

# Government Starts Taking Bigger Bite From American Paychecks

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal government started taking a bigger tax bite out of Americans' paychecks today as the 10 per cent income surtax recommended by President Johnson to help pay for the Vietnam war finally went into effect.

The 10 per cent increase in the federal tax Americans already have been paying, not on their total wages.

When Congress failed to act last year, Johnson changed the effective date for individuals to last April 1, a date approved by Congress in the measure finally passed in June.

The extra 3/4 months must be paid under Federal income tax returns are filed by next April 15.

That decision will be up to the administration elected in November, and to the new Congress.

The tax is intended to help meet the cost of the Vietnam War—now running more than \$2 billion a year.

The corporate tax is retroactive to Jan. 1. The entire package is expected to increase revenues by more than \$15 billion in the current fiscal year, which ends next June 30 with the individual surcharge accounting for \$7.75 billion of this.

**Committee Opens First Hearing**

**IDaho Falls** (AP)—The Legislative Council's Local Government Committee opened the first of five scheduled hearings today on proposals for streamlining local government. The first hearing will be in Idaho Falls and the committee will be in Twin Falls, Boise, Lewiston and Coeur d'Alene on succeeding days.

Proposals for discussion include: combining local enforcement units, reducing the number of or eliminating local highway districts; and changing budget procedures for counties.

Favorable comment on the budget proposal was expressed by Max Yost, executive manager of the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho, in the privately financed organization's July newsletter.

Yost said the proposal would make it easier for county commissions to balance budgets and could save property owners from being overtaxed.

State law fixes procedures for commissions to adopt operating county budgets. At present, the county budgets need not be approved until after the county's operational year begins.

The committee proposal is to require the budgets be adopted by county commissions before the operational year begins and to certify needs in terms of dollars instead of mills.

Edelman, who is white, is a former official in the Justice Department and a native of Minneapolis.

**Texas Solon Dies Of Heart Attack**

**HOUSTON, Tex.** (AP)—Rep. Joe Pool, D-Tex., an outspoken critic of Vietnam war protestors and resistance to the draft, collapsed and died at the Houston airport Sunday after being stricken with an apparent heart attack. He was 67.

Pool was a member of the House Committee on Un-American Activities and had advocated 20-year jail terms for those who blocked troop trains or refused to bleed and supplies to the Viet Cong.

Mr. Lowder said the district is hoping to pass the bond issue this fall, which would cost only require about \$2 million. This includes property purchase, landscaping, building construction and facilities.

Dean Miller, Caldwell, bonding attorney hired by the school district, attended a meeting Thursday night at the school office with a committee working on proposed sites for the buildings. Also in attendance were members of the school board and central school officials.

Mr. Miller explained the financial issues of bonding and explained procedure and methods by which the school district could bond.

Proposed sites for the two buildings were discussed and it was decided that an option would be taken by the board towards purchase.

**Hike In Small Business Loans Noted**

**IDaho** small businesses were loaned a total of \$8 million during the last fiscal year by the Small Business Administration, announces Oliver Davis, Boise regional director. South Central Idaho businesses received \$1,324,000 in loans.

"With bank participation and direct loans to 133 individual small businesses, this represents an increase of 39 per cent over a like period the previous year," said Mrs. Davis.

The largest increase in money needs came from southwest Idaho where loans more than doubled in the past year. Davis noted that in Twin Falls alone, loans totaled \$194,000, in the Minidoka area, \$298,000, and in the North Side Wood-River area, they totaled \$334,000.

