Gov. Nelson Rockefeller Speaks To Boise Crowd

Writer Captures Mood Of Rockefeller's Boise Visit

— Swept the brow of New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller Tuesday as he faced a crowd of 3,000 in the blistering sun at Boise.
He was optimistic, but leading politicians in the capital city failed to share his enthusiasm. Idaho delegates for over an hour gave their votes to Richard Nixon and Gov. Ronald Reagan.
But Rocky addressed the crowd as if he had those votes varied up and put away. It was a display of traditional political confidence.
"I have come here to offer you a choice," he told the crowd, "the old politics is not good enough."
Rockefeller entered Boise shortly after noon Tuesday fresh from a speech in Helena, Mont. During his Helena talk, the New York politician stated he favored federal gun controls, and at Boise, later, he stated to newsmen, "I told them that in metropolitan areas there are not too many to shoot and no big game. People are able to buy guns who should not. I reminded them they had to get a license to fish and to hunt and to drive automobiles, and I couldn't see why they should not have a license to get a gun."
And Rockefeller touched all bases. He promised he would control spending, seek a positive change in Vietnam, advocated lowering the voting age to 18, and recommended a lottery draft.
State officers swarmed over the capital steps and they could be spotted flanking Mr. Rockefeller almost constantly.
As New York's first visit to the capital upon entering the city, he joined Gov. Don Samuelson, left the Idaho throne, signed a check for \$25,000, and drove a two-mile stage coach.

Gen. Westmoreland Sworn Into Office

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson made a surprise visit to the Pentagon today and watched smilingly as Gen. William Westmoreland was sworn in as the Army's 25th chief of staff.
Johnson, dressed in a sandy, light brown suit, stepped into the office of Secretary of the Army Stanley R. Resor just as Westmoreland, former U.S. military commander in Vietnam, was about to take the oath.
The ceremony also was attended by several congressional figures, all of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and three other military figures closely associated with Vietnam: retired Army Gen. Lawrence Collins, former ambassador to Vietnam Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, and former Army Chief of Staff Gen. George H. Decker.

Westmoreland took the oath, standing straight, chin out, right hand raised. His wife, Katherine, in a rose linen dress, was at his left side.
"Westy" as he is known to many, said he accepted the job with "pride and humility."
He thanked his predecessor, Gen. Harold K. Johnson, who had led the Army's Joint Chiefs of Staff for their support during the war, and concluded: "To the authorities over me and to the troops under me I pledge

my loyalty."
After the oath, Westmoreland and Westmoreland had spoken, the President stepped forward to say quietly: "Nice going."
Then the party, headed by Johnson and Secretary of Defense Clark M. Clifford, stepped outside the Pentagon where Westmoreland was awarded 117 honors including a 15-gun salute.
The oath was administered by Army Adm. Gen. Kenneth G. Wickham.

Lawyers For Ray Begin Appeal Motion In Britain

LONDON (AP) — James Earl Ray's British lawyers today began preparing his appeal against Chief Magistrate Frank Milton's ruling that he should be extradited to the United States for trial on a charge of murdering Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.
Milton on Tuesday rejected the argument by Roger Frisby, Ray's British attorney, that the killing of the Negro civil rights leader was a political crime and therefore not subject to extradition.
Frisby planned to enlarge this argument in his appeal to the High Court, Ray remained under close guard in London's Wandsworth jail. The appeal will delay his return to the United States until late this month, at the latest.
Ray's court-appointed attorneys have 15 days from Tuesday to file their appeal. They were expected to take advantage of almost all this period.
The court then may take several days to schedule a hearing

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Council Sets Downtown Hearing Dates

