the latter area is at Glenns Ferry, where pioneers used to cross the Snake River in the shallow water. All three areas are top attractions, both to tourists and residents and the residents of Magic Valley for many years. It is hoped the park projects will be finished in the next few years.

After Long Respite, Humphrey Is Back On Old Campaign Trail

Back on the trail after a long respite, Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey is depicting himself as the spokesman for the "vast, silent group of Americans" who want equality and equal rights for everyone.

Humphrey offered the evaluation Friday in St. Paul, Minn., at a Democratic fund-raising dinner, his first political outing since the assassination of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.

The event provided one of those frequent encounters between the vice president and his rival for the Democratic presidential nomination, Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy.

McCarthy, like Humphrey a Minnesotan, was first to speak to the group and was on his way out when Humphrey arrived. A quick handshake, a few words

in passing and then each went his separate way.

Humphrey said a slowdown in the arms race and diligence in attempts to reduce tensions between the United States and the world's two major Communist powers, the Soviet Union and Red China, rank as top-priority objectives in the coming year.

The Democratic organization in Minnesota has a strong pro-Humphrey cast but this didn't deter McCarthy from urging the state party "to erase old ideas, and in some cases, old loyalties."

Before flying to Minnesota Friday Humphrey spoke in New York at the National Newspaper

Association, an organization representing newspapers. The group is being given a strong rush by the Democratic and Republican contenders.

United States Gains In World Opinion In Quest For Peace In South Vietnam

The United States has made gains in what has developed into a contest to bring world opinion into play in the quest for peace in Vietnam.

Both sides in the Paris talks, deadlocked after six weeks, have laid stress on the role of world opinion. The Americans say the North Vietnamese are misleadingly "The North Vietnamese seem convinced that both world and American opinion are largely on their side."

A survey by Associated Press bureaus shows that in Asia, a critical area of this contest, the rash public criticism of the United States—which was—Vietnamese—escalated—adding

President Johnson, renouncing a new term, declared a limitation on the bombing of North Vietnam.

That move, which led to the talks, was hailed in India as a bold and historic step. It marked the end in India of daily condemnation of the Americans by government and press on the issue of the bombing.

India's leaders long advocated unconditional cessation of the bombing. The Johnson announcement was viewed in New Delhi as a vindication of that stand. Mrs. Indira Gandhi, the prime minister, credited President Johnson with "courageous initiative... of historic significance." 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Results Of Surtax Explained

By EDMOND LE BRETON WASHINGTON (AP) — No, the government is not planning to take a big chunk of tax out of one of your next paychecks. It's all up with the retroactive tax increase Congress has passed.

Moreover, the odds are that you will come up with a big bundle of cash next April when you file your return. These are the best answers now available to the questions naturally raised by the fact that the tax just passed applies to individuals' income back to April.

Here is what will happen: Fifteen days after President Johnson signs the bill, as he is likely to do, your employer will begin withholding 10 per cent more from your pay than he does now. That means 10 per cent more than the 10 per cent of your income. If you are in one of the lowest tax brackets, forget the whole thing. The 10 per cent surtax does not apply to you.

The extra withholding will not, in most cases, cover the extra tax. The difference is simple: 10 per cent extra withholding for half a year equals 5 per cent for the whole year, but it applies to three-fourths of the year. But most people on withholding have more taken out of their pay than they owe in taxes. Many arrange this deliberately, so they will get a refund. The spokesman had this advice for you: if you want to come out next April about what you are now, ask that your first paycheck after the new withholding goes into effect and figure out how much more is being taken out. Then ask your employer to increase the added withholding by half. For example, if \$10 more is being taken out of your pay, ask that it be stepped up to \$15. Then, when settling-up time comes next year you should be about even with your pre-surtax situation. It is better to have the same refund, or liable for about the same amount of extra tax.

(Continued From Page 1) water, paid for in part by the sale of peaking energy. Nothing over-simplified about this, just a hard-nosed look into the future.

"A state water plan is no more accurate than its ability to look into the future," Mr. Crookham said.

The board chairman points out that water for use as water within Idaho is the highest charge to the Idaho Water Resource Board, who must formulate the Idaho plan. A progress report will be made to the legislature in December, 1968.

"The board has entertained some action already," Mr. Crookham points out, "stating that the Salmon River has storage potential to elevation 2,570 but has called for studies of the Salmon system for all uses. The board has also stated that the Middle Snake, above the confluence of the Salmon River, is susceptible to hydroelectric development. These are official Idaho positions as of now."

The December, 1968 progress report, by present estimates, will show that the Snake River Plains do contain more land capable of irrigation than the Snake River flows above Water will accommodate.

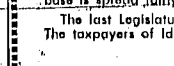
"They're really going to fill up our five-room frame home," the father said. "And there are still a lot of things I have to go."

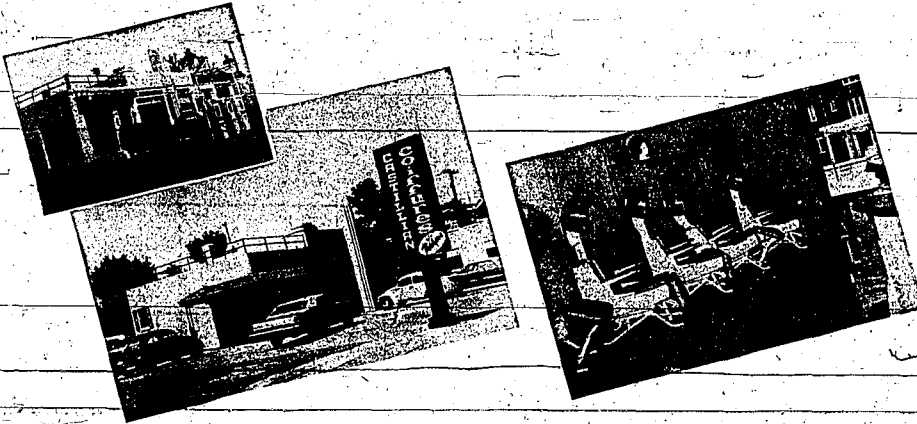

Dr. Molner's Health Column Set For Times-News Debut

Dr. Joseph G. Molner, internationally active in public health work as a doctor "To Your Good Health," receives more than 70,000 letters a month from readers of his newspaper column, which now appears in the Times-News.

"I don't ignore anything that people want to ask about," Dr. Molner explained. "The simple fact is the people sometimes want desperately to know about something concerning health—and are too shy even to ask their own physicians. I suppose at times they spend several days working up courage to ask—and then I get a letter about it."

"I never use the name of a person who writes—just the initials, and sometimes I even change the initials to conceal identity. But I try, soon or later, to answer most questions that come to me. Sometimes hundreds of letters ask essentially the same question, so an answer in the column, addressed to one person, is really addressed to many."

The variety of questions, Dr. Molner admits, is enough to give any physician the jitters because, as he says, "Medicine, today, is such a big subject that no man can master it all, or even try to."

Actually, his column is mainly the work of three men: himself; a close friend and neighbor who is a specialist in internal medicine; and another longtime friend, a science writer of a newspaper.

Dr. Molner adds: "I never let readers think that I am an oracle. I draw on every possible source for the answers I give—and one thing that has pleased me immensely is that other doctors, specialists in their fields, have come to me and volunteered information that has taken many years to assemble. Some are personal friends, and some are men that I have known by reputation only. Yet they write to me with information on technical matters that no one man in several lifetimes could learn."

Dr. Molner is gray-haired, chunky, vigorous and skilled in golf. He plays 18 holes of golf in the 70s and enjoys bowling.

His training, both technical and practical, has been extensive. He was born in Butler, Pa., but has spent his adult years in Detroit, working most of his way through college, a lot of his work having been as a laboratory technician. His medical degree was from Wayne State University, with postgraduate work at Johns Hopkins University. He served as deputy health commissioner, medical director of the health

department and commissioner for many years. As an intern through his original specialty was children's diseases, he tackled a wide variety of medical problems. He studied tropical diseases in Central America; was named to the public health committee of the Foreign Operations Committee; has published 20 or 40 technical papers in medical journals; in 1956 was invited to go to England to address the British Royal Society of Health, the fourth American to be so honored in 15 years.

