# Tests Say Medicines Deceptive

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP) — A panel of 200 scientists has found scores of drugs tested in a study for the federal Food and Drug Administration "totally ineffective."

The panel called for relabeling of more than 2,000 drugs—two-thirds of those tested so far in the study.

Dr. Robert K. Cannon of the National Academy of Sciences told a group of science writers Monday that revision is necessary because "the labels were misleading and deceptive."

"They left the impression that a drug could do what it cannot do," he said. "To put it bluntly, there was not a fair representation of the drug in question."

Dr. Cannon reported on a two-year study of drugs placed on the market between 1958 and 1962. The study now is about 87 per cent complete, and there is no reason to suspect that the two-thirds figure will change when the study of 3,600 formulations is finished, he said.

The study, being made by a National Academy of Sciences panel at the FDA's request, covers drugs introduced prior to 1962 about 85 per cent of all those now on the market. Those introduced since 1962 have been subject to laws requiring that label claims be substantiated.

Dr. Cannon said 6 per cent of the drugs tested so far have been "rated totally ineffective" despite elaborate claims. The biochemist declined to name brands, saying that was up to the FDA. A full report will be made when the study is completed, probably early next year.

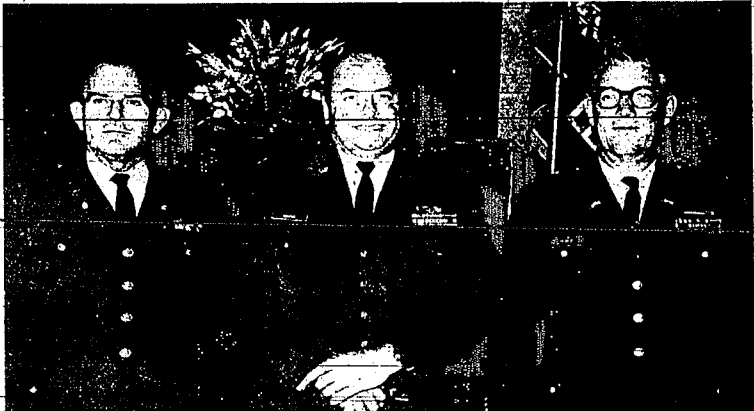
Only a small fraction of the drugs covered in the study can be bought over the counter, Dr. Cannon said. The rest are prescription items.

# Late Tally Gives Maryland To HHH

The suspense was gone, but the task of presidential vote counting continued on today in Alaska, Maryland and Missouri where President-elect Richard M. Nixon and Hubert H. Humphrey fought some of their closest contests.

With the count down to the last few precincts or the final stacks of absentee ballots, Maryland appeared firmly in the Humphrey column while Alaska and Missouri had lined up behind Nixon.

The latest national vote totals showed Humphrey with 30,760,301 or 42.97 per cent; Nixon with 31,083,267 or 43.48 per cent, and third party candidate George C. Wallace with 9,674,802 or 13.53 per cent. The Humphrey total includes 51,342 votes received by a second slate of Alabama electors pledged to him.

In the electoral-vote count Nixon won 32 states with 302 votes, Humphrey 13 states, and

the District of Columbia with 191 and Wallace 5 states with 45. The Oregon's hotly-contested Senate race incumbent Sen. Wayne Morse had been mathematically eliminated by his Republican challenger, Robert Packwood who held a 3,699 vote lead and only 2,500 votes to be counted.

The presidential absentee vote counting resumes in Missouri today but it was a foregone conclusion that the final tallies will give the state's 12 electoral votes to Nixon. The count was Nixon, 784,351, to Humphrey's 770,564, and Wallace's 199,660.

Nixon, who carried St. Louis County on election day, was expected to win most of the county's uncounted absentee votes.

# Viet War Lull Believed Brought On By Battlefield Failures Of Foe

SAYGON (AP) — The Vietnams war is on again in one of its periodic lulls with the Communist-led troops generally declining battle and making relatively few offensive moves.

