## Allies Launch Major Vietnam Assaults

SAIGON (AP)— Allied forces launched air and ground assaults today to block Viet Cong and North Vietnamese troops moving toward Saigon from the north and northwest. But U.S. intelligence officers said the earliest the enemy could attack the capital was Sept. 15, and that any plans to attack may depend on success against allied troops in the outlying areas. South Vietnamese rangers repulsed an enemy force only 2 1/2 miles southwest of Saigon Wednesday in the biggest outbreak of fighting near the capital since enemy troops battled their way into the city in May and June. Vietnamese headquarters said seven rangers were killed and 17 wounded, and 31 enemy were counted on the battlefield. The attackers were believed part of a large reconnaissance

force probing for weak points in Saigon's defenses. Another enemy unit about a mile away fired eight mortar shells at government rangers and wounded five, a South Vietnamese spokesman said. More than 3,000 American and South Vietnamese infantrymen launched a drive early today into the Boi Loi Woods, 30 miles northwest of Saigon, where a former enemy base camp has been leveled by bulldozers and saturation bombing raids. First reports said there was no contact with the enemy. Elements of two regiments from the Viet Cong 5th Division are believed to have pushed into the Boi Loi Woods during the past few weeks. The allies aim to block the enemy from using the woods as a staging area for attack on allied installations and government towns along the defensive lines leading into Sai-

gon. These include the headquarters of the U.S. 23rd Infantry Division at Cu Chi, about 10 miles to the south. Meanwhile, U.S. B-52 bombers dropped tons of bombs on suspected positions of two North Vietnamese regiments reported to have moved to within 38 miles north of Saigon from jungled hideouts along the Cambodian border. Earlier, the B-52s hit suspected stores of ammunition and rice for these troops. One U.S. intelligence source said the enemy had planned to attack the capital Sept. 1 or 2 but now "they're going to continue harassing actions while they re-plan what to do about Saigon." Harassing actions Wednesday night included a 10-round mortar barrage on the capital of Hau Nghia Province, 22 miles

northwest of Saigon, and a ground attack on a nearby government battalion. First reports said casualties were light. Enemy mortars also fired 15 shells into coastal Tuy Hoa, 235 miles northwest of Saigon. The U.S. Command said the attack was aimed at a police compound, and seven policemen and three civilians were wounded. The air war against North Vietnam slackened as tropical storm Bess moved into the Tonkin Gulf and American pilots flew only 70 missions Wednesday against supply routes in the southern panhandle. It was the lowest number since tropical storm Rose held U.S. pilots to 31 missions Aug. 3. Bess today was over the Hue-Phu-Bai area in the northern part of South Vietnam, bringing heavy rain and gusts of about 45 miles per hour.

week with 23,000 pupils affected. Negotiations Wednesday were fruitless as the 300-teacher union sought higher pay and a formal working agreement. In Madison, Ill., where some 35 of the town's 3,000 pupils picked to get back in class, the school board went to court in an effort to return teachers to work. About 400 teachers submitted resignations which the school board refused to honor. The board sought a circuit court judgment to determine if he could hire replacements for teachers who refused to report. In East Haven, Conn., schools had 3,000 pupils who were on strike with the dispute reportedly centering on inclusion of teachers' families in medical insurance. Despite some tension, classes in all but one of Boston's 189 schools opened without incident. The exception was the Gibson school in the Dorchester section where a group of Negro parents said they would renew a sit-in to force the transfer of a newly appointed white principal and her replacement by a Negro principal of their own choice. In Johnston, R.I., public schools were prevented from opening Wednesday when bus drivers reported sick. Their union's negotiations with the school committee for a new contract have been stalled several months. The New York City dispute involves a controversy over hiring and firing of teachers by an experiment local school board in Brooklyn. The board dismissed 10 teachers last spring and the teachers union says there will be a citywide strike unless all are reinstated.

## U.S. May Open Door To Czechs Fleeing Domination Of Soviets

WASHINGTON (AP) - The United States may open the door to Czechs who would rather live here than under renewed Soviet domination, several top officials said today. This was one of several responses to the continuing Soviet armored presence in Czechoslovakia discussed at a hush-hush session of the National Security Council Wednesday night. Another possibility discussed was a joint pledge with NATO allies that no reductions would

be made from the present troop levels in Europe. It was understood that the council, made up of President Johnson and his top military, diplomatic and intelligence advisers, reached no decisions, but prepared recommendations for a cabinet meeting today. Should the United States issue a statement promising extra quota relief status for Czech citizens, it would parallel action taken after the 1953 Hungarian uprising. More than 20,000 refugees cases were handled then.

## A. F. Oslund, Pioneer T.F. Airman, Dies

Arnold Francis (Arnie) Oslund, 73, a Twin Falls Civil Air Patrol, Col. and well-known Twin Falls resident and businessman, died Wednesday evening. He became ill at a CAF meeting at Apple Field. He was stricken about 8 p.m. and was taken to Magic Valley Memorial Hospital. He was pronounced dead on arrival. Mr. Oslund was an avid pilot, one of the pioneers of private aviation in this area, and was secretary-treasurer of Twin Falls Flyers Incorporated. He was born April 20, 1895, at Spicer, Minn., and after graduating from high school at Ansel, Minn., he moved to Gooding where he worked for the Gooding Motor Co. He served as shop foreman at the Twin Falls branch of the company from 1922 to 1921, then became associated with the Allen Oil Co. He retired as a bulk manager of the Westport Oil Corp. in 1952, but continued working part time. He served in France during World War I, made his first airplane flight at that time. He had been flying planes ever since. He was active in civilian air travel. Oslund and was a charter member of the Twin Falls unit of the Civil Air Patrol. ## More Stop Signs Are Planned At Gooding

GOODING—Installation of additional signs to help alert motorists to the stop sign on Highway 20-26 where it crosses Gooding's Main street, which is State Highway 48, was announced Thursday by State Highway Department officials. Complaints about the intersection were raised Wednesday by Sheriff Bill Bunn, after a traffic accident at the intersection claimed the life of Harold Voss, 63, Gooding. The sheriff said he has urged installation of a four-way stop at the intersection which has been the scene of six accidents since May 1. Highway department officials, admitting the present situation of stop signs, pedestrian crosswalk and a 12-inch flasher on Highway 20-26, has not been as successful as intended, said they plan several additions. They now are installing an amber alternating flasher on the stop ahead sign, and brighter flasher bulbs in addition to reviving the flasher vial, all of which should reduce accidents at this intersection. The department also is designing a cantilever stop sign with flasher attachment for installation over the traffic lane of U.S. Highway 20-26. Traffic studies indicate six accidents have occurred at the site since May 1 and it would appear speed and failure to stop are the major contributing factors. With the additional apparatus, it is hoped severity will be greatly reduced or eliminated.

