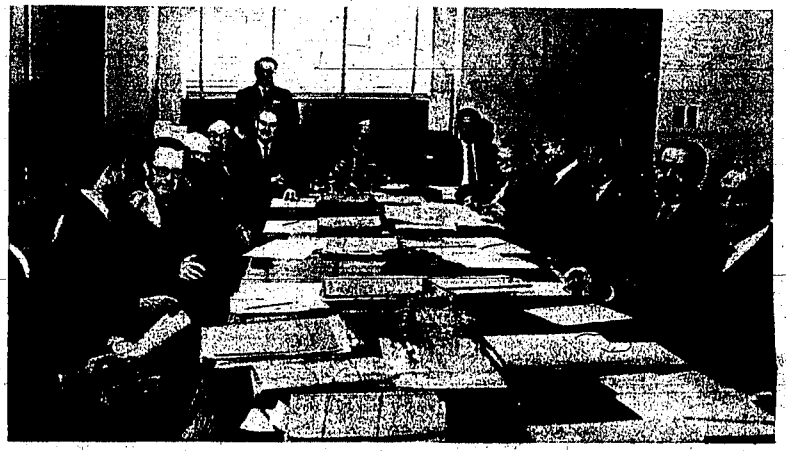

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Red Tactics Muled At Peace Parley; Hanoi Seeks End To Raids On North

By ARTHUR L. GAVSHON
PARIS (AP) — Some diplomats here think the recent upsurge of fighting in Vietnam may signal new Communist moves at the Paris peace talks. But they profess no sure knowledge whether any meaningful development can be expected before November's U.S. election.

Hanoi's post-diplomat Xuan Thuy has indicated that he believes the situation in Vietnam leaves the door open for a new round of negotiations.

President Johnson served notice Sept. 11 he contemplates no surrender "on the installment plan." He insists on North Vietnam's display of North Vietnam's restraint to match an American bombing halt.

Thus, the four-month-old Paris exchanges between Xuan Thuy and Harriman are at a standstill.

The North Vietnamese and their friends say in a variety of ways to a variety of people that the Americans do not see things that way. One comment they say was restraint.

Americans contest these assessments. This is how one Communist source, close to Hanoi's men, put it:

"The North Vietnamese have not, and whole body of evidence suggests, acknowledge they exercising control over the 'liberation' movement in the South."

LBJ Hopes For 'Summit' Of Viet Allies In October

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson is keeping his options open for a summit meeting of the Vietnam war allies this fall, possibly in mid-October.

Diplomatic sources say there are strong hints the President would like to fulfill the promise of the last Honolulu communique for another summit meeting before the end of this year.

A speedup of preparations for the meeting could be quickly carried out once the decision is reached, sources said.

Johnson's last meeting with South Vietnam's leaders was in July at Honolulu.

Before that session White House aides had said that it was being held in keeping with a Johnson policy to hold a summit on the Vietnam war every six months.

One question puzzling the political experts here is the effect such a meeting would have on the presidential campaign of Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey. U.S. officials see no likelihood Johnson will back track from the strong positions he took in a recent speech when he said there would be no withdrawal of troops from the demilitarized zone that divides North and South Vietnam and indicated there would be no let-up in the limited bombing of the North.

According to an view, the question is how much would be gained in reassuring U.S. allies about the future course of American policy in the Far East and how much would be lost at home by such assurances.

At the same time, North Vietnam appears to be hardening its negotiating position in Paris, according to analysts here.

The demand that the United States recognize and negotiate with the National Liberation Front on matters dealing with the war in the South has been emphasized repeatedly in recent weeks by North Vietnam Premier Pham Van Dong and Nguyen Thanh Le, the politburo adviser at the Paris talks who is regarded here as a ranking official of the Hanoi government.

It is known to North Vietnam that the United States cannot accept the demand to negotiate separately with the NLF political arm of the Viet Cong.

The standard U.S. position is to agree to talks with North Vietnam with the NLF represented at the negotiating table as part of the Hanoi team.

The United States also is insisting that the Saigon government be represented at the preliminary meetings prepare the way for peace talks.

Judge Orders Auction Sale For Weapon

BOISE (AP) — A modified M-1 carbine, once used in a battle with police — and which the FBI wants for its Washington, D.C. museum — will have to be sold at a public auction, a federal judge ruled Monday.

