the best efforts of the best doctors to cure them.

Other doctors object to the notion of evaluating office medical care on

the grounds that it constitutes an invasion of privacy. They insist that what goes on between the patient and the doctor is privileged and confidential. "These people bare their souls to us—sometimes," said one veteran practitioner. "If they ever got the idea that some of the information they confide might get to somebody else, they'd tell us nothing—and that would be very bad medicine for them, let me assure you."

Yet hospital records, which often contain much confidential information, are carefully scrutinized without obvious damage to the physician-patient relationship.

Then, too, some doctors feel that

regulation of office practice is unnecessary since the really sick people wind up in the hospital, where strict safeguards are already in effect.

Proponents of the need for evaluating the quality of medical care in the office concede the complexity and difficulty—and in some areas the impossibility—of their task. They insist, nevertheless, that some areas can and ought to be measured.

Does the doctor take an adequate history? Does he examine the patient thoroughly and properly? Are the laboratory and X-ray studies which he orders complete and appropriate? How do his standards and results compare with those of his colleagues? And so on.

This would require an on-the-spot evaluation by a trained inspector who would sample the patient records in the doctor's files and render an opinion as to just how good they were. Some authorities insist that the picture would be incomplete without direct observation of the physician as he listens to a patient's symptoms, examines him, and recommends diagnostic tests or treatment.

The first type of evaluation could probably be carried out by a medically trained non-physician, providing it gave due regard to the problems of everyday office practice. The second kind of inspection would necessarily require the services of a physician, and this fact in itself would seem to rule out this approach. Beyond that, the seeming intrusion of a third party into the doctor's traditionally private consulting and examining rooms could be expected to meet with objections from doctor and patient alike.

The professional evaluation and grading of office medical care is still some time off. Inevitably, however, it is coming. I believe reluctant doctors will have to accept it because third parties such as insurance companies and state and Federal agencies may refuse to pay fees to any physician who does not submit to evaluations.

Since payment from these sources is making up an ever-increasing per-

centage of his income, the doctor may find this pressure hard to resist. Then, too, his own specialty board or hospital may require periodic examination—of his office practice. Lastly, patients will insist upon it.

It is significant that National Advisory Commission on Health Manpower, which reported to President Johnson in November, 1967, included "peer review and accountability" (evaluation of doctors by other doctors) as one of the Commission's major recommendations.

My hope is that when it comes it will be the result of the desire and efforts of doctors to do the job on their own rather than have unrealistic regulations forced upon them by those outside the profession.

But there are, of course, some standards by which the layman might judge his doctor now.

What medical school did he graduate from? When? Where did he perform his internship and residency training? (There are about 80 medical schools and several thousand hospitals in the U.S. certified for postgraduate training.) You can't be familiar with all of them, and you might not even recognize some of those that doctors rank as top-notch. A tactful inquiry of the doctor's aide should get you the information on the medical school.

In what hospitals does he have admitting privileges? Has he done any teaching or research? Is he specialty-board certified or eligible? (Again, the most obvious source of information is the doctor himself or his aide, but you may prefer to refer to the American Medical Association Directory or the Directory of Medical Specialists available in most large public libraries.)

What do his colleagues think of him as evidenced by their willingness to consult or have him take care of their family? (There is no higher compliment than being known as "a doctor's doctor.")

And finally, what do his patients think of him? Patients often take little notice of a doctor's scientific competence as long as he seems to

get results. They tend to over-emphasize his personality, an uncertain reflection of ability. But the reference books and diplomats tell you all about the doctor as a scientist and nothing about him as a person. You need to know about both to decide whether you want him to take care of you. So listen to what other patients say.

There are a few other guidelines an observant and inquiring patient can use. Does the doctor's office seem well organized, well staffed, and run on schedule? Does he advise a complete physical examination and then advise yearly checkups? (Watch out if he seems content to treat only your symptoms without trying to get at the source, or if he ignores modern concepts of preventive medicine through annual examinations.) Does he keep adequate notes and records? Nobody can possibly carry all that information in his head, and some apparently minor detail of today may take on great significance sometime later.

Does he seem anxious to investigate and discuss even relatively minor complaints? Early diagnosis is quite often the key to successful treatment.