## Nixon Refuses To Voice Opinion On Chicago Riot

Republican candidate Richard M. Nixon is off and running in his bid for the presidency after a campaign kickoff in Chicago that drew thousands and jammed streets. Nixon refused during a whirlwind tour of Chicago Wednesday to comment on the riotous protest disorders there last week. He said "It is best to leave conclusions to investigations already underway." "I think political figures should not make partisan comments," Nixon said on a question-and-answer television program. "I'm not going to get into it."

Democratic candidate Hubert H. Humphrey's campaign manager, meanwhile, predicted the presidential contest will be "a close struggle that will go to the wire." But the campaign manager, Lawrence F. O'Brien, said in Washington the vice president is getting a depth of support that few people would have envisioned two weeks ago. "Telephoned and telegrammed offers of support have been pouring in," O'Brien said. He said there is "a great deal of support for the vice president by people who have never before been active in politics." Humphrey begins his presidential drive Monday with stops planned at Philadelphia, Denver and Los Angeles.

Crowds estimated at from 250,000 to 400,000 crowded streets along Nixon's two-mile motorcade through the Chicago loop area Wednesday and tons of rain fell from the clouds. Nixon told television panelists that U.S. choices in responding to Soviet actions in Czechoslovakia and Eastern Europe are limited and world conflict should not be risked. "I can say here that the U.S. can march and help them," he said. "But if we were to do that, it would mean risking a world conflict. I do not think any of us want that because it would mean the destruction of those countries, too."

## Grounded Bomber Said Ready To Fly

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—The Air Force chief of staff said today the F111A fighter-bomber, grounded after a triple-tragedy, is ready to resume combat missions in Vietnam.

"We are now ready to return the F111 to combat in Southeast Asia where it can again perform in the most challenging conflict environment yet encountered," he said.

The remarks by Gen. John P. McConnell supported an earlier declaration from Maj. Gen. Fred V. Gossett, deputy for the F111 program, that the F111, once the TFX, is "ready for combat operations again."

The Defense Department called a halt to F111 missions over Vietnam after three planes crashed, two of which were not recovered.

Air Force investigators said the cause of at least one crash, and perhaps others, was a faulty actuator rod in the tail assembly. The malfunction since has been corrected.

The mishaps added fuel to the lingering controversy over awarding of the multibillion dollar contract to General Dynamics-Fort Worth.

McConnell's comments were seen as an acceptance ceremony marking the turnover of the first F111C by the United States to the Australian government.

Australian Defense Minister Allen Fairhall accepted the sleek, swinging supersonic warplane on behalf of his government. The Australians have purchased 24.

It was announced the "fly-away" cost of each aircraft would be \$5.95 million.

## Crews Search Snake River Man Thought Lost

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP)—Crews combed the Snake River in western Wyoming without success Wednesday, hoping to find the body of a man identified as Ross J. Martinez of Ogden, Utah.

Earlier in the day the Wyoming Highway Patrol said the body of Jim Ammonds, 29, of Brigham City, Utah, was found inside a pick-up camper that plunged into the river Monday.

Martinez was believed to have been a passenger in the camper. Authorities said the pair left Ogden early Monday for Jackson, but the truck went into the river about 13 miles south of the town.

The river is 150 feet wide and about 12 feet deep in the area of the search. Patrols were combing the banks and a boat searched the turbulent waters.

## Negotiators Continue Air Parley

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—Negotiations were to resume today for a contract between Western Airlines of Los Angeles and the Airlines Pilots Association.

The pilots have threatened to strike at midnight tonight.

Laverett Edwards, chairman of the National Mediation Board, said he believes a contract will be worked out without a disruption in service.

"I don't see an insoluble point in the case," he said, "but there are still a number of items and issues to be agreed upon... but I feel very optimistic and hopeful that there will not be a work stoppage."

PALERMO, Sicily (AP)—Hundreds of women and children lay across the streets and erected barricades of stone and wood Wednesday to protest a water shortage in Palermo.

The demonstrators moved only after firemen drove out in the evening with water trucks.

Police authorities cut water distribution this summer in seven stages a day—between 7 a.m. and 2 p.m. They said a new aqueduct and a larger pipeline will soon boost distribution to 16 hours daily.

Demonstrators who blocked traffic in the suburbs of Palermo for much of the day claimed the water didn't run when it was supposed to.

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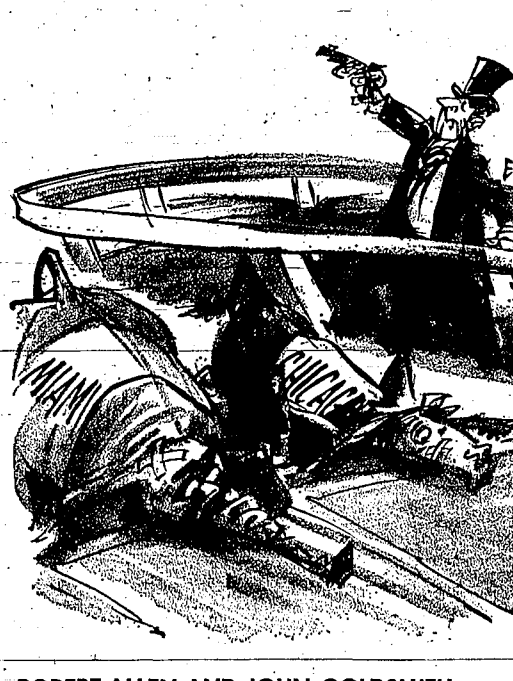

Attorney Urges Ghetto Cleanup OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — "The answer is not to put Huey Newton in the gas chamber, the answer is to wipe out the ghetto," his lawyer said as he summed up the defense Wednesday.

