 fight, while allied casualties were light.  
 Six attacks were reported in the Saigon area amidst reports that elements of two North Vietnamese divisions were on the move from Cambodian border areas toward the capital.  
 Sources put some 40 units near Dau Tikong, some miles northwest of Saigon, where U.S.-armored columns and North Vietnamese troops have been locked in a weeklong battle for control of a road over which enemy infiltrators must cross en route to the capital.  
 In stepped up efforts to blunt the threats, U.S. Air Force B-52s pounded the rubber-plantations area surrounding Dau Tikong road with 300 tons of explosives.  
 Some 30 Stratofortresses launched missions against infiltration corridors between Saigon and enemy base camps.  
 "The most serious situation appeared to be at the Green Heron area. Two Special Forces companies along the Cambodian border 130 miles northeast of Saigon.  
 Headquarters said the enemy fired a barrage of rockets and mortars at the some 100 American and South Vietnamese defenders, then sent 500 infiltrators to storm the site.  
 With the help of U.S. Army helicopter gunships, the defenders were reported holding out against the enemy force which surrounded the camp. Fighting was described as heavy.  
 Headquarters said initial reports listed 22 enemy killed, while U.S. forces sustained no casualties were light.

## Summary, Extended Outlook

No rain was reported anywhere, although during the past 24 hours eastern areas recorded more rainfall with only local reports of additional rain elsewhere.  
 Warmer weather is now forecast for Idaho valleys during the next few days. Some large gains in daytime temperatures will occur today with temperatures into the upper 60s into the 80s. A cold front moving into the Pacific Northwest will produce partly cloudy in west parts of Southern Idaho through the weekend. Saturday. But it appears doubtful that the storm will remain strong enough to produce rain in the Snake River Valley. Daytime temperatures ranged from 49 at Montpelier to 78 at Ontario. ## Police Gird For Battle In Wichita

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) — Three daylight gang robberies and shootings by Negro youths played Wichita police as they prepared for a possible third night of street violence in this central Kansas city of some 275,000 population.  
 Gov. Robert Docking ordered Wichita National Guardsmen into their armory for possible use if they are needed as a curfew went into effect for all of Sedgewick County at 10 p.m.  
 Chief of Police Eugene Pond said "if these things occur in daylight, there is no telling what could happen during the night."  
 Police said about 15 youths swarmed into the Wichita Brokerage Co., a hardware and auto parts firm, forcing clerks to lie on the floor at gunpoint, and made off with \$200 cash and \$300 worth of power tools.  
 About 20 youths robbed a supermarket at 25th and Hillside of an unknown amount of money and wounded two young boys. Stewart Brown, 15, was shot in a wrist, and Thomas Weichert, 17, was slugged on the head.  
 Minutes later, two youths entered a dairy bar and took money from the cash register.  
 Four men were arrested in the hardware robbery.  
 Two fire bombings with minor damage were reported in Wichita.

## Medics Say Ike Rallies In Illness

WASHINGTON (AP) — Army doctors reported today there is "encouraging" evidence in former President Dwight D. Eisenhower's status but that his overall condition "must still be considered critical and the outlook guarded."  
 The term "guarded" means that the doctors still consider unpredictable the matter of the general's survival from this 71st heart attack since 1955.  
 The report of the doctors of the Walter Reed Army Hospital was issued as Eisenhower was within hours of completing the first week since he was stricken with his latest attack at 1:25 p.m. EDT last Friday.  
 In connection with at least some of the heart attack which Eisenhower had suffered previous to his one, his doctors have said that the so-called "critical" period generally lasts about a week. They said that this is true for any patient suffering at least the kind of heart attack known as a "myocardial infarction" where the heart attack involves actual damage.

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## Jury To Probe Demo Assassination Rumor

CHICAGO (AP) — A federal grand jury opens an investigation today into an alleged plot to assassinate Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and two senators, and to disrupt next week's Democratic National Convention.  
 U.S. Atty. Thomas A. Foran said Thursday he subpoenaed members and some who took part in a peace march on the Pentagon last October.  
 The rumored assassination plot was to involve Humphrey; Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, also a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination; and Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., Foran said.  
 McClellan headed a Senate investigation into the activities of two South Side youth gangs recently which resulted in their losing a federal antipoverty grant.  
 The prosecutor said the report which originated in Cook County Guardsmen arrive in Chicago to be used if needed to maintain order in the event of disturbances next week.  
 The remainder of the troops, requested by Mayor Richard Daley, will arrive at armories Saturday.  
 Gov. Samuel H. Shapiro ordered the troop callup after consulting with Daley, and in the face of threatened antiwar demonstrations around the International Amphitheatre, the convention site, and the downtown hotels where delegates and candidates were to be housed.

