

Allies Hunt Reds In Massive Sweep

SAIGON (AP) — Thousands of allied troops scoured the battle-scarred mountain valleys near Khe Sanh and the jungled foothills southwest of Da Nang today in new offensives aimed at spoiling enemy attacks.

Task forces of U.S. Marines and American and South Vietnamese infantrymen met little resistance, but continued to turn up valuable enemy munitions stockpiles.

One stockpile found two miles below the center position of the demilitarized zone yielded 200 rounds of 152mm artillery ammunition—plus 100 fuses. This indicated that the enemy may be planning to move big Russian-made guns into the South. The 152s can fire a 90-pound missile 16 miles.

Military spokesmen, in delayed reports, announced the loss of four more American aircraft to enemy ground fire over the past three days.

They included an observation plane and a reconnaissance helicopter helping the allied ground troops search for the enemy. A Navy A7 Corsair fighter-bomber downed over North Vietnam, and an assault helicopter hit near the Cambodian border northwest of Saigon.

One of the observation planes was shot down Sunday 500 yards south of the abandoned pilot base at Khe Sanh. The pilot and artillery observer were unhurt.

The Marines returned to Khe Sanh on Wednesday in a new offensive sweep through the

one-time fortress, three months after giving up for what the U.S. Command said was more flexibility and mobility.

The Marines apparently acted intelligently, reports the North Vietnamese troops had moved into Khe Sanh, but the Leathernecks went in unopposed. A U.S. spokesman said they don't plan to stay.

Khe Sanh underwent a 77-day enemy siege earlier this year, but Marines held out until it was lifted early in April by a relief force.

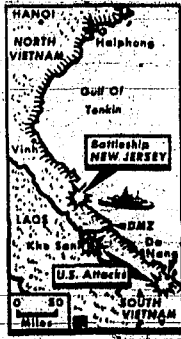
The A7 Corsair, from the carrier Constellation, was downed Sunday just below the 19th parallel bombing boundary for American pilots. The pilot, Lt. George M. Bley II, of Fremont, Calif., was rescued and was picked up five miles offshore by a rescue helicopter. He suffered minor injuries.

It was the 985th American transport aircraft to be downed in more than 3 1/2 years of bombing North Vietnam.

In raids over North Vietnam's southern panhandle Sunday, American pilots logged 129 missions. They reported destroying or damaging 39 supply boats and 100 trucks, ferrying war material into the South. Eleven anti-aircraft sites also were reported smashed.

The U.S. Navy announced that the South Vietnamese woman-led Navy commandos and government troops to a Viet Cong prison camp in the Mekong Delta region, Australia, and 23 other areas.

Heavy 'Loot' Poses Problem

Bandits Take Mercury From Idaho Mine

WEISER, Idaho (AP) — State police said four gunmen walked into the El Paso Natural Gas Co. mercury mine early today, tied up two attendants and made off with 7,000 pounds of mercury.

Police said the mercury was valued at \$40,000. They said the attendants told them the gunmen, wearing masks, loaded the mercury into two trucks and drove away.

Mercury is a metallic element which has a wide variety of uses. In addition to being used for the filling of instruments which measure temperature and

atmospheric pressure, it also is used in medicines and in laboratory experiments.

The mine, in existence for many years, has been operated by El Paso or a subsidiary since 1955. It was shut down from 1961 to 1964 because of low metal prices, but has been operated continuously since December, 1964.

It originally was an underground mine but in recent years has been operated as an open cut mine.

Plant Superintendent Ray Loman said the mercury is shipped in steel flasks, each weighing 84 pounds.

Loman said mercury can be harmful to a person if he comes in contact with it. As long as the flasks are not broken, he said there is no danger in transporting it.

One of the trucks used to haul the stolen mercury belonged to the company and the other was owned by an employee.

Loman said it had not been determined how the four men reached the mine, on a mountain top east of Weiser.

Loman said he believed it would be difficult for the men to dispose of the stolen mercury, since sources — and markets — for the liquid metal are

limited.

State police said the two vehicles reported stolen from the mine were found later abandoned in a farm field about three or four miles away.

State Mine Inspector O. T. Hansen said in Boise the ore from which the mercury is recovered in the El Paso operation is a light gray in color. Mercury sulphide shows up as it is pink tracings.

The ore is crushed, then heated in a high temperature furnace using the mercury sulphide to evaporate. It is then condensed and becomes mercury in liquid form.

Idaho CAP Wing Is Rated High On Drill

An Air Force team evaluating the Idaho Wing of the CAP's annual search and rescue and civil defense practices was "highly pleased" with the effectiveness of the Idaho group. Practices were conducted from the Twin Falls Municipal Airport.

