## B52s Hit Red Units At Saigon

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. Air Force B52 bombers blasted enemy base camps threatening Saigon with heavy raids Wednesday and today, boosting to more than 700 the number of missions flown in the past four months in defense of the capital.

The B52 campaign to blunt an enemy attack on Saigon has become one of the biggest and costliest of the war—perhaps costing \$250 million since June 1.

The eight-jet Stratofortresses have dropped more than 125,000 tons of explosives in 705 missions against base concentrations, infiltration corridors and other targets in the outlying provinces of Saigon. Each mission averages about six bombers each carrying 30 tons of bombs at an average cost of \$2,000 a ton.

In the latest strikes, the B52s mounted seven missions against enemy troop concentrations, long-time base camps, bunker complexes and infiltration routes along the approaches northwest and northeast of Saigon.

The closest raids to Saigon were 24 to 31 miles northwest of the capital.

In other developments, the U.S. Command announced an enemy movement of American troops in a three-way shift to realign units with their own parent divisions. The movement involves three brigades of about 5,000 men each.

The latest shift sent the 3rd Brigade of the 101st Airborne Division from the outer ring of defense northwest of Saigon to the Hue area far to the north to join the division's two other brigades.

Earlier, it had been disclosed that the 3rd Brigade of the 32nd Airborne Division had been moved from the Hue area to the capital military district to protect Saigon's western flank against enemy attack. This brigade replaced a brigade of the 25th Infantry Division which in turn took up the positions left vacant by the 101st Airborne's move.

Elsewhere, South Vietnamese infantrymen killed 44 enemy troops late Wednesday in heavy fighting in the Mark 55 area, 50 miles southwest of Saigon. U.S. Army helicopter gunships supporting the South Vietnamese army killed 10 enemy troops, killing four and wounding six.

## U.S. Envoys See Progress In Conclave

PARIS (AP) — Some U.S. officials say privately an early breakthrough toward a Vietnam peace deal is possible despite the deadlock talks here on ending the war.

Their optimism has them to the point of discussing the idea of a ceasefire in North Vietnam, which is possible despite conflicting American and North Vietnamese terms for a bomb halt would be reconciled.

Arguments advanced by opponents who say a bomb halt through still is on the cards emerged after the 25th session of the conference Wednesday.

Taken together these arguments suggest the North Vietnamese for the first time, are revealing a readiness to yield some ground.

## Wallace Sends Gen. LeMay To Vietnam On 'Fact' Trip

EVANSVILLE, Ind. (AP) — George C. Wallace today announced his decision to send his third party running mate, retired Air Force Gen. Curtis E. LeMay, to Vietnam for a 14-day fact-finding mission.

Tentative plans call for LeMay to go to Vietnam about Oct. 15, reporting back in time for an Oct. 20 nationwide television address by the former Alabama governor who's running for president.

LeMay, meanwhile, was campaigning in Florida.

The trip by LeMay, former Air Force chief of staff and head of the Strategic Air Command, recalls the trip to Korea by former President Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1952.

The difference is, however, that Eisenhower, a five-star general who led allied forces in Europe in World War II, pledged to go if elected and then made the trip before taking office.

Wallace has pledged to end the Vietnam war with conventional weapons if the Paris peace talks and LeMay has said he agrees.

LeMay, who will be accompanied by three Alabama aides of Wallace, has been a hardliner on Vietnam all along.

When he was picked a week ago to take second place on the Wallace ticket, he revived the dormant issue of nuclear weapons by saying "there are many occasions when it would be most efficient to use them."

He added at the time that he didn't think it was necessary to use them in Vietnam.

In an AP interview just before leaving for his Florida campaign swing, LeMay said no situation exists in Vietnam or any place else now where nuclear weapons would be appropriate.

But he added that "there is some place where you're going to use nuclear weapons. Where is it? I don't know."

In the same interview he asked what he thought the risks of a full blown military effort in Vietnam.

He answered: "There's a risk. There's a risk in everything. We live in a risky world... There is some risk to living. Presumably, we're not going to live in a safe world in there. So there is some risk—that Red China might come in, maybe the Russians, even might come in. Well, we've got to live with it. How much risk is there? China? They've got plenty of problems of their own over there right now. We haven't got any weapons capabilities do us any damage anyway, at least not now. Later on maybe yes. Well, now they haven't. So unless we put a big army out there, we're not going to get it at all, they can't hurt us. I think we're foolish to put a big army there. Every state has recognized against that as long as I can remember."

