Proposal To Hire Coordinator For T.F. Plan Viewed

Officials representing three groups interested in downtown Twin Falls improvement gathered at the Regerson Hotel Monday afternoon to discuss how the massive development project is progressing.

Talk centered around coordination of the three groups as downtown development nears. Represented were the Twin Falls City Council, Twin Falls Futures Unlimited and the city's Urban Renewal Agency.

The Urban Renewal Agency secretary of the Urban Renewal Agency, proposed that a five-man commission made up of representatives of each group serve as the coordinating agency.

Then the matter was taken a step further. It was proposed that a man be hired to work full time as a coordinator.

No action was taken on the proposal, however, Mayor Egan Kelly asked each group to name two men to work on the problem and come up with recommendations sometime this week.

The coordinator, it was said, is needed to work on all phases of the downtown project and coordinate every move with members of each group along with the engineering firm and designers of the project.

Members of the city's urban renewal project, approved by the council recently, is in San Francisco being reviewed and should be sent to Washington, D. C., for final approval and funding "sometime this week."

Those attending were also told about a legal snag in the Local Improvement District in the downtown area.

The improvement area is actually two projects that are geared to work together for total downtown improvement.

The LID area, which blocks fronting on Main Avenue between Second Streets East and South, and Third Streets East and South. The urban renewal area then covers a U-shaped area surrounding the LID area.

The snag in the LID is the assessment roll. William Langley, city attorney, told the group the assessment will have to be made in square feet rather than on a front foot basis.

An LID resolution has been passed reading a cost of \$10 per front foot per year and Mr. Langley said this will have to be changed to read square feet, but he said the amount of money concerned works out to the same.

The assessment roll is being worked on at the present time and should be complete in about another month. It will be presented to the council and a public hearing will be called. After that hearing, the council will take action on the assessment roll.

The LID is to raise \$255,000. After that, the city will have to find an agency to buy and sell the bonds to raise the necessary money for downtown improvement in the LID area.

The Urban Renewal Agency expects its federal funds to be approved and available in about a month also.

Office records told there is enough money available through the LID and the urban renewal agency funds to hire a coordinator to work on the downtown project.

The meeting lasted two hours.

Chicago Riot Brings Grand Jury Probe

CHICAGO (AP) — A federal grand jury investigation of demonstrations, parades and news coverage during the Democratic National Convention has been ordered by Chief Judge William Campbell of U.S. District Court.

Judge Campbell on Monday ordered the September grand jury to investigate alleged violations of federal statutes during the convention.

Thomas A. Foran, U.S. district attorney, already had started an investigation and Judge Campbell ordered him to turn over to the grand jury all information he has accumulated.

"Only the federal grand jury has the total responsibility under our Constitution to hold such a probe," Judge Campbell told the grand jury.

"Purely on the information I have read in the press, I find that various people are accused of interstate travel in violation of the federal communication statute by some television networks which he said were accused of engaging in interstate commerce to unduly influence the convention by television.

The jury also was directed to investigate charges that a telegram, sent to the convention, suggested a hearing of the Democratic convention platform committee.

In another development, Mayor Richard J. Daley announced that a one-hour television show prepared to present what he termed "a balance portrayal" of the convention will be shown at 9 p.m. Sept. 15. Commenting for the first time on a report issued by his office Friday on the convention week disturbances, Daley again defended police action in handling antiwar demonstrators.

"I have said that any overreaction by the police department being investigated, thoroughly investigated," he said in a news conference. "But I would be the first to defend it to the end."

The comment that all our policemen acted this way is not true.

Local Farmers Do Better Than Average

NEW YORK (Special to the Times - News) — An analysis of the past year in better financial shape than prices in most parts of the country.

Despite a downturn in prices of farm products and livestock, many of them succeeded in boosting their gross receipts above the previous year's level, according to a survey by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

In part, to favorable weather conditions, bigger plantings and heavier fertilization. Improved operating efficiency and more use of the use of more mechanical equipment, was also a factor.

In contrast to the results reported for the local area, farmers and ranchers in many parts of the country were able to show little or no improvement.

The findings are based upon a survey conducted by the Standard Rate and Graft Service, Inc. figures on gross farm income and farm population for each county in the United States.

In Twin Falls County, it shows, farm receipts in the year first to decline in the period with the prior year's \$54,478,000.

That was the gross amount, before taking operating costs and taxes into account.

The bulk of it consisted of cash receipts from the sale of crops and livestock. The rest was made up of government payments and "income kind," which is the value of the home-grown product consumed on the farm.

A breakdown of the cash receipts from the sale of commodities, on the basis of data compiled by the Department of Agriculture, shows that approximately 58 per cent of it was from the marketing of farm crops and the remaining 42 per cent from livestock, poultry and dairy products.

In terms of the number of men, women and children living on farms in Twin Falls County, the gross income was equivalent to \$7,702 per capita.

It compares favorably with the \$4,727 per capita averaged on farms elsewhere in the United States and with the \$6,194 in the State of Idaho.

Yanks Seize Red Supplies

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. Marines killed 34 North Vietnamese troops in two clashes Monday just below the demilitarized zone and uncovered a large cache of ammunition and supplies.

Five Marines were killed and 23 wounded in the two battles within two miles of each other just north of the Marine outpost known as the Rock Pile, U.S. headquarters reported.

In a sweep through a bunker complex six miles west-southwest of the Rock Pile, the Marines uncovered more than 500 mortar and rocket rounds, 200 pounds of rice, medical supplies and cloth of Soviet, Czechoslovak and French origin, apparently for uniforms.

The flareup of fighting around the Rock Pile was the only significant fighting reported.

Troops of the U.S. 19th Light Infantry Brigade, operating 150 miles farther south below Da Nang, found another weapons cache that included 37 carbines and rifles, 19 rocket grenades, seven machine guns and nine flame throwers.

