Red Rockets Hit Base At Da Nang

SAIGON (AP) — The Viet Cong marked the 23rd anniversary today of Ho Chi Minh's proclamation of Vietnamese independence with a rocket attack on Da Nang that killed 21 Vietnamese and wounded 45. All but one of the casualties were civilians.

South Vietnamese headquarters said the enemy gunners fired 31 Soviet 122mm rockets into Da Nang, South Vietnam's second largest city before dawn. The majority landed in residential areas.

One of the most savage rocket attacks on the civilian population since a barrage of 30 rockets on Saigon nearly eight weeks ago and 19 civilians and wounded 116.

Five of the rockets hit the U.S.A. Navy's administrative headquarters in downtown Da Nang and five caused light damage at the big airbase, but only one American-Marine was wounded. The other military casualty was a South Vietnamese soldier who was killed. A heavier barrage of 100 rockets and mortars on Sunday hit one of two Special Forces camps near Tay Ninh, northwest of Saigon near the Cambodian border. The U.S. Command said one American and five Montagnard mercenaries were killed and two Americans and 17 Montagnards were wounded.

It was on Sept. 2, 1945, as World War II was ending, that Ho Chi Minh emerged from relative obscurity and in Hanoi set up the first Republic of Vietnam. Ever since, Hanoi has dated independence from that date, although it was not until 1954 that the French were defeated and Vietnam divided.

Allied ground forces reported at least 60 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong killed in ground sweeps during the weekend. Four Americans were reported killed and 58 wounded.

U.S. B-52 bombers dropped nearly 500 tons of bombs on enemy infiltration routes, mostly in a stretch of Saigon between the capital and the Cambodian border.

Iranians Mourn For 8,000 Slain In Major Quake

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Iran observed a national day of mourning today for more than 8,000 persons killed in an earthquake that devastated 750 square miles in the northeast part of the country.

As aftershocks continued, officials said at least 8,222 persons were killed, 2,632 were injured and about 100,000 made homeless by the catastrophe Saturday.

A government spokesman said no foreigners were among the victims.

Destruction of the region's underground water system raised a new threat to the thousands of survivors housed in tent cities. The army sent convoys of water tankers and food to the area.

Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi personally directed relief work from Tehran and sent Prime Minister Amir Abbas Hoveyda to the disaster zone along with five of his Cabinet ministers.

The Shah planned to tour the region Tuesday. He was expected to order a large-scale reconstruction program as he did in the Ghasvin area after a major quake there in 1962.

The worst of the quake was believed to have been near the village of Kakhak, which was leveled. At least 1,400 of the 2,400 inhabitants were reported killed or wounded. In the village of Biaz-Abad, at least half the 2,000 residents were reported killed.

Highway Death Toll Increases

As millions of motorists crammed the nation's highways for the start of the three-day holiday, a spokesman for the National Safety Council said traffic deaths were running slightly ahead of the pace of a year ago.

At 7 a.m. EDT today a total of 439 persons had died in highway accidents across the country since the start of the three-day holiday weekend at 8 p.m. Friday.

An Associated Press survey tallied 518 in a nonholiday period of equal length starting Aug. 16.

Howard Pyle, president of the safety council, said the major concern was "that the heavy going will allow of a number of holiday travelers, combined with crowds of weary returning vacationers and a bit too much alcohol, will result in a high percentage of highway accidents."

Eight North Dakota teenagers, killed Sunday while returning from a party, added to the mounting toll of Labor Day fatalities.

The four boys and four girls were returning in two cars from a farewell party for an Army recruit when the vehicles collided on Interstate 94, west of Jamestown, N.D.

The highest traffic toll for a Labor Day holiday was 636 in 1967.

The lowest death count for the three-day weekend since World War II was set in 1940, when 246 persons were killed.

A four-day celebration of Independence Day in 1967 set a record for the highest death count for any summer holiday period. A total of 232 persons were killed.