Does he seem to consider carefully each drug he gives you, or does he keep switching around?

Does he seem to depend too much on laboratory and X-ray tests and not enough on talking to and examining you? Even today the vast majority of all diagnoses are made, at least tentatively, on the basis of a good history and physical examination.

Does he make house calls? What are his arrangements for emergency coverage? You may be left high and dry in your hour of need unless you settle this before problems arise.

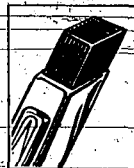
How does he react when you mention specialists or the advisability of getting another medical opinion on something?

These pointers are not infallible, but they certainly could help the average person in deciding whether he is getting the kind of medical care he wants, needs—and deserves. ♦

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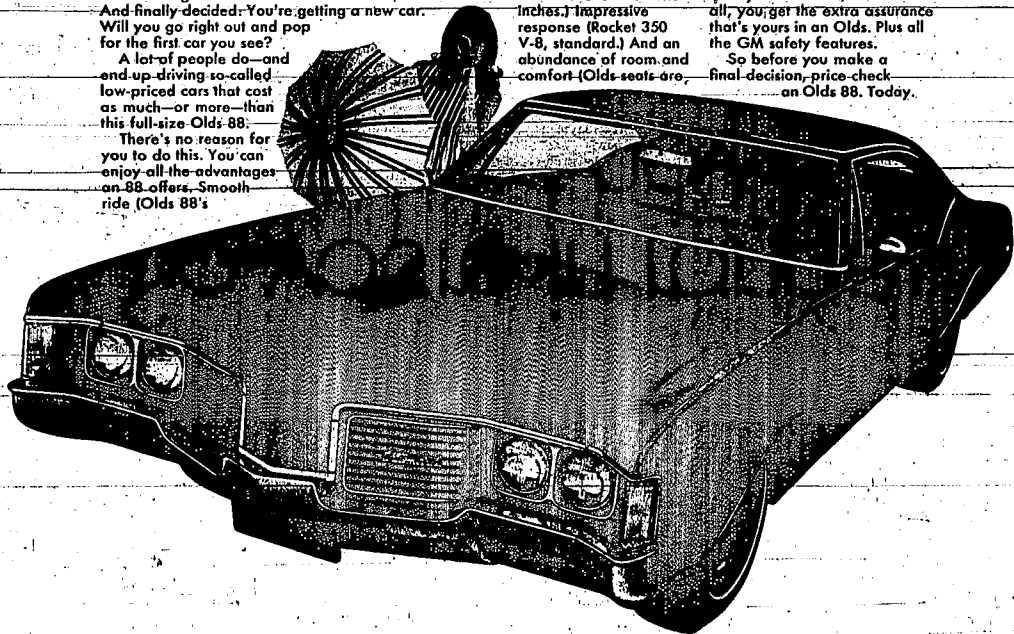

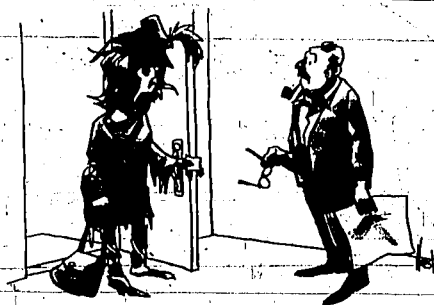

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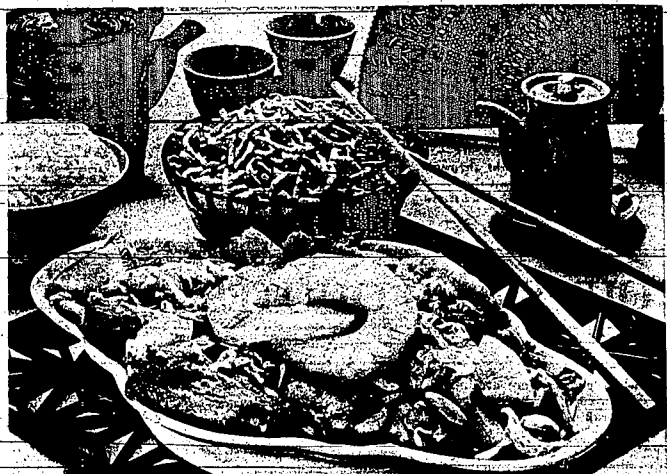
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CHICKEN As You Like It

Chicken wings, sweet 'n' tart, are served Oriental style with rice, chow mein noodles, and tea.