Viet Cong and North Vietnamese shelling killed one American and nine Vietnamese and wounded 24 Vietnamese in five attacks from the northern provinces to the Mekong Delta.

The American serviceman was killed in Kontum, in the central highlands, when 17 rounds of 100-pound Russian rockets landed around the area. A government military headquarters and a housing area. John McCull, who holds a lease on about 17.5 acres of state land at Payette Lake, asked permission of the board to build 40 housing units on about 4.5 acres of the tract. He said he would agree in writing that the units not encroach on the beachfront.

State Sen. H. Young, R-Nampa, representing Blingham, said the original application was filed nearly three years ago and he urged the board to take some action on it.

Shepard objected on grounds the proposal involved private development of a commercial business on state-owned land. Blingham said his present offer.

Czech Leader Signs Pact With Soviets On Economic Issues

PRAGUE (AP) — Premier Oldrich Cernik flew to Moscow today and signed an agreement on the delivery of natural gas to Czechoslovakia and a protocol "on other economic issues," the news agency CTK reported.

The agreement was signed by Cernik and Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin, the agency added.

There was no detail on the economic protocol but CTK said the Russians agreed to delivery of natural gas to Czechoslovakia "for many years" and to "cooperation in the construction of a gas pipeline on Soviet territory."

Cernik was believed to have gone to Moscow to seek help to offset the economic setback resulting from the Soviet bloc invasion of Czechoslovakia.

Meanwhile, Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Vasily Kuznetsov returned to Prague after a visit to Bratislava, the capital of Slovakia, to report that his talks with Slovak Communist party chief Gustav Husak had been "cordial" raised the prospect that Moscow has bigger things in mind for Husak.

This contrasted with the official description of "frank and comradely"—meaning disagreement—used for Kuznetsov's talks with Ondrej Slovacek, chairman of the Slovak National Council, and earlier with President Ludvik Svoboda, Premier Cernik and national Communist party chief Alexander Dubcek.

Kuznetsov came to Czechoslovakia Friday amid complaints in the Soviet press that liberal Czechoslovak leaders were not moving swiftly enough to conform to Moscow's demands that the liberal reforms of the past months be rolled back.

Husak's public statements have received favorable attention in Russian newspapers. He has advocated steps to prevent Czechoslovak refugees from fleeing the country and is the only Czechoslovak official so far to mention "counterrevolutionary forces" in his speeches. The Kremlin says Soviet troops moved into Czechoslovakia Aug. 20 to save communism here from counterrevolution.

Humphrey Predicts Cut In Viet Forces

Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey predicts some reduction of U.S. forces in Vietnam may be possible by early next year and says substantial Vietnam peace negotiations may be under way by then.

The Democratic presidential candidate also accused Republican opponent Richard M. Nixon Monday of demonstrating "concern" over the nuclear non-proliferation treaty up for Senate confirmation.

Nixon, taking a day off from campaigning, said in a statement the United States should use its "enormous material wealth and power and ability" to aid starving Biafrans in the Nigerian civil war.

"In other political developments," Humphrey said, "the United States should use its 'enormous material wealth and power and ability' to aid starving Biafrans in the Nigerian civil war."

Prospects that former Republican Gov. B. Humphrey Chandler would be named third party candidate George C. Wallace's running mate faded quickly when Chandra's civil rights record is an obstacle.

—Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., says Humphrey and his running mate, Sen. Edmund Muskie, "are best equipped to handle the problems facing the nation." Kennedy said he'll have more to say about the campaign at a time goes on.

Humphrey, expressing optimism over exploratory peace talks in Paris, told a group of White House reporters he believes "substantive negotiations" may begin before the U.S. presidential inauguration in January.

He also said "it can safely predict" that "unusual developments" the United States will be able to begin removing some troops from Vietnam as the peace negotiations are still under way.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk disagreed in Washington that the timing of U.S. troop reductions could be forecast at this time.

Humphrey claimed Nixon's statement that he has doubts about some provisions of the treaty against spread of nuclear weapons while supporting it in principle demonstrates "a confusion" and the kind of world leadership Nixon would bring.

Nixon attacked Humphrey, urged President Johnson to give all the imagination, attention and energy he can muster to the problem and said this is no time to "change channels" or "serve the diplomatic niceties."

That was a reference to blocks by both the Nigerian and Senegalese governments against shipment of food to the starving Biafrans. Referring to America's wealth and power, Nixon said "there is no better case in which we might invest that power than in sparing the lives of innocent men and women and children whose lives are otherwise doomed."

School Enrollment Is Up In T.F., Officials Told

Enrollment at Twin Falls schools has increased over the first day of school in 1967.

According to figures from the most recent enrollment survey, Monday's total enrollment was 6,085, compared with the 1967 figure of 6,047. This is broken down as follows: 2,921 in the primary school, 1,115 in the junior high school, 1,000, and special education, 88.

These figures were released during the school board's Monday night meeting.

The board also approved calling for bids on the paving of a section near adjoining the parking lot at the high school on Transit street. Bid opening is set for Sept. 23.

The College of Southern Idaho's August payment for use of its facilities to the school district was prepared and may apply to the September payment, the board decided.

The trustees discussed a year-around school proposal, but decided more research would be necessary before a decision can be reached.

The purchase of a "district-owned school bus also was discussed. This bus would be for use of student field trips. No decision was reached on this matter.

The board accepted the resignations of three teachers, Mrs. Wanda K. Sutcliffe, Mrs. Naomi Nelson, and Mrs. Gwynne Schwartz.

New teachers hired include Mrs. Susan Mattison, junior high algebra; Mrs. Angella Beck, second grade, Morningdale; Mrs. Joanne Alban, English, senior high; Patricia Stewart, first grade, Lincoln; Delbert Paul Remaley, Jr., sixth grade, Lincoln; Mrs. Ruby Franklin, second grade, Lincoln, and Sarah Stormont, fifth grade, Morningdale.

