Long Voter Lines Form In Nation; Record Indicated

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans poured from their homes in massive numbers today to settle the cliff-hanging race for the presidency between Richard M. Nixon and Hubert H. Humphrey—or to throw the battle into the House.

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—From North Carolina came reports of the "heaviest turnout in memory." From Columbus, Ga., there are crowds like we have never seen.

In Mobile County, Ala., early voting appeared the heaviest in history. In the Kansas City area it was considerably heavier than usual. In Detroit, long lines were the rule, although the actual vote was somewhat below 1964.

Eighty people were in line when the polls opened at 6:30 a.m. in Columbus, Ohio, suburb. Cars were backed up for two miles at a Charlotte, N.C., precinct.

These early-bird voters were casting their ballots in climax to one of the most topsy-turvy presidential election campaigns in history.

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Change In Church Today: Has It Come Full Circle?

It came through loud and clear Monday night. The winds of change are blowing the ecclesiastical linen of the Christian Church.

And, if the opinions of the panel that discussed "The Crisis of Change in the Churches Today" at the third session of the Community Forum are an indication, the change may take the church back in the direction from which it came.

Not that it will go back to the inquisition, the political power or the dogmatic ways that tinted the skeletons in its closet, but, at least, back to the ceremonial, colorful celebration of the sacraments, the liturgy, the high point in the lives of mankind in the early days of the Christian era.

Also on the panel, members of the church, saw a need of the church's changing from an emphasis on words and content.

Fall Cleanup

Saigon 'Boycott' Delays Plans For Full-Scale Paris Peace Talks

PARIS (AP) — The first scheduled peace talks since the bombing halt in Vietnam, due Wednesday, were postponed today because of the absence of a delegation from the Saigon government.

A U.S. delegation spokesman, in announcing that the session "will not be held," added that the United States hopes the South Vietnamese government will send a negotiating team "in the near future."

Also, he said, certain procedural matters involving the proposed expanded phase of the Paris parity have not yet been agreed on, and U.S. and North Vietnamese envoys have been answering any questions "in procedural questions."

The postponement followed the refusal of South Vietnamese President Nguyen-Van Thieu to join the proposed four-party sessions which would also include the Viet Cong's National Liberation Front.

"We will not talk with the NLF in Paris and no one can force us to do such a thing," Thieu said in Saigon.

The Saigon boycott embargo, headed by Ambassador W. Averell Harriman in view of President Johnson's Oct. 31 announcement of a bombing halt aimed at propelling the Paris talks into a new, more productive phase, they got under way in May.

Johnson said a regular session of the Paris talks was to take place on Wednesday at which Saigon government representatives "are free to participate."

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Students Hold School Aides With Knife

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Officials of San Fernando Valley State College were held prisoner by knife-wielding students for up to four hours Monday.

No serious injuries or vandalism was reported.

Altogether, about 200 students seized the top floor of the administration building and held 34 persons in the president's office, faculty lounge and other rooms.

The fifth floor was sealed off by members of the Black Student Union, Downstairs, on the first floor, leaders of the Negro group met with acting president Paul Blomgren and other administrators.

Later, after word that police were moving in, the students quietly left the building.

Blomgren met with other administrators and faculty and said he would announce in what-if anything would be done about the student demands.

LBJ Casts His Ballot In Texas

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (AP) — President Johnson cast his vote for a new president today two hours after the polls opened in his own hometown.

—There wasn't much doubt that he bolted for Hubert H. Humphrey, although Johnson wasn't answering any questions about the personal electoral process.

This was one of the few national elections since 1937 when Johnson himself wasn't running for Congress, the Senate or vice presidency of the White House.

He was in an easy-going, affable mood, joking and chatting with the election board and employees of the Pedernales Electric Coop, where the polling place was located.

Accompanied by Mrs. Johnson, Ranch 35 miles farther west and drove up to the coop just before 10 a.m.

They sat side by side at an eight-foot, plastic-topped table in a demonstration kitchen, scanning the paper ballots and marking yellow pencils provided for all the voters.

The chief executive and first lady were voters No. 12 and 13 in election box No. 4 for Johnson City and the surrounding area. About 275 persons are registered to vote there, according to the 78-year-old election judge, T. M. McNail.

Kimberly Road Name Change Still Studied

Jean Milar, Twin Falls city engineer, reported Monday night that the city council is studying the changes necessary in altering the name of Kimberly Road.

He said the residence numbers wouldn't have to be changed if the council decides to rename the street. Mr. Milar also noted the name, "Kimberly Road" is used in only two of the business titles. There are 43 addresses on Kimberly Road.

A petition, bearing 54 signatures, favoring the name change, was presented to the council.

Mr. Milar said the next meeting of the planning and zoning commission will be held Nov. 12 and they would probably make a recommendation regarding the name change at that time.

