Thousands Join Campaign

'Solidarity Day' March Begins

WASHINGTON (AP) — Under a sky growing dark with the threat of rain, thousands of Americans marched from the grounds of the Washington Monument to the Lincoln Memorial today to demand a greater government effort to abolish poverty.

The half-mile march along the Reflecting Pool took the demonstrators within yards of the plywood and canvas shelters of Resurrection City, home of most of the Poor People's Campaigners who arrived in the nation's capital six weeks ago.

Orderly but disgruntled, the church members and laymen. People just began to move from the tall marble monument to the Lincoln Memorial. One large group was led by Walter Rutherfurd, head of the United Auto Workers Union.

Washington Police Chief John B. Taylor estimated that 10,000 people were in the area shortly after noon. Actor Ossie Davis told the crowd at the monument that "we are not a crowd. We are a movement of 35,000 and heading for 50,000."

It was the climactic demonstration of the Poor People's Campaign for jobs, housing, education and welfare benefits for the poor.

Blacks and whites, poor and affluent participated in the demonstration. Some wore business suits, others frayed coveralls.

About 4,300 police and national guard troops patrolled the area. The demonstration was pledged to nonviolence by the Rev. Ralph David Abernethy, head of the organizing Southern Christian Leadership Conference.

But in a speech prepared for Lincoln Memorial, Whitney M. Young Jr., executive director of the National Urban League, said this may be the most march which is nonviolent and which brings blacks and whites together.

"The nation and the Congress must move before it is too late; before the prophets of violence replace the prophets of peace and justice," Young said.

Mechanics Split Vote On Union

Labor votes were taken among employees of the Idaho companies Wednesday and the results at noon showed a split decision.

On Wednesday, Reese Motor Co. voted to join the union and began negotiations on a contract. The vote at Willis Motor Co. was 10-8. The vote at Bob Reese was 10-8.

The vote was held to determine whether the employees want to belong to the Teamsters Local Union No. 483 and the Machinists Union.

Tom Hazzard of the Idaho Employers Council, said the Willis vote was a vote of confidence for the company.

Bob Reese, he said, the results did not mean the employees would join the union. "It just means an attempt will be made to negotiate a contract between labor and management."

A vote at Bill Workman Ford was also held late Wednesday, and votes are planned at Glen Jenkins Chevrolet, Inc., and McKey's, Inc., Thursday morning.

Mr. Hazzard said, "If employees turn down all but the three lowest offers, then there is a possibility the union won't even try to negotiate a contract in Twin Falls."

T.F. Groups Okay PUC Control Of Intra-State Air Schedules

Representatives of several Twin Falls County and city groups came to an agreement Tuesday noon that the Idaho Public Utilities Commission should have jurisdiction over intra-state public air transportation — an authority that has been lacking since PUC authority in the state was adopted in 1951.

The PUC has scheduled a hearing July 9 in Boise on this proposal — an outcome of Jim Wilkins, operating as Gooding-based Sun Valley Airlines, filing an application for intra-state air service.

Those attending the meeting Tuesday at the Twin Falls Livestock Commission Co. included the three county commissioners, members of the city council and an officer of the Chamber of Commerce Airport Committee.

A letter condemning the action will be sent to the PUC and a delegation representative of those attending the meeting will attend the July 9 hearing.

It was the feeling of those attending the meeting that commuter airlines, such as Sun Valley Airlines, serve a basic need in Idaho.

The men felt that such commuter airlines should have some type of route protection to prevent larger airlines from duplicating flight times which are already being filled by commuter airlines.

The existing PUC regulation was adopted in 1953, prior to the airplane era, and has had no updating since that time.

Those attending the meeting Tuesday feel some type of authority should be established to regulate common carrier airplanes in the state. Such regulations now exist for bus and train service.

Post Office Receives Gun Regulations

New regulations concerning the shipment of firearms in the mail were received Tuesday afternoon by Fred Sanger, Twin Falls postmaster.

The new regulations define what concealable firearms are, including regulations, and include an addition. The addition is that the postmaster is required to notify the law enforcement agency to whom the package containing firearms is going.