At 7 a.m. EDT today 27 persons had been drowned and 13 had died in boating accidents during the Labor Day break.

Humphrey Opens Vote Drive

NEW YORK (AP) — Hubert H. Humphrey opens his campaign for president by riding in a Labor Day parade today after drawing applause in his hometown Sunday with a denunciation of "militant, strident, violent" persons who "take to the streets to settle their problems."

The Democratic presidential nominee accepted the invitation of the city's labor leaders to ride up Fifth Avenue today rather than risk the possibility of slim crowds in the traditional Democratic campaign opener in Detroit's Cadillac Square.

But the vice president faces the possibility of antiwar demonstrators in a state where the Democratic senatorial nominee, Paul O'Dwyer, has refused to support the party's national ticket. O'Dwyer said Sunday he would march in the parade but not with Humphrey.

Several hundred demonstrators, shouting "Stop the war," and "Dump the Hump!" gathered outside Humphrey's New York hotel Sunday night, but police led his cavalcade into the garage via a side entrance out of sight of the protesters.

After leaving Minneapolis, the vice president issued a statement calling on Republican presidential nominee Richard M. Nixon to join him in serving "on North Vietnam that we support the efforts of our negotiators" in Paris.

Humphrey said the North Vietnamese should understand there is no chance "that partisan debate in America might create dissension here which would lead to a weakening of American determination either on the battlefield or at the negotiating table."

After today's appearance, Humphrey returns to his lake-side home in Waverly, Minn., for a week of rest and strategy sessions.

His Waverly Sunday, his friends and neighbors heard him contrast street demonstrators with his vision of what he calls "the New Day," a phrase he obviously intends to use in 1968 campaign theme.

"The New Day," Humphrey said, "is the recognition that the young have their time and their place, and their day, and it's here. The New Day is a challenge to the older people to clear away the impediments, to clear away the obstacles for a new generation: The New Day tells us that we have to do better things in our country, whether good as they are, they can be improved."

Then, turning to the question of demonstrations, Humphrey said "if there is any one thing that the American people need to rise up and protest about, it is this tendency of some to take to the streets to settle their problems." A phrase he used from a crowd of more than 2,000.

"History," the vice president said "is strewn with the wreckage of the militancy that has been brought about by self-appointed, self-righteous citizens."

Burley Youth Killed In Rupert Accident

RUPERT — The Magic Valley traffic death toll climbed to 32 Sunday with the death of Saul H. Saldana Jr., 17, Burley. The youth was killed when he was thrown from his car about 1:15 a.m. on 605 300W, Rupert.

State Patrolman John Brewer said the car apparently went out of control as Mr. Saldana was heading west on the county road. The 1968 Dodge ran off the right side of the roadway, traveled for 45 feet, and hit a power pole.

It continued down the roadway again, running back off the right side and traveling another 140 feet in the borrow pit before slamming into another power pole. It then rolled twice before coming to a stop on its wheels.

The 17-year-old youth was injured and a fourth escaped injury in the accident. Passengers in the Saldana auto, Ramiro Navarez, 16, and John Mancillas, 17, were treated for injuries and released from the Minidoka Memorial Hospital following the incident. Another passenger, Ronald Navarez, 16, was not injured.

Officer Brewer said seat belts were in the auto but were not in use. None of the passengers was thrown out. The car was demolished.

Saul Saldana Jr. was born Sept. 3, 1951, at Yuma, Wash., and came to Idaho with his parents in 1962. They settled in Burley where he had resided since.

At the time of his death, the youth was a senior at the Burley High School.

Saldana Sr.; Burley, one sister, Sylvia Saldana, Burley; two brothers, Richard Saldana and Ruben Saldana, both Burley; paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Francisco M. Funeral services are pending at the Payne Mortuary, Burley.

Quiet Returns To Riot Region

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — Police described an "extremely quiet" Sunday the predominantly Negro area of this city returned to the previous two nights.