Five teachers were hired for the Headstart program. They are Dolores Johns, Barbara Parrott, Debra Burado, Paul Nebek, and Colleen Stradley. Mrs. Irene Melton will be the cook.

Superintendent Speaks About 16-Year School Financial History In Twin Falls

Dr. E. H. Ragland, superintendent of Twin Falls School District No. 411, released Monday a prepared 16-year study of the school's main operating tax collections since 1952.

"In this period," he said, "we found that \$3,850,132 has been paid in local property taxes for the general operating expenses of the district. At the same time \$2,940,658.87 was remitted to the district through state and county apportionments.

Prior to 1958, more money was raised from local property taxes for general fund use than was provided from state and county apportionments. But since 1958 the tendency has been for a larger proportion to be provided by the state and county," Dr. Ragland said.

"Passage of the three per cent retail sales tax in 1965 undoubtedly led local taxpayers to believe that the source of support would be substantially maintained or increased," he said.

"School District No. 411 has been limited to a 30-mill rate since 1955, with three exceptions when one-mill emergency levies have been extended," Dr. Ragland noted. "This 30-mill ceiling has held down local school taxes to a point that there were no other sources to supply school funds except state and federal money. It can also be noted that federal money is allocated for specific purposes."

Dr. Ragland said very little is thrown into the mainstream of school finance and made available for the important matter of salaries and wages of teachers and all other school employees as well as for other educational improvements.

"It may well be that local initiative should be more of a factor in the support of Idaho public schools," he said. "Local taxpayers are not fully aware that the Boise school district in any given school year levies 10 or more mills more for operating expenses than any Magic Valley school district," Dr. Ragland said.

In his 16-year study, Superintendent Ragland also compared revenues anticipated in each of the fiscal years since 1952 with revenues actually collected. He noted almost no difference in

local tax collections compared to those anticipated with hardly significant, he said. Local school taxes for operating schools showed an excess of about \$72,600 over the amount anticipated in the period under study.

"However, when you spread that amount over 16 years, it averages \$4,500 per year, which would not support the salary of one additional teacher," Dr. Ragland pointed out.

"We can only conclude that in school district No. 411, the operating revenue budgeted or anticipated bears a close resemblance to revenues received when judged over a period of years," he said.

"It should also be pointed out that the local tax levy for this district is lower at this time than it was in 1962. At this time

the total levy was 44.5 mills. It is expected that the 1968 levy will be 42 mills. This would be an increase of three-fourths of a mill and will have to be justified under the school board's authority to apply the emergency mill levy above mentioned," the superintendent said.

In concluding Dr. Ragland said that more than one-fourth of the local school taxes for all purposes are used to pay for buildings already built or for limited additions of plant facilities. This draws off much tax money that is seriously needed for operating expenses, he said.

NEWPORT NEWS, Va. (AP) — The aircraft carrier John F. Kennedy, the newest member of the Atlantic Fleet, was at dockside today while crewmen groomed her for exercises next week and a shakedown cruise in November.

The 81,400-ton warship is scheduled to steam to the Caribbean in her first journey with the fleet and return, hopefully, in time for Christmas.

The 2,500-man ship's company will be joined by the 2,500 men of her air wing during the coming month.

Some of her planes came aboard before Saturday's commissioning ceremonies when the ship was officially presented to the Navy by her maker, the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Co.

He said there is much debate about military objectives, but "there is no debate about the performance of the men who serve in our armed forces."

Gov. John Volpe of Massachusetts and Caroline Kennedy also made brief statements, but the main address, which visibly moved the crowd, came from former Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara.

Officers Ousted When Shots Fired At Panthers

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Two police officers were suspended today after 12 carbine shots were fired into the black Panthers headquarters in West Oakland, police said.

Police Chief Charles Galt said two patrolmen "have been implicated in the shooting and have been suspended at my direction pending further investigation."

Bullets reportedly pierced the four-by-five-foot window in the two-story stucco building, striking posters pasted to it of Eldridge Cleaver and Huey P. Newton, leaders of the militant Negro organization.

The shots came two days after Newton, the Panthers founder, was convicted of voluntary manslaughter in the shooting death of a white policeman John Frey. He had been charged with murder.

Because the area was deserted at the early hour, no one was injured, either at the headquarters or in Tosa's Cafe next door where a "sit-in" also was pierced by a bullet.

Humphrey Shuns McCarthy Battle

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey is pictured by aides as having no plans to counter any antiwar campaigning by his defeated rival for the Democratic presidential nomination, Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy.

As the man who gave the anti-Vietnam war movement an impetus last year, by announcing he would oppose President Johnson for renomination, McCarthy said in Chicago that he could not support either Humphrey or GOP nominee Richard M. Nixon. Instead, he said he would campaign for senatorial candidates who share his criticisms of Vietnam war poli-

cies. He also is expected to try to help House members seeking election as antiwar candidates. Humphrey, who backs Johnson's policies except for minor variations, was said to have no intention to fight McCarthy's efforts.

The vice president's attitude, as reported by his staff members, is that if McCarthy can help elect Democrats to the Senate and House, well and good. How much campaigning the presidential nominee will do with and for such candidates apparently will depend on the desires of the latter.

If they want to come aboard with him before or after making rounds with McCarthy, Humphrey's aides think they will be welcomed as exemplars of the vice president's thesis that the Democratic party is big enough to shelter men with divergent opinions.

If they decide to be elsewhere when Humphrey campaigns through their states, the vice president can be expected to accept that as their prerogative and ignore the implied or actual snub.

McCarthy has made it clear he has no affinity for a fourth-party movement. He has acted to choke off moves in Iowa, Indiana and Montana to put his name on the presidential ballot. He is awaiting a ruling by the secretary of state of Minnesota on whether he must take affirmative action to keep his name off in the home state he shares with Humphrey.

Far from being the forgotten man after his defeat for the presidential nomination, the McCarthy aides said he is being swamped with speaking invitations.