The FBI wanted the weapon for its museum and attorney Allen Derr of Boise, acting on behalf of its client, Lillian Jo McEwen, also claimed it.

McEwen was sentenced to ten years in prison in connection with the gunfight, which ensued when agents attempted to arrest her.

Bulgaria Vows Trade With Russ

MOSCOW (AP) — Leaders of Bulgaria, a Soviet ally that joined in the invasion of Czechoslovakia, have come out of a Kremlin conference with promises of new Russian trade and aid, a communique said today.

The communique indicated that the situation in Czechoslovakia also received considerable attention at the meeting between Bulgarian Communist party chief Todor Zhivkov, his Soviet counterpart Leonid I. Brezhnev and Soviet Premier Alexei N. Kosygin.

It said the leaders agreed fully on efforts for "a stronger repuff to the machinations of imperialism," which have been blamed for "counter-revolution" in Czechoslovakia.

Menace Prague

By GENE KRAMER PRAGUE (AP) — Thousands of Soviet troops ring Prague with their big guns aimed at the city to keep pressure on Czechoslovakia's leaders.

The steel ring of Soviet artillery is evident in any travel outside the city. In the big, sad city, heavy cannon, rockets and missiles point at Czechoslovakia's capital from north, south, and east and west.

One military expert says there is enough artillery not only to destroy the 600-year-old city but to "overkill" it if shelling is ordered.

A short ride on the main highway east of Prague, a left turn toward the village of Dubec and there are 24 big guns set up in the alfalfa fields, their barrels pointed toward the capital.

Twelve are lined up in a row to the right of the road; there are two groups of six on the left. The guns appear to be 122mm cannon with a range of more than nine miles.

Prague is less than eight miles away so these weapons could hit the presidential palace on the opposite bank of the Vltava River.

A mile or so farther are five batteries of multiple rocket launchers, pointing at the city. A few hundred yards beyond the end of Prague's Stranice streetcar line, two score Soviet T-55 main tank are parked, their guns directed toward the city.

Northwest of Prague, near the village of Horomerice, more than nine big guns are concentrated within half a mile. They include at least 18 122mm howitzers, six huge 152mm cannon plus 82mm guns and 57mm automatic antiaircraft batteries.

Some travelers have also seen missiles mounted on tanks aimed at Prague from the east and several tank regiments.

The artillerymen live in tents near their weapons with ammunition and supplies stockpiled nearby. Estimates of the total number of occupation troops ringed Prague range up to 90,000.

Very little is camouflaged, and the site of artillery aimed at the big city is clearly visible to Czechs picking apples in nearby orchards or passing on their motorcycles.

The implication is that all the hardware is there to frighten the people and intimidate their liberal Communist leaders to meet Soviet demands.

One major demand, for renunciation of press and radio, is now being enforced. As a result, details are meager on the continuing talks between Soviet and Czech leaders.

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By JULES LOH DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Campaign strategists for George Wallace, encouraged by his gains in recent nationwide polls and a gathering momentum in his third party race, have come to believe he has a reasonable chance to win the presidency.

When I was governor of Alabama, I met Nelson Rockefeller and George Romney and some of those others who wanted to be president," he said in an interview, "and they didn't impress me as being better qualified than I."

His strategists said they intend to concentrate on 25 states with 257 electoral votes, 87 more than the 270 needed to win.

In a speech here Monday night he told 7,000 cheering Texans—who hope to deliver their state's 25 electoral votes to Wallace—that his "base" was the Southern Governor's Conference, an association of 17 states with 177 electoral votes.

In addition to Texas these include Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware—Florida—Georgia—Kentucky—Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia and West Virginia.

These are the states Wallace will concentrate on, but as Bill Jones, one of his top aides, said, "We're not going to slight any states—we could carry some others that might surprise you."

Jordan Assails Fund Cut

Idaho's Sen. Frank Jordan has criticized a hold-back of federal highway funds and Sen. Frank Church has spoken against proposed federal gun control legislation.

Jordan, R-Idaho, said Monday that the hold-back could result in higher costs, rather than in economy.

"The Department of Transportation has attempted to justify this move in the name of economy, but the ultimate result would obviously have just the opposite effect," Jordan said.