## Child Is Fair After Truck Runs Over Her

BUHL — A 4-year-old Buhl girl who was run over by her father's pickup truck at her farm home near her Wednesday afternoon is expected to be out of the hospital in a few days. She is listed in fair condition at Magic Valley Memorial Hospital.

She Ellen Warren, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eldon Warren, Route 2, Buhl, ran out toward her father as he started turning an unloaded heavy pickup truck around in the farm yard, according to an older sister.

Mr. Warren told her to go back into the house so the child ran onto the porch and waited there a short time. Then, her father said, the child dived out behind the vehicle, unknown to her father.

The truck's wheel backed over her pelvis, breaking it in four places. The child's legs were badly skinned, but not otherwise injured, the family said.

The attending physician pointed out that had such a mishap occurred to an older person it probably would have been more serious, but a child's bones are more pliable.

## U.S. Charges 'Priest' With Tax Violation

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The children at Boys Town of the Desert know him as the Rev. Robert Niklibore, Roman Catholic priest and head of the orphanage.

The U.S. attorney's office says he is known to neighbors in Palm Springs as Robert Drew Rand, an executive of an electronics firm with a \$75,000 income.

Father Niklibore was charged Wednesday with failing to declare personal income of nearly \$120,000 over a three-year period.

U.S. Atty. Matt Byrne said the priest maintained a dual identity for several years, operating the orphanage at Banning, Calif., and living in the plush Palm Springs desert resort.

The government charges he didn't file income tax returns for the years 1964 and 1965 when he had a total gross income of \$112,880.74.

## Ketchum Man Is Killed In Freak Mishap

SHOUP, Idaho (AP) — An elderly Idahoan, convicted of murder, died in a freak accident along the Salmon River.

Sheriff Bill Baker said Naughton Jones, 67, Ketchum, was the victim. Baker said Jones' automobile, loaded with junk, went off a gravelled Forest Service road Wednesday night and into the river's edge.

Baker said the load spilled onto Jones, forcing his head to the floor of the partially submerged vehicle. Coroner Del Jones, no relation to the victim, said Jones drowned.

## Negotiators See Progress On Pueblo

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — U.S. Navy and Korean negotiators met at Panmunjom today for the second straight day and a substantial breakthrough was in the making on the release of the crew of the USS Pueblo, intelligence sources said.

U.S. officials refused to comment on the report.

The sources declined to elaborate on what they meant as a breakthrough.

At the same time, the South Korean newspaper Kyunghyang Shinmun quoted informed sources as saying the 82 Pueblo crewmen, held in North Korea since the ship's capture Jan. 23, may be released shortly.

The paper added that the Panmunjom meeting was attended for the first time by Lemmy Finmark, a Swede who is a member of the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission of the Korean armistice.

## Peruvian Military Seizes American-Owned Oil Field

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Peru's revolutionary military government today announced the seizure of an American-owned oil field complex Wednesday in a move that could delay recognition of the new regime by the United States and other Latin American governments.

The action against International Petroleum Corp., a subsidiary of Standard Oil of New Jersey, also could slow foreign investment which Peru needs.

President Juan Velasco Alvarado announced the seizure by the armed forces of the country's major petroleum complex in a speech broadcast to the nation shortly after noon.

"The revolution is on the march," said Velasco, a general in the coup that overthrew and expelled President Fernando Belaunde Terry last Thursday. He was cheered by several hundred military officers crowded into the ballroom of the presidential palace.

It was not clear from Velasco's announcement how much compensation—if any—would be paid to International Petroleum.

In New York, Standard Oil of New Jersey issued a statement saying it learned of the seizure from news dispatches. It called the action "clear violations of international law and laws of Peru."

"However," a spokesman reported, "the company said that full implementation of the actions by the military regime are not yet clear—it hopes that once the regime understands the true nature of the prior settlement, it will all fairness recognize its validity."

That settlement, negotiated in August under Belaunde, called for the government to take over the oil field in December. No payment was involved, but the government gave up its claim of \$144 million in taxes, which it said were owed back to 1924 when the American firm bought the field from a British company.

The takeover included the La Brea and Parinas oil fields and reflects the northern part of this Andean nation, on the west coast of South America.

## Final Countdown Begins For Apollo Launching

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — The space trio is to ride the pulsating power of the Saturn IB into orbit at 11 a.m. Friday on a critical mission that could put the United States back on course toward its goal of a manned lunar landing next year.