Was the lull forced on Hanoi by military reverses or decided as a political move in answer to President Johnson's peace offensive which began to gain momentum in early October?

American military officers almost universally believe that the enemy's present posture, with his main-force units frequently back in jungled sanctuaries along the Cambodian and Laotian borders, was dictated by battlefield failures.

The most recent of these was the so-called August offensive which failed to achieve anything and, according to one ranking general, "was evidently planned in an unbelievably sloppy manner."

The military intelligence people admit, however, that their judgments are those of soldiers, earmarked for the president's eye.

Humphrey appeared to have gained Maryland's 10 electoral votes by a slim margin—He held a 17,371-vote lead over Nixon with about 15,000 paper ballots still to be counted. Humphrey's total was 533,045, Nixon, 515,674 and Wallace, 179,859.

Texas, which was decided for Humphrey on election night a week ago, showed Humphrey 1,267,317, Nixon 1,221,199, and Wallace 581,717.

### Youths To Face Charges

DETROIT (AP) — Eleven youths face prison terms of up to 25 years each if convicted on charges connected with eight bombings in the Detroit area in recent months. The 11, including two girls stood mute at their arraignment in Detroit Recorder's Court Monday. The group, ranging in ages from 18 to 24, are charged with conspiracy to place explosives with intent to do damage. The explosions all damaged public property in Detroit: Ann Arbor, Roseville and St. Clair Shores and dated back to Aug. 30. No one was injured in the blasts which occurred in the early or early morning. Bombings rocked three Detroit police parking lots, a drafting housing two Roseville field houses, the Sewall school administration building in St. Clair Shores, a parking lot at an Army recruiting office in Detroit, a CIA office in Ann Arbor and the Institute of Science and Technology building at the University of Michigan. Police, who had warrants for the arrests of eight youths, said "Their motivation appears to be anti-establishment." Police said the racially-mixed group did not appear to be part of an organization. Despite police characterization of the defendants as "hippie types" they were for the most part dressed in conventional sports clothes without any hippie trinkets. One young man wore shoulder length hair and another had a wide-brimmed hat. Arrested were David J. Vail, 24; Ronald Pierce, 18; John Schmitt, 19; William T. Ladd, 20; James R. McCarra, 18, and Dieder Flowers, 20, all of Detroit. Others were Joseph Clever, 19; Antoine Dughay, 18; Gary R. Millmore, 19, and Sandra Rousseau, 20, all of St. Clair Shores and Benjamin H. Parks, 20, of Highland Park. Preliminary hearings were set for Nov. 19.

LONDON (AP) — The Kremlin has given its giant male panda, An An, a courtship extension in London with his reluctant British partner, Chi Chi. The Soviet Ministry of Culture ordered An to return to the Moscow Zoo after a two-month stay in the London Zoo failed to produce consummation and the first giant panda born in captivity outside China. On Monday, the Soviet ministry sent another cable saying An An could stay a while longer. An official of the London Zoo said the reluctant Chi Chi "is giving signs that she is coming into season. We think there is a possibility of them mating." An An and Chi Chi are the only two giant pandas outside of China.

### McNamara Flies To Afghanistan

MOSCOW (AP) — World Bank President Robert S. McNamara, the former U.S. secretary of defense, left by air today for Afghanistan after an unexpected meeting with Soviet Premier Alexei Kosygin. A brief official announcement gave no details on their meeting, which lasted an hour and 45 minutes. A U.S. Embassy spokesman said McNamara, en route to Kabul, stopped in Moscow as a tourist and Kosygin asked him to call on him.

# Dissident Priests Stage 'Sit-In' Protest

WASHINGTON (AP) — About 200 priests, singing "The Impossible Dream," marched into the bishop's hotel at midnight Monday to show support for the 40. They sat-in for three hours before Archbishop John F. Dearden of Detroit, head of the conference, finally met with them and received an appeal asking the conference to require mediation of their dispute with the cardinal.