Council Cooperates For Turf Club Sale

Twin Falls City Council voted unanimously Monday night to rescind its action during the last regular council meeting.

The council had recommended the beer and liquor licenses held by the Turf Club be suspended. Since this action was taken, Leo Soran and Robert Soran have entered into a contract for purchase of the property, contingent upon the liquor license.

Councilmen voted to approve the license and to refer the Turf Club subject to the approval by the health and sanitation department prior to Dec. 31. A valid license must be obtained before the liquor license.

Leo Soran said if the Turf Club's present owners do comply with the regulations, making it possible for a beer and liquor license to be obtained, he and his brother will complete the contract.

He said the building would be mainly used for banquets, but he also would be a regular dining room. Mr. Soran indicated they would remodel the building and keep the Turf Club name.

He said that if the contract is fulfilled, they probably wouldn't be ready to open for two or three months after Dec. 1.

City Manager Herb Derrick noted that considerable work will have to be done on the building before it will meet sanitary requirements. He said vandals have damaged the interior of the building and the roof leaks. The sewer system also would have to be connected with the city line. All these repairs will have to be made by the seller prior to Dec. 1.

The councilmen said they were pleased someone was interested in purchasing the property, rather than having the building deteriorate.

Saigon Avers Reds Chart New Attacks

SAIGON (AP) — The South Vietnamese government said today that a Communist document seized a few days ago contained orders from Hanoi to step up military and political activity in the north after the United States stopped the bombing of North Vietnam.

There was no indication yet that the enemy had been put into effect, and the full ground war continued. But informed sources said American air attacks on the Chi Hoa Trail through Laos have been tripled since the bombing of the North was halted last Friday.

The sources said that 300 Air Force and Navy bombers are now daily attacking the jungle trails down which North Vietnamese troops and supplies travel to South Vietnam.

"The South Vietnamese political warfare department issued a 'special release' saying Communist political commissars at the regional and provincial levels throughout the territory of South Vietnam after the United States stops the bombing of North Vietnam."

The special release continued: "In the military field, the provincial commissars have to boost up the guerrilla warfare movement in order to conquer the whole countryside.

"In the political field, the provincial commissars have to push into action several armed propaganda teams into the towns and cities in order to carry out on a large scale their program of terrorism, assassination and sabotage as well as to support the formation of what is called the coalition government.

"In the enemy troop action field, the provincial commissars have to increase their propaganda and political work in the ARVN (Army of the Republic of Vietnam) soldiers and their dependents and especially to lure them with illusory peace solutions."

A government spokesman said the document had been captured by "friendly troops very close to the bombing hot spot" in the Mekong Delta about 50 miles south of Saigon.

A spokesman for the U. S. Command, asked about the document, said, "We have similar information." He declined to comment.

In Saigon, South Vietnamese President Nguyen Van Thieu continued to resist U.S. efforts to let the full calendar day extend to the Paris peace talks, and 5,000 Vietnamese demonstrated peacefully in the capital in support of Thieu's proposal.

About 3,000 Roman Catholics and other Vietnamese heard Sen. Nguyen Gia Hien, a leader of South Vietnam's most hawkish political faction, accuse President Johnson of playing domestic U.S. politics with his peace initiative.

Hijacker Nabs Victims' Funds As 'Contraband'

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Airline passengers back from Cuba today said the man who hijacked the plane seized their money as "contraband" of war.

They got it back from Cuban officials when the plane landed at Jose Marti airport outside Havana.

Morris J. Bedlin, a Miami Beach, Fla. fixer, said the Negro hijacker announced "You've got a new captain" when he took over the Boeing 727 jet with 37 other passengers and seven crew members aboard.

Bedlin said the hijacker announced over the public address system that the jet seizure was part of a black nationalist movement.

"He said 'we're going to take the plane for 100 days,'" Bedlin told newsmen.

M. R. Garrison, a Vernon, Tex., oilman, now in Miami, said the hijacker said the black nationalists were taking the action for "a new Africa."

Under the grant, half-day courses are conducted three times each year at 18 locations in Idaho, Montana and Oregon with physicians invited to attend programs most conveniently located to them.

These courses deal with recent advances in prevention, diagnosis and treatment of patients with heart disease, cancer, stroke and related diseases.

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Nixon Avers Reds Shift Arms South

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Richard M. Nixon triggered an anti-communist election campaign by reporting Hanoi may be taking advantage of the Vietnam bombing halt to shift arms south-nor the flow of military supplies from the North to the South.

Appearing on a \$100,000 network television Monday night, the Republican presidential candidate said:

"I read a very disturbing report this afternoon in which the Air Force general pointed out that the North Vietnamese are moving thousands of tons of supplies down the Ho Chi Minh Trail—and that our bombers are not able to stop it."

Humphrey was simultaneously conducting a television of his own here—and the Democratic presidential candidate quickly answered a question about Nixon's remarks.