"Any rise in construction costs during this two-month period would add to the serious inflationary spiral we have been experiencing under the present administration," he said. "The \$24 billion deficit we face is in the general fund and not in the federal highway fund."

Church, D-Idaho, said that better law enforcement, not gun controls, is needed to halt rising crime rates.

"This year, we will dish out nearly eight times as much on a war in Vietnam as we will spend in the United States for all police, all courts and all correctional institutions," he said.

Rep. George Hansen, R-Idaho, who is opposing Church in his campaign for re-election, said he did not believe there would be a need for "all-out war" to win the Vietnam conflict. But he said he wanted to end "playing games" in Vietnam. "Those games," he said, including permitting of sanctuaries in which he said Viet Cong were free from attack.

Biologist Insists 'Sheep' Dam Would Harm Fish Runs

PORTLAND (AP) — Construction of High Mountain Sheep Dam on the Middle Snake River could seriously jeopardize the existence of salmon and steelhead runs, a fisheries biologist testified Monday.

Robert T. Gonsulus, a biologist for the state of Oregon, was cross-examined at Federal Power Commission hearings in Portland on written testimony he gave earlier in Washington, D.C.

Gonsulus repeated his position that "any additional problem encountered by these fish, even a relatively minor one, could be enough to wipe out the run."

The hearings are on the application by two power companies to build High Mountain Sheep Dam. They are Pacific Northwest Power Co. and the Washington Public Power Supply System.

The Interior Department opposes the High Mountain site favoring dams above the confluence of the Snake and Salmon rivers on the Oregon-Idaho border. Conservationists oppose any dams on the Middle Snake.

Gonsulus's testimony was in contrast to the official position of the state of Oregon, reiterated Monday, which favors hydroelectric development of the Middle Snake and supports the application of the two power companies.

Earlier, Francis W. Kittrell, an interior engineer who is a sanitary engineer for the government, said that if High Mountain Sheep were built there would be a dissolved oxygen problem which would damage the fish runs.

On cross-examination by conservationists, Kittrell said the dissolved oxygen problem would exist at any dam on the Middle Snake.

'Indicators' Of U.S. Health Fail To Show

WASHINGTON (AP) — Government officials say two economic indicators have failed to show a hoped for response to enactment of the income tax surcharge.

The Federal Reserve Board announced Monday that industrial production dropped in August, but that the decline was attributable more to the after-effects of a steel labor settlement than to government efforts to cool off the economy.

The production index fell from 103.6 in July to 104.0 in August on a scale in which the 1957-59 base period is 100.

Production of consumer goods remained at what the board called "advanced levels" and there was little change in the volume of auto assemblies after the allowance for model change-over.

But the output of iron and steel showed a sharp decline after several months of peak production while buyers built inventories as a hedge against a possible strike.

At the same time, government officials predicted that third quarter figures for the Gross National Product (GNP) would not show anywhere near the dip that had been hoped for.

The administration reportedly had been hoping the income tax surcharge and other anti-inflation moves would cut the third quarter increase to just over \$10 billion in the value of all goods and services produced in the nation.

But now many government officials are saying this won't happen and that the increase will be between \$15 billion and \$20 billion.

Airman Says Peace Trek Stirs Censure

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Air Force Lt. Hugh Smith contends he is being transferred to Taiwan for helping organize a march for peace of soldiers and veterans one year ago.

Michael Locks and John Bright said they were being sent to Hill Air Force Base near Ogden, Utah, next week because of their part in preparing the San Francisco demonstration last Columbus Day.

The three are attached to the 348th military wing at Hamilton Air Force Base.

They said they were called to active duty in January after the U.S. intelligence ship Pueblo was captured by North Koreans.

A spokesman at Hamilton AFB said the three were attached to the wing's personnel office and were declared surplus in July, making them eligible for transfer to bases where there are shortages.

Anglers Disrupt Test Of Rocket

TANEGASHIMA, Japan (AP) — Japanese scientists had to postpone a rocket launching today for a second time in a week because of fishermen sailing into the target area in protest.

The fishermen claim the tests have deprived them of a rich fishing ground and are demanding compensation. Four boats sailed into the target area today just before space center scientists planned to fire a two-stage Japanese rocket to collect data for the launching of a communications satellite by 1971.