McCarthy has generally avoided reporters since the convention.

Bolivia Shuts State Schools Over Dispute

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) — President Rene Barrientos ordered Monday night that the state school system be shut down for the two remaining months of the school year in a drastic countermeasure at 25,000 striking teachers.

Barrientos made the announcement in a brief nationwide radio message in which he said the strike had opened the way for "anarchistic and Castroite subversion." The teachers walked off the job a week ago demanding higher wages.

Last week, Barrientos said that all teachers who joined the walkout would lose their jobs. He said Monday night the government would begin a search for new teachers to take the place of the strikers in the next school year.

He said the steps were taken to head off street disturbances planned by "certain sectors" of Bolivian society. He did not elaborate. He added that the measures would also "put an end to anarchism and politics in education."

Japan Detains U.S. Pacifist On China Trip

NAGASAKI, Japan (AP) — Officials of the Maritime Safety Agency said today they have taken into custody American pacifist Dr. Earle Reynolds and his Japanese wife after they sailed their 30-ton yacht Phoenix out of Japanese territorial waters for Communist China.

Customs officials said Able, 28-year-old wife of Dr. Reynolds of Yellow Springs, Ohio, would be questioned on charges of illegal denture because they said she did not carry a passport.

Spokesmen said a safety agency patrol boat trailed the Phoenix and Reynolds warned the yacht not to sail out of Japanese territorial waters.

Reynolds, they said, violated Japanese law because he knowingly assisted his wife in illegally leaving Japan.

Officials said his wife could not be issued a passport for her trip because she has not received entry approval from Communist China. The Phoenix left Nagasaki today for Shanghai.

Muskie Confers With Fulbright

HOT SPRINGS, Ark. (AP) — Sen. Edmund S. Muskie paused Monday in his Democratic vice presidential campaign for a private meeting with Sen. J. W. Fulbright, D-Ark., one of the party's strongest critics of the Vietnam war.

Muskie and Fulbright did not appear in public together. No statement was issued following their meeting and a dinner they attended with several state Democratic leaders.

Newsmen glimpsed the two senators together only once, inside a hotel garage where Fulbright, who did not meet Muskie's campaign plane, greeted his Maine colleague.

They shook hands warmly, exchanged pleasantries, and moved inside before the bulk of the press corps following Muskie arrived. Fulbright is campaigning to win re-election against his Republican opponent, Charles Bernard.

Asked if he was backing the national Democratic ticket, Fulbright said, "certainly—I always do."

Nixon Urges American Aid For Nigerians

NEW YORK (AP) — Richard M. Nixon called on President Johnson Monday to give "all the time and attention and imagination and energy he can muster" to the African tribesmen afflicted by starvation because of civil war in Nigeria.

"America is not without enormous material wealth and power and ability," the Republican candidate for president said in a statement issued through his New York office.

"There is no better case in which we might invest that power than in sparing the lives of innocent men and women and children who are otherwise doomed."

Nixon spent the day in his New York apartment, resting from a four-day cross-country campaign trip, and meeting with staff members.

He resumed his campaign Tuesday in a joint appearance with Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller and a speech to a suburban audience in Westchester County, New York, and then leaves Wednesday for another speaking trip across the nation.

International Bank Bolsters Sterling

BASEL, Switzerland (AP) — The Bank of International Settlements today announced a new \$2-billion credit to bolster the pound sterling.

The credit, which will make foreign currencies available any time holders of pounds want to exchange them in large quantities, will run for 10 years, with a three-year grace period after that before any repayments need be made.

Twelve countries will participate: Austria, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, West Germany, Italy, Japan, Holland, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland and the United States.

Olimak Emminger, No. 2 man in the West German federal bank, told newsmen that West Germany would make available \$400 million of the amount. Led by the United States and West Germany, the central banks of the 12 nations agreed on the credit at a meeting that

lasted until after midnight Sunday. The purpose is to restore confidence in the pound, which once more has been badly weakened by Britain's persistent tendency to spend more abroad than it earns.

The credit also assures holders of pounds—chiefly the oil-rich Arabs of the Middle East—of other currencies into which they can convert their sterling holdings if they desire. But the British and the central bankers hope that the granting of the credit will engender so much confidence in the pound that much of the credit will not have to be used.

Scientist Predicts Continuing Rise In Transplantation Of Human Organs

NEW YORK (AP) — With the number of heart-transplant operations throughout the world edging near 50, a scientist predicts an even greater upsurge in the number of operations over the coming months.

Dr. F. C. Spencer of the New York University Medical Center also said that despite the obvious success of the heart transplants so far, a great number of questions remain.

One problem that needs exploring, Spencer said, is why many recipients seem to respond either "extremely badly or extremely well."

He told the second International Congress of the Transplantation Society Sunday that the next year will provide major and needed information about

long-term survival of recipients, added, "I predict a great increase in frequency in the next several months."

The society held its first meeting last year in Paris. Dr. Theodore Cooper, director of the U.S. National Institutes of Health, told the hundreds of researchers Sunday that the United States is setting up a cardiac transplantation registry to record treatment and results on all heart transplants for the use of the world's scientists.

Cooper also cited the problem of supply and demand in heart transplants. Government statistics show that there are 200,000 deaths each year in the United States from acquired heart disease, he said.

"For the 80,000 or so of these which occur before the patient can reach the hospital," he said, "only prevention will provide a cure."

Of the 120,000 who get to a hospital, about 40,000 might be returned to the community without surgery. That leaves 80,000 persons each year who "clearly require new forms of surgery," Cooper said.

There are about 8,000 deaths each year from congenital heart disease occurring before the age of 1-year, but these are largely due to lesions that could be han-

dled with other surgery. Various other cases would amount to about 1,000 additional persons a year to be added to the 80,000 transplant candidates.

Looking at a potential supply of donors, Cooper said there are 260,000 deaths of men and women between the ages of 15 and 64 each year from causes other than cancer or heart disease.