The constructive issue is dominating the bishops' five-day fall session which began Monday. A final stand on the controversy is expected to be shaped in secret debate starting Wednesday. The proposed version of the pastoral letter already handed out to the bishops also probes the morality of the Vietnam war and takes a stance in favor of selective conscientious objection to a specific war. But the bishops refused to spell out any de-

tails in advance of their vote. About 220 bishops and five cardinals are attending the conference one week after the Grench Assembly of Bishops left the question of birth control to personal conscience. A civil engineer picked the hotel Monday with a sign showing red flames and the inscription: "To the U.S. Bishops—Obey the Pope." About 200 priests from as far away as San Antonio and Sent-

met during the day Monday to ask the U.S. bishops to step in the punishment dispute. Many of them, led by clergymen cast out from their rectories by Cardinal O'Boyle, marched a mile to the hotel to deliver the appeal. The priests prayed in the lobby, sang hymns and ate sandwiches. Archbishop Dearden appeared before them to accept their appeal. The Rev. Thomas Reese of Wilmington, Del., a spokesman for the priests, said afterwards, "It's a calculated risk—it may do more harm than good." But we're hopeful.

## Australian Police Find Criminal 'Armor' Useful

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Victoria State Police have borrowed an idea from one of Australia's most notorious criminals — to protect police in gunbattles. For three years police have kept secret a suit of armor that can stop a .32 caliber bullet from 10 feet. Police are now convinced that most rifle shots will glance off it. In many ways it resembles bushranger Ned Kelly's famous ploughshare armor of the 1880s. But where Kelly had his arms and legs exposed, the new police model protects all but hands and feet. The armor was constructed for the Victoria Police by the tailoring department of Wilkingson of London, a firm known for its swords and armor. The helmet protects the face and neck, and there are straps at the back.

## Army May Reduce Scope Of U. S. Training Bases

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army has been ordered to begin scaling down its huge training bases in the United States as the American buildup in Vietnam nears its end. The Pentagon acknowledges considering cutbacks in some training centers, but says no decision has been reached. A reduction in training output will be possible as the Army ceases sending new units to Vietnam and concentrates on the most part on providing replacements for men wending up two and three-year tours. The Vietnam manpower level now at approximately 35,000 men, is expected to reach President Johnson's announced ceiling of 349,500 around the end of the year. The Army Times, an unofficial publication aimed at the soldier audience, reports in its Nov. 13 edition that the Army plans to phase out basic combat training at Ft. Bliss, Tex., and advanced individual training at Ft. Dix, N.J. The newspaper tied the elimination of basic training at Ft. Bliss to Army plans to cut back its weekly training load from 56 to 53 companies. A company is about 200 men. The Bliss cutback would go into effect late this month. The phase-out of advanced individual training at Ft. Dix, the Times stated, would come in mid-December. Dix would continue providing advanced training for guided missile men. As part of the readjustment of the training complex, the Pentagon only a few days ago designated Ft. Polk, La., a permanent installation. Officials said the move makes Polk, which dates back to World War II, eligible for some badly needed construction funds. The Army has been operating 15 training centers to help meet Vietnam war needs. Since mid-1965, when the big Vietnam buildup began in earnest, the Army has added over a half-million men to its ranks. The war effort requires 50,000 replacements per month, and

other worldwide commitments demand additional forces. In addition to Forts Dix, Bliss and Polk, the U.S. training centers include Ft. Knox and Ft. Campbell, Ky.; Ft. Jackson, S.C.; Ft. Gordon and Ft. Benning, Ga.; Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo.; Ft. Ord, Calif.; Ft. Sill, Okla.; Ft. Sam Houston, Tex. (medical); Ft. McClellan, Ala. (WAC's); Ft. Bragg, N.C.; and Ft. Lewis, Wash.