Lt. Col. Ed Woods, Twin Falls, reported that the team said the wing had performed better than last year and that several areas of the practices had been improved. In 1967 the Idaho Wing received 95 points out of a possible 100.

Search and rescue practice was Saturday and the civil defense exercise was Sunday. Simulated nuclear attacks fell at four points in Idaho through Sunday, beginning with an 8 a.m. bombing at Mountain Home.

At 9 a.m. Cascade Dam was hit, and at 10 a.m. the American Falls dam was the target. A simulated nuclear explosion fell at 11 a.m. with a strike at the State Capitol in Boise.

The CAP's main function in the civil defense practice was to assist local governments, maintain

communication, dispense medical equipment and personnel and search and rescue and civil defense practices was "highly pleased" with the effectiveness of the Idaho group. Practices were conducted from the Twin Falls Municipal Airport.

The checking of this point was necessary to determine if long specialized personnel could be safely kept in specific areas.

Several aircraft flew about 100 miles from the base to Boise, as far east as Pocatello, and north to Halley.

One plane made a fast "dash" through the "hot spot" at Boise to determine just how much damage was done to the capital.

A nuclear expert from Lowery Air Force Base was on hand Sunday to view the proceedings and to give the Col. Woods, who was highly pleased with the results of the practice.

The Twin Falls group of the CAP was unable to attend the practice because of inclement weather at that area.

The northern group, however, was able to maintain communication and reporting the movement of traffic into the undamaged sections of Idaho.

Results of the evaluation will be reported in about 30 days, Col. Woods said.

Top Court Convenes Fall Term

WASHINGTON (AP) —

The Supreme Court opened a new term today, 20 minutes late, but untroubled.

At 10:20 a.m. EDT, Chief Justice Earl Warren led the other eight black-robed justices to their places behind the long mahogany bench, a clerk in morning coat called the packed courtroom to attention and Warren announced briskly: "The 1968 term of the Supreme Court is now convened."

Without another word, and without explanation for the 20-minute delay, the chief justice called for new admissions of lawyers to the high court's bar.

House Panel Slaps LBJ On Requests

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Appropriations Committee today cut deeply from the administration's request for funds to launch its new low-income housing program and to expand the food stamp program.

Also sharply trimmed by the committee was the request for money to enable the administration to enforce the new open housing law and for a juvenile delinquency control program.

The cuts were made in the final appropriations bill of the year, which the committee reduced from \$70 million requested by the administration to \$10 million.

In a report accompanying the bill, the committee said it "is not impressed with the urgency of all the programs and has provided only for those that are most important."

The House, scheduled to take the bill up Tuesday, is likely to go along with nearly all the recommended cuts.

Chief casualties were the food stamp program, which Congress is seeking to trim and the new housing program designed to increase home ownership among low and moderate income families and to make modest housing available to them.

President Johnson asked for \$90 million in additional funds for the food stamp program, which has been running for more than 10 years.

Congress recently authorized that much of an increase, but the House has trimmed the appropriation itself to \$20 million. The funds would be in addition to \$225 million already appropriated for this fiscal year.

Under the new housing program the federal government helps pay the interest costs on building low-income housing.

Johnson asked for \$15 million, sufficient to contract for \$150 million worth of such housing this year, but the committee recommended spending only \$5 million which would limit contract authority to \$60 million.

SAIGON (AP) — Two American soldiers have been transferred to the front lines from the rear for failing to salute officers, an Army spokesman reported Monday.

Maj. Gen. Charles P. Stone, commander of the 4th Infantry Division, confirmed there is such a policy in his 15,000-man division, which is based in South Vietnam's central highlands.

The order went into effect Sept. 7. Saluting is required in rear base areas but not in forward combat zones. The division's rear headquarters is at Camp Henri, just outside Pleiku.

Stone, in explaining the directive, said the policy had been applied before.

Baseball 'Hero' Lists Plot To Curb Negro Vote

DETROIT (AP) — Jackie Robinson, baseball's first Negro Hall-of-Famer, who is working for Democratic presidential nominee Hubert H. Humphrey, charged Sunday that Republicans decided at a secret New York strategy session to try to keep the Negro vote at home.

"They're going to send militants into the black community to keep people home," by conducting there is no difference between the candidates, Robinson told reporters as he flew here with Humphrey to attend the World Series.

Robinson, who said his information came from a very reliable source who attended the meeting held after the Democratic National Convention, said "every 'no vote' means a vote for Richard Nixon."