Assuming that all would be suitable donors, he added, that means that one out of three would have to be willing and available as a donor to supply the 81,000 candidates.

"Assuming the willingness," Cooper continued, "the availability does raise some impressive problems in logistics and preservation."

4 Goals Outlined By Hansen

Orval Hansen, the 2nd Dist. congressional hopeful, kicked off his final campaign drive before the November election by listing four goals he would seek if elected.

They included one on agriculture — and two other political candidates also spoke on farm problems Monday.

"First," Hansen said, "we must reverse the disastrous decline in farm income and rebuild a strong and healthy agriculture."

"Second, we must end the inflation that is pushing living costs up and the value of earnings and savings down."

"Third, we must build Idaho's future on a solid foundation by enlarging our capacity to provide quality education for our youth and by developing our resources and expanding our economy to create new job opportunities and rising income for all Idahoans."

"Fourth, we must eliminate the root causes of violence and disorder while protecting lives and property through firm but fair law enforcement," he said.

Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, and St. Anthony grower said he wanted revenue to provide farm programs. He said the next Congress "should give more attention to the seeking of new answers, particularly in the area of strengthening the farmer's bargaining power in the market place."

The Idaho Democrat also said he was satisfied with Senate-House conference approval of legislation restricting exports of logs from Idaho and other Northwest states.

"Several wood products companies in Oregon and Washington were forced into bankruptcy by Japanese competition before temporary action was finally taken," Church said.

Darrell Manning, a Pocatello Democrat who opposes Hansen, told a Pocatello group Monday night that "this nation has entered into an era of national foolishness in attempting gun control legislation."

"We have hundreds of volume of laws against crime, but crime is increasing," he said. "What makes you think that outlawing guns would work a magic solution?"

Manning also advocated more training and modern equipment for police.

Compton I. White, the Democratic 1st Dist. nominee, told a Boise group that Idahoans need not isolate themselves from racial and social disturbances which may be having a greater impact in other sections of the country.

"We can't solve the social and racial unrest with prodding bayonets and sabres," he explained. "We must look to the cause of this civil disobedience and honestly attempt to eradicate it on the root level through needed social reforms."

Pocatello Schools Face Fund Crisis

POCATELLO, Idaho (AP) — Pocatello's school district is faced with raising operating revenues through taxes on a below-average assessed property valuation, according to Superintendent Ron Ellis.

Bannock County commissioners Monday approved the district's levies, along with those of seven other taxing units.

Ellis said the assessed valuation in his district (No. 25) is only 53 per cent of the statewide average — of \$5,500 — in assessed valuation per pupil. The district will be \$5.32 mills per \$100 of assessed valuation — up nearly one mill from this year's levy.

But the superintendent said that levy was still four per cent below the state average.

One factor in increased district costs, he said, was the closure of St. Joseph's Catholic school. Its students were transferred to Pocatello schools.

Other levies approved were School District 21 — which reduced its levy — Inkom, Lava Hot Springs, McCammon, Chubbuck, the Portneuf and South Bannock free libraries and the Lava Hot Springs Cemetery District.

T.F. Man Is Head Of Big, Big Business

Lt. Col. Chester C. McMullin, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. McMullin, Route 3, Twin Falls, is the head of a big business—one of the largest in the world. He administers government contracts valued at nearly \$45 billion.

Lt. Col. McMullin was assigned to the military post last year. He is an Air Force veteran with a degree in science and a masters degree in engineering administration. He is also the holder of the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal, and other medals.

During World War II he flew a number of combat missions and also served as a project engineer at a Naval Research Laboratory.

Right now he is the commanding officer of the Air Force Post Representative Office and is responsible for the management and administration of government-industry contracts. The administration calls for performance, scheduling and cost in the contracts.

The responsibility includes an estimated 10,000 contracts worth an annual government expenditure of \$5 billion a year and a net worth of \$45 billion.

This makes his job one of the biggest in the world.

Gun Slaying Verdict Stirs Controversy

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — The verdict that Black Panther leader Huey Newton killed a white policeman in a street gunfight but didn't shoot the other officer wounded at the scene stirred new controversy Monday. "I don't understand the verdict," said Newton, 26-year-old organizer of the militant Negroes.

"They didn't have the guts to decide the case on its merits," he said through his attorney. "It was a racist settlment."

In full since the slaying of officer John Erey and the wounding of officer Herbert Hoanes Oct. 26, Newton faces a possible sentence of 2 to 15 years for voluntary manslaughter.

"I think the jury was extremely conscientious and I respect the jury's judgment," said the prosecutor, Lowell Jensen. He had asked for first degree murder, carrying the possibility of death in the gas chamber.

The jury returned its verdicts Sunday night after deliberating four days in a nine-week trial.

It rejected the prosecution's contention that Newton acted with malice aforethought when atopped in a car for questioning.

Superior Court Judge Monroe Friedman described voluntary manslaughter as, among other things, an act committed "in the heat of passion."

"It's an inconsistent verdict and contrary to the evidence," said Newton's attorney, Charles Gary.

"We intend to take this to the highest court in the land."

Negroes Assail 'Separatist' Idea

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Black separatism was repudiated in speeches during the opening session Monday of a new Negro organization, the American Foundation of Negro Affairs.

U.S. District Judge Leon Higginbotham, president of the foundation, opened the five-day conference by urging the delegates "to take time out to think ... rather than to follow the road of polarization."

Dr. Higginbotham told the 700 delegates: "While we want to build black economic power and strength, we want that to serve as a step for entry into full and open society."

