Soldiers, Large Plane Held On Soviet Island After Forced Landing

WASHINGTON (AP)—An airplane carrying 214 U.S. servicemen to Vietnam is being held today on a Soviet island in the Pacific Ocean after being forced to land by MIG fighters.

The chartered DC-8 was on its way to Vietnam from McChord Air Base in Seattle, Wash., Sunday when, the U.S. government said, it strayed off course and was forced to land on Iurup Island, a part of the Kuril chain in the northern Pacific.

The State Department immediately contacted the Soviet embassy in Washington and urged the quick release of the plane, its passengers and the 17 crewmen.

Johnson Signs Historic Nuclear Weapons Pact

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson announced today that the United States and the Soviet Union have agreed to start talks "in the nearest future" on limiting offensive and defensive nuclear missiles systems.

The signing of the historic nuclear nonproliferation treaty was announced today by Secretary of State Dean Rusk while President Johnson was in London and Moscow before President Johnson spoke, Soviet Premier Alexei Kosygin announced.

White House officials reported that the Soviet Union wants to hold international talks on disarmament, including a halt in the manufacture of nuclear weapons and reduction of nuclear-weapon stockpiles.

Kosygin also proposed discussions on limitation and reduction of "means of delivery of strategic weapons."

The premier attacked the United States, he said the need to eliminate foreign military bases, one of the Russian proposals, "is convincingly proved by the continued aggressive war of the U.S.A. in Vietnam."

In London, Prime Minister Harold Wilson, presiding at the signing ceremony there, called the treaty "the most important measure of arms control and disarmament on which agreement has yet been reached."

Wilson pledged that Britain would continue "with renewed confidence and renewed hope to work for further advances in disarmament," Johnson, in his remarks, referred to the long U.S. effort to start discussions on cutting back the complex nuclear arms race. Moscow had indicated last Thursday that the Soviets were finally ready for serious talks.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk and U.S. disarmament chief William C. Foster were tapped for the honor of signing the non-proliferation treaty for the United States.

The President predicted that virtually all of the countries of the globe will join the pact.

The 51 signers in Washington indicated most of the complex support to bring the treaty into force. The pact becomes effective upon ratification by 40 non-nuclear states plus the three nuclear sponsors—the United States, Britain and Russia.

PARIS (AP)—After France's biggest election landslide in 40 years, President Charles de Gaulle had a mandate today to repair the economic damage of weeks of labor and social strife and to carry out sweeping reforms of France's industrial and educational systems.

Buhl Woman Is Injured Slightly In Rail Mishap

A Buhl woman escaped without cuts and bruises Sunday when her 1954 sedan collided with a freight train at the Curry Crossing on Highway 93.

Officials said it was a miracle the woman survived—the collision, she escaped—with only minor injuries.

The accident occurred at 10:20 a.m. Sunday at Mrs. Nellie E. Swazey, 64, Route 3, Buhl, was traveling east on the highway.

The train was southbound and Deputy Sheriff J. D. Turner, investigating officer, said the woman apparently failed to act the warning signals at the crossing. There were no skid marks, the officer said.

The woman reported "I heard a whistle, but thought it was someone behind me." Her car was struck by the engine of the train, carried across the highway and across the railroad tracks. It came to rest against a power pole on the south side of the highway. The vehicle was damaged and officers estimated damage to the train at \$200.

Hijacked Plane Will Be Returned

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The wife of an American airliner pilot held prisoner in a Havana jail pleaded in vain today to fly to Cuba for a visit with her husband.

A substitute pilot went to Cuba early today to return the hijacked airliner, leaving behind Mrs. George Proflongo whose husband was forced at gunpoint by a hijacker to land the plane in Havana Saturday.

Proflongo was immediately arrested by the Cuban government for trial on charges of defecting to the United States eight years ago.

The new pilot, Allen Cribbs, was taken to Varadero, Cuba, aboard an empty, chartered airliner that flies daily to Cuba to pick up refugees.

The Southeast Airlines DC-9 hijacked over Key West, Fla., Saturday by one of its 15 passengers was to be returned to that city by Cribbs later in the day.

A Miami state investigator in Miami said he had not been determined if it was coincidence that Proflongo was the pilot of the hijacked airliner. If the plane was diverted to Cuba for the purpose of kidnaping him.

Irvin L. Jones Jr., president of Southeast Airlines, said the Cuban government promised safe return of the plane's other occupants and the other two crew members. Identified by the airline only as copilot Dave Martin and stewardess A. Kimball.