The 300-man launch crew planned to start the critical 16-hour hours of the count by feeding electrical power to the 274-foot-tall Saturn IB rocket.

As the launch team prepared the rocket and the Apollo spacecraft, Navy Capt. Walter M. Schirra Jr., Air Force Maj. Donn F. Eisele and civilian astronaut Walter Cunningham expected to relax after a morning meeting in their quarters with key project officials.

# Senators Pledge 'Time' Bill Fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — Minority Leader Everett M. Dirksen, without mentioning a filibuster, says Senate Republicans will use "the means at our command" to block passage of the equal time bill that survived historic locked-door debate in the House.

Dirksen indicated in an interview after the 27½-hour House debate on the measure ended Wednesday that numerous amendments may be offered to the bill permitting a radio-television confrontation by the major presidential candidates with major requiring equal time for minor candidates.

Shortly after the 280 to 25 House vote of approval, the Columbia Broadcasting System of New York City, which is the GOP nominee Richard M. Nixon, Democratic nominee Hubert H. Humphrey and third party candidate George C. Wallace, and their running mates, one of prime time on each of the next four Sundays.

The National Broadcasting Co. asked the three to arrange meetings with network officials to agree on a time and format acceptable to all.

Dirksen made it clear Senate Republicans have no intention of letting the bill become law in its present form, if they can stall it in the waning days of a session where a quorum to conduct business is rapidly disappearing.

"We are going to resist this with the means at our command," Dirksen said.

Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana made the House-passed bill, the pending Business at a session today called two hours earlier than the usual noon meeting time.

"Observing that he expected considerable discussion" by the minority, he added:

"I hope the Republicans will do their best to see that we get home before the polls close on Nov. 5."

Sen. Roman L. Hruska, R-Neb., said that the adjournment of Congress might be delayed by the argument over the measure.

There were indications, however, that the Democrats may be willing to let the bill die after they have attempted to drive home the point that Nixon doesn't want a debate.

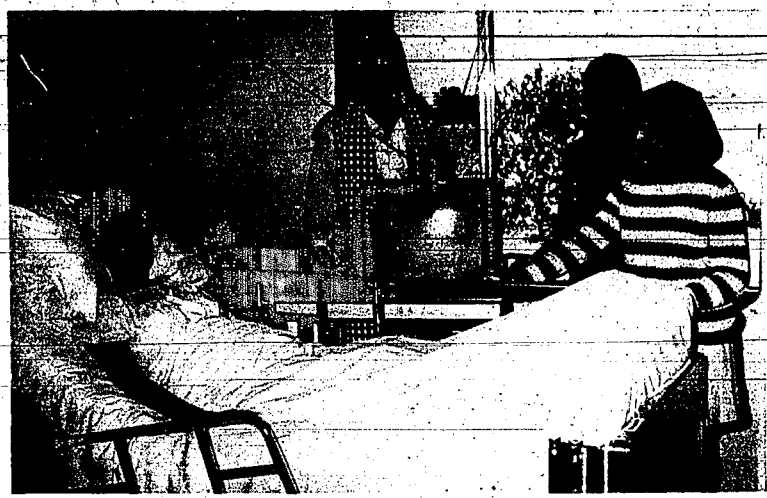
Nixon has said he would debate Humphrey but would not join in a "circus" in which Wallace was invited to participate. Humphrey and Wallace both have said they would debate.

The bill now before the Senate differs from an earlier version it passed in that it considers Nixon, Humphrey and Wallace all as major candidates. The earlier Senate version would merely have suspended the law, permitting networks to invite whom they want.

Sen. Fred Harris, D-Okl., one of Humphrey's advisers, said he had been told the Republicans plan to use obstructive tactics to prevent action on the House measure.

Humphrey made a personal call on House Speaker John McCormack, D-Ill., urging passage of the bill while that chamber was tied up in knots with repeated Republican demands for roll calls.

Republicans denied that they were trying to prevent passage, saying they were driving for action on "stymied election reform" and congressional reorganization legislation.