Recently a Chicago sanitation expert challenged Dr. Molner on a technical question—and was dismayed to learn that Molner was a professor at Wayne State University, lecturer at the University of Michigan, consultant to the International Cooperation Administration, and a member of the E. M. E. R. O. Committee which established the standard rules for control of communicable diseases which is the "Bible" of the American Public Health Association. He also has been a speaker on health matters by invitation in Scotland, Holland, and Denmark.

His medical column, he admits, was begun largely because he thought somebody ought to write one in very plain language, but still keep it as scientifically accurate as a man can do.

Dr. Molner believes the best rule of health is the practice of "moderation."

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Conflict On Purposes Apparent

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER
PARIS (AP) — The dispute between the United States and North Vietnam over whether they are making progress in the Vietnam peace talks springs from their basic conflict of purposes at this stage of the negotiations.

North Vietnam is still trying to maneuver President Johnson into granting a new concession by putting an end to all attacks on North Vietnamese territory.

The United States is trying to maneuver Hanoi into making a concession of its own by curtailing infiltration of troops into South Vietnam.

Public opinion all over the world, but especially in the

United States, is regarded by each side as a weapon to be used against the other in this struggle.

Hanoi, speaking through Ambassador Xuan-Thuy and the rest of its negotiating team, obviously regards pessimism as its most effective public opinion lever.

The theme which Thuy and his spokesmen have been sounding for weeks is that the talks are making no progress because the United States refuses to stop attacking North Vietnam. The way to move toward peace, they argue, is to end the attacks.

On the other hand, U.S. officials have emphasized every indication of movement in the discussions. Their theme has been that in spite of the deadlock slight progress has been made in laying the groundwork for more serious future peace negotiations.

Both assessments are based on what has been happening in Paris since the meetings started May 13. There has been much talk but no progress on the question of how to deescalate the war; there has been some progress in U.S. Ambassador W.

Averell Harriman's effort to develop a cordial, informal relationship with Thuy. Harriman believes this will enable them in coming months to explore secretly the issues of a compromise peace.

The difference in interpretation of these two lines of development erupted into open disagreement Friday.

U.S. Secretary of Defense Clark M. Clifford had said Thursday there were "no straw men" which indicated "some movement" at Paris. Secretary of State Dean Rusk, told newsmen in Washington that he agreed with Clifford. Harriman, leaving for Washington Friday, said "some progress is being made by bits and pieces."

North Vietnamese spokesman Nguyen-Thanh-Le told a news conference in Paris, however, that the talks are "marking time." He said the "absence of progress" was due to the refusal of the United States to end all attacks on North Vietnam and that other subjects could be discussed here.

Behind this propaganda battle lies the hard fact that what is ultimately at issue is a question of military advantage.

President Johnson has said that the bombing of the North Vietnamese panhandle destroys about 20 per cent of the Communist infiltration of troops and supplies into the South. To end the bombing would, by U.S. estimate, give North Vietnam an important military advantage.

On the other hand the United States, from the North Vietnamese point of view, would gain an advantage of great importance: Hanoi substantially curtailed its infiltration into the South.

System Of Education Is OK For Now

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's present system of administering its higher education is being considered adequate for many years, the new executive director for higher education believes.

Dr. Donald L. Keith says he thinks there is little need for two separate administrative boards or for establishment of a chancellor who would direct all colleges and universities.

Recent discussion has generated criticism of the fact the present State Board of Education is a single board in charge of public schools and higher education.

Keith said he does not think criticism that the state board spends too much time on higher education and not enough on public schools is valid.

A proposed constitutional amendment on the November ballot would make the superintendent of public instruction an official appointed by the state board, in a similar manner in which the director for higher education is now appointed.

Keith said he doubted that passage of the amendment would alter state board decisions in allocation of time between public schools and higher education.

William C. Siefert Jr., executive secretary of the State Commission for Higher Education Facilities, said he disagrees with a suggestion that there be two state boards — or divisions of the existing board — for public schools and higher education.

"I think that would be the worst possible thing that could happen," Siefert said.

SAIGON (AP) — Maj. Gen. Nguyen Ngoc Loan, the controversial former chief of South Vietnam's national police, will go to Australia next week for treatment of wounds he received in Saigon street fighting last month, informed sources said today.

Rockefeller Aims Again At Nixon

WILMINGTON, Del. (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller criticized Richard M. Nixon Saturday for not disassociating himself from a Nixon supporter's statement that former Alabama Gov. George C. Wallace belongs in the Republican party.

Rockefeller said Wallace is a racist, and we don't need him. The New York governor paid a 12-hour visit to Delaware via quest for support for the GOP presidential nomination. He spent about an hour closeted with 11 of the state's 12 delegates to the Republican National Convention.

Observers say the delegation is split eight for Nixon and four for Rockefeller, and there were no indications of change after the meeting.

Clayton S. Harrison Jr., state GOP chairman and a delegate, said Rockefeller "impressed me as being a well informed man. My reaction was very positive." But Harrison said he was still a Nixon backer.

Rockefeller's reference to Wallace came at a coffee and party reception in the Hotel DuPont ballroom attended by about 300 persons.

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

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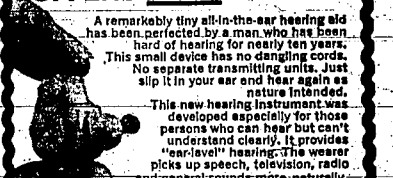

Palmer And Nicklaus May Be Ignored

CLEVELAND (AP) — Glamorous Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus look like mere mortals this week when firing starts in the \$110,000 sixth annual Cleveland Open golf tournament.

Golf fans here will be straining for a look at the pro tour's newest sensation, Lee Trevino of El Paso, Tex.

Trevino, a 28-year-old Mexican-American, passed up the Canadian Open and will be making his first appearance since his brilliant victory in the U.S. Open.

The colorful rags-to-riches professional should be a delight to watch. Unlike Palmer and Nicklaus, he plays extremely fast. No matter how tough the shot or the pressure, he walks up and whacks the ball.

Described as a jokster and a wisecracking comedian, Trevino no keeps up a running conversation with the fans. "When they don't talk to me, I talk to myself," he says.

His \$30,000 victory in the Open was his first professional tournament triumph in a one-year career and his 275 winning total matched the lowest score ever shot in the Open. He'll be gunning for the \$22,000 first prize in this week's tournament.

Nicklaus has never won here and hasn't won a tournament in seven months. But his second-place finish in the Open indicates he may be ready to crack the winner's circle.

Palmer, still the biggest name in golf, has been in a terrible slump but usually plays well here. He won the first Cleveland Open in 1953 in a playoff with the late Tony Lema and Tommy Aaron, lost in a playoff to Lema in 1964, finished 101 in 1965, was well down the list in 1966 and finished in a tie for ninth place last year.

today who hate Negroes, or to again be blunt, and yet they verbally stoned those who do with cries of "traitor." They say kill, "Kill the dirty slugs," bomb them, all." Now, since the basic tenet of Christ was peace, (I seem to recall the phrase "Prince of Peace" used now and then) this attitude of, "Thou shalt not kill, except in massive doses," seems somehow un-Christian.

To hear those who position it with just grievances, and yet they verbally stoned those who do with cries of "traitor." They say kill, "Kill the dirty slugs," bomb them, all." Now, since the basic tenet of Christ was peace, (I seem to recall the phrase "Prince of Peace" used now and then) this attitude of, "Thou shalt not kill, except in massive doses," seems somehow un-Christian.

There are many "Christians" who commit adultery, steal, and lie on a regular basis. But since Christ was not one to go in for such things, it would seem that that too is un-Christian.
And so the "Christian" is really a Christian who has made a great many concessions in the convenience of modern living and a modern world.
One possibility is to change the name from Christian to

Semi-Christian. It's a thought.
It is hard for me to look at a man like the one who sat across from me that Tuesday evening and think of him in the light of, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and thy neighbor as thyself."
Again, does he regard the statement as, "and thy neighbor

as thyself, except for 'all them niggers back east'." Is he one Christian or one of millions? I am afraid he is one of tens of millions.
It is a wonder that a single Negro believes in God at all.
It is a wonder that the children of those Jews who died under the gas "showers" in Germany believe in God at all.
It is a wonder that countries,

so long free from major disease, suddenly suffered from plague and syphilis brought in by missionaries working in the name of "Christianity," now, years later, believe in God at all.
But they do.
Yet it seems as though the Semi-Christian will keep insisting that Christianity is the only path to salvation, while doing what he damn well pleases.