"It didn't work in 1964 when they tried to get us out of the Martin Luther King," Robinson added in predicting failure of the strategy. Recent polls have shown Humphrey stands a good chance of winning the name overwhelming Negro support President Johnson had in 1964 if the Negro vote were.

The former Brooklyn Dodger star, who resigned last August as assistant to New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, criticized Humphrey's strategy. "Edward W. Brooke, R-Mass., who is backing Nixon and Rep. John Conyers, D-Mich., who has been cool to Humphrey," Any black

man who has any concern for the future of the United States has to go out and work and elected president," he said.

"I think he is the worst racist in the country," Robinson said. "The Republican who played an important role in Nixon's capture of the Republican presidential nomination; as did Callahan."

Robinson was not specific on exactly when the GOP strategy session took place or who was there, although he said Negro representatives of the Republican National Committee were present.

"I was called by one of the black Republicans who was there," he said, adding "they think we are stupid. We know Humphrey's record on civil rights."

State Endowment Funds Jump In Two-Year Period

BOISE (AP) — State endowment funds, which provide earnings for public schools and state institutions, had a 30 per cent increase in growth rate during the past two years compared to the previous two-year period.

Figures released by a Land Commission report from the state endowment funds increased by \$9,661,069 during the biennium ended June 30, about \$2.7 million more than was brought into the fund during the previous two years.

However, there is room for debate as to whether that increase anywhere near the potential earnings from the land.

The state started with considerable discretion to the land board, which administers state lands through the land department.

Despite an implied threat that if the money was not raised, the local county agent's office would be closed, Mr. Clark said the office is still open.

Next year's convention of commissioners and clerks will be held at the Ponderosa Inn here.

"I can see nothing ahead but a big increase in taxes," Mr. Clark stated, "because of the demands of education, welfare, hospitals and other agencies."

NEW YORK (AP) — Consolidated Edison Co. has applied for a permit to build an underground nuclear generating plant on Welfare Island in the East River.

Charles F. Luce, Con Edison chairman, said Sunday that although no definite plans had been made, the company hoped the city would leave a portion of the island in such a way that we can put a nuclear power plant beneath it."

He said such a plant would cut down air pollution by replacing those burning coal and oil. It also could be used to generate steam used to heat city buildings, Luce said.

A similar recommendation came from Laurance S. Rockefeller, conservationist and brother of Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller. He said that a plant on Welfare Island would eliminate the need for long power lines coming in from outlying areas.

Rockefeller heads the Electric Utility Industry Task Force which reported Sunday that underground power lines and clear generating plants near the cities would help beautify the countryside.

He also said that putting existing lines underground would cost about \$150 billion.

French Leader

PARIS (AP) — Opposition leader Francois Mitterrand, runner-up to President Charles de Gaulle in the 1965 elections, announced Sunday he would seek a leadership post in the new Socialist party being formed by Franco's non-Communist left wing.

His withdrawal from top political leadership was considered a direct result of setbacks the opposition suffered in France's May-June social crisis and the June elections.

As president of the Federation of the Left, Mitterrand led the Communist, Communist and non-Communist left opposition against De Gaulle in 1965 and picked up 45 per cent of the votes.

Let in May, Mitterrand, 52, was criticized for failing to take the initiative in the widespread student and workers' unrest.

His withdrawal from top political leadership was considered a direct result of setbacks the opposition suffered in France's May-June social crisis and the June elections.

As president of the Federation of the Left, Mitterrand led the Communist, Communist and non-Communist left opposition against De Gaulle in 1965 and picked up 45 per cent of the votes.

Let in May, Mitterrand, 52, was criticized for failing to take the initiative in the widespread student and workers' unrest.

Couple Wins Damages From Hospital That Refused To Perform Abortion

NEW YORK (AP) — A Brooklyn couple has won \$10,000 in damages from a hospital that refused to perform an abortion on the wife, who later gave birth to a physically and mentally handicapped child.

The plaintiffs were Robert Stewart, 29, his wife, Barbara, 29, and their daughter, Roslyn, who was born Jan. 4, 1965, totally deaf, partially blind, mentally retarded and autistic, and with a defective heart.

The defendant in Brooklyn Supreme Court was Long Island College Hospital in Brooklyn, where Mrs. Stewart had sought unsuccessfully to obtain an abortion on the ground that she had contracted German measles which could injure the unborn child.

In their \$500,000 suit, the couple charged the hospital with malpractice and negligence on two counts — failure to perform the abortion, and failure to advise Mrs. Stewart of the danger of continuing her pregnancy or to inform her where an abortion could be obtained.