"For many years, the Post Office Department has required that all packages containing firearms be marked 'FIREARMS' in one inch large block letters. Concealable firearms could not be mailed, except from manufacturer to dealer, to a law enforcement officer or an officer in the armed forces.

The new regulations say the same thing, Mr. Sanger said, but define clearly what concealable firearms are. The definition restricts shipment of shotguns with barrels less than 18 inches long; rifles less than 12 inches long; and any pistol.

Mr. Sanger said he is required to write a letter to the chief law enforcement officer concerned in the area where a firearm-bearing package is being sent. He said it won't control the shipment of all guns, but restrict the use of guns in any area.

"But it will let law enforcement officers know who has received guns, and what type of gun it is."

About 10 years ago, a Twin Falls postman reported that his firm when a loaded rifle in a package went off on the loading dock.

Laborites Ask House Of Lords Abolition

LONDON (AP) — More than 50 Laborites in the House of Commons signed motions today calling for abolition of the House of Lords by Conservative members in the upper chamber mustered a small majority to reject the Labor government's order for a total trade boycott against Rhodesia.

Prime Minister Harold Wilson was expected to indicate Thursday whether the government would support the campaign.

The chief question was whether Wilson would jettison all-party negotiations which have been under way to make the largely hereditary upper chamber more of a senate of elected and/or appointed elders.

Some political commentators believed the motion would be abandoned and the Laborites would push through legislation to create an elected senate. Others recalled that a talk of abolishing the Lords is as old as the century and predicted that the negotiations would continue as before.

Despite the Lords' 193-184 vote Tuesday night, the government's order for tougher sanctions against the rebellious Rhodesia was rejected.

The 110 Laborite peers about 85 actually voted. They were supported by eight Conservatives, defying their own party leaders. 20 Liberals, about 80 Independents, 18 Bishops led by the Archbishop of Canterbury, and the only Communist in Parliament, Lord Milford.

The Conservatives generally assume that they have 80 party members in the Lords, plus the support of hundreds of nonpolitical peers who would turn up in large numbers on an issue that moved them — such as a bill to abolish phreasant shooting.

This time, many Conservatives stayed home or went to the opening of the Royal Ascot races meeting. However, one peer reported meeting two uncles he thought were dead.

The Conservatives insisted their opposition to tougher sanctions against Rhodesia did not constitute approval of the white minority government.

They contended that a stiffer British trade would rule out any negotiated settlement with the white Rhodesians, who declared independence from Britain Nov. 11, 1965; but the Labor government no longer has a mandate for such election because of its recent election setbacks, and that Britain has lost control of the British issue to the United Nations.

Backers Of 2 Initiative Measures Miss Deadline

BOISE (AP) — Backers of two of three proposed initiative measures have failed to meet a deadline set by Idaho law. Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa said today.

Only sponsors of an initiative to restore Idaho to standard time filed arguments for their proposal by the deadline of June 8, Cenarrusa said.

Lacking, he said, are arguments in support of an initiative to amend Idaho's dredge mining law and one to require a referendum by voters before a ur-

ban renewal program could be approved.

Cenarrusa said the law requires that sponsors of an initiative must have filed arguments with his office at least 150 days before the general election. That date was June 8.

Opponents of an initiative, must file arguments against their proposal 105 days before the election. That would be July 23.

Cenarrusa said he must assemble the arguments in a pamphlet and provide copies for all registered voters at least 75 days before the election. County

auditors are responsible for distributing the documents.

Cenarrusa said he does not know whether failure to meet the deadline invalidates the initiative, or simply prevents supporting arguments from being distributed at state expense.

So far, only the preliminary petitions have been filed on the time and urban renewal proposals. Petitions with about 4,000 signatures have been submitted in support of the dredge mining initiative.

To get an initiative proposal on the general election ballot,

signatures of qualified electors equal to 10 per cent of the number of voters cast for governor in the preceding election must be filed in the secretary of state's office by July 5. The number required this year is 25,260.

Cenarrusa said he noted the June 8 argument deadline while checking the initiative law. He said he believes the responsibility for meeting the deadline lies up to the sponsors and opponents of initiative proposals, not his office.

"It's their problem," he said.

Vietnam And U.S. Peace Envoys Exchange Charges During Talks

PARIS (AP) — North Vietnam accused the United States today of a lack of good faith in the Paris peace talks. Striking back, the U.S. delegation accused North Vietnam of a gross violation of American aims in the conflict.