Tender Trap Gets Hagerman Tourists

know about it. Cooperation in the town is good. Law enforcement men, businessmen and residents in general have been helping in the latest effort to "let the public know" about Hagerman. Once a week the Hagerman Valley Chamber of Commerce has been stopping one car, and treating its occupants to a noon dinner and the town's hospitality.

Navy Man Tells Experiences

"I've had to be active on things really get on your nerves," says Mike Barney, who was formerly stationed at Adak, Alaska, on an isolated Aleutian island. Barney found many pursuits which kept him active during his year's stay.

Barney's official capacity was station manager of the radio and television station maintained there. Besides being station manager he became a scuba diver and an actor at the base.

"I joined a club of scuba divers here about four months after my arrival and bought my equipment there," explains Barney. "We had to buy special suits for diving in the 32-degree water of the Bering Sea. The suits helped but it was still pretty cold."

Life on the island for the club divers had to go 120 feet below the surface, but most of the diving after that was at 60 or 70 feet. Members of the club usually explored sunken hulks.

"One time we found a sunken tugboat and managed to salvage a bunch of fishing equipment from it," said Barney. Another time they explored the hulk of a World War I German submarine.

When asked about the danger in such ventures, Barney said it was too cold for sharks, but that killer whales are sometimes sighted.

"We were diving once when we saw one—it took us five minutes to swim half a mile," he said. No one had ever been seriously hurt while diving with the club.

Barney stated that the marine life was fantastic, beautiful, and fun to play with. "Especially the sea otters—they were like pup. There were seals there too, by the millions."

When it was too dark to dive, Mike Barney worked on organizing a theater group, now with 50 members, which produced three plays. They did a murder mystery, "Night of January 16," a Mike Nichols comedy, "Barefoot in the Park," and "Staging 17," the play upon which the television series Hogan's Heroes is based. The performances were held in the Bering Theater.

About the island, Barney said it was green, windy and overcast nearly the whole year. "The temperature averages about 40 degrees on the beach, and the rest of the island is mountainous. There is also the Adak National Forest—it con-

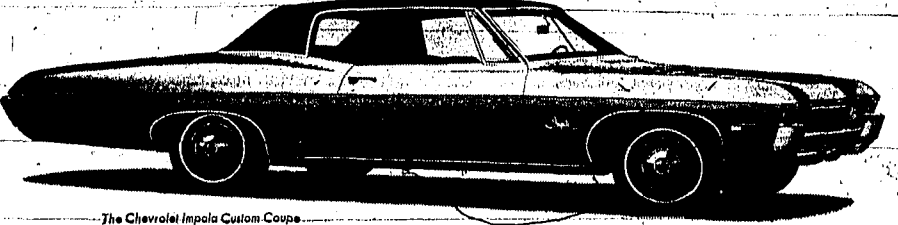

Presidential Politicians Bloom As Perennial Every Four Years

As a "perennial candidate," Norman Thomas is the all-time winner, having made more tries (six) for the Presidency of the U.S. than any other serious candidate in our history.

This year, Harold E. Stassen makes it a three-way tie—with Henry Clay and Eugene V. Debs—for second place in history's "perennial candidate" sweepstakes—Each of these three distinguished gentlemen made five attempts either for a nomination or as a party candidate.

Other men who have played this game in a substantial way down through the years, according to the editors of Encyclopedia Americana were Franklin Delano Roosevelt (the most successful), Martin Van Buren, James Buchanan, and Farrell Dobbs. They made four tries apiece, and for all but Mr. Debs, of the Socialist Worker Party, their persistence and popularity paid off at least once.

There were several who three times sought the nation's highest office, and best-known among them were William Jennings Bryan (1896, 1900 and 1908) and James G. Blaine (1876, 1880 and 1884). Bryan won the Democratic nomination all three times; Blaine got the Republican nomination only once.

Champion long-distance runner Norman Thomas, the Socialist Party candidate, ran in every Presidential election from 1928 through 1952.

Henry Clay was unique among Presidential candidates, for the frequency and strength of his candidacies, as well as for having been a heavyweight in three successive political parties: the Democratic Republicans (1824) and the National Republicans (1832) and the Whigs (1840-1848 and 1848), always without success.

James Buchanan, conversely, started slow and eventually made it big. He tried for the nomination in vain in 1844, 1848 and 1852. The fourth time, in 1856, he defeated the new Republican Party's first candidate, John Charles Fremont, and was elected President.

Farrell Dobbs was a minor (Socialist Workers) party candidate in recent years (1949, 1952, 1956, 1960).

Franklin D. Roosevelt campaigned four times, won the nomination four times, and was elected President four times—a feat achieved by no one before or since his time. Nor will it ever happen again, under the existing constitution, for a President of the U.S. can no longer hold the office for more than two terms.

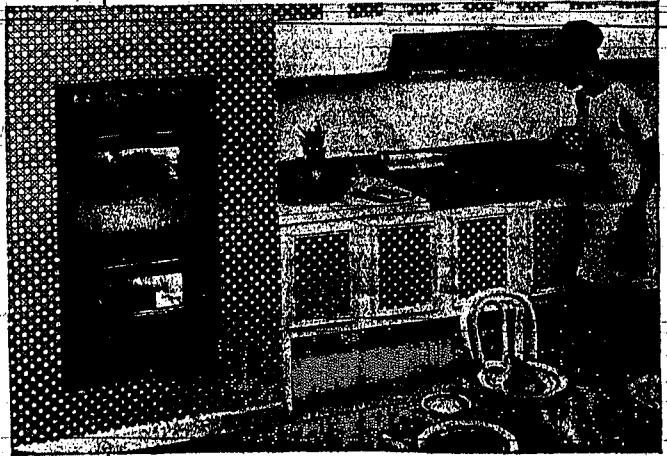

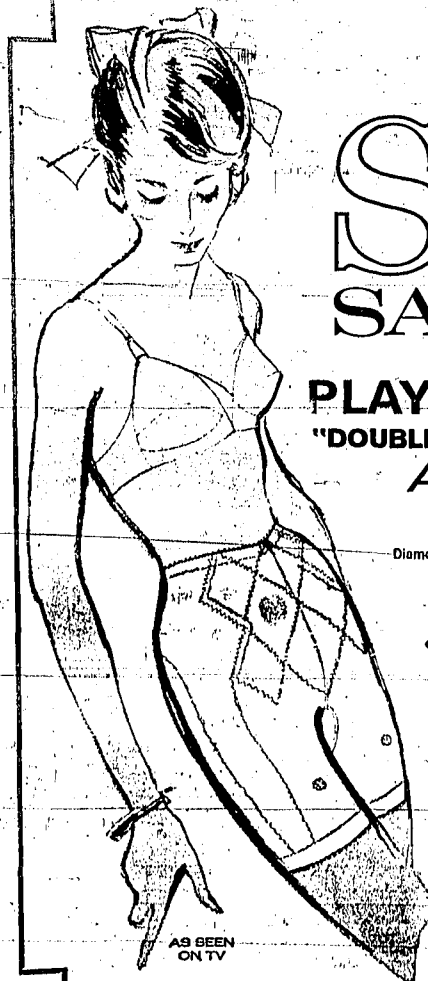

The old gives way to the new, as a service station located on the site of the first "modern" station in Twin Falls, was remodeled and now houses one of the most up-to-date beauty salons in our area, Castilian Coiffures by Parkers.

The salon, located across from Mountain States Telephone Co., is the result of the combined efforts of A. B. Parker and his son, Spencer, director and co-director of Parkers' Hollywood Beauty College.

The service station was originally maintained by Allen Oil Co. in 1918 and according to Eldon G. Bracken, one of the first owners, was Twin Falls' first service station, complete with pumps and "modern" equipment.

A lava angel fountain, a copy of an ancient piece done in Mexico City, is located in the foyer and adds just the right touch to the Spanish surroundings.

The shop includes five stations and can accommodate 10-12 persons at a time, with 10 vibrating, revolving hair dryers. The styling chairs are all operated by electricity. The staff includes six, with five beauty operators employed full time.

A private showing was held Wednesday evening for Magic Valley salon owners and open house is scheduled for the first week in July, although the new shop is open for business now. Plans for this building were completed last November, with Mr. Parker beginning the remodeling April 10.

