Udall Approves Project To Provide Additional Water For Salmon Tract

BOISE (Special to the Times)—The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers overruled the long-awaited decision which would have authorized construction of the Salmon Falls Dam flood control project. The project, which would have provided additional water for the Salmon Falls Division Reclamation Project, was approved by the U.S. House of Representatives in July, 1967, but was vetoed by the Senate.

Business Beckons Onassis

ATHENS (AP) — Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis' bridgegoing of four days left her for the first time Thursday, interrupting their honeymoon to fly to Athens on business.

While shipping magnate Aristotle Onassis worked at his downtown Athens office, his bride remained on his palatial yacht Christina moored at Scyros, his private island in the Ionian Sea 300 miles northwest of Athens.

Onassis was expected to fly back to Scyros Thursday night to join his bride.

At present, Onassis is negotiating a \$300 million contract with the Greek government for an industrial complex consisting of an oil refinery, aluminum plant and related installations.

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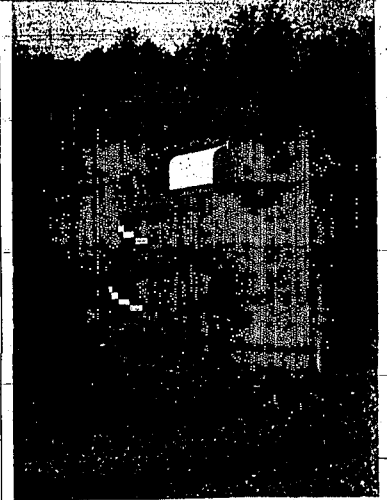

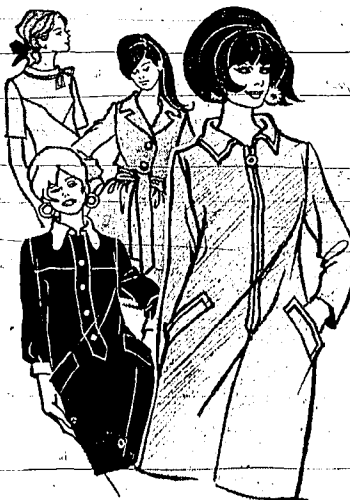

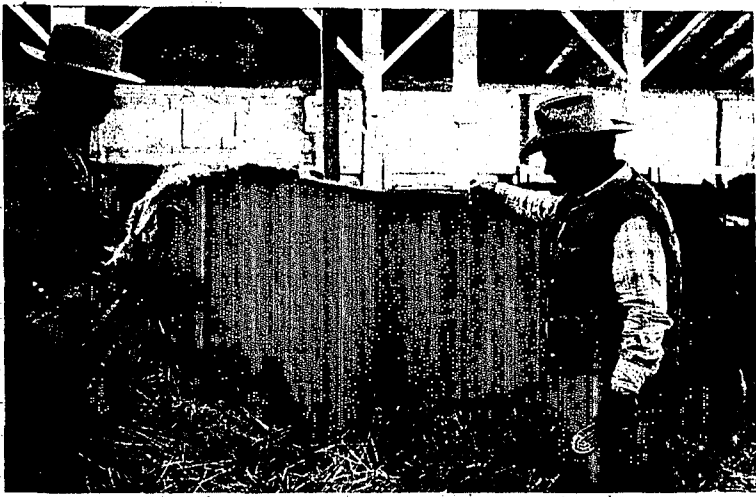

UNIONDALE, N.Y. (AP)—A home after her husband, Coye, wife's request for police protection led to the discovery of counterfeit money printing facilities in a secret room and the arrest of her bartender husband, police said.

News Story Cites History Of Suspect

CHICAGO (AP)—James Earl Ray, charged with the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., worked in a north suburban restaurant for two months in early 1967. The Chicago Tribune said Wednesday in a copyrighted article.

Thursday morning editions, said that Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Klingemann, owners of the Indian Trail Restaurant in suburban Wheeling, hired Ray as a dishwasher shortly after his escape April 3, 1967, from the Missouri State Penitentiary in Jefferson City.

They found the employee who gave the name John L. Rayns, so efficient that they raised his salary from \$103 to \$117 a week, Mrs. Klingemann told the Tribune.

However, she said that Ray seemed preoccupied, received several phone calls a week, and one day before he quit—received a strange, unidentified visitor at the back door.