Traffic Toll Is 24 Ahead Of Last Year

BOISE (AP)—Idaho had one less traffic fatality in June than in the corresponding month a year ago, but for the six-month period the toll was 24 ahead of that for 1967.

The figures were provided by state police, who listed the June toll at 24 this year compared with 26 in June, last year.

At the end of June, the totals were 132 this year and 108 last year.

Only seven of Idaho's 44 counties escaped a traffic death in the first half of this year. They are Blaine, Camas, Caribou, Clark, Bule, Lincoln and Teton. Bonneville and Canyon, each with one death, have contributed the largest number of fatalities this year. Elmore, Kootenai and Nez Perce each had 10 deaths.

In another traffic-related development, the Idaho State Police reported that a woman was injured in a traffic accident in Salmon, some 45 miles to the west.

Allied spokesman said the victim, Elizabeth Spurr, 31, of Salmon, was injured in a collision with a 1965 Chevrolet. She was wearing a seat belt. She sustained 172 cuts, 20 abrasions, 20 lacerations, 75 Soviet-designed AK47 assault rifles; 10 tons of TNT; three mortars; three tons of mines; 300,000 rounds of AK47 ammunition; more than 2,000 mortars, bazooka-type rockets and nearly 3,000 grenades.

SAIGON (AP)—U.S. Green Beret troops and South Vietnamese forces seized a huge cache of arms and supplies in the north of Vietnam on Sunday.

The cache, located about 50 miles from the Cambodian border in a key supply corridor to Saigon, some 45 miles to the west.

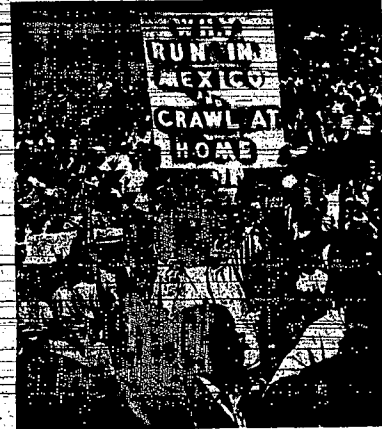
Allied spokesman said the cache, seized late Sunday, included 172 carbines, 20 Brownings, 200 M16 rifles, 10 tons of TNT, three mortars, three tons of mines, 300,000 rounds of AK47 ammunition; more than 2,000 mortars, bazooka-type rockets and nearly 3,000 grenades.

