Halloween Pranks Reported In T. F.

Not all the goblins and witches that were out for Halloween in Twin Falls Thursday night were friendly.

An 11-year-old boy whose family had just moved to Twin Falls, had an unhappy ending to his night's trick-or-treat activities.

Being new in the community he did not have friends to accompany him, but he decided to go out alone. About 9:30, he returned home with a few treats.

His parents were not home so he ran to the house of a neighbor. He told the woman he was on his way home with a sack of treats and out through the back wood shopping center where two high school age girls accosted him. They hit him in the stomach knocking him down. They then took his sack of candy and other treats.

Adults in the area ignored his cries for help, but his parents, the neighbor who asked for his name not be used, said he stayed at her home until his parents returned and that he continued to complain of pain from the blow in the stomach.

It was a quieter Halloween than some in recent years, however. Twin Falls City Police said that no major damage or destruction was done by the older pranksters on Thursday night.

The police department confiscated 43 dozen eggs, 20 dozen of them from one group of boys.

The eggs were given to the Salvation Army Friday morning.

One police department employee noted that it was "too bad they don't throw bacon, too."

The police blitzer showed nearly a dozen complaints of egg-throwing incidents were made Thursday night. Several incidents also complained of youths throwing tomatoes, but eggs were by far the most popular with pranksters.

There were reports of a man of young-friking-creators being hit with flying objects. One report, which has not been substantiated, showed a man and an older boy pulled a gun on some small children and took their treats.

There were several other reports of high school age youth stealing candy from children.

A fire-plug alarm was turned on and gushed water for several minutes before firemen arrived to turn it off.

A group of high school students were in a week about one and one-half miles south of Kimberly, according to Twin Falls County Sheriff officials.

Israeli Saboteurs Hit Arabs

TEL AVIV (AP) — Israeli commandos, retaliating against recent Egyptian attacks, crossed the Suez Canal and penetrated 12 1/2 miles into Egypt Thursday night to bomb two Nile bridges and a power station, the Israeli army announced.

The daring raid came five days after 10 Israeli troops were killed and 34 wounded in a battle across the canal which E. E. Oweis reported was attacked by Egypt. Israel claimed that at one point Egyptian commandos crossed the canal and engaged Israeli troops in a battle. It attempts to cross at two other points.

The Egyptian army claimed that it had killed and captured 10 Israeli soldiers and said one civilian was killed and two wounded. Israeli sources scoffed at the Egyptian explanation, saying President Gamal Abdel Nasser could not admit to his people that Israeli soldiers could make a raid so deep into Egypt.

In a communique announcing the raid, the Israeli army said: "The action aims to make it clear that the Israeli army is able to retaliate against the Egyptian aggression."

The size of the raiding party was not disclosed.

The announcement said the targets included: The new Qena Bridge 280 miles south of Cairo, the Nag Hammadi Bridge 35 miles west of the Qena area, the Nag Hammadi transformer station near the bridge and a 500-kilowatt high tension line linking Cairo and Assuan.

Cong Rockets Lash Hayoc In War Zone

SAIGON (AP) — American air, naval and artillery bombardment of all of North Vietnam ended tonight, President Johnson's order, the U.S. Command announced, but it said there would be no lull in operations in South Vietnam.

The U.S. Command showed signs of "declassification in the South. In the 12 hours before President Johnson's broadcast announcing the bombing halt, an enemy mine blew high in a U.S. Navy list and killed 16 American sailors and a South Vietnamese rocket attacks against the Viet Cong in the delta of Saigon and Hue, and 69 North Vietnamese and 12 Americans were killed in fighting north of Saigon near the Cambodian border.

American warplanes continued raids on North Vietnam's southern "pamphleteer" today but destroyed thousands of type before 6 p.m., or 8 a.m. EST, the hour Johnson set for all attacks on North Vietnam to be halted.

A spokesman for the U.S. Command in Saigon said all American troops that have been operating in the demilitarized zone were pulled back into South Vietnam about a week ago.