The Klingemanns were unaware that John L. Rayns was really James Earl Ray until mid-August, when a magazine writer, commissioned by Ray to write his life story, contacted them.

They then informed the FBI.

Philanthropist Endorses 'Youth'

NEW YORK (AP)—"Instead of worrying about how to suppress the youth revolution, we of the older generation should be worrying about how to sustain it," says John D. Rockefeller III.

The 62-year-old philanthropist, in a speech Wednesday accepting the Family of Man Award from the Society for the Family of Man, urged the older generation to "re-examine our assumptions—and our laws," and to open more "channels of communication" with young people.

The proper way to respond to young protesters, Rockefeller suggested, "is simply to be responsive—to trust our young people, to listen to them, to understand them, to let them know that we care deeply about them."

United Fund Aid To USO Is Urged By Local Official

The local branch of United Service Organization receives all its funds through the Twin Falls United Fund Drive, according to Tommy Walker, local representative.

Mr. Walker had his first experience with the USO during World War II in Australia. He said the USO people provided a "home away from home" for many of the servicemen. The centers could go to the USO center, have homemade cookies and coffee and enjoy themselves playing ping pong, pool, or cards. He said sometimes the USO gave dances at the centers. Since this time many USO centers have been established throughout the world, bringing "clean" entertainment to American GIs.

The 1967 USO annual report said it has completed and financed the expansion of USO in Vietnam, bringing the total number of clubs there to 17, with other clubs being opened in Thailand, Taiwan and Malta. In 1967 the curtain rose on more USO shows than at any time since they were organized in World War II. Through USO, many American soldiers are able to see big name entertainers.

Mr. Walker stressed that USO is appreciated by the men overseas and Twin Falls people do have a responsibility to support their boys overseas through the United Fund.

LBJ Praises Efforts To Cut Poverty

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson cited Wednesday "the campaign ribbons" he said he and his antipoverty workers have earned during the past five years in moving seven million Americans out of poverty.

But, he said, regardless of "the kind of politics you preach," two jobs will face the next president — "to sustain what we have begun" and "to chip away at the remaining 27 million" still remaining in poverty.

The President spoke in the White House Cabinet Room to 23 regional directors of the Office of Economic Opportunities (OEO).

He said achievements of the past five years included starting an army of 600,000 volunteers in antipoverty efforts, sending two million pre-schoolers to Headstart, trying to teach a skill to over four million unskilled and untrained young people and engaging in "the biggest manhunt in our history to find the hard-core unemployed in our teneming ghettos, to hire them, to train them and to retrain them."

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Sen. Thurmond Campaigns For Nixon

STATESBORO, Ga. (AP) — A Wallace vote is a wasted vote, Sen. Strom Thurmond said Wednesday night as he swung up a two-day Georgia tour designed to woo supporters of third-party presidential candidate George C. Wallace to Republican Richard M. Nixon.

Addressing a crowd estimated at 2,000, Thurmond said votes for Wallace would help put Democrat Hubert H. Humphrey in the White House.

Wallace has no chance of winning nationally, but he could draw enough votes to throw the presidential election into the U.S. House of Representatives, where Humphrey would have the best chance of being chosen president, the South Carolina Republican said.

Earlier, Thurmond predicted Nixon will carry six Southern states and Wallace will carry the others.

The six states Thurmond said Nixon will carry are Virginia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Florida, Texas and Tennessee.

Constitutional Amendment Outlined By Women's Group

As a part of its activity to inform voters of the issues in the forthcoming election, the League of Women Voters of Twin Falls provides this information concerning the amendment HJR 4. HJR 4 provides that vacancies in the office of justice of the Supreme or District Court, Secretary of State, Treasurer, Auditor, Attorney General, or Superintendent of Public Instruction, shall be filled by the governor as provided by law. The specific purpose of this amendment is to clarify and eliminate conflict in constitutional language which now exists between Section 6 Article IV and Section 19 Article V. It is to make clear that the legislature may establish by law the provisions by which the governor is to fill such vacancies. As an example, the legislature in creating the Judicial Council in 1967, declared that any vacancy in the Supreme or District Courts was to be filled by the governor from names recommended by law. HJR 4 would make it clear within the constitution that the legislature could enact such re-

Lynda Bird's Friend Gains Overseas Position

WASHINGTON (AP) — Warren G. Young, a close friend of President Johnson's oldest daughter, is being sent to Chile as a U.S. Information Agency officer even as scores of USIA officers are being recalled from overseas.