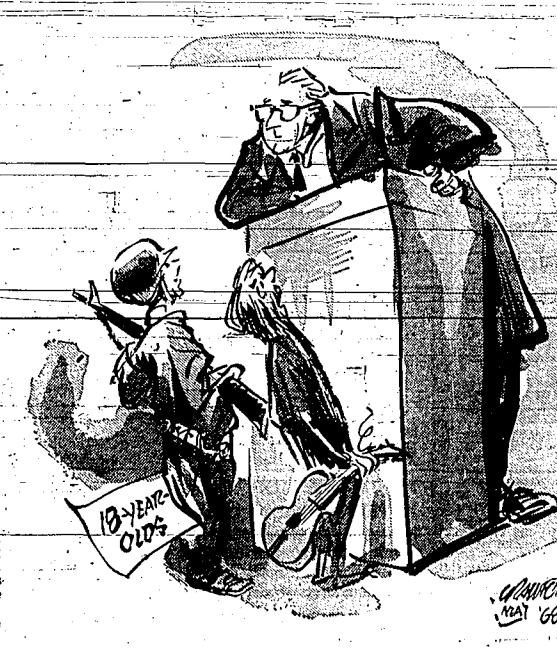

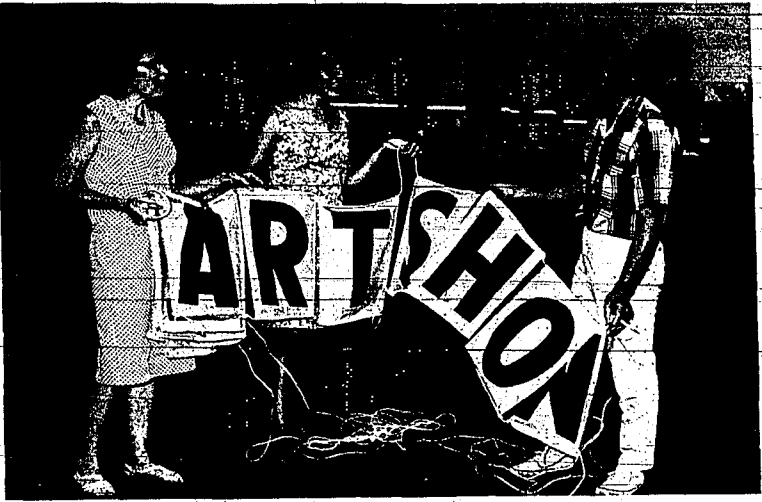

# Admiral Attacks Academy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice Adm. Hyman G. Rickover says the U.S. Naval Academy is not producing the mature, confident and well-educated officers the modern Navy needs.

Rickover also says the Defense Department "is too much influenced by an industry viewpoint" in its dealings with defense contractors and that its "far from being as low as claimed," may be too high.

The deputy commander of the Navy's nuclear propulsion program issued a closed House subcommittee hearing in May. His testimony was released today.

"Naval Academy midshipmen generally lack poise, self-confidence and maturity," Rickover said. "They give the appearance of having these qualities, but it is a superficial appearance with little depth."

He said the most prevalent deficiencies he finds in interviewees are lack of poise, confidence and maturity. He said the Academy and Naval Reserve Officer Training midshipmen fall into the categories of insufficient academic preparation and immaturity.

Academy officials could not be reached for comment.

Rickover said he had been told by one member of the class of 1967 that grades are the important thing at the academy and that "the instructors don't care too much about midshipmen learning the theory as long as he can pass the quizzes."

The admiral, a 1922 graduate of the academy, said he believes the general lack of poise, confidence and maturity are caused by the idealistic but impractical attempts by the Naval Academy to include broad coverage of military training, professional and academic education, sports, etc., without giving anything up.

An emphasis on military indoctrination and training, he said, "is fostered by a strong professional military officer organization centered in the executive department" of the academy at Annapolis, Md.

# Ships Move In Seaway After Strike

OTTAWA (AP) — Ships moved through the St. Lawrence Seaway again today after a 24-day strike that idled nearly 300 ships and cost an estimated \$20 million in wages, seaway tolls and other losses.

Traffic resumed Sunday night a few hours after some 1,200 striking members of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway, Transport and General Workers voted 72 per cent in favor of an agreement providing a 18 per cent wage increase spread over three years and another 4 per cent in fringe benefits.

The increases will cost the seaway authority \$2 million for the three years covered by the agreement.

Ninety-six ships, most of them ocean freighters, were awaiting entry to the inland waterway at Montreal when the strikers ratified the agreement hammered out in two days of bargaining which ended late Saturday.

Another 75 ocean ships were trapped in the system, and more than 100 lake vessels beyond Montreal were stalled.

The agreement virtually wipes out the 20 per cent gap between the wages paid Canadian workers on the heavily subsidized routes and those paid by the United States on the locks it operates. But W. J. Smith, president of the union, pointed out that the American workers open negotiations for a new contract in the fall and said the Canadians would presumably fall behind again.

The agreement gives workers 7 per cent more pay the first year, 6.5 the second and 3.5 the third. The bonus will bring the basic laborer's rate from \$2.77 to \$3.32 an hour. Skilled employees, including carpenters and mechanics, rise from \$2.43 to \$4.36. The first year increase is retroactive to Nov. 1, two months before the expiration of the old contract.

# Weakness Of Allied Intelligence Noted

By JOHN T. WHEELER  
SAIGON (AP) — The Communist command's ability to mass elements of four divisions around Saigon underlines once again the weakness of allied tactical intelligence and the enduring strength of guerrilla warfare tactics.

Despite massive firepower, helicopter mobility, numerical superiority and computers, the allied command has been forced toward the medieval strategy of putting back to defend the city's gates.

The allies have the equivalent of some nine divisions in the Saigon region and along the major infiltration routes leading to the capital. But they have not been able to find and destroy a significant enemy formation other than on the way to Saigon or in their pre-attack positions.