LBJ Halts Viet Bombing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Three years and nine months after he started the bombing of North Vietnam, President Johnson has ordered an end to all attacks against that country in the hope this will "lead to progress" in ending the war in southeast Asia.

Announcing his decision Thursday night, Johnson said he acted with the full support of his military chiefs and diplomatic advisers, and the agreement of South Vietnam, and upon "confirmation" from North Vietnam of "the essential understanding" of U.S. terms for his action.

The Johnson order injected a dramatic new element into the presidential election contest less than a week before the voters go to the polls.

Political observers said it could give a lift to Democratic nominee Hubert H. Humphrey's campaign, although it might have come too late to make much difference in voter opinion.

Republican nominee Richard M. Nixon, third party candidate Charles C. Wallace, and Humphrey all said after Johnson's television-rail broadcast, they hoped the step would mean progress in the Paris peace talks.

Johnson himself, obviously aware of speculation that he might time a bombing halt to help Humphrey, declared that the action was determined by responses from North Vietnam to his terms.

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Statement Issued On County Ruling

The Twin Falls County Commissioners issued a statement Thursday concerning a resolution passed last week that would require present county employees living outside the county to resign.

This ruling was determined earlier this week, would affect an undetermined number of employees at the Magic Valley Medical Center.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor Michael Felton, when asked for an opinion on the matter, said employees not residing in the county would be required to resign in the legal requirements set up in the county commission resolution.

At least two employees involved in the controversy at the hospital are registered nurses.

The commission statement, issued by Commission Chairman Haber, Loughmiller, said, "The August 1968 resolution of this board terminating county employees living outside the county was intended to limit the county payroll to those who help pay those payroll, county employees. This was an emergency thing but all in some areas is required by law."

He continued, "Our resolution however, was not intended to apply to hospital employees."

It also read, "The legal advice of the county, Michael Felton, has ruled that hospital employees are not county employees within the framework of the resolution. We have every intention of abiding by his advice. If doing this, we will have to review the whole question of county employee residency."

The statement ended by reading, "It is our intent to continue to get the best service for the least cost. We believe that if persons of equal ability are available, county jobs should go to them."

China Reds Oust Chief Of Nation

TOKYO (AP) — The Chinese Communist Central Committee announced today it has kicked President Liu Shao-Chi out of office after a long period of criticism and charges of crimes that generally spell imprisonment and possibly death.

Peking (New China News Agency) said Liu's final fall after months of criticism and struggle was voted by the enlarged plenary session of the Communist Party meeting in Peking Oct. 13-15.

The conference first since party chairman Mao Tse-tung moved against Liu in August, 1956 with his cultural revolution phase was a renewed vote of confidence and promised to "continue to settle accounts" with Liu and his accomplices.

Congressional Critics Applaud Bombing Halt

By The Associated Press — President Johnson's decision to halt the bombing of North Vietnam has drawn generally favorable reaction from doves and greeted with skepticism by some hawks.

Among the three major presidential candidates, Republican Richard M. Nixon declined to comment beyond saying he hoped the action "may bring some progress" in the Paris peace talks.

Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, the Democratic candidate, said the action was "a meaningful, very hopeful" and added, "Doves is closer tonight—thank God!"

Third-party candidate George C. Wallace said, "I hope and pray" that the halt will bring an early and honorable peace in Southeast Asia "so we can bring

the American service in a home.

Congressional doves saw the halt as the opening of a path to peace, while hawks questioned stopping the bombing without specific assurances of a general cessation from North Vietnam.

Sen. John M. Stennis, D-Miss., ranking Democrat on the Senate Armed Services Committee, said, "We should be able to judge their good intentions within two days, and unless this is shown, then we should re-substantiate and step up the bombing."

Stennis added, "I am inclined to doubt that there is any real change of position by North Vietnam."

On the other hand, three of the leading Democrats who had opposed administration Vietnam policy expressed pleasure over the move. Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy of Minnesota, J. W. Fulbright of Arkansas and J. B. Maguire of South Dakota all said they probably would support peace talks.