Downtown Improvement in Twin Falls moved ahead Wednesday with a special city council meeting resulting in approval of a resolution of intent to create a local improvement district and acceptance of an urban renewal plan for public hearing.
The public hearing was held during the Wednesday morning meeting. The first was set for July 16 at 7:30 p.m. in the Twin Falls City Hall auditorium. This will be specifically for property owners of the six half-blocks involved in the proposed local improvement district.
Local improvement District 83 would be financed through an assessment of \$10 per year per front foot of property over a 15-year period, said by the property owners, and by revenue from off-street parking. Of the total \$10,000 cost of the district, \$25,000 property owners are paying, which he estimated at \$253,000, remaining would come from assets of the Off-Street Parking Association.
The Downtown Improvement Plan for the district may make valid proposals in the July 16 hearing.
The second hearing, called for a resolution of intent to be provided by the council, would be held July 22, a date on which there is no regular meeting of the council scheduled. It is set for 8 p.m. in the American Legion-Hall to accommodate more people. This hearing would cover the Twin Falls Urban Renewal Plan, proposed to cover a six-block area in downtown Twin Falls, part of it overlapping LID 83.
All interested persons are allowed to file protests with the city on the second hearing and each will be recorded, later reviewed by the council.
The Urban Renewal Plan, submitted Monday night to the city council, was presented to the Twin Falls Planning and Zoning Commission for review and returned Wednesday to the council with

Released Progress Hoped For In Talks

TOKYO (AP) — North Vietnam announced Wednesday progress in its announced decision to release three captured American pilots in return for U.S. pilots captured in North Vietnam.
"Hanoi's Vietnam News Agency (VNA) monitored in Tokyo, said:
"Proceeding from the humanitarian and lenient policy of the government of the Democratic Republic of Vietnam, the general political department of the Ministry of Defense has decided to release three U.S. pilots captured in North Vietnam."
"It did not give the names of the pilots, or say when they would be freed."
However, North Vietnamese Ambassador Xuan Thuy, who received Harriman's thanks in today's session of the talks, said "we did not make one centimeter of progress."
The North Vietnamese news agency had announced before the start of the session here that four "humanitarian" reasons three captured fliers would be released. It did not give the date or the names of the Americans chosen for release.
Xuan Thuy officially informed Harriman of the decision in the morning.
Harriman said his only information on the matter was what he broadcast said.
"We like to think that perhaps a straw in the wind," he said. "You remember Secretary of Defense Clark M. Clifford spoke of fliers in the wind as related to progress in these talks."
Clifford said two weeks ago he saw some fliers and hints of evidence of progress in the talks.
Harriman returned to the conference table for a new attempt to get North Vietnam to negotiate the war in Southeast Asia, but he faced another rejection.

Planes Hit Panhandle In Vietnam

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. fighter-bombers pounded North Vietnam's southern panhandle Tuesday with the largest number of raids in two months while the big B52 strategic bombers kept up the heaviest saturation bombing given the demilitarized zone area in the war.
Allied ground troops also were busy below the northern frontier and reported they killed 355 of the enemy in clashes in South Vietnam's northernmost provinces.
Along with the record air activity, U.S. headquarters announced the loss of two Air Force fighter-bombers and a light aircraft reconnaissance plane and a big Marine helicopter over South Vietnam.
The Viet Cong shot down the Marine helicopter, killing all four crewmen, and also killed all nine men in a Marine patrol the helicopter had set down to check out a "mountain trail" you were tangled with obstacles northwest of Da Nang.

New City Gun Law Is Signed

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Mayor Joseph Alioto signed the city's new gun law Tuesday as the Police Department went ahead with plans for "Operation Gun Registration."
The new law, which goes into effect Aug. 16, requires owners of all types of firearms to register them with the police.
Owners will be required to pay a \$2 registration fee for each gun or a flat fee of \$10 for an authentic collection of antique or historical weapons.

Abuses Hurdled After Meeting In Berkeley

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — An eight-hour meeting of the Berkeley City Council broke up at 5 p.m. PDT Tuesday with hundreds of young dissidents hurling taunts, curses and abuses.
Enraged that the council had refused to grant their demand that a block of Telegraph Avenue near the University of California be sealed off for a July 4 rally, the audience of more than a thousand stormed out yelling curses and insults.
Shouts of "No, no, no!" "Figs," "dogs," and "We'll kill you," were mingled with obscenities.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Frank Johnson expressed shock today at the Central Park shooting in New York City and called on Congress and all the people of America to pass the gun control measures which are needed to protect the American people against insane and reckless murder by gunfire.
The President issued this statement:
"In New York City this morning, bullets from a sniper's gun have brought heartbreak and horror. Again senseless tragedy has struck at gunpoint. I call upon the Congress and all of the people of America to pass the gun control measures which are needed to protect the American people against insane and reckless murder by gunfire."