North Vietnamese Ambassador Xuan Thuy told U.S. Ambassador W. Averell Harriman that the United States has been escalating its fight in spite of President Johnson's statement that the United States is not claiming the number of air strikes on territory of the North had gone up from 2,500 in March to 4,700 in May.

Harriman called Thuy's

speech "quite a strong attack" and indicated it had forced him to change his own statement in the meeting today—the ninth day of talks in the Geneva accords, which ended French rule in Vietnam and left the north-south division. But he turned his fire in part to a counter-attack after Thuy—who spoke first, had blasted the United States.

Thuy declared that strikes have increased in total over his country, though the target area is limited, he accused the United States of increasing strength in Saigon and bombing residential areas.

"If it does," he declared, "it is a grotesque distortion of American objectives and a formidable obstacle to progress here... The United States does not seek permanent military bases, military presence or alliances there."

McCarthy Maintains Large Margin In New York Primary

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — U.S. Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy maintained an astounding margin over Kennedy and Humphrey forces today, although late Tuesday's advance primary changed the figures slightly in the battle for New York State's Democratic presidential delegates.

In overpowering the other troops, McCarthy evidently gave coastal strength for Paul O'Dwyer's advance primary victory. McCarthy harvested at least 51 of the 123 convention delegates in partial returns sloughed by hand-counting of paper ballots.

The count grew to a possible 24 for delegates pledged to the late Robert F. Kennedy. Supporters of Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey gained one, possible two. Uncommitted delegates garnered 10 seats.

The voting trend indicated that McCarthy would maintain 51 of the delegates.

The surprise Senate victory was Paul O'Dwyer, a former city councilman and brother of the late Mayor John Lindsay of New York City. He defeated Eugene H. Nickerson, Nassau County executive who came into the race at the last minute.

porters of Richard M. Nixon put up challengers for only 11 of the 82 delegate slots. The remaining delegates went to Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller.

Of the 11, two in Queens went to Nixon, two in the Rochester area went to Rockefeller, and seven were uncommitted.

The congressional phase of the primary saw all challenged incumbents win re-nomination, among them Bayview Democrat Emanuel Celler, who today won the House seat in the Democratic nomination early in his Harlem district.

Election returns were delayed because the primary had a number of contests for a wide variety of offices, including seats in both houses of the state legislature and the state senate and the presidential delegates.

O'Dwyer, Nickerson and Resnick provided the first test of the state's new system, replacing the old convention method of choosing candidates for statewide office.

O'Dwyer had 264,470 votes, Nickerson 248,092 and Resnick 214,270.

Brandt Tells Of Visit Into East Berlin

By BONN (AP) — Foreign Minister Willy Brandt of West Germany reported to his government today on his surprise visit into Communist East Berlin for a 10-hour visit with Moscow's man in East Germany.

The visit established a new contact between Bonn and Moscow on the issue of East German restrictions on travel to West Berlin and was a slap at the East German regime. It also defied East German regulations against non-Berliners from East German territory.

Brandt, who crossed the Berlin wall unannounced Tuesday night to visit Egon Abramov, Soviet ambassador to East Germany, told newsmen in Berlin, "There are still difficulties." He refused to give details.

Brandt apparently caught the East Germans by surprise.

Before reporting to the Cabinet in Bonn, Brandt told the German press that the current situation requires that "we must above all protect the vital economic connections with West Berlin."

Marines Kill 128 Reds At Khe Sanh

SAGON (AP) — U.S. Marines, artillery and aircraft poured a force of North Vietnamese through a mortar barrage, the North Vietnamese probed for a weak spot in the defenses around a key position nine miles south of the combat zone in the northwest corner of South Vietnam.