■ Chicken is an all-time popular choice with busy homemakers. It offers high protein food at below-average cost. It can be prepared quickly or leisurely in tempting combinations as these to please one and all.

*To Bone Chicken Thighs: Make a lengthwise cut through to bone along thinner side of thigh. Scrape flesh away from bone; remove and discard bone. Cut off the piece of cartilage. Spread out pieces, skin side down.

5. Arrange chicken on a heated platter; pour sauce over all. Serve with spaghetti and crusty Italian bread. *4 servings*

Oriental Pineapple Chicken

- 12 chicken wings
- ¼ teaspoon Accent
- ½ teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 tablespoons cooking oil or salad oil
- Syrup drained from 1 can (8½ oz.) pineapple slices
- Chicken broth (1½ cups)
- ½ cup soy sauce
- 2 tablespoons cider vinegar
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 cup diagonally sliced celery
- 4 green onions, diagonally sliced
- 1 can (5 oz.) water chestnuts, drained and halved
- 1 can (1 lb.) bean sprouts, drained and rinsed
- ¼ cup toasted blanched almonds
- 4 pineapple slices

1. Remove and discard tips from chicken wings; cut wings in half at joint. Toss with a mixture of the Accent and ginger.
2. Heat garlic and oil in a large, heavy skillet. Brown chicken.
3. Add enough chicken broth to the pineapple syrup to make 1½ cups; gradually pour into skillet. Cover and simmer 16 min., or until chicken is tender.
4. Push chicken to side of skillet. Stir in a mixture of soy sauce, vinegar, and cornstarch. Add celery and green onion. Bring to boiling and cook 8 min., stirring constantly. Mix in the water chestnuts, bean sprouts, almonds, and 2 of the pineapple slices, cut in large pieces.

Move chicken through mixture. Heat thoroughly.
5. Turn into a heated serving dish. Garnish top with remaining pineapple slices. *4 servings*

Stuffed Mini-Rolls

- 12 chicken thighs, boned*
- Accent
- Apple-Raisin Stuffing (see recipe) or use 12 tablespoons chopped chutney
- Melted butter or margarine

1. Sprinkle chicken generously with Accent. Working with pieces skin side down, divide Apple-Raisin Stuffing or chutney among boned thighs, spooning it onto center of each. Fold sides over stuffing and fasten with a small skewer.
2. Place chicken seam side down in a greased shallow baking dish and brush with the melted butter.
3. Bake at 400°F. 20 min. Turn thighs and continue baking for 20 min., or until chicken tests done.
4. Serve with fluffy whipped potatoes and chicken gravy, canned or prepared from a mix. *8 servings*

Apple-Raisin Stuffing: Mix ¾ cup chopped pared apple, ¼ cup dark seedless raisins, 1 tablespoon finely chopped onion, and 2 tablespoons snipped parsley.

Chicken Cacciatore

- ½ cup olive oil
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 broiler-fryer chicken, 2½ to 3 lbs. ready-to-cook weight, cut in quarters*
- ½ cup regular all-purpose flour
- 1½ teaspoons salt
- ½ teaspoon Accent
- 2 teaspoon black pepper
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 onion, thinly sliced
- ½ lb. mushrooms, cleaned and sliced lengthwise through stems and caps
- 1 can (8 oz.) tomato paste
- 1 can (1½ lb.) tomatoes, sliced
- 1½ teaspoons salt
- ½ teaspoon black pepper
- 1 teaspoon oregano, crushed
- 1 teaspoon chopped parsley

1. Heat olive oil with garlic in a large heavy skillet.
2. Meanwhile, coat chicken with a mixture of flour and next three ingredients. Place chicken skin side down in hot oil, turning occasionally to brown evenly on all sides.
3. While chicken is browning, heat butter or margarine. Add the onion and mushrooms and cook until lightly browned, stirring occasionally. Add to the chicken with a mixture of the remaining ingredients.
4. Cover and simmer 25 to 30 min., or until chicken is tender, basting occasionally.