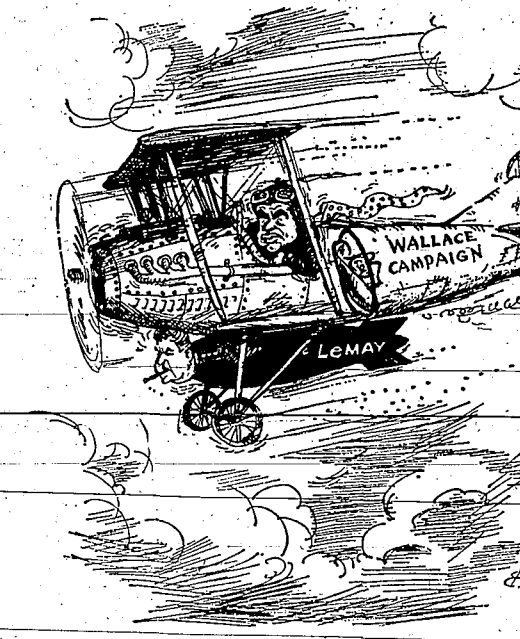

# Demo Candidates Urge Priority For Education From New Funds

Local education should have number one priority with the 30 to 35 million dollars expected in new tax money in Idaho during the next biennium, Democratic legislative candidates in Magic Valley declare.

In a joint statement, the candidates point out that during the next biennium accumulated surplus and new growth in state income is expected to provide between 30 and 35 million dollars more than the present state budget.

"This will be new money and will be excess of the money earmarked for tax relief in connection with the inventory tax phaseout program," they explained.

"Idaho must establish definite priorities of development in using this new money, the candidates say, and they urged that a specific programmed improvement in local education should have top priority.

Commenting on taxes, the Democratic candidates point out that the present state tax structure is in a state of change and the Idaho Supreme Court has ordered the revision of the local tax base to provide equal taxing of all type of property.

The statement points out that the ratios used in taxing utility properties must equalize the same ratio used for assessment of other property.

State agencies are requesting budgets which are higher than the income from the present state tax base. They suggest a three-point platform on state taxation under which utility taxes would be lower, then the rates charged to customers must be lowered to reflect these tax savings.

Future support of local governments, such as counties, must include tax sources other than just the property tax. Homes, land and business property are no longer a full measure of wealth or of ability to pay, the statement says.

The candidates also oppose any raise in the sales tax beyond the present three per cent.

The Democratic candidates include Rep. Vern Ravenscroft, Gooding County; Oscar Arstein, Paul, District 21-B; Ed Elliott, Burley; Don Fredricksen, Gooding County; Jerry Morgan, Rupert; Jack Pierce and Lovell Turner, Cassia county's District 25; Leo Schlender, Ketchum, District 21-A, and Leon Aslett, Jerome.

# Gooding County Candidate Refutes Charge On Zoning

WENDELL — Clyde Peterson, Wendell, Republican candidate for third district commissioner in the Nov. 5 General Election, Thursday refuted a statement "being widely circulated to the effect that I advocate zoning for Gooding County."

He said the rumor may be the result of his two year's work on the Gooding County Planning Commission.

"Or, it could be an effort by those responsible to damage me politically as a candidate for county commissioner in the General Election," Mr. Peterson declared.

He noted there is presently no authorization to zone Gooding County and he has no knowledge whatsoever of what is entailed in countywide zoning plans.

"Consequently, I have no opinion one way or the other on zoning," he declared.

The candidate added he does feel very strongly about the county planning program, which has been in progress for more than two years and is nearing completion.

"With citizen participation, Gooding County Planning, Commission and the Rural Area Development (RAD) committee have been doing a job of which the people of Gooding County can be proud," Mr. Peterson said.

# Cleveland Mayor To Boost Police

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — Mayor Carl B. Stokes, troubled by racial unrest in Cleveland, announced Wednesday a \$17-million program to improve law enforcement.

The Negro mayor also re-joined Police Chief Michael J. Blackwell, 68, and gave the \$22,125-a-year post to Deputy Inspector Patrick L. Gerity, 49.

Blackwell, who was appointed police chief when Stokes took office last November, turned down an offer to become a consultant to the police department and said he would rather go back to being an inspector.

Stokes told a news conference he would ask City Council for funds to overhaul the police communications system and to establish a modern command center to coordinate police response to crime calls.

He said he would fully detail the program later but the immediate aim was to correct the "internal breakdown-of-police morale and discipline."

Relations between members of the 2,200-man police department and City Hall became strained after the July 23 sniper incident when 10 persons, including three white policemen, were killed after a group of black nationalists opened fire on police.

Stokes withdrew white police and National Guardsmen from the Glenville area the night after the shootings. Black community leaders and Negro policemen patrolled the streets.

Although Stokes' decision was later praised by some persons as having prevented more bloodshed, the Fraternal Order of Police strongly criticized the mayor's actions.