Miss Smith, a frequent guest at the White House, was maid of honor when Lynda Bird Johnson married Marine Capt. Charles Robb last December. She and Mrs. Robb earlier had been roommates at the University of Texas.

Her appointment as a foreign service reserve officer came last February, less than a month after President Johnson ordered a reduction in government employment overseas in order to reduce the U.S. balance of payments deficit.

Since then, a USIA spokesman said, the agency's 2,100-man officer corps has been reduced by 68. Sixty USIA officers have been transferred back to Washington from foreign posts, he said, and further cuts are planned.

In his January directive, the President also ordered all department and agency heads to reduce official travel outside the United States to the minimum consistent with orderly conduct of the government's business.

The USIA confirmed, in response to an inquiry, that Miss Smith was being assigned as assistant cultural affairs officer in Santiago, and disclosed she will visit four capitals en route to Chile.

She will leave Washington Nov. 4.

There are three categories of foreign service officers in the USA:

1. Foreign Service Officer. He gets his appointment only after passing a rigorous competitive examination.
2. Foreign Service Staff Officer. He, too, must pass a foreign service entrance examination prior to appointment.
3. Foreign Service Reserve Officer. No competitive exam is required. The applicant, fills out the necessary papers, goes before a panel of foreign service officers and takes a language aptitude test.

There have been only six appointments since Jan. 1. The other five all had extensive experience and entered the service at grades paying up to \$25,000 a year.

Reserve officers receive the same pay and allowances as foreign service officers.

In a government booklet entitled "The Foreign Service of the United States," reserve officers are described as "persons with highly specialized skills not readily available in the foreign service who serve for limited periods."

"With rare exceptions," it adds, "a candidate for a foreign service reserve appointment must have passed his 31st birthday."

Miss Smith is one of the "rare exceptions." She is 24.

Age 31 is mentioned in the booklet, an official said, because that is the cutoff age for eligibility to take the competitive examination required for regular foreign service officers.

Miss Smith entered the Foreign Service Institute in suburban Arlington, Va., on Feb. 26 for Spanish language training.

When she completed the 28-week course on Oct. 4, a spokesman said, she had attained an S-2 rating—meaning she can speak Spanish well enough "to satisfy routine social demands and limited official demands."

In preparation for her transfer to Santiago, Miss Smith is receiving additional training at the USIA and State Department here, but efforts to contact her for an interview were unsuccessful.

Bishops Warn Priests on Faith

LONDON (AP) — The Roman Catholic bishops of England and Wales gave their priests a virtual ultimatum Thursday that they must refrain from opposing papal teaching in all matters of faith and morals.

Those unwilling to do so can be removed at the discretion of their bishop, said a letter from John Cardinal Heenan, head of the hierarchy, following a three-day meeting of the bishops last week.

It was the second meeting the Bishops had held in a month to decide a policy toward priests who oppose Pope Paul's encyclical forbidding artificial means of birth control.

Already several such priests have been suspended from preaching and disclosed she will visit four capitals en route to Chile.

Jury Declares Wreck Victim Was Drinking

SHERIDAN, Wyo. (AP) — A coroner's jury has ruled that an Idaho man killed in a traffic accident in downtown Sheridan Monday had an unsafe amount of alcohol in his blood.


Killed was John Heine, 23, Coeur d'Alene. His pickup went out of control, crossed a median, made a U-turn and smashed into a parked truck.

The jury found that Heine died of head injuries.

It was the first traffic death in Sheridan in five years.

Sen. Muskie Lists Hazard Of Wallace.

NEWARK, N.J. (AP)—Sen. Edmund S. Muskie Wednesday condemned George Wallace in the strongest terms he has used in the campaign and wall late Wallace supporters in a Polish-American neighborhood that they would "be among the first to be destroyed by this kind of doctrine."

Muskie, the Democratic vice presidential candidate, gestured angrily toward a small knot of youths who held a 4-foot Wallace banner at a rally of about 1,000 persons in the Newark suburb of Irvington.