Fried Chicken à la Southern Belle.

- 1 broiler-fryer chicken, 2½ to 3 lbs. ready-to-cook weight, cut in serving-sized pieces
- 1½ cups cream
- 1½ teaspoons savory
- 1 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- ¼ cup regular all-purpose flour
- 1½ teaspoons paprika
- 1½ teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon Accent
- ¼ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- Shortening and butter (equal parts)

1. Marinate chicken pieces 1 hr. in a mixture of the cream, savory, and the 1 teaspoon freshly ground pepper, turning once.
2. Remove chicken from cream. (The seasoned cream may be used for gravy.) Coat with a mixture of the flour and next four ingredients. Set aside on waxed paper for 30 min.
3. Meanwhile, fill a large, heavy skillet one-half full with the fat. Heat to 350°F.
4. Fry only a few chicken pieces at a time 10 to 13 min. (about 5 min. for wings), or until tender and browned; turn pieces several times during cooking. Drain over fat a few seconds; remove to absorbent paper-lined platter. Keep chicken warm while frying the remaining pieces. *About 4 servings*

Exclusive Interview: Shirley MacLaine Talks About Men, Marriage, Morals

SHIRLEY MACLAINE is one of the movies' biggest box-office attractions.

She is the star of the soon-to-be released "The Bliss of Mrs. Blossom" and is currently filming "Sweet Charity." Shirley is also one of the most controversial figures in Hollywood, a city noted for controversial figures. Here, in an exclusive interview with a friend and neighbor, she gives stimulating answers to a variety of provocative questions.

How do you think of yourself first? As an actress, wife, or mother?

As a woman first of all. In the final analysis, that's it. I am me, and I have to be true to myself.

Do you think American women are becoming more aggressive than men?

A whole new viewpoint is developing, one which says everyone can develop according to the equipment she possesses, not according to her sex. In an odd way, this makes her more feminine because the more consummate a woman feels, the more feminine she becomes.

Do you plan to raise your daughter Sachi as a free individual?

Yes. It seemed like her life belonged more to her than to me from the moment she was born. Of course, I made sure I was always there when she needed me, but mostly she'd rather be on her own.

I remember the time when I lived at the beach in Malibu and put Sachi outside in her playpen. I was busy, and the next time I looked out, it was raining. Sachi was throwing her arms around, gurgling, having a marvelous time. I was worried, but Sachi loved it and cried her eyes out when I brought her in.

With your husband Steve living in Japan, how is your marriage, thriving?

Love makes a unit of the three of us, a unit that is much stronger be-

cause it consists of three independent people.

Was there ever a time when you had your doubts about your marriage?

Yes. There was a time in '67 when I didn't think it would work. I'd thought it all out and decided that I should break my contract and go to live in Japan with Steve. But he wouldn't let me. He pointed out that I'd worked since I was two years old, that work is my life. If I quit, I'd hate him, myself, everything!

How did you and Steve come to give your child such an unusual name?

Steve was brought up in Japan, where his father was in the diplomatic service. He was a paratrooper in World War II and was his unit's official interpreter when they landed in Tokyo. His outfit found a little girl named Sachiko (which means "happy child"), whose parents were killed in Hiroshima. Steve wanted to adopt her, but she died of radiation sickness before he could. So we named our daughter Stephanie Sachiko Parker and call her Sachi.

You were married on Sept. 17, 1954. The next morning you left to start work in your first film. Was Steve understanding of your independence even though you were only 19?

Steve was the wanderer then! I knew that. And he knew I had these drives to express myself through my work. He was not about to take this away from me.

In a marriage, do you feel there has to be a boss?

Sometimes or other, there has to be one partner with the final answer, no matter how progressive you are. One Christmas Steve and I almost argued about when to give Sachi her gift. I wanted her to nap first, but Steve was impatient to give out the gift. I gave in because I felt somebody had to be the boss, namely Steve.



Is it true that you're thinking of going into politics?

Ha! Can't you just see me behind a desk? I am not interested in politics as a job, but I do feel it is important for actors to commit themselves.

Are you a religious person?

I believe God is in people. I believe love is God. The important thing to me is to believe in people.