Authorities said they were generally staying out of the area—except for disorder, sniping and looting which began late Friday after a teenage dance.

The two night's violence resulted in injuries to 20 policemen and 20 other persons and the arrest of 16 persons. Property damage was generally light, confined mostly to broken windows and looting of shops in a Friday night which were quickly put out.

All of the injured policemen, which included four who were seriously injured in an ambulance accident at local hospital, had been treated and released.

Satellite Controls May Reduce Airplane Congestion And Aid In Traffic Delays

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The traffic problem that often plagues pilots flying into and landing delays at major airports may be eased considerably in the early 1970s by a network of precision navigation and control satellites.

The satellites could lower required separation distances between aircraft, warn high-flying jets of low clouds and fog, guide craft around bad weather, monitor plane systems for possible trouble, and pinpoint altitudes of planes or ships in distress.

Officials of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said the system would provide reliability and confidence in air traffic controllers and pilots to permit reduction of the present, widely spaced separation standards of 100 miles longitudinally and 2,000 feet vertically.

They said that if the separation standards were changed to 100 miles laterally, 10 minutes longitudinally and 1,000 feet vertically that 340 million would be saved annually by aircraft operating in the heavily traveled North Atlantic region alone.

The altitude, longitude and latitude of an aircraft could be computerized rapidly by the satellites and associated ground equipment at air terminals. The system could tell instantly when two planes were on a collision course and warn them via satellite radio channel.

The system would permit controllers to better plot the location of planes and facilitate planning for landings and takeoffs.

A Navy network of navigation satellites has been operating several years, helping submarines and ships plot their positions with an accuracy of about 600 feet. Last year many of the details of the system were declassified so that commercial shipping could use the satellites.

Now the Air Force, Navy and NASA are studying next generation satellites that might provide a position accuracy of about 100 feet. Conventional earth-based navigation techniques are accurate to within only two to four miles.

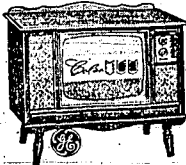

Ordinarily, my doctor's nurse takes my height and weight; checks my blood pressure; makes a urinalysis.

Physicians' examinations vary widely in scope. It depends on the time a physician can devote to such work, and on his facilities.

What you describe is average and covers screening for a good many of the disorders that you suspect.

I take it for granted that your doctor takes a brief history of any specific complaints and your general health has been checked.

Most women expect and should have a Pap test annually. A smears booster every three to five years is wise.

As to booster shots, you may have to remind him of them. A smears booster every three to five years is wise.

Thais Probe Few Ballots Of Citizens

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — The government has ordered an inquiry to find out why only about 18 per cent of those eligible voted Sunday in Bangkok's first municipal election in years.

The election gave 22 of the 24 council seats to members of the Democratic party. Elections and political parties had been banned in Thailand since a military coup in 1958.

The low turnout was taken by many as a snub to the military government, which entered a slate of candidates of its own.

The council members will have little room to maneuver in their five years in office. The Interior Ministry which has ruled Bangkok through the appointed council, retains the right to dissolve the elected body if it acts "in a manner prejudicial to the public interest."

Poll Indicates Ruling Opposed

PRINCETON, N.J. (AP) — Most American Roman Catholics, particularly those in their 20's, oppose Pope Paul's recent encyclical banning artificial birth control methods, the Gallup Poll reported Sunday.

The poll said that of every 100 Catholics who are aware of the encyclical, 54 say they are opposed, 28 are in favor, and 18 expressed no opinion.

Even among devout Catholics — defined as those who attend Mass once a week or more — criticism is nearly as strong, the poll said.

Among young Catholics, those in their 20's, almost 8 in 10 disagree with the Pope's position.

Gallup also noted that more than 60 per cent of Protestants of all ages were critical of the encyclical.

Catholics interviewed in the survey gave three reasons primarily for their opposition: The world is becoming overpopulated, Catholics should be allowed to follow their conscience in family planning, and families should rear only those children they can properly care for.