"Mr. Wallace's forbears in the 1920s came up to New England—the Klan—they came up and when were they fighting there? They were fighting the Poles and the Italians and the Lithuanians and all these foreigners from overseas," said the Maine senator, whose father came to America from Poland in 1903.

Candidates Swap Pledges, Charges

By The Associated Press

Democrat Hubert H. Humphrey pledged efforts Thursday to reduce the "balance of terror" in U.S.-Soviet relations if elected president and said he favors a supervised worldwide reduction in arms and military spending.

But Republican Richard M. Nixon charged Humphrey is too talkative for delicate diplomacy abroad and said the Democratic political beliefs and philosophy "are hopelessly inadequate" for crises at home.

Third party candidate George C. Wallace, meanwhile, said he'd welcome an hour-long television "debate" with Humphrey the following night.

But Nixon's camp said Wallace's proposal doesn't change a thing and the debate matter is "closed."

Humphrey said today he supports early U.S.-Soviet talks to end the missile race and beyond that favors worldwide "supervised and carefully safeguarded"—reductions in arms and military spending.

"We cannot live forever in a world where our safety, and our security depend on a precarious balance of terror," he said in remarks prepared for an appearance before clergymen in Los Angeles.

Nixon assailed Humphrey Wednesday as a man who has "been unable to mind his tongue when delicate negotiations are going on" and then called him the last hope at home "of the philosophy of atomism, welfareism, centralism and permissiveness."

The political beliefs and philosophy of Humphrey are hopelessly inadequate for the crises of our times," Nixon said in Grand Rapids, Mich.

Their failure is written in bitterness, and divisiveness and violence of American life today.

Nixon offered no personal comment on Wallace's Nixon-Humphrey debate proposal but a Nixon aide said Wallace obviously was seeking a way to get free television time.

"It doesn't change a thing," said press aide Ron Ziegler. "Our position has been that we will not enter into any form of debate that would provide a forum for Wallace."

Wallace made the proposal in

Roanoke, Va. He said 39 minutes the night after the Nixon-Humphrey debate would be all he'd need to "fix both of them."

Dr. Frank Stanton, president of the Columbia Broadcasting System, sent telegrams inviting both Humphrey and Nixon to appear on a special "Face the Nation" program Sunday night at 8 p.m. EDT in line with Wallace's proposal.

In other political developments:

Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, the Democratic vice presidential candidate, compared Wallace to Ku Klux Klansmen who harassed Polish and other ethnic groups in New England in the 1920s.

"We've got to beat him so badly," Muskie said in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., "that his kind and his message is never heard from again in America."

Gov. Spiro T. Agnew, the GOP vice presidential candidate, said in Joplin, Mo.: "If there's ever a time for violence, it's in the attack on crime."

Curtis E. LeMay, the American independent vice presidential candidate, said he favors birth control and legal abortion.

"I'm as religious a person as anyone," he said in Birmingham, N.Y., "but think the good Lord put us on this earth to think a bit for ourselves."

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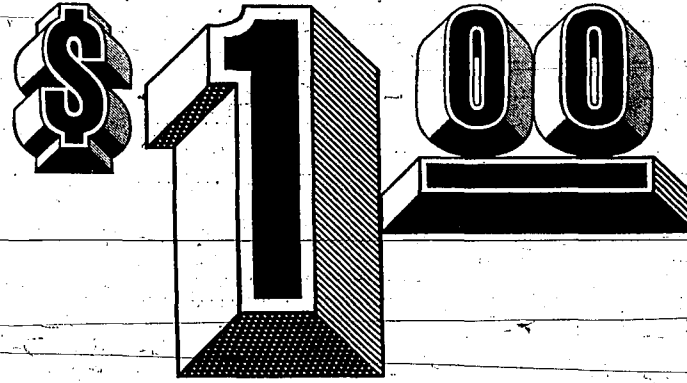

Pilot Would Try New Test Flight

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — Air Force Maj. Gerald Gentry says he is "anxious to try again as soon as we can find out what went wrong" in the first powered-flight test of a wingless, wedge-shaped prototype of a space plane.
 The craft, designated the X-15, "lifting body," was dropped Tuesday from a B-52 bomber eight miles high. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration wanted Gentry, 33, to ignite two chambers of a four-chamber 8,000-pound thrust engine and then climb to 45,000 feet. One chamber ignited, but repeated attempts to start any of the others failed.
 Gentry, who handled the 22-foot craft in previous glide tests, jumped without power on Rosamond Dry Lake 18 miles from his intended point.
 Later versions of the X-15 may ferry astronauts back from orbit.