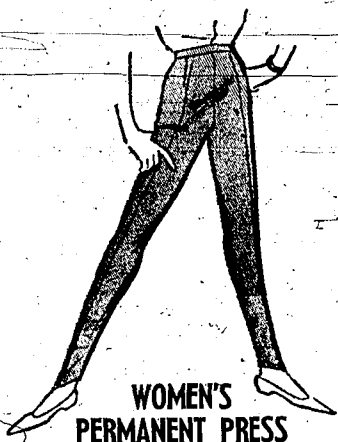

School Bond Issue Faces Minidoka Voters

RUPERT—Passage of a proposed \$2.1 million school bond issue in the Minidoka County School District will depend on whether or not two-thirds of the voters in their ballots next Tuesday are in favor of the proposal.
Should the required majority of those who vote decide in favor of the 12-mill tax levy, required to raise the \$2.1 million, they will also determine which of the proposed sites will be purchased for a junior high school building in the west end of the district.
In addition to the erection of two new junior high school buildings for the district's estimated 1,320 seventh, eighth, and ninth graders, the money would finance additional classrooms and an all-purpose room complete with hothouse facilities at Heyburn and a vocational building at the high school.
Minidoka County school Superintendent Meyer explains that school building costs have risen 23 per cent in the past six years and that the prediction is that another increase of at least 3.8 per cent can be expected this year. Therefore, he said, the wisest time to build would be at the present because "we are saving money each year we wait."
"Each new school would house between 600 and 700 students each. On the question of why two schools, members of the citizen's committee selected to aid in the investigation of the possibility of the construction, explained that national education experts deem it an ideal situation when there are four or five elementary schools feeding two junior high schools, which in turn feed a high school. Also, many feel that a jump from the small 300 member student body elementary school to a 1,200 member student body junior high would be too great and would create both adjustment and discipline problems.
At the high school presently, where the ninth grade is now housed, some 1,600 students are enrolled. Consequently, the school, built for a capacity of 1,200, is at the most overcrowded school in the state.
Mr. Meyer explained that staffing the new schools would be no problem because the present staff would be moved and shifted with the students.
Removing the ninth grade from the high school would allow the school to accept such subject fields as business, machines, data processing, drafting, electronics and other fields where a typical classroom would suffice.
The school, however, is short facilities to offer subjects such as power mechanics, welding, and auto mechanics. A vocational building would eliminate that problem.
Statistics indicate that only about 50 per cent of those students graduating from Minidoka at the high school level are employed after an average of 15 months. The remaining 50 per cent are not being prepared to prepare the latter half for their place in life much better than they are now being prepared.
Fifteen Minidoka seniors are now in the military service.

A THOUGHT TO REMEMBER

In our on the way of living, nearly everyone, at least occasionally, is a guest in a hotel or motel, it is nothing less than a phenomenon that almost all these traveling old places have in common. 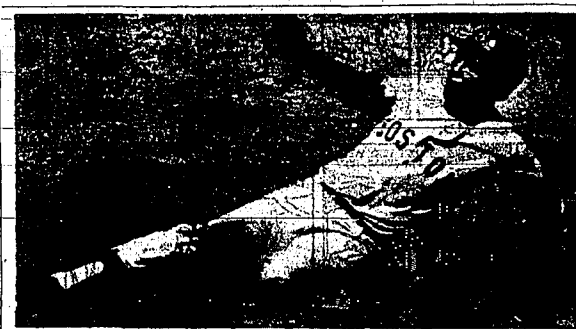

New Hunting Season Eyes Early Start

BOISE (AP) — Sportsmen may go into the remote mountain regions of Central and Northern Idaho as early as Sept. 21 to bag deer and elk, the State Fish and Game Department said Monday.

Roger Williams, chief of the Big Game Division, said big game hunting maps, available from authorized license vendors throughout the state, show opening dates for all hunting units.

"Most indicators," Williams said, "point to a good harvest of both elk and deer because of the past three moderate winters in most regions."

He said there are only two major boundary changes in hunting units this season.

The Bear Valley Unit, No. 34, has been expanded by extending the boundary west to include the upper Deadwood River drainage in southwestern Idaho. The latter formerly was in Unit 33.

The Marsh Creek Drainage of the Salmon River Middle Fork, which formerly was in the Bear Valley unit, now is included in the Stanley unit, No. 38.

"This means," Williams said, "that the Upper Deadwood Drainage, including the reservoir, will open for elk and deer hunting with the early Sept. 21 season in Bear Valley, Unit 34, and that all of the Marsh Creek Drainage will start elk and deer hunting with the rest of the Stanley unit, No. 38, on Oct. 5."

"Sleeping Deer unit, No. 27A, opens Sept. 21 along with Bear Valley and the other mountainous back-country units to the north."

Idaho High Court To Hear 15 Appeals

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court listed today hearings on 15 appeals, including three involving killings or attempted killings. They will be heard in Pocatello beginning Wednesday and continuing through Sept. 17.

The court will hear Thursday appeals by Harvey Pulver, serving a prison term from Bannock County for second-degree murder, and Lavar Chaffin, convicted of involuntary manslaughter in Bingham County.

Pulver and five others were charged with murder in the death of Downey City Marshal Daniel Woodward on July 18, 1964. Pulver is appealing from a ruling in Bannock County District Court, denying him post-conviction relief.

Chaffin was convicted of killing his wife Aug. 15, 1965, in Blackfoot. He was sentenced to five years in prison.

To be heard Friday is an appeal by James B. Polson, who was convicted in Bonneville County of assault with intent to commit murder. The charge resulted from an incident in Idaho Falls May 2, 1966.

Among other cases on the Supreme Court's docket are two involving disputes between city police and their municipalities.

Members of the Pocatello Police Department won a ruling in Bannock County District Court, compelling Pocatello to maintain the policemen's retirement fund through a tax levy. The city appealed.

Former members of the Idaho Falls Police Department sued in Bonneville County Court in an effort to recover money deducted from their salaries for a police retirement fund. District Court ruled against them, saying the police retirement fund law is unconstitutional.

House Nod Indicated On Farm Aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson's effort to exempt federal welfare payments and farm price supports from the mandatory \$8 billion spending cut has picked up vital support in the House.