New York Sniper Kills 1, Wounds 3 In Shooting Spree

NEW YORK (AP) — A man shot a woman to death in a Central Park comfort station today and then wounded an elderly man and two policemen before he was killed by officers wearing bulletproof vests, police reported.
Tear gas fired by police flushed the heavy-set, middle-aged gunman from a cluster of trees near the Metropolitan Museum of Art, in which he had fled, Arthur Deutch, "I let him have 12 in the chest and McLoughlin hit him too."
Deutch and Capt. Robert McLoughlin, both wearing bulletproof vests.
The shootings occurred near 85th Street and Fifth Avenue, across from some of the city's most exclusive apartment houses. Jacqueline Kennedy lives in the area. She is away with her children at Hyannis Port, Mass.
Police said the gunman was carrying a bank book with the name Angel Anello of Manhattan.
The body of the woman, who was not immediately identified, was found in a booth in the women's part of the comfort station. She was shot in the head, police said.
Most seriously injured was Charles Back, a resident of the neighborhood, who was walking his dog in the park. He was in Lenox Hill Hospital with a back wound.
The wounded policemen — Patrolman Philip Sheridan of Sayville, N.Y., and James Hubbard of the Bronx — were in the same hospital with flesh wounds.

Reds Release Plane Pilot Denies He Was Off Course

TOKYO (AP) — The U.S. air force carrying a Soviet-bound transport plane was held for two days by the Soviet Union, the pilot denied that he violated Soviet air space.
"I did not stray over Russian territory," said Capt. Joseph Tosolini of Bethany, Conn. He said he had flown the same route from Tacoma, Wash., to Japan many times.
Tosolini said he argued with the Russians over the content of the plane and its passengers. Navigator Larry Guntrun said his calculations showed the plane violated Soviet air space because the plane's crew made a navigational error. The State Department apologized, the Soviet government released the plane with unexpected swiftness.
Tosolini, flanked at a news conference by his 17-member crew that included nine stewards, said he signed a letter as a condition for his release. He said corrections in the letter indicated the Soviets had perhaps erred in fixing the plane's position.
The first letter the Russians wrote for Tosolini to sign admitting he had violated Soviet air space listed the time between his plane's interception by Soviet MIGs to the time it landed at the Soviet base at "something like 35 minutes," Tosolini said.

Idaho Features Races For High Court

BOISE (AP) — Idaho has only three statewide election races this year — and two of them will be nonpartisan.
The two races with each name a justice of Idaho's Supreme Court, filling vacancies caused by retirement — a supreme court justice must retire at the end of the term during which he reaches age 70. Two of the five justices are in that position

Justice C. J. Taylor and Justice E. B. Smith, who is serving this year as chief justice.
The only other statewide race is for the U.S. Senate seat held by Sen. Frank Church, a Democrat. Both he and Republican Rep. George Hansen, who seeks to displace Church, are opposed for their party nominations.

But in the four-man race for the seat held by Justice Taylor, if no candidate receives a majority of the votes cast in the primary, then the two leaders run again Nov. 12.
The four candidates include three district judges, Sherman J. Bellowood of Rupert, Floyd R. Thomas of Idaho Falls and Charles R. Donaldson of Boise, and a north Idaho attorney, Steve Bistine of Sandpoint.

followed in the naming of county probate judges.
District judges are elected for four-year terms, and the latter do not expire this year. There is no requirement in state law that a district judge or a state official — resign his position to seek election to another job. He must resign, of course, before he is installed in a new position.

Oregon Paper Will Support Rockefeller

EUGENE (AP) — The Eugene Register-Guard, Ore., in an unusual move, Tuesday devoted its entire editorial page to the support of New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller for the presidency of the United States.
"In the 1968 election, the most critical election in the history of this nation," the Register-Guard believes, that the New York governor is the most qualified and most able man to lead the country," the paper said in a brief statement explaining the move.