 NEW YORK (AP) — After having been frustrated for at least two years by rising prices and high-borrowing charges, many potential homeowners seem to have made a decision to act now and buy.
 This at least is suggested by the recent high number of housing starts, a startling figure of 1.5 million units for September.
 That was the highest rate since early 1964 and came as a surprise even to some real estate people.
 For many months Americans had been delaying home purchases primarily because mortgage rates were rising sharply. But as they delayed, they saw the prices of homes rise as fast or even faster.
 In the past three years, for example, some young couples with their eyes fixed on what they believed was a \$20,000 home have found to their dismay that it is now priced at \$25,000, or beyond their capacity to finance.
 No wonder then that purchase decisions are being made. An inflationary psychology, never long absent from the real-estate market, seems now to have won over caution.
 Inflationary psychology develops in this way: Prices rise and the consumer retreats, even lowering his living standards to offset the higher prices. After a couple of years, however, his attitude might change. Gradually he comes to feel that if he doesn't buy now he'll pay even more tomorrow.
 Over a long period of time this psychology always makes its impact on the real estate market. As population increases the amount of space per person

Cancer Society Assails Smoking

NEW YORK (AP) — The American Cancer Society, favoring what it called unchanged social acceptance of cigarette smoking and zealous advertising, said Wednesday it will try to change the nation's smoking habits.

The society's national board, assembled from 50 states, adopted a nine-point program that will stress that "giving up cigarette smoking is immediately rewarding and offers a more pleasurable and longer life."

Two key aspects of the program are:

"We should strive to secure the elimination of cigarette advertising in all media. It is hoped that this can be achieved by voluntary self-regulation and that governmental action will not be necessary."

"We should . . . support federal legislation . . . including proposals to make the warning label on cigarette packages more accurate, to place warnings on all cigarette advertising and to require the industry to list on packages and in advertising the tar and nicotine content in cigarettes."

In 1960, the society said, when it began its public education program, there were 36,520 lung cancer deaths. This year, the society said, 55,000 are expected; next year, 59,000.

The society said cigarettes also have been linked to oral cancer and cancer of the larynx, esophagus and bladder and to cardiovascular disease, chronic bronchitis and emphysema.

"While medical research has produced a clear picture of the threat of cigarette smoking," it said, "their social acceptability and the energy with which they are promoted have not been essentially reduced."

The society said it believes in the right of adults to decide if they will smoke, but added "We do not see enough real freedom in this decision in our society."

For youngsters, the society said, there is the lure of their contemporaries' smoking and glamorous advertising. "The adult smoker finds his habit confirmed not only by each cigarette he smokes but by a variety of social pressures."

Farmers, merchandisers, manufacturers, advertising agencies, newspapers, and magazines, publishers and retailers are urged to draw income from cigarettes," the society said. "Tax benefits are considerable to federal state and city governments."

Those who cannot stop smoking cigarettes, the society said, should be encouraged to use low tar and low nicotine cigarettes or pipes or standard cigars.

"Pipe and cigar smokers run a risk of cancer of the mouth," the organization said, but "the threat to their life is not very great."

Federal Count Of Car Theft Faces Youth

A 15-year-old Seattle youth taken into custody Wednesday morning in Twin Falls will be transported to Boise to stand trial in Federal District Court, according to Jack Newell, local agent for the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Mr. Newell said Franklin Thomas Wilkes was arraigned Wednesday afternoon before U. S. Commissioner Harry B. Turner on a charge of interstate transportation of a motor vehicle.

"Bond was set at \$500 and upon failure to post that amount, the Wilkes youth was remanded to the custody of the Twin Falls County Sheriff."

Mr. Newell said that Twin Falls Police officer Jerry Pack apprehended the youth on a traffic violation about 1 a.m. Wednesday.

Mr. Newell said that when the youth could produce no proof of ownership for the car he was driving he was taken to the police station for questioning.

A check with the FBI National Crime Information Center revealed that the car had been stolen in Seattle.