Newton, a member of the militant Negro Black Panther organization, is charged with slaying a white policeman who halted his car in a Negro neighborhood last Oct. 29.

Newton's attorney, Charles Garry, said Officer John Frey stopped the car only because it was on a police list of Black Panther vehicles. He said the case was a "diabolical attempt" to get Newton, and he accused the prosecution of doctoring testimony.

Prosecutor Lowell Jensen displayed anger for the first time in the 31 trial days when he said Garry's accusation was false. "I don't do it and I haven't done it and I resent being accused of it," he said. "We do not put on witnesses that perjure themselves." The jury receives the case today.

Rupert Meet Scheduled On Minidoka School Bond Issue

RUPERT — The first of two scheduled public meetings called to explain the various aspects of the proposed \$2,100,000 school bond issue for Minidoka County will be held at 8 p.m. Thursday at the Minico High School. Voting on the proposed bond issue will be held Sept. 17.

The bond would finance the erection of two new junior high school buildings for the district, as well as additional classrooms and an all purpose room complete with hot lunch facilities at Heyburn and a vocational building at the high school.

A brochure entitled "What You Should Know About Minidoka County School Bond Election Sept. 17" has been mailed to all of the county's taxpayers to answer many of the common questions asked about the proposal.

The brochure explains that the two junior high schools are needed because at present, the district has 1,320 students, enrolled in grades seven, eight, nine and about 1,125 in grades 10, 11, and 12. Each new school would house about 700 students.

On the problem of staffing of the new schools, Camden Meyer, superintendent, explains that the present staff would be moved to the new sites along with the students.

If passed, the bond issue would call for the collection of 12 mills instead of the seven and one-half mills now assessed. In terms of dollars and cents, the bond would move from the city.

Audie Murphy Can't Repay \$13,260 Note

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Audie Murphy, the most decorated U.S. soldier in World War II, says he's broke and unable to pay off \$13,260 on a promissory note.

Murphy, 44, said in court Wednesday that he paid part of the interest but none of the principal of a note signed Nov. 13, 1964, in favor of the First National Bank of Dallas, Tex. A judgment against him was entered Nov. 26, 1966. Murphy told Superior Court Commissioner Human O. Danoff that he lost \$200,000 in Algerian oil holdings because of the 1967 six-day war between Israel and Arab nations. As an actor, Murphy said he receives television residuals from old films but that the state immediately attaches them to apply on overdue income tax payments.

### Asian Flu Outbreak Expected

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — A new strain of Asian influenza may mean an extensive outbreak in the United States this fall and winter, according to the Public Health Service Advisory Committee.  
The committee said there is no specific vaccine available for the new strain, called "A2-Hong Kong-68."  
The announcement of the possibility of a new outbreak came Wednesday as the committee revised the more cheerful earlier report of July.  
The earlier statement suggested there would be little outbreak, but came before the outbreak of the new strain in Hong Kong.  
The Hong Kong strain emerging in July shows a marked change from previous strains, the committee reported, after meeting in all-day sessions at the National Communicable Disease Center in Atlanta.  
A spokesman said the current vaccine for A2 may still be partially effective, but no specific vaccine against the new strain will be available for three to six months.

### Erring Clerk Lets Bandit Flee Holdup

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A short, thin man dressed in a business suit robbed the First Security Bank in downtown Salt Lake City of \$998 Wednesday afternoon. He might have been caught, except for a foul-up.  
The robber barely had time to walk onto Main Street and become lost in the crowd when two policemen arrived — about 10 seconds after the "robbery-in-progress" alarm was sounded.  
A bank employee, unaware of the crime, told the officers there had been no robbery.  
Officer P. M. Beattie had finished notifying headquarters to call off the sound cars racing to the bank when he noticed teller Jeanie Auger crying.  
A clerk worked with Miss Auger verified the robbery and Beattie surrounded the alarm. At this time, however, the robber had gained a full minute to make good his getaway.  
Miss Auger told the robber, unmasked and about 35 or 40 years old, handed her a threatening note and ordered her to put cash in a black valise. She said the robber had his hand inside his coat as though he might be holding a gun.  
Miss Auger said the robber's note said that members of her family were being held and would be harmed if she didn't cooperate.

### 20 Per Cent Of Teachers Leave Idaho

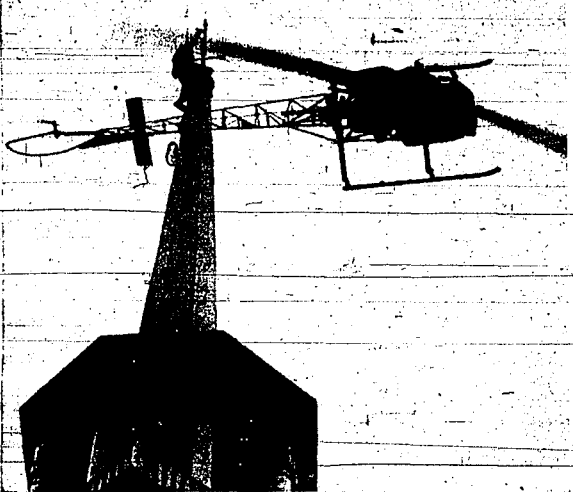
BOISE (AP) — The executive secretary of the Idaho Education Association reports nearly 20 per cent of last year's teachers in Idaho failed to return.  
Wayne York said 21 Idaho districts have new superintendents. He terms the change in school personnel "a personnel upheaval rarely experienced in the state."  
York said Wednesday that teachers now working "are at their desks in spite of nearly unsurmountable obstacles and continued neglect by the state they serve."  
"There is a several million dollar surplus in the state's general fund which could go to education. Instead of paying higher and higher in the coffers of the state treasury, if this money is not saved for government services, it should remain in the taxpayers' jeans."