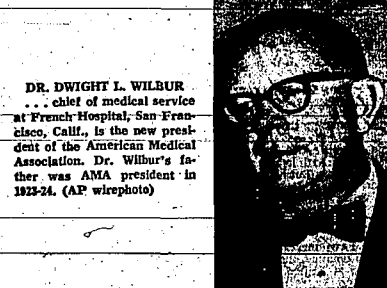

16-Year-Old Is Youngest Person To Discover Comet
BISHOP, Tex. (AP) — A 16-year-old Bishop high school junior who "didn't have anything else to do this summer" set out to find a new comet.
He found one.
Mark Whitaker is the youngest person credited with discovering a new comet.
The Whitaker-Thomas comet, spotted by Mark with a home-constructed 4-inch telescope June 14, is named for him and Norman G. Thomas, a professional astronomer at Lowell Observatory in Flagstaff, Ariz., who confirmed Mark's observations. Thomas spotted a mysterious light, which turned out to be the comet, June 17 on a photograph plate made to trace the asteroid Icarus.
"I didn't really expect to find anything," Whitaker said Tuesday. "I had all summer to find a comet and I found one."
He found it on the third night of his search. "I didn't know if it was a new or a periodic comet after observing it two days. I wanted to send a report. Most astronomy books I have always used the Harvard Observatory. I tried by telephone and transferred me to the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory at Cambridge, Mass. Mobilization Law Signed By Thieu

By BARR YKRAMER
HUE, Vietnam (AP)—President Nguyen Van Thieu signed the general mobilization law today and said his government will not ask for more U.S. and other allied troops.
"The Vietnamese government intends to take over more responsibility," Thieu told newsmen after ceremonies marking Armed Forces Day. "We do not intend to ask the United States and the other allies for more troops."
In the past, Thieu has said more troops were needed above the allied contribution of 598,000 men to insure an accelerated victory.
Thieu said the general mobilization should add 125,000 men to the regular and militia forces of South Vietnam, bringing their number to almost 875,000 by the end of next year.
The law also makes 18 and 19-year-olds and men between 38 and 50 eligible for service in local, self-defense units. More than 170,000 men already are members of these local forces.
U.S. officials say the United States has agreed to equip some of the men. Thieu is expected to ask for more arms for the recruits on his visit to Washington, scheduled for July.

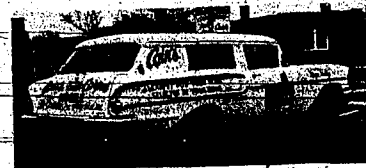

Irs. Bucher's Battle Cry

Remember The Pueblo!

By Ron Roach

SAN DIEGO (AP) — "Remember the Pueblo!" That's the battle cry of Mrs. Rose Bucher, wife of the skipper of the captured U.S. intelligence vessel which has been in Communist North Korean hands for nearly six months.

Mrs. Bucher believes that her husband, Cmdr. Lloyd Bucher, and the 81 other American crewmen will be freed but she vigorously protests the slow pace of diplomatic effort to win their release.

"The Navy really doesn't have anything to do about it. The State Department is responsible. If our military leaders had been in control, we'd have the ship back."

Mrs. Bucher, who has two teen-age sons, is critical of the Defense Department for refusing to give her a list of crewmen's families. But she has managed to contact about three-fourths of the families.

"I feel an obligation as the commanding officer's wife to give words of encouragement. We give each other encouragement. It's our son, our husband or our loved one."

The Department of Defense said it was a matter of policy and would be invading people's privacy. It said some don't want their name and address released. But others say it's okay. I guess they thought I was a rabble-rouser when they were in Washington. Have we become so inhuman that people's feelings and human lives mean nothing?

"The State Department has asked not only me but other families as well to minimize publicity. They're trying to make noise and we make it more difficult on our husband or son."

"I believed that I wouldn't do it. If they can show me proof, then I will shut up."

Mrs. Bucher said she hopes to see the Pueblo seizure become a political issue in the upcoming elections.

"But there's no other way. The Democrats are embarrassing their heads. Republicans are picking it up."

"These men on the ship are Republicans. Democrats want to have you. Many on the boat aren't even old enough to vote. Some are just 21 and could vote for the first time. Are they going to get absentee ballots?"

Committees of volunteers have formed in San Diego and elsewhere to distribute bumper stickers which say "Remember the Pueblo."

Court Denies Benefits In Man's Death

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court has denied benefits to a Lewiston, Idaho woman who claimed her husband died because of an argument.

The court's ruling upheld an earlier decision by the State Industrial Accident Board.