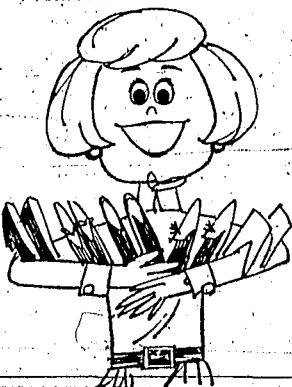

Zamboanga Remembers Famed 'Black Jack'

ZAMBOANGA, Philippines (AP) — General "Black Jack" Pershing has not been forgotten in Zamboanga.

Pershing Square and the general's old offices still stand amid the orchids and lush greenery of this exotic tropical town on the Sulu Sea.

The late Gen. John J. Pershing, remembered best in his American homeland as World War I commander of the U.S. Army troops in Europe, was pretty big stuff in Zamboanga before the doughboys even snuffed out the Germans.

In 1901, the late Capt. Pershing, already nicknamed "Black Jack" after fighting along the U.S.-Mexico border and a veteran of action against the Apache and Sioux Indians, was a battling leader in the wars against the savage Moro tribes of the Southern Philippines.

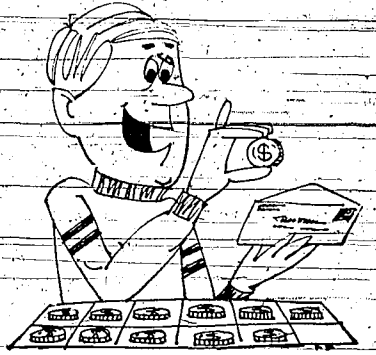
Many Moro warriors worshiped a paginated Moslem gospel and believed that to die while killing Christians guaranteed a favored spot in heaven. Newly arrived American colonizers were prime targets.

In ferocious fights through these islands, Pershing led American troops and Philippine scouts to a series of victories over the Moros.

In 1903, after President Teddy Roosevelt had jumped him from a 45-year-old captain to brigadier general, Pershing became governor of the Moro Province with headquarters in Zamboanga.

He was instrumental in starting the Sulu News newspaper and in building the roads that

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The condition of a Pittsburgh area man continues to improve, doctors say, after he received the heart of a 25-year-old auto crash victim.

He is awake, alert, and recognized and waved to his family. Hospital officials have declined to identify the recipient, but the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette said in an article for its Monday edition that the recipient is Ben Anolik, 41, a Pittsburgh businessman and former boxing promoter.

The newspaper said a hospital spokesman would neither confirm nor deny that Anolik was the recipient. However, the paper reported that the hospital said a patient by that name had been admitted.

The donor, John Skultety, Jr., an insurance salesman from Lucerneville, Pa., was fatally injured about 3 a.m. Saturday when his car overturned near Indiana, Pa.

He died at Presbyterian-University Hospital and 20 minutes later a team of surgeons, headed by Dr. Henry T. Bahson, began the four-hour operation.

Relief Flights Set To Biafra

GENEVA (AP) — The International Red Cross Committee announced today that it will start regular daylight relief flights to Biafra in defiance of the Nigerian government's threat to shoot down any planes trying to break the blockade.

The flights will operate from Santa Isabel, the capital of the Spanish island of Fernando Po, where 3,500 tons of food have been collected.

The flights will be flown by five planes, four of them loaned by the Red Cross societies of Denmark, Finland, Norway and Sweden. A sixth will be provided soon by the Dutch Red Cross.

The Red Cross committee said it has passed on this information to the head of the Nigerian military government to gather with the registration numbers of all the planes involved and the wavelengths the planes will use to identify themselves to ground forces.

21 Jim Crow at Bay

We conclude that in the field of public education the doctrine of "separate but equal" has no place.

U.S. Supreme Court

For decades Negroes had been harassing Jim Crow with legal actions. In 1945, however, an important change of tactics was decided upon by the NAACP's Legal Defense and Educational Fund, directed by Thurgood Marshall.