## Latin Cheer Papal Trip; Speech Set

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Pope Paul VI was hailed as the Pope of hope by thousands of Colombians who watched with emotion as the pontiff kissed the soil when first setting foot in this part of the world.  
 Many went Thursday as they witnessed this act of humility by the Pope and proclaimed it the crowning moment of his historic visit.  
 The pontiff's journeys by helicopter today to a meeting with thousands of Latin-American peasants in a huge meadow called San Jose Field, outside the village of Mosquera, 18 miles from Bogota.  
 "His address is expected to be of far-reaching significance. The Catholic hierarchy is already on record stressing that the Church will take a more active role in the effort to help Latin America's impoverished millions."  
 The 70-year-old pontiff's welcome Thursday was described as the most tumultuous of his six trips abroad. Cries of Viva El Papa! resounded wherever he went in this Colombian capital. Some exclaimed: "He's truly a Pope of hope!"

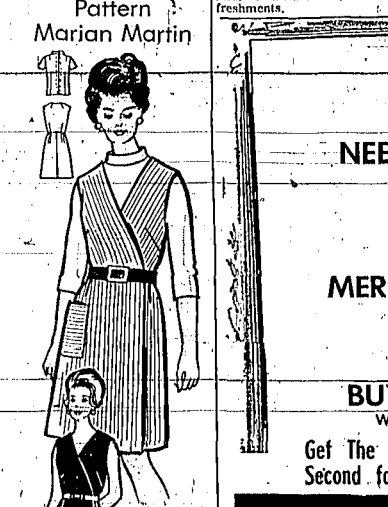

Just before serving, combine puree with whipped cream and flavor to taste with sugar or lemon juice.

# Hopefuls Squabble Over Reds

By The Associated Press  
Idaho's Senate candidates criticized the Russian invasion of Czechoslovakia Thursday, but Rep. George Hansen, R-Idaho, said his Democratic opponent, Sen. Frank Church, had failed to grasp the stark realities of Russian and Communist politics.

Church, speaking at the Franklin County Fair in Preston, said Russian claims of having been invited by Czechoslovakian leaders "is betrayed for the lie it is by the tall-tale delay in producing them."

"The truth is that the Russians are desperately looking for Czech puppets to front for them," Church said. "No doubt they will come up with some old Stalinist types, but the world will not be fooled by such a transparent charade."

Hansen commented to a Jagerman group about a Church statement made Wednesday. "While the Czechoslovakians are being ground under the iron heel of Soviet force, my opponent simply stated that 'His-story's lesson is that the form for freedom from within cannot be quieted for long,'" Hansen declared.

The Czechoslovakian tragedy, Hansen said, "should arouse any doubts regarding Russia's will to use force to conquer and hold the people of other nations."

# Union Ballots For Strike At Seattle

SEATTLE (AP) — Aerospace Workers Union officials called for strike authorization Thursday amid cheers of thousands of Boeing Co. production workers who met at Seattle Center to cast ballots on the proposal.

Union leaders requested the authorization after reporting poor progress in negotiations with the giant aerospace firm since May 1 for 68,000 Boeing production workers across the country. The current contract expires Oct. 2.

"Our (strike) committee is convinced that we're not going to get anything from management that we are not big enough to take away from them," Al K. Schultz, union negotiations coordinator, told an estimated 18,000 members from Boeing plants in the Seattle-Everett area.

Similar strike-vote meetings were held near Boeing installations at Cape Kennedy, Fla., Michoud, La., Huntsville, Ala., and Wichita, Kan.

Union officials said results of the vote will be announced after all secret ballots are counted, probably within a few days.

# Retailers Urge Aid For Idaho Businesses

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's legislature should consider helping local governmental units if it decides to limit the revenues they receive in place of the phased-out inventory tax, a spokesman for the Idaho Retailers Association said Thursday.

Tim Brennan, executive secretary of the association, told a Boise civic group \$18 is now returned to local units of government for each \$15 lost in the four-year phase-out of the tax. The personal property tax on inventories, livestock and timber products is to be phased out over four years under a law passed last year by the legislature.

Local revenues lost as the inventory tax is reduced by 25 per cent each year are to be made up by diversion of 20 per cent of the sales tax monies by the end of the four years.

Brennan said he would not oppose an amendment to return one dollar for each inventory tax dollar lost in local revenues, instead of the current percentage base.

But if the legislature amended the phased-out law to provide revenue return on a dollar-for-dollar basis, "it ought to take a long look at helping local units of government with their financing."