The order demanded the resignation of Safety Director Joseph F. McManamon. A resolution calling for Blackwell's resignation was dropped in view of the police chief's age.

There were reports that patrolmen were broadcasting derogatory remarks about Stokes over the police radio and refusing to answer calls to Negro areas.

# Agency Mulls Maine's Plea For Refinery

PORTLAND, Maine (AP) — Maine's bid for a foreign trade zone and industrial complex faces its first major test Thursday as the U.S. Commerce Department launches hearings here into the proposal that could bring New England its first oil refinery.

The plan, called for a free trade zone in Portland with another zone and refinery at Machiasport, has drawn opposition from oil companies and been injected into the national political campaign.

Establishment of the zone would permit foreign goods to enter duty free, be processed and shipped out again.

Maine's Democratic governor, Kenneth M. Curtis, charged Wednesday that oil interests are trying to hold up the hearings "in hopes their man, Richard M. Nixon will be elected president" and the proposal can be junked.

On the other hand, a Republican congressman from Texas has called the project a Johnson administration "fix" supported by pressure from Maine Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, the Democratic vice presidential candidate.

The Texas Rep. Robert Price predicted approval of the project, which he termed a "smelly deal", and said it would give Occidental Petroleum Corp. of California an unfair competitive edge over domestic oil producers.

# Examination Shows Victim Well-Dressed

YERINGTON, Nev. (AP) — Examination of a man's body found in the desert two miles from the shallow grave of two slain Wyoming businessmen disclosed Wednesday he wore a dress shirt and tie and had three bullet holes in his skull, the sheriff's office said.

Undersheriff Gary Alazzi said the examination by Dr. Don R. Schieve of Reno also determined the mostly skeletal remains found Tuesday about 15 miles east of Dayton were those of a man 5 feet, 10 inches tall.

Alazzi said the unidentified man was the victim of murder, although he repeated Sheriff George Allen's opinion the case is not related to the slaying of two Wyoming businessmen.

Authorities called for reports of missing persons. Information of the man's dental work and physical makeup is being retained for identification.

# NATO Chiefs Talk In Secret

BONN, Germany (AP) — Defense chiefs of seven NATO countries began secret two-day consultations today on the role of nuclear weapons in the defense of the West.

The North Atlantic Treaty Organization's nuclear planning group, also known as the McNamara Committee after former Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara, was meeting under maximum security conditions.

The U.S., British, West German, Italian, Danish, Belgian and Greek delegations to the semiannual session were believed to be hearing details of a series of studies compiled since they conferred in April in the Hague.

