Committee For Minidoka Bond Proposal Picked

RUPERT — Rodney Hansen and Ross Hunsaker have been elected co-chairmen of the Citizen's Committee appointed recently by the Minidoka County School Board of Trustees to study the feasibility of construction of two new junior high schools for the district.

The men will be in charge of publicity and scheduling general meetings for the public in connection with the school building proposal.

The committee will plan to meet with all interested groups from Labor Day until Sept. 7, the date of the bond election.

During a recent meeting of the group, Dean Miller, bonding attorney, noted that the probable interest rates for the upcoming bond issue are difficult to estimate "since there are so many variables." He estimated a 4 1/2 per cent rate, and said interest rates on school bonds are tax exempt.

The group discussed the advisability of amortizing payment of the bond issue an even amount over a 20-year period by just paying the interest rate on the bond and postponing the principle until present bond issues are paid off.

Postponement would mean the county could afford it with a 12-mile levy, whereas the other would take at least a 15-mile levy to pay off bonds until present bonds are paid off. At that time, it would drop to about nine mills.

The bond issue would include a new junior high in the west end of the county, and one near Rupert, plus additions at Heyburn and Minico. Passage of the proposed bond issue would mean an increase of approximately \$20 to \$25 annually for an average 80-acre farm or small business, and an increase of \$10 to \$15 for the average new three-bedroom home.

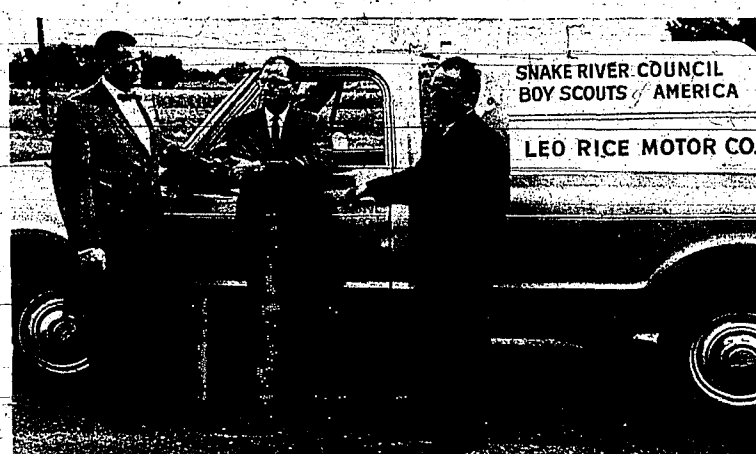

Nose For Clues Not To Be Sniffed At

Police Dog's Job Has Gone To Pot

SAN YSIDRO, Calif. (AP) — Rebel is a police dog who makes it his business to catch marijuana smugglers with his nose. The 105-pound, silver-and-black German shepherd divides his time between the San Ysidro Border Customs station near Tijuana, Mexico, and the U.S. Customs Mail Division headquarters in San Francisco 500 miles to the north. With his handler, agent Bob Gore, Rebel has piled up an impressive number of successful cases since he began his job six months ago. He's a fantastic dog," says Gore. "Controlled breathing is the secret of his success." Rebel goes into action when Gore slips on the dog's "association collar" which makes him relate to his job. With his collar on, Rebel seeks out the weed and even places where it has been hidden or smoked, and he will claw and dig until he gets to it. One of Rebel's most difficult cases, Gore recalled, happened at the San Francisco mail division when he became obsessed with a package containing a portable tape recorder. "When we finally disassembled the recorder," Gore said, "we found 11 plastic bags of marijuana stuffed up under the top of it—some when we removed most of the internal parts—we found six more bags in the bottom of it." The mail supervisor told Gore the nearly two pounds of marijuana never would have been found without Rebel's help. Another major find was in San Ysidro, Gore said, where Rebel became so interested in one car that officials began a search. That yielded more than 4,000 illegal amphetamine tablets.

Rebel doesn't have a nose for pills," Gore said, "but apparently marijuana had been smoked in the car sometime, and that led us to search the vehicle." Rebel has sniffed out the weed hidden in arm rests, suit linings, pickup truck beds and luggage, Gore said. He was among 175 German shepherds screened for the job by Charles Art, owner of a police dog school in Plymouth, Mich. He stands taller than most other dogs either because they had a bad nose or bad disposition," Gore said. His only reward after closing another case is an affectionate pat on the head. But Rebel is not alone in his fight against crime. Police in San Francisco and San Diego, Calif., have reported using German shepherds with some success. The use of dogs to sniff out narcotics isn't new either, according to the Federal Bureau of Investigation in San Francisco. The FBI used dogs to detect opium about 20 years ago, but dropped the program when it found the dogs were becoming addicted.