The lead editorial said that "The Word" is that Richard Nixon has the Republican presidential nomination wrapped up. If this is the case, the paper said, "we believe the party politicians are missing the mood of the mainstream of American thinking."
"It is our belief that most Americans in both major parties and among the vast legions of independent voters, want a new face, new thoughts, a real change in the White House."
The paper's editorial said polls continue to show Rockefeller could win the presidency. And it cited what it called his wide experience in state and federal affairs as making him the best qualified candidate.

Voting for supreme court justices is at the same primary election at which candidates are nominated by the political parties. But the justices' names are on a separate ballot.
If a candidate obtains a majority of the votes cast in the primary then he is elected, and does not have to run in the general election in November.
That will be the case this year in the race between district Judge Merlin S. Young and Atty. Gen. Allan G. Shepard, both of Boise; the two candidates for Justice Smith's job. The one who polls the most votes in the primary will be elected.

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Latin Flavor Added To Junket By LBJ

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's long July 4th holiday will have a strong Latin flavor, mixing celebrations with serious diplomacy South of the Border.
With some 40 Latin American ambassadors and their ladies in tow, Johnson flies to San Antonio, Tex., today for an elaborate Independence Day celebration at HemisFair, the Southwest's largest exposition. The Latin nations are major participants in the exposition.
Johnson plans called for joining the ambassadors in both ceremonial and social activities associated with the fair before nightfall. On Thursday, he will be the main speaker at a flag-raising ceremony on the HemisFair grounds.

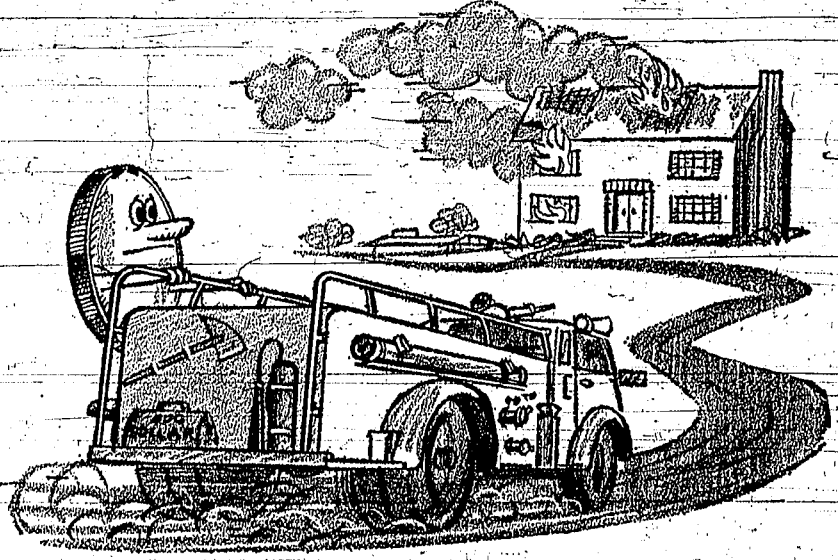

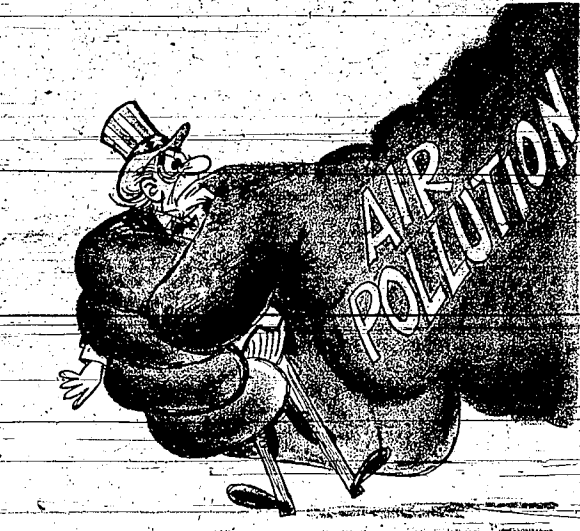

A Good Yawn

Dear Dr. Molner: Please explain the importance of yawning. Most people take it as a sign of being sleepy and find that even after a good night's sleep I immediately begin yawning.