Mr. Newell said that another youth was with Wilkes, but was not in the car at the time officers stopped Wilkes. He said he was apparently near the scene, however, and is believed to have fled.

Drastic Changes Anticipated In Medicine Will Virtually Eliminate Family Doctors

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — No less an authority than Dr. Dwight Locke Wilbur, president of the American Medical Association, says the practice of medicine will change drastically over the next 10 to 15 years.

"It won't be what people want—or think they want. But it will be what they need—the best medical care possible under the circumstances of those times," Wilbur said in an exclusive interview dealing with current and future problems of medicine.

In the future, the family doctor will be almost as extinct as a "dodo" when you're hurt or sick, you'll go to the nearest hospital for emergency treatment, administered by physicians especially trained in these procedures.

If necessary, you'll be referred to a specialist, working not in a private office but in a large center with other specialists, sharing facilities they singly could not provide.

You may not even see the doctor on your initial visits. Your case history will be taken by assistants—even, eventually, by computers. Trained aides may do some of the preliminary examination.

Group practice is the growing trend," says Wilbur. "It saves the doctor's time—there aren't nearly enough of them to go around—and it saves the patient's money."

The kindly old gentleman with the bedside manner was wondrous in his day, Wilbur says, but society can no longer afford him. The modern doctor is more efficient, more scientific and less subject to error.

Unfortunately, he is often more impersonal. But people are already beginning to accept this, Wilbur says, as they are beginning to accept changes in all areas of personal service.

Electric Shock Kills Builder

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A construction worker was killed by electric shock Wednesday while placing water pipe in a trench.

The victim was Dean Baxter, 47, Lehi. The sheriff's office said he was touching pipe which was in contact with a crane.

The crane brought a power line.

Blake is a physician and so are two of his three sons.

Despite his high office, Wilbur now 65, is a practicing physician—he came to the interview from a round of hospital calls. And when he leaves his AMA post next June he'll happily resume his specialty as an internist. "I'll be glad to get back," he says. "I'd rather do that than anything."

Wilbur believes the revolution in medical treatment will come as an answer to today's problems.

"Far too many people are failing to receive the benefits of a physician," he says. "There are at least four barriers which must be lowered.

"One is ignorance of the benefits which we find in many slums and rural areas. Some simply do not know what modern medicine can do for them and they turn to self-medication or to quacks.

"Two closely linked barriers are financial and geographical. Even where the medical service is free, it may cost a sick person all of a working day to go to and from a distant medical center.

"Then there's the status barrier. Minority groups are not comfortable in the presence of doctors. They find it difficult to communicate with educated personnel.

"It will take time to overcome these barriers, but it can be done through education and government assistance and ingenuity."

Utah Democrats Back Liquor Bill

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—The Forum for Democratic Responsibility, a Utah organization of young persons affiliated with the Democratic Party, says advertising claims by opponents of the liquor by the drink proposal were "outright dishonesty."

The group issued Wednesday a strong condemnation of the misleading statements regarding the proposal and the flagrant misrepresentation of legal aspects of the bill.

The organization said statements that the proposal gives too much power to the Liquor Control Commission, was erroneous in that the proposed bill "includes the same standard of legal protection to the citizens of Utah granted by almost every section of the state government."

The F.D.R. said claims that bars could be opened near schools and homes were false as the bill "retains all of the zoning protection for our communities and homes that we now enjoy."

Hall Of Fame Looking For New Inductee

NEW YORK (AP) — Vincent Stevenson turned up unexpectedly once before and the College Football Hall of Fame hopes lightning strikes twice.

Stevenson, who quarterbacked the University of Pennsylvania to the national championship in 1904, is one of 13 men who will be inducted into the Hall of Fame Dec. 3 at the National Football Foundation's annual banquet here.

But Stevenson was last heard of almost 20 years ago and Penn officials have no record of him

since 1949. The name drew a blank at Stevenson's last known address in Philadelphia.

In an effort to locate him, the Hall of Fame placed notices in Philadelphia papers this week.

"We hope the newspaper stories will poke him out," said Jimmie McDowell of the Hall of Fame. "If he's alive he must be close to 90."

Stevenson was given up for lost during World War II. In his 60s, he went to sea with the Maritime Service and was reported missing in action at sea. But he turned up in Philadelphia in 1949 and got a hearty laugh out of reports of his death.

