## Wallace Takes Aim At North; Chicago Motorcade Scheduled

CHICAGO (AP) — George C. Wallace pointed his presidential campaign at the North this week, aiming at industrial states and Democratic and Republican voters.

Advancement for the American Independent party candidate arranged a noon-hour motorcade today in this Democratic stronghold, and an evening speech in Cicero, an all-white working class suburb where he is popular.

The route for the procession was one mile of State Street, Chicago's main shopping area. The time and the downtown district long have been favored by thousands of lunch-hour workers and shoppers are on the streets anyway.

Richard M. Nixon, the Republican presidential nominee, was seen by 400,000 persons, by police estimate, in the downtown area early this month.

Wallace, former governor of Alabama, planned to make a speech at Albright Field in Cicero, a southwestern suburb of 71,000.

## Lengthy Fortas Fight Discourages Backers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Fortas' bruised and battered nomination to be chief justice is being given little chance for Senate confirmation, even by some supporters.

Sen. Joseph Tydings said Sunday an attempt to kill a filibuster against Fortas' appointment will fail when it comes up Tuesday.

"The filibuster will succeed" in keeping the Senate from voting on the nomination itself, the Maryland Democrat said.

Tydings' assessment came in a week-end of many gloomy developments for Fortas' supporters, whose hopes were brightened by only a couple of items.

Albert Jenner, a Chicago attorney who leads the American Bar Association's committee that endorsed Fortas, said Sunday that "nothing relevant has come forth" requiring reconsideration of the endorsement.

He was responding to ABA President William Gossett's earlier statement that the committee acted without knowing all the facts, particularly some brought out in Senate Judiciary Committee hearings.

And a new organization, the Lawyers' Committee on Supreme Court, nominations, urged the Senate Sunday to stop a filibuster and let the matter go to the floor for a vote on the merits of the appointment.

"Nothing would more poorly serve our constitutional system than the nomination itself, without the approval of the Senate majority, but to be thwarted because the majority is denied a chance to vote," the 102-man committee's statement said.

The only effect the statements by Jenner and the committee would likely have on the Senate floor might be short-term support among those who have been wavering in their backing of the move to have Fortas succeed retiring Earl Warren.

An Associated Press survey last week showed anti-Fortas forces had enough strength to keep a filibuster going, and that was before Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen said he had changed his mind and would vote against limiting debate.

In fact, Dirksen gave what could be a mortal wound to Fortas' chances when he said Friday he might not even support the appointment as he first said he would.

## Nixon Spells Out Program To Cut Crime, Help Aged

KEY BISCAYNE, Fla. (AP) — Richard M. Nixon has entered a new phase of his presidential campaign, spelling out the details of his programs for the first time and intensifying the attack on his foes.

The Republican nominee announced Sunday his crime fighting proposals, calling for creation of a national academy of law enforcement to train local police and a high-level national crime fighting council.

The day before, he dealt with the problems of the aged, pledging cost-of-living increases in Social Security pensions.

In both statements, Nixon hit hard at his Democratic opponent, Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey. And he is now dealing openly in speeches with his other foe, George C. Wallace, the American Independent party candidate.

"We are picking up in both fire and substance," said an aide. "We are now filling out the programs. You'll also notice the tempo of the attack picking up."

In the future, he said, Nixon will be announcing the details of his proposals on taxes, inflation,

# Negro Separatist Idea Soars Anew

WASHINGTON (AP) — Joseph W. Waller Jr. divides his world into two groups—"beautiful black brothers," and "crackers."

To this lanky, black-skinned resident of St. Petersburg, Fla., all whites are "crackers," and blacks should have the right to keep them out of black neighborhoods.

Change the word "crackers" to "white devils," or any one of several other terms, and Waller's views become fairly representative of a growing phenomenon in city slums—black nationalism, the philosophy of Negroes who want complete separation from whites.

A decade ago these sentiments were voiced only by lonely figures who stood on Harlem street corners, haranguing crowds that largely ignored them.

Surveys show that American Negroes are still pretty much ignoring the message. Separation has not begun to replace integration as an ultimate goal. But the nationalist point of view is enjoying something of a resurgence.