### Miss Kennedy Will Present Sword To Ship

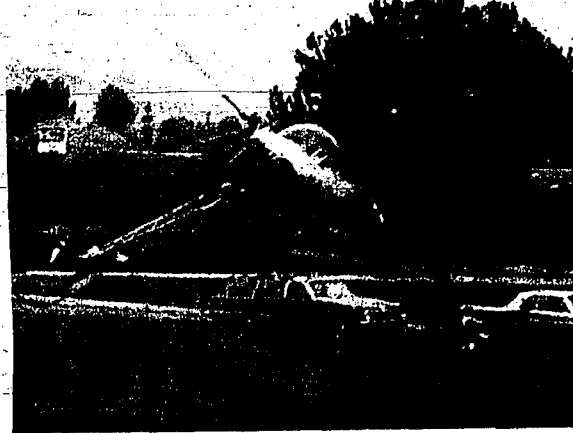

### Panel Will Probe Chicago Riot

WASHINGTON (AP) — A national commission charged with finding ways to prevent violence announced Wednesday it will investigate the outbreaks in Chicago during the Democratic National Convention.  
The plan was disclosed, as speeches about the disorders, the controversy over police handling of them and criticism of news media coverage of them overshadowed legislative business on the opening day of Congress, after-the-convention session.  
Some members suggested and some demanded a federal probe.  
"In a related development, the Columbia Broadcasting System turned down the request of Mayor Richard J. Daley of Chicago for air time to present his version of what happened."  
The National Broadcasting Co., in response to Daley's request, to the three television networks, offered to give Daley time on a panel show. A spokesman for Daley said this was "unresponsive" and Daley probably would not agree.  
The American Broadcasting Co. did not reply immediately.  
Dr. Milton Eisenhower, chairman of the National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence, told newsmen the clashes between police and demonstrators represented to him "violence of very large proportions."  
Eisenhower said the commission will recruit a special task force to determine the facts of the Chicago violence and other recent events such as the outbreak of shootings in Cleveland.  
He said the probe might also cover fighting in Miami, Fla. during the Republican national convention last month.  
The 13-member panel was established Wednesday as a result of the fatal shooting of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy on June 5.

### Blasts Car

OXFORD, Ohio (AP) — Sixth Grade student disgruntled with his 1956 car that he shot it several times with a .22-caliber rifle.

The theft was discovered Thursday when a customer used bank officials what had happened "to the other box." Police said about \$26,000 was cash and about \$4,500 was in checks.

### 3 States Develop Fish Pact

BOISE (AP) — Fishing in the Snake River has been simplified from a legal viewpoint by reciprocal agreements between Idaho, Washington and Oregon covering stretches of the river that form boundaries between the states.  
The agreements allow fishing anywhere in the river with a home state license, but do not allow fishing from the opposite bank.  
A similar reciprocal agreement between Utah and Idaho covers fishing and hunting on Bear Lake, which is bisected by the boundary line between the states.  
Oregon and Idaho have had their reciprocal agreement in effect since 1935 and the Utah-Idaho agreement dates 1941. The agreement with Washington, however, was approved by the Legislature in 1967.

### Candidate Asks Vote Recount

BOISE (AP) — A recount of the primary vote for state senator in five precincts of Idaho Legislative District 1 has been asked for by Frank Findlay of Coconilla.  
Findlay and Peter Wilson were tied in that race according to the official vote tally. The tie was resolved by a flip of a coin before the State Canvassers Board and Wilson won.  
The district comprises Bonner and Boundary counties and has 46 precincts.  
A deposit of \$100 per precinct is required for a recount. The money is refunded if the recount shows a change in the official canvass.  
The recount request was made to the attorney general. It was the second such request.  
William L. Crookham and Donald Winter, both of Caldwell, jointly asked for a recount in District 11 in Canyon County. Winter, the incumbent, and Crookham tied in the Republican primary for state representative.  
Crookham won the coin toss but joined with Winter in posting the \$2,300 for the recount.

### Proposed Dam Sparks Dispute

LEWISTON, Idaho (AP) — Witnesses disagreed about whether dams on the Middle Snake should be built by private enterprise or the federal government during a federal hearing Wednesday.  
Sixty-nine persons testified during the first day of the four-day hearing, most favoring construction of the dams, but disagreeing on who should build them.  
Idaho, Washington and Oregon representing conservation groups, said the stream should be left in its natural state.  
Gov. Don Samuelson said he favored private development even though he sides with conservationists.  
William C. Levy of Washington, D.C., is conducting the Federal Power Commission hearing to determine whether Pacific Northwest Co. and Washington Public Power Supply System should jointly construct the dam on the Snake River.  
WPPSS is a combination of four private utilities. WPPSS is an organization of public utility districts. They are seeking joint permission to construct High Mountain Sheep Dam about 6 1/2 miles upstream from the confluence of the Salmon and Snake rivers, or at an alternative authorized site.  
Samuelson said since private utilities had joined public utility districts in submitting the joint application, the issue is not public versus private, but rather who benefits from development of the Middle Snake.  
He pointed out "the main flow of the Snake is provided by watersheds of Idaho."  
Federal construction of a hydroelectric dam at Appaloosa site has been proposed by the Department of Interior. The site is about 20 miles upstream from the mouth of the Salmon.  
Wednesday testimony was open to individuals and organizations, as will be the Saturday hearing.  
Today and Friday is set aside for cross examination by parties involved of technical witnesses who submitted written statements in advance.