Rep. George H. Mahon, D-Tex., chairman of the Appropriations Committee told newsmen Monday, "These are uncontrollable items. I would favor exempting them."

At the same time, it was reported that Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., chairman of the Ways and Means Committee does not plan to actively oppose moves by Mahon's committee to exempt these two categories from any money legislation still moving through Congress.

About \$1.2 billion is involved. Mills was the major architect of the spending limitation, written into the law providing the 10 per cent income surtax.

The law provides a \$160.1 billion limit on federal spending during the year ending next June 30, which amounts to a \$8 billion cut.

However, some exceptions were provided from the cut. Increased Vietnam war costs and items labeled uncontrollable, such as interest on the national debt, veterans' benefits and Social Security payments.

Sen. Griffin Asks Hearing Over Fortas

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Robert P. Griffin, R-Mich., asked the Senate Judiciary Committee today to reopen its hearings on President Johnson's nomination of Abe Fortas to be chief justice.

In a memorandum to the committee members, Griffin urged a thorough investigation to determine "the full extent of Mr. Fortas' involvement in the operations of the executive branch while serving as Justice of the Supreme Court."

Griffin, leader of the GOP opposition to Fortas' confirmation, fired off his request a day in advance of another scheduled meeting of the Judiciary Committee.

Earlier, Majority Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., said that unless the committee acts soon on the nomination, he may try to take the matter directly to the Senate floor.

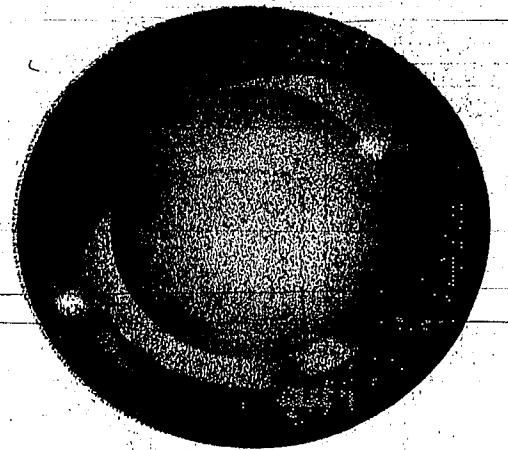

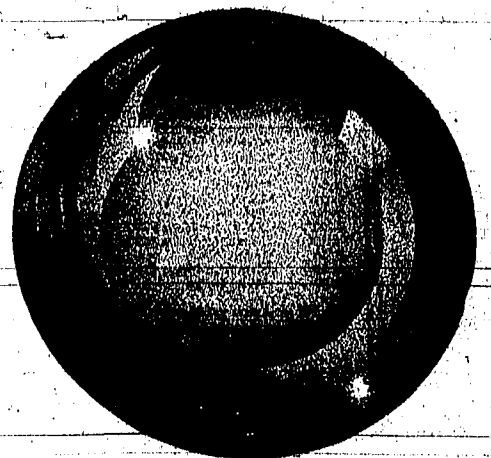

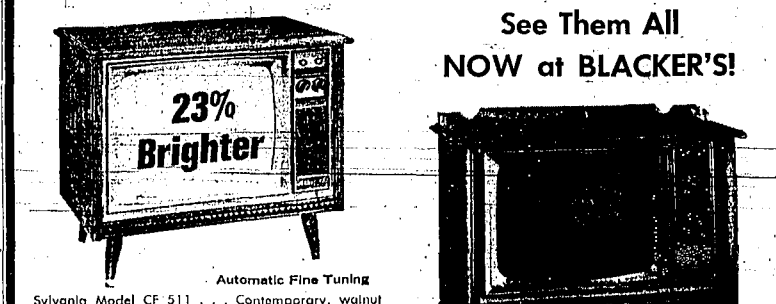

"The Mod Squad" Is Unlike Any Other TV Show

Executive Producer of ABC-TV's "The Mod Squad"

Before a new show goes on the air—the producer hears a lot of negative questions, and "The Mod Squad" has been no exception. I've been asked "Why are you doing a show about hippie cops?" and "Doesn't TV already have enough police-action series?" and "Are you just trying to grab the teenybopper audience?"

The kids—Pete Cochran, Linc Hayes and Julie Barnes—are not hippies and the series isn't about hippies. They don't fink on other kids. If they meet a girl who is on drugs, for example, they are more concerned with finding her supplier than with turning her in.

Many of our stories involve some young people but the majority of the cases handled by the Squad deal with adult criminals and crimes. They do not work the "teen scene" exclusively. And the "Mod" in the title doesn't refer to the Carnaby Street look in clothes—it's an abbreviation for modern, a key word for the series.

We hope the show will reflect what's happening today, what people are doing and talking about. The three kids work for the police because we wanted a job which would bring them in contact with a lot of different people. They are like sponges, soaking in the environment, discussing what they see and hear, and reacting to it.

They are "lonely" people who know what it is to be hurt. They care about others and they want to belong—to something. We think the thing viewers will remember about "The Mod Squad" are the scenes where the kids just talk to each other, the "soul scenes" we call them. They work because our three young stars have "soul," on screen and off.

'Lancer,' New Western Series, Debuts Sept. 24

The time is the 1870's. The nation is only beginning to recover from the Civil War, but already another kind of war is developing in the West. It is war for land, for cattle, for water rights.

In the pilot episode of "Lancer," premiering on Sept. 24, he is being menaced by a vicious gang intent on seizing both his property and stock. When his foreman is killed and he wounded, he decides to seek the help of his sons whom he has not seen since infancy.

They turn out to be very different kinds of men. One, who was left with grandparents when the mother died in childbirth,

is discovered in Boston. On the surface a dandy, he proves to be something else, a knowledgeable horseman and fighter who served in the war with General Sheridan. The other, who disappeared when Lancer's second wife deserted him, has led the life of a gun-slugging renegade in Mexico.