A white man who tried to join a conversation among Negro youths in a Washington park recently was asked to leave because "this is a black unity meeting, we just want black cats here."

When he protested that whites interested enough to listen should be welcomed, he was told that black people had to organize themselves before they could be a drive to re-elect Lyndon B. Johnson.

An Associated Press survey indicates that although city governments estimate the national population from tiny to all-most nonexistent, the day when they could be safely ignored may be over.

In Cleveland, the group accused of starting the July sniper attack that killed 11 persons called themselves nationalists.

So did many of the volunteers who walked the streets all the next night, with the approval of Negro Mayor Carl Stokes, pleading with angry crowds not to throw bricks or set fires.

But before they agreed to become peacekeepers, they insisted that all white police be kept out of the trouble zone. Many stated they were not so much interested in quelling a riot as in heading off a confrontation with police that might end in a "whole's sale slaughter of blacks."

Here in the capital, an umbrella group called the Black United Front, formed early this year at the urging of Stokely Carmichael, has followed nationalist urgings and excluded whites from its neighborhood meetings.

Some members don't believe in racial separation, notably the Rev. Walter R. Rife, vice-chairman of the district council, but they go along with the tactic in hopes of welding together Washington's Negroes, who make up 88 per cent of the city's population, into a genuinely effective force.

Mayor John V. Lindsay of New York regularly consults black nationalists in his so far successful efforts to keep the peace in his gigantic melting pot.

Black Muslims and other "hard core" nationalists, who urge establishing a separate nation in this country for blacks, admit they represent only a tiny minority of Negro opinion.

They argue, however, that time is on their side. Give the United States long enough, they say, and the actions of her white majority eventually will convince a majority of Negroes that they cannot hope to exist as equals with whites.

Individuals who make a career out of being nationalists vary almost as much in the details of their philosophy as they do in shades of skin color.

Some have white friends, others don't—at least, not publicly. Some believe in separation as a goal, others only as a tactic. Some want a separate nation, others would be satisfied with control of their neighborhood center cities.

Some will work with police and city administrations, others collect guns and ammunition and train youngsters in karate. Some wear colorful African-style robes and jewelry, some, including James Lawson, president of Harlem's United African College, look like a conservative businessman.

It's impossible to single out even a handful of overall leaders. Every major city has several groups, and the leaders of ten bitterly compete with each other for control of their small followings.

## Austerity To Menace British

BLACKPOOL, England (AP) — Chancellor of the Exchequer Roy Jenkins appealed to the British people today for 18 months of hard work and belt-tightening austerity to reach "new horizons" for Britain.

"There is no easy way out," he said.

Jenkins was given a standing ovation by the Labor party's annual convention after his hard-hitting defense of the deflationary policy of Prime Minister Harold Wilson's government, curbing wages and prices.

Britain has been living on borrowed money for too long, he said, enjoying benefits of the welfare state while piling up a huge foreign debt. He said he had called a halt in March when he imposed on the nation the greatest increase in taxes ever laid down by a British government.

Jenkins was stating the government's views on a number of resolutions, presented by trade unionists and left-wingers, demanding that the Labor party reject the government's efforts to limit pay raises and set up controls on imports as a way out of the country's economic difficulties.

Jenkins said it was time backers of the resolutions learned the hard facts of life: that the nation had been living beyond its means and carrying a burden beyond its strength.

He promised that controls on prices and wages will not be maintained "one minute longer than is essential." He rejected the call for import controls.

Frank Cousins, general secretary of the Transport and General Workers Union, introducing the resolution against government control of wages, delivered a violent attack on Wilson's economic policies. He said they had given rise to "a deep feeling of mistrust in the country. The administration, he said, seems "to have lost all sense of direction."

The bitter mood of disillusion of many delegates at the party's annual convention over high unemployment, and belt-tightening curbs on pay raises indicated the convention will hand Wilson a stinging rebuff.

## Republicans Enjoy 'Well-Oiled' System, Democrats Campaign With Handicaps

WASHINGTON (AP) — When Richard M. Nixon was nominated for president, Republican National Chairman Ray C. Bliss proudly presented him with \$1 million and a smoothly functioning campaign organization.