Rather than attempting to enforce the equality part of "separate but equal" and thus make segregation too expensive to work, the very concept of segregation itself was to be attacked.

Years of litigation in the lower courts culminated on May 17, 1954, when the Supreme Court delivered its historic decision outlaw-



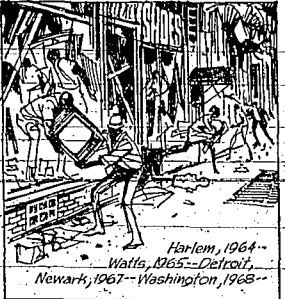
ing racial segregation in the public schools. Though Negroes had won a major battle, the war had only begun. The South grinded itself for resistance, despite the court's injunction to desegregate with "all deliberate speed."

The ensuing years were filled with racial conflict as white America attempted either to reverse or ignore or adjust to the new order of things: Federal vs. state authority reached showdown stages in Little Rock, Ark., in 1957 and on the University of Mississippi campus in 1962.

These were the major skirmishes, but there were hundreds of minor ones—on one side, burnings and bombings; on the other, "freedom riders" marches, demonstrations.

Four Negro students began the sit-in movement in Greensboro, N.C., in 1960. The movement spread throughout the South and thousands of students were arrested. The Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee ("SNICK") was formed in 1960 and Ameri-

cans began hearing about a militant separatist group called the Black Muslims.

Negroes were learning that what laws said was one thing, what men did was another.

"The legal basis of segregation has been destroyed," said Martin Luther King Jr. "Our job now is implementation of the decision. We must move on to mass action."

King, who rose to national prominence as a result of the Montgomery, Ala., bus boycott in 1955, formed the Southern Christian Leadership Conference ("SCLC") and became the leading apostle of nonviolent resistance to discrimination and the greatest Negro figure since Frederick Douglass.

"I have a dream," King told an audience of 250,000 during the March on Washington in 1963. But continued white violence and resistance to desegregation were not to permit him to live to see that dream come true.

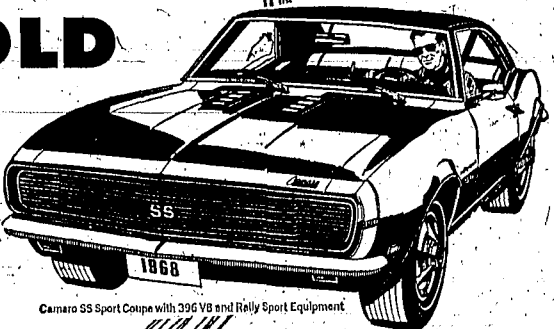

Maternal Disinterest Noted As Problem By Psychiatrist

NEW YORK — A noted psychiatrist today complained that "many women no longer take pride in motherhood" and blamed maternal disinterest — the opposite extreme of "momism" — for many of the current problems among young people.

In an article in the current issue of McCall's, just released, Dr. Theodore I. Rubin asserted that "many so-called love children are obsessed with love to compensate for a lack of love at home."

"Mothers who feel unfulfilled in potential career expectations", and are confused about their own identities "have more than usually confused feelings toward their children," the psychiatrist said. "For these women, having and raising chil-

children is certainly not felt as a highly creative occupation." Dr. Rubin said that many mothers "are unable to give their children enough unconditional love," since "their children are often unconsciously seen as obstacles to self-acceptance."

"Proper actions and proper words cannot compensate for feelings," he said, adding that "without a great deal of love and feelings, people grow up with extraordinary yearnings and problems."

Dr. Rubin acknowledged the "large role" our culture plays in causing emotional disturbances, but emphasized that "the confusion women feel about their role as mothers" is "another key to the situation."

President Johnson Deplores Chicago Violence

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — President Johnson, while applauding the nomination of Hubert H. Humphrey as Democratic presidential candidate, let it be known today that he deplores violence and law-breaking of the kind that coincided with Humphrey's selection. "The President always deplores violence," press secretary George Christian told newsmen who asked about Johnson's attitude toward the violence Wednesday night in Chicago. "He has always believed that people should abide by the law."