"Humphrey accused—Nixon of trying to frighten the American people" and said "it is a totally irresponsible charge."

The vice president said he checked with U.S. government officials who said the Nixon statement was not true.

"It's a totally unsubstantiated charge," he began on Nov. 4. "I think you know very well that the President's orders to stop the bombing of the North did not include the Ho Chi Minh Trail—and the Communist subject to intensive American air power as it has been in the past and is again more so now, and that the Ho Chi Minh Trail zone—south of the demilitarized zone—are all subject to intensive air interception or interdiction."

Just as Nixon made such a statement and added, referring to his Democratic rival, "Boy, he really is getting confused."

Questions asked of Nixon during the hour-long broadcast from the NBC network were phoned from all parts of the nation to 100 telephone operators in the TV studio. As he being screened, they were read to Nixon by former NBC radio football coach Bud Wilkinson.

A crowd of the candidates' replies mirrored his public statements during the campaign. But he was perhaps sharper than usual in hitting at Humphrey.

Accusing the Democratic campaign of saying little or nothing about major issues, Nixon said:

"They've attacked me personally. They say I can't be trusted. They have just engaged in personal attacks. I don't think that's worthy of anybody who is going to be president of the United States."

Nixon said that "to show you how low they lay out," he quoted Humphrey as having said there's a one-in-three chance that the next president will not live out his four-year term.

Denying "this is a horrible thought to express, Nixon went on with a vigorous defense of his vice-presidential running mate, Spiro T. Agnew, saying that he should inherit the White House he would be "a strong, compassionate man."

Nixon also hit at Humphrey's "Musketeer" for having said when asked about draft card burners that anyone choosing to break the law in such fashion should be willing to face the penalty.

The Republican candidate said he and Agnew wouldn't "talk any of this nonsense."

Ougadougou Trek Proves Startling

OUAGADOUGOU, Upper Volta (AP) — The train to Ougadougou is an African safari by rail.

Plunging through the dense forests and flatlands of West Africa, it takes you from Abidjan, Ivory Coast — a modern city of skyscrapers — to the mud huts of Upper Volta's capital, Ougadougou.

The 715-mile route to the north is the first step in a 78-year-old dream to connect Niamey, the capital of Niger, to the port city of Abidjan on the Gulf of Guinea.

But the so-called Abidjan-Niamey Express never gets to Niger. It only travels as far as Ougadougou. To date it has not been considered financially profitable to complete the 250-mile link between Ougadougou and Niamey.

The first pick was raised to construct the vital link to the coast for landlocked Upper Volta on Jan. 12, 1964.

Fifty years later, winding its way in a semicircle through Benin, Burkina Faso, Mali and Niger, the Abidjan-Niamey Express roared into Ougadougou to break the trade barrier.

Stopping at each little village it passes, the train averages less than 26 miles per hour. But the 28-hour trip is a picturesque visit to centuries gone by where Africans still live in drab and plain thatched-roofed mud huts, and farm or raise goats for a living.

Dozens of natives rush to greet passengers as the 12-car train jerks to a halt in such desolate outposts of the interior as Yapo, Toussiana and Siby.

Naked, waving children squeal with delight and peek into windows as their mothers bargain over water, bananas, peanuts, eggs and other local produce with hungry and thirsty passengers.

Many a loud squabble over prices is abruptly ended when the diesel-powered train starts off — passengers clinging to items only half paid for, or snatched from the fruit-laden baskets perched on the heads of

the women on the platform below.

Most passengers travel third class on the five cars at the tail end of the train.

Here men, women and children are suitably boxed together with chickens, ducks and uncooperative goats. Ventilation from the open windows does little to relieve the oppressive sun and stench.

Barefooted and dressed in colorful robes or European clothing, they cling tightly to their overflowing knapsacks or dilapidated suitcases holding all their possessions.

Many are returning home from the Big City on the coast after visiting relatives there. Others are migrating to the north to join the agricultural centers, now being mechanized and pushed by the Ivory Coast government to help relieve the population pressures in urban centers.

First and second class passengers fare a little better. Here the cars are divided into 10 compartments which seat and sleep two. In first class compartments a person can sleep and sit by himself. Sheets and pillows are supplied. There is a dining car — serves three meals a day, replete with soup, fish, meat and wine. Here passengers pass the hours talking, playing cards and listening to transistor radios.

Extension of railway lines to Tambao in northwest Upper Volta, where that country's border meets with Mali and Niger, is now under consideration. The discovery of manganese deposits in the area has prompted a study to determine whether the reserves justify the expense.

If the study is favorable, a 220-mile route passing through Kaya, Douai and Maroko in northern Upper Volta will be cut out through the plains.

One can wishfully note that Douai is only 108 miles from Niamey in Niger.

If the Abidjan-Niamey Express ever reaches Niamey on the Niger River, it will finally have justified the name given to it at the beginning of the century.
