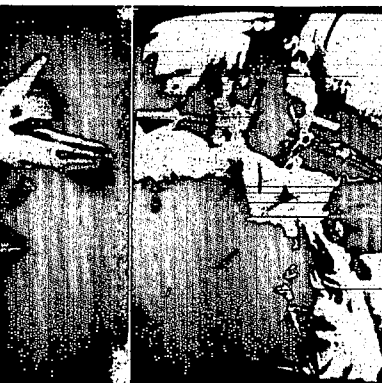

Soldiers Ordered Back To Vietnam

WASHINGTON (AP)—For the first time, the Army and Marines are sending thousands of men back for involuntary second tours to Vietnam.

The Army plans to return about 18,000 this year, the Marines some 6,000.

Until this year, the number of nonvolunteers ordered to a second round of war service has amounted only to a trickle.

But this has changed because of the length of the war, the high manpower turnover stemming from the one-year duty tour in Vietnam, and the tight control of seasoned officers and noncommissioned officers.

Many career servicemen also are becoming eligible for involuntary second tours in Vietnam because they have been away from the war zone for at least two years.

The Army, Marines and Navy had set that as the hoped-for interval between tours, although some exceptions had been made.

In such scarce skills as helicopter pilots, the Air Force has had no specific interval policy, but has tried to give everybody a turn before tapping men for second tours.

The involuntary second tour trend will affect career servicemen rather than draftees because young men serving two-year draft hitch may not be returned to the war.

The Army contingent will include 4,950 officers mostly in the captain-major/lieutenant colonel bracket, and 12,900 enlisted men, and 1,000 noncommissioned officers.

The Marine returnees will include 1,000 officers and 5,000 enlisted men.

Between them, the Army and the Marine Corps account for about 80 per cent of the 24,000 American servicemen in Vietnam.

With a 50,000-man-a-month turnover, the Army and Marine have the biggest problem in maintaining a flow of key officers and noncoms to Southeast Asia.

The Air Force this year is sending only about 150 noncommissioned officers back to Vietnam on involuntary second tours.

A spokesman said the Air Force No. 411 are ready to go back in a few months if it becomes necessary to return some enlisted specialists for second tours.

Court Agrees To Decide 'Peace' Fuss

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court agreed Monday to review a ruling that the Texas "disturbing the peace" law is an unconstitutional invasion of peaceful protest.

The court acted on an appeal by state Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin. It brings before the justices another important test of demonstrators' power.

A federal court in Austin, Tex., threw out the state law last April. The ruling grew out of a demonstration mounted by the University Committee to End the War in Vietnam when President Johnson visited Killeen, Tex., last December to speak at the dedication of Central Texas College.

Committee members and other protesters of U.S. war policy headed into a crowd that included many soldiers recently returned from Vietnam—Fl. Hood is nearby—with such signs as "I have but One Idol—Hitler, General Ky."

Temper flared, epithets became angrier and three members of the committee were arrested. They were John E. Morby, a history instructor at the University of Texas, and James M. Damon and Zigmont W. Smigal Jr., graduate students at the university.

The Texas law made it a crime to use loud, obscene or vulgar language in any public place in a manner calculated to disturb the peace.

The court in Austin found the law's language too vague to be clearly understood, as well as an unnecessarily broad invasion of First Amendment freedoms.

The appeal will be heard later this term.

Board Said Ready To Buy Union School

Officials of Twin Falls School District No. 411 are ready to sell the old Union School building, it was learned Monday.

Sale price is \$7,500.

Dr. Ernest Ragland, superintendent of the district, said "Now it's up to the county. We're ready to act as soon as they are."

The county commissioners discussed the purchase Monday but no action was taken.

The county agreed recently to buy the school building, then turn it over to the Twin Falls County Historical Society.

Officials of the historical society visited the building Sunday to study remodeling needs. All the county's historical lore will be stored at the building and the building will be used as a museum.

"We see no hitch in the transaction," Dr. Ragland said.

"Everything has been approved unofficially. Now it has to be made official by school board and county resolution, and the legal papers have to be drawn up," he added.