### Gen. Gruenther Doubts Early End To Viet War

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Gen. Alfred M. Gruenther, former Supreme Allied Commander in Europe, said Wednesday he did not foresee an early end to the Vietnam war.  
Speaking during a luncheon at the 75th annual convention of the Pacific Coast Gas Association, Gruenther said it must be remembered the South Vietnamese is in a state equivalent to the United States at the time of our revolution.  
He recently visited Vietnam, and commented that countering guerrilla actions was difficult, estimating it required at least a seven-to-one manpower edge.  
The retired Army general said that except for the Tet offensive earlier this year, the United States and its allies had done well the past six months. U.S. involvement centered around the apparent unwillingness of the Vietnamese to carry a larger share of the war load.  
He ruled this out, saying compared with 27,500 American military deaths, the South Vietnamese have suffered the equivalent of 700,000 deaths on a per capita comparison.  
The draft call in South Vietnam has been expanded, making all men between ages 17 and 33 liable for service, he explained.  
And Gruenther said the United States now is giving South Vietnam more M-16 rifles and more artillery support.  
He said before Americans had the M-16's and the artillery support because they were considered better trained, and it was felt the better trained should be best equipped.

### City Streets Fixed With 'Pink Stuff'

Many city streets in Twin Falls were being surfaced Wednesday with red clay and a new seal coating material which has never been used in Twin Falls before.  
Residents stepped out of their homes and questioned workmen about the "pink stuff." The reclamation first sprayed on its pink color, but within a few minutes it turned black as it is absorbed into the street surface. Ron Scheuffele, city engineer, pointed out that the pink color is merely to help the engineers determine how fast it is being absorbed.  
A little more than four miles of city roadway is being resurfaced.  
Reclamation has been successful in California and Nevada, and if it proves durable in Twin Falls it will save the city a great deal of money. Mr. Scheuffele said Reclamation is much less expensive than in chip surfacing that has been used previously.

### Counties Win Support Boost

Frozen pizzas are available in most stores with a choice of cheese or sausage toppings and in sizes ranging from individual to large party sizes. The newest version is a double-crust, individual pizza that can be baked in a toaster.

Although frozen pizzas are completely prepared and do not require additional ingredients before baking, inventive cooks find it fun and a challenge to add a personal touch. Typical additions include anchovies, thin slices of hot Italian sausage, crushed dried red pepper, sliced mushrooms, tiny meatballs, crumbled crisp bacon, shredded Parmesan cheese, sliced or shredded mozzarella cheese and sliced black or green olives.

Traditionally, the ingredients are scattered informally over the pizza before it is popped into the oven, but they may also be arranged in a more orderly design as suggested for the following pizzas.

**FOUR-WAY PIZZA**  
With the tip of a knife, mark frozen unbaked pizza top into four wedge-shaped sections. Fill each section with one of the following: 1) anchovy strips; 2) thin slices hot Italian sausage and shredded mozzarella cheese; 3) sliced canned mushrooms; 4) tiny canned shrimp or cooked shrimp, chopped.

**POLKA DOT PIZZA**  
Spread pizza sauce (also available in freezer cabinets) over unbaked pizza. Cut mozzarella cheese into thin slices (have cheese as cold as possible), then cut cheese into circles, using a small round cookie cutter or kitchen scissors. Arrange cheese circles on pizza and bake according to package directions.

**POP ART PIZZA**  
Anything goes on this pizza. Use a can or tube of squeeze cheese to make a design. Fill with other ingredients such as olives, shrimp, anchovies, bacon strips. Bake according to package directions.

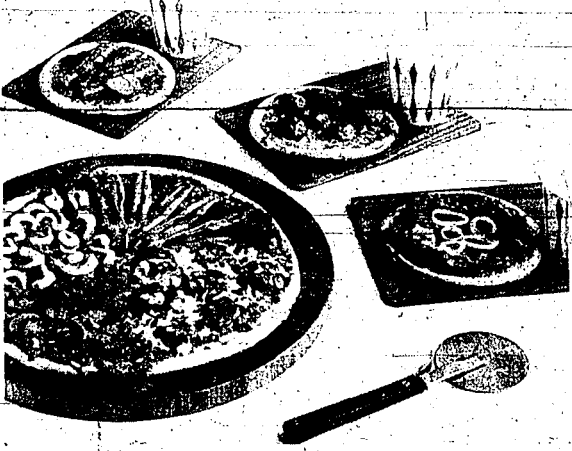
**PIZZA CAROUSEL**  
Arrange a circle of black olive slices in center of unbaked pizza. Surround with a circle of overlapping salami slices. Next, add a circle of sauteed frozen mushrooms, then a circle of frozen chopped green peppers. Bake according to package directions.

## Indoor-Outdoor Carpet Rated By Engineers

GLENNIS FERRY—Engineers at Consumers Union, a consumer testing service, found that indoor-outdoor carpeting is extraordinarily durable, reports Marilyn Jordan, Elmira, County extension home economics agent.

It will hold up for a long time, in or out of the weather, on boards, cement or the bare ground. But only three carpets rated by Consumers Union could pass the flammability test set up by the U.S. Government.

The indoor-outdoor carpeting falls into three main types: polypropylene olefin fiber, made into felted material, usually about 1/2 inch thick; needle tufted material, made the same way as a pile rug, and vinyl matting.

The pile in the tufted type may be cut, uncut or partially cut to form a pattern just as in some regular carpets. Two models rated acceptable by the union were tufted, one felted. In general, felted models are less expensive than tufted, but aside from price the testing service found no general advantage of one type over the other. Usually, vinyl mat carpeting is completely waterproof but less strong than the fiber-based models.

They had no time to say nice words to the pool manager or time to write a letter to their local newspaper."

Don has the satisfaction of having prevented an empty seat in the kindergarten this fall and this is enough for him.

One thing I know I will never do again and that is laugh at some of the old movies on The Late Show. You know the ones—where the Indian girl, after being saved, turns to her rescuer and says, "It is the way of my people—now my life belongs to you." Maybe those primitives had the right idea. They stuck with the person who really cared.