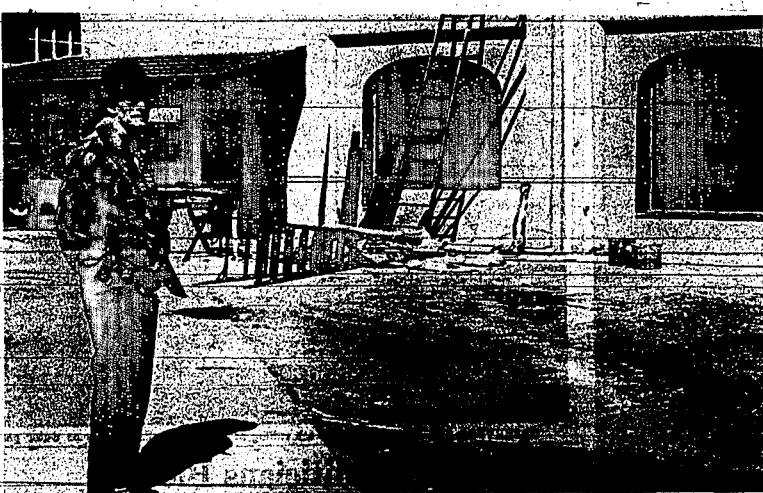

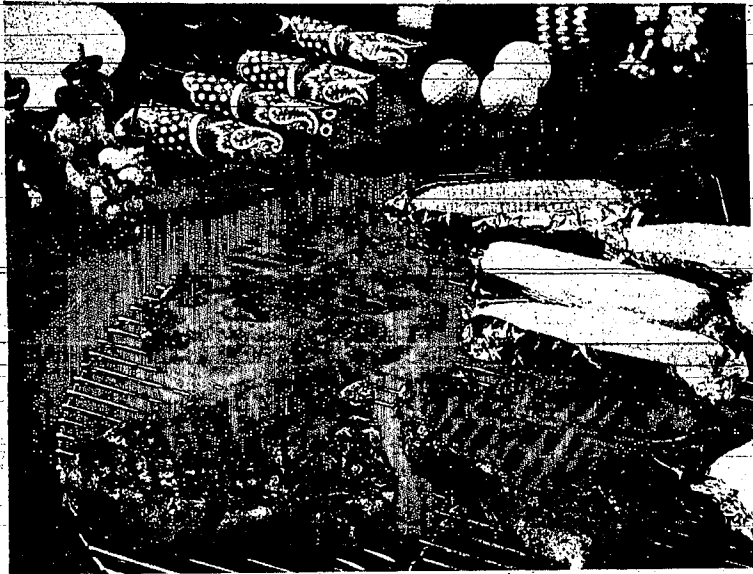

Entertaining Friends?-- Try An Outdoor Barbecue

Every good cook's repertoire should include recipes for outdoor cooking -- and now might be a good time for all good wives to come to the aid of their husband's cookouts -- namely with a few new menu ideas.

Since hubby seems to have taken over the backyard entertaining -- you must do your suggesting, very subtly though, so he thinks it was his idea all the time. Barbecuing is one of the simplest and most enjoyable ways to entertain family and friends and as the man of the house demonstrates his skill as "king for a day" at the barbecue, plan ahead with a few friendly nomenclature tips. Don't discourage your backyard kitchen executive -- just suggest.

Barbecuing is fun and summer time is the time for relaxation and easy informality. All you need is a little advanced planning, imaginative ideas, hot coals in the barbecue and most of all -- some good tasty recipes.

Through the courtesy of the Barbecue Briquet Institute several new menu ideas have been supplied by the National Live Stock and Meat Board.

One suggestion is for beef porterhouse steaks.

When individual steaks are selected, they can be served rare or medium-done as each member of the family wishes. There's a difference of two to five minutes total cooking time between rare and medium when one-inch-thick steaks are used. It's a little more of a difference with thicker steaks, but to a steak fancier the degree of doneness is important.

Let briquets burn until gray before placing steaks on the grill. If a grill thermometer is used, it should register 350 degrees for the cooking period. The grill may be rubbed with a piece of suet trimmed from the outside edge of the steak, if desired, to prevent sticking.

Place steaks on grill and let cook eight to 10 minutes. Turn with tongs. Season with salt and pepper. Let other side brown, about eight to 10 minutes. Total cooking time for a one-inch thick porterhouse steak will be 18 to 20 minutes for rare, and 20 to 25 minutes for medium-done.

The one-inch thick porterhouse steak weighs from one and one-quarter to two pounds while those cut one and one-half inches thick weigh from two to three pounds. Here are two zesty tidbits to add

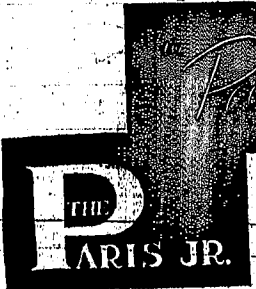

MUSHROOM CAPS—
CAULIFLOWERETTES
8 to 12 fresh mushroom caps
8 to 12 fresh medium-sized
cauliflowerettes
2 cups boiling water
1/2 cup vinegar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon olive seed
1/2 garlic clove, quartered

Add mushrooms and cauliflow-
erettes to boiling water. Cover
tightly and cook slowly for five
minutes, or until vegetables are
tender. Drain. Combine one-half
cup water, vinegar, salt, sugar,
dill seed and garlic. Add vine-
gar mixture to cooked vegeta-
bles. Cover tightly and marinate
in refrigerator for at least 12
hours. Turn at least one while
marinating. Drain and serve
with steak. If desired, these
may be threaded on wooden
skewers.

For the finest flavor and en-
joyment of fish, the "Whole
Fish Grilled in Foil" is the an-
swer. Handling fish, particularly
a big one that you want to keep
whole, presents a problem. Be-
cause of its size, it's unwieldy
and since it is delicate, it breaks
easily during cooking. Grilling
in heavy duty foil will do it
tough.

**WHOLE FISH
GRILLED IN FOIL**
4 to 7 pound fish, cleaned
Butter or margarine
1 medium onion, sliced thin
Salt and pepper
Fresh Tarragon, parsley,
thyme and lemon.

Leave head on fish. If desired,
Remove eye and insert small
green pepper circle. Spread a
little butter or margarine in the
corner of a heavy duty heavy
duty foil and arrange onion
slices on it. Sprinkle fish cavity
with salt, pepper, herbs and a
little tarragon. Rub butter on
foil and again sprinkle with
seasonings. Dot with butter.
Bring foil up over fish, sealing
edges with double fold. Seal
both ends. Place on grate over
medium hot briquet fire.

Cook a three to five pound
fish 25 minutes, and five to
seven pound fish, 30 minutes,
turning once or twice. Fish can
be brown a little through foil. While
fish cooks, make a tent of foil
for the final grill. Tear off
foil somewhat longer than the
fish and create along length-
wise center. When baking time
is finished, open the foil package
and turn back foil crimping it
neatly.

Place tent over package al-
lowing space for heat to circu-
late up and around. Cook 10
minutes longer or until fish can
be flaked with a fork. To serve,
remove tent, slide foil with fish
onto tray. Border with baked
tomatoes and lemon slices.

BAKED TOMATOES
Slice firm tomatoes in half.
Sprinkle with salt, pepper, a
little finely chopped onion and
parsley. Dot with butter. Wrap
each half in a square of foil and
cook on grill for 10 minutes,
or until just beginning to soften.

FOIL BAKED POTATOES
Scrub large baking potatoes.
Rub with butter, margarine or
other flavorful fat. Wrap in foil.
Place on grill around outer edge
and bake one hour, turning two
or three times. Test for doneness
by piercing through foil
with a fork.

Meat and fruit combinations,
so popular in Oriental cuisine,
form the heart of the outdoor
barbecue grill, and the com-
bined ingredients in the follow-
ing two barbecue sauce recipes
improve the flavor of chicken,
steak, spareribs, hamburgers
and franks. For an added treat
place drained cherry peach halves
on grill the last five minutes
cooking time and brush lightly
with barbecue sauce.

2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
1 (8-ounce) tomato sauce

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BOB SEAGREN—

Our High-Flying Hope
for an Olympic Rout

In a world of monastic athletes, this handsome vaulter swings from a catapult-like pole—and through a fun-filled life

HANDSOME Bob Seagren, possibly the world's greatest pole vaulter, has a page full of records, but one he remembers clearly was a 17-foot-7-inch vault last year in San Diego.