Reagan Urges Veto Of Flight

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. (AP) — Gov. Ronald Reagan wants the United States to curtail New York-to-Moscow commercial airline flights and impose a "radio communications" quarantine on the Soviet Union.

The Republican governor told newsmen that in light of the Soviet invasion of Czechoslovakia, the United States should re-examine its policy of offering "bridges of friendship to our enemies at a time when they seem to be kicking our brains out."

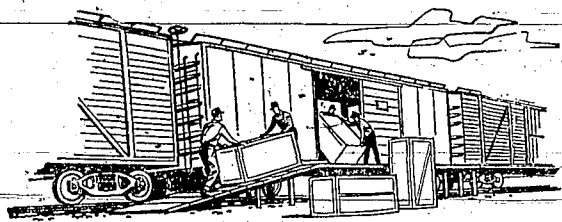

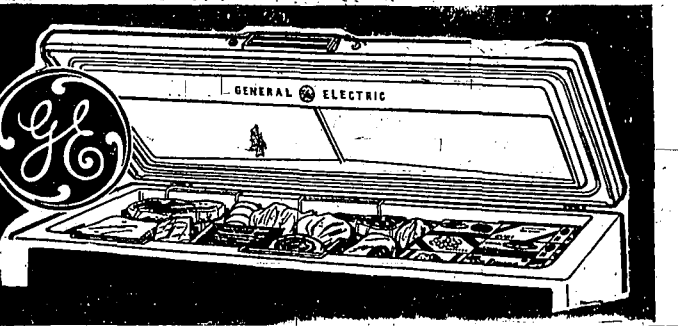

Gun-Law Backers Win Vital Point

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate backers of stronger gun control laws have scored an important point by winning approval of a ban against the mail order sale of ammunition for rifles, shotguns and .22-caliber weapons.

The Senate voted Monday 41 to 36 to rebuff the Senate Judiciary Committee's proposed amendment "to exclude the ammunition from the mail order sale in the main control bill."

The vote came as the Senate started work on scores of amendments to the bill which like one passed earlier by the House, bars the mail order sale

of guns and ammunition to private persons. Still to be acted on is an amendment turned down by the Judiciary Committee and the House, to require the registration of all guns and the licensing of their owners.

Under the proposal by Sen. Joseph Tydings, D-Md., states could set up their own registration-licensing plans, but if they refused the federal government would do it for them.

Another major fight is due on a committee proposal to allow an individual to purchase a gun over-the-counter in a state adjoining his own. That also has been attacked as a weakening provision.

Another amendment critics said would weaken the bill was exempted ammunition for 90 percent of all firearms. It excludes from coverage of the bill ammunition of the type that killed President John F. Kennedy, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., the secretary of the Treasury to specify what types of weapons they can deal in.

The bill as it went to the Judiciary Committee specified that it cover all ammunition. But the committee majority, including some opponents of any new gun-control legislation, revised it to exclude the shotgun, rifle and .22-caliber ammunition.

U.N. Assembly Taps Liberian As President

UNITED NATIONS — N.Y. (AP) — The election of Miss Angie Brooks, Liberian undersecretary of state, as president of the 1968 General Assembly was virtually assured today when she received the endorsement of African chiefs of state in Algiers.

Miss Brooks, veteran U.N. diplomat, would thus become the second woman to head the assembly. Mrs. Vijayalakshmi Pandit of India served as president in 1953.

Guatemala's foreign minister, Emilio Arceles Catalan, already has been agreed upon as president of the 23rd session of the assembly, which opens Sept. 24, and is expected to be elected without opposition.

Trains Delayed In Union Fuss

TOKYO (AP) — Japan National Railway said its trains were 30 minutes late in some areas today as two unions began a slowdown protesting a modernization plan calling for relocation of 50,000 workers.

Unless the railroad bows and leaves the workers where they are, the two unions said their 34,000 members would continue the go-slow movement through Thursday and strike for 12 hours on Friday.