Thus, three strong men, each related, each of different temperament and upbringing, confront each other for the first time. There is no sentiment in the meeting. "Help me save my land," says Lancer, "and one-third goes to each of you," vaguely suspicious of their new-found father, the two sons agree to the deal for the profit involved.

In future episodes the Lancers face up to many serious challenges from those who would steal their ranch at any cost, and those who just carry trouble wherever they go. There are frequent disagreements between the three independent Lancers, particularly the two sons who, although striving for the same goal, have quite different ideas on how it should be achieved.

James Stacy plays Johnny, the former renegade. He has appeared in a number of television roles and opposite Hayley Mills in the motion picture, "Summer Magic." Wayne Maundner, the deceptive dunder from Boston, is best known for his title role in "Custer."

Andrew Duggan, the tough Murdoch, starred in the television series "Hombre" and "The Boat," played a returning role in "Twelve O'Clock High" and has innumerable motion picture credits. Texas is played by Elizabeth Daur, who has appeared on "Batman" and in the motion picture, "The Boston Strangler."

No Studio, No Stage, No Scenery, No Props For Barbara Streisand Special

Art director Tom John, associated with three Barbara Streisand specials, faced his greatest challenge working on her latest Monasie Night special, "Barbara Streisand: A Happening in Central Park," which aired Sunday, Sept. 15 (8-10 p.m. ET) on CBS-TV.

"No studio, no stage, no scenery, no props — all I had to work with was all of nature which was as difficult as it was simple," the highly experienced and handsomely awarded director explains.

The landscape became his studio; a natural rock formation his stage; a cluster of trees his backdrop; the Manhattan skyline and the moon his only props.

"If I had a budget of a billion dollars, I couldn't have created a more spectacular setting," Tom admits.

He constructed a clear plexiglass platform over the rocks and placed a simple stool at the end of the runway that jutted into a portion of crowd that numbered 135,000.

"We kept the plexiglass as clean as it must have been like walking on water for Barbara!" Seating for the multitude followed the natural contour of the rolling Sheep Meadow right up to the rocky stage. Because of camera close-ups, Tom had to add clumps of artificial grass where the ground was poking through.

"Our only other problem," he recalls, "was the enthusiasm of the subjects who crowded over the night for the best seats locations. They painted 'Flower Power' all

Diahann Carroll was a winner even before she won the title role of "Julia."

The coveted Julia role is by no means Miss Carroll's first triumph.

For her efforts as a nightclub singer — her bread-and-butter profession — Cue Magazine named her "Entertainer of the Year."

When she braved Broadway, as the star of Richard Rodgers' "No Strings," she won a Tony Award.

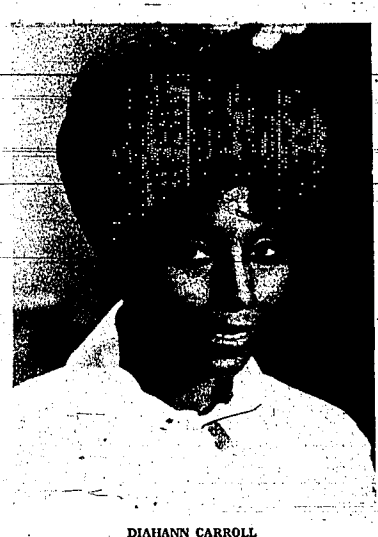
And when she tried television, in an episode of "Naked City," she won an Emmy nomination.

As for the woman behind the credits and trophies, Diahann Carroll — like Julia Baker — is the mother of a pre-teenager, daughter Suzanne Otille. Miss Carroll, presently single, has a July 17 birthday, stands 5 feet 5 1/2" and weighs around 120 pounds.

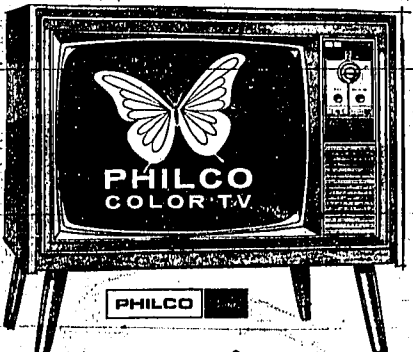

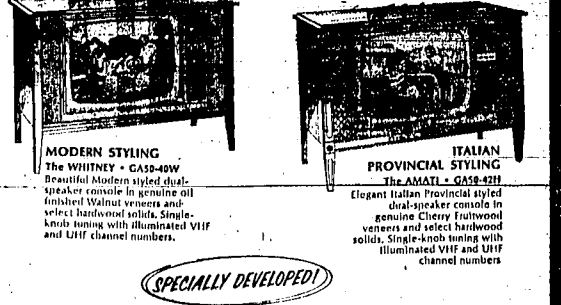

Sandy Koufax Now Earning Praise As Commentator

Sandy Koufax, who is now commentator for NBC Television, is regarded by many sports experts as one of the greatest left-handed pitchers to ever play in the major leagues. Currently on the NBC TV's "The Sandy Koufax Show," which precedes the network's telecast of the Major League Baseball game of the week, and on all the commentators of the televised games, Koufax during his spectacular career in baseball compiled dozens of pitching records.

He won the Cy Young Award in 1963, 1965 and 1966—the only pitcher to receive this best pitcher-of-the-year award more than once. He was named the National League's Most Valuable Player in 1963, an honor rarely awarded to a pitcher.

Koufax pitched four no-hit, no-run games in consecutive seasons and holds the major league records for most shutout games won by a left-hander in a season—11, and most strikeouts in a season by a major league pitcher—32. He also holds the major league mark for most strikes out in two consecutive games (31), and three consecutive games (41).

Koufax spent all his playing days with the Dodgers, first in Brooklyn and then in Los Angeles. He was forced to give up the game after the 1966 season, at the age of 29 because of an arthritic condition in his left elbow. Although born and raised in Brooklyn, N.Y., Sandy now lives in Studio City, Calif.