"I was going with a girl then, and it was her birthday. Just as a joke, I told her, 'I'm going to set a record for you today. I didn't really expect to, but it went right, and I did.'"

Was the girl properly grateful?

Seagren hems and haws and finally says, "I guess you could say so. At least I still remember that record first of all."

This week Bob Seagren is scheduled to try out for something more important to him than a record and even more important than a pretty girl. The high-flying hopeful from the University of Southern California will be vaulting at Los Angeles for a place on the U.S. Olympic team which will represent us in Mexico City in October.

U.S. Olympic fortunes are notoriously poor in winter Olympics, but with superb athletes in track and field—Seagren, miler Jim Ryun; shot-putter Randy Matson—and even greater swimmers—Debby Meyers and Don Schollander—the summer Olympics should bring enough first-place medals to reverse America's gold flow.

All the athletes, of course, are dedicated, but Seagren's dedication stops short of the monastic regimen of, say, a Jim Ryun. "I like vaulting, but if I couldn't have fun, I'd quit."

"I got a lot of razzing at school about the way you magazine guys

write me up as a playboy, always making sure my hair is just right even after a vault. I don't care too much—maybe it helps me in my social life."

Seagren, the 21-year-old son of a market-development executive for Pepsi-Cola, lives in a trophy-laden bachelor's apartment four blocks off campus. He is a little hazy about his educational goals—it took considerable prepping to get him into USC—and in talking about his future, he may fantasize a budding career in public relations, representing a U.S. sporting-goods manufacturer in Europe, or becoming a movie star. ("I haven't tested yet, but some people are interested.")

Seagren has been pointing his performances toward a June peak all year, although the way he paces himself makes physical-education experts to shake their heads. Mornings are for class, afternoons for working out with USC middle-distance runners and developing further the amazing deltoid and trapezius muscles in his upper arms and shoulders. Bob takes to the pole only a few times weekly in practice, though strictly for form. "My nights are my own," he adds cryptically.

On Fridays Bob usually is off by plane—"The hardest thing about being a pole vaulter," he laments, "is finding a cab driver who'll carry you and your 16-foot pole" to Albuquerque, New York, Philadelphia, or wherever there's a track meet. He may participate in a Friday night meet in Boston, take in the town from 11 to 2 or 3 a.m., then catch a morning plane to Los Angeles for another meet Saturday night.

"I'm young," he says matter-of-

factly. "I can take it. When you are enjoying yourself, you can't burn yourself out."

His older brother Art started Bob pole vaulting. "Art would get the poles they use to wrap rugs around and vault from roof to roof. I followed. Once I missed a roof and caught a clothesline on the Adam's apple. Boy, I've had poles crack under me, and I've hit down hard, but I remember that jolt best."

Memories of the Seagren boys flying roof-to-roof almost convulses the amiable, uncomplicated youth in laughter. "Our neighbor had a pond in his yard, and I vaulted it one day. Art called out, 'Here I come, too.' I looked around just in time to see him sail right into the water. It was like a slapstick movie—he came up spitting mud, water, and goldfish. It's always been fun for us, not work, though there's plenty of that in getting in shape."

Every time Seagren breaks a record, another USC vaulter, Paul Wilson, tops it—until Seagren tops Wilson's mark. The same give-and-take situation used to exist between Seagren and John Pennell, who was his mentor and roommate until last year. Pole vaulters traditionally are the

eccentrics of the track-and-field crowd, yet they seemingly are devoid of envy or jealousy. Seagren, Wilson, Pennell—and others—are almost rooting sections for one another's achievements.

"It's no fun without competition," Bob explains. "That's why I prefer the outdoor to the indoor season—there's more fellows competing. Paul and I run together weekdays and watch films of our jumps and point out each other's mistakes. Without the others, there wouldn't be much kick to pole vaulting."

The outstanding competition this week at Los Angeles should be enough "fun" even for Bob Seagren. A sometimes erratic vaulter, Bob is by no means a cinch-to-run away-with-qualifying-honors. But beneath that easygoing exterior is a highly motivated young man.

"Vaulting has allowed me to see this country—and 12 others. And every time I come home to this country, I love it more. I sure want to be in Mexico City with our team and do a good job for America."

The second motivation is that Bob is going with a new girl—one without a single pole-vaulting record to her credit. ♦

Miss Furness, a door-to-door salesman has offered to fix my roof at a bargain price. Should I take him up on it?

Not without checking him out first. We've all heard stories of slick door-to-door salesmen who've unloaded shoddy goods or goods that never arrived on unsuspecting consumers. Of all of these hit-and-run swindles, the home-improvement racket is the worst.

Perhaps the man may offer you a special factory deal, a bargain price, or some similar gimmick. Often, half-way through his work, he will "discover" something else that needs fixing at an additional "bargain" price.

When he's through, it may turn out you've paid an exorbitant sum for shoddy improvements you really may not have needed in the first place. Or he may quickly sell the contract you've signed to someone else. When you complain, these new people tell you they're not responsible.

No doubt there are shady businessmen whom you have to telephone yourself or see in their own offices. But the door-to-door people seem to have the most offenders. That's why, before you sign anything, you should double-check with the Better Business Bureau and also compare prices with the established business people in your area.

What can I do if I think I've been swindled?

You should contact your local district attorney or the Better Business Bureau. You may not be able to get your money back, but at least you can help protect other people from the same frauds by alerting authorities.

The way the law stands now, some people can go on doing business even if you or the government has brought action against them. We have asked Congress to give the Federal Trade Commission new powers that will enable it to stop the swindles immediately, rather than having to wait while court action is pending.

Congress passed a "Truth-in-Lending" bill last month. Will this make shopping for money simple and safe?

Simple, yes. Safe, no. Whether it will be safe or not depends on whether

people take advantage of it.

Briefly, it requires finance companies, banks, and other lenders to tell borrowers and credit customers of the dollars-and-cents cost of their loans. You can see in a moment what the credit costs are, and you can do comparison shopping. The bill also restricts garnishment of wages for debts and makes extortion by loan sharks a Federal offense.

Congress recently passed a Truth-in-Packaging bill, but when I go to the supermarket I still see so many different sizes of the same thing that I feel I need a slide-rule to choose. What's going on?

No wonder you're confused. We know that there are 57 sizes of toothpaste, 30 sizes of hair spray, and 200 sizes of paper towels. The Truth-in-Packaging bill hopes to end this chaos. The bill calls for voluntary standards to be set by business. When it was passed, two industries—the instant-coffee and instant-potato people—volunteered immediately to get to work on setting their standards. There are indications that other industries will follow suit.

The government would prefer voluntary self-regulation by business. But if it fails to act, then the bill calls for the Secretary of Commerce to advise Congress at the end of a year as to whether new legislation is needed.

What information do I have a right to expect from the manufacturer of a product?

I think the consumer should be told what a product will do, what it contains, how long it will last, and what it costs to operate. You should be told all the do's and don'ts that go into using the product. For example, the refrigerator people will tell you the total cubic footage of the refrigerator, but this doesn't take into account the special features that may take up some of this space. I think they should tell you the actual usable capacity.

We're working with industry to get them to provide this sort of reasonable information. They tend to hesitate, especially about giving the life expectancy of a product because

this does depend on who uses the product, how they use it, and where they use it. But I think an educated guess, based on average usage, would be reasonable.

Why can't I ever buy an appliance and expect it to last at least until I've finished paying for it?

That's one of the most common complaints—and a fair one. The President has instructed me, the chairman of the FTC, and the Secretaries of Commerce and Labor to work with industry on solving this.

The major problem seems to be that, although almost every appliance comes with a warranty or a guarantee, they're written in such complicated language that consumers can't understand them. What we need are guarantees that are simply written, that say what they mean and mean what they say.

They should tell you exactly what

parts are guaranteed and for how long. They should state who's responsible—the store or the manufacturer. They should tell you what the limitations are, such as accident, misuse, fire, flood, or act of God. A major washing-machine company recently has done just this and, to boot, it simplified the warranty into a letter that anyone can understand. We're hoping that other manufacturers will follow their lead.

When my nephew came home from Vietnam, he found that his auto-insurance premium had been raised because he'd been out of the country. Is this fair?

No, it's not. We are now undertaking a major survey of auto insurance, and there seem to be a lot of things that need looking into. The time lag between filing a claim and getting action is often terribly long. Some people are not paid enough for damages and injuries, and others

seem to be paid too much. Too many people have too much trouble getting insurance—at a decent price. There is discrimination against special groups, such as returning veterans, clergymen, doctors, divorcees, young people, and minority groups.

