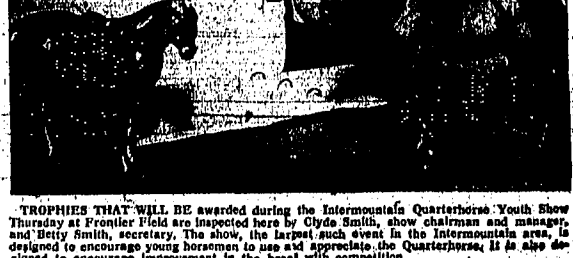

Stamp Issue Is Sold Rapidly

One of the most unusual, and most attractive, issues of a commemorative stamp by the United States Post Office Department already is becoming a rarity around here, especially at the Twin Falls Post Office report.

The stamp is the "Historic Flag Series," depicting on separate stamps 10 different flags that Americans carried as colonists and as citizens of a new nation.

What makes the issue unusual, especially from a philatelic standpoint, is that all 10 different stamps are printed in five rows on a standard sheet of 50 stamps. The flags all are in full color.

Whether because of the interest of philatelists or "flag buffs," or the outstanding attractiveness of the stamps, the local Post Office sold out its supply in about two weeks.

The stamp went on sale here July 5. The Kimberly Post Office also has sold its supply, as have several other post offices in surrounding towns.

In all, according to the Post Office Department bulletin, 120 million of the stamps were printed, with the sheets to be distributed among about 33,000 post offices. The Twin Falls Post Office got a shipment of 10,000, or 200 sheets of 50.

Postal employees here said they will not be able to order an additional supply.

Whether these stamps will have any substantial value in the future as a collector's item is anybody's guess, but the guess right now is that they will be worth something in years to come? Maybe.

Artificial Rainfall May End Problems

WASHINGTON (AP)—Weather modification plans for the Colorado River basin "if they are successful" may reduce pressure from the Southwest to divert water from northwest states, including Idaho.

Rep. George Hansen, R-Idaho made the statement after a meeting of a House Interior subcommittee Monday in which Reclamation Commissioner Floyd E. Dominy testified.

Dominy told the group experiments intended to induce rainfall artificially are "in progress," Hansen said.

If they are successful, "then the Colorado Basin states will have no excuse to ask for diversion of water from Idaho or the Pacific Northwest," he explained.

Hansen said if the experiments proved successful, further attempts to divert Northwest water would be recognized as "an out-and-out attempt to better their own economy at our expense."

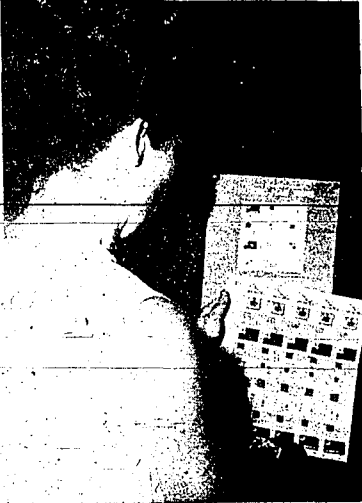

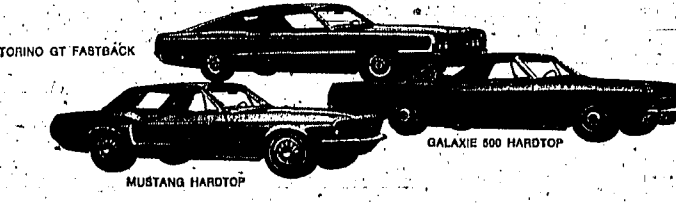

Blood Vessels

Dear Dr. Molner: I am a male, 46-in-good-physical-condition except that two years ago I had a blood vessel burst in my eye. It has happened twice since then. Each time I called the doctor but he advised me not to worry and said no treatment was necessary.

Since there was no apparent cause for this I am worried if it is a sign of vascular weakness or deterioration. Can anything be done to prevent recurrence? ... This sort of thing does happen to some people, and as a rule they get the same correct advice. Ordinarily the explanation is a fragility of the tiny capillary blood vessels in the trip about once a week—B.M. Maybe you haven't harmed yourself so far and I hope not, but you must have been on a "trip" the times I wrote about this before.