Film-Rating Plan Adopted By Producers
NEW YORK (AP) — The movie industry, for the first time in its history, has adopted a film rating system to restrict admission to some movies it considers unsuitable for young people.

The ratings are to be enforced voluntarily by individual theater managers.

The classification program goes into effect Nov. 1, when films will be rated in four categories:

- G—for general audiences;
- M—for mature audiences (advised);
- R—young people will not be admitted unless accompanied by a parent or an adult guardian;
- X—young people will not be admitted.

The minimum age is generally 16, but may vary between 16 and 18 according to individual states and cities.

— A means of measuring benefits achieved in relation to development (IUD) programs.

Risk, Gromyko Exchange Views
UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko exchanged views on a broad range of international issues during a three-hour dinner meeting that both sides called useful.

The meeting was the first extensive conference between the two diplomats since Soviet troops invaded Czechoslovakia in 1968 and put a chill in international relations.

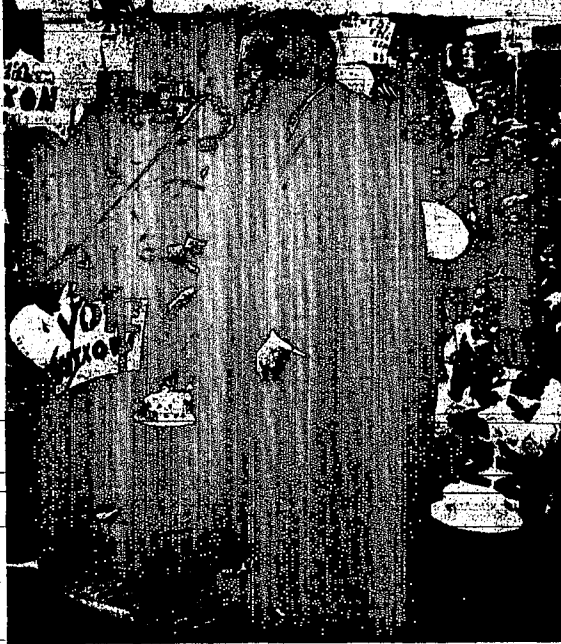

Stanford Seeks To House Overseas Students In Lavish British Home

BY TOM A. CULLEN
LONDON (NEA) — Stanford University undergraduates studying in Britain may soon be sleeping in four-poster beds with canopies, a university deal to acquire a stately British home goes through.

The home in question is Clivedon, once the home of the Ashtons, located amid 337 acres of park land at Taplow, Buckinghamshire. Stanford would like to turn Clivedon into an overseas campus to accommodate 80 of its students, who are presently housed in Lincolnshire.

"Lincolnshire is too far from the center of things," George Docker, Stanford's overseas director of administration, explains. "We want to be closer to London, and Clivedon is only 20 miles away from the metropolis."

If Stanford is successful in bidding for Clivedon, American students will be attending lectures in rooms—where British monarchs and prime ministers were once entertained.

The late Viscount Astor gave Clivedon to the nation before he died, empowering the National Trust to let it to any group interested in fostering better understanding between English-speaking peoples.

Stanford's overseas study scheme fits the description—but the university has had hot competition from a group of British trade unions who want to turn Clivedon into a study center and invite American unions to participate.

If his bid is successful, Stanford will be getting Clivedon for only \$4,000 a year, but it will cost at least \$200,000 to convert its rooms for residence purposes.

If successful, Stanford will also be acquiring a sizable slice of British history, some of it glorious, some of it not so.

Built by the Duke of Buckingham in 1666, Clivedon, in the early 18th century, belonged to Lord George Sackville—the hero of the Battle of Blenheim, who captured 12,000 men in that engagement.

In the 19th century, Queen Elizabeth was frequently a guest at his home, located on the banks of the Thames. However, in the late 1930s, Clivedon earned another name as the gathering place of pro-Hitler appeasers.

The "Clivedon Set," as they were called, included such influential names as Lord Halifax, the British foreign secretary, and Geoffrey Dawson, the editor of the London Times.

It was they who invited Air Marshal Hermann Goering to shoot grouse in the somewhat naive belief that once he had mixed with the British upper crust and tampered their way of life, Goering would see the light.

In World War II, some attempt was made for Clivedon's students to be sent to the States, but part of its grounds for the building of a hospital, where over 25,000 servicemen were treated.

Almanac 'Boss' Seeks Lore By Traveling Through U.S.

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP) — When Ray Geiger dropped off his 19-year-old son at the University of Notre Dame, the father undoubtedly picked up some quips that may show up in the next edition of the Farmers' Almanac.