Nobody knows yet what the solution to the auto-insurance problem will be, but one suggestion that has been made is to make auto insurance more like fire insurance. If your house burns down, you don't have to find the fire bug and sue him or his insurance company. Instead, you carry your own protection.

With all the frauds and unfair practices that are going on are businessmen today more dishonest?

I really can't say because I wasn't working in this field, say, 20 years ago. But the market price is a great deal more complicated than it used to be. Though the frauds are often what make the headlines, my office is concerned with more than that. We're trying to make the market place a simpler place to deal in.

Take the question of fabrics! It used to be that if you bought a dress, you could tell by just looking what it was made of—wool, cotton or silk—and then you knew how to clean and care for it. Today there are so many synthetic fabrics that you can't tell what anything is made of.

Under Esther Peterson, my predecessor, a Fabrics Commission was set up to compile a glossary and guide for the care of all these fabrics. This information has been simplified and coded into labels that could be permanently sewn into every garment. Now the question is: will the apparel people use these labels on a voluntary basis?

How safe are the fish and poultry I buy?

There's no way of knowing, but a certain percentage is below standard. Fish is hardly inspected at all, and 13 percent of the total poultry is not Federally inspected. That's 1.6 billion pounds, which can add up to quite a stomach ache. Where there is state inspection, often only the plants are inspected, not the poultry itself.

We'd like Congress to pass a bill

making fish and poultry as safe as meat, and such a bill is now in the hearing stage. In the meantime, you're probably safer sticking to the major distributors. You might ask your supermarket manager where he buys his poultry. If he gets it from out of state, then you know it has been Federally inspected.

Who's to blame for the grocery gap—the difference between what the farmer gets and what I spend at the store?

I don't know who the rascal is or if there is one. But the farmers are not getting a fair price, and the consumer certainly is paying enough. We need a faster, more efficient way to get food to the consumer.

How can I protect myself against dishonest repairmen?

Nowadays, it's hard to find any repairman, much less a competent one. You have to hope that you find someone you like or who comes recommended by a friend. There is not so much fraud but rather too few people in this field. And that means room for incompetence. We are not considering legislation in this area so much as trying to help industry; serve the public better.

I know that a Recreational Water Safety bill has been proposed. Does this mean I'll have to have a license to drive my own boat?

We won't know that until our study in this area is completed. But it is now all too easy to get in trouble with a boat. Anybody can get behind a wheel, and so we do need some safety regulations. Beyond this, we also need programs to remove dangerous debris from our lakes and rivers, safety patrols and inspections, and better testing of boats and safety equipment. A friend of mine, fed up with the space his lifesaving equipment took, tossed it all overboard—and it sank immediately.

I read that some color tv sets give off radiation. True? Are such sets still around in the stores?

It was found that certain color tv sets did give off radiation from the bottom of the set. The manufacturers recalled the sets, but did not get all of them back. And when the

sets were adjusted, it was then found that the radiation came out of the sides of the sets. Instead of adjusting certain color sets, it seems that when you push up the voltage on one of the "gizmos," it gives off radiation.

How dangerous is this? It's hard to say. If a child is sitting in front of one of these sets today, we might have to wait 20 years to know what the eventual damage is. Of course, we don't want to wait. There should be standards to eliminate this threat.

The President has asked Congress to pass the Hazardous Radiation Act which would give the Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare the power to set and enforce standards of safety and to require manufacturers to recall bad equipment.

Is the Federal government poking its nose into places where it doesn't belong?

I don't think so. In all cases, the government would prefer that industry solve its own problems. It's only where industry falls down on the job of self-regulation that the government has to step in.

Where possible, it should be left to the city and state governments, but there are some things only the Federal government seems able to handle. Take the Wholesome Meat Act that was passed last year. It came some 60 years after Upton Sinclair first exposed the conditions in the meat plants in his book, "The Jungle." The industry and the states had all that time to take action, but they didn't.

How do you work with business for self-regulation?

We meet with them constantly. We might say, "We feel such-and-such is a problem; what do you think you can do about it?" They are more than willing to talk because business is inordinately opposed to Federal legislation. So they will talk, and I believe they are making an effort in many cases to set up the needed reforms and standards by themselves.

The President has just appointed a Consumer's Lawyer. How will his office operate?

The job is so new that it hasn't

taken shape yet. But two of the vital things he will do is to represent the consumer in front of regulatory agencies and also to file suits on behalf of the consumer.

In safeguarding his dollar, what can the consumer do?

Be careful. Take time when you shop; get educated about the market place. Food is always the focal point of the consumer's annoyance because it's so constant. You might buy a car and pay \$200 more just because you like one better than the other. You make the decision only once. But think how many decisions you have to make to save \$200 on food. You're a long time comparing labels to do that. You've got to be sensible.

Some time back, a group of housewives went on strike against a supermarket. How successful was that?

It was successful, but not in the way the housewives expected. The supermarket did reduce its prices for a while, but then it went right back up. But the housewives let the food people know they were paying attention and watching them closely. That's important.

As you began your job and started looking into the consumer field, what surprised you most?

When I began, I was a better shopper than I was given credit for being. So there weren't many surprises. The biggest surprise were the number, and variety of problems in the field and the size and complexity of the market place.

Does the old slogan caveat emptor ("let the buyer beware") still hold? What obligation do I have as a consumer to be informed?

You have to do the best you can. You should pay attention to whatever information you're given. Read the instructions carefully and try to understand what the product will and won't do. Most importantly, you should give your business to the people who give you the best break. That's the name of the whole game. If you reward better practices, better service, and better information, then you're using your dollars where they count the most. ♦

Summer Salad Buffet

Luncheon meat, vegetables, and sweet pickles are teamed with the macaroni in this attractive meal-in-one salad bowl.

Here's cooling and tempting buffet fare for a summer luncheon or supper. Include hot rolls and broiled tomato halves for the "something hot" on this pleasing and colorful menu.

Main Dish Macaroni Salad

Stand vegetable sticks such as carrot, zucchini, celery, and cucumber in mugs of crushed ice to accompany this pretty, pastel salad.

- 4 cups (1 lb.) elbow macaroni
- 1 can (12 oz.) luncheon meat, cubed
- ½ cup sweet fresh cucumber pickle slices
- ½ cup green pepper pieces
- ½ cup sliced green onion (including tops)
- 1 teaspoon Accent
- ½ to ¾ teaspoon tarragon leaves, crushed
- ½ teaspoon seasoned pepper
- Bottled French dressing
- 1 can asparagus spears, drained
- Crisp lettuce
- ½ cup shredded carrot
- Green pepper ring

1. Cook macaroni in boiling salted water as directed on package; drain, rinse, and drain again.
2. In a large bowl, toss the cooked macaroni, luncheon meat, and next six ingredients with ¾ cup of the salad dressing. Cover and chill thoroughly, at least 2 hrs.
3. Pour about ¼ cup of the salad dressing over drained asparagus in a dish. Cover and chill.
4. Line a large salad bowl with the lettuce, turn salad mixture into bowl, and garnish with the shredded carrot and an asparagus bun-

die (the marinated asparagus in the green pepper ring).

5. Serve with additional dressing and deviled eggs. *8 servings*

Cucumber-Pineapple Cocktail

Put 2¼ cups (1-pt. 2-oz. can) chilled unsweetened pineapple juice, ¼ teaspoon seasoned salt, and 1 cut-up seeded pared cucumber into the container of an electric blender. Cover and blend. Serve in low 4- to 6-oz. glasses. Score and thinly slice cucumber. Pull the stem end of a small sprig of watercress through the center of each slice; float in each. *About 3 cups*

Lemon Cloud Pie

1. baked 9-in. pastry shell
- ¼ cup sugar
- 1 tablespoon (1 enr.) unflavored gelatin
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 5 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- ½ cup water
- ½ cup lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon peel
- ½ teaspoon vanilla extract
- 5 egg whites
- ½ cup sugar

1. Blend in the top of a double boiler ½ cup sugar, the gelatin, and salt. Gradually add a mixture of the egg yolks, water, and lemon juice, stirring constantly.