A yawn is a complex-physical mechanism. It may be a sleepiness or fatigue or boredom. It can be contagious, seeing someone else yawn can make you do it, too.

Physically, an increased saturation of the blood with carbon dioxide is a respiratory stimulant. It's the automatic control of the body that develops a yawn.

There's more to it than that. The opening of the mouth stimulates the cerebral circulation. Often a person stretches his arms, which has the same effect.

A yawn in the morning? Well, you may breathe very lightly while asleep, and the yawn is a way of starting brisker breathing and getting your blood circulating.

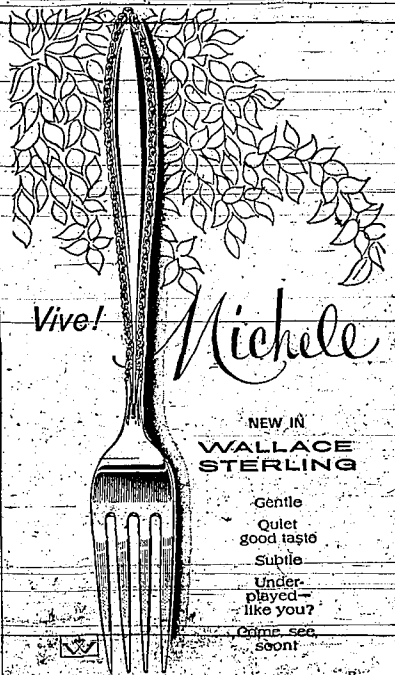

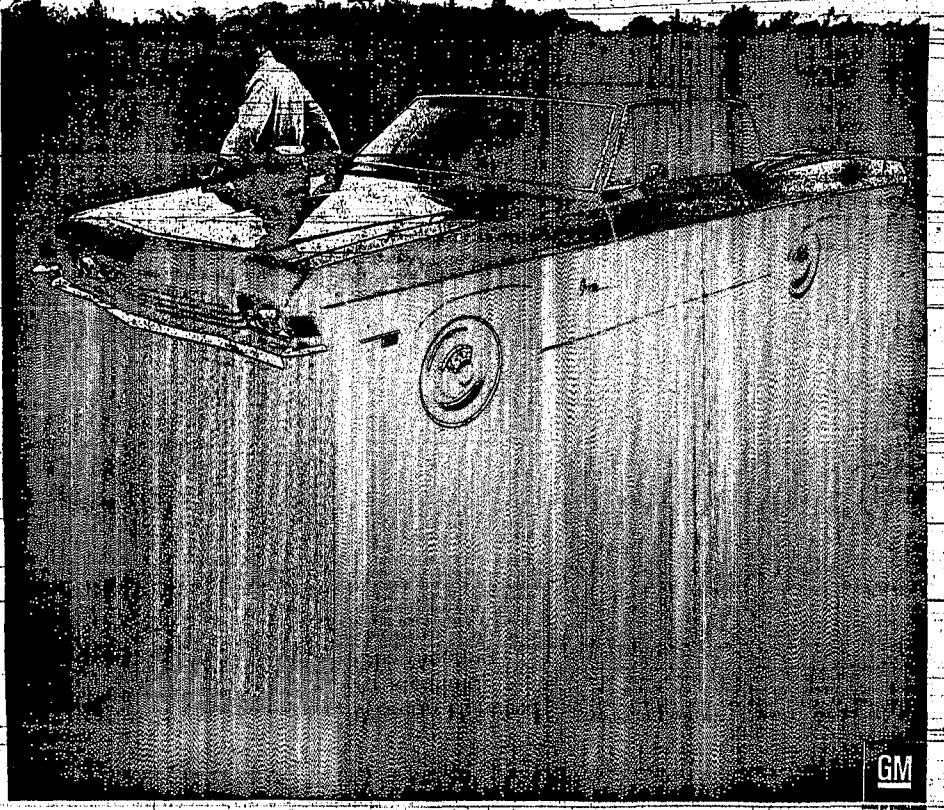

Workers In Uruguay Are Protesting

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay (AP) — Public transport stopped running, 20 banks closed for the day and telephone service was disrupted in Uruguay Tuesday as thousands of workers stayed home to protest the government's economic austerity measures in this once prosperous welfare state.