# Stubborn Detective Climaxes Eight-Year Search With Arrest Of Trio

By GORDON MACNAB  
 PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — "I go on the theory," said Detective Earl Son, "that all crimes can be solved if you proceed correctly. You just work and go on working."  
 In November, 1960, Son, now 56, was assigned to help find who committed the rape murder of Beverly Ann Allen and the knife slaying of her college sweetheart, Larry Ralph Peyton, both 19.  
 Over the years, Son's hair turned nearly white. His 6-year-old twin son and daughter grew into teenagers. He traveled

107,000 miles running down clues. Multnomah County's bills for the prolonged search reached \$250,000.  
 When Son wasn't away somewhere on his dogged manhunt, he would take the case home with him.  
 "My wife was understanding. She's wonderful," said the tall, slightly stooped detective, who has the kindly manner of a family doctor.  
 "I'd sit around the house thinking what had been done. I'd sit seven-day run.

awake nights wondering where I'd gone wrong."  
 At last, on Aug. 19, Son decided he was ready to make arrests. He and a detective colleague who had shared the investigation for the past three years brought in three men and charged them with the "double murder."  
 The accused are Earl Frederick Jorgenson, 28; his brother, Edward Ralph Jorgenson, 36, both of Portland, and Robert Gordon Brom, 28, of Salem.  
 Because of Oregon's legal restrictions on "pretrial discussion" of criminal cases, Son cannot disclose now what prompted him to arrest the Jorgensons and Brom.  
 "My work was just investigating," he said. "The courts will decide if the crime was solved."  
 Peyton's body, bearing 23 stab wounds, was found in his car on a "lovers' lane" at the edge of Portland's 3,500-acre Forest Park.  
 Miss Allen, who had been spending the Thanksgiving weekend in the Peyton home, day,

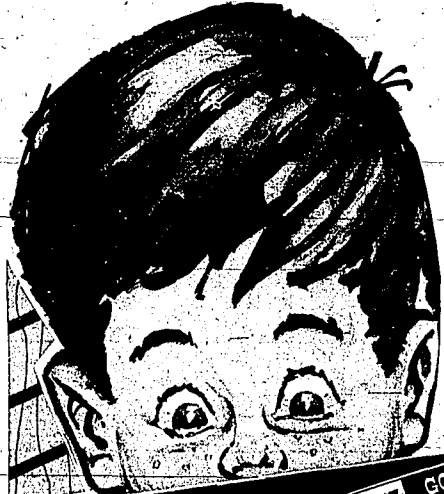
had been with Peyton on Saturday evening. They did not return that night. His slaying came to light the next day.  
 Six weeks later Miss Allen's body was found where it had been tossed over the edge of a mountain road 40 miles west of Portland. She had been raped and strangled.  
 "At the start," Son recalled, "I was one man in a group of six teams of detectives. We worked up to 18 hours a day for months. Then it quieted to a routine."  
 The file in the Peyton-Allen case grew. A filing cabinet was moved close to Son's desk and all information went into it.  
 "The case was kept alive by publicity," Son said. "Newspaper stories on the anniversaries were always followed by new reports. Each had to be checked out."  
 Two years ago another in the series of newspaper stories about the Peyton-Allen case was followed by information which Son said "first pointed us in the direction we took" to make the arrests.  
 "If the defense can come up with anything to prove those arrested are not guilty," Son said, "we will help them. All we are after is the truth."

# Sen. McCarthy Refuses Fourth-Party Affiliation

By The Associated Press  
Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy says he will not become a fourth party candidate and will not join the effort to organize a fourth party drive.  
McCarthy, who has said he might support such a drive if its programs and leaders were acceptable, reiterated refusal to directly participate with a statement Tuesday in Washington.  
But the New Reform Party of Montana ignored the statement and nominated the unsuccessful contender for the Democratic nomination as its presidential candidate.  
Marcus G. Raskin, whose New Party hopes to get on the

ballot in 25 states, predicted over the weekend that several state groups would put McCarthy's name on the ballot whether he wanted it there or not.  
McCarthy said he would deny official approval in those states requiring it to put his name on the ballot, but said he would try to "respond" to the wishes of supporters in states that do not require official approval.  
He urged his supporters to work instead for the election of senators who agree with his opposition to Vietnam war policy and his stand on domestic priorities.  
McCarthy said he has asked

that his name be withdrawn in Iowa, where he said it "would have little bearing on the outcome of the national election" and might hurt Gov. Harold Hughes' Democratic Senate campaign.  
A top supporter of McCarthy's Democratic bid—former Democratic National Chairman Stephen Mitchell—said meanwhile he will now support the party's nominee, Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey.  
"Let's face it—unite and fight another day," Mitchell said in Teos, N.M.  
Louisiana Gov. John McKeithen announced he will not support Humphrey because of

differing views over the Supreme Court and other issues. But the announcement did not signal a general bolt by Southern Democratic leaders.  
Wallace appealed on national television Tuesday night for money and votes from "mainstream America" and particularly urged unregistered voters to get on the rolls and vote for him.  
The appeal came at the end of a half hour of time purchased from the National Broadcasting Co., following films of Wallace speeches and interviews.  
The former Alabama governor was resting and writing speeches in Miami today, where

he said he is on the November ballot in 46 states and "we will get the other four soon."  
Republican presidential candidate Richard M. Nixon, who launches his campaign drive tonight in Chicago, says voters are more concerned with issues than candidates this year. He said the presidential outcome is unpredictable.  
"When people are more concerned about issues than men," Nixon said in New York, "they make up their minds by what the candidates say."  
"This is the year when people are wrought up," he said. "This is the year when people are unpredictable."

Nixon's running mate, Maryland Gov. Spiro T. Agnew, also returned to the campaign trail today with stops planned in Wisconsin, Ohio and several Eastern states.  
Humphrey—formally kicks-off his Democratic presidential campaign Monday in Philadelphia. He planned to interrupt strategy sessions as Waverly, Minn., today to return to Washington for a National Security Council meeting.