The revenue loss in the current fiscal year from phasing out 25 per cent of the inventory tax would be about \$1.5 million, he said, and the five per cent diversion of sales taxes will amount to about \$1.8 million.

"Almost everyone favors inventory tax repeal," Brennan said, "but says we can't afford the loss of revenue."

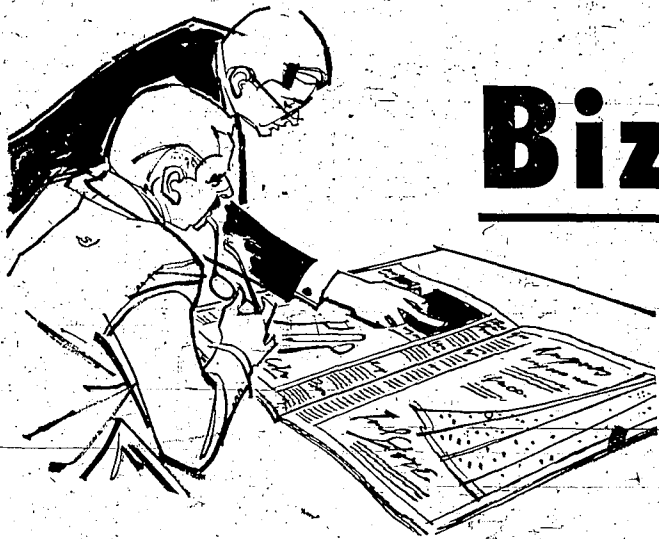

## Beef Rated Favorite By Housewives

Beef, followed closely by chicken, was rated the top favorite by homemakers in preliminary results of a recent survey issued by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in cooperation with the National Livestock and Meat Board.

Possible reasons for selecting beef as the most frequently eaten meat included their opinions that beef can be prepared in many ways and that it is tasty and digestible. About one-third of the homemakers said usually an important factor in their meat-buying decisions, the survey shows.

Most homemakers were hesitant about buying frozen meats. The survey shows that they preferred to buy fresh meats and freeze them at home.

## Nevadan Retires

RENO — Ray K. Petersen, research agronomist, at the Max C. Fleischmann College of Agriculture, University of Nevada's Southern Nevada Field Laboratory at Logandale recently retired after 22 years service with the University.

Petersen, who lives in Moapa Valley, began working for the University in 1946 as a county extension agent in Clark county. In this capacity he had much to do with the development of the tomato and celery industry in Southern Nevada.

He later served to direct research for the University on these crops. He served as a horticulturist, a research agronomist and as superintendent of the Southern Nevada Field Laboratory.

## Damage To Valley Crops From Rain Can Be Extensive

Damage to crops throughout Magic Valley because of the heavy precipitation the past week can be quite extensive. However, it will be several days or weeks before the extent of the damage can be evaluated.

## Less Potato Production Is Forecast

The Aug. 1 fall potato estimate has been released by the USDA. The estimate is based on normal weather for the remainder of the growing season.

Total Idaho potato production is now forecast at 58,760,000 hundredweight. This is 5,140,000 hundredweight less than the 1967 Idaho production of 63,900,000 hundredweight and nine per cent less than the '67 crop. This is the smallest crop for Idaho since 1954, says Dwayne E. Splin, executive secretary of the Potato Growers of Idaho, Inc.

Total production in the 28 fall potato states is now estimated at 216,895,000 hundredweight compared to a production of 232,074,000 hundredweight in the fall of 1967. Reduction in the '68 fall potato crop as compared to the '67 crop is about seven per cent. As estimated the '68 crop should compare to the 1965 potato crop.

The estimated reduction in fall potato production should be indicative of higher prices for potatoes in the fall. Usually a one per cent reduction in production brings a five per cent increase in price; on this basis farmers in Idaho should get approximately 45 per cent more for their potatoes this year. An increased potato price is badly needed by the Idaho farmer and Idaho herself.

The unusual heavy rainfall in this area has broken down hundreds of acres of grain, caused moldering in beans, rotting of potatoes and even germination of grain seed still in the heads.

One Twin Falls farmer, Robert J. Coiner, said he found some of his grain sprouting in the heads. Other farmers in the area also have found this in their fields.

Some corn, both sweet and field, also has been knocked down by the heavy rainfall and also by hail, which struck briefly in the area Monday evening. The biggest crop lost, other than the grain, could be beans. This loss would be because of mold. Several bean officials state that mold is beginning to appear in several bean fields throughout the area.