The foremost dangers are damage to the heart and to the blood, and by the time you begin to notice symptoms, there will have been permanent damage which cannot be repaired medically. A few months of glue-sniffing can wreck the liver worse than years of hard drinking. It's as simple as that.

Dear Dr. Molner: I have a very noticeable mole above my right eye and would like to have it removed surgically but have been told that mole removal would cause cancer. Will it?

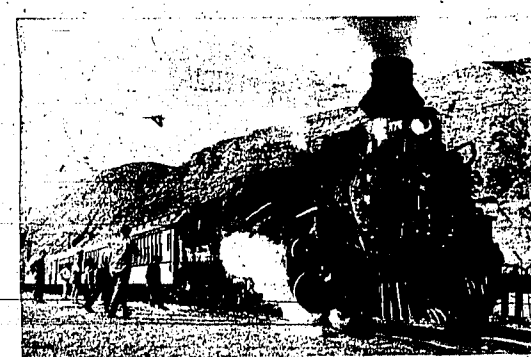
Red Dissension

What with the Union Pacific and a lot of other railroads trying their best bid of passenger traffic, it might do them good to glance toward Colorado and the Denver and Rio Grande Western. No doubt about it—the best paying train on the D. and R.G. right now is the "Silverton" which runs from Durango to Silverton and return each day.

The Silverton train has been defeated as a registered historical landmark by the National Park Service. And so the six-hour round trip on the narrow gauge road with the little engines and the yellow-orange coaches becomes more popular each year.

Import Curb Action Stalled

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Presumably Congress will adjourn before the two conventions in August may stall at least for awhile the little-heralded protection drive for import quotas on steel, textiles, oil, meat and other products.

the Wall Street Journal forecasts not only a widespread distortion of markets but a debilitation of a good deal of the U.S. economy. These business paper warnings add to a chorus coming from spokesmen for agriculture, for much of industry, public service groups and others.

Operating as it is without effective national leadership, U.S. industry is more easily broken into fragments which special economic and other interests find "workable." Without a centralizing power to rally around for resistance, the fragmented elements are more amenable to pressure.

Recipient Of Heart Doing OK

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — Surgeons transplanted the heart of a youth fatally injured in an auto accident into the body of a Nebraska man today in what they described as a very successful operation.

It was the 27th such transplant in the world and the second in three days at St. Luke's Episcopal hospital, where seven now have been performed. Hospital spokesman identified the recipient as Henry W. Jurgens, 57, of Beatrice, Neb. They said he entered St. Luke's Sunday morning from advanced heart disease.

The donor was Michael K. Buxton, 16, of Houston, who suffered massive head injuries in an auto accident Monday morning. He died at 12:47 a.m., the hospital reported, and the transplant surgery was completed at 2:15 a.m.

Dr. Denton A. Cooley supervised the operation, as he has the others at St. Luke's. A spokesman said he considered it very successful and pronounced Jurgens in highly satisfactory condition.

Hospital spokesmen said the patient who received a new heart Saturday—Fred C. Everman, 62, a retired barber from Alexandria, Va.—was able to walk unassisted from his bed to a chair.

Everman received the heart of Evelyn G. Krikorian, 33, a Houston housewife who died of complications from a kidney ailment. He was reported in "very satisfactory condition."

Of the previous heart transplant patients at St. Luke's, three others continue to recuperate and two have died.

Everett C. Thomas, 47, of Phoenix, Ariz., who received a new heart May 3, has left the hospital and plans to start work Aug. 1 at a Houston bank, Cooley said.

Louis J. Piarro, 54, of Elmont, N.Y., underwent surgery May 21. He probably will move to Houston for twice-weekly check-ups when he is dismissed, Cooley said.

The third patient, George Henry DeBord, 46, of Helotes, Tex., also is progressing satisfactorily, Cooley said. DeBord received a new heart July 2.