Geiger, who's celebrating his 35th year as Almanac editor, finds frequent excursions across the country yield rich harvests of gossip, lore and philosophy for the 152-year-old publication.

Geiger, 58, graduated magna cum laude from Notre Dame in 1922 and hopes son Greg, a sophomore, will follow in dad's footsteps as Almanac editor.

"But if his calling is elsewhere, I have the acres of land to cultivate," Geiger said. Peter, 17, is a high school junior in the Geigers' home-town of Lowell, Ind., where the Almanac is published annually. Kenneth, 14, is a freshman, and Michael, 11, is a sixth grader.

And there's Barbara, 15, who might turn out to be the first lady. Almanac editor.

Since taking charge of the Almanac, Geiger has seen its circulation grow from 100,000 to 1 million. The Almanac is sold to businesses that distribute it to customers.

"I suppose the popularity is due to the fact that it reminds people of the good-old-days when life was far less convoluted," Geiger says. "The charm seems to grab people."

"I'm the first to admit the jokes are corny, but it's a good grade of corn. I've been telling jokes like those for audiences all over the country, and believe me there's more fun to be had in pure corn than in the sick jokes of dirty jokes," Geiger says. "It's no mystery that some Almanac material tends to be ecclesiastical, since I have a brother who is a priest and a nephew who is a nun."

The 1968 Almanac's wit includes a definition of middle age scored: "Too many nights sleep in a table."

It advises, "Mini skirts enable young ladies to run faster and because of them they may have legs and arms that are written in small letters but it is a capital idea."

The Almanac contains categories for each month with moon phases, sun rise and set, moon rise and set and regional, day-to-day weather predictions.

"We have been predicting weather for 52 years longer than the Weather Bureau has been in existence," Geiger said, "and it is my thought that it perhaps, when the Bureau says they had top equipment was some old copies of the Almanac."

Harry K. Bule, astronomy professor at the University of Florida, calculates weather forecasts, using a secret formula based on sunspots, stars, moon and position of planets.

The Almanac also provides a host of household hints and recipes, all checked by Geiger's wife, Ann.

"I remained single until I was 38, but then a pretty girl from the Almanac seduced me. Geiger said, "I asked if she could do any better. She said she could, so I married her."

Fishing Quality Is Restored

Half Of Senate Favors Plan To Halt American Bombing Of North Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP) — At least half the Senate favors one plan or another to halt U.S. bombing of North Vietnam. Twenty-seven senators of the Associated-Press survey said they favor an unconditional bombing halt. They are opposed by 18 senators who said there should be no further bombing reduction in the current stage of the war. In between were 23 senators who said they would insist on some matching action by Hanoi, or in reducing the level of the fighting or in compromises at the bargaining table in Paris. The 18 who oppose any reduction of the air predicated that a bombing halt would result in wholesale military infiltration from the North and stepped-up, costly ground action in the South by Communist units taking advantage of a toothless

American air dragon. The senators who said they want the bombing halted unconditionally at least on an experimental basis—maintained it would be an acceptable risk in an all-out attempt to end the fighting. The AP survey was conducted after the flurry of congressional and political debate sparked by Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey's Sept. 30 Vietnam policy speech. Humphrey said that as president he would consider stopping all bombing "as an acceptable risk for peace." Protests Set Against War During Trial

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP) — Supporters of nine war protesters accused of burning draft records say they will stage more demonstrations during the trial. Nine Roman Catholic clergymen and laymen have been charged with seizing Selective Service records at suburban Catonsville and burning them last May 17. The trial begins today. The demonstrations began Sunday afternoon as an estimated 80 opponents of the Vietnam war appeared in front of the Basilica of the Assumption. A dozen counterdemonstrators appeared in front of Enoch Pratt Free Library across the street from the Catholic church. Baltimore police, some with gas masks and riot helmets, were at the scene but made no arrests. No incidents were reported during the brief demonstration. The nine have pleaded innocent to charges of mutilating and destroying government records, hindering administration of the Selective Services Act, causing injury to government property and conspiring to do all those things. On trial in U.S. District Court are: Rev. Philip J. Berrigan, 44, a Josephite priest from Baltimore; Thomas P. Lewis, 27, a Baltimore artist; Rev. Daniel Berrigan, 47, brother of Philip; Brother David Darst, 26, a teacher at St. Louis, Mo.; John Hogan, 33, an ex-Maryknoll brother. Others are: Thomas Melville, 37, an ex-Maryknoll priest; his 38-year-old wife, Marjorie, an ex-Maryknoll nun; George Mische, 33, a Washington, D.C., peace organizer; and Mary Moylan, a Washington, D.C., nurse.