Asked if Johnson deplored violence by police and National Guardsmen as well as private citizens, he replied, "All kinds of violence."

As to Johnson's over-all view of the meeting, Christian stuck to Johnson's own assessment, given personally to newsmen Tuesday night, that the convention was a good one and well run.

In response to another question, Christian said Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark will proceed "as expeditiously as possible" with an inquiry by the Federal Bureau of Investigation into police violence against newsmen covering the convention.

New Ghetto Program Aids Teen-Agers By Teaching Skills Of Photography

By IRVING DESFOR AP Newsfeatures

A national summer program to bring photography's benefits to ghetto youngsters in 50 cities started early this year with appointment of Hershel Sarbin as national photography coordinator for the President's Council on Youth Opportunities.

With summer's end at hand, I went to Chicago to see how the photography workshop idea for underprivileged youth worked out in a major city. I met at about 100 youngsters enrolled in the program, five instructors, city officials and the civic-minded project coordinator who translated directives into deeds which kept the program moving.

My observations and discussions verified again that worthwhile projects are made by the people involved in them. In Chicago, Sarbin's delegate was a dedicated "doer." Bill Patis, advertising executive and textbook publisher, I found him personally hauling crates of photo supplies to the instructors. He was quite elated for he had, among other items, 40 single lens reflex Canon TL cameras, the latest donation from Bell & Howell.

Patis' presentation of the program was endorsed enthusiastically by Mayor Daley. It was immediately worked into an active committee on urban opportunity headed by Dr. Deon Brooks with Walt Brooks, director of Chicago's summer services. They found the open

needed in the neighborhood centers, proceeded with darkroom installations, enrolled youngsters between 16 and 21, located qualified instructors and distributed donated cameras, film and equipment. By late July, the four photography workshops were operational.

With instructors a vital and direct link between the underprivileged youths and the world of photography, they found dedicated men with professional backgrounds. Besides Ken Bianco, who teaches experimental photography at Illinois Institute of Technology's School of Design, there were Bob Musgrove, a professional photographer with 20 years' experience; Roy Lewis, whose magazine assignments included Life, Jet and Ebony; Jim Taylor, owner of his own photography studio. And to supervise the instruction program, there was Lindy Saunders, Chicago Daily Defender photographer and physical education teacher.


Besides sessions of instruction in the use of still and movie cameras and darkroom procedures, there were joint group field trips to sports and entertainment events in which the youngsters had special permission to shoot the action. Special demonstrations and talks by photo specialists were also presented, with emphasis on jobs available in photography.

The success of Chicago's summer youth photo workshop may be judged by the fact that it will not end with the coming of fall, but will be continued as a year-round program.

Progress of the national program may be indicated by the need for a national publication to link the efforts and results of all the cities in the photography program. That need has been met with the appearance of a newspaper titled "Like It Is," edited by John Duriniak, former editor-in-chief of Popular Photography. It is the first issue in a monthly schedule. Most contributions will come from youngsters and instructors in the program, giving them an opportunity to see their work in print and to show, through photographs, how they view their lives and communities.

The newspaper's credo explains what the national photography project tries to achieve for ghetto youngsters: "The camera, an eye for all men, is a way to see in and a way out."

Officer Infiltrates Group

'Yippie' Riot Plans Told

CHICAGO (AP) — A policeman who infiltrated the Youth International party has disclosed how Yippies planned in advance to riot and provoke attacks on them by police during the Democratic national convention, the Chicago Tribune said today.

The Tribune said in a copyright story that the policeman, Robert L. Pierson, told the newspaper he was given a leave to serve as an investigator for the state's attorney's office, won the Yippies' confidence and became bodyguard for their leader, Jerry Rubin.