House Speaker John W. McCormack, D-Mass., termed the president's action "a calculated risk that he was justified in taking." He declined comment on whether it implied anything "the President had the highest motives."

House Minority Leader "Everett" M. Dirksen, R-Ill., said, "I don't think we should read too much into this development, although there may be some indication that bargaining at Paris now will begin in earnest."

But Dirksen cautioned not to expect too much now. "It is only a beginning," he said.

Senate Minority Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., said he had discussed a possible halt with the President two weeks ago and declared Johnson's move was "most encouraging."

Bubonic Plague Death Stirs Warning To Idaho Hunters

BOISE (AP) — For the first time in 18 years a fatal case of bubonic plague was reported today by the State Health Department.

Dr. John Mather, director of the preventive medicine division, said Leonard Nelson, 32, Salmon, died Oct. 23 in a Salmon hospital after he had been bitten by a chipmunk on Oct. 23.

Mather said Nelson was working as a guide in the middle fork of the Salmon River area and apparently contracted the plague after he killed and skinned a snowshoe rabbit. Nelson became ill on Oct. 10 and was hospitalized Oct. 23.

Mather said the only other reported case of plague in Idaho was in 1950, a fatal case caused by bubonic plague was reported today by the State Health Department.

There is no cause for alarm for persons planning to go into the middle fork area on hunting trips, Mather said. He said, however, they should avoid trapping or handling rabbits, pick rats, chipmunks or squirrels.

He said a study of small rodents in the area will be undertaken to determine the nature and extent of the outbreak. He said plague often has been found in small rodents, particularly ground squirrels in many areas of Idaho.

Reds Still Face Bombing To Halt Travel To South

SAIGON (AP) — The end of the U.S. bombing and shelling of North Vietnam does not mean the end of the aerial campaign against North Vietnamese troops and supply columns heading for the South.

Most of these columns do not pass within miles of the frontier between North and South Vietnam. They travel through neighboring Laos along what is called the Ho Chi Minh Trail.

More than half of the bombs dropped by U.S. pilots in recent

months have been aimed at trucks and men on this trail. It is part of a major bombing campaign carried out in Laos since late 1964. Although neither the U.S. nor the Laotian government has admitted that anything other than armed reconnaissance missions are being flown, every type of U.S. warplane including the giant B-52s has flown raids on targets in Laos.

The bombing of North Vietnam is stopping at a time when heavy monsoon clouds make raids here only marginally effective. The bad weather will continue until late March or April, the Defense Dept. says. Force officers have said that if a bombing halt had to come, they would prefer it during the winter in Laos when the weather is fair and they step up the bombing there.

8 Students Face Charges After Protest

SEATTLE (AP) — Eight Negro students at Highline Community College were arrested Thursday at the end of a sit-in to protest an item in the school newspaper.

About 20 took part in the demonstration in the newspaper office, but most left when officers ordered them to. The eight arrested refused to leave and barricaded a door with furniture.

Harrison Allen, 25, one of those arrested and president of the 70-member Students for a Democratic Society at the college, said Negro students and white sympathizers sought a retraction of the item from student editor John Nelson. Allen said when Nelson declined, the sit-in was staged to get an apology or Nelson's removal as editor.

Allen said the item was in the form of a horoscope published Oct. 4 and saying under the sign of sagittarius: "A terrible fate will befall you this week. You will walk through the Central District. Need I say more?"

The Central District is Seattle's predominantly Negro area.

The main road of the Ho Chi Minh Trail runs through the Mu Gia Pass, on the Laotian-North Vietnamese frontier 170 miles north of the demilitarized zone. The roads through Communist portions of Laos can handle heavy trucks, including semi-trailers. Feeder roads begin branching off to South Vietnam 25 miles below the DMZ and continue at intervals for more than 200 miles.

President Johnson said unarmed reconnaissance of North Vietnam was not included in the aerial suspension. These flights can monitor traffic heading toward the Ho Chi Minh Trail so U.S. warplanes can begin pounding the columns as soon as they leave North Vietnam.