Park Meeting Attended By Rupert Men

RUPERT — City Councilman George MacDonald and City Engineer Ron Klebo attended a meeting with the State Board of Parks and Recreation in McCall and presented tentative plans for the development of the city's new recreation park in the Big Valley Subdivision, in the northern part of the city. The plans were presented, hoping that they would meet the specifications to qualify for participating Federal funds, Mr. MacDonald explained. The plans call for the construction of four baseball diamonds, backdrops, dugouts, lightings, rest room facilities, storage space, and parking areas. Mr. MacDonald said because of the specific nature of the Rupert project, it has a low priority rating, but the board indicated it was impressed with the city's overall program which provides a variety of activity for both city and county residents. Following the report from the Rupert city officials, the board agreed to send two staff members to work with the city in writing the project up to a higher priority rating. Mr. MacDonald noted that the higher priority ratings apply to more generalized projects.

Czechoslovakia Situation May Harden Democratic Foreign Affairs Posture

CHICAGO (AP)—At a sensitive moment in American politics, the Soviet Union's troop withdrawal from Czechoslovakia is likely to harden the foreign affairs posture of Democrats convening in Chicago and of the Republican party as well. "Among Democrats, the crisis in eastern Europe probably will assist Vice President Humphrey, who already is the commanding leader for the presidential nomination to be awarded at the party's national convention next week. His chief rival, Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy of Minnesota, is banking heavily on a convention battle over Vietnam war policy to bolster his bid to overtake Humphrey. But echoes of the European crisis undoubtedly will make the task of Democratic doves far more difficult. For the convention is not likely to adopt a conciliatory plank on dealing with the Communists in Vietnam while Communist troops in Europe are on the march. The movement by Soviet, Polish, East German, Hungarian and Bulgarian troops came after weeks of tension over internal liberalization of the Czech Communist regime. The trend represented a break with old-line communism. The Soviet government said its troops moved at the request of Czechoslovakia to meet a threat to the Socialist system. While the situation was not clear, its part on the Democratic platform hearings under way in Washington could only be one of stiffening attitudes toward the Communist world. President Johnson summoned the National Security Council into crisis session—and candidate Humphrey is a member of that panel. If the crisis persists, the political drawbacks of identification with the president, Johnson's administration—and the Vietnam policy—may offset for Humphrey by the tendency toward national unity behind the government, which normally occurs in times of international crisis. In fact, there has been the expected flurry of gossip that in the time of crisis there might be a late-starting movement to draft Johnson himself for the nomination—though he has said he would not accept renomination. For the Republicans and their presidential nominee, Richard M. Nixon, there was a ding of irony in the European developments. Two weeks ago, Nixon accepted the nomination with a flourish in which he held out hope for a time of negotiations with the Communist world. "After an era of confrontation," he said, "the time has come for an era of negotiations."

Education Can Save Numerous Mothers' Lives
ONTARIO, Canada — Good news department: Deaths from childbirth and from abortions have reached an all-time low in Ontario, and credit for this achievement was given to the widespread use of birth-control pills and better sex education. This report comes from W. T. Noonan, M. D., secretary of the maternal welfare committee of the Ontario Medical Association. Noonan said that the maternal death rate in 1965 was down to 1.3 per 100,000 births and that abortions took only six lives. Dr. Noonan said that the large decrease in the number of criminal abortions resulted from the spread of family planning information and broader acceptance of contraceptives. "Those who might have used abortions in the past," Dr. Noonan said, "are getting pregnant." They are preventing pregnancies.

Intravenously Fed Children Grow Normally
SAN FRANCISCO — Parents need not be fearful that an infant's normal growth and development will be affected if it is fed intravenously for long periods of time. This reassurance comes from Stanley D. Dudrick and colleagues of the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine who presented studies of 10 infants on intravenous feeding for 10 to 210 days to the American Medical Association meeting here. During that period weight gain, growth, and development progressed normally, and normal wound healing took place. "In one infant we have been able to provide sufficient nutrition exclusively by vein for about a year," Dr. Dudrick told Women's Medical News Service. "This is the first demonstration, we believe, of a newborn fed exclusively this way. She weighed four pounds at birth, and after eight months weighed 13.5 pounds. She continues to thrive in the hospital."

Here's a recipe guaranteed to make your reputation as a truly creative home cook. Reminiscent of many more elaborate (and difficult and time-consuming) terrines and meat pies with brischole or puff pastry bases, our Neapolitan Beef Pie starts with ready-to-use refrigerated crescent rolls.