Pierson, 35, said he guarded Rubin from Sunday afternoon until Wednesday afternoon when his identity was discovered in a chance meeting with a member of the Blackstone Rangers, a South Side street gang, who recognized him.

Demonstrations by antiwar groups, including the Yippies, during this week's Democratic convention resulted in violent exchanges between protesters and police. The outbreaks brought swift action by police and charges that they attacked demonstrators without provocation, often "clubbing them into submission."

Several hundred were arrested and scores were injured. As a result of Pierson's un-

dercover work, the Tribune said, police officials knew in advance what the Yippies were planning.

Pierson related that after he received permission from the Cook County—Chicago—state's attorney's office riot control unit to attempt to infiltrate the Yippies, he grew a beard for six days, rented a motorcycle and rode into Lincoln Park on Monday. The Yippies generally operated out of the North Side park and it was the scene of a number of violent exchanges between them and police early in the week.

Kidnap 'Go-Between' Found In Restaurant

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — The kidnaper of 4-year-old Stanley Stafford Jr., telephoned four restaurants in the Los Angeles area before he found a man willing to deliver \$250,000 ransom.

Harold "Red" Tracton, 39, pressed the register Saturday and said they didn't want to get involved.

A nerve-racking 36 hours followed for Tracton, 47, the ordeal included 15 hushed phone conversations, the care of a 50-pound satchel containing \$250,000 in \$20 bills and a lonely drive to the payoff spot with the hope FBI agents were somewhere near, watching.

At the end Robert L. Dacy, 39, an ex-convict, was wounded and captured Friday in a wild auto chase and gun battle, and the frightened boy was returned to his parents.

Dacy, in a hospital with a broken right leg, later pleaded innocent to two state counts of kidnaping for ransom. He was arrested Saturday without bond with his preliminary hearing set for Sept. 20 in Municipal Court.

"I took good care of your boy," Dacy told the mother as she arrived at Morningside hospital where doctors were taking seven stitches in Stanley's leg, cut in a traffic collision that ended the long chase.

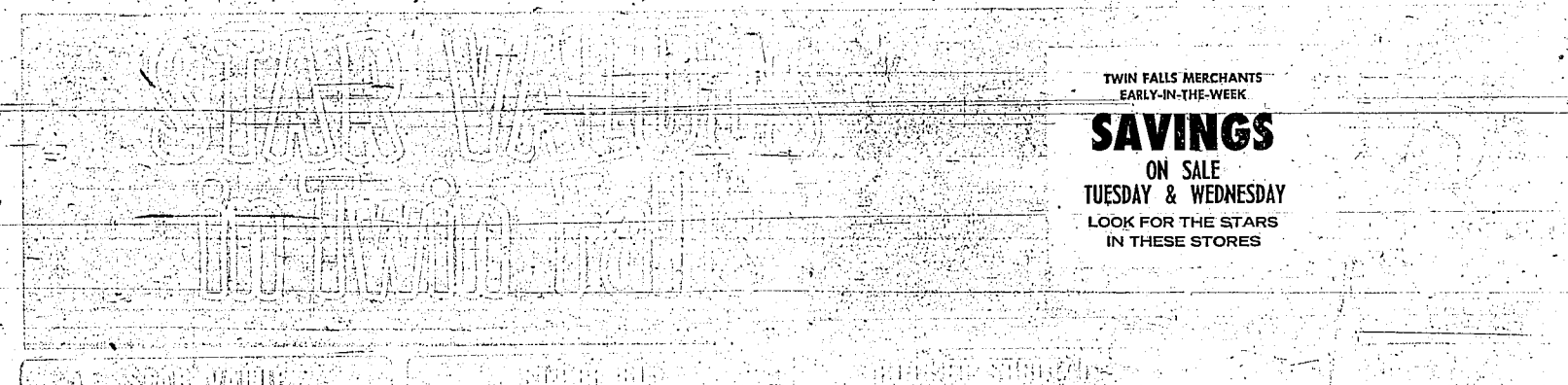