But military sources have said that despite the good weather and improved reporting, any bombing halt poses grave military risks.

They feel that if men and supplies are spared from destruction in the North, it cannot be assumed they will be destroyed in Laos. The number of troops and the amount of equipment infiltrated into South Vietnam during the full bombing campaign proves this, they say.

U.S. Marine commanders responsible for the demilitarized zone area have said privately they consider a bombing halt potentially disastrous because of the North Vietnamese artillery north of the frontier and the fact that North Vietnamese troops on the DMZ front could retreat north after heavy battles, refit and move back south through the DMZ for more fighting.

Any agreement to return the DMZ to a truly demilitarized character would be almost impossible to police, these officers have said. Several divisions are just north of the line not outfitted for what U.S. intelligence expects to be a major offensive south of the DMZ.

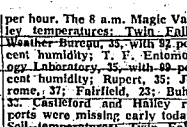

From Socialist To Black Power, Voters Face Wide Range Of Platforms

WASHINGTON (AP)—Voters who don't like Humphries, Nixon or Wallace will be able in some states to take their pick of presidential candidates running on platforms ranging from demands for peace now to fair treatment of visitors from outer space.

Twenty-five states will have presidential candidates on their ballots from at least one of the nine minor parties which have entered slates opposing the three major contenders.

Views for these candidates will be tabulated in most of the states—after ballots are counted for the three tickets that have qualified in all states—Richard H. Humphrey and Edmund Muskie for the Democrats; Richard M. Nixon and Spiro T. Agnew for the Republicans; and George E. Wallace and Curtis E. LeMay for the American Independents.

Here's a rundown on the minor parties and their standard bearers:

The Socialist Workers party, represented by Fred Halstead of New York, for president, and Carby in Arizona, for vice president, has the longest list of state entries among the minors—19.

A part of the Trotskyist movement that broke from Moscow Communism in 1928, it is basically a peace-Vietnam effort, this year, with Negro control of black communities as a second issue.

Halstead, 40, works for two prominent peace groups.

Boutelle, 36, is a Negro and was a follower of Malcolm X, the slain Black Muslim leader.

Next in the number of entries comes the Socialist Labor party, which claims to represent the original Socialist movement in the nation. It is on the ballot in 13 states.

The candidates are Henning A. Blumen, 57, of Cambridge, Mass., a machine assembler, for president, and George Sam Taylor, 43, of Philadelphia, an electronics technician, for vice president.

The Peace and Freedom party, another organization com-

mitted to withdrawal from Vietnam, and local power in black communities, is on nine ballots, but its candidates vary from state to state.

Eldridge Cleaver, information minister for the California-based Black Panthers is the formally chosen presidential candidate but entertainer Dick Gregory is the candidate of record in three states—New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania.

Cleaver is below the constitutional age minimum for president but the Constitution sets no age for candidates.

Gregory ran five state races for the three tickets that have qualified in all states. He is the nominee of the New party.

That recently formed organization generally has adopted Vietnam, poverty and racial policies from the late Sen. Robert F. Kennedy. Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy and Sen. George McGovern, all bidders for the Democratic, presidential nomination.

Besides backing Gregory in two states, it is offering its perennial bidder, offering Earl Harold, Mann Sr., Hillsdale,

Mich., and Roland E. Fisher, Topeka, Kan., in nine states.

Communist party candidates made the ballot in two states—Minnesota and Washington. The candidates are Charlene Mitchell, a Negro woman from Harlem, for president, and Michael Zagoroff of New York, the party's 24-year-old national youth leader.

The Constitution party has put Richard F. Traveler of Penn-

sylvania, Tex., and Merle Thayer, Davenport, Iowa, in North Dakota.

Kirby J. Hensley, a Modesto, Calif., minister, is bidding for the White House in Iowa under the banner of the Universal party.