NEAPOLITAN BEEF PIE

- 1 pound lean ground beef
 - 1 can (8 ounces) tomato sauce
 - 1/2 cup chopped fresh parsley
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 2 packages (3-ounce each) refrigerated crescent dinner rolls
 - 3 eggs
 - 1 jar (2 1/2 ounces) shredded Parmesan cheese (about 3/4 cup)
 - 1 medium onion, thinly sliced
 - 6 slices (1/2 ounce) mild cheddar cheese
 - 1/2 cup frozen mozzarella Swiss or Proceesa American
 - 1 tablespoon water
- In skillet brown beef; pour off fat. Remove onion; heat and stir in tomato sauce, parsley, salt and pepper; set aside.
- One package rolls into a ball. On floured roll, place 1/2-inch slice; line 8-inch pie pan. Combine two eggs and one egg white, reserving yolk; with Parmesan cheese, spread over dough; top with beef, spreading evenly. Arrange onion and cheese over beef; spread remaining egg mixture over cheese. Mix reserved egg yolk with water; brush pastry edge. Press remaining package of rolls into a ball; roll to 1/2-inch thick and place over filling. Trim, seal and flute edge; cut steam vents in top. (If desired, decorate with fancy cutouts made from plastic trimmings). Brush with remaining yolk mixture. Bake at 350 degrees for 60 minutes. (If pastry begins to overbrown, cover with sheet of foil.) Let stand 10 minutes before cutting. Pie may be served warm or chilled. Make six servings.
- VARIATION:** If you have four thin slices boiled or baked ham on hand, add them to Neapolitan Beef Pie. Follow recipe as directed, covering cheese slices with the four ham slices. Spread the remaining Parmesan cheese egg mixture over the ham slices and proceed as in the recipe.

Handtags Help In Upkeep Of Ready-To-Wear

GLENN'S FERRY — A handtag can help turn upkeep of clothes from a bore to a breeze, reminds Marily Jordan, Elmore County home extension agent. In fact, the handtag ranks with fashion and fit among important considerations in buying, according to researchers. Handtags and labels tell fabric and finish. They are essential to upkeep.

Many clothes, sheets, bedspreads and curtains have fabrics and finishes unlike those of a few years ago. Knowing their characteristics is the first step in giving them proper care. To mention a few, there are permanent press, water repellent, soil and oil finishes, while newer still are the soil-releasing finishes for dacron cotton blends.

Study of handtags and labels will teach what to expect of each modern material and what the terms mean. Usually "no ironing" means that touch-up ironing is needed. If you know the generic and trade names of fibers and fabrics and what to expect of each, you'll be a wise shopper. If you wash a wool sweater when the label says "dry clean only" you may ruin the day.



"This legislation has been recommended by the Johnson administration despite the fact that we are in a fiscal crisis that has placed in jeopardy the financial structure of this country," Hansen said.

Cain of the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, Pasadena, Calif., reported their Venus air density calculations Wednesday in the American Meteorological Society's Journal of Atmospheric Sciences.

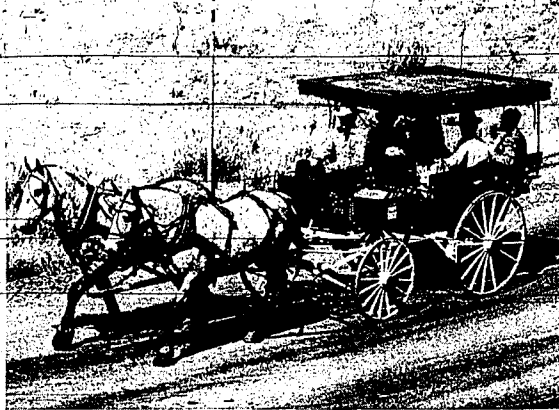

Magic Valley Highway Work Report Given

SHOSHONE — Idaho Highway Department officials Thursday released information on Magic Valley highway projects and revealed that work on State Highway 30 from Red Cap Corner to the Hansen Bridge is nearly 75 per cent finished.

Highway connectors are being finished at Red Cap Corner and at the bridge and workers are sealing roads in the area.

At the present time, sealcoating from Kimberly to Hansen, and North Five Points in Twin Falls, to the Hansen Bridge is 88 per cent complete.

In other area highway work, officials said bids will be opened Sept. 3 for Interstate 80N construction between Cottrell and Sublett. When the contract is awarded, the entire stretch of road between Cottrell and Sublett will be under construction.

Work in area also improving 400 West Road in Mindoka County. This project is 28 per cent complete.