Elmer Davis was a superintendent at the Schmidt Brothers, Inc., lumber mill in Wayne, Idaho, when he died in July, 1965.

Mrs. Neva Davis claimed the death resulted from a heart attack which was caused by an argument Davis had with a fellow employe.

The Supreme Court said Mrs. Davis failed to prove the cause of death or that it was the result of an industrial accident.

Humphrey Backer Says Chances Good

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's Democratic Party is more united now because its national convention delegation is uncommitted, according to the Idaho chairman for Vice President Hubert Humphrey.

William O. Payton of McCall said that, even though Idaho's delegate votes may not all go to his candidate, the party would be helped by an uncommitted slate.

Payton admitted that some Humphrey backers, particularly from out of Idaho, would have liked the Idaho delegates committed to vote for Humphrey. But he said he resisted their efforts.

A poll after the delegates were selected showed that 17 of the delegates would probably go to Humphrey, five to Minnesota Sen. Eugene McCarthy and the rest were uncommitted.

"The important thing is that we create as much harmony as possible within the party and an election of the candidates contained within the state," Payton said.

Some Humphrey camp leaders said that of Idaho's 25 votes, at least 21 should go to the vice president.

Payton said the Idaho votes were not committed to Humphrey and would go to him only if it appeared he were the leading candidate at the time of the Democratic convention's roll call next August.

Rockefeller Using Election Records As Campaign Weapon

By REELMAN MORIN, AP Special Correspondent NEW YORK (AP) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller is beginning to use a new campaign weapon—comparing election records—in his effort to overtake Richard M. Nixon in the race for the Republican nomination for president.

A Rockefeller campaign placard trumpets, "He's never lost an election." Nixon, of course, was defeated in his last two races, for president in 1960 and for governor of California in 1967.

Rockefeller cites their respective showings in heavily Democratic New York City. He said in New Jersey Tuesday that Nixon lost the city in 1960 by 791,000 votes whereas he lost it in 1965 by only 70,000.

The governor pointed out to republican congressional leaders that in 1962, he polled 395,000 more votes than the combined total cast for New York candidates for Congress. He said Nixon, running for governor of California that year had 147,000 fewer votes than the total for congressional candidates there.

Rockefeller is elated over the results of a poll taken in another predominantly Republican city, Philadelphia, late last week. It showed him running ahead of Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, 47.4 per cent to 46.3 there.

"Look at the record," Rockefeller told newsmen. "Nixon lost Philadelphia by 300,000 in 1960 and (Sen. Barry) Goldwater by 400,000 in '64."

The use of these election statistics is designed of course to persuade Republican delegates to the GOP national convention that Rockefeller has drawn more votes from Democrats and Independents than Nixon. Since the Republicans are the minority party...

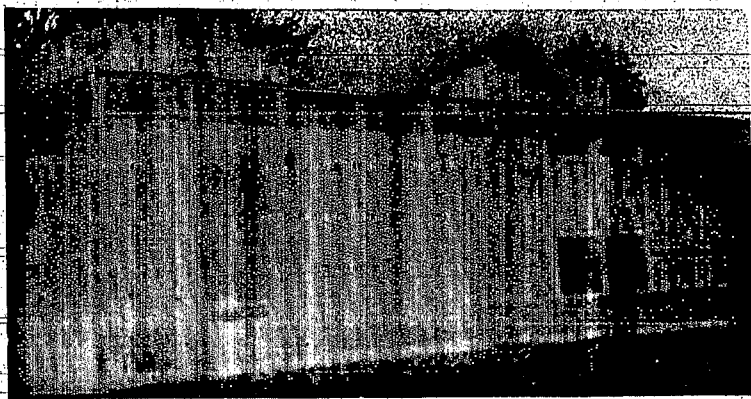

Migrant Children Go To School In New Structure

RUPERT — A small number of Spanish-American migrant children have begun their first session of summer school in Rupert, in a specially built, movable building.

The building, a four-classroom pre-fabricated building purchased from the Boise Cascade Corp., in Pocatello, is situated on the Pershing School grounds and will be used on a year-around basis.

The school is primarily for migrant children who need help with English as a second language. The operation is made possible through the migrant law, Public Law 89-10, Title 7. Until the building was ready for occupancy this week, the migrant students attended classes in Pershing school last week.