Hensley, 56, got 19 votes for president in 1964. The Universal platform includes civil treatment for beings from other worlds who may visit this planet.

 LONDON (AP) — The new edition of the western world's best-known survey of military aircraft says the Soviet Union and the United States appear to have an unwritten agreement to limit their antiaircraft missile defenses.
 Citing U.S. proposals for negotiations to forestall construction of ABM systems, Editor John W. Taylor wrote in the 1968-69 edition of "Jane's All the World's Aircraft."
 "It is often claimed that the Russians may have tested at least 15 carrier rockets for this 'space bomb' system, sending them into space under the guise of Cosmos satellites for scientific research in space."
 Jane's said the first such test is believed to have been the Cosmos 139 shot on Jan. 25, 1967. A number of the Cosmos shots are believed by Western experts to have been satellites photographing foreign military installations.
 By coincidence, the Soviet Union launched Cosmos 250 today, described for the first time as a missile. The distance from the earth of its orbit—between 24 and 243 miles—appeared too high for it to be a bomb carrier or a reconnaissance vehicle.

Mr. Arstein was appointed to the agricultural affairs, insurance and conservation and resources committee. He was the only freshman legislator put on the ballot.

Both incumbent county commissioners in the second and third districts are opposed: Alex Roemer, Democrat in district 2, by Ronald M. Hawkes, GOP; and Republican Howard Hanks in district 3 by Wayne Holtzbock, Democrat.

Mr. Roemer is completing his eighth year as commissioner for the county, having taken office in January, 1961. He is a farmer.

Mr. Hawkes owns with his son, Glenn, the Hillcrest Dairy and has lived in Rupert since 1947. He served as county commissioner from 1953 until 1960.

He has also had experience as Minidoka County sheriff, having served from 1944 until 1951.

He is past president of the Western States Angus Association, having served two terms, and past president of the Idaho Angus Association, having served three terms.

A Rupert businessman for the past 25 years, Mr. Holtzbock is currently the public works advisor for the City of Rupert.

"All America desires an honorable peace and we must stand united behind the decision that has now been made and see what develops," Rep. Hansen said.

"One of the conditions we must sought from the communists was an end to the rocketing of South Vietnamese cities and villages," yet the scheduling of Saigon Thursday — ending a two-month lull on attacks of that city — at a cost of at least 23 lives did not seem to incorporate such a spirit of mutual cooperation and willingness to take the same stand toward peace that we have taken.

"I can only hope this is not a preface of what is to come," he concluded.

Bombing Halt Draws Note From Hansen

BOISE (Special) — Rep. George Hansen, Republican candidate for Senate, Thursday night expressed his hope that the latest developments in a bombing halt over North Vietnam were a meaningful step toward peace negotiations.

"I had hoped there would be more comprehensive and firm commitments from the other side, but now we can only hope they will follow our lead."

"One of the conditions we must sought from the communists was an end to the rocketing of South Vietnamese cities and villages," yet the scheduling of Saigon Thursday — ending a two-month lull on attacks of that city — at a cost of at least 23 lives did not seem to incorporate such a spirit of mutual cooperation and willingness to take the same stand toward peace that we have taken.

"I can only hope this is not a preface of what is to come," he concluded.

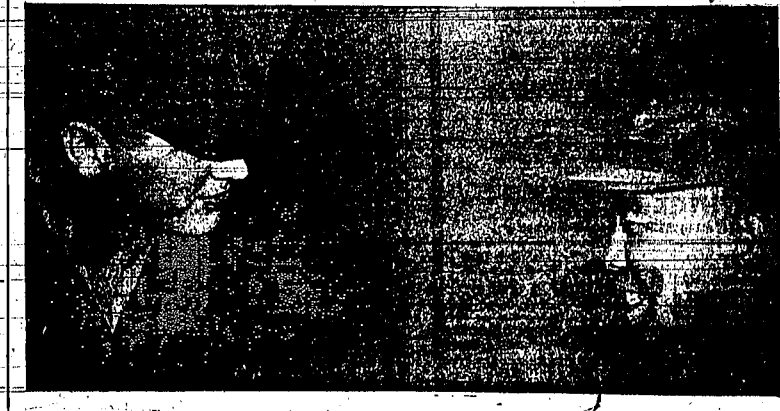

Meanwhile, the treasurer for the Democratic National Committee said a surge of contributions has upped the party's budget for the last week of the campaign to \$3 million, enabling them to match the Republicans dollar-for-dollar.