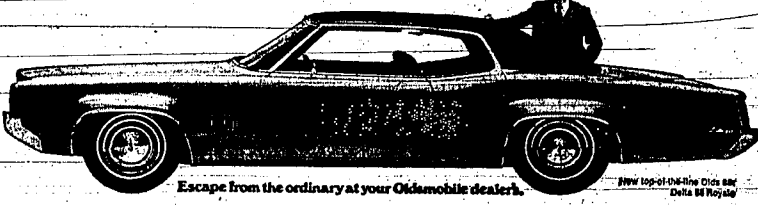
## Crash 'Pillow' May Cut Deaths

WASHINGTON (AP) — Officials say a "crash pillow" which inflates, immediately in a collision offers hope of making cars safer for passengers. "It sound crazy—like a Rubie Goldberg contraption—but it is being taken very seriously both by the government and by industry," Dr. William Haddon Jr., director of the National Highway Safety Bureau, said Monday. Haddon said the pillows could be available within a few years, but technicians want to make certain triggering mechanisms are as foolproof as possible. Present plans call for a pillow to pop out of the steering column and another from the dashboard in front of the front seat passenger.

# Experiment To Attack High Prices Land Is Initiated By Ford Foundation

NEW YORK—A major experiment to attack escalating land prices—a problem that has seriously eroded Federal programs of acquisition of parks and other open spaces—was announced today by the Ford Foundation. Private and public conservation leaders, including Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall, said the step was of great potential significance.

The Foundation announced a guarantee for a \$6 million line of credit to enable the Nature Conservancy, a nonprofit organization, to borrow funds for land purchases in at least twenty states. The land to be bought consists of ninety-seven tracts earmarked for Federal purchase when Congress appropriates the necessary funds. The Nature Conservancy will hold the tracts until one of three Federal agencies (the Forest Service, the National Park Service, and the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife) can purchase them at cost.

Commenting on the announcement, Secretary Udall said: "The Nature Conservancy has for a number of years assisted government agencies in land acquisition, and the Ford Foundation's action will enable this highly effective private conservation agency to play a more significant role than ever before. We are extremely pleased that the Conservancy and the Foundation are joining forces in this exciting conservation activity."

Under the terms of the Foundation guarantee, the Conservancy will establish lines of credit to provide the funds for the land purchases. Two banks will participate, the First State Bank of Albany, New York, and the Manufacturers Hanover Trust Company of New York City.

"Escalating land cost, the problem this program is designed to help resolve, has been of increasing concern to both members of Congress and the executive agencies involved in land acquisition," Gordon Harrison, program officer in charge of the Foundation's Resources and Environment effort, said today. "Under normal circumstances, approximately 12 to 18 months elapse between the time that Congress authorizes a project and the time when the appropriation becomes available and the acquiring agency can have land purchasers in the field. In addition to the normal increase in land values that may occur during that period, an opportunity is provided for real estate speculators to buy the key tracts and inflate their prices.

"This speculation is not only greatly increasing the cost to the taxpayers of the government's open-space programs, it is threatening its very existence, as there are not sufficient funds available even to cover the costs of projects already authorized. Congress has even considered declaring a moratorium on all further land purchases, but that would bring the entire program to a halt."

The Foundation's guarantee to the Nature Conservancy is the largest in its new series of program-related investments (the use of part of its portfolio directly for programs now supported only through outright grants) which was announced last month, and marks the first use of its capital for land-preservation purposes.

"While the funds and the lands involved are relatively small compared to the magnitude of the problem," Mr. Harrison said, "we believe the experiment will establish a significant pattern for considerably larger land acquisition in the future."

Working together, these two private agencies—the Conservancy and the Foundation—can, we hope, forestall substantial losses in dollars to the taxpayer."

Edward P. Clift, chief of the Forest Service, called the program "a significant contribution to the Conservancy's splendid program of acquiring outstanding properties for public use and enjoyment and protection of natural beauty. It will materially assist the Federal agencies, including the Forest Service."