When Lawrence F. O'Brien was installed by Hubert H. Humphrey as both campaign manager and chairman of the Democratic National Committee, he found what he terms "a modest deficit."

In addition, the Democratic organization was in disarray.

Now, with five weeks to go until election day, O'Brien says that his organization is ready. But "we have nowhere near the financial resources that we would like to have," adding that, in this regard, "I envy Ray Bliss."

"You live with what you have," O'Brien says, adding that he expects the Republicans to outstep the Democrats by 4- or 5-to-1.

Nixon relies on the more traditional pattern of a personal organization, operating out of New York and headed by John Mitchell.

Mitchell and Bliss meet each week to coordinate. But in over-all charge is the candidate himself.

Bliss' biggest fear is that overconfidence will bring a repetition of 1948 when so many Republicans were sure Thomas E. Dewey would defeat Harry S. Truman, that "they thought their vote wasn't needed."

For O'Brien, his greatest worry is that this is "a very short campaign."

Ironically, the Democrats planned this deliberately, as assuming it would work to their advantage in what was expected to be a drive to re-elect Lyndon B. Johnson.

Neither O'Brien nor Bliss would estimate in interviews what the two parties plan to spend on the presidential and congressional races.

A Republican source said, however, his party will spend at least \$20 million.

One result of the money situation is that the GOP advertising campaign is well ahead.

Shortly after Nixon's nomination, television commercials featuring excerpts from his acceptance speech began to appear.

But the first Humphrey television spot, about medicare, went on the air only last week.

As a result, the Democrats have been trying "to secure as much free television time as we can," O'Brien says, by having Humphrey appear on such programs and question-and-answer sessions that are carried as a public service.

On the organizational side, the Republicans are operating mainly through the regular state units.

The beer dealers resolved to support the U.S. Brewers Association in a statewide anti-litter drive.

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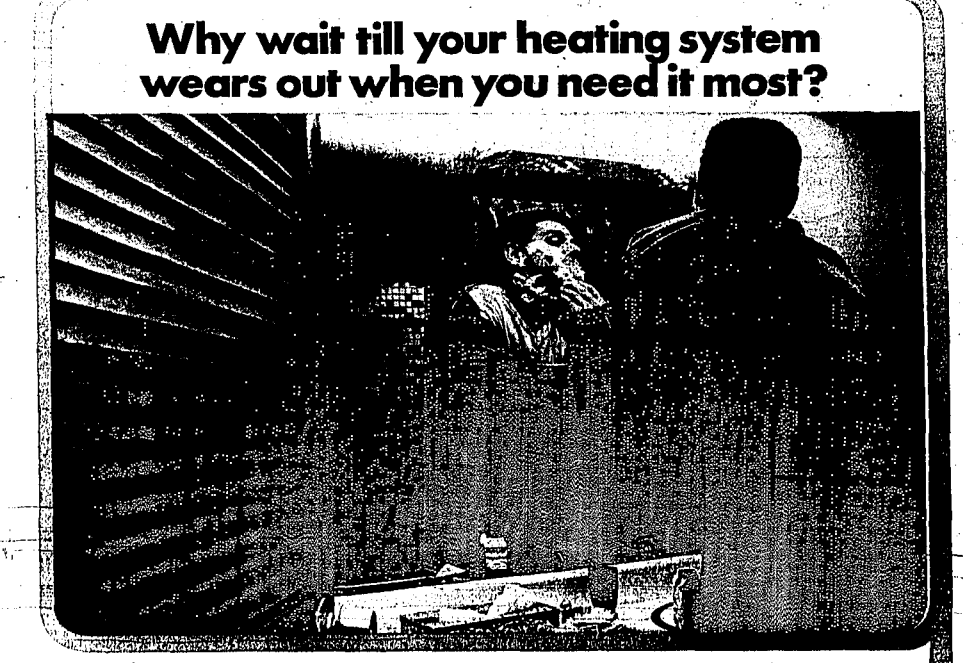
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## Cleric Slates Visit To Idaho

# Obesity Called Most Common U.S. Disease At Rupert Rally

**RUPERT** — Obesity is one of the most common diseases in the United States today, and very few people will admit overweight is caused by over eating, members of Magic Valley area TOPS clubs were told during the second annual area rally held last week at the Rupert Elks Lodge.