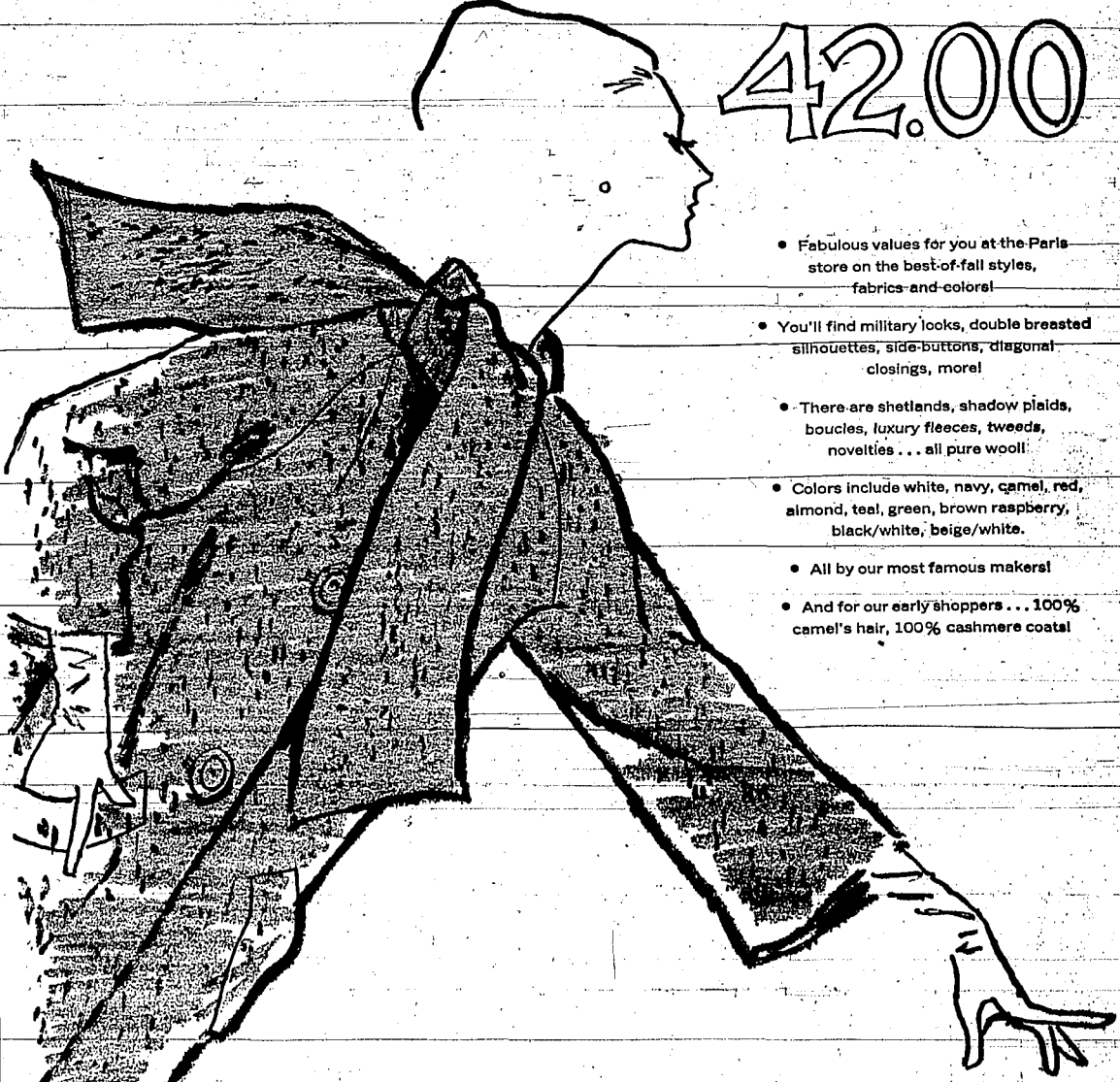

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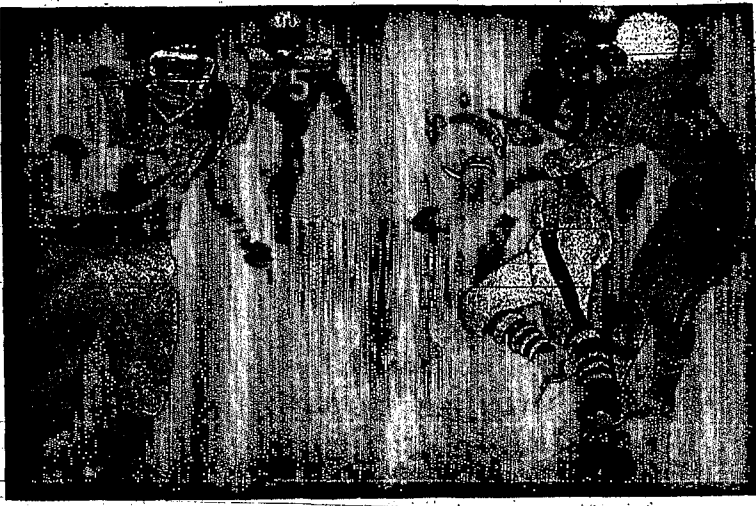

### Soviets Boast Towering Hoop Squad

MEXICO CITY (AP)—"Man, they have some beanpoles. They are 7-foot-8," said Spencer Haywood, 6-foot-8 U.S. center from Detroit, as he watched the towering Russian basketball players in their red sweat suits, who are already passing the American quarters in Olympic Village.

Sergei Kovalenko, the Soviet center, is 7-foot-2 — a student with sandy red hair, dangling arms and legs like a spider. Vladimir Andreyev is 7-foot-2 and Alhazh Zharnukhamedov is 6-9. Veteran Gennady Volnov and Jack Lipso are each 6-6. The shortest man of the Soviet squad is 6-1, Yuri Selikoff.

Tallest man on the U.S. squad is Ken Spain of Houston, followed by Haywood and Bill Hosket of Columbus, Ohio, each 6-8.

The United States has never lost an Olympic game, winning 68 straight, but this year they fell into the tournament underdogs to the towering Reds.

"We are quicker than the Russians and shoot better but I doubt that we are physically as strong," said the U.S. head coach, Hank Iba of Oklahoma State. "We will have to outfox them."