Under the Conservancy's program, however, the government is under no obligation to complete the purchase. Although the Conservancy will purchase only land included in the projects authorized by Congress and only on the request of the responsible agency, it has no commitment from the government for the land's repurchase. Should Congress revise its land acquisition plans, title to the property would remain with the Conservancy. In such cases, it would attempt to recover its funds by the sale of the land to other buyers.

The Nature Conservancy is the only national conservation agency whose sole purpose is the preservation of natural areas by their actual acquisition. In addition to accepting outright gifts of land, which are then retained in a natural state for scientific research or other purposes, the Conservancy helps to finance purchases of outstanding areas through loans made from its revolving funds. These loans, which are usually made to local groups, generally cover option costs or downpayments on desirable areas and give the local group time to organize its own fund-raising program. When the purchase has been completed, the Conservancy will either retain title to the land or transfer it to a suitable agency, such as a university or a local conservation organization, who will then supervise its maintenance. It had engaged in hundreds of such transactions across the nation.

It has also assisted numerous government agencies with their land acquisition programs by making purchases in emergency situations when public funds were not immediately available. The money for such purchases comes from the Conservancy's revolving funds or lines of credit previously established with commercial sources. Among the states that have been helped are California, Virginia, Connecticut and New York.

The effect of such action often exceeds the actual acreage involved. Upper Priest Lake, the last wild, but accessible lake in Idaho where private land development could take place, was threatened when two privately owned inholdings were suddenly placed on the market. At the request of the Forest Service, the Conservancy made loans to the owners against a mortgage on the property in return for agreement that no further development would take place for one year. Before the expiration of the agreement, Senator Church of Idaho introduced a bill in Congress to extend the boundary of the Kaniksu National Forest to include the privately owned part of Upper Priest Lake. The bill passed, the Forest Service condemned the area, and the Nature Conservancy recovered its funds. Now, with the cooperation of the state of Idaho, which has large holdings on the eastern shore of the lake, the entire lake has been declared a scenic area.

Laxes, and other expenses, and transfer the land to the state when funds were appropriated. In 1955 the property was sold to the state for a total of \$530,000 under deeds providing for reversion to the Conservancy if the natural area restrictions embodied in them were violated. This deed requires that 75 percent of the park remain wild, while the other 25 percent will be developed for recreational use. By state legislation these provisions were made effective even against highway construction.

The Conservancy, which was incorporated in 1954, has its headquarters in Washington, D.C., and branch offices in Chicago and San Francisco. Its total assets, including its revolving funds and land currently held, amount to \$15 million.

