PARIS (AP) — President Charles de Gaulle named Maurice Couve de Murville today to form a new government after Premier Georges Pompidou resigned.

Pompidou had been in power for 6 years, 2 months and 10 days.

However, reliable sources have reported that Pompidou is not in favor of De Gaulle's plans for working participation in the management councils of industry.

Ambassador Thuy Accuses Americans Of Spreading Rumors On Peace Progress

PARIS (AP) — Ambassador Xuan Thuy, pleading for a quick end to all U.S. attacks on North Vietnam, accused American authorities today of having "spread rumors" of progress in the Paris peace talks to serve their own political purposes.

There were some government casualties in the confused fighting on the North at once. In case of such a failure, he argued, the United States would "bear the blame" for not negotiating.

There have been conflicting assessments of the detached discussions for several weeks, but this was the first time the differences had come so up close in a formal meeting.

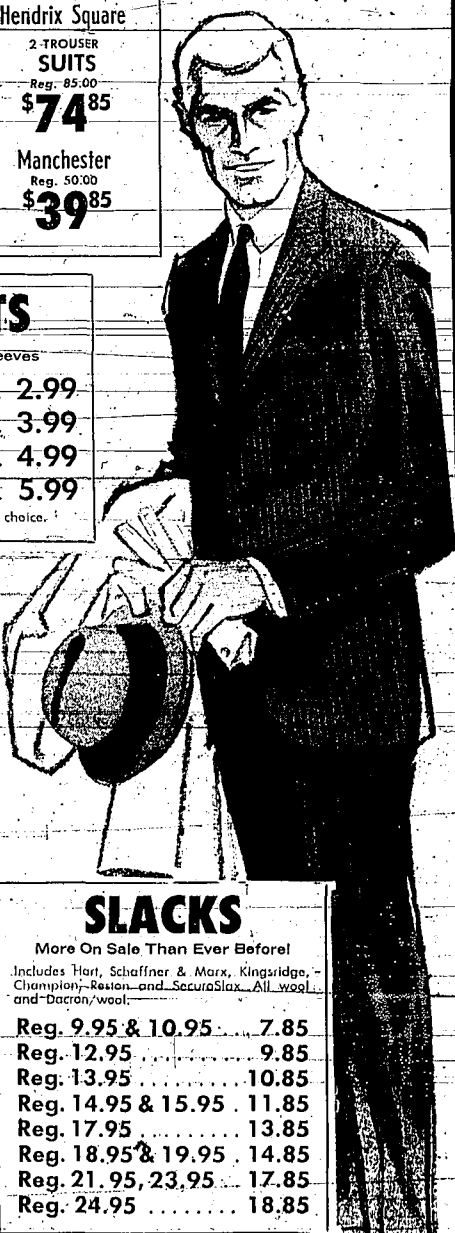

Traffic Safety Study Set In 4 Area Towns

Representatives from four Magic Valley communities met Tuesday morning with representatives from the National Safety Council and Idaho's Traffic Safety Commission to begin a study of traffic safety in the cities.

After data is collected and analyzed for each city, a report will be made to the city. The Governor's Traffic Safety Commission has contracted with the National Safety Council to make studies of 19 Idaho cities. The studies, which will include Twin Falls, Rupert, Jerome and Burley, will offer highway safety program analysis.

Under the federal National Highway Safety Act, the governor of each state is responsible for putting the act into effect in his state, which governors of Idaho, Montana and Alaska are doing through the National Safety Council.

The studies will cover 15 areas in traffic safety, rating each city against national standards and writing evaluations for the city. The meeting held Tuesday involved representatives of the four Magic Valley cities: A. P. Bunderson, field representative of the National Safety Council, and Mark Gibson, assistant director of the Idaho State Traffic Safety Commission. Mr. Bunderson and Mr. Gibson distributed and explained the forms asking for information to be used in the traffic study.

The men will return about July 20 to each city to complete the study. Ninety or 100 days later they will return to each city with an evaluative report.

The purpose of the studies is to help identify traffic safety deficiencies and meet national standards, and to establish uniformity among the states. Areas covered in the studies include highway design, driver education and licensing, traffic laws and enforcement, and alcohol use in relation to highway safety, as well as other aspects.

Thieu Thinks U.S. Men Can Leave In '69

ABOARD USS CONSTELLATION, off North Vietnam (AP) — President Nguyen Van Thieu said today that he thinks American troops can begin leaving South Vietnam in 1969. He said the next Viet Cong offensive—expected late this month—"may be the last all-out effort from the Communists."

Thieu was reminded at a news conference aboard the aircraft carrier Constellation that he had said in April that American forces could be reduced by the end of 1968. He was asked how he felt about this now.

"I think we have moved very fast on our plan to develop our armed forces according to our 1968 and 1969 plan," he replied. "The end of 1968 is too soon, but I think from 1969 we could have a timetable for phasing out the major American units."

"But I repeat, I never hope that all American forces have to withdraw altogether at one time. There should be a progressive phasing out because we know well that Vietnamese armed forces need time to grow, to train, to be equipped and to take over more and more responsibility from the American forces."