However, the extent of the damage would depend on the weather in the next few days. According to Willis Huxman, meteorologist for the U.S. Weather Bureau at Kimberly, the outlook is for warmer temperatures and a chance for light showers. He said although the temperatures will be warmer than in the past few days, the

temperatures will still be below normal. Normal daytime temperatures for this time of year, according to records at the Bureau of Entomology at Twin Falls, is 87 degrees with nighttime temperatures of 49. Huxman said the daytime temperatures in the next few days will be in the low 70s, and nighttime temperatures in the low 40s.

The amount of precipitation that fell in the area the past week is well above normal for August. Mr. Huxman said the normal amount of precipitation for August ranges from 12 of an inch at Gooding to 29 of an inch at Burley. The amount of precipitation that fell the past week as of 8 a.m. Wednesday, was 2.70 in-

ches in Twin Falls, 3.09 inches at Jerome, 3.43 inches at Burley, 3.15 inches at Gooding and 2.59 inches at Buhl. He also emphasized that the accumulative amount of precipitation so far this year is 7.70 inches as compared to the total precipitation for a normal year in the low 70s. The accumulative amount of precipitation at this time of year in a normal year is 5.71 inches. The forecast for the next few days offers some hope for farmers, but the weather will still be below-normal. With the finding of white mold in beans, farmers are advised to let the beans mature without a further irrigation because of the soil moisture caused by the heavy rainfall.

## Along Fences And Canals

Farmers in the Pleasant Valley area south of Kimberly have apparently suffered only light damage from the rain and hail. Mrs. Lee Mathers stated they would lose 40 acres of hay which was cut the day before it started raining. However, the rain has helped the grazing land which would help make up the loss.

The Dale Butler farm 2 1/2 miles south of Kimberly suffered some hail damage to beans. However, Mrs. Butler said it was too early to tell how extensive the damage would be. Pods were broken and knocked off the plants and other pods bruised. Adjacent farms had little evident damage.

Ray Blair of the Reservoir Ranch, Glenns Ferry, had just started combining grain at the Little Camas Ranch when the rains came. Now they are getting really concerned about how much damage the moisture is going to do to the grain and the alfalfa seed up there.

The sweet corn crop at Tuttle was harvested by the Green Giant Co. before the rain last week. But some hay in the windrow and bales are still in the fields. Grain harvesting in the area was interrupted by the moisture.

Harvest operations in the View area are at a standstill because of the moisture this past week. Both grain threshing and haying has stopped.

Rain put a stop to harvest in the Richfield area last week. Winter wheat was being combined and some farmers had started to harvest spring wheat.

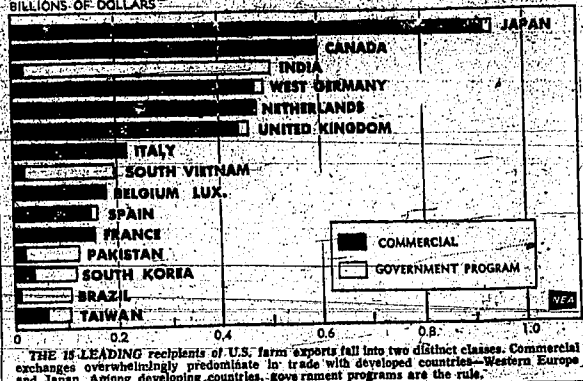

Plant lice (aphids) found on tender tips. Spray with malathion or 2% nicotine sulfate. Black spot disease, bad in wet, damp weather. Cause: leaves to turn yellow, then drop. Old leaves should be cleaned up and burned. Spray plant with Phaltan (Folpet).

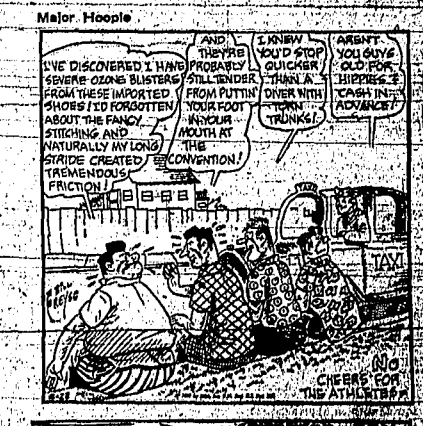
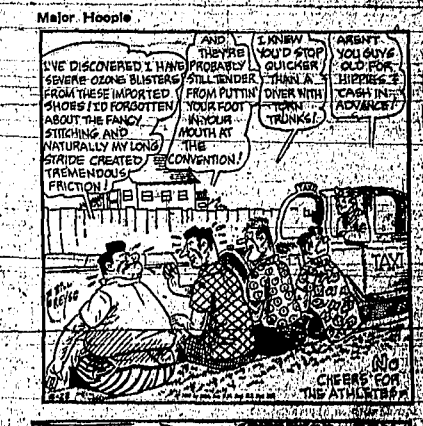