Haywood is the youngest player ever to perform on a U.S. basketball squad. He is just 19, and the pros are barely wait until he finishes college.

The rangy Negro, who sports a Lincoln-style beard, played at Trinidad State Junior College before shifting to the University of Detroit, where he has two more years of eligibility.

Haywood was a member of the team that invaded Europe this summer, winning six games and losing four. The Americans lost two to the Russians and two to Yugoslavia.

"We didn't have Hosket and JoJo White (from the University of Kansas) with us then," Haywood said. "Also we were not organized."

In recent warmup games, the makeshift American Olympians defeated the pro New York Knickerbockers of the National Basketball Association 65-64, lost to Cincinnati of the NBA 71-62 and whipped the Denver Rockets of the American Basketball Association 69-63.

MEXICO CITY (AP)—A calm Mexico City, heavily patrolled by police and soldiers, awaited the opening of the Olympics Saturday as new controversy swirled around the Games.

The International Olympic Committee was locked in argument over whether to re-elect as President Avery Brundage, the rich 81-year-old Chicagoan, who has headed the Olympics since 1952. The Communist countries oppose him.

Striking students, whose clashes with the police in recent weeks have cost upwards of 50 lives, held secret policy meetings. Indications were that any future protests would be on the order of a sit-down.

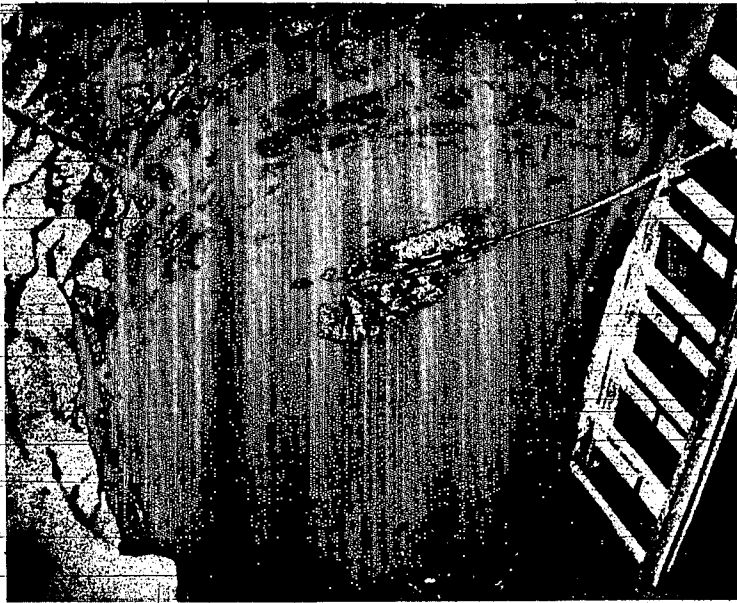

**Adjournment May Doom Gun-Control Bill**

WASHINGTON (AP) — After months of congressional "right- or wrong" home campaigning for re-election or planning to leave early. Another possible GOP tactic would be to try to prevent the bill from being considered immediately by employing the parliamentary procedures that forced the House to remain in session for 27 hours and 37 minutes before completing action today. Although the House is expected to approve the gun control bill, Rep. sence of many members of those under 18. Similar age limits would apply to the sale of ammunition. —Provide stiff prison terms for use of a firearm in committing federal crimes. —Add bombs, bazookas, and grenades to the 1934 firearms law that requires federal registration of machine guns and sawed-off shot guns. CHARGE DISMISSED CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. # Chemicals May Replace Nightstick For Police

By HARRY MOSKOS HONOLULU (AP) — "Since we started using chemical sprays we have practically eliminated the night stick. It's better than hitting a man over the head," says Police Chief Joseph C. Hall of Asheville, N.C. His endorsement of chemical spray devices was typical of the reaction of police chiefs interviewed at the recent 76th annual conference of the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

Police Chief Thomas Cahill of San Francisco, the association's first vice president, said city supervisors there have prohibited police from using chemical agents because of possible eye injuries but "I personally think we should be allowed to use chemical agents under certain conditions." He said he felt pressure spray devices "are a valuable weapon in the control of violence with a minimum of hazard involved."

"Certainly chemical agents are less harmful than shotguns, rifles, clubs or even handcuffs," said Chief Silver Suarez of Springfield, Ill., but he cautioned police should not become careless in their use of such items.

"In the hands of an untrained policeman, the use of a chemical agent could result in a charge of police brutality," Suarez added.

Chief Elmer A. Briscoe of Reno, Nev., felt "it is a lot more humane than using the night stick or another weapon."