The featured speaker at the meeting was Dr. Walter Peterson, Burley physician and surgeon, who discussed weight loss procedures and the desirability of maintaining ideal weight for health reasons.

The doctor discussed four methods of losing weight, including fad diets which he said are seldom successful; diet pills, which become crutches and can be dangerous; thyroid pills, which are essentially the same as the other pills; and eating less, which is the ideal way to lose weight.

He reminded the women that the older they get the less active they become, and thus burn fewer calories, and consequently need fewer calories.

A question period followed the doctor's remarks.

# LDS Official Urges Organization Of One Stake Per Week At Rupert Confab

**RUPERT** — Approximately 1,600 members of the Minidoka LDS Stake congregation met Sunday morning to hear and discuss by Elder James A. Cullimore, an assistant to the Council of Twelve Apostles.

# Senators Urge Oil Price Probe

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Eighteen senators and 35 House members joined Sunday in asking the Justice Department and Federal Trade Commission investigate the possibility of illegal collusion in gasoline and fuel oil price increases.

A letter to the two agencies, released by the office of Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., asked the probe, saying, "Because of the rather stringent laws against price-fixing, we think the fact that almost all the oil companies saw fit to raise their prices by the same amount at the same time merits close consideration."

The letter said the hikes would cost consumers in the Northwest and mid-Atlantic states \$250 million, and if it should spread to the West the cost would be \$885 million.

## Professor, Students Argue Over Philosophy Of 'Hippies'

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The young people and the professor disagree about the hippies. He says they're dirty, shiftless spongers. The young folks defend them as needlers of American society.

"They're practitioners of the worst sort of hypocrisy," said the Rev. Dr. Robert E. Fitch of San Francisco, who called them lazy, immature, irresponsible, immoral and smelly.

"I question this hard name-calling," said Peggy Liggett, a student at Texas Christian University. "Rather than name-calling, we ought to try to rectify conditions in society that cause them to withdraw from it."

The youngsters and Dr. Fitch, who teaches Christian ethics at the Pacific School of Religion, tangled on the subject Sunday night at the General Assembly of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).

"The hippies are trying to tell us something about the society we're living in," said Frederick W. Smith, of Minneapolis, chairman of the youth panel. "In a sense they're a product of society. We go to ask what they're saying about a society on which they've turned their backs."

Commented Dr. Fitch: "They're trying to tell us they don't want to grow up and be responsible adults."

About 10,000 church people in Kansas City's Municipal Auditorium applauded points scored by the contenders, most often Dr. Fitch's views.

"It looks as if there's a majority over the age of 30 in this audience," observed Smith. "Don't talk to me about being over 30," said Dr. Fitch. "My grandchildren would consider this youth panel a bunch of old men and women, and I communicate with them."

## Eban Rusk Ponders Peace With Israeli Leader

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk was in New York today for 10 days of diplomatic talks that include a meeting with Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban, on hand with a new peace plan for the Middle East.

Rusk also had on his agenda talks with Secretary-General U Thant and General Assembly President Emilio Arenales of Guatemala.

Rusk and Eban both arrived Sunday to take part in the U.N. General Assembly policy debates, and in other diplomatic conferences.

Eban told reporters that Israel is "exploring all possibilities for a lasting peace" and that he would give his ideas on the subject in a speech Oct. 8.

Diplomatic sources here said Eban told officials in Rome, Paris and London that he had a package deal for the Arabs. But the sources said they knew none of the details.

Other sources said they doubted reports that the Israeli plan would return Sinai to Egypt and most of the West Bank of the Jordan River to Jordan.

For the second time in three days, Eban rejected a Soviet peace plan reported to call for Israeli withdrawal to pre-1967 boundaries in return for a U.N. presence there, an Arab declaration of nonbelligerency and a Big Four guarantee against new hostilities.