Queen Elizabeth II left a dull, rainy London by plane today for a two-week state visit to South America, the first trip there by a reigning British monarch.

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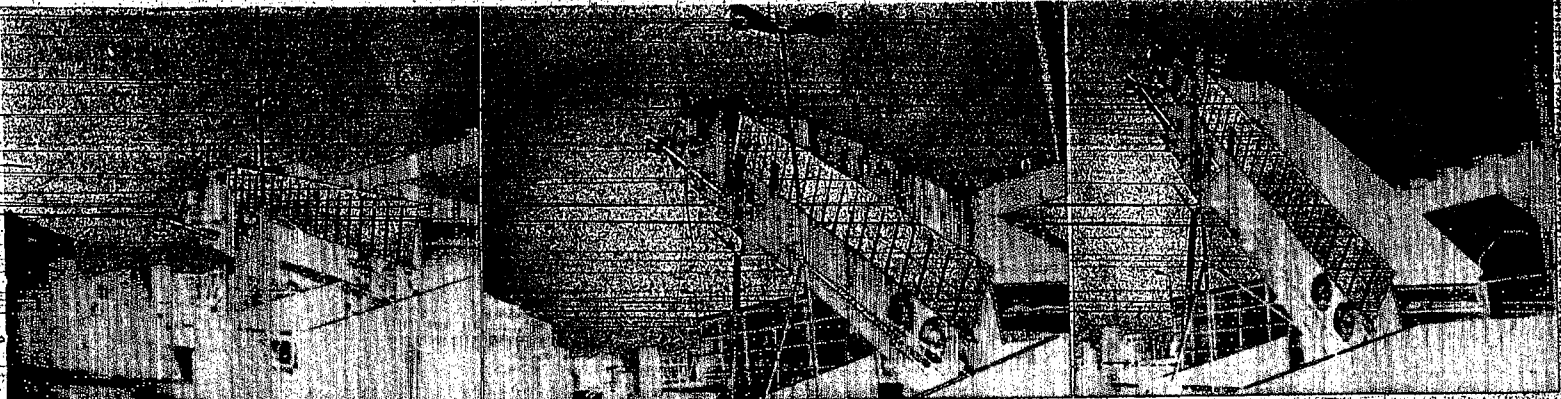

Sugar Beets Trucked To T.F. Factory

The Amalgamated Sugar Co. has been using rail road cars to haul sugar beets from area beet stock piles to either the Twin Falls or Mini-Cassia factories.

But because of sugar beets being produced this year on new land west of Buhl and Castleford and Glenns Ferry, there is no railroad near these stock piles. So large diesel trucks are being used to haul the beets from the stockpiles to the Twin Falls factory.

The sugar company has a three-year contract with Circle A Construction Co. for building a new truck dump at the factory. Owners of the construction firm are Leon and Myra Alett. Je-rome Leon Alett, a Democrat, is seeking the state representative post in Jerome County.

Currently, until the beets near Buhl and Glenns Ferry are stockpiled, the firm is hauling beets from Jerome to the sugar factory.

According to Robert Day, Twin Falls, assistant to the agriculturalist, Amalgamated Sugar Co., the trucks will be hauling beets from areas that are close to highways and the factory as well as those from the Balanced Rock and Brunau areas where there are no railroads.

In commenting about the quality of the beets this year, Mr. Day said they are very good and the sugar content is about one per cent over last year's.

Marvin Alett, co-owner, says nine trucks are hauling the beets from Jerome and when they start hauling the beets from the factory and back trucks will be used, and as many as 35 for the Brunau beets.