2. Continue to stir and cook over boiling water until gelatin is completely dissolved and mixture is slightly thickened.
3. Remove from water and stir in the lemon peel and extract. Cool slightly. Chill until mixture begins to gel (becomes slightly thicker); stir occasionally.
4. Beat the egg whites until frothy. Gradually add ½ cup sugar, continuing to beat until stiff peaks are formed. Turn slightly thickened gelatin mixture onto beaten egg whites and gently fold together. Turn filling into pastry shell.
5. Chill until firm; garnish as desired with lemon. *One 9-in. pie*

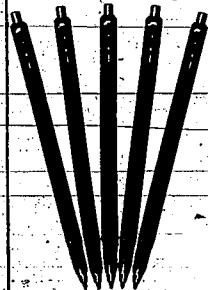

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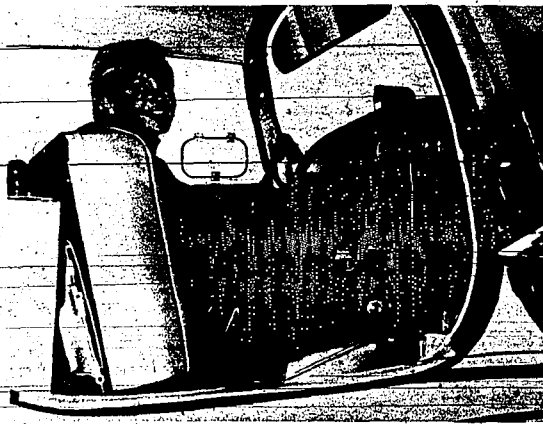
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I Flew the Atlantic—Solo!

SLOWLY my single-engine plane climbed up from the granite peaks of Narsarsuaq, the Greenland fjord. Above me, the sky was overcast. I seemed to be trapped between them. I had to find a hole to get through.

When I finally did, I lost all ground references. I had no navigation because the radio ship's radar beacon way out in the Atlantic, was out of commission.

At 13,000 feet, I had to rely on sheer dead reckoning for the next four hours, hoping that I was compensating correctly for the wind as I headed for Iceland across the vastness of Greenland.

I was flying solo, yet I was not really afraid, although once I was so scared of flying, I took the train wherever I went.

There were good reasons for me to be scared, too. It all dates back to my flight in a Boeing 707 nine years ago—a jet that took a 30,000-foot dive suddenly, which nobody expected to survive.

Until then, I had accepted flying like most people. True, three times my mother, an astrologer, had cautioned me not to get on a plane. And each time she was justified. The first time my plane had lost two engines in a violent storm. The other two times I took her advice and stayed off the planes. Both crashed. Thereafter I always checked with her—except for that fateful flight from Paris to New York.

Next to me on that flight was a Hollywood-type character, tall, con-celcted, handsome. I didn't like him. Suddenly, for no apparent reason, the plane went into this terrible dive.

The "G" forces pulled my head forward until it felt like it would break off. My eyes and teeth felt like they were being pulled out. Like everybody else, I was sure we were going to die.

People began to scream, and the strapping young man next to me screamed loudest of all. I don't know how long the dive lasted. Maybe no more than three minutes. It seemed like an eternity till the cap-

tain finally pulled out of it.

We flew for another half an hour until we made an emergency landing in Gander. None of us felt like getting on the relief plane they sent for us, but somehow we did.

On the final lap of the flight—from Gander to New York—we lost our oxygen supply. And when we landed, we were told about another plane that crashed in Long Island Sound just hours before. I'd had it with flying!

For two years after that, except for one flight to New York which I slept through, I was too terrified to get on another plane. As a result, I lost out on a lot of acting parts.

Then one night I went to a night club to see Pat Collins, the well-known hypnotist. I didn't know that one of my friends had told Pat about my fear of flying. When she saw me, she offered to help me get over it.

She did nothing jazzy. Just sat me down, hypnotized me, and said, "Susan, you will remember that you used to love flying and that you used to feel safe."

Two days later I got a call to fly to Texas for a tv show appearance. I was excited when I got on the plane. As we picked up speed heading down the runway, I had a feeling of exhilaration. My fear of flying was a thing of the past!

Then, about three years ago, a friend invited me to fly in his private plane. But those small planes didn't appeal to me, and it took months before I finally agreed to go.

I was scared at first, but the day after flying with him I found myself signing up for pilot instruction. Two months later, after soloing, I got my private license.

The idea of flying to Europe started a year later. I was studying Russian at the time and a friend suggested, "Why don't you fly to Russia?" I said, "Sure, why not?"

When I started to check into it, I found out that while a few women had flown single-engine planes across the Atlantic before, none had ever done it under the observance of the National Aeronautic Association, the only agency that could certify any speed record.

In my naïveté, I had no idea what was involved, such as survival training, familiarity with special compasses, how to use an automatic pilot and other special equipment.

She had a morbid fear of flying, says this popular actress, so she made herself pilot a single-engine plane on a record-smashing trip to Europe

For weeks, pilot friends of mine helped me to learn to fly by dead reckoning. They took me out over water, took away my instruments, made me get lost. Then I had to find my way back. They simulated all kinds of emergencies.

Many tried to discourage me. I was warned that even today few people go in single-engine planes across the Atlantic and that, being a pilot for such a short time, I was an idiot to plan it.

With all the training I did the few weeks before my flight, I still had only 15 actual instrument hours to my credit and scarcely 500 flying hours altogether. I found it tremendously complicated to take off from a big airport like LaGuardia. I'd been given certain clearances, and they were amended just before I took off and then changed again. It's easy to get confused!

But what a wonderful feeling as the plane lifted off at last, heading for my first stop—Moncton, New Brunswick. The flight in the single-engine Aero Commander 200 took me on a 6,269 mile half-circle, from LaGuardia to New Brunswick, Labrador, Greenland, Iceland, Scotland, and into Copenhagen. The estimated flying time was 22 hours and 25 minutes, but due to inclement weather, the flight took 4 week because I had to wait four days for the weather to clear up. The actual flying time was about 25 hours.

There were some frightening moments other than my climb out of the Greenland fjord. The most rugged part of the trip was the leg between Iceland and Scotland. When I took off from Reykjavik, the plane's door opened. The noise was simply horrendous, but I didn't want to go roaming around the cockpit to pull it shut.

I also encountered icing. I had no choice but to drop below freezing level. The ice sounded like a machine gun when it broke off the propeller and hit the windshield.

The trip's climax was my arrival in Scotland. It was night and raining hard. They had bagpipes waiting for me, and when I jumped out of the plane, three policemen "arrested" me for not having the right papers. Luckily it was just a gag. There was only one disappointment about the trip. My visa to Moscow didn't come through.

My first reaction after I got back back home was, now that I've done it, I'll stick to knitting.

That feeling didn't last long, I am studying charts of the Pacific now. After all, I already speak Japanese. ♦

THE LAS VEGAS legend still exists of little old ladies cranking the arms of slot machines, of "high rollers" at the dice tables and roulette wheels, of millions of lights and miles of beckoning neon signs.

For Las Vegas is first and foremost the world's biggest gambling machine, and it is gambling that has turned this dry, once forbidding desert into a glittering oasis that drew 14.5 million visitors in 1967. It is gambling that makes it possible—even necessary—for each of a dozen superbaroque hotels to offer the world's greatest bargains in big-name entertainment.

To keep the guests' rooms filled and the guests close to the action, a typical Las Vegas hotel has an entertainment budget of \$100,000 a week. The flashing signs that proclaim the superstar in attendance cost up to \$1 million. At the same time this summer you will find Broadway's "Fiddler on the Roof," the Folies Bergères and the Paris Lido shows, Ella Fitzgerald, Red Skelton, Phyllis Diller, Milton Berle, Roger Williams, Eddie Fisher, Connie Francis, Kay Starr, and dozens of other stars playing the Strip. The most it would cost you to see the show is a \$6 or \$8 dinner—about a third of the price of such an evening in New York, Miami, or San Francisco.

The old Las Vegas attitude used to be: never let the guest outside. Once inside one of its lush palaces, time stopped. The great casino lobbies were cunningly constructed so that no sunlight seeped in. Even now no clocks are visible; no croupier wears a watch. Breakfast is served 24 hours a day, and bedrooms have sunproof shutters to keep out the blaze of day.