Elizabeth Taylor Has Operation

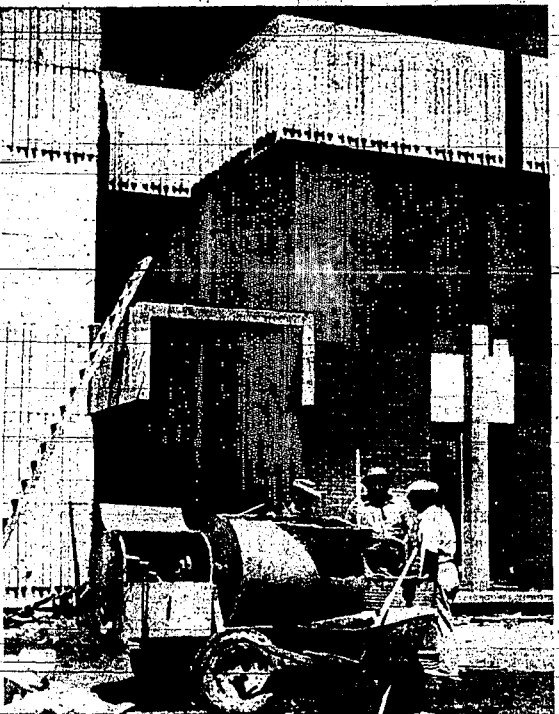

Future Of Edward Kennedy Is Political Question Of Hour

By CORNELIUS F. HURLEY, staff writer when Kennedy was a senator.

What the future holds for Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, the last surviving brother of the Kennedy clan, is one of the major political questions of the hour. The question grows as the time draws near for the Democratic National Convention. There has been speculation whether he will become a candidate for vice president, or even whether he will remain in the Senate.

A meeting Monday at the Kennedy compound overlooking Nantucket Sound brought together some of the leading figures in the campaign and administration of the late President John F. Kennedy, and in the brief campaign of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy which ended with an assassin's bullet June 5.

Gathering to discuss creation of a memorial to Robert Kennedy were such men as Robert S. McNamara, Arthur M. Schlesinger Jr., Theodore C. Sorensen, and Kenneth P. O'Donnell. There were about a dozen others for the meeting on the memorial plans.

McNamara was secretary of defense in the Kennedy and Johnson administrations, until his appointment as president of the World Bank.

Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey let it be known last week he'd be happy to have Kennedy as his running mate on the Democratic ticket. But he said Monday night in a New aide to President Kennedy and York interview, that whether he will invite Kennedy to run is "greatly dependent on Mr. Kennedy's wishes and views."

O'Donnell has been a Kennedy campaigner for years, and also was in the White House.

Also at the meeting was Frank Mankiewicz who was on a chartered sailboat with family members and some friends, was on hand, he has made no comment on his political plans.

Richard Cardinal Cushing of Boston, an old family friend, said a few weeks ago Kennedy should retire from politics and public life to be more available to the 12 fatherless children of his two slain brothers.

By JOHN CHADWICK, WASHINGTON (AP) — An opponent of President Johnson's Supreme Court nominations has labeled as propaganda a Justice Department report favorable to the Justice-designate Abe Fortas.

The comment was made Monday to the Senate Judiciary Committee by Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., D-S.C., whose request that Justice Department representatives be called to explain the report at today's committee session was granted by Chairman James O. Eastland, D-Miss.

The unexpected development came after the committee apparently had wound up its hearings into Fortas' nomination to succeed Earl Warren—and at least temporarily—into the nomination of Homer Thornberry to be an associate justice.

The Justice Department's 27-page memorandum on the "judicial performance of Mr. Justice Fortas" was put in the record last Saturday by Sen. Philip A. Hart, D-Mich.

Hart said he had requested it to provide "more balanced record" after the critical questioning of Fortas by Ervin and Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C.

Department Report 'Propaganda'

Ervin called the Justice Department document an attempt to propagandize the committee and said he intended to answer it and wanted to question the lawyers who drafted it.