Buses and taxis left Montevideo's streets before the evening rush hour. Thousands of commuters formed themselves in chains along main avenues, stopped private cars and demanded rides. Trains and planes—the national airline, had been struck earlier.

President Jorge Pacheco Areco lightened a system of press control that had been based largely on self-censorship. Authorities said newspapers must now submit galley proofs for approval before publication. There were no newspapers Tuesday because of the strike.

"Last year the occurrence of man-caused fires was kept low through the concern and cooperation of national forest users," said Mr. Iverson. "I hope we get continued cooperation from the public in preventing fires."

Q—We're senior citizens with no other income than Social Security interest on \$8,000 in savings and loan dividends from 25 Am. Telephone. We own our home and \$30,000 in E bonds. How should we invest \$3,000?

A—First may I commend you for your thrift during your working years.

For maximum income from your life savings, I have two suggestions. Since you mention no heirs, you might cash all or part of your E bonds to purchase a joint annuity with a beneficiary. You would discuss the details with the representative of any nationally recognized insurance company licensed by your state. This annuity would provide a guaranteed monthly income to you both until the death of one partner—and thereafter to the survivor. If this is your decision, keep the \$3,000 in the savings bank to cover possible emergencies. You might wish to consider I'd exchange E bonds for H bonds through your bank. E bonds make an excellent savings device. You choose the course but if converted into H bonds, the interest on the latter will be paid to you every six months by check from the U.S. Treasury Department. The yield the first year is over 3 percent. If held to maturity the total yield at the new rate is 4.25 percent. You choose this course of action, you could place your \$3,000 in Am. Telephone or any other stock.

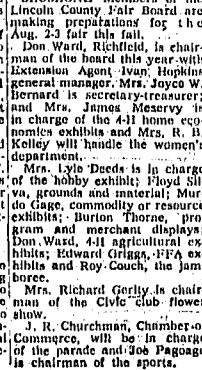

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republicans launched a collection of studies of U.S. domestic problems and suggested solutions Tuesday in a possible preview of parts of the platform for their party's presidential campaign.

The book, "Republican Papers," to be published July 4, heavily emphasizes two themes which GOP legislators have been stressing.

One is what Rep. Melvin Laird of Wisconsin called "returning to state, city and other local officials the opportunity and resources to solve their own problems. Republicans would do this by making block grants of federal funds to the local units without tying the funds to federally directed programs."

The other theme is a revision of the welfare system by emphasizing increases for those receiving such aid to move into gainful work.

Laird, chairman of the House Republican conference and editor of the book, said a new conference. "We were not talking welfare reform, but we added a hope platform which would encourage local officials to recognize that there are better ways to do things in the 1970s than there were in the 1950s."

Hughes Might Buy ABC Shares

NEW YORK (AP) — Fifi-an-fer Hughes, through owner of Hughes Tool Co., offered Monday to buy 2 million common shares of American Broadcasting Cos., Inc. for \$74.25 a share—a total of \$148.5 million in cash.

If stockholders respond with 2 million shares, Hughes Tool of Houston, Tex., would acquire a substantial but not majority interest in ABC.

ABC, the third biggest television and radio network, has 4,727 million shares outstanding.

Trading in ABC shares was delayed in opening on the New York Stock Exchange until late afternoon pending announcement of the Hughes Tool offer.

The issue closed at \$6.50 a share, up \$1.12 for the day, on volume of 40,400 shares.

ABC made no immediate comment on the offer but a spokesman said a statement was being prepared.

The Hughes Tool announcement said that if more than 2 million shares are tendered it may elect to purchase any or all shares above that amount.

The offer will be in force until 3 p.m. EDT July 15 unless extended.

Hughes, who hasn't been seen in public in years, is the sole owner of Hughes Tool, a major manufacturer of oil well drilling equipment and helicopters.

Since 1957 he has become the major owner of hotels and gambling facilities in Las Vegas, Nev. His acquisitions there include four hotels and an entertainment facility, all with casinos.