Sawtooth National Forest Personnel Show Concern About Late-Season Fires

A special fire warning to hunters has been issued by Sawtooth National Forest Service. To asking the cooperation of hunters to extinguish campfires and cigarettes, Darrell Smith, fire dispatcher, noted a great number of man-caused fires occur in September and October. "This, of course, points the finger at the hunter," Mr. Smith said. In the period from 1960 through 1967, there were 133 man-caused fires. He pointed out that in 1967 there were nine such fires and there are already that number this year with the two worst months-to come. These fires usually are about one-fourth acre apiece and each cost at least \$300 to control and pay for damages. Many of the fall fires are caused by hunters' morning warming fires. The hunters count on cool weather to extinguish the fires. The small fires are often left smoldering and by that afternoon or the next day the weather has turned warmer and a fire results. Mr. Smith pointed out that the forest service makes an intensive effort to patrol hunting areas for fires, in helicopters and with ground crews, but their fire fighting personnel is limited this time of the year. The law requires a fire should never be left burning or unattended at any time. Forest Service personnel noted that persons responsible for the fires are liable for costs of suppression and damages. These people can be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law, they said. Some fires start after the individual believes he has put the fire out. In extinguishing the fire, it should be separated and spread out in a cleared area. Soil and water should be used to smother the fire, but a fire should never be buried since it can escape from under the dirt. The area within 50 feet of the fire should be checked for sparks that may have blown outside the cleared area. Special attention should be given to rotten wood which catches fire easily from sparks. A safe campfire should be built in a level spot, a safe distance from trees, overhead branches, bushes, dry grass or downed and rotten logs. A 10-foot circle should be cleared around the fire area. Extra firewood should be kept outside the cleared area and a shovel and axe should be kept handy. The Forest Service officials emphasized that even though the greatest fire hazard exists during the months of July and August, there is still a hazard in the later two months and people are the factor during September and October. They also ask the cooperation of the public in reporting the fires and careless incidents to the nearest ranger station.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mexican-Americans say it's about time the United States found out they work hard, pay their bills and pronounce their "j's."

So the newly formed Mexican-American Anti-Defamation Committee has prodded Jose Jimenez to shape up and wear Madison Avenue to stop using that lazy lull with sombrero and serape to sell everything from potato chips to dog food.

Armando Rodriguez walked into a news conference Monday and said, "We're here to say, 'Let's get with it. We're either part of the country or we're not.'"

"The labor and sweat of the Mexican-American have built the Southwest," said Tony Calderon. "The brush was cleared, the cotton picked and the irrigation ditches dug. The Mexican-American worked in 110-degree weather in the valleys of California."

"We're not just 'SI senor' citizens," said Calderone, chairman of a San Antonio, Tex., group called IMAGE.

Nick Reyes, an Equal Employment Opportunity Commission employee who will head the Mexican-American committee without pay, said entertainer Bill Dana has agreed to cast a new image for his comic Jose Jimenez character, who does commercials for the "yellow pages."

Reyes said he has written letters to six firms which he said sponsor advertisements degrading to his race.

"Twenty years ago you had quite a lot of advertising using Negroes in a demeaning fashion," said Rodriguez, head of the Mexican-American unit in the Office of Education.

"Then came the Indians and they protested. Now it seems the Mexican-American is the new person used for advertising," he added.

Rodriguez said the committee will ask for air time to counter what they consider insulting Mexican-American characterizations and will boycott firms who persist in using the characterizations.

"We're American consumers, among other things," said Calderon, "but we have no identity."

Commissioner Albert Pena of Bexar County, San Antonio, Tex., said the federal government was one of the biggest offenders in the equal opportunity line. Federal officials had "better clean up their own house."

British Exports Hit New Record

LONDON (AP) — British exports jumped to a record peak last month and imports declined giving a dramatic improvement in the nation's foreign trade deficit.

The Board of Trade announced that the visible trade deficit fell to 30 million pounds, or 572 million, in August, 51 million pounds less than in July.

Exports were 537 million pounds—\$1,288.8 million, an increase of 27 million pounds over July. Re-exports were unchanged at 10 million pounds (\$45.6 million).

Imports fell by 13 million pounds (\$31.2 million) to 652 million pounds, (\$1,504.8 million).

This left a "trade gap" between exports plus re-exports and imports of 98 million pounds, but inclusion of banking, shipping and other "invisible" earnings abroad brought the visible deficit down to 30 million pounds, the lowest monthly loss this year.