The repair of 850 West Road overpass is starting. That overpass was damaged several

months ago when supports were smashed by trucks. Since that time, a weight limit on the overpass has been strictly observed.

Work on 6.8 miles between Rogerson and Three Creek Road is 69 per cent complete, officials said.

Construction of a rest area facility east and west of the junction of highway 93 and Interstate 80N is 37 per cent complete.

Work is now progressing on sealcoating from the Jerome interchange to Greenwood on Interstate 80N, officials noted.

The new Halley maintenance building is 98 per cent complete at the present time.

Officials said all projects are in addition to work done by maintenance crews on routine sealcoating, sign post painting, land hole patching.

Utah Welfare Rights Organization Sets Goals To Raise Income Levels

By CAROL LYN DEEGAN SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—Utah Public Assistance grants — and how to raise monthly levels to meet end of living increases — is the target of the newly organized Utah Welfare Rights Organization.

The organization, recently formed in Salt Lake City, has invited various state minority groups to aid in efforts to upgrade standards of persons receiving state welfare.

Corresponding Secretary Marvel Poulos of Salt Lake City says the group will seek legislation to raise monthly welfare grants and to provide better low-cost housing.

Groups indicating an interest in the new organization have included the National Association for Advancement of Colored People and the Spanish-speaking Organization for Community, Integrity and Opportunity.

Proposed legislation to increase grants about \$20 from present levels was discussed on Tuesday night at a meeting at the Salt Lake County Complex.

Opinions on the proposal were offered by Milton Wellenmann and Utah Attorney General Phil Hansen, seeking the Democratic Senate nomination, and Galen Ross, seeking the Democratic Congressional nomination.

Wellenmann pointed out the 1966 Utah Legislature — dominated by a Republican majority — had refused to approve cost of living increases for welfare payments. Grants were frozen at a minimum monthly payment of \$85 for one person.

He noted that although the Utah Welfare Rights Organization is seeking a maximum one-person payment of \$115 a month to meet essential needs, Hansen advised the group to organize efforts and swarm down on legislators like "the seagulls swarmed down on the crickets."

"I can prove the United States spends more money in one year on chewing gum than on welfare grants," he said.

"The Utah Attorney General said persons in governmental offices should take the problem by the horns — regardless of political advancement — and tell it like it is."

Ross advocated support of a proposed national guaranteed income. He said the \$12 billion needed to finance such a program could come through a cutback in Vietnam spending, Defense Department appropriations and payments to farmers for not farming their lands.

Utah Water Unit Okays Several Ideas

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—The Utah Water Pollution Committee has approved several amendments suggested by the federal government to propose water quality standards for interstate streams.

One amendment would lower the temperature of cold water fishing from 70 to 68 degrees. Warm water fishing would remain at 80 degrees.

The amendments will be the subject of public hearings at Logan, Price and Salt Lake City. Dates for the hearings have not been announced.

Under the Federal Water Quality Act of 1947, all states were to adopt the water quality standards by June of 1967 or have the government set the standards. Utah met the deadline but the federal government has suggested several amendments.

In its meeting Wednesday, the committee elected Wesley Jensen of Utah Packers Inc. of Provo as its chairman, and Frank K. Borg of the University of Utah was named vice chairman.

Fish And Game Gives Gun Law Summary

BOISE (AP)—The Idaho Fish and Game Department on Wednesday summarized state laws governing the use of firearms. The department said the summary was issued "because of the national dialogue now underway on the matter of additional restrictions on the sale of firearms, and because another big game hunting season is in the offing."

Persons carrying an unlicensed or unlicensed in field or forest must have a hunting license. Children under 12 are not allowed to carry weapons. The use of rim-fire 22 caliber cartridges on any game animal is prohibited. Center fire cartridges may be used, including the ".218" type.

Use of 12 gauge weapons on upland game birds or waterfowl is illegal. Rifles or pistols may be used in hunting forest grouse and turkey. Automatic rifles are illegal while semi-automatic rifles are legal. Shotgun barrels must be over 18 inches in length. Shotgun shells may be used on big game animals, but slugs or balls are prohibited as ammunition. Pistols, except 22 caliber, may be used on big game, but are not recommended. Automatic rifles are illegal unless a permit is obtained from a county sheriff. Game animals which may be hunted include: bear, cougar, bobcat, squirrel, jack rabbit, raccoon, raccoon, and snowshoe rabbit. These animals may be hunted during specified seasons: grouse, pheasant, turkey, chukar, quail. Ducks, geese and mourning doves may be hunted during specified seasons. These unregulated birds may be hunted any time during any season. These unregulated birds include: sparrow, kingfisher, magpie, plover, crow and starling. Further details are available from the department.