Each truck will haul between 25 and 28 tons of net sugar beets and each truck makes a round trip from the Jerome stockpile to the factory and back in about one hour and 15 minutes.

At the newly constructed truck dump at the Twin Falls factory, which raises the truck up to a 45-degree angle, a truckload of beets is unloaded every seven or eight minutes. About 2,500 tons of beets are trucked every day to the factory by the trucks.

The deck of the large truck bolt is 96 inches wide and 60 feet long. A truck is unloaded in about one minute.

Hauling of sugar beets is a winter job for the Circle A Construction Co. During the summer the firm is involved in construction work. Last winter the firm hauled about 200,000 tons of beets for Utah-Idaho Sugar Co. in eastern Idaho.

The Aletts also own a 220-acre farm in Jerome County and raise purebred Angus cattle.

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Tips Offered For Grub, Weed Control

JEROME — Wilmer Priest, Jerome County Extension Agent, offered advice on grub control in cattle and fall weed control.

Use of insecticides for control of cattle grubs should be done before Nov. 15 in this area, says Mr. Priest. At the present time the grubs are migrating into the throat and back area of the cattle.

They are small now and if they are killed at this stage of growth, they do not cause an up and laid on the surface, will dry up and die before winter freezing sets in. In addition, any seed which has sprouted this fall will not have developed permanent root and cultivation will not work the same as it will on annual weeds.

The application of soil sterilant during the late fall months is very effective. These sterilants are better when they have four to six inch supply of moisture over a six to eight inch period following application.

unfavorable reaction to the cattle. After the grubs gain additional size, adverse effects are rather common.

Systemic insecticides—a r'e nearly 100 per cent effective in killing grubs during their development period, but they should not be used on milk animals or on fat animals which will be slaughtered within 60 days.

Regarding fall weed control, Mr. Priest said, "Some of the most effective weed control work can be done in the late fall period." Dry cultivation of quackgrass and the application of soil sterilant are particularly effective.

Social Security Question Box

If you have any question about social security, address them to Jim Davis, Box 1238, Twin Falls, Idaho.

Q. My husband died the last day of the month, and I returned the social security check when it cleared a few days later. Will this check be re-issued to me?
A. No. Because under the law the last social security benefit is payable to the person who died. This is true even when the death is on the last day of the month. On the other hand, a full month's benefit is payable for the first month in which a person dies. But how about the income I get from rental of a house I own that is included in his \$1800?
A. No. The limit on earnings applies only to income earned from employment or self-employment. Income from investments such as rentals, interest and stocks does not affect your benefits.

Q. I will be 18 this month. I started college in September. Will my checks stop now that I am 18, or will I be able to get students benefits?
A. You will be eligible to get your checks every month, as long as you are unmarried, a full-time student, and under age 22. You can also get your benefits during regular school vacations of up to three months. However, I must also add that you will lose some of your social security benefits if you earn more than \$1680 in a year.

F.F. Auction Firm Refutes P&SA Charge

The charge against a Twin Falls livestock commission company in violating the Packers and Stockyards Administration regulations are false, say officials of the local firm.

A statement from the P&SA charges that the Stockyards Commission Co. during January and February, 1968, failed to maintain its least account books from the sale of consigned livestock.

L. S. (Mike) Utlican, president of the commission company, and Gene Larson, vice president, say they have proof that this is false. They said, "At all times we have maintained our least account books for proceeds from the sale of consigned livestock and at no time have we used money from the custodial or trust account for any other purposes. And as of the month accused, Jan. 31, 1968, the custodial account showed \$7,825.31 in the bank and on Feb. 29, 1968, the account showed \$3,145.47 in the bank. At no time has there been a check permitted in order to purchase the livestock. The firm permitted its auctioneer employees to purchase for their accounts livestock consigned for sale on commission. Mr. Larson said, "Cecil Patterson, the auctioneer, is accused of having purchased 11 head of livestock during the period of time checked by the P&SA examiners. Had these cattle been purchased on

Nixon, Humphrey Comment On Cattle Industry Situation

Presidential candidates Richard Nixon and Hubert H. Humphrey recently commented on the increasing problems that are facing the cattle industry.