Teachers for the migrants are Pete Espinoza, a graduate of Idaho State University, and Christine DeThomas, a University of Idaho graduate. They will be assisted by Georgia Lee Newman, Linda Espinoza, and Aurora and Anna Maria Quillinan, teacher aides. Director for the summer session is Gene Shapp.

Approximately 50 students were expected to enroll for the session and assistant superintendent Doyle Lowder said it is expected more will report for school as the session progresses.

Bids Taken For College Furniture

Bids amounting to \$31,022 for furniture and equipment for the College of Southern Idaho fine arts and academic buildings were approved Monday night by college bids rejected were those for a fume hood, floor scrubber and projector. All bids submitted for those items were alternate bids.

The \$31,000-plus figure was about 10 per cent lower than anticipated. Dr. James L. Taylor said the project for the furniture and equipment was about \$38,000 and that the college had a budget of about \$30,000 set for the items.

The bids were awarded to nine different firms, all of which have Idaho based outlets. Those firms included pianos, chairs, desks, tables, waste baskets and other items to furnish the two new buildings.

In other action, the board approved the hiring of Lloyd LeClair as assistant to the business manager, H. L. Van Slyke.

Dr. James L. Taylor, CSI president, reported that the college is still short six teachers for the fall term. Ten new instructors are to be added to the staff to handle the anticipated enrollment increase. College classes will be operating out of the new campus facilities this fall.

Colorado's New Uranium Boom Surging

GRAND JUNCTION, Colo. (AP)—Presses for needed uranium fuel, preservation and medicine, the new uranium boom rushes on.

But nuclear experts say unless new supplies are found, uranium to fill its demand.

"We're not only new uranium deposits but whole new districts," said Atomic Energy Commissioner Wildred E. Johnson in a speech.

John F. Emerson, head of uranium carbide's operations on the Colorado plateau, said he is selling uranium right now that we haven't even found yet.

Although the federal government still is the largest purchaser, its share is dropping yearly, and it intends to get out of the uranium business by the end of 1970. It has applied at Grand Junction—insurance for its future needs.

Government purchases during 1967 totaled 9,077 tons of uranium oxide at a cost of \$184 million, AEC statistics show, compared to 17,671 tons.

By contrast, the AEC reports, commercial purchases calling for deliveries through 1974 now amount to \$5,000 tons of uranium oxide.

It requires a ton of ore, on the average, to produce four pounds of uranium oxide.

To obtain the amount of ore needed to supply industry, old mining districts are being examined for supplies overlooked before—ones abandoned—because they were thought to be exhausted, and new areas are being searched.

Drilling, a byproduct of exploration and development, set an all-time record in the West a year ago, totaling 10,884 million feet, according to AEC statistics.

"The first quarter of this year the AEC says, drilling totaled 2.5 million feet, and officials see a record 13 million feet as probable in 1968.

The quest and the work are paying off. Known uranium reserves increased 7,000 tons last year, despite the tapping in the first quarter.

Price enters into the availability of ore. Government purchases currently are at \$5 a pound; uranium oxide, officials see about \$12 a pound a few years in the future.

Even with the rush, the new ore is still scarce, and there is a ready-made demand for it which can't be met yet.

Scattered through the Colorado Plateau are uranium deposits that have been drilled years ago by the Atomic Energy Commission. Some of the deposits are still in the public entry.

Conservatively, 100 billion tons, these reserves are being estimated by the AEC. The uranium ore worth \$1 billion total might double in alternate years. The AEC estimates that the uranium in the West is worth \$1 billion in total.

By JOHN CUNIFF AP Business Analyst NEW YORK (AP) — If the United States is to be branded as a significantly violent nation, then a sense of intellectual balance requires that notice be taken also of another characteristic, organized, voluntary philanthropy.

This quality is not quite unique among Americans, but its absence in many nations has led to immeasurable violence and anguish for its people. More so than any nation, Americans have a tradition of voluntary giving. Private, non-profit institutions, often staffed with volunteers, do much of the work that is done in this field.

In 1967, Americans donated to worthy causes—religion, education, arts, hospitals, the poor and so on—a conservatively estimated \$14.6 billion. It was the 29th straight year of increased giving.