Washington officials said Wednesday that the Soviet Union had presented such a plan to the United States. Eban said it was not new, could not be called a peace plan and in any case should have been presented directly to the countries concerned. He also objected that it did not call for "recognized boundaries" for Israel.

Eban will present the new Israeli plan as a new round of talks aimed at settling the Arab-Israeli war of June 1967 gets under way.

Gunnar Jarring, of Sweden, U.N. special representative to the Middle East, is expected to conduct these talks separately with Eban and with Foreign Ministers Monem Rifai of Jordan and Mahmoud Riad of Egypt.

In Jerusalem Sunday, Israel said it would stand by its refusal to allow a U.N. investigation into alleged mistreatment of Arabs in Israeli-held lands unless the plight of Jews in Arab lands was also looked into.

The U.N. Security Council voted Friday to send an envoy to Israeli-held areas but did not call for a look at the treatment of Jewish communities.

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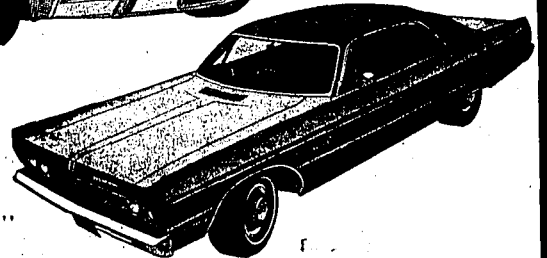
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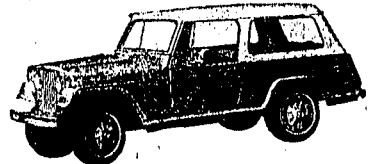
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# Battleship Poses Expensive Query

SAIGON (AP) — The battleship USS New Jersey went into action off the Vietnamese coast today—a \$50 million question mark.

The 56,000-ton vessel which fired her last previous bombardment off the coast of Korea 15 years ago has become something of an embarrassment since the decision was taken a year ago to put her back in service.

Officially, the Navy is keeping a stiff upper lip and hopes the battleship's nine 16-inch guns will prove more than useful in Vietnam. Privately, however,

many officers feel the ship is a victim of de-escalation and finding enough targets to justify her presence won't be easy.

The naval command won an argument in August 1967, within the confines of the Pentagon to bring the ship—which flew the admiral's pennant in World War II—out of mothballs.

Elaborate charts and reports were drawn up to show that a battleship—with guns able to reach 23 miles—could blast a majority of the targets in North Vietnam being hit then by warplanes. The argument was particularly telling because the jets were then going down at the rate of about one a day.

Even then, however, the Navy didn't win all it wanted. The original plan had called for two battleships. That would permit one to be on the guns at all times. The second ship would be back at Subic Bay in the Philippines, replacing the barrels of her guns which wear out after about 300 firings if maximum charges are used.

The Navy accepted the reaction, but it was just one battleship, confident it would prove its worth.

Then came the de-escalation of the war with President Johnson's order limiting bombing to a relatively small area of the North Vietnamese panhandle.

There isn't much in the panhandle to really engage a battleship. Most of the coastal road is easily within range of cruiser and destroyer guns, as are small airfields at Vinh and Dong Hoi.

The one area where the New Jersey's massive broadside could be devastating is along the 17th parallel demilitarized zone, driving North and South Vietnam.

In this area, North Vietnamese forces have dug in some gun emplacements that have defied counterfire and aerial bombardment.

Although the DMZ is actually 27 miles long, most of the enemy's gun emplacements are within range of the New Jersey's 16-inch batteries. The area where she is likely to do most of her work and where the first rounds were fired today.

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# Panel Urges Alterations In Bank Laws

BOISE (AP) — Changes in several Idaho banking laws have been recommended by the Legislative Council's Public Depository Committee.

The group's recommendations to the 1969 Legislature included one that the state be prohibited from depositing its funds in any bank which pays no state sales or personal property taxes.

Now, state-chartered banks pay such taxes but nationally chartered banks generally do not.

Another recommendation was that the state's investment authority for endowment funds be broadened. However, the changes could only be made if a proposed constitutional amendment passes in November.

Under the amendment, a requirement that state endowment funds be invested in government securities would be stricken.