## House To Hear Water Program

WASHINGTON (AP)—A compromise bill to authorize a \$1.3 billion water-development program in the Colorado River basin will be called up for House consideration Thursday, Chairman Wayne N. Aspinall, D-Colo., of the House Interior Committee said today.  
Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said he believed the Senate would be in position to pass the bill "Friday if the House does it Thursday."  
Senate House conferees filed a report today with the House on the compromise measure, calling for a Central Arizona project and smaller projects in Colorado, Utah and New Mexico. The bill was forged from mistakes passed earlier by the Senate and House.  
Under House rules providing a 24-hour waiting period, the bill

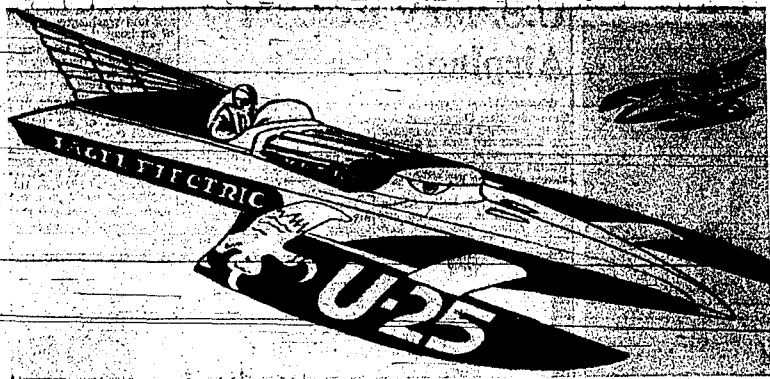

# U.S. May Restrict Airplane Traffic

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Transportation Department formally proposed today to restrict the number and type of aircraft using airports in New York City, Washington and Chicago as a means of easing air traffic congestion.

The Federal Aviation Administration, in a notice of proposed rulemaking, designated airports in New York City, Washington and Chicago as "high-density airports."

At each of these airports, a specified number of takeoffs and landings under instrument flight rules would be limited.

The proposed rule would, during the hours from 6 a.m. to midnight, restrict such operations at Kennedy Airport to 80 per

hour, at O'Hare to 135 an hour and at La Guardia, Newark and Washington National to 60 an hour.

The proposed rule would require aircraft operating into the airports under the reservation plan to be able to maintain an air speed of not less than 172 miles an hour while under the jurisdiction of air traffic approach control.

The FAA said it would hold a public hearing on the proposed rule Sept. 25, and would receive comments until Oct. 3. The new regulations could go into effect shortly thereafter and probably will become effective in November.

## War Victims Soar As 408 Die In Week

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. casualties surged upward again last week, reflecting the heavy fighting that had continued for a second week after a prolonged lull.

The U.S. Command said 408 U.S. troops were killed and another 2,513 were wounded, 1,398 seriously enough to require hospitalization. The toll was the highest since the week ending June 1, at the end of the Communists' second major offensive of the year.

The U.S. Command reported 4,476 enemy troops killed by allied forces last week, virtually unchanged from the 4,474 reported the week before. But that earlier total was increased to 5,329, and last week's figure will probably be boosted similarly as more reports come in.

American casualties in the previously reported week, ending Aug. 24, were 308 killed and 1,144 wounded.

Despite the increase in fighting, South Vietnamese government casualties dropped off slightly to 484 killed, 1,768 wounded and 40 missing compared to 493 killed, 1,833 wounded and 49 missing the previous week.

Since U.S. forces entered the war at the beginning of 1961, the U.S. Command has reported 27,500 of its men killed in combat, and 171,808 wounded. Another 1,197 are missing or captured.

Enemy casualties in that period are estimated at 300,105.

## Priests Ask Council Help For Dispute

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fifty-one Roman Catholic priests, claiming a right to their own ideas on birth control, are asking the National Council of Catholic Bishops to step into the priestly dispute with Washington's Patrick Cardinal O'Boyle.

A leader of the dissenting priests, the Washington Priests Association, said Wednesday night a petition is being sent to the Council of Bishops asking it to set up a special board to mediate the dispute which already has led to suspension of one priest.

The suspended priest is the Rev. T. Joseph O'Donoghue who moved out of his Northwest Washington rectory quarters Wednesday, meeting a deadline set by Cardinal O'Boyle.

The cardinal suspended Father O'Donoghue for citing in a sermon the words of some Catholic theologians who disagree with Pope Paul VI's encyclical banning all forms of artificial birth control.

Cardinal O'Boyle told a news conference this week that the encyclical is the authoritative teaching of the church and must be followed by priests who deal with birth control, even though the encyclical is not necessarily infallible.

The cardinal contended that "an attack on authority" is behind the priests' rebellion.

He has given the priests until Sept. 14 to retract their statements or face punishment. It has not said what punishments might be assessed. But under church law penalties can range from withdrawal of specific privileges, such as saying Mass, to suspension from a parish church.

## Polls Stay Open In Nevada Vote

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — For the first time in 104 years, since Nevada became a state, bars and liquor stores were open during voting hours.

The donor was Agen Alves, a public prosecutor who shot himself in the head. Sources said his wife had agreed to donate his heart, kidneys and pancreas but his brother balked at the last minute.

The donor's organs were transplanted to one woman and two men. One man who received a kidney, identified as Nassif Salomao, died a few hours after his operation. The other kidney went to an elderly woman, Ann Toporovich.

The heart recipient was identified as Hugo Orlandi. The pancreas recipient is a young man, who was not identified.

## U.S. Drive On Crime Brings Arrest Record

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney Gen. Ramsey Clark reported today record numbers of arrests and convictions in the last fiscal year in his department's battle against organized crime.

"A vigorous follow-through can achieve virtual elimination of major organized crime that has corrupted American life for decades," Clark said in a statement.

His report detailed the work of his department's criminal division with emphasis on a special organized crime and racket section. He said the number of indictments has increased each year since the special drive was started in 1961.

Indictments were obtained against 1,166 persons in the year ended June 30. Clark said compared to 1,107 the preceding year and 19 in 1960, the year before the special drive was started.

Convictions also reached record proportions—520 compared with 400 in fiscal 1967, a 30 per cent rise, he said.

Of the 520 convictions, he continued, 281 resulted from FBI investigations into the activities of racketeers and gamblers. This represented a 43 per cent boost over the previous fiscal year, and Clark noted there are still nearly 700 persons awaiting trial.