"Financial experts said this raised high hopes of seeing Britain's foreign trade move into the black late this year or early next for the first time since 1962."

Director To Leave NASA

WASHINGTON (AP) — James E. Webb, who presided over America's entry into the age of manned space flight, is stepping down as head of U.S. space program he believes ranks second to Russia's. Webb announced his retirement Monday and said Dr. Thomas O. Paine, deputy administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, would become acting head of the agency. President John F. Kennedy named Webb to head NASA in February 1961 when it had 17,000 employees and an annual budget of \$999 million.

Two and a half months later astronaut Alan Shepard rode a Mercury capsule to an altitude of 116 miles, marking the nation's first manned penetration of space.

Webb, who actually will leave his post when he turns 62 next month, steps out at a time when his "budget" is about \$3.8 billion and NASA employs 34,000.

This is less than the peak year of 1965 when the budget was \$5.2 billion, but Webb told newsmen he was not quitting because of disagreement over current government economy moves.

"Jim Webb is a truly remarkable man," said Dr. Robert R. Gilruth, director of NASA's Manned Spacecraft Center at Houston, Tex.

Julian Scheer, a long-time friend who is NASA's assistant administrator for public affairs, said Webb plans "to do a lot of things he is interested in on his own." Webb announced his retirement after a meeting with President Johnson. The President made no immediate comment. Under his tenure, NASA completed six one-man Mercury missions and 10 two-man Gemini missions. The only blot on an otherwise perfect safety record came in a ground accident in January 1967 when a launch pad fire killed the first three-man Apollo team. Webb said Monday that the United States is still second to the Soviet Union in space operations and that current programs would not bring parity. He said there is still a chance, however, that the nation will land men on the moon before the end of next year.

- Don't smoke your cigarette all the way down.
- Take fewer draws on each cigarette.
- Reduce your inhaling.
- Smoke fewer cigarettes each day.

The advice is contained in a new pamphlet, "If You Must Smoke," issued by the health service on behalf of the National Clearing House for Smoking and

Tax 'Break' Asked For Guardsmen

The 116th, composed of Idahoans, was called to active duty last spring and is now in Vietnam. The governor said Hansen told him earlier that "while under certain circumstances a part of the pay of members of the 116th may be excluded from tax, part would be subject to tax under present Idaho law."

Nixon Aims At California Votes

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Richard M. Nixon is making California a top target of his Republican campaign for personal as well as political reasons.

The lure of 40 electoral votes, and the prospect of victory in a state which once rejected him at the polls, already have drawn Nixon to California twice within 10 days. At least two more campaign missions to the state are planned before the Nov. 5 election.

If state polls, which now show Nixon leading, Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, should give any hint of trouble later, there probably would be additional campaigning in California.

Ailing Employees Cost \$190,720

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Salt Lake City employees averaged nearly five days off because of illness last year. A report from the city personnel department said this cost the city \$190,720.

Nixon said Monday night he feels he must win in his native state if he is to capture the presidency.

"It's top priority," said Herbert G. Klein, his director of campaign communications.

California ranks second only to New York in electoral votes. "It's also a matter of personal pride," Klein said of Nixon's concentration on California.

He was born in Yorba Linda and returned there Monday for a hectic visit to the house in which he was born. Swarms of children surged around the yard, screaming and pushing for a look at the nominee.

California gave Nixon his political start electing him to the House of Representatives and Senate—and also dealt him his gravest setback, a 300,000-vote defeat in his 1962 bid to become governor. It came two years after Nixon had narrowly carried California over the late President John F. Kennedy.

This time, the state poll shows Nixon running nine percentage points ahead of Humphrey. Nixon will seek to build his backing tonight with an hour-long television show, to be

broadcast on a statewide hook-up.

He made a similar appearance two months ago, before he won the Republican nomination. He spent the days after that victory in San Diego, planning his presidential campaign, and returned for campaign appearances in San Francisco and Santa Clara on Sept. 5.

A speech Wednesday in Fresno will wind up the current trip. A crowd estimated by police at about 4,000 greeted Nixon at Yorba Linda—an estimated 14,000 overflowed the Anaheim Convention Center for a Monday night rally.

The homesite Nixon visited once was a lemon farm, an unsuccessful one run by his father.

DEAR ABBY: Regardless of the choice in the beginning, we all end up with the funeral director in the end.