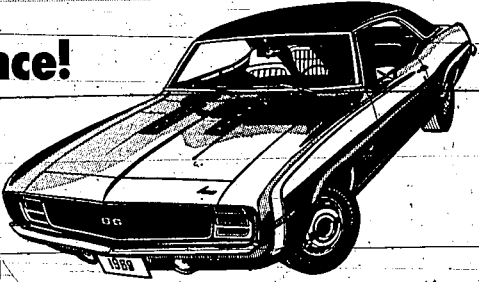

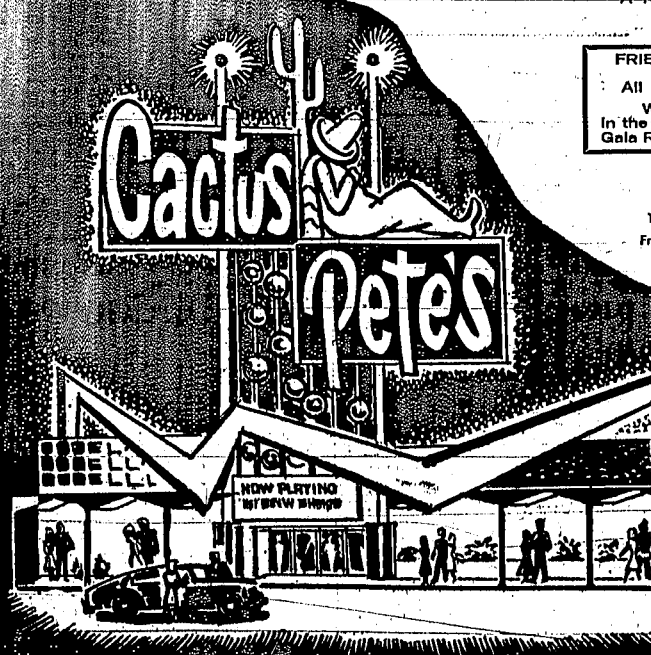

I want to become a lawyer, Abby, and I've been trying to upgrade my vocabulary. I've

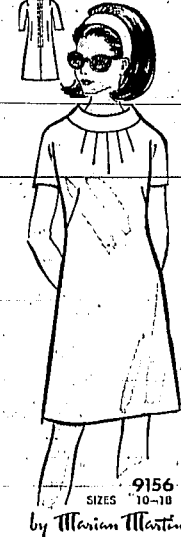
taken courses in speech and drama, and have developed a very dynamic and impressive way of communicating.

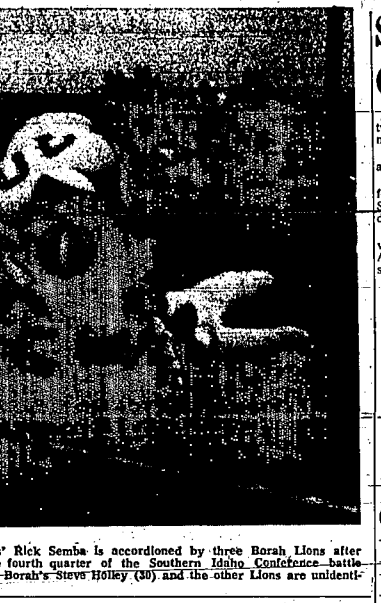

# Officials Fret Over Morale Of GIs If Peace Talks Start

By JOHN T. WHEELER

SAIGON (AP) — A senior U.S. military source expressed concern today that the fighting morale of U.S. and South Vietnamese troops may suffer a serious drop once full-fledged peace talks get under way in Paris.

The concern stems from the old military adage that no soldier wants to be the last man killed in any war.

One military source said the gravest concern is for the morale of the South Vietnamese troops, many of whom have been fighting off and on for a dozen years or more.

The Viet Cong and North Vietnamese are bombarding the Saigon government's regular army and its militiamen with propaganda on the theme that the war is almost over. President Nguyen Van Thieu in a nationwide radio TV address warned that he believes the Communist propaganda that the war soon will be over and to throw down your arms.

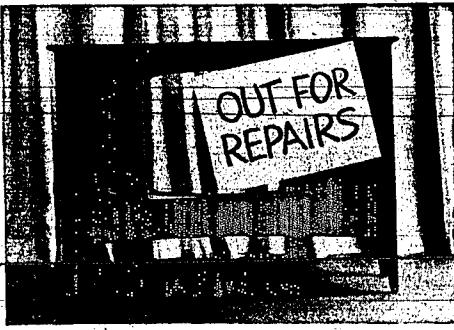
Desertion always has been one of the biggest problems among Saigon's divisions; the prospect, false though it obviously is, of an early peace could escalate the trend.

The enemy on the other hand has kicked off a major propaganda campaign to convince its troops that they can win the war with "high morale."

The enemy promises major military operations that will reinforce the hands of their negotiators in Paris.

The U. S. Command feels this propaganda may be an accurate reflection of the enemy's intentions. Gen. Creighton Abrams' staff already is planning a major offensive, both to counter Hanoi's plans and to strengthen the allied side at the bargaining table.

"We can play fight-talk as well or better than they can," one source said.