In a recent speech in Dallas, Mr. Nixon said, "The cattle industry, our largest farm industry in terms of dollar sales, has been suffering from the growing demand of the American consumer for high quality beef. It has done so independently without any special government supporting programs."

"In the past 20 years, per capita consumption of beef in our country has risen from under 20 to more than 40 pounds a year. In the same period, the average portion of family income expended on food has actually declined by more than seven per cent."

"The cattle industry, however, has not kept pace with an increasing national prosperity because of a severe cost-price differential. The result has been that many small family farms have been forced to sell their company order number instead of by name, this would have been legal in the eyes of the law."

The third charge against the firm states that the firm failed to give full correct names of purchases on consignment accounts to show this. Officials of the local firm say, "For 20 years or more, this policy has been practiced by this auction yard and all other auction yards in Magic Valley that purchasers names are listed, for example, as follows: R.C. Gregory, R. C. Gregory, according to P&SA regulations we are guilty of concealing purchasers names, even though most of the cattle in this area they know that R.C. 4 is Ray Chug, Ray 5 is Ray McKintier and Hal 5 is Hal Bolton."

On the last charge by P&SA, the firm is charged with selling livestock for its president, Mr. Utlican, under assumed names. "Had Mr. Utlican desired to list his name for the consignment number, says Mr. Larson, instead of using the grower's name, this in the eyes of P&SA is legal. He chose to use the grower name for identification purposes because they were registered cattle and he felt it was fair for the buyers to know who the cattle came from and who the grower was."

"This was done only as a means of identifying the cattle because P&SA does not require identification of consigned livestock for the buyer. If we were attempting to hide the identity of livestock we probably would have been operating in harmony with P&SA regulations and would have used numbers only to identify said livestock."

The two officials also say that they do have complete records of all transactions involved in the operation of the business.

"The two added the legal restrictions being against the P&SA."

The only senior atop any individual category is Clewis Wright of Bethune-Cookman, the No. 1 punter with a 44.9 average.

In team categories, California-Riverside is first in total offense with an average of 447.8 yards a game. Los Angeles State is tops in passing offense at 292.2 a game. North Dakota State leads in rushing with 366.9 a game. Virginia State is ahead in total defense with 36.0 a game. Doane is first in scoring with a 48.1 average and Bethune-Cookman is No. 1 in punting with a 44.9 average.

A candidate for the office of Twin Falls County Prosecutor, Emil Pike is an experienced attorney who has lived in Twin Falls the past four years.

GOP Chief Claims Error By Senator

BOISE — Roland Wilber, Idaho state Republican chairman, has charged that Sen. Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., gave Idaho a distorted picture of the Senatorial seniority system in last-ditch attempt to save the Sen. to seat of Sen. Frank Church.

"Sen. Mansfield tried to fool an Idaho Falls audience into thinking that Church has a chance for a seat on the important Joint Atomic Energy Committee," Wilber said. "What he neglected to say is that the Democrats will have no voice whatsoever in filling the current vacancy on the committee."

Wilber said that the vacancy exists because of the retirement of Sen. Bourke Hickenlooper, R-Iowa, and must be filled by a Republican Senator.

"The appointment will be made by the Republican leadership, so any Democratic seniority is completely irrelevant," Wilber added. "George Hansen, Republican nominee for the Senate, has received assurance from Sen. George Murphy, R-Calif., that the Republican Senate leadership will give prime consideration to Hansen and Republican Senator Len Johnston."

"Wilber said that a Democratic vacancy would occur only in case of a death or surprise retirement by one of the Democratic Senators on the committee, none of whom are up for re-election—John Pastore, of Rhode Island; Richard Russell of Georgia; Clinton Anderson of New Mexico; Albert Gore of Tennessee or Henry Jackson of Washington."