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PUC Air Route Petition Studied

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has taken under advisement a petition asking it assume jurisdiction over air routes in Idaho. The petition was filed by Jim Wilkins, owner of Sun Valley Airlines, and is based on a letter Wilkins said he will not begin operations on a proposal to establish commuter runs between Idaho cities until a state agency establishes control over air routes. The PUC held a public hearing Tuesday on the petition and also will hear testimony from a Shoshone, until Aug. 1 to prepare a legal brief supporting the contention that the PUC has authority under present law to regulate air routes.

Mike Southcombe, an assistant attorney general, was to examine that brief and was given until Aug. 12 to prepare an answering brief pointing out any legal objects he believes would exist.

Southcombe said if it is determined the PUC does not have the authority, his office will recommend that the 1969 legislature specifically empower the PUC to regulate air routes.

Wilkins said there is no state or federal agency regulating airlines operating wholly within Idaho, and consequently interstate airlines would have no protection from unfair competition.

Secret Service Man Fires Shot At Youths Near Reagan Home

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — A Secret Service man fired one warning shot at two Negro youths he caught approaching Gov. Ronald Reagan's home with two firebombs Tuesday night. The bombs did not ignite. Police said the incident apparently was related to disturbances which started earlier Tuesday about two miles southwest of the governor's mansion, which the Reagans found unsuitable after a short stay there. Secret Service men were assigned to guard Reagan along with other presidential candidates—announced or not—after the assassination of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy in Los Angeles June 5. Reagan is California's favorite-son candidate to the GOP national convention.

Nafziger said police told him the incident may have been related to troubles in the Oak Park section, "that area is highly populated with Negroes." During the disturbance, which broke out Tuesday afternoon, care full of predominantly Negro youths drove into surrounding areas throwing firebombs, rocks and bottles. No major damage was reported.

In Oak Park, where police sealed off the small business district to traffic for a while, a white man was stabbed by a group of Negro youths who accosted him when he got out of his car.

A Sacramento County Hospital spokesman identified him as Frank Hanley and said he was in satisfactory condition. Asst. Police Chief Ray Dehner said the group of youths followed Hanley into a house when he got out of the car with two girls. The stabbing occurred in the house, he said, and the girls were unhurt. The youths then set fire to Hanley's car.

Rulings Are Made By Supreme Court

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court has upheld a conviction of a state prison inmate who contended he did not intend to escape.

The high court Tuesday also reversed a lower court decision involving injuries in a boating accident in North Idaho and affirmed "in part" a dispute over a "rogue hog."

The prison inmate, Melvin Charles Marks, appealed his conviction of escaping a prison work detail in 1965. Marks claimed he had jumped from a prison truck transferring the work detail in order to assist a friend who had fallen from the vehicle. His absence was not noticed by prison guards until the truck reached its destination.

The jury were later apprehended nearby.

The boat collision occurred in 1965 on Lake Chatelet between a boat operated by John A. Linehan, Colfax, Wash., and a boat belonging to Alex and Irene Schaub of Lewiston.

The Schaub sued for personal injuries and damages, but the district court ruled in favor of Linehan.

The supreme court ordered a new trial, saying that certain instructions to the jury in the first trial were prejudicial to the Schaub's case.

The high court affirmed in part and reversed in part the case involving the sale of hogs by War Paulius, a Washington resident, to Vern Liedtke of Nez Perce County.

Paulius had sought compensation in the sale of the hogs, and Liedtke counter-claimed, claiming the hogs were diseased and infected the remainder of his herd.

The district court ruled in favor of Liedtke, awarding \$11,616.47 and the high court upheld that award.

Rent-A-Kid Plan Grows In Atlanta

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — An imaginative project, Rent-A-Kid, is providing underprivileged boys and girls to Atlanta's West End with their first experience in job responsibility. They have performed such jobs as painting toshelle buttons for home canning. The operation began a month ago as the brainchild of Joy Cochrane of the West End Neighborhood Service Center. The purpose is to provide youngsters, aged 14 to 18, who have little or no parental supervision, the opportunity to earn money for food and clothes. The project, originally offered in half lots, has been so well received by the community that a second office has been opened. Plans are being made to open several more and to keep them open during the school year on weekends. Rent-A-Kid was offered a booth in one of the city shopping centers to provide its customers with assistance.

Father Edward J. Dillon, Roman Catholic priest and codirector of Rent-A-Kid, said most of the youngsters participating in the project—many are drop-outs—already have begun to fend for themselves. By providing them with the chance to earn money of their own they might be stimulated to stay in school and become self-supporting citizens. He said. General household chores have dominated the jobs accepted but no reasonable job is turned down. The office director, Deborah Lavender, decides if the fee charged for a job and whether it is dangerous or too large for Rent-A-Kid to handle. The hourly rate is \$1.35 and the youngsters are paid \$100 unless they wish Rent-A-Kid to collect their wages for savings.



The tour is expected to last two hours and is intended to acquaint interested farmers and ranchers with the advantages of new varieties of crops, new crops and good economic practices, Mr. Smith said.