J. Preston Strom, chief of the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division, said one policeman can immobilize four or five people without doing any permanent injury by using a chemical spray device so "it gives the policeman an added sense of security."

Daniel F. McMahon, sheriff of New York's Westchester County, said "there has been a lot less use of the night stick since the introduction of chemical agents. The men on the beat are very strong in favor of the use of chemical agents."

Chief Leonard G. Lawrence of Hamilton, Ontario, Canada, said chemical devices were taken out of context by critics. The report said there was a need for additional research on the use of chemical agents.

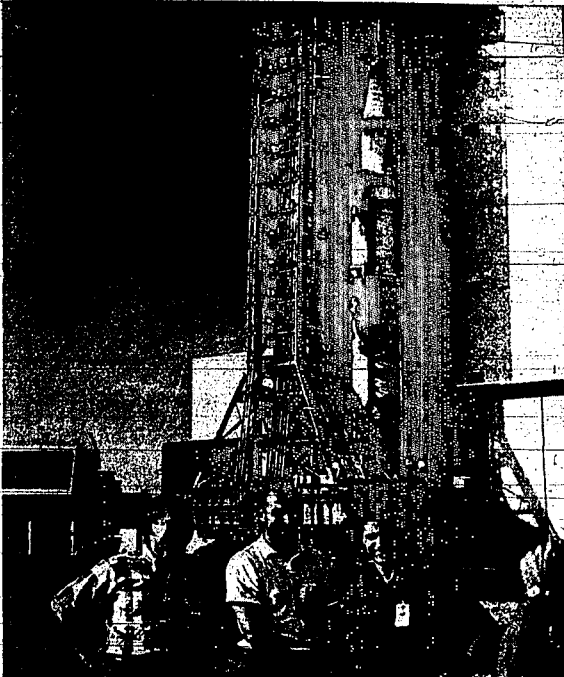

# Red Cross Claims 'Treasure' Found By Boys In Vacant Lot

GUTHRIE CENTER, Iowa (AP) — A judge has awarded 12 boys nearly half the buried treasure they found three years ago, but the American Red Cross now says it has a right to all the money—more than \$1,500.

The Red Cross filed a petition in U.S. District Court in Des Moines, Iowa, Tuesday as Guthrie County District Court Judge Robert O. Frederick was approving a settlement between the boys and three other persons.

"Some people might criticize us for not going after what is rightfully ours," explained John Howard of Des Moines, executive director of the Central Iowa chapter of the Red Cross. "The treasure—old gold coins and currency with a face value of \$11,524.31 but believed to be worth more—was discovered by the youths on June 1, 1965, as they dug in a vacant lot in Beard, Iowa."

The winners of the lot, Mr. and Mrs. John Rosenbeck, filed a claim for the money as did Lois Tallman of Guthrie Center, the niece of the man who had lived on the lot and presumably buried the money. He died in 1953.

Judge Frederick approved a settlement under which the boys, now aged 9 to 15, would get 40 per cent of the net worth of the treasure, and Miss Tallman and the Rosenbecks each would get 30 per cent.

But the Red Cross, in its petition, said the money belongs to the lot, Fred Boardley, had willed his entire estate to the Red Cross. This was discovered only last week, Howard said.

## Group For Humphrey Cites Goals

BOISE (AP) — The newly formed Idaho Farmers' committee for Humphrey-Muskie said today it is supporting present federal farm programs "with changes to meet current needs." The committee, in a statement said Vice President Hubert Humphrey, the Democratic presidential nominee, fathered the Food for Peace program, the cornerstones of the war on hunger and launching pad for a spectacular rise in American farm exports.

The statement said Idaho's share of farm exports under that program amounted to \$65 million as of last February.

"We worry about depressed prices," the statement said, "because we remember during the Nixon-Benson years the pile-up of farm surpluses was approaching a national scandal."

## Income Of Farms Remains Steady

BOISE (AP) — The index of prices received by Idaho farmers was unchanged in the month ended Sept. 15, the Idaho Crop and Livestock Reporting Service said today.

But the index of prices paid by farmers for feed gained two points during the month. The feed index on Sept. 15 stood at 80 per cent of the 1947-49 average, compared with 78 per cent at mid-August and 81 per cent on Sept. 15, 1967.

The index of prices received was at 253 per cent of the 1910-14 average, unchanged from the Aug. 15 level but up from 244 per cent on Sept. 15, 1967.