Since philanthropy in the United States is so highly organized an activity, a popular definition also exists. It is the total of all contributions that are voluntarily left in will.

The statistics show, however, that \$1.1 billion of the 1967 total was donated by living individuals, much of it in \$1 and \$2 contributions in door-to-door solicitations by neighbors.

If it is argued that this proves we are a nation of beggars rather than givers, and that Americans can afford to give more, then one can point to the contributions not measured in dollars.

As of now, it is estimated by the American Association of Fund Raising Councils, a trade group of professional fund raisers, that 35 million Americans are offering their time and skills to philanthropy. In one form or another, they are involved for an average of one hour a week.

Volunteering is in itself an American institution; the association's literature notes. As evidence, it calls attention also to the fact that more than 12,000 volunteers abroad and more than 15,000 who have completed overseas assignments.

There is an attitude among Americans, says Jack Schwartz, association executive director, that they will be given away. "There is a general feeling of social responsibility. I've met people who don't know how to turn down a request for help. It's part of our culture."

Most students believe American philanthropy is a tradition that dates back to the 17th-century when neighbors were dependent upon each other for security, for raising orphaned children, for building barns.

Today, many activities normally supported by government in some nations are operated in the United States as private, nonprofit enterprises. The giving of funds, in fact, is essential in education, health, culture and welfare.

Judge Thornley Swan of the Second District Court sentenced Adams Tuesday. The former assistant attorney general had pleaded guilty to the charge June 6. Adams initially was charged with two counts of automobile homicide but the charge was reduced.

Our constitutional rights and freedom to bear arms as law-abiding citizens is at stake. Many systems and congressional emotion is creating senseless laws that will not control the criminal but will disarm America. The Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act, now on the President's desk awaiting signature contains as its Title IV the Dadd Bill, modified by amendments in the Senate. Do not be misled by statements that the gun measure is "a half way measure or watered down." It is the Dadd Bill except it does not preclude at this moment, inoperative sale of rifles and shotguns to non-licensees. To this position the President indicated his disapproval.

S.3603, by Senator Dodd, would include rifles and shotguns and ammunition in Title IV of the Crime Control Act now on the President's desk. In response, Senator Dodd (Connecticut) and Congressman Emanuel Clark (Tennessee) introduced a bill, H.R. 17735, which would refer to the Committee on the Judiciary in the Senate and House of Representatives, respectively. S.3604 and H.R. 17735, which were referred to the Committee on the Judiciary in the Senate and House.

S.3604, by Senator Dodd, would require the registration of all firearms in the nation under a system to be set up by the Secretary of the Treasury. Registration would commence 90 days after enactment. The registration period is 6 months. Persons who chose not to register their firearms may, instead, within the six months registration period, register their firearms and thereby avoid proceeding under the Act. Further, no person may sell, deliver or otherwise dispose of any ammunition to any person who does not furnish proof that the firearms for which he is purchasing ammunition have been registered.

H.R. 17735, by Congressman Celler, is a substitute for Title IV of the Crime Control Act. The basic differences between the Celler Bill and Title IV are these: 1. The prohibition against "mail order" and any interstate sale to individuals would be extended to rifles, shotguns, ammunition, and components of ammunition. 2. No federally licensed manufacturer, importer, or dealer could sell or deliver any firearm or ammunition (including ammunition components) to a person under 18 years of age. 3. A \$10 license would be required for the manufacture of small arms ammunition. (There is no exception for a handloader.)

The House Judiciary Committee is scheduled to take action on this bill June 20, 1968. The complete registration feature is the most serious challenge in prioritizing rights of the sportsman, either on national or local levels. This could be the first step in total disarmament of all private citizens in America. First a registration, then a license, then an annual increase in cost of the license plus ever-increasing police harassment in the issuance of a license, such as fingerprinting, viewing of the gun to be licensed, waiting for extended periods of time for police licensing procedure, etc. All these measures can be used to discourage and finally eliminate private gun ownership. Such a procedure has already been used successfully under the Sullivan Law in New York City.

Russia would vote yes on all these measures. Would you? If Idaho needs any gun control then let Idaho decide, not the federal government. Your expression of opinion to your elected representatives is your right and patriotic duty.