Stevenson then announced that he would retire either in Philadelphia or on the West Coast. That was the last anyone heard of him.

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Kaye Hall and Charles Hickox won their second gold medals and Sharon Wichman became the first U.S. woman breaststroke champion in Olympic history Wednesday night while a scandal involving alleged payoffs to athletes swirled around the Olympic Village.

Mike Burton also won his event, the 400-meter freestyle, giving the U.S. corps—a gold medal sweep of all four swimming finals for the night and 16 victories in 22 swimming and diving events overall.

Miss Hall, a high school senior from Tacoma, Wash., shattered the world record in the 100-meter backstroke, winning in 1:06.2. She earlier had won a gold medal as part of the U.S. girls' team that took the 400-meter medley relay race.

Howe Signs 2-Year Pact With Detroit

DETROIT (AP) — Forty-year-old Gordie Howe, the National Hockey League's career goal-scoring leader, with signed a two-year contract Wednesday and intimated he would retire when it terminates.

"It would depend on how I feel. But this is my last contract," said the star Detroit Red Wings' right-winger, now in his 23rd season in the NHL.

Financial details were announced, but it is estimated that Howe's salary per year was increased from \$40,000 to \$70,000. "Gordie is right up there with the top ones in salary," said Sid Abel, the Wings' general manager.

Chicago stars Bobby Hull and Stan Mikita and Boston defenseman Bobby Orr are also believed to be among the highest paid players in the NHL. Hull's estimated salary is \$85,000, Mikita's \$75,000 and Orr \$65,000.

Howe scored 39 goals and had 43 assists last season to finish third in the scoring race. "I can honestly admit that the game is getting tougher," he said after signing the new pact. The deal replaced a two-year agreement which had another year to run.

When he quits the game Howe will devote his energies to his job as a vice president and accountant executive with the Olympia Agencies Inc., owned by Frank Rowe, who also owns the Red Wings.

Last year's overall Magic Valley success proved out 3 birds per man on the opening day and this is a shade under what generally satisfies the department and the public.

"We have been, and will be, operating checking stations at the same spots for the same number of hours for about 15 years," Blake pointed out. "We find the results of these checks correct to the limits of percentage points in gauging our hunting seasons."

Commission To Set 1968 Fishing Rules

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Fish and Game Commission began Wednesday consideration of the regulations which will govern fishing in 1968.

Adoption of the regulations is expected by the commission Thursday.

The commission heard preliminary reports on success of the upland game bird and big game hunting seasons. They indicated the deer kill is up significantly from last year and the elk harvest is up slightly.

Statewide, the commission was told the number of big game hunters was up about 13 percent over that in 1967.

Success in the north Idaho pheasant season, which opened Oct. 2, was widely reported better than a year ago. In the south the pheasant season opens Saturday and game officials said the outlook is for some improvement over 1967 in south central and southeastern areas with little change in the southwest.

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP) — Breaking the immortal George Gipp's 37-year-old record by turning into the emotions of The Associated Press College Back of the Week.

"I didn't know how most of the rest Notre Dame fans were going to feel about it because Gipp has always been such a part of Notre Dame football tradition," said Hanratty Wednesday.

"But now I guess all the alumni and friends of the university who remember that records are made to be broken because so far the mail has brought nothing but congratulations.

"Breaking the record made me feel just like I broke a piece of my mother's expensive china."

The modest 6-1, 205-pound senior from Butler, Pa., did not play a full game in Notre Dame's 35-0 rout of Illinois Saturday, but he passed for 212 yards and three touchdowns and ran for 55 more yards. "It boosted his career yardage to 4,178, wiping out Gipp's mark of 4,110 that had stood for nearly a half century."

Firestone Ends Racing Contract

AKRON, Ohio (AP) — The Firestone Tire and Rubber Co., one of the oldest names in motor racing, confirmed Wednesday it will temporarily suspend its championship and stock-car racing.

"Until contract fees are more realistic Firestone will sign no drivers, mechanics or sponsors or racing teams," a spokesman said.

Italian-born Mario Andretti, whose contract with Firestone expires in January, is presently the only driver under contract to the company.

Andretti's spokesman said Andretti's contract may not be renewed "for all intents and purposes" the company will be out of motor racing by the beginning of the 1969 season.