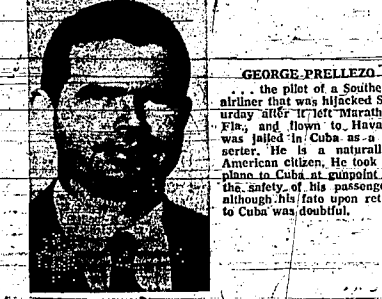

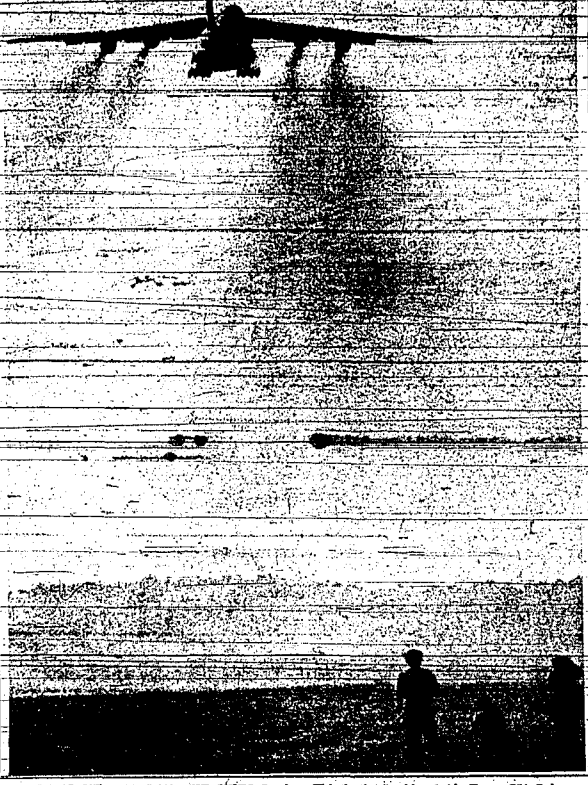

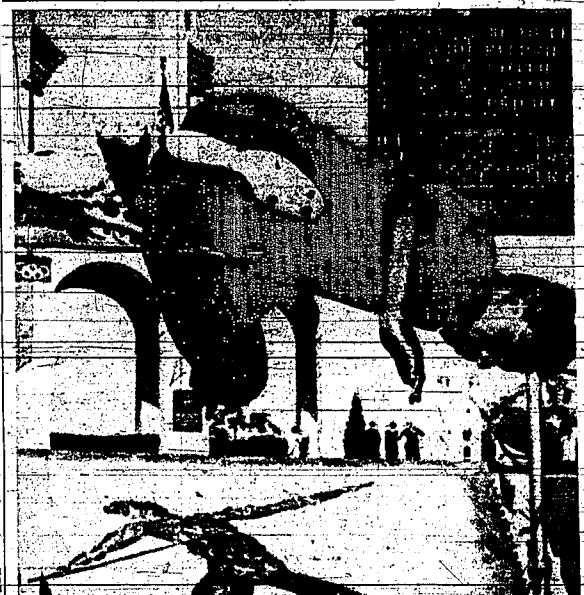

Red China Ups Nuclear Capability

MOSCOW (AP) — Communist sources said Sunday they have learned that Communist China has developed its first intercontinental ballistic missile, broadening a nuclear capability that Peking says includes a hydrogen bomb.

The sources reported it was a "medium-range" missile. The missile has not been tested but that its construction was completed in the last few days. The missile was described as ready for trial use.

The report was unofficial and could not be confirmed. Nor was any estimate given of how long it might take China to establish effective production of an ICBM.

But the breakthrough, if true, would make China the world's third ICBM nation after the United States and the Soviet Union. Her nuclear progress is charted in a series of seven nuclear blasts since October 1964, culminating in what was described by the Chinese as a hydrogen bomb test June 17, 1967.

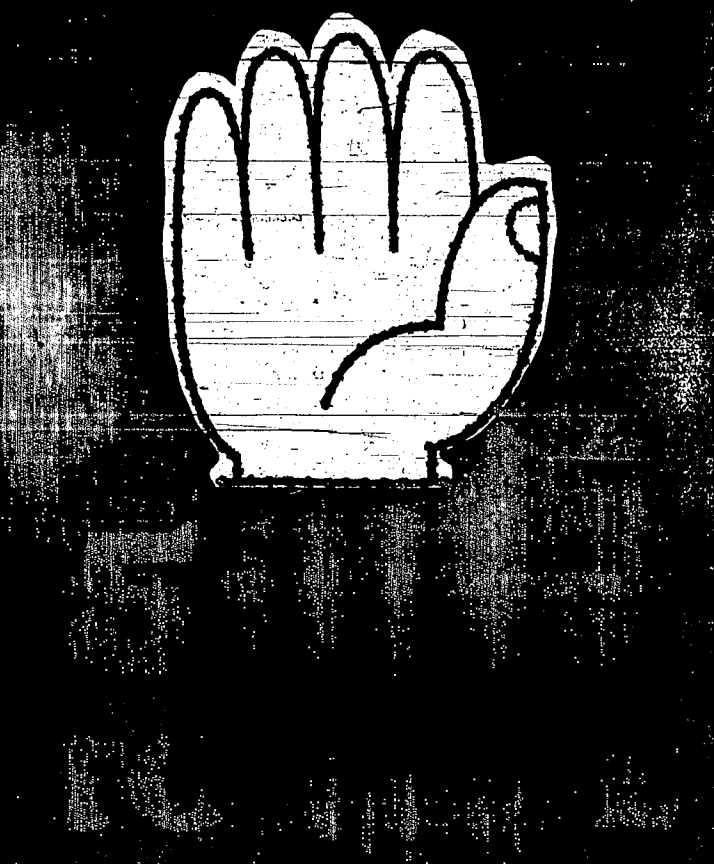

Oscar de la Renta believes the belt line is never to be uncovered. But others dare to leave bare a goodly portion of the bosom—either by plunging necklines or cutting away at the bust.

Federal Government To Investigate Cost Of Buying And Selling Stocks

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government has launched Monday what is expected to be one of the most searching investigations into the cost of buying and selling stocks. It could change a system which dates to the 18th century. About 20 subpoenas reportedly went to large broker-dealer firms and the rest to industry officials. Now, York Stock Exchange witnesses were not subpoenaed. The inquiry will pit the NYSE, which plans to change its stock minimum fee schedule on stock transactions against the Justice Department which wants the minimum fees eliminated. If anything, the Justice Department has said, a maximum fee should be set to protect investors from a competitive fee structure.

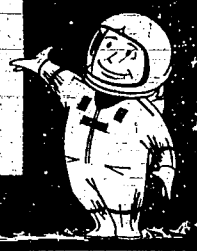