The money has been budgeted by the county, it was learned.

The historical society has searched for a museum for several years. When Union School was vacated last summer by the school district, historical society officials made application through the county for use of the building.

Students who attended Union School are now being transported to grade schools in Twin Falls.

There was no immediate evidence of any link between the students and two men who shot and killed U.S. Army Capt. Charles R. Chandler in Sao Paulo Saturday. They sped away leaving leaflets that accused Chandler of being in Brazil to "train war criminals."

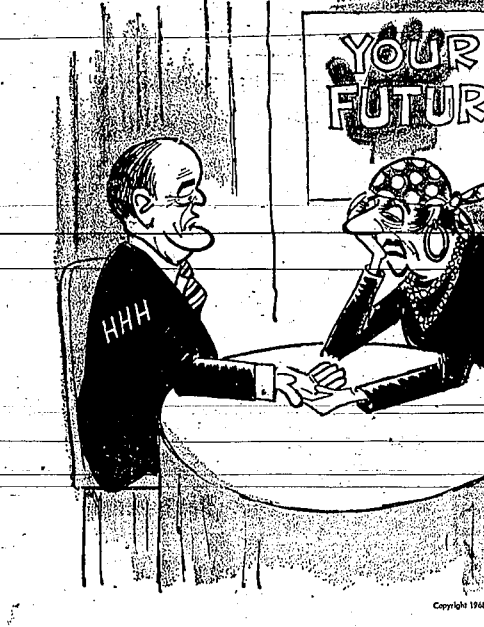

Bright Future Seen In Music For Youngsters

BOISE (AP) — The conductor of the Utah Symphony told a Boise news conference that there is a bright future for young musicians in the United States. Maurice Abravanel said the reason for his optimism was very simple. "In the United States there is an amazing interest in good music by young people," he said. Ten years ago, he said, "good" music was considered "sissy" — and today any young man or woman with talent and a deep interest can find an opening for a musical career. "Such opportunity was nonexistent ten years ago." Abravanel pointed to state subsidies as a possible solution to the financial problems facing many of the performing arts. He said the only other answer would be for private corporations to subsidize orchestras. "By and large," he added, "corporations in the West don't do very much for symphonies."

Negro Proportion Of War Dead Falls Slightly

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon says the proportion of Negro servicemen killed in Vietnam has declined a bit, while the percentage serving in the war zone has risen. A summary released recently showed that at mid-year 1967, 13.7 percent of the 25,616 Americans killed in Vietnam were Negro. The percentage stood at 14.1 at the end of the 1967. The ratio of Negroes serving in Vietnam, Thailand and aboard Navy vessels in offshore waters was 10.5 per cent at mid-1968, compared to 9.8 per cent six months earlier. The U.S. population was listed as 10.5 per cent Negro in the 1960 census. The Defense Department initiated the racial breakdowns after some Negro leaders complained Negroes were bearing a disproportionate share of the fighting in Vietnam. 10 Jeeps Add To Capability Of CAP In Search Operations

The Idaho Wing Civil Air Patrol is increasing ground search and rescue capability with 10 Jeeps recently acquired from an Army base in Arizona. These Jeeps are being re-conditioned, painted and equipped with a radio at the Blue Lakes Mobil Station at Filer Avenue and Blue Lakes Boulevard South. Surplus cocks from the Japanese green pheasant experimental program are being released along with ring-necked in the five northernmost counties.

Probably the best pheasant hunting in northern Idaho is in the lower Clearwater River drainage, particularly some areas of Tammany and Lapwai counties, according to Elmer Norberg, game bird supervisor. He added that years ago pheasant habitat north of the Salmon River, near timberline at this time of year, and on south fork facing open grassy slopes within timbered areas. Chukar partridge, once found in numbers on the lower Clearwater and Salmon rivers, and in Hells Canyon of the Snake from Lewiston to Weiser.

Pheasant hunting in southern and eastern Idaho opens next week on October 20. Average yearling pheasant shooting is anticipated.