But in 1959 Las Vegas opened its great flying saucer of a Convention Hall and a new kind of tourist began coming—the conventioneer and his family. Hotels, becoming aware that you cannot fill 25,000 tourist beds with just "high rollers"

and little old ladies, began to let sunshine leak in. They built swimming pools, tennis courts, and golf courses—there are 10 18-hole layouts patching the desert with green. The newest slogan is "come—and bring the family."

Several hotels have added nursery and baby-watching services. And one adventurous young couple just opened a facility that could be a pattern for resort complexes everywhere. Sy and Lenette Ogulnick, both former schoolteachers, have built a \$300,000 Children's Center only one mile from the Las Vegas Strip.

They have a 9,000 square-foot multipurpose dining room, auditorium and gymnasium, a heated swimming pool, tennis courts, athletic fields, and a woodland camping site.

There are dormitories for boys and girls—age range from 6 to 16. The Ogulnicks will pick up children at any Las Vegas hotel and keep them for the day—from 8:30 to 5:30 or on a full room-and-board basis. Day camping costs \$10, overnight \$20 or \$120 a week.

The Center has a faculty of teachers and advanced students from Southern Nevada University who are ready to tutor children in subjects that may have given them trouble during the school year or to teach them guitar, tennis, skiing, riding—anything the child wants.

For families who want to play together, Las Vegas is a hub for excursions to Lake Mead, formed by the towering arc of Hoover Dam, the highest in the Western hemisphere. The lake has a 500-mile shore line and is a haven for waterfowl, Rocky Mountain sheep, deer, and coyote can be spotted from the shore. There is no closed fishing season—in fact, fishing is legal night and

day, and 600,000 fish were taken last year.

There are a dozen marinas on the lake, and boats can be hired for water skiing, fishing, or exploring such fascinating desert-rock formations as Iceberg Canyon, Napoleon's Tomb, and Swallow Cove.

Only an hour farther away are Zion National Park and Bryce Canyon, two glories of the American West, with cliffs, buttes, and mesas as spectacularly colored as the Grand Canyon.

If conventions and the family have wrought one significant change in this desert city, a more dramatic change could be in the offing. Howard Hughes, America's mysterious billionaire, seems to be buying up Nevada. Quietly, from his headquarters in the Desert Inn, he has purchased 14 percent of Las Vegas' hotel-and-gambling facilities for upwards of \$150 million.

He also has bought the nearby Krupp ranch, Thunderbird Field, tv station KLAS, the Taylor ranch, Alamo Airways, and untold stretches of prime land along the Strip. He plans to build a monorail to serve his empire on the Strip—and Hughesland may soon make Disneyland look like a county fair by comparison.

Visualize then, if you can, Las Vegas 1975—with its monorail down the glittering Strip, the desert converted to green with new irrigation projects, families on vacation—and, of course, tireless little old ladies with paper cups full of coins in their left hand and a strong right hand on a one-armed bandit. ♦

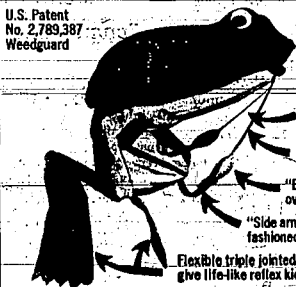

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How We Can Spot Tomorrow's Killers

Childhood clues can single out potential murderers, says this sociologist, and give us time to curb their violence

AN ENRAGED Minnesota farmer shoots his wife dead and sets fire to their house, cremating their four children.

In a Michigan mining town, a middle-aged janitor, who seemed to be "an all-right guy," grabs a high-powered rifle and suddenly kills seven townspeople.

Once every 48 minutes someone in the U.S. commits murder. Yet as different as all the killings appear, the crimes have a single common denominator that makes them doubly tragic: virtually all could have been predicted years before they happened!

Studies which I headed a decade ago produced guidelines by which violent criminals of the future can be detected with almost absolute certainty in childhood. The "predictability factors," if coupled with an imaginative program of counseling and treatment, could in all probability be preventing much of today's violence. Yet, ironically, these findings are nowhere being used in any anticrime effort.

My findings actually got under way at Harvard University years before I became a sociologist. In 1935, Dr. Richard Clarke Cabot, a professor of social ethics, there, recruited 1,000 boys from the slums of Cambridge and Somerville, Mass., for an anti-delinquency experiment. The youngsters were either eight or nine years old and represented a racial and ethnic cross-section. None had yet acquired a police record.

In the opinion of teachers, ministers, and others who knew them, half of Cabot's group were boys who

would eventually "go bad." The other half were considered to be intrinsically "good" boys.

For several years Cabot arranged for half of the "good boys" and half of the "bad" to receive regular medical care, tutoring, supervised recreation, and such luxuries as summer camp. The rest continued to exist in an unaltered slum environment. By the late 1950s, it was time for a followup study. Cabot had died, so I was asked to determine what had become of his boys. Eventually we tracked down 920. Since the 1930s, we found that 40 percent had run afoul of the law. And two things were evident:

First, those who had compiled police records had come equally from the "good" and "bad" groups, as had those who had never been arrested. Second, the special attention given to half the boys had had no deterrent effect.

As we analyzed their personal histories, however, an interesting pattern emerged. Based on detailed reports, we rated each subject's childhood background on a number of criteria:

What was each parent's attitude toward him? Rejection? Erratic affection? Genuine love? How was he disciplined? Physical abuse? Loss of privileges? Were the same standards of behavior consistently enforced or was an infraction punished sometimes and ignored others? How did his father and mother act toward each other?

Our subjects who had committed murder or assault with intent to kill (there were 14 of these) all received the lowest rating possible in each of the categories. In other

words, they had been thoroughly rejected by both mother and father; the enforcement of behavior standards had been inconsistent; the usual discipline against them had been physical cruelty; and their parents clearly had despised each other and had shown it by physically and verbally abusing each other numerous times.

A young man I'll call Eddy Wood typified this unique group. His father, an alcoholic who was himself an ex-convict, ignored Eddy completely except to beat him in erratic displays of discipline. On the rare occasions he was home, the father also beat Eddy's mother in the boy's presence.

Eddy's mother admitted she didn't like Eddy as a boy and couldn't help showing it. Eddy compiled a minor police record and openly admitted hating his mother and all women. When he was 20, he picked up a girl and killed her.

What is particularly compelling is the fact that the same kind of rock-bottom family background showed up for all the violent criminals—even though their individual personalities and their specific crimes differed widely.

It is easy to understand why. For one thing, a youngster in such an unhappy home learns to view the world as a threatening place in which he has to defend himself from attack. His first view of human behavior is of violence. Both parents tend to be highly aggressive, and they teach the child, at least implicitly, that one can express violent tendencies without inhibition. As a means of self-preservation, he may adopt a facade of mildness,

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But in reality he feels an intense inner rage against his parents and, by extension, all human beings, too.

Some people may wonder why the offspring of a given family may turn out radically different — may come to include, for example, a killer, a nonviolent criminal, and a person who avoids lawbreaking altogether. I did find such families in my study, and the explanation for them is a simple one: parents rarely raise all their children in exactly the same way.

One family I studied had two boys. The older was treated like a female—given dolls and dresses, for instance—by the mother, who had wanted a girl. She rejected her second son altogether. The father ignored his first-born and abused the younger. The parents fought violently themselves. Today the older boy has never committed a violent crime—but is a homosexual. The younger is a convicted murderer.

The point is that I feel we could be predicting tomorrow's killers with the same degree of confidence that a physician can predict that persons exposed to infected mosquitoes will contract malaria.

With our crime rate booming, it seems imperative that this

knowledge not be allowed just to gather dust in a sociologist's files. If a sufficient public cry were raised, funds would be allotted by Government and private foundations for putting this data to work, at least in experimental pilot projects.

Initially, perhaps, the home life of a youngster could be thoroughly investigated the first time he runs afoul of juvenile authorities. If the ingredients for future violence were unearthed in the child's environment—in other words, the low rating in each category of our scale—he could then be legally removed from his home.

In a small, special boarding school (not a reformatory or juvenile institution in the traditional sense) he could be placed in an atmosphere of love, kindness, and fair, and consistent discipline and be in contact with a large number of adults who are the exact opposite of his parents. Treated early enough, I believe he could be remolded for a lifetime of nonviolent behavior.

When we have on one hand mounting violence and on the other a formula that opens the way to detecting the potential perpetrators of violence yet to come, how much longer can we really wait? †

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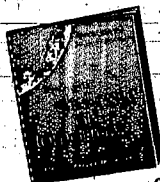
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