Some 15 enemy battalions are reported within 15 miles of Saigon. One highly placed Vietnamese source says some 1,000 enemy troops have infiltrated the city itself despite the ring of patrolling troops and hundreds of police checkpoints.

The establishment of a vast beefed up capital military district command is a tacit admission that the Viet Cong cannot be stopped before they reach Saigon. During the two previous offensives this year, some 4,000 troops managed to penetrate the city in February and about 1,200 in May and June. The allied command was caught flatfooted in February but had ample warning of the May offensive.

Mountains of intelligence on the expected Viet Cong attack in allied hands, but the vital details of just where individual enemy units are holed up are not part of it.

One U.S. source said lagging intelligence has resulted in B52 strikes as much as a day behind enemy movement toward the capital. The Stratofortresses are supposed to destroy the enemy

regiments before they can get into position for an attack.

Most tactical intelligence apparently comes from electronic and photographic devices and the like most of them carried by plane. Due to past demonstrations that U.S. and government troops cannot prevent enemy movements from villagers has dried up significantly, one source reported.

The villagers face multiple problems if they help. Allied troops may attack their villages causing widespread damage. Of the helpful villagers may be betrayed and executed, along with all their families. Viet Cong punishment for informers is swift, brutal and final.

Thus the old Communist strategy of swimming through the people remains as fundamentally sound as ever. That 1,000 of these fish can swim undetected in Saigon itself shows that the strategy works as well in the cities as in the countryside.

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Carlos Prado Uribe, 20, a Mexican fisherman, has been rescued after a harrowing 18 days adrift in the Gulf of Mexico in a tiny green rowboat.

The young fisherman covered 64 miles. Several times he spotted ships between swells but they didn't see him.

Uribe lived off bait—dead fish—and rain water after he became lost near the Yucatan Peninsula. He was plucked from the Gulf Saturday night by the crew of the Escourt, a Belgian freighter.

Speaking was Bryon Nelson, now 56, who won about everything he could a generation or more ago but never managed the British Open.

"That Carnoustie course still scares me, certainly those last two holes," he said.

Nelson, whose best finish in the British Open was fifth in 1937, now is a television commentator and was on hand when Player captured his second Open title, standing off the challenge of Jack Nicklaus and New Zealand's Bob Charles for his first tournament victory in three years.

"The galleries here are so knowledgeable that they really can know the negotiation of a golf shot. They care, I suppose about the results of a round but it seems they care a great deal more about the execution of a golf shot."

What Nelson was saying is exactly what happened when Player, fashions his winning 289 on Saturday, smashed a really great shot to the 14th green and from four feet holed an eagle three which, in the final analysis, won him the title.

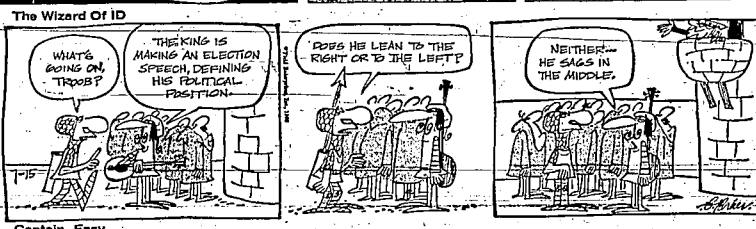
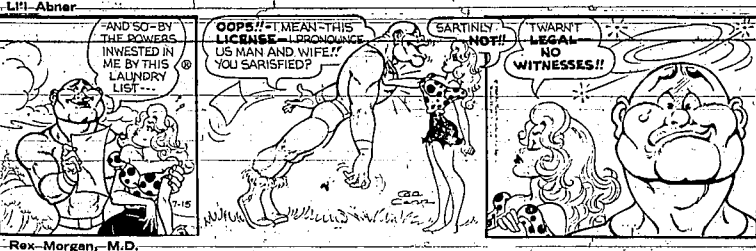
**NO-TRUMP RAISE NEEDS STRENGTH**  
 Oswald: "Some bridge players like to fight against windmills. Because there is a bonus for making a game, they bid game on hands that should play at a low and safe part score."  
 Jim: "Some bridge writers encourage some of these unsound game bids. Take a look at the North hand as an example. North has eight points and a 4-3-3-3 distribution. Eight points is in the 18-19 range. If South has a full 18 points for his no-trump opening bid, take a look at the hand should play in these no-trump. If he has 10 or 17-it shouldn't but books recommend a raise with this North hand."  
 Oswald: "Not our books. We don't want to be in two no trump if our partner has only 16. We are too likely to go down. We aren't even too happy about getting to game-if he has 18."