Do you have a goal in life?

I guess to make tomorrow a little better than today. This is a kind of recent stage; it comes with a feeling of success. I want to contribute something to make the world a better place to live in.

How do you feel about the sudden and surprising success of your actor brother, Warren Beatty, as a movie producer?

How about that! Frankly, I am not all that happy with the way his picture made violence and the characters—who were criminals in real life—almost likeable.

What do you think of nudity and sex in films today?

Well, I certainly don't believe in censorship, if that's what you mean. I think movies are better than ever today because they are true to life. If nudity is an intrinsic part of the story and done with taste, then I say okay. As long as the actress doesn't catch cold, that is.

What do you think of morality in general today?

There's a whole new morality developing these days. And who's to say what is right and what is wrong really? The more I travel, the more I realize that traditional habits are silly. I hope I am raising Sachi to have her own sense of morality, but whenever I talk to her about anything, I always preface it with "This is just my opinion." 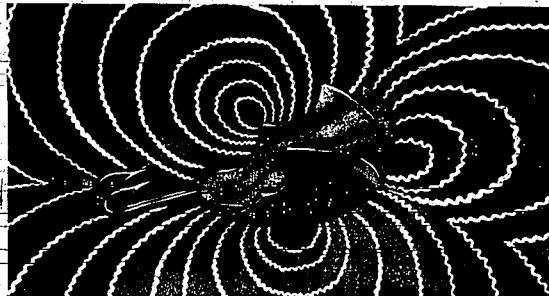

A Sure-Fire Way to Break Your Bad Habits



DO YOU want to stop smoking? Quit compulsive gambling? Eliminate overeating?

Science now has come up with a fascinating formula to help you break your bad habits. Called "aversion therapy," its basic principle is this: if you have an unpleasant experience while doing something, you will stop wanting to do it.

Recent studies at the University of California prove that aversion therapy really works—if administered under professional supervision. In the experiments, subjects carried a small battery-powered device in their pockets and whenever they felt the urge to indulge in an undesirable habit, they gave the device a squeeze. Immediately a mild-to-moderate shock was administered.

This method of "punishing" the habit was highly successful in the case of nail-biters, and with smokers, a vastly tougher breed, the technique recorded a 50-percent success rate.

Dr. Malcolm Kushner of the Institute for Research in Clinical Psychology cites an interesting case history involving aversion therapy. A 17-year-old girl had been afflicted with chronic fits of sneezing. She underwent a complete series of examinations, tried a variety of medications, and even resorted to hypnosis and sleep therapy—all to no avail.

Doctor Kushner's treatment involved placing a microphone around the girl's neck, connected to an amplifier and a shock source. Electrodes were taped to her arm, and every time she sneezed, the amplified sound triggered a mild shock. After several treatments, the sneeze frequency diminished gradually and finally stopped.

While not all cases are as serious as this, Doctor Kushner feels

that aversion therapy is the answer to equally persistent, bad habits, such as nail biting, smoking, and overeating.

The technique was equally valuable in curing a compulsive gambler. Two British psychiatrists, Dr. J. C. Barker and Dr. Mabel Miller, were called in to help a man who was losing his weekly earnings. The two doctors made films of him at a gambling establishment and at home. Seating him in a dark room, the films were shown to him and each time the gambling-hall film was run, he was given mild shocks. The home-life film was accompanied by the soothing voice of his wife.

Doctor Barker later announced, "The patient has not been near a gambling establishment in more than two months."

Not all forms of aversion therapy require the shock technique, though. A Beverly Hills psychiatrist tells of a case involving a movie star with compulsive eating habits. The man, as a matter of habit, would make midnight raids on the refrigerator, and his wife sought professional help.

The doctor recommended that she get a picture of a grossly fat man, enlarge it to life-size, and superimpose the head of her husband on it. She stood the figure in front of the refrigerator each night and before long her husband's midnight forays ceased.

Authorities feel that aversion therapy may play its most important role in coping with surface habits and should not be used in cases where the habit is caused by a deep-seated neurosis.

In any case, professional recommendation and approval should be sought before applying aversion therapy because, as with any form of therapy, when and how it should be used is best left to the judgment of a trained professional.