Of the convictions and indictments obtained during fiscal 1968, he said, 48 defendants were identified as known or suspected members of the Mafia.

Clark said during the past 13 years 210 known or suspected members of that crime syndicate were indicted or convicted.

He attributed part of the criminal division's success during the past two years to a policy of establishing what he called "strike forces—teams of attorneys and investigators from key federal agencies—who move comprehensively against organized crime in a specific metropolitan area."

## Panel Hits Rifle Pact For Army

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate investigating subcommittee today charged the Army with "most inept performance" in awarding contracts to accelerate production of the M16 rifle.

While it will not attempt to undo decisions already taken, the subcommittee said, "this should be the last time that any defense agency conducts a procurement in such an awkward, unreasonable manner."

The five-member unit of the Senate Armed Services Committee commented in a final report on a long investigation of Army contract awards for a sharp increase in M16 production to meet a Vietnam need.

The contracts were awarded to General Motors Corp. and Harrington & Richardson, without competitive bidding.

The subcommittee said two other companies—Maremont Corp. of Saco, Maine, and Cadillac Cages—were prepared to submit lower prices than those of the winners.

The report summed up major findings with these comments: "The Army's method eliminated two companies before considering the prices they would have submitted. They could have been considered without delaying either contracts or production."

"General Motors was selected as one of the contractors without considering that their price was \$20 million more than other producers found competent by the Army's own evaluation."

"The removal of price as a factor is not even usually supported by the reasons advanced by the Army."

The subcommittee said that General Motors and Harrington & Richardson had each received orders for 240,000 rifles at ceiling prices of \$56.3 million and \$41.5 million, respectively.

Maremont testified during hearings it was prepared to bid \$36.5 million. The report cited testimony to a House subcommittee that Cadillac Cages had set a price of \$32.8 million.

The subcommittee renewed its objection to the Army's criticism of the existing M16 rifle test-firing range while approving a GM plan to build such a range in an open area above its proposed production line.

And it again held that the urgency advanced as a reason for procedures should have required more consideration to having Colt Industries Inc., previously the sole supplier of the rifle, increase its production.

"The process of obtaining additional production of M16 rifles reflects no credit on those involved in supervising and directing the action. It has been to say the least a most inept performance," the subcommittee said.

"It would not now serve the national interest to have the production efforts already underway. Certainly, however, this should be the last time that any defense agency conducts a procurement in such an awkward, unreasonable manner."

## Panel To Probe Chicago Riots

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's anti-riot commission will investigate the disorder that swept Chicago during the Democratic National Convention, its chairman announced today.

Dr. Milton Eisenhower said a special investigative task force of the commission would also look into "other recent events such as the outbreak of shootings in Cleveland."

Eisenhower told newsmen the study also might include rioting in Miami, Fla., during the GOP National Convention but only Chicago and Cleveland were mentioned specifically in the commission announcement.

Eisenhower said the commission had not discussed the Chicago investigation with President Johnson and acted on its own initiative.

A anti-war demonstration staged by youth groups during the convention in Chicago led to clashes with police, with hundreds of injuries and arrests resulting.

A controversy continues over whether police action amounted to unwarranted brutality or was a necessary restraint to preserve order.

## Tot Survives Despite Lack Of Esophagus

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — Eighteen-month-old Troy Swiggum, a caddy blond with big eyes and chubby cheeks, looks as if he has never missed a meal in his short life.

The fact is, however, that he has never really eaten one—in the usual sense.

Troy, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Swiggum, River Falls, Wis., was born without a complete esophagus.

Instead of providing a connection between his mouth and stomach, his esophagus leads to a blind pouch.

He was admitted to St. Paul's Bethesda Hospital two days after his birth in February 1967, underwent surgery—called a gastrostomy—and an artificial hole was made in his stomach wall to make it possible to pour food directly into the stomach by a tube.

Although Troy gained some weight after the tube's installation, he wasn't keen on being fed that way. He'd cry and fuss so much that doctors found it difficult to provide him with the sustenance needed for an infant.

Last July 13, he reentered the hospital. He was then down to nine pounds, just four pounds over his weight shortly after birth.

Physicians called a new feeding device, called a Heiter pump, to bring his weight up. The pump force feeds a concentrated meat-based formula mechanically.

Troy began to thrive, his weight and growth curve changed for the better. He now weighs slightly over 17 pounds, 10 ounces and looks fine, will likely remain in Bethesda Hospital under December.

It is expected that surgeons will perform an operation to improve an esophagus for him by using a portion of his colon.

## River Survey Pinpoints Flow

BOISE (AP) — A survey of the Snake River also shows more than four million acre feet of water flow into the stream from springs in the stretch between Miller Dam and Ketchikan Hill, the Idaho Department of Reclamation said today.

The flow includes the famed Thousand Springs in the Hagerman Valley and lesser known springs near Twin Falls and Dolan.

## Fund Plan To Assist Suspects

PORTLAND (AP) — A friend of one of the men charged with murder in the 1960 slayings of Beverly Ann Allan and Larry Ralph Peyton, said Tuesday a benefit was planned to raise money for defense.

Besides, said Ray Dike of Portland, he hoped to help create a more favorable climate of public opinion.

Dike said he was a friend of Edward Ralph Jorgensen, 36, one of the men charged with the killings of the co-ed and her date.

"We are going to have a benefit for Ed basically, and his family," Dike said.

"Quite a few are working on it," he said, and added, "We are trying to answer the question of how a working man can compete with a quarter of a million dollars."

One estimate of the cost of the investigation that went on for eight years before the arrests was \$250,000.

Jorgensen's younger brother, Carl Frederick Jorgensen, 28, and a Salem man, Robert Gordon Brom, 28, are all held and charged with the killings. Only Edward Jorgensen is married.

Both the Jorgensens pleaded innocent Tuesday in Multnomah County Circuit Court.

Brom did not enter a plea. His attorney said the indictment would be challenged because

more than one crime was charged. Dike said the benefit would be but friends would have a chance to contribute money for the defense. He said there would be no dinner, fence. "We may have a news conference then, too," he said.