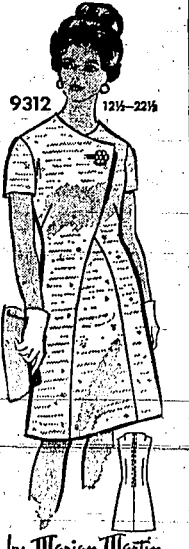

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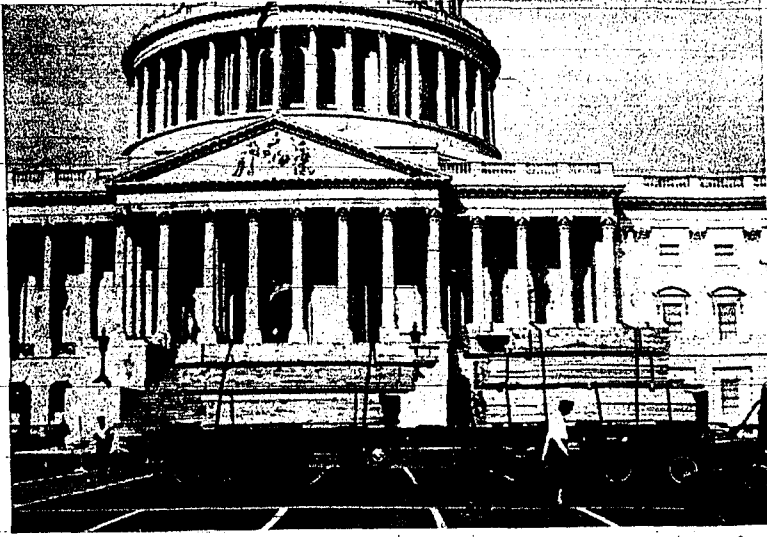

Romney, Nixon, Muskie Schedule Utah Visits

Republicans will be first at but this week as three men of national political prominence visit Utah.

Already in Salt Lake City is Gov. George Romney of Michigan, former Utahn and former contender for the GOP presidential nomination.

Romney, who arrived Monday night, is in Utah to speak for Propositions One and Two, amendments to the state constitution to have the legislature meet annually and to increase legislators' pay.

Romney was scheduled to speak to the Salt Lake Rotary Club this afternoon and be on hand Wednesday when the Republican presidential nominee, former Vice President Richard Nixon, delivers an address at the Salt Lake Tabernacle.

Republican spokesmen said both men plan to leave early Thursday — the day the Democratic vice-presidential nominee, Sen. Edmund Muskie of Maine, arrives in Utah.

Romney and his wife, Lenore, flew to Salt Lake from Santa Barbara, Calif., where he consulted with officers of the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions.

He waived off newsmen's questions about the national Republican campaign, saying his primary mission to Salt Lake City was nonpartisan, then said:

"The only way to unbind ourselves from our dependence on the federal government is to strengthen state and local government. For decades the fed-

Intermountain Region Forest Officers Urge Public To Enjoy Colorful Autumn

The Intermountain Region Forest Service, Ogden, is urging the public to make plans to enjoy the colorful autumn season in the national forests. About this time each year, foliage on aspen, oak and mountain maple is touched with hues ranging from pale yellow to brilliant bursts of orange and red. But far too soon these leaves will flutter to earth to enrich the forest soil.

Many parents are questioned on the how's and why's of colored leaves as they drive their children through the countryside. The questions are not new and neither are most of the answers.

Indian legend tells of celestial hunters slaying the Great Bear. His blood, dripping on the forests, changes many leaves to red. Other leaves turn yellow when the fat splatters out of the kettle as hunters cook their meat. Of course, even the youngest will recognize this story as pure fiction. Then there is the story of Jack Frost, who for many years has been held responsible for frost-painted windows and colored leaves. But the fact is, that many leaves change color before Jack Frost appears on the scene.

For precocious youngsters who want fact instead of fiction, the Department of Agriculture's Forest Service has prepared a leaflet entitled "Why Leaves Change Color." It is available in most Forest Service field offices and the Regional Office, 324 24th St., Ogden, Utah 84401.

Among other interesting information is a brief story of the chemical processes taking place in the trees as summer changes to winter.