Twenty-six points don't always produce a game and North has no 10 spot and this very poor 4-3-3-3 distribution. When the hand was played South had some chance to make his three no-trump. A heart was opened and the defense collected four-entire heart-tricks-and then shifted to a club.  
 Oswald: "South won the club and went after spades. When the jack dropped he had four spade-tricks. That means all he needed was a diamond finesse but the diamond finesse failed, as did the play for game and rubber."  
 Jim: "We might add that we do recommend action opposite partner's opening no-trump with eight high card points plus extra values, such as a couple of 10 spots or a five-card suit. But with a really flat hand, such as North did hold, the best procedure is to stop at one and try for the small, sure profit."

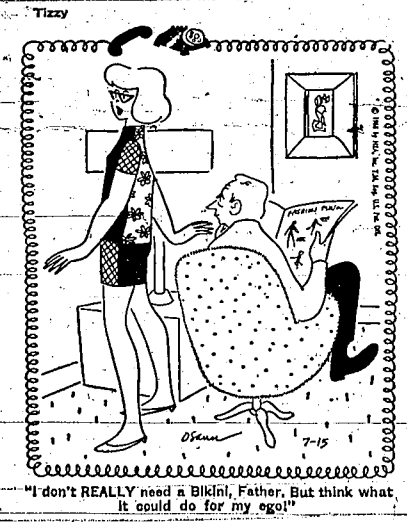
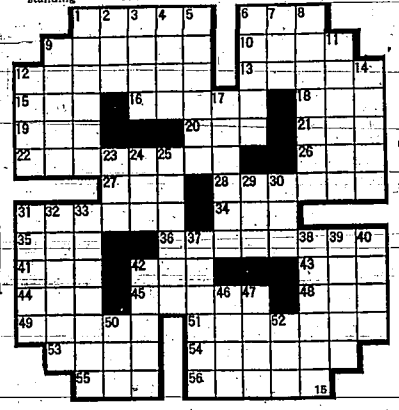

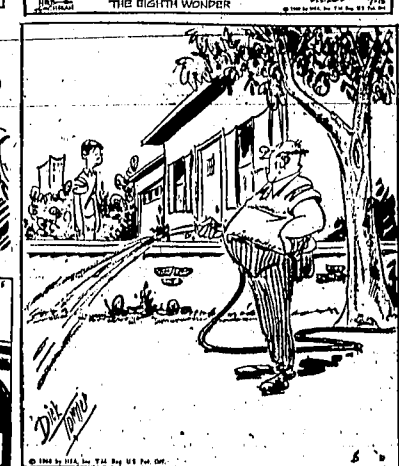

## Burley Air Force Pilot Is Given Two Honors After Air Mishap In Vietnam

Maj. Bruce D. Stocks, 35-year-old combat fighter pilot from Burley, has received two of the highest honors bestowed by the Air Force.

He has been decorated with the Air Force Cross, the highest Air Force award for heroism in combat and second only to the Medal of Honor.

The major has also been selected for Air Force-wide recognition as a recipient of the 1967 Koren Kolligian Jr. trophy. The trophy, named and established in memory of a lieutenant who died in a 1955 aircraft accident, honors aerial skill handling a flight emergency.

Major Stocks, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Preston Stocks, 1310 Normal Ave., Burley, was presented the medal and trophy at the Pentagon.

The major, now a flight test engineer for the swing-wing F-111, received both awards for his efforts and airmanship after his F-105 Thunderchief was shot down by surface-to-air missiles over North Vietnam and he was wounded.

Maj. Stocks was lead pilot in a four-ship formation flying fire suppression when he and the second aircraft crew were hit. The major received arm and chest wounds and his aircraft radio and fuel systems were damaged.

Ignoring his handicaps, Maj. Stocks escorted the second crew, who were forced to eject to a safe bailout point and then provided protective air cover for the downed airman until search and rescue aircraft arrived over the site.

Then Maj. Stocks found an aerial tanker and performed the exacting task of connecting with the tanker to take on fuel. He then flew the stricken fighter-bomber several hundred miles to his home station, Takhli Royal Thai Air Force Base, Thailand, to successfully save the plane.

Maj. Stocks returned from Southeast Asia in March and is now assigned to the Air Force plant representative office at General Dynamics Corp., manufacturer of the new twin-engine tactical fighter-bomber, at Fort Worth, Tex.

He and his wife, the former Carol F. Russ, have three sons and a daughter.

Specialist Webster, on May 6, while serving with the Third Battalion 319th artillery in Vietnam, distinguished himself when his company engaged in enemy combat. Specialist Webster moved from position to position, exposing himself to heavy enemy fire in order to bring the men of his company ammunition and hand-grenades. He also moved near the enemy position and engaged in hand grenade combat at close range. He moved into

areas a number of times to help recover wounded fellow soldiers. He entered the service in November of 1965 and has been serving in Vietnam since Aug. 17, 1967. He is a graduate of the Filer High School, the serviceman's wife, Kathy Webster, and their year-old daughter, Cheri, reside at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Pullin, Kimberly.
